ABSENT: Regents Clausen, Drexler, Wilkie. (Regent Wilkie was present at the afternoon session.)

Upon motion of Regent Backus it was VOTED, That the minutes of the meeting of the Board held on June 22, 1935, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

Regent Grady read the report of the Finance Committee on the budget for 1935-36. He then stated that he wishes to go on record as objecting to increases in salaries of those not under civil service rates prescribed by the Bureau of Personnel. He raised the question ence to payments in the classified service and stated that in his • as to whether the Board of Regents of the Mattorney General the question the power to lawfully fix the compensation of civil service employees of the minimum fixed by the Bureau of Personnel by the employment

'President Frank made the following statement: "It is my judgment that the emergency policy of waiver applied to civil service, as well as non-civil service employees, is not a violation of the law of the state."

V Mr. Phillips stated: "In interpreting the letter receiv in March, 1934, from the Bureau of Personnel, my understanding i we are not only complying with all of the laws of the state, b university has been specifically directed to prepare its pay rolls as outlined in that letter and in accordance with the letter as the Bureau of Personnel interpreted it. We are following directions given to us by the Bureau of Personnel."

No copy of the report of the <u>Senate Investigating Com</u>-<u>mittee</u>, filed September 21, 1935, has been sent to the Regents of the University for any official notice or action.

(Cont.)

It has, however, come to our attention from publication in the press. 'We find no evidence in the report, or referred to therein, supporting its conclusions. The absence of any facts to support the conclusions reached is covered in the report by generalizations such as the statement that the matters condemned are matters of common knowledge.

Many facts as to the actions of the Regents and Regents' Committee and the President of the University as to the Extension Division are omitted and many facts entirely misstated. Suffice it to say that the Board reaffirms its approval of the acts of the Regent Committee as to the Extension Division and of the President of the University in connection therewith. We are more than satisfied that the action taken by this Board was not only fully sustained by the facts but required in the best interests of the University.

As to any alleged activities of teachers in the University in the promotion of Communism or any allied beliefs, the report contains no reference to any member of the University staff as teaching Communism or any other subversive or un-American doctrine. We must, therefore, assume that the Committee found no such case.

As to the students, nothing is mentioned other than the singing of the "Internationale" at a meeting of a small group of students.

The University of Wisconsin, throughout its history, has steadfastly preserved on its campus the right of free discussion guaranteed by the Bill of Rights of the Constitution of Wisconsin and the Constitution of the United States. We are convinced that this constitutional guaranty of free discussion is in the interest of the safety as well as the progress of the state. And we unanimously support the President of the University and his administrative colleagues in the preservation of this constitutional right regardless of the criticisms that may be directed against it. We are entirely satisfied that the President of the University has never taken an attitude towards the freedom of expression of opinion on the campus which is too liberal towards such expression.

We reaffirm our belief in the full freedom of expression of honest opinion on economic and political matters where such expression does not go beyond the bounds of law or good morals. We believe students should have and do have the right to study social problems and should not be suppressed from expressing or advocating doctrines in which they sincerely believe, provided always the bounds of law or decency are not exceeded. This is the rule which has prevailed in the University and we here reaffirm it.

We differ from and disapprove the opinions expressed by

some small groups of students. We disagree with some public statements of the personal opinions of some members of the faculty. But we cannot undertake to prohibit every such expression of opinion that we may regard as unsound without setting aside this constitutional right of free discussion.

Without reference to any particular statement or act, the report of the Senate Committee tends to create the impression that the President of the University and other administrative officers encourage the spread of communistic doctrine in the University. The utterances of the President of the University are a matter of record. In none of them has he advocated Communism or anything resembling it but has consistently taken the opposite position.

It is comforting to know that there are today over 1700 more students from Wisconsin homes at the University than there were in 1933 when the first of these legislative investigations ended. Evidently the fathers and mothers of Wisconsin have confidence in the University and we shall continue our efforts to deserve that confidence. We welcome criticism which calls attention to specific cases which can be corrected if there has been abuse.

Document 488 - November, 1935 OFF-CAMPUS GRADUATE WORK IN EDUCATION

The Graduate Faculty recommends that the Department of Education be permitted to offer, as an experiment for a period of two years, extension courses for graduate credit in the Eau Claire and Stevens Point areas under the following terms:

- 1. The students applying for graduate credit must be regularly admitted to the Graduate School.
- 2. These courses shall be given by legal staff members of the Department of Education.
- 3. The courses to be offered shall be selected from those already listed as acceptable for graduate credit.
- 4. As an integral part of the work in the course, experimental work in the public schools of the city shall be required.
- 5. The total number of credits taken by any one person during an academic year shall not exceed two a semester or four for an academic year.
- 6. At the end of two years the Department of Education shall report on this work to the Graduate Faculty, and may at that time request authority for its continuance.

The Faculty of the College of Letters and Science recommends the abandonment of the present "two-year" joint course leading to the degree of B.S. (Medical Science) and the approval of a new "three-year" joint course leading to the same degree. A revised statement covering both the present B.A. course and the new B.S. course is herewith submitted for approval.

* * * * *

A major in Medical Science is authorized for students in the General Courses who pursue the regular three-year premedical sequence and meet both their premedical and special degree requirements. In their senior year such students register in the Medical School as well as in the College of Letters and Science. The work of the major consists of a minimum of <u>25</u> credits in closely related medical subjects, and according to the degree requirements selected (see section 14) they may qualify for the B.A. or the B.S. degree.

MEDICAL SCHOOL

Candidates for either the B.A. or the B.S. degree are permitted to major in medical science; they shall register in the Medical School in their senior year and will count toward their degree the full work of the first-year medical course. Such students must earn at least 90 credits in Letters and Science and meet all the regular premedical requirements (8-10 credits each in general chemistry, biology, and physics, at least 4 credits in organic chemistry, one year of college Latin or its high-school equivalent, and a reading knowledge of French or German established by credits or examination) during the first three years.

The candidates for the B.A. degree must satisfy the regular requirements in foreign language, English, and history or mathematics as specified for the B.A. degree in the General Course.

The candidates for the B.S. degree must complete freshman English, a year of elementary or more advanced mathematics in college, Zoology 105, and one year of organic chemistry.
