Dr. EDWARD FOREMAN EVERETT FELLOWSHIP IN MEDICINE.

Upon motion of Regent Faast, seconded by Regent Grady, the following recommendation of the Trust Fund Committee was unanimously adopted:

Everel Fellowsh

That athe gift of \$10,000 from the Estate of Dr. Edward Foremen Everett tendered by his sisters, Mrs. William Henry Sawyer, Mrs. George Cary Comstock, and his brother Julien F. Everett to establish the Dr. Edward Foreman Everett Fellowship in Medicine be accepted; the income to be paid to his surviving brother and sisters during their lives. Upon the death of the said Mrs. William Henry Sawyer, Mrs. George Cary Comstock and Julien F. Everett, the annual income shall be paid to candidates nominated by the Dean of the Medical School and approved by the Regents. If in any year the income of the fund shall not be equal to the amount of a University Fellowship in the Graduate School, the Regents may permit the fund to accumulate until the annual income shall be equal to the amount of such University Fellowship. The fellowship shall be so administered as to inculcate the true ideals of the medical profession, so that the incumbent shall enter upon the practice of medicine not primarily as a commercial occupation but with a view to the welfare of mankind, with a sense of satisfaction in the practice of the profession in itself, and with a recognition of the dignity of the healing art.

The incumbent of the fellowship shall have received his Bachelor's degree at the University of Wisconsin and may retain the fellowship until he receives his degree as Doctor of Medicine at the University of Wisconsin; and if in the judgment of the faculty of the Medical School a reappointment seems likely to be of high advantage to the practice of medicine in the United States, the fellowship may be continued for an additional season of study of not more than one year at the Medical School of Columbia University in the City of New York. All further conditions regarding the qualifications of the incumbent mentioned in the memoranda left by Dr. Everett to be followed in so far as practicable.
