Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on January 12, 1952, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That Nathan P. Feinsinger, professor of law, be granted leave of absence, without pay, for the second semester of 1951-52, in order that he may continue as Chairman of the Wage Stabilization Board.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That Mrs. May S. Reynolds, professor of home economics (foods and nutrition) be granted leave of absence, with pay, for the second semester of 1951-52; to receive \$716.10 from Summer Session Leave Trust, \$1,800 from Agriculture 1-2, and \$1,008.90 from Agriculture 1-4.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That Arthur W. Mansfield, professor of physical education - men and Intercollegiate Athletics, be granted leave of absence, with pay, from March 6 to April 7, 1952, to take part in the Far East Command Baseball Clinic in Tokyo, Japan.

Regents Arveson and Kleczka voted "No".

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That Murray Fowler, associate professor of comparative philology and linguistics, be granted leave of absence for the academic year 1952-53, without pay, in order that he may accept a Fulbright scholarship for study in India.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, ThatTroels Warming, associate professor of mechanical engineering, Milwaukee Center, be changed from half-time for the first semester to full time for the second semester of 1951-52; and that his salary be increased from \$2,735 to \$4,102.50 for the academic year; charge to 2A-2AB and 11-Ext. Staff, Milwaukee.

VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to
sign a contract with Hyland, Hall and Company, Madison, on a cost-plus basis not
to exceed \$5000, for the furnishing of all sheet metal and plumbing equipment and
supplies, labor and trucking services necessary to revamp the ventilating and air
conditioning system in Great Hall, Memorial Union Building. (Chargeable to
Fund 15-373, Memorial Union Building Association, Physical Plant.) (Confirming
approval by the Executive Committee.)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a contract with the Milaeger Well Drilling Company, Milwaukee, on a unit-cost basis, for soil borings at sites proposed for various buildings, including the Dairy Cattle Instruction and Research Center and the Bacteriology Building.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That \$300 be appropriated from the income in the Anonymous Fund to the Graduate School to be paid to the Institute of International Education.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That \$25,000 be appropriated from 1-E Unbudgeted Receipts to the College of Letters and Science to provide funds for additional instructional staff needed on account of the increase in student enrollment over the estimates on which the 1951-52 budget was based.

In connection with the foregoing recommendation, Regent Jones pointed out that there had been a material increase in enrollment, especially in the College of Letters and Science, over the enrollment estimates used in preparing the 1951-52 budget and that there would probably be an increase over the estimated enrollment for the second semester of the 1951-52 school year.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That although the University cannot guarantee suitable housing accommodations for Badger student families who will be required to move from Badger by June 30, 1952, and that although the responsibility for finding other accommodations must rightfully be the obligation of the individual students, university officials are most anxious to cooperate in assisting the Badger students with their housing problems, and, to that end, for those student residents of Badger who will be enrolled in the University for the 1952 summer session or for the fall semester of 1952-53 the following policies are approved:

- a. That the Director of the University Housing Bureau be authorized to give preference and first consideration to Badger students as described above for such accommodations as are listed with the Bureau that may be suitable, beginning immediately and effective through June 30, 1952.
- b. That the Director of Residence Halls be authorized to give preference in assignment to Badger students as described above for vacancies that occur in housing units operated by that Division that might be suitable, beginning immediately and effective through June 30, 1952. (This housing includes the Monroe Trailer Camp, the East Hill Trailer Camp, the University Cabin Court, housing in the University Expansion area, and the University Houses.)

Regent Renk announced that he had met with officials of the City of Madison and suggested a meeting with the city officials and the Regents to discuss problems of mutual interest, including the University expansion program. He believed the University should pay taxes on property in the University expansion area on which the University receives rents and that the University should not be exempt from paying for street improvements in front of its rental income property when the adjacent owners of private property are required to pay for such costs. He thought the University's public relations would be greatly improved if the Regents would meet with city officials and discuss problems of mutual interest to the City and the University. Regent Renk moved the adoption of the following motion:

That at the March meeting, between 12:00 Noon and 2 P.M., the Regents as a committee of the whole meet with the Mayor of Madison, the President of the Common Council, and the President of the Madison Chamber of Commerce and talk over our problems.

The motion was seconded by Regent Kleczka who stated that he had no objection to meeting with the Mayor of Madison and other city officials but that he did disagree with Mr. Renk's belief that the University should pay taxes on the property in the expansion area, because the payment of taxes has been declared illegal by the Courts.

Regent Renk agreed that legislation would be necessary to permit the payment of taxes and also pointed out that there were other problems which should be discussed with the city officials, such as that concerned with University Avenue traffic.

Regent Jones stated that he had a great deal of interest in and sympathy for Mr. Renk's suggestions because he believed every effort should be made to obtain cooperation and mutual understanding. He recounted the numerous occasions on which the Regents and University groups, studying the future development needs of the University, had met with former Mayor Kraege, members of City committees as well as with the City Council, and representatives of the religious groups owning property in the expansion area. Regent Jones stated that he wanted to disabuse any thought that the Regents had not met and discussed mutual problems with the city officials. He stated that the fundamental question was the right of the City to tax state property and that that was something which was under the control of the Legislature. He referred to bills which had been introduced in the last three sessions of the Legislature relating to taxing University properties, including one which would have required the payment of taxes on the University residence halls. Regent Jones granted that the City of Madison does have its problems and growing pains but stated that that is true of most all communities in the state. He cited problems facing other communities and cited the advantages enjoyed by the City of Madison and Dane County, including the amount of income taxes paid and distributed back to the local community as well as advantages accruing as a result of expenditures by the University and other departments of state government located in Madison, and the saving to residents of Dane County because of the financial advantage to students from Dane County attending the University. Regent Jones wanted the record to clearly show that the Regents have met with officials

of the City of Madison regarding mutual problems, that the Regents are cognizant of the statutory tax-exempt status of University property, and that the Regents have gone on record in favor of paying school taxes for school-age children residing on state-owned property.

Regent Kleczka stated that the Regents had selected authorized representatives of the Board to meet with officials of the City of Madison regarding the expansion program.

Regent Renk acknowledged that the Regents may not have looked down at the City of Madison but stated that they were dictatorial in sending the letter telling the people owning property that the University was going to take over all the property in the expansion areas. He stated that the Regents had to improve their public relations and should discuss these matters with the city officials.

Regent Watson objected to the proposal made by Regent Renk, not because there is no problem, but because he believed the Regents would be heading toward very serious problems if they are to be bound by advanced commitments made by one Regent. He thought the proper approach would be to first clear the matter with the Board of Regents. His concern was with the method of making arrangements.

Regent Renk stated that any Regent who thinks he is doing what is right can speak for himself. He stated that when he was appointed to the Board by Governor Kohler he was told to go up there and tell them what he thought and was not told to clear it with anybody.

Regent Werner said that it would be difficult to vote against Regent Renk's motion but stated that he would be compelled to do so because the proposed procedure was improper. Regent Werner stated that he was entirely in favor of cooperation with the officials of the City of Madison and that he believed the Regents had been doing that since first considering the expansion program. He stated that the Regents were entitled to send the notices which were sent to the owners in the expansion area and that such communications were merely serving notice that it was the plan of the University to eventually extend the campus to the limits outlined.

The Vice President of Business and Finance reported that the Budget Committee of the Legislative Council is currently studying the question of the taxation of state-owned property on a state-wide basis and suggested that the Regents might want to consider inviting members of the Budget Committee of the Legislative Council to attend whatever meetings might be held with the officials of the City of Madison.

Regent Renk stated that the matter of taxes was only one of the angles and that what he wanted to do was to get the Regents and the people of Madison together.

Regent Jones stated that because Regent Renk felt that the communication sent to property owners in the expansion area was dictatorial, he would ask that a copy of the letter be brought in and read to the Board.

Regent Renk stated that it was not a question of words but a question of how the words were received.

Regent Werner again cited the meetings held with pastors of the student churches and stated that they were satisfied with the need for the University's expansion program.

Regent Kleczka stated that it was necessary for him to leave the meeting and requested that the vote be taken on Regent Renk's motion.

Regent Renk restated his motion as follows:

That the Board of Regents sit down, with the Mayor of Madison, the President of the Common Council, the President of the Madison Chamber of Commerce and any delegations they might select, at our next meeting in March or at a suitable time to be designated by the President of the Board.

A called vote was taken, Regents Arveson, Gelatt, Kleczka and Renk voting "Aye"; Regents Jones, Sensenbrenner, Watson and Werner voting "No". Regent Sensenbrenner stated that he was voting "No" because of the time of the meeting and the fact that the Legislative Council was considering these problems.

Regent Renk challenged the right of President Sensenbrenner, as Chairman of the meeting, to vote on this motion. The decision on this challenge was deferred pending a study of the rules of order.

Regent Sensenbrenner and Regent Renk discussed the right of an individual Regent to speak for the Board.

The Secretary then read the form letter sent in June, 1946, to each owner of property in the two expansion areas and read the two resolutions referred to therein which were adopted on May 4, 1946, by the Regents relating to the expansion program and the notices to property owners in the expansion areas.

Regent Jones then asked Regent Renk whether there was anything in the communication or the resolutions that, by construction, might be considered dictatorial. Regent Renk agreed that he did not think they sounded dictatorial but that the people of Madison think they are. Regent Jones then demanded a "Yes" or "No" answer to the question of whether it was dictatorial. Regent Renk stated it was not dictatorial but was received as such and that he would go on record that the action of the Regents, as received, was dictatorial.

Appropriate sections from Roberts Rules of Order were read to the Board on the question of the right of the Chairman to vote and the Chair ruled that his vote was legal and declared that the motion by Regent Renk was lost on a tied vote.

Regent Watson stated that because Legislative consideration was being given to the problems under discussion that the Regents should again consider these matters before meeting and discussing them with the city officials. Regent Watson moved the adoption of the following motion:

Until

That there be a special order of business for considering this problem which is to be submitted to the Legislative Council and that subsequently the officials of the City of Madison be advised that the Regents will be happy to meet with them to discuss this problem.

The motion was seconded by Regent Werner and adopted unanimously.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 11:45 A.M.
