

Spotlight on the Union Theater

The Wisconsin Union Theater has a lot in store for the upcoming year. The Theater will receive several improvements to make your concert-going experience even more enjoyable.

The Union Theater will enhance its equipment over the winter break by adding a new rigging system and a new main curtain. The Theater rigging system operates the main curtain, fire curtain, and 39 pipes that fly a movie screen, orchestra ceilings, stage masking and scenery. The current system is the original from 1939 when the Union Theater opened. It was adequate for the time, but today's scenery is heavier and the lighting is more complex. The installation of the new system will be concluded by the end of January.

"The most obvious improvement from the audience's perspective will be the new main curtain," says Fred Fisher, Wisconsin Union Theater Technical Director. The new system will allow the backstage crew to hang shows faster and safer. It will also accommodate more complicated sets and lighting, giving groups that perform at the Union Theater more flexibility to utilize the space.

Spring Performance Series

The Spring Performance Series gets underway with the Regina Carter Quintet on February 24. The program will provide a unique multicultural perspective and promises to challenge preconceptions of the violin by revealing its melodic side and potential for percussive expression.

To add even more flare is Taraf de Haïdouks, a one-of-a-kind band that touches on the richness of the Romanian Gypsy tradition. The mix of ages gives a unique sound to the band: the old men contribute soul and experience while the young add speed and energy. Taraf de Haïdouks will perform at the Union on March 24.

Chucho Valdes, a Cuban Pianist who has led Irakere, perhaps the world's top AfroCuban fusion band, will be at the Union on April 21. Due to political tensions between Havana and Washington, Valdes has not been well known in the United States. He is starting to become a force on the American scene though, thanks to his talents as a stunning piano performer and composer.



February 13, Alan L. Keyes

Alan Keyes, a former Reagan administration official, is a recognized leader in the conservative movement. He is a two-time presidential candidate and a former U.S. Senate Republican nominee.



February 27, Judy Shepard

Judy is the mother of University of Wyoming student Matthew Shepard who was attacked and died as a result of his sexual orientation. Since her son's death last year, Judy has become an activist against anti-gay violence and has testified before the Senate Judicial Committee in support of the Hate Crimes Prevention Act



April 17, Ralph Nader

Ralph Nader was the Green Party presidential candidate in the 2000 election. In his third presidential campaign, he challenged the duopoly of the two-party system. Nader is a consumer activist who has defended people against corporate negligence and government indifference.



April 22, Afeni Shakur

Shakur is a former revolutionary, Black Panther, activist and mother of the late rap star Tupac Shakur. She inspires audiences with her story of peace and empowerment and the struggles it took to get there.



Community Service through Students




As the Division of Social Education, the Union has a commitment to citizenship and providing students with out-of-the-classroom learning opportunities. The Morgridge Center for Public Service located in the historic Red Gym, is a vital part of the Union's mission because it provides students with hands-on experience while giving

service to others. "It is natural that a center that promotes and encourages service be a part of the Union's tradition," says Susan Dibbell, office manager for the Morgridge Center.

One way the Morgridge Center carries on the Union tradition is through the Wisconsin Idea Undergraduate Fellowships, a program that supports special projects where students, faculty and community organizations collaborate on activities that are designed to benefit all who participate in it. These projects are student-initiated and student-run, but are planned in collaboration with a faculty member and community organization. The completely volunteer program gives numerous UW students the chance to propose an idea and receive grant money to implement their idea in the community.



Students can use the Morgridge Center's online resources to search for volunteer opportunities or meet with staff to learn more about the Center's diverse offerings.



Directly next to Memorial Union is the historic Red Gym, which serves as home to the Morgridge Center for Public Service among many other student programs. The Morgridge Center is part of the Union, focusing on local, national, and international service opportunities.

Dave Jukam, a UW undergraduate, took advantage of the fellowship program last year when he put together the ASPIRE (Achieving Success by Promoting Interest in higheR Education) project. Dave realized that in today's society children from economically disadvantaged backgrounds face barriers in the education system that often deter them from reaching college. By proposing the ASPIRE program and implementing it in the community, Jukam has given many children the opportunity to experience what college is like and discover that it is within their reach.

ASPIRE strives to attract middle school students to higher education by bringing them to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, where they are paired up with UW student mentors. They tour the campus, attend special lectures with guest professors and discuss in small groups the college experience. What makes the program work so well is the many undergraduate volunteers. The ASPIRE program runs two annual sessions for six weeks on Saturday mornings. Initial funding for the ASPIRE program was provided by a Wisconsin Idea Undergraduate Fellowship. The program has been so successful that its creators are now trying to find continued support to keep the program running.
