
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



THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

The University of Wisconsin, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the University opened its doors to the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the University of Wisconsin includes 13 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, more than 43,000 students and 14,000 employees, nearly 4,000,000 volumes in 22 libraries, a \$750,000,000 budget, and research and development expenditures totalling \$185,000,000 (third largest in the U.S.).

Wisconsin has ranked among the top ten universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. Combining the results of seven major ratings since 1925, Prof. David Webster of the University of Pennsylvania, writing for the June 1983 *Change* magazine,





ranked the University of Wisconsin fourth in the nation—behind Harvard, California-Berkeley and Yale, and tied with the University of Chicago. More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections were offered in the fall of 1986. Majors are available in some 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's degree programs.


UW departments ranked among the top ten in the nation in the 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States include Sociology (1st), German, Chemical Engineering and Geography (2nd), Statistics (4th), Plant Pathology, Molecular Biology and Biochemistry (5th), Spanish and Portuguese (6th), Zoology (7th), Political Science, Chemistry and Economics (8th), Mathematics (9th), and History (10th).

The UW's international activities extend the boundaries of the campus to all parts of the globe. The campus has about 3,600 foreign students from 125 countries, offers some 50 foreign languages for study, and has the largest overall number of international studies faculty and largest number of faculty of any university in East Asian, South and Southeast Asian, African and Latin American studies. Junior year abroad programs are offered for students going to Brazil, China, England, France, West Germany, Hungary, Israel, India, Italy, Spain, Sweden, Norway, Nepal, Thailand and Mexico and Quebec for summer study.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, education of physicians and other health professionals, research and public service. It includes the Medical, Nursing, Pharmacy, and Allied Health Professions schools; UW Hospital and Clinics; State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center—one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country.

More than 400 campus organizations offer a wide variety of activities for Wisconsin students—including social, political, philosophic or religious, sports, honorary, ecological, philanthropic, drama and music groups plus fraternities and sororities. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.

Jim Mott marks his 23rd year as Sports Information Director at the University of Wisconsin in 1988-80

A Madison native, Jim is a member of the CoSIDA (College Sports In-

formation Directors of America) Hall of Fame (1979). He is also a past president of both CoSIDA and the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

In 1986, Jim was honored with the distinguished Arch Ward award— presented by CoSIDA for longtime meritorious service to the sports information profession.

Mott served as Wisconsin's basketball manager for four years while an undergraduate at the UW, earning a major "W" award for his work. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Zoology from Wisconsin in 1951, and then spent the next three years in the United States Army—including 16 months of service in Korea.

He and his wife, Dorothy, are the parents of three sons—Bill, 26, David, 23, and

Eric, 21. Bill is a graduate of the UW Medical School, Dave graduated from the UW Pharmacy school this past May, and Eric is currently an undergraduate at the school.

Leu handles all radio and television contracts for the UW Athletic Department, assists in the coordination of athletic marketing programs, and is the producer of Wisconsin's post-season football, basketball and hockey highlight films. He has also done color commentary on Wisconsin's hockey broadcasts, and has served as producer-host of Badger Football on the state's public television stations.

Doug Spencer, now in his fifth year as Assistant Sports Information Director and sixth year overall with the University of Wisconsin athletic program, came to Madison with hockey coach Jeff Sauer in the fall of 1982.

A 1976 graduate of Western Michigan University with a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and Journalism, Spencer was a member of the Badgers' 1983 NCAA Championship ice hockey team as administrative assistant to coach Sauer.

Prior to arriving at the UW, Doug was the Publicity and Publications Director for the Amateur Hockey Association of the United States in Colorado Springs from 1979-81, and was assistant sports information director at both Western Michigan University (1977-79) and Eastern Michigan University (1976-77). He has nine years of collegiate sports information experience behind him in a full-time capacity.

COVERING THE BADGERS

COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

Wisconsin's working facilities for pressradio-television are located on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium and can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6. Radio broadcast booths are located on level three, while print media are located on level four.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS

All requests for Communications Center tickets must first be placed with the Wisconsin Sports News Service Office. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call window at Camp Randall Stadium on the ground level entrance at Gate 6, Section E. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations. Telecopier service will be available to members of the working press by the appropriate servicing organizations.

PRESS BOX SERVICES

Game programs, two-deep lineups, game-day notes and statistics are provided prior to kickoff. Complete game statistics and play-by-play accounts will be furnished to each working location—or as requested.

RADIO

Each station admitted for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets. Booths are assigned and tickets mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the Wisconsin Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call window.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Field passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV level, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30 yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

PARKING

A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 (directly adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium) are available to working media only. They will be issued as requested and as available.

PLAYER INTERVIEWS

Player interviews may be obtained following practice each weekday, Monday through Thursday—at approximately 6:00 pm. Out of town media should arrange interviews ahead of time through the UW Sports News Service Office at (608) 262-1811.

On game days, media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players in the Badger lockerroom following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches.

Post-game interviews of opposition coaches will be conducted in the UW Wrestling room, located a short distance down the hallway from the opposition's locker-room under the east side stands.

INTERVIEWING COACH MORTON

Coach Don Morton will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview of Coach Morton will be conducted in the media interview area in the Badgers' weight training room.

Coach Morton will conduct a press and telephone conference for local media each Monday at 12 noon central time during the season in the "W" Club Room in Camp Randall Stadium. A light lunch will be served.

On Tuesdays throughout the season, Coach Morton will take part in the Big Ten Telephone Conference. (Media wishing to take part in this teleconference should phone the Big Ten Service Bureau in Schaumburg, Illinois at 312-885-3933 to secure the appropriate phone number and further details.)

Morton will also usually be available each weekday immediately before and/or after practice. Practice will start daily at 4:00 pm.





1988 **WISCONSIN FOOTBALL**

The University of Wisconsin football program looks to continue its march forward in 1988 as the Badgers enter the second year of Don Morton's challenge to rebuild the school's gridiron fortunes.


Following a successful four and onehalf year period (1981 through four games of 1985) that saw Wisconsin football teams compile a 31-18-1 record, a 63% winning percentage and appearances in three post-season bowl games, Badger gridiron teams slumped to five wins in their next 20 outings. Included in that difficult period was the tragic death of popular head coach Dave McClain in the spring of 1986, a loss that was instrumental in the program's period of misfortune. As a response to the situation, youthful and highly-respected coach Don Morton was brought in from the University of Tulsa and entrusted with the task of turning the Badgers back into winners.



Now, with his first season behind him, the energetic Morton expects to see measurable improvement in his second team as the University of Wisconsin proudly celebrates its 100th anniversary of college football competition. Whereas 1987 was characterized by transformation, readjustment and new coaching philosophies, 1988 should bring a degree of fruition. As Morton and his staff add tenure, the program continues its build-up of skilled athletes, the team gains confidence, and the offensive and defensive systems continue their progression.

Wisconsin confidently returns 18 starters this fall—11 on defense and seven on offense—among a total of 23 defensive and 16 offensive lettermen. Although the Badgers are coming off a 3-8 overall and 1-7 Big Ten 1987 record, there was a positive element in that four of the eight defeats occured in the final minutes of the fourth quarter.

THE DEFENSIVE SIDE




Defensively, Morton and coordinator Mike Daly are understandably optimistic. With all 11 starters back (based on the final game lineup of 1987), the Badgers look to cut down a 1987 opponent scoring average of 27.2 points per game and an opponent's total offense average of 398 yards per game.

"The Badgers will have more emotional, mental and physical maturity on defense in 1988," said Morton. "And although we do have 11 starters returning, only three of those slated for initial starting duty are seniors, so we are still a young defense.

"Our depth at the corner position is an area of concern for us in the pre-season; some of our younger players will have to mature in a hurry. But nonetheless, we expect our area of biggest improvement this fall should be on the defensive side of the ball."

Key performers in Wisconsin's "reduced okie" defense will include post-season honor candidates David Wings at inside linebacker, Dan Kissling at defensive line/outside linebacker, Don Davey at defensive end, Chad VandeZande at defensive tackle, Pete Nowka at strong safety and Greg Thomas at free safety. Wings, the Badgers' defensive "MVP" and an honorable mention All-Big Ten pick a year ago, is the No. 2 returning tackler in the Big Ten Conference for 1988 after registering 134 stops and two interceptions a year ago. Kissling, also an honorable mention All-Big Ten selection in 1987, registered 74 stops, six tackles for loss, three pass deflections and three fumble recoveries and is recognized as one of the up and coming linebackers in college football. Davey, a 6-5, 237-pounder, was a first team GTE/ Cosida Academic All-American in 1987, recorded nine tackles for loss (-47 yards) and four pass deflections. VandeZande, who tentatively moves to defensive tackle after playing at noseguard, is a three-time letterman who has started games all three of his years at Wisconsin. Nowka, marking his third year as a defensive starter, recorded 55 tackles and two interceptions last year, while Thomas came on strong to start nine games at safety with 105 tackles and two interceptions.



DEFENSIVE LINE

The Badgers' defensive front wall should show increased effctiveness in 1988. Four players who started the 1987 finale against Michigan State will form the core of the line.

At the end position, Don Davey and Leon Johnson will head into the fall as the No. 1 and No. 2 performers. With nine starts behind him, Davey should come to the front among conference veterans in 1988 while Johnson had five starts a year ago. At noseguard, John Banaszak and Bill Antonie make up the early two-deep. Banaszak started the final seven games of '87 at defensive tackle, while Antonie saw action in all 11 contests in a back-up role. Manning the tackle spot this fall are converted veteran noseguard Chad Vande Zande (11 starts in 1987) and back-up Jeff Wolf. Vande Zande was fourth on the team in tackles a year ago with 62, including seven tackles for loss (-29 yards). The "sam" (or outside linebacker) spot-the fourth to line-up along the line of scrimmage-will be hotly contested between standouts Dan Batsch and Dan Kissling. Both players marked 11 starts a year ago, with Kissling recording 74 tackles, three pass deflections and three fumble recoveries. Batsch had 39 stops, six tackles for loss (-19 yards) and two fumble recoveries.

Morton and Daly feel they have a solid group up front, one that will be instrumental in the team's plan to move upward in 1988.


LINEBACKERS

Wisconsin's basic defensive formation includes four positions that cover the middle portion of the playing field. They are an outside linebacker, two inside linebackers and a strong safety.

At the two inside spots, the Badgers feel especially confident with the return of starters David Wings and Malvin Hunter. Wings is a solid All-Big Ten candidate while the up and coming Hunter moved into a starting role alongside Wings for the final five games of 1987 and collected 53 tackles. Behind Wings is returning letterman Peter Underwood while Hunter's top backup should be veteran letterman Andy Hartlieb.

The outside linebacker position features two-time letterwinner Paul Partington as the tentative 1988 starter and a "player-to-watch" in physically-talented John L. Williams.

At strong safety, veteran performer and fourth-year starter Pete Nowka is one of the best at his position in the Big Ten. He had 55 tackles, two interceptions and two fumble recoveries last season. His backup, Rafael Robinson, is a converted running back who was especially impressive during the 1988 spring session.



SECONDARY

Wisconsin returns three starters in the secondary in left cornerback LaMarr White, free safety Greg Thomas and right cornerback Brad Mayo. The trio features experience and speed, but lacks in size.

White recorded 47 tackles and three interceptions in 1987; Thomas finished second on the team in tackles with 105 and had two interceptions; Mayo marked 41 tackles, a team-high five pass deflections, three interceptions and one fumble recovery.

Backing-up White will be Tyrone Mahone, behind Thomas will be two-time letterman Jeff Wagner and backing-up Mayo should be Eddie Fletcher.

THE OFFENSIVE SIDE

Offensively, the Badgers hope to be much more difficult to defend in 1988. Morton and offensive coordinator Pat Simmers have spent much of the off-season upgrading and expanding the team's option attack—moves designed to better capitalize on the strengths of individual players as well as create more complex problems for the opposition.

This fall, the Wisconsin offense will feature bruising running back and All-Big Ten/All-America candidate Marvin Artley, 1987 Big Ten freshman of the year and quarterback Tony Lowery, All-Big Ten/All-America candidate and guard Todd Nelson, tight end Brian Anderson and starting receivers Scott Bestor and David Burks.

One indicated change for the Badgers this fall will be an added emphasis on the passing game, according to Morton.

"We have a chance to see improvement in 1988." said Morton. "Our quarterbacks, Tony Lowery and Otis Flowers, will be sophomores with a year's playing experience. Marvin Artley led the Big Ten in yards-per-carry last year and is looking forward to a great senior season. Senior guard Todd Nelson should carry on in a fine tradition of offensive linemen at Wisconsin. With a year of running the option, we have added more offense—especially in the passing area.

"We lost four starters from 1987 on offense, and all four were veteran offensive linemen. It takes time to develop an offensive line and some of our young players have to come through and mature in a

Artley, Wisconsin's most valuable player on offense in 1987, is the No. 2 returning rusher in the Big Ten for 1988. A 6-1, 225-pound senior, Artley led the conference with a per-carry average of 6.5 yards in 1987 with 955 yards and nine touchdowns. Lowery, who started the last seven games, was honored as UPI's Big Ten freshman of the year after recording 851 yards of total offense in seven games. Nelson is a 6-5, 285-pound senior who started all 11 games last fall, while the 6-5, 235pound Anderson started every game at tight end. At the receiver positions, Bestor and Burks ranked 1-2 on the team in '87 with 18 and 17 catches respectively.


OFFENSIVE LINE

The 1987 Badgers featured a veteran offensive line, one that saw three of its members—tackle Paul Gruber, guard Glenn Derby and center Rod Lossow—move on to the National Football League. For 1988, however, Morton and his staff face a rebuilding job, starting with the replacement of four starters.

The top athlete here is All-America/All-Big Ten candidate and guard Todd Nelson. A 6-5, 285-pound senior and two-year letterman, Nelson started all 11 games a year ago and is considered one of the midwest's top performers by pro scouts. Nelson looks to continue a fine tradition of offensive linemen at Wisconsin, one that includes 1987 All-American Paul Gruber being selected as the fourth pick overall in the 1988 NFL college draft.

Also listed as tentative 1988 starters are two-time letterman Keith Peterson (6-5, 264) at left tackle, Jim Basten (6-4, 253) at center, Joe Magazzeni (6-7, 278) at right guard, and Tim Otto (6-4, 255) at right tackle. Peterson, who figured to battle for a starting spot in 1987, was forced to miss ten games last fall after suffering an early injury to his chest area while weightlifting. Magazzeni played in two contests and Otto played in three.

Pre-season No. 2's include Brady Pierce (6-7, 267) at left tackle, David Rapps (6-5, 245) at left guard, Matt Joki (6-5, 255) at center, Nick Polczinski (6-5, 275) at right guard and Jeff Krieger (6-6, 220) at right tackle. Pierce saw action in six games in 1987 while Polczinski played in eight.




TIGHT END/ WIDE RECEIVER

An area with solid depth for 1988 looks to be the receiving corps. Wisconsin can look to returning starters and veteran lettermen at both tight end and wide reciever.

The tight end position will center around 1987 starter and three-time letterman Brian Anderson (6-5, 235), followed by two-time "W" winner Paul Chryst. Anderson caught 13 passes for 150 yards and one touchdown a year ago, while

Chryst grabbed six for 67 yards and one six-pointer. Anderson has started 20 games the past two seasons. Chryst, one of the UW's most versatile athletes, has also seen previous action at quarterback and could fill in there if the need arises.

At wide receiver positions, returning starters are Scott Bestor and David Burks. Bestor topped the club in catches in '87 (18 for 257 yards and one TD) while Burks was second (17 for 208 yards). Those totals are expected to increase in 1988 as the Badgers figure to show an expanded passing attack. Behind Bestor and Burks are two-time letterman and player-to-watch Bill Williams, Jr and two-time letterman James Ross.



QUARTERBACK

A position that holds the key to the offense, the quarterback derby will revolve around returning starter Tony Lowery and fleet-footed Otis Flowers. Lowery started six of the final seven games in 1987, earning freshman of the year accolades in the Big Ten for his efforts. He completed 42 of 89 (47%) passes for 572 yards and gained 446 yards (279 net) and one TD on 114 rushing attempts. He is expected to come to the front among option quarterbacks as a sophomore.

Flowers, meanwhile, will provide a strong backup and could even challenge for the starting job. He got into five games a year ago, including a start vs Purdue, and provides the offense with exceptional quickness.

RUNNING BACK

As mentioned earlier, the Badgers will count heavily on standout power runner Marvin Artley, who should be a good bet to crack the 1,000-yard barrier in 1988. As the Big Ten's second leading returning

rusher, he figures to be a good bet for several post-season honors.

Alongside Artley should be returning two-year letterman Steve Vinci (290 yards and 6.6-yard average in 1987), a player with starting experience each of the past two seasons. Behind Artley and Vinci will be Eric Ford who saw action in six games including a start at Michigan.

Although skilled athletes are in position, much of the success of the Badgers' running game will depend on the rebuilding of the offensive line.

KICKING GAME

A key area for Wisconsin in 1988 will center around the kicking game. The Badgers graduated four-year placekicking standout Todd Gregoire, the Big Ten's all-time leading field goal kicker, and four-year punter Scott Cepicky. Contenders for those positions are likely to include quarterback/punter Brad Brekke, placekicker Eric Jahn, and promising newcomer Rich Thompson of Oklahoma.

Interestingly, the Badgers were in a similar situation heading into the 1984 campaign but came up with two of the school's all-time best in Gregoire and Cepicky.

"Our kicking game is really unsettled," said Morton. "There is definitely a tremendous opportunity for a kicker and punter on our football team in 1988."

BADGER FOOTBALL

HEAD COACH DON MORTON



An enthusiastic Don Morton marks his second season as head coach of the University of Wisconsin football program in 1988

Named as the UW's 26th head football coach on November 28, 1986, Morton was initially awarded a five-year contract.

This fall, he has the distinction of serving as the guiding force of Badger football as the University of Wisconsin proudly celebrates its 100th season of intercollegiate competition on the gridiron.

This fall, optimism around the football offices is abundant as Morton heads into the second phase of a program to rebuild and rejuvenate Wisconsin football fortunes. Although his first team compiled a 3-8 overall and 1-7 Big Ten record, Morton's young and determined squad did indeed come close to posting a winning campaign. Strong on character and desire, the 1987 Badgers simply came up short on experience. In fact, if you took away a total of just nine fourth quarter minutes off of four games. Morton's first University of Wisconsin football team would have finished with an impressive 7-4 mark. It was a fine line, indeed.

For the record, the four fourth-quarter losses happened this way. In game two, the Badgers were upended by Utah, 31-28, on a field goal with just **four** seconds remaining. In game six, they lost a heartbreaker at Illinois, 16-14, on a field goal with just **54** seconds left. In game seven, they were edged 27-24 at home by Northwestern on a field goal with **6:51** remaining. And in game ten, the Badgers lost 22-19 at Minnesota after leading most of the second half; the host Gophers scored the winning touchdown with only **36** seconds left to play.

Along with installing a renewed sense of enthusiasm and eagerness throughout the program, highlights of coach Morton's first season at Wisconsin included an impressive 28-7 victory over a talented University of Hawaii team in his debut at Camp Randall last September 12th, a monumental 26-24 triumph over the Ohio State Buckeyes in Madison last November 7th, and a 30-13 triumph over Ball State on Parents' Day last September 26th.

A 41-year-old native of Flint, Michigan, Morton was born on April 10, 1947 and attended and graduated from that city's Northern High School. He then enrolled at Augustana College in Rock Island, Illinois, playing center for the football team in the late 1960's and earning a Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology in 1969.

An impressive academic background eventually culminated in a Master of Arts degree in Education and Administration from Western Illinois University in 1974.

Morton began his professional coaching career in 1969 as an assistant football and assistant wrestling coach at Moline (IL) High School, serving there through

His successes at Moline High School subsequently earned him his first collegiate position as offensive line coach at Augustana College of Sioux Falls, South Dakota from 1971-76.



Don then moved on to North Dakota State University as offensive backfield coach from 1977-79, and was succeedingly named head coach at the school in 1979.

His six-year head coaching record at North Dakota State was 57-15-0 (.792), with the school winning the North Central Conference title four straight years (1981-84) after placing second in both 1979 and 1980.

While at North Dakota State, Morton's teams participated four times in NCAA Division II Championship playoffs, with the Bison winning the national title in 1983 and placing second in both 1981 and 1984.

Morton took the head coaching position at the University of Tulsa following the 1984 season and immediately led the Hurricanes to the Missouri Valley Conference title with a perfect 5-0-0 record (6-5-0 overall) in his first campaign of 1985.

Tulsa dropped out of the Missouri Valley Conference following the 1985 season and in 1986 campaigned as an independent, posting a 7-4-0 record. The Hurricanes ranked third nationally that year in rushing offense at 289.0 yards per game,

and 14th nationally in total offense at 414.0 yards per game.

Recognized as one of the top young head coaches in college football, Morton's overall philosophy of collegiate athletics includes a strong commitment to academics. "I am proud to be a part of a university that has a value system," he said. "One that says, 'heh, this is what we believe in, this is what we stand for.' I think that's important in our society.

"I'm excited that here at the University of Wisconsin they are not going to corrupt the educational process. When we make a fraud of a student-athlete for the sake of winning, that is not winning at all. That has not happened here, and it will not happen here.

"That so-called 'dumb-jock' is not born. He is systematically created when we let him go through a system unchallenged. As a coaching staff, we will continue that great tradition of challenging young people on a day-to-day basis—academically and football-wise."

From beliefs like those, you can easily see why his staff and student-athletes develop a great respect for his guidance and leadership. Morton's program is highly organized; the staff believes in doing all the little things one percent better than the competition, and doing them the right way.

"The difference that will make a difference at the University of Wisconsin," he says, "is people—living and working and doing their very best on a day in and day out basis. If we do that, we're going to be successful; the scoreboard will take care of itself."

"In athletics," he said, "we talk a great deal about intensity. But intensity is incomplete if you don't know what you're intense about. Here at the University of Wisconsin, we are going to know what we're intense about.

"We want to create a vision for our football players," he continued, "a vision that is very clear, concise, and attainable."

"It's important for all of us to realize one thing," he continues. "We are involved in a game. It is a game played by young people and not every play will be perfect, there will be mistakes made. We have to keep that in mind.

"I'm in the toy department at the university. There are a lot more important things going on across campus. This is fun, and we have to keep this game in perspective."


Morton's nine-season record as a collegiate head coach is a noteworthy 73-32-0, for a winning percentage of .695. He compiled winning records of 57-15-0 at North Dakota State and 13-9-0 at the University of Tulsa prior to accepting the head coaching duties here at Wisconsin.

Don and his wife, Susan, have two children—daughter Stephanie, age 17, and son Joshua, age 14.


PAT SIMMERS




MIKE DALY


BOB BABICH




CRAIG BOHL


LAWRENCE 'L.C.'COLE


KEN ELLETTDirector of Football Operations


PHIL ENGLE Defensive Line Coach


JIMMY GONZALES Defensive Line Coach

PERSONAL: Jimmy, who enjoys jogging and racquetball, was born April 4, 1958 in San Antonio, Texas. He is single.




MARK MAUER Tight Ends Wide Receivers Coach

MARIO RUSSO Administrative Assistant



DR. A.L. 'ADE' SPONBERG



A new era of University of Wisconsin athletics began in the Fall of 1987, as the school welcomed both a new athletic director and a new head football coach.

Dr. A.L. 'Ade' Sponberg was named as the UW's new athletic director on May 15, 1987, and thus marks his second year at the helm of the Wisconsin athletic program in 1988-89. He succeeded Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch, who served 18 years in that position.

Sponberg has made an immediate impact on the Wisconsin athletic scene. He has been instrumental in instituting a comprehensive marketing program for the athletic department and has made the "business" side of the program a top priority. He has been a key figure in the addition of the Dave McClain Athletic Facility to the department and has been on a seemingly non-stop "meet the public" crusade since first coming to Madison.

The 51-year-old Sponberg, who first assumed his duties at Wisconsin on July 1, 1987, has more than 20 years of experience as a collegiate athletic director, including a tenure at North Dakota State University from 1973-87. In addition to his AD's position at NDSU, Sponberg also held the rank of professor and chaired the Division of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics.

The athletic program at NDSU enjoyed a highly successful period under Sponberg's leadership. CELEBRATING 100YEARS Of Wisconsin Football

Highlighting a Century of University of Wisconsin Football by Jim Mott, UW Sports Information Director



THE EARLY YEARS 1889-1899

You can trace the start of football on the University of Wisconsin campus from 1883. The school publication of the day TROCHUS—reported that there were class teams in all sports, among them baseball, tennis, crew, track and football. Eleven students were listed as members of Wisconsin's first Football Association.

It wasn't until 1889, though, that the University of Wisconsin first had a football team that played a recorded intercollegiate

It was then that a group of students decided to form a team with Andrew A. Bruce, a member of the law faculty, being generally credited with being the organizer of the project.

A challenge by a group of men in Milwaukee who had played football in the East while in college (football as an intercollegiate sport dates from the Princeton-Rutgers game of 1869), brought about that first

The Calumet Club, as the team was called, had an outstanding player in Alvin Kletsch, who had also been instrumental in the team's organization. The Calumet Club scored a 27-0 win over the Badgers in a game played in Milwaukee on November 23, 1889

The play of Kletsch caught the eye of the Wisconsin players and they invited him to coach the team for a few days in preparation for the game at Beloit three weeks later.

Kletsch took the job as coach at his own expense. He travelled to Madison from Milwaukee on the morning train, coached the


team in the afternoon, and returned to Milwaukee in the evening-also by train.

He taught the Badgers what he called the Eastern style of play. It emphasized running wide, smashing through the line with mass power, actually heaving the ball carrier over the line at times, or lateral passing to get around the ends quickly. On defense, his teams used a nine-man line with one roving linebacker and a safety. (Note: the forward pass was not legalized until 1906.)

Beloit edged past the Badgers, 4-0, and the University of Wisconsin now had to wait until the 1890 campaign to register their first gridiron win.

The Badgers' first football victory came in the opening game of the 1890 season-November 1—with a resounding 106-0 trampling of Whitewater Normal on the lower campus field.

Two weeks later, the Badgers met the University of Minnesota for the first time at Minneapolis with the Gophers prevailing by







since—except in 1906 when traditional rivalries were banned—and outside of the Ivy League, the series is the longest in the

The 1891 season proved to be the first winning campaign for the Badgers with a 3-1-1 record with Minnesota again defeating Wisconsin, this time by just 26-12.

Before the 1890's would run their course, Wisconsin football would establish outstanding rivalries with not only Minnesota, but also with the University of Chicago, Purdue University, Northwestern University and the University of Michigan. And in 1895, Wisconsin would play a vital role in the organization of the "Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives" which would eventually become known as the "Big Ten" or "Western Conference".

Parke H. Davis became Wisconsin's first full-time coach in 1893, coming to Madison as a graduate of Princeton University. Parke played tackle as an undergraduate, and since he felt the Badgers needed a little help at the position, he enrolled as a graduate student in English, and played as a member of the team. His enrollment in school satisfied the only eligibility requirement at the time.

Interestingly, after the formation of the "Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives", one of the first rules enacted came on November 26, 1897 when it was voted to require a year's residence after changing institutions.

Davis' 1893 Wisconsin team scored an impressive win at Ann Arbor over Michigan, 34-18, but Minnesota embarassed the Badgers again—this time by 40-0—and though the UW posted an eventual 4-2 record, Davis departed in favor of H.O. Stickney, a Harvard graduate, as coach in

Wisconsin's biggest win of those early days of the sport came in the 1894 finale when the Badgers battled Minnesota to a standstill, and the outcome of the game was finally decided on a 50-yard run by Ikey Karel late in the second half. The crowd of 8,000 that took in the game on a rain-soaked lower campus field was the largest to see the Badgers at home up to that time, and the excitement of the victory was captured in the printing of the *Daily Cardinal* extra on red paper.

The coming of Phil King, an All-American quarterback at Princeton in his playing days, as head coach in 1896 helped to put the Badgers into the football "limelight" and established the game on a "big league" basis on the Madison campus.

King inherited a Wisconsin team that had posted a 5-2-1 record in 1895, but a tie against Illinois and defeats by Chicago and Minnesota at season's end were not well received by followers of the team.

The Badgers, captained by John "Big John" Richards, reeled off seven wins in a row before being tied 6-6 by Northwestern in the regular season finale at Evanston, Illinois. Victories in conference games over Minnesota, 6-0, and Chicago, 24-0, gave the Badgers their first conference title.

A post-season game played against the Carlisle Indians in the Chicago Coliseum on

the night of December 19 resulted in an 18-8 setback for the Badgers and left their season's record at 7-1-1. A crowd of 14,000 took in the game—the largest to see the Badgers play up to that time.

Pat O'Dea, Wisconsin's legendary "kangaroo kicker" from Australia, made his debut in the 1896 game against Grinnell. He averaged an impressive 50 yards on five punts in the contest, but during practice the next week he suffered a broken arm and was out for the season.

The highlight of that 1896 campaign was the 6-0 win by the Badgers over Minnesota, a game in which team captain J.R. Richards followed the blocking of Jerry Riordan into the end zone late in the game for the decisive points.

Richards also played a big role in the UW's 24-0 win over Chicago with a pair of 60-yard runs to set up touchdowns by Bill Atkinson, Ikey Karel (Karel tallied twice) and "Norsky" Larson—all after a scoreless first half.

Wisconsin successfully defended its title in 1897 and pulled off a rare feat—defeating conference rivals Minnesota, Chicago and Northwestern on the road for a perfect 3-0 league record. The Badgers' victory over Minnesota on October 30th at Minneapolis marked Wisconsin's first-ever gridiron win there, while the game at Chicago on November 13th was settled early on a 40-yard scoring run by Harvey Holmes and a 35-yard field goal by Pat O'Dea. Wisconsin's victory over Northwestern at Evanston on November 25th came by a 22-0 count.

The 1897 Badgers, under coach Phil King, went on to post a fine 9-1 record, the only loss being to a surprisingly strong Alumni team, 6-0, with former player Walter Alexander scoring a touchdown late in the game. Over the next four years, King would lead the Badgers to a 90% winning percentage, with 35 victories in 39 games—capped by an unbeaten 9-0 campaign in

1901. And from 1896 through 1901, King led his University of Wisconsin football teams to a 51-6-1 (.888) record!

The Badgers lost 6-0 at Chicago in 1898—Michigan took the conference title at 3-0—and in 1899 Chicago handed Wisconsin a 17-0 defeat in the final game of the year with the Maroons gaining the league championship at 4-0. The other 1899 defeat was by Yale, 6-0, at New Haven, Connecticut—the first eastern appearance by a Wisconsin football team. Then in 1900, the Badgers narrowly missed another conference crown when they were edged 6-5 at Minnesota.

Pat O'Dea was an all-around athlete. In addition to football and track, he also pulled a good oar and boxed. Despite his light weight—he weighed around 180 pounds on a six-foot frame—he was a bruising tackler in football and was skillful in running back punts.

During his four-year college career (1896-99), Pat averaged better than 50 yards on punts and got off punts of 100 yards several times.

He drop-kicked 31 field goals, including 13 in one season (1899), drop-kicked four field goals in one game (vs Beloit in 1899), had a 62-vard field goal—one that still stands as the Wisconsin school record-vs Northwestern in 1898, a 60-yard goal against Minnesota in 1899, a 57-yard field goal against Chicago in 1897, and placekicked a 57-yard goal against Illinois in 1899.

While Pat O'Dea was probably the most spectacular of the Badgers during the early days of Wisconsin football, there were others who have become a part of the school's lore and legend. Names like Ikey Karel, John Richards, Art Curtis, Jerry Riordan, Eddie Cochems, Norsky Larson, T.U. Lyman, Earl "Keg" Driver, Chet Brewer, Oscar Nelson, Red Abbott, Bill Juneau and Walter Alexander, among others.

DAWN OF A NEW CENTURY 1900-1910

Wisconsin's 1901 team was the first to compile an undefeated (9-0) season, scoring 317 points to just five for the opposition—that by Knox College on a blocked kick that was returned 30 yards for a touchdown. The Badgers registered big victories over Minnesota in Camp Randall and Chicago in the Windy City in the final two weeks of the season to gain a title-share with Michigan.

A crowd of 11,000 saw the Badgers tally 18 first-half points en route to a 18-0 win over the Gophers. Captain Art Curtis tallied twice—one on a double pass from Norsky Larsen, and another when he picked up Gil Dobie's fumble of a punt and crossed the Minnesota goal line behind a superb block by end Red Abbott.

Wisconsin closed out the memorable 1901 season on Thanksgiving Day in Chicago by drubbing Amos Alonzo Stagg's Maroons 35-0, with Eddie Cochems returning a kickoff 100 yards for a score.

The nine victories during the 1901 season were part of the school's longest winning streak—17 games—that started on November 10, 1900 with a 54-0 rout of Notre Dame (Eddie Cochems tallied four touchdowns) and ended on November 1, 1902 when the Badgers lost to Michigan's second "point-aminute" team, 6-0.

Wisconsin's 1902 team had won its first five games, then lost to Michigan, defeated Northwestern 51-0, and lost back-to-back games at Minnesota and at Chicago, finishing 1-3 and sixth in conference play.

Phil King departed following the season—he came back to coach in 1905—with an overall record of 57-9-1 and a conference mark of 16-6-1. He had coached the Badgers to a pair of undisputed titles and a share of a third. Only one Wisconsin football coach since then has been able to win a pair of championships.

The period of 1903 to, and including, 1910 was a trying one in Wisconsin Football history. Coach Phil King resigned after the 1902 campaign to enter a family business, and the school's athletic board, of which ten of the 15 members were students, elected Arthur H. Curtis, the 1901 team captain, as the new head coach.

Curtis, who had played right tackle for four years, had spent the 1902 season coaching at Kansas, and even though he had just the one year of experience, the board's decision was based primarily on a desire to establish the graduate coaching system.


Both the 1903 and 1904 football teams posted winning overall campaigns—6-3-1 and 5-3—but in Western Conference play the record was 0-3-1 in 1903 and 0-3 in 1904 and tied for last in the final standings.


The experience of those two years virtually settled the question of whether or not Wisconsin should continue the policy of employing only graduate coaches. Phil King was persuaded to return for 1905—he brought with him Eddie Holt, the great Princeton tackle, to coach the line. The Badgers posted a winning overall record at 7-3, but the team's only conference victory was a 16-12 win at Minnesota in a game which denied the Gophers a perfect season and a share of the league championship.

After the 1905 season there came a time to reflect on where the sport of football had been, and where it was going. Proselyting and subsidizing athletes had grown to the point in all schools where it demanded faculty action. Faculty members from Wisconsin and the University of Chicago took the lead in house cleaning. Many reforms were instituted but Wisconsin faculty members went a step further—they voted to abolish all intercollegiate football which would have automatically caused the abandonment of all athletics, since football receipts carried the full program.

However, the faculty, under pressure from the Board of Regents, modified its action by limiting the football schedule to five games but barring the so-called "big games"





by a provision that the Badgers could not play its traditional rivalries—Chicago, Minnesota and Michigan.

The 1906 season, under the direction of Dr. C.P. Hutchins, turned out all right from a victory standpoint as the Badgers won all five of their games and "shared" the conference title with Minnesota after disposing of Iowa, Illinois and Purdue handily.

The biggest blow, however, came in box office receipts. A meager sum of \$3,400 was realized as against nearly \$35,000 in 1905.

In 1907, the Badgers posted a 3-1-1 record under Dr. Hutchins and his staff, with the one "big game" allowed being a 17-17 tie with Minnesota in the season finale.

Tom Barry took over the coaching reins in 1908 and success continued with 5-1 and 3-1-1 records in 1908 and 1909, respectively. It was Chicago, playing at Wisconsin's 1908 Homecoming game, that ruined a perfect season by handing the Badgers a 18-12 defeat.

Barry's 1910 team posted a 1-2-2 record—Wisconsin's first losing season since 1890—and the season's lone victory came in a 10-0 triumph over Chicago in the final game.

1911-1919

John Richards took over from Barry for the 1911 season and he built a solid defensive team. The Badgers won their first five games of the season, then experienced a 6-6 tie with Minnesota—Keckie Moll tallied the Wisconsin points—and a 5-0 loss at Chicago to end the season with a 5-1-1 record.

But the Badgers found themselves in for another coaching change in 1912. Richards left Madison after the 1911 season to become head coach at Ohio State. The ground work he had developed paid off handsomely for Bill Juneau, his successor, who had played four years for Wisconsin at the turn of the century as a halfback and end.

Juneau, who had captained the UW's 1902 team, made good use of the material left him by Richards and the Badgers moved impressively through a seven-game schedule unbeaten to earn the 1912 conference championship.

Lawrence, the opening foe, gave the Badgers a thorough test before losing 13-0. In succession, followed lopsided victories over Northwestern, 56-0, Purdue, 41-0, Chicago, 30-12, and Arkansas, 64-7.

The Badgers then pulled off a 14-0 win at Minnesota on November 16th, with full-back Al Tanberg scoring the game's first touchdown and Eddie Gillette passing to Robert "Butts" Butler for the second score. Both tallies came in the second period of play.

Wisconsin closed the 1912 season on the road at Iowa on November 23rd. The Badgers broke on top with first period touch-

downs by John Van Riper and Gillette, who had a 50-yard scoring run. Gillette led the Badgers in scoring that year with 50 points, a mark that was to stand until Pat Harder's 58 points in 1941.

So impressive was this 1912 Wisconsin juggernaut that Walter Eckersall picked seven Badgers on his All-Western team, and nine of them on his All-Conference team. "Butts" Butler, playing tackle, was also accorded All-American honors.

On that team were ends Joe Hoeffel and Hod Ofstie, tackles Ed Samp and Butler, guards Max Gelein and R.M. "Tubby" Keeler, center Walter Powell, quarterback Eddie Gillette, halfbacks John Van Riper, Al Tormey, Noyes "Moose" Bright and Arthur Alexander, and Al Tanberg at fullback.

Wisconsin's 1913 football team was not successful in defense of its 1912 title—3-3-1 overall and 1-2-1 in the conference—though Tubby Keeler was named All-American for his outstanding play.

The 1914 and 1915 teams had winning records overall, and though the Badgers did not place high in the conference standings, All-American honors went to guard Arlie Mucks in 1914 and to tackle Howard "Cub" Buck in 1915.


Dr. Paul Withington came from Harvard to coach the 1916 Wisconsin football team. The Badgers posted a 4-2-1 record, but Withington's services were not retained.

John Richards then returned to campus in 1917 and stayed through the 1922 season—except for the war-time 1918 campaign during which Guy Lowman directed the Badgers. In his six years as head coach, counting 1911, Richards lost but nine games

while winning 29 and tying four. In conference action, Richards' record was 17-9-3. And on only two occasions did a Richards-coached Wisconsin team lose by more than a touchdown—16-3 vs Ohio State in 1917, and 19-7 vs Minnesota in 1919. Three of the other nine losses were by just 3-0 counts on

opponent field goals.

Although Richards was conceded to be a remarkable defensive coach, some of his admirers felt that his ability as an offensive coach was not fully appreciated. He was one of the most successful forward pass coaches of his day, and was one of the early users of the screen pass (many feel he invented the play). He was also highly successful in utilizing the running pass from punt formation. Richards liked to use the goal-line pass, coupled with a fake line plunge which won many a game for the Badgers.

Richards' place as head coach at Wisconsin was taken by Guy Lowman during the 1918 war year and the most significant win of the season took place on November 23rd at Columbus, Ohio when the Badgers whipped Ohio State, 14-3. Star of that game was a freshman quarterback named Frederick Smith. Smith scored both Wisconsin touchdowns—on long runs of 80 and 68 yards—the latter with an intercepted pass. It would not be until 1982 that a University of Wisconsin football team would again prevail in Columbus against the Buckeyes.

THE ROARING TWENTIES 1920-1930

Wisconsin's 1920 football team came through with a 6-1 record under coach J.R. Richards, the only loss being a 13-7 decision at Ohio State with the win giving the Buckeyes the title and relegating the UW to second place. It was a Badger team with an All-American end in Frank "Red" Weston and an All-American tackle in Ralph Scott.

It was Iowa's turn to take conference honors in 1921, but Wisconsin had a shot at the title until tying Michigan in Camp Randall, 7-7, and losing at Chicago, 3-0, in the final two games of the season. The Badgers finished at 5-1-1 overall and 3-1-1 in league play.

Jack Ryan, a Dartmouth graduate, appeared on the Wisconsin coaching scene in 1923 and made an auspicious debut by winning his first three games—including a 52-0 romp at Indiana. That was to be his only Big


Ten triumph, however.

The 1923 Badgers should have also defeated Michigan, but a disputed decision on a punt runback gave the Wolverines a 6-3 victory on November 17th. Walter Eckersall was the referee and he was generally held responsible, although the disputed decision on the play was made by Colonel Mumma, the field judge.

The play went like this. Merrill Taft had punted 45 yards to Michigan's Tod Rockwell and Wisconsin's All-American tackle Marty Below was down fast on the kick and nailed Rockwell after a ten-vard return. As he loosened his grasp, Rockwell got up and started to run but was hit again by Russ Irish, a big end, and Adolph Bieberstein, a guard. They also loosened their grip when it seemed that Rockwell was stopped. (Note: the Badgers had been warned earlier by the officials for "piling on".) But again, Rockwell got up and started to walk toward the Badgers' goal line. Once in the clear he started to run, and though pursued by Wisconsin defenders, scampered across the goal line to give Michigan a 6-3 halftime lead. There was no further scoring in the game.

A wild scene prevailed in Camp Randall at the end of the game and fans, with emotions running high, swarmed onto the field to surround Eckersall. But he was saved from harm by the Wisconsin players, who formed a protective ring around him.

(Editor's note: Martin Below, Wisconsin's 1923 team captain and an All-American, was inducted into the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame in 1988.)



The 1925 season saw George Little come over from the University of Michigan to assume both the athletic director and football coaching duties at Wisconsin.

His first Badger team was 6-1-1 and would have won the Big Ten title were it not for a 21-0 loss to Michigan's eventual champions in the annual Homecoming game. The Badgers were relegated to a third place finish.

Little's 1926 team was 5-2-1 overall and 3-2-1 and fifth in the Big Ten with Minnesota scoring late in the game to win 16-10 and Michigan—in defense of its title—dealing the Badgers a 37-0 blanking at Ann Arbor.

Wisconsin's scoring against Minnesota consisted of an 87-yard fumble recovery run by Jefferson Burrus—who later in the year was named a Rhodes Scholar—and a 30-yard field goal by Butch Leitl. The Gophers scored on a 60-yard punt return with four minutes left in the game.

Although remaining as Athletic Director, Little gave up coaching after the 1926 season. He chose as his replacement Glenn Thistlewaite, who had turned out some fine teams at Northwestern in previous years.

His 1928 team had a 7-1-1 record and placed second in the conference at 3-1-1 behind defending champion Illinois. The Badgers opened the Big Ten season playing a 19-19 tie at Purdue on October 20th, then reeled off conference victories over Michigan and Iowa on the road and over Chicago at Madison before bowing 6-0 to Minnesota in the final home game.

That win over Michigan was the first by a Wisconsin football team in Ann Arbor since the 1893 team accomplished the feat in the Badgers' fifth year of intercollegiate compe-

tition. The winning score came in the fourth period when Sammy Behr combined with Bo Cuisiner on a 25-yard pass-run play.

Minnesota used a short scoring run by "Bronco" Nagurski in the second quarter to end Wisconsin's hopes for the championship as a crowd of 46,000—largest in Camp Randall history to that time—looked on.

The 1928 Badgers also proved to be tough on non-conference foes as they shrugged off Knute Rockne's long grass complaints in Camp Randall for a 22-6 win over Notre Dame on October 6th and a 15-0 whitewashing of Alabama in Madison on November 3rd. Against Notre Dame, the running of Ken Bartholomew for one score and passes from Bo Cuisinier to Lew Smith and Sammy Behr to Cuisinier from punt formation (the play covered 58 yards) rallied the Badgers after they trailed 6-2 at halftime.

A 15-yard first period run by Harold Smith keyed the Badgers' victory over Alabama, in a game played before 25,000—including Alabama Governor Bibb Graves. In that opening period of play, Wisconsin standout Milo Lubratovich suffered a broken ankle that was to sideline him for the rest of the season. (Two years later, however, Lubratovich was accorded All-American honors for his fine line play in a 6-2-1 season.) Also in that game, a 33-yard field goal by August Backus and a scoring run by Cuisinier in the third period put the game with the Crimson Tide on ice.

BATTLING THE DEPRESSION 1930-1940

Wisconsin athletic director George Little and head football coach Glenn Thistlewaite both resigned from their jobs in late December, 1931, and Dr. Clarence W. Spears was named to guide the school's football fortunes starting in 1932.

Spears, who had coached successfully at Minnesota and Oregon, turned out his best team at Wisconsin in his first year with a record of 6-1-1 that included a 4-1-1 mark in

the Big Ten.

Michigan won the title with a 6-0-0 mark, with Purdue second at 5-0-1. Wisconsin's only defeat was at Purdue by a 7-6 count, repeating the 1930 result in Lafayette, while the tie game was at Ohio State, 7-7. In both games, the opponents scored first, then held off furious Badger rallies that ended up short. Ohio State's bid for a victory via field goal was thwarted by Wisconsin's Dave Tobias, who blocked the kick late in the fourth quarter.



Wisconsin opened the 1932 season with a 7-2 victory over intra-state rival Marquette. The game's key play came on the final play of the game when Gene Ronzani's pass to Dick Quirk covered 70 yards and was prevented from being a touchdown by great pursuit by Mickey McGuire who tackled Quirk at Wisconsin's five yard line.


Wisconsin's key 20-13 victory over Minnesota on November 12th was achieved on the individual brilliance of McGuire, who scored all three of the Badgers' touchdowns. His first came on a 87-yard touchdown run with the opening kick-off, his second on a pass from Joe Linfor to make it 13-7 in the third quarter, and his third on another pass from Linfor for the winning tally.

The following years—1933, 1934 and 1935—were not good ones for Wisconsin and Dr. Spears, and after a single win in

1935, he was replaced as coach by Harry Stuhldreher, a member of the famous Notre Dame "Four Horsemen" backfield in 1924.

Stuhldreher, who came to Wisconsin from the head coaching position at Villanova, guided Wisconsin football fortunes for 13 years (1936 through 1948), serving as athletic director as well from 1936 to October, 1950.



WORLD AND BEYOND 1941-1949

There is little doubt that the University of Wisconsin's 1942 football team was one of the school's all-time best. It missed the Western Conference championship and mythical national collegiate laurels by an eyelash.

The Badgers of '42 posted an 8-1-1 record and scored 149 points while vielding just 68. It was a remarkable turnaround from the 1941 team which scored 144 points in eight games, but allowed 208 points—an average of 26 points per game.

Only one opponent scored more than one touchdown in a game against the Badgers in 1942. A wild gang of Northwestern Wildcats racked up three six-pointers and even then couldn't win. With 18 seconds remaining, Mark Hoskins tossed a six-vard scoring pass to Len Seelinger and Wisconsin pulled out a 20-19 victory.

The "Fall of '42" Badgers were undefeated, though tied by Notre Dame (7-7) through their first seven games, capped by a 17-7 win over the nation's top-ranked team-Ohio State-before falling six inches short and one second away from an undefeated season, the Big Ten title, and a national collegiate championship. Instead, they placed second in the conference and third nationally.


November 7, 1942 was a gloomy day at Iowa City, the day an inspired Iowa Hawk-


eye team handed the Badgers their lone defeat by a 6-0 count. Iowa had scored early in the second period on a 22-yard pass play from Tom Farmer to end Bill Burkett and then relied on its defense to stop the Badgers at every turn. As time ran out in the first half, Wisconsin fullback Pat Harder just couldn't negotiate the final inch for the tying score. And in the final six minutes of play, the Iowa defense intercepted passes by Harder and Seelinger that insured their win.

Wisconsin's 17-7 victory over Ohio State on October 31st was played before 46,000 fans—matching the largest crowd set earlier in 1928 when Minnesota knocked the Badgers out of title contention in Camp Randall, 6-0. It was a ten-point Wisconsin second quarter that triggered the victory. Harder scored from one yard out, and later place-kicked a 27-yard field goal.

The Buckeyes came back late in the third period with a 96-yard march that culminated when Paul Sarringhouse crashed over from three yards away. The Badgers retaliated quickly to put the game out of reach, however. Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch returned the OSU kickoff to the Badgers' 34. The running of Hirsch and Harder, plus passes by Hirsch to Dave Schreiner and by Mark Hoskins to Hirsch, moved the ball to Ohio's 15. It was there that Hirsch swung wide to his right with the football, stopped and threw across the playing field to

Schreiner, who had faked the OSU defensive right halfback and gone deep into the left side of the end zone where he caught the ball for a touchdown. Hirsch finished as the game's top rusher with 118 yards on 13 carries while Harder added 97 more on 21 tries with 11 scoring points.

Wisconsin scored 21 touchdowns during the 1942 season, on everything from a sixinch plunge to a 101-yard return of a pass interception (by Jack Wink vs Great Lakes). Twelve of the TD's were made by rushing, the longest being a 63-yard run by Hirsch, and eight came via the air, with a 70-yard pass play from Wink to Schreiner against Marquette accounting for one.

The Badgers' tough pass defense limited ten teams to just 59 completions in 172 attempts for a total of 865 yards and four touchdowns, and came up with a season total of 27 interceptions—still the school record. Hirsch led the way, grabbing six interceptions at defensive halfback.

Four sophomore starters combined to make the team solid down the middle, with Fred Negus at center, Ken Currier at right guard, Wink at quarterback and Hirsch at left half. Other starters were Schreiner at right end, Bob Baumann and Paul Hirsbrunner at the tackles, Evan Vogds at left guard, Hoskins at right half and Harder at fullback. Pat Lyons, Bob Hanzlik, Farnham Johnson and Hirsbrunner split the left end

starting assignments, while Bob Ray and Len Calligaro spelled Harder at fullback when injuries sidelined him. Ashley Anderson started two games at quarterback, as did Lloyd Wasserbach at right tackle the final two games of the season when Hirsbrunner moved over to left end.

After a 1948 season that provided a 2-7 record—the Badgers defeated only Illinois, 20-16, and Marquette, 26-0—Ivan Baum Williamson came to the Madison campus from Lafayette College to next direct Wisconsin's gridiron fortunes.

The Badgers got off to a good start in 1949 with a 41-0 romp over Marquette, and when the season had ended with a satisfying 5-3-1 record—
a solid foundation for a successful decade


of the 1950's had been laid.




THE FABULOUS FIFTIES 1950-59

The 1950's produced a fine 57-28-7 (.658) overall record for University of Wisconsin football teams, the best decade since the 1900-1910 era when the Badgers went 58-15-3 (.783) and won a pair of conference titles. The 1950's provided the school's all-time best Big Ten record with a mark of 40-21-7, and the Badgers broke a 40-year drought by tying for the 1952 Big Ten crown with Purdue at 4-1-1.

As the decade neared its end, the Badgers—under Milt Bruhn—put together a three-season mark of 20-6-1 overall and 14-6-1 in Big Ten play. (Bruhn, who had served as line coach under Ivan Williamson, was elevated to the head coaching job at Wisconsin when Williamson was named to succeed the deceased Guy Sundt as the school's ath-






In each of his first five seasons (1949 through 1953), the Badgers found themselves in Big Ten championship contention right up to the final gun and in Rose Bowl consideration on four occasions. Throughout his career, his record as Wisconsin coach just kept getting better and better. After a 5-3-1 mark in his first season of 1949, his 1950 team went 6-3, followed by a '51 squad that sported a 7-1-1 mark.

Dubbed "The Hard Rocks" by Wisconsin State Journal sports editor Henry J. Mc-Cormick, the 1951 University of Wisconsin football team missed an unbeaten season and a probable Rose Bowl bid because they failed to negotiate the final yard of a 79-yard march in the third period with a 10-7 lead over Illinois. After the failure to capitalize, the tide of the game turned in the Illini's favor and they prevailed, 14-10.

The Badgers, who were tied the following week by Ohio State, 6-6, in Camp Randall Stadium, were a rugged aggregation that season. They wound up as the nation's best defensive team against combined rushing and passing, yielding only 154.8 yards per game. They ranked second nationally against the rush on a yield of 56.6 yards per game and 12th nationally in pass defense, giving up just 88.2 yards per game. In Big Ten play, Wisconsin's top-rated offensive and defensive units set five new conference records and led in 26 of some 43 categories. The Wisconsin football record book was also virtually re-written.

Following a 1-1-1 record in their first three outings, Wisconsin went on to win its next six games to finish at 7-1-1. A 6-0 Homecoming win over Indiana on November 3rd came on a day when a surprise snowstorm dumped nine inches on Madison and made it almost impossible for traffic to move—yet alone play a game. The Badgers won, incidentally, on a last-minute 37-yard pass play from quarterback John Coatta to Bill Hutchinson.

The following Saturday, November 10th, saw Wisconsin record a 16-7 win over Pennsylvania. Interestingly, the "Hard Rocks" defensive platoon accounted for all UW points. Derel Teteak recovered a bad center pass in the end zone and Bob Leu ran back an intercepted pass 39 yards for a pair of first quarter scores and a 14-0 lead. The Badgers then made it 16-0 in the third period when All-American end Pat O'Donohue tackled Gerald Robinson in the end zone for a safety.

Over the course of the 1951 season, the Wisconsin defensive unit outscored Wisconsin's nine opponents, 58-53. They did it on four touchdowns—two on pass interceptions and two on recoveries of bad center passes in the end zone, four safeties and extra points and field goals that accounted for 26 points. (Nine of the 11 defensive players


were also on the field during those extra point and field goal attempts.)

From that great '51 team came the Big Ten's leading scorer and pass receiversophomore Jerry Witt, the league's recordbreaking passer—senior quarterback Johnny Coatta, and the conference's recordbreaking rushing leader - freshman fullback Alan Ameche, who gained 774 yards on 147 carries. Some 19 Badgers in all were included either on defensive or offensive Big Ten all-star teams or received honorable mention. It was the largest group of Wisconsin post-season honorees since the 1912 Badgers placed nine players on Walter Eckersall's all-conference first team. And of those 19, defensive back Ed Withers, end Pat O'Donohue, end-linebacker Hal Faverty and OB John Coatta were named on various All-American teams.

There were a total of 17 seniors that completed their careers as members of the "Hard Rocks". They were Norris Ace, Cary Bachman, John Coatta, Hal Faverty, Gene Felker, Bill Gable, Harry Gilbert, captain Jim Hammond, Dave Hansen, Bill Lane, Bob Leu, Pat O'Donohue, Bill Schleisner, Jerry Smith, Rollie Strehlow, Deral Teteak and Eddie Withers—as well as student managers Gordon Becker and John Friedel.

The great season of 1951 set the stage for 1952, but there were definite problems to be solved. Who would be the quarterback? Who would replace the All-American ends? How would the defensive secondary shape up?





Stalwarts like captain George O'Brien, shifting from offensive guard, and John Dixon, moving from fullback, took over the linebacking duties to help a lone returning veteran in Roger Dornburg. Jim Haluska took over the quarterback slot and did an outstanding job. Seniors Roy Burks, Burt Hable, Bill Hutchinson and freshman Paul Shwaiko helped shore up the pass defense. Jerry Wurhmann developed fast to combine talents with Don Voss and once again give Wisconsin one of the best pairs of ends in the nation.


The 1952 Badgers defeated Marquette, Illinois, Iowa, Rice, Northwestern and Indiana, while losing at Ohio State and to UCLA in Camp Randall to record a 6-2-1 regular season. The finale was a 21-21 tie before a sellout crowd of 52,131 in Camp Randall in the 62nd meeting of Wisconsin and Minnesota.

There was great emotion right down to the final seconds of play, with both teams playing for the win. A victory would give the Badgers the undisputed Big Ten title; a win for the Gophers would give them a share of the conference crown.

Minnesota managed to tie the game with 8:05 to play on a Paul Giel to Dale Quist nine-yard scoring pass to tie the score at 21. The pigskin then changed hands seven times—five times in the last 1:34 of the game—with Burt Hable's third interception of the afternoon stymieing the Gophers on the game's final play.

The tie gave Wisconsin a share of the Big Ten championship with Purdue, but by a vote of the Big Ten faculty representatives, the Badgers were chosen to play in the 1953 Rose Bowl, drawing Southern California as

Wisconsin's first Rose Bowl game saw USC prevail 7-0, on a Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael 22-yard pass that capped a 73-yard march in the third quarter. Alan



Ameche's 54-yard run on Wisconsin's opening play of the second half gave the Badgers scoring position, but they could not make good on the opportunity. The Badgers dominated most of the game's statistics—Ameche rushed for 133 yards on 28 carries—but the Trojans used a superior kicking game and a better passing attack to end a string of six straight defeats handed to Pacific Coast teams by Big Ten schools.

In 1953, there was a change in college football—back to the one platoon system. Ameche made a successful conversion to playing defense as a linebacker that year and Art Lentz, the school's publicity director, came up with "The Iron Horse" as Ameche's label and combined with his fine running—he totalled 3,345 yards over four years—the player became a candidate for the 1954 Heisman Trophy.

Wisconsin posted a 6-2-1 record in 1953, with a 34-7 upset of top-ranked and unbeaten Illinois on November 14th putting the Badgers in position for a title share. But again, a 21-21 tie game with Minnesota in Minneapolis ended such hopes.

The Badgers tied with Michigan for second place in 1954 with a 5-2 Big Ten record (7-2 overall) in a year in which Ohio State won its first title under W.W. "Woody" Hayes with a 7-0 record, including a 31-14 defeat of Wisconsin in Columbus.

During Ameche's four brilliant years as a Badger, the school's record was 26-8-3. His career was capped when he was named a unanimous All-American choice as well as the Heisman Trophy winner.

By the end of the 1954 campaign, coach Ivan Williamson had guided Wisconsin to an overall 37-14-4 record and a winning percentage of .672, including a Big Ten mark of 26-9-4—the best for any conference school during that six-year period.

Williamson's final Wisconsin football team—1955—won three of its first four games before slumping to a 4-5 season's record and a 3-4 Big Ten slate. He was then named the school's athletic director on November 12th, two weeks after Guy Sundt

had passed away just days before the Home-coming tilt with Michigan State.

The 1956 campaign brought with it a new coach in Milt Bruhn, but the Badgers struggled through a rebuilding season and a 1-5-3 record.

But Wisconsin then came on strong to post winning seasons in 1957 (6-3-0), 1958 (7-1-1) and 1959 (7-2). The '58 Badgers just missed the Big Ten title when they were upended by Iowa 20-9 on October 18th in Camp Randall Stadium in a game they actually led 9-0 at halftime.

The 1959 contingent, dominated by seniors, rallied to defeat Minnesota by an 11-7 score on November 21st to gain Wisconsin's second Big Ten football championship of the decade. But, unfortunately, the "fabulous fifties" ended on a losing note when the Badgers lost in the 1960 Rose Bowl game to Washington by a 44-8 count.

The 1950's produced seven concensus All-Americans, 13 All-Big Ten players, seven academic All-Americans, and eight academic All-Big Ten performers.

ON THROUGH THE 1960's


Following a 4-5 record in 1960, Milt Bruhn's Wisconsin football team rebounded to record a 6-3 mark in 1961.

That year, the Badgers had started the season slowly, standing at 3-3 after wins over Utah, Indiana and Oregon State and losses to Michigan State, Iowa and Ohio State. An open date following the Ohio State game, however, helped to re-charge the Badgers and they went on to win their final three games against Northwestern, 29-10, Illinois, 55-7, and Minnesota, 23-21. The late-season successes in '61 would then carry over to 1962.

The 1962 Badger football team was unquestionably the highlight of the decade. Wisconsin featured the running and passing of quarterback Ron Vander Kelen, the pass catching talents of Pat Richter, the effective running of Lou Holland, and rugged line play.

Vander Kelen had played just briefly as a defensive back in Wisconsin's 44-6 pasting of Marquette in 1959. Injury and ineligibility dogged his career until 1962, when he put it all together and led the Badgers to an 8-1 season, a No. 2 national ranking, and a date with No. 1-ranked Southern California in the 1963 Rose Bowl.

The Badgers won their first four games of the 1962 season by a combined score of 158-41, meeting defeat for the only time at Ohio State by 14-7. But Wisconsin bounced back to hand Michigan a 34-12 setback on November 3rd in Ann Arbor, returned to Madison to upend No. 1 and unbeaten Northwestern, 37-6, and earned the Rose Bowl berth a week later by thumping Illinois on the road by 35-6 behind Louis Holland's four touchdowns. Three of his scores came in the first period, setting up the title game

In as hard fought a game as has ever been played in the long rivalry, the Badgers came from behind in the final quarter to register a 14-9 triumph over the Gophers. A Ron Vander Kelen pass to sophomore end Ron Leafblad and a conversion by Gary Kroner gave Wisconsin a 7-6 lead with 10:50 left in the first half.

A Collins Versich 32-yard field goal late in the third period made it 9-7 in favor of

the Gophers' 12-yard line. Three running plays by Holland for five yards, Vander Kelen for six, and an offtackle smash by fullback Ralph Kurek gave Wisconsin its go-ahead score at 14-9. But Minnesota came back down the field quickly, and it was left to Jim Nettles to

come up with the game-saving interception in the end zone that ended the Gopher

The 1962 Big Ten championship was the second for Milt Bruhn, making him the only Wisconsin coach to claim two conference titles in this century. The Badgers were now off to their second Rose Bowl in four years!

Never has there been such a spectacle as the 1963 Rose Bowl game. It matched the two best teams in the nation-No. 1 USC against No. 2 Wisconsin.

The Badgers trailed in the first period 7-0 when Pete Beathard completed a 13-yard scoring pass to Fred Hill. The Cardinal and White tied the game just before the end of the first period on a one-yard plunge by Ralph Kurek.

quarter belonged to USC. First Ben Wilson smacked into the Badger end zone from one-yard out. Then Ron Heller tallied on a 25-yard run to put the Trojans up 21-7. Wisconsin threatened to make it 21-14 just before halftime, but an apparent score was denied by a penalty.

Even the third period belonged more to USC than to Wisconsin, with the Trojans scoring twice to offset a Vander Kelen 17yard scoring run and the Badgers looked down and out at 35-14. And then to make matters worse, Fred Hill came up with a 13yard touchdown reception from Beathardhe had thrown aerials of 57 and 23 yards to Hal Bedsole in the period—with just six seconds gone in the fourth quarter to send the score to 42-14 in favor of Southern Cal.


But the rest of the game belonged to the underdog Badgers, in what ranks as one of the great challenges of all-time. Vander Kelen rallied his team. First came a 13-yard scoring run by Holland to narrow the margin to 42-21. That was followed shortly by a four-yard scoring pass from Vandy to Gary Kroner that made it 42-28. Suddenly a safety gave the rallying Badgers two more points as a bad center pass prevented a USC punt and it was now 42-30.

Pat Richter then scored on a 19-yard pass from Vander Kelen with under two minutes to play in the game. It was, unbelievably, 42-37! Just one more possession.

But, alas, time ran out on the Badgers. Memories are, however, still sharp of one of the great rallies in school history.

Vander Kelen was named co-player of the game, after completing 33 of 48 pass attempts for 401 yards and two touchdowns. Pete Beathard, his counter-part with USC, shared game honors with his eight completions in 12 attempts for 190 yards and four

Wisconsin paced the nation in scoring in 1962, tallying 285 points in nine regular season games for an average of 31.7 points per game. They ranked seventh nationally in forward passing offense, averaging 160.7 yards per game on the strength of Ron Vander Kelen's fine throwing arm, and finished tenth nationally in total offense, running and passing for 3,142 yards, or 349.1 yards per game. Vander Kelen, who was the Big Ten's leader in passing and total offense, was also named the conference's most valuable player.



Wisconsin's football fortunes after that wonderful 1962 season went downhillslowly at first—during the remaining years of the decade.

The Badgers managed to win their first four games of 1963, over Western Michigan, Notre Dame, Purdue and Iowa, but a 13-10 loss to Ohio State in Camp Randall on October 26th sent the UW reeling to a 5-4 overall record and a 3-4 Big Ten mark.

There would not be another winning season for a Badger football team until 1974. After three tough seasons-1964, 1965 and 1966—John Coatta replaced Milt Bruhn as Wisconsin's 22nd head coach. But Coatta had even a tougher time, with Badger teams winning just three games the next three seasons.

THE MODERN ERA 1970-87

John Jardine was summoned to Madison following the 1969 season—he was an assistant coach at UCLA—by Wisconsin athletic director Elroy Hirsch to turn the Badger football program back around.

The UW put together an improved 4-5-1 record in 1970, including a memorable 29-16 victory over Penn State in which junior quarterback Neil Graff threw three scoring passes.

After Rufus "Roadrunner" Ferguson put the Badgers on the scoreboard with a short touchdown run in the first period, Graff tossed a 68-yard bomb to tight end Larry Mialik to give Wisconsin a 13-10 half-time lead over the Nittany Lions.

Penn State tied the game at 16 late in the third quarter, but Graff then tossed scoring aerials to Terry Whittaker for 27 yards and to Mialik for 52 yards to cement the decision.

The "Roadrunner" paced Wisconsin's rushing attack for three straight years—588 yards in 1970, 1,222 in 1971, and 1,004 in 1972—and Camp Randall came alive with fans flocking to see Ferguson's "shuffle".

Another great ball carrier, Billy Marek, came to the forefront in 1973. He put to-

gether three outstanding seasons, gaining 1,207 yards in 1973, 1,215 in 1974, and 1,281 in 1975, leading the Badgers to a winning 7-4 record in 1974.

Marek, running behind an offensive line that included Bob Johnson and John Reimer (Dennis Lick was out with an injury) at the tackles, Terry Stieve and Rick Koeck at the guards, Art Zeimetz at center and Jack Novak at tight end, turned in his finest collegiate day in a 49-14 win over Minnesota in the 1974 season finale in Camp Randall. Billy rushed for 304 yards on 43

scored five touchdowns—all three are still Wisconsin single game records.

Four of the UW's wins that season came on the road—at Purdue, Indiana, Iowa and Northwestern. Victories over Nebraska and Missouri, meanwhile, highlighted the home schedule, with senior Gregg Bohlig guiding the team's offensive attack from his quarterback position.

Dave McClain came on to the scene to replace John Jardine following the 1977 season and promptly became the first Wisconsin football coach since Ivan Williamson to direct the Badgers to a winning season (5-4-2) in his first year at the helm.


Following successive 4-7 campaigns in 1979 and 1980, the Badgers moved to the

thick of the Big Ten title fight in 1981. They opened the season in Madison with a stunning 21-14 victory over pre-season No. 1 Michigan, with a Jess Cole to John Williams 71-yard screen pass providing the winning score. Wisconsin also went on to win conference matchups with Purdue, Ohio State, Northwestern, Indiana and Minnesota enroute to a 6-3 Big Ten record and a subsequent berth in the Garden State Bowl.


A Randy Wright engineered scoring drive that covered six plays and 85 yards—and took just 49 seconds—was capped by a touchdown toss to Michael Jones to give the Badgers a 26-21 victory in the final game of the season at Minnesota and the bowl bid.


The McClain-coached Badgers produced seven wins four straight years—7-5 in 1981, 7-5 in 1982, 7-4 in 1983 and 7-4-1 in 1984. Their Big Ten record during those four seasons was an impressive 21-14-1, with the team finishing in the first division each year. Wisconsin finished just a half-game out of the Big Ten championship in 1981, with Iowa handing the Cardinal and White a 17-7 defeat in the final home game. A win over the Hawkeyes in that game would have meant a title tie and the school's first Rose Bowl assignment since 1963.

Following the 1982 season, the Badgers played in the Independence Bowl in Shreveport, Louisiana, scoring a 14-3 victory over Kansas State for the school's first bowl win. A Randy Wright to Tim Stracka pass-run





UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN



Tantamount to the success of any collegiate athletic program today are topnotch facilities, and here at the University of Wisconsin, the Badger football team is blessed with some of the best.

The Wisconsin football team utilizes impressive 76,293-seat Camp Randall Memorial Stadium - the ninth largest college-owned football structure in the nation - for all its home games as well as practice. The mammoth double-deck, horseshoe-designed facility also houses the football coaches' offices, the Wisconsin football lockerroom, a complete weight training facility and the athletic training room.

The modern and spacious UW Communications Center, located atop the west side's second deck, contains working areas for more than 300 athletic staff and media personnel throughout its three levels. The third level is composed of radio

and television booths, the fourth level is reserved for print media, UW athletic staff and dignitaries, while the fifth level is composed of private corporation boxes and is also used for television broadcasts.

This fall, the University of Wisconsin football program takes another step forward with the scheduled completion of the Dave McClain Athletic Facility - a stateof-the-art indoor practice building. The McClain Athletic Facility will be complete with an artificial turf practice area (including space for both kicking and punting), a furnished lounge, modern lockerrooms, a complete weight-training room, an athletic training room, a lap pool for rehabilitation of injuries, and various supply and storage areas. The McClain Athletic Facility connects directly to Camp Randall Stadium via an enclosed walkway for easy access from the football offices.



THE WISCONSIN FOOTBALL COMPLEX


Wisconsin's football program, located on the north side of 76,293-seat Camp Randall Stadium, occupies some of the most imposing office facilities in the Big Ten

From the impressive surroundings of the office of Head Coach Don Morton and private paneled offices for each of the Badgers' assistant coaches, to comfortable lounges and study areas for players and visitors, the Wisconsin football complex is truly complete.


The UW football program also has at its disposal seven conference rooms for individual player/coach or position meetings and special rooms for viewing and studying game films. Located just adjacent to the coaches' offices and players' lockerroom are the school's sports medicine and training rooms.


And now, additional excitement is in the air around Camp Randall Stadium as the Wisconsin football program eagerly anticipates the opening of the Dave McClain Athletic Facility for the 1988 campaign.











THE WISCONSIN STRENGTH PROGRAM

At the University of Wisconsin, the "physical fitness" of student-athletes is of primary concern.


Under the guidance of director of football operations Ken Ellett and Jim Hyne, the school's strength program is recognized as one of the most successful and complete in the Big Ten.


Strength training at Wisconsin consists of several year-round programs. For Badger football players, for instance, the strength program includes a pre-season training program, in-season and winter conditioning programs, and spring and summer programs as well. The football team ordinarily uses the strength training facility two hours per day, four days per week.

1987 All-American offensive tackle Paul Gruber, shown working out on one of the five pieces of modern Keiser equipment included in the UW weight training room, is a prime example of the physical development athletes can achieve through the school's comprehensive strength program.

Each sport that utilizes the weight room is fully supervised by Hyne and his staff. They will analyze and chart an individual athlete's week-by-week progress, as well as plan individual and team conditioning programs for the school's men's and women's sports. Strength training at the University of Wisconsin means more than just weight lifting. It also includes agility and flexibility development.

Open from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm six days per week, Camp Randall's 4,000 square foot Wisconsin weight room contains some of the finest training equipment on the market today. The football team makes





use of some 38,000 pounds of free weight, 21 olympic bars, 21 free-weight stations, seven squat stations (of which four are electric squat racks), ten bench press stations, four wall-pully cable stations, five pieces of Keiser equipment (based on pneumatic pressure and used especially for high-speed training), and three full set dumbbells (5-100 pounds, in five-pound increments).

It's a good set-up, but the best is yet to come. With the opening of Wisconsin's new Dave McClain Athletic Facility set for this fall, comes a new, state-of-the-art computerized weight training room that will consist of some 7,000 square feet.

Along with all new training equipment, will be a separate computer room for evaluating athletes, a maintenance room, strength training offices, and a glassenclosed conference area with seating for ten to 15 people.

THE ATHLETIC TRAINING FACILITIES

The Wisconsin Athletic Training Department is also housed in Camp Randall Stadium - located adjacent to the Badger football offices and lockerroom and just above the weight training room.

Six full-time trainers, under the direction of staff coordinator Dennis Helwig, two graduate assistants, and some 20 student-trainers are on hand each day to assist the more than 900 University of Wisconsin student-athletes in their needs.

In addition to the main training facilities in Camp Randall Stadium and the new Dave McClain Athletic Facility, the department also has five satellite facilities around the campus. There is one at the UW Fieldhouse, the Red Gym, the natatorium, the Dane County Memorial Coliseum, and Neilsen Tennis Stadium.

Helwig and his staff put the main emphasis of their work on preventive programs. Their daily routines include coordinating the physiological testing of athletes, enlisting computer programs such as *Anjion* (dietary analysis) to





The UW training staff is also proud of their close working relationship with Madison-area physicians, some of whom regularly visit the campus to see injured athletes. Working directly with the Wisconsin football team is head team physician Dr. William Clancy, orthopedic surgeons Jim Keene and Ben Graf, and Dr. Greg Landry, who handles internal medical problems for UW athletics.


"The frequency of visits to the campus by our attending physicians," reports Helwig, "helps us with rehabilitation programs and shortens significantly the return to competition for our injured athletes. These individuals make a very large and very important contribution to the success of our athletic programs."

provide nutritional information to athletes, utilizing Cybex strength-testing devices in the evaluation of strength weaknesses, working with attending physicians in rehabilitation of student-athletes, working to improve individual athletic performance, and outlining preventive stretching programs to aid in avoiding the reoccurance of past injuries. The trainers also advise athletes as to what type of treatments they should do and refer them to appropriate physicians.

Thanks to the introduction of computers into the training department two years ago, the UW staff now has the capability of "tracking" sports injuries; in other words, diagnosing when and where these injuries most often occur. This information has proved extremely helpful to coaches in devising conditioning programs and practices for their teams.



THE DAVE McCLAIN ATHLETIC FACILITY





The monumental Dave McClain Athletic Facility, named in honor of the late Wisconsin football coach, is expected to usher in a new era in University of Wisconsin Athletics.


Set for initial occupancy this fall, the 166,264-square foot Dave McClain Athletic Facility will compare with the finest indoor training facilities in the country. For Badger Football, it will provide a pleasant environment that will improve practice conditions during in-season inclement weather and post-season practice periods, as well as assist student athletes' offseason conditioning and skill development.

The 76,380-square foot main floor of the new facility will feature an artificial turf practice area, with adequate space for all components of practice including height for kicking and punting. The building's 64,320-square foot lower level will house showers, lockers and dressing areas; a


At a total cost of \$9.5 million, the Dave McClain Athletic Facility has been constructed on an outdoor practice field immediately north of Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. The domed structure is bordered on the north by the Engineering building, the east by Camp Randall Park, and on the west by parking lot #17 and Camp Randall Stadium. Direct access is provided via a corridor from the facility to the football offices in the stadium.

CAMP RANDALL MEMORIAL STADIUM

Camp Randall Stadium, the home of the University of Wisconsin Football Team, is recognized as one of the finest collegiate facilities in the nation.

From its impressive doubledeck, horseshoe design and 76,293-seat capacity, to its modern and spacious Communications Center, the UW is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field.


The ninth largest college-owned structure in the nation and third largest in the Big Ten, Camp Randall's official capacity of 76,293 is surpassed only by Michigan (101,701), Tennessee (91,249), Ohio State (85,290), Stanford (84,795), Penn State (83,770), Georgia (82,122), Texas (80,000) and Clemson (78,915).



The Badgers have drawn crowds of more than 77,000 on 17 occasions since 1980, and on 30 occasions since 1975. The all-time single game attendance record at Camp Randall Stadium is 80,024, set against Michigan in 1978.

Wisconsin ranked 14th in the nation in 1985 per game attendance with an average of 71,613, while the 1984 school record attendance of 74,681 per game ranked the Badgers 13th nationally.

Located atop the West side of Camp Randall's double deck, the Communications Center ranks as one of the nation's finest facilities for press, radio and television. The fourth level serves the needs of the print media and is the game headquarters for the UW Sports News Service. Radio broadcasts of Wisconsin football originate from the newly remodeled third level - which was improved and expanded in the summer of 1985 - while television broadcasts originate on the fifth level.



In addition to serving as the home of Wisconsin Football, Camp Randall Stadium also houses the UW Athletic Department, the athletic training facility and staff, and the National "W" Club.

THE HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL


Although the original structure was built in 1917, the history of the Camp Randall area itself dates back much further than the 70 years of the stadium.

In the years prior to the Civil War, the original site was owned by the State Agri-

cultural Society, whose yearly state fairs attracted holidaying throngs there.

When the Civil War broke out in 1861, however, the society turned the land over to the government to become Wisconsin's major military training center. Named for a wartime governor, the site became known as "Camp Randall Military Training Center."

The land again became the state fair grounds when peace returned, and when General U.S. Grant visited it 15 years later, he hailed the transformation from a war-





crowd regularly watching from fringed surreys. (Wisconsin won its first great victory at home in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0.)

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913, but the stands were still constructed of wood. The legislature had declined to pay the extra expense of concrete and consequently, when a large section collapsed on Nov. 21, 1915 and injured 20 spectators. (Only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties from among the 1,800 in the area.)

In 1917, a new 10,000-seat concrete structure was begun with a grant of \$15,000 from the state legislature. (The rest of the money to finance the project was earned through University athletic events.)

The first game to be played in the "new" Camp Randall Stadium in 1917 was

time military training center to the site of the annual state fair as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace." (Others who had visited the grounds included General Sherman, General Sheridan and President Hayes.)

Following the eventual move of the Wisconsin State Fair to Milwaukee, it was decided that the land should be sold for building lots. This decision infuriated surviving Civil War veterans. Blasting this "sordid sacrilege", they promptly urged the legislature to purchase the land, and in 1893 the State of Wisconsin presented the site to the university as a memorial athletic field. And when the question of a name arose, the vets naturally carried the day for "camp" instead of "field".

Football became of part of the University of Wisconsin athletic scene in 1889, but the first games were actually played on the lower part of the campus, with a part of the




the memorable Homecoming matchup with the Minnesota Golden Gophers - a game the Badgers won 10-7.

In 1921, capacity was increased to 29,783, then to 38,293 in 1926, and to 45,000 in 1940 - before the first of three enlargements since the end of World War II took place. 1950 and 1951 saw the completion of the horseshoe at the north end of the stadium and capacity was upped to 51,000.

In 1958, the running track was eliminated from Camp Randall, the playing field was lowered ten feet, and 12,000 more seats were added to give the facility a total of 63,435 seats. The addition of the second deck on the west side in 1966 created 13,000 more prime viewing seats as well as the modern Communications Center, and capacity rose to 76,293.

1984 saw the creation of 14 private boxes - each with seating for up to ten people - on the fifth level of the Communications Center, while a 1985 construction project on the third level of the Communications Center created ten new booths for radio broadcasts.



THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Situated amidst five fresh-water lakes and rolling hills, the University of Wisconsin is one of the most enchanting campuses in America. It sits on the south shore of Lake Mendota, encompassing more than 300 buildings and 900 acres of land—most within two blocks of the lake. There is beautiful and green Bascom Hill. A 129-acre peninsula—complete with hiking trails—known as Picnic Point. There is the vibrant pedestrian State Street Mall—lined with unique shops and restaurants. The on-the-hour ringing bells of Carillon Tower and 76,293-seat Camp Randall Stadium.

The Elvehjem Museum of Art houses the University's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C. to the present, and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.

University Theater, School of Music, and the Dance Division offer a wide range of performances throughout the year. Facilities include the Ronald E. 
