

EARLY QUITTING.....

Early quitting is no joke - even though it's certainly getting to be one in our yard.

Early quitting is a form of cheating. Everyone is paid for a full day's work, and those who quit before the whistle blows are not giving a full day's work in return for the pay they receive.

In these times of war it is an abuse that cannot be condoned. With thousands of our soldiers spread all over the world fighting our battles and dying that we might survive to live in peace and comfort, no one should look upon this abuse with complacency.

Practically every man in this yard has pledged his honor that he will stay on the job until the whistle blows. A majority of those working here keep that pledge, but there are many who do not.

These cheaters stand around gangways and stock piles, idle near the shop doors, and slowly inch up toward the clock-house. But when the whistle blows they suddenly come to life and dash for the exits.

Imagine what a discouraging picture this would be if it were seen by our soldiers and sailors now bleeding and striving against the enemy.

The weight of the expressed opinion of the majority of you employees who are daily hurt by the unpleasant spectacle of early quitting will go far to stop this abuse.

And once the boys are in the Army, just think how swell it'll be for them - because there's one place where they won't have to worry about the time or getting to a clock-house first.....


.....AN "EXPERT" AT WORK.....






HOCKEY TEAM TO MEET BUTLER'S ON WEDNESDAY

A dance, sponsored by the Zenith Dredge Athletic Association, will be held at the Spaulding Hotel on February 27th (Saturday).


The purpose of this dance will be to raise funds for the promotion of sports for men in our yard.
