#### RAISING TURKEYS .

Mr. W.R. James has a hobby which is very interesting. That is "turkeys". There are White Holland, Bronze, Narragansett, Bourbon Reds, Mississippi Wilds and Ebony Blacks. There are upwards of 2,000 of them, not much to look at now , but just imagine what they will look like around Thanksgiving .

Besides the turkeys there are six kinds of pheasants: Golden, Amherst Reeves, Mutant, Ring Neck and Silver. And Geese: Canadian , Snow and Egyptian. And Ducks: Wood, Mallards, Pekin and Muscovy.

Mr. James lives on the Judge Sears place just east of Elgin Club. Though one of the older places, it is quite up-to-date. The large living room facing the lake is quite as if it were built in 1939.

There are 32 acres in the estate. The round barn is quite interesting. It is the only one around here. It has a basement which was used for horses and cattle, the second floor for carriages, the third for hay. Then above is the loft for birds and many generations of them have made it their home. Mr. James had an etching made of it and sent cards out for Christmas Greetings.

The foreman on the estate is Helmar Odden. The house which he occpies is made over from an old log cabin, with additions. No one remembers when the cabin was built.

The James family like to be out of doors as much as possible when up here and have an out door fire-place for cooking and roasting weiners, etc. There is a very fine shuffle board court on the beautiful sward at the rear of the home with a beautiful setting of flower gardens.

Before taking over this place, the James' lived for a season on the J.H. Larson place, now owned by F.H. Farnsworth. They liked the lake and folks so well that they decided to buy here.

In the business world, Mr. James is President of the C.D. Gammon Co. Chicago, which is engaged in trucking steel. His son C.R. James is Vice -President of the firm and Mr. James Hofta , a son-in-law is also an officer. Mr. and Mrs. James have another daughter, Edith, who is a member of Belfry Players.
