Improvements Galore

The sights and sounds of construction continue as the Wisconsin Union is in the midst of a major construction period. Both Union South and Memorial Union are improving through renovation projects.

The Lakeside Terrace has reached the final phase—perfecting the details. This spring a decorative brick border will line the new area, a brick surface for the class of '36 plaza will be installed, and landscaping will be completed. Look forward to enjoying the new and improved terrace once winter departs!

The Union Theater auditorium will be repainted between semesters to be ready for the spring season.

At Union South during semester break, two walls of the second floor atrium will be removed, completely opening the atrium at the second floor level. The second floor corridor will receive new

carpeting, the lounge will sport new furniture, and the assembly hall will have a new floor installed.

By March, the remodeling and expansion of the Red Oak Grill will begin. The finished product will provide an entirely new food service unit with nearly three times the seating capacity and a wide entrance opening directly into the atrium.

This summer begins construction of a beautiful open stairway in the atrium—thanks to a gift by the Trustees of the Memorial Union Building Association. All three levels of Union South will be accessible from the center of the building—a welcome change.

Yes... there is an end! The lake safety tower is now completed. This 46-foot tower located adjacent to Helen C. White library is designed to improve lake safety. The tower includes a set of high-visibility warning lights and a look-out for hoofer boats.

Parking Available!!

Can it be? Is it true? Yes, the turnover on parking spaces by Memorial Union has improved. Helen C. White parking ramp is re-opened with the main level being converted to three-hour (and some two-hour) meters at \$.40 per hour, open all day. The lower level is available to visitors 5-10 p.m. on weekdays and all day Saturday. FREE parking on both levels all day Sunday.

Also, the meters in lot #1, between the Union and the Armory have been converted to two-hour or 30-minute meters to promote turnover. It seems to be working so feel free to drop in.

WISCONSIN CONNECTION: **Black Artists** Past and Present

Cooperation and collaboration are two words important to the Wisconsin Union Directorate (WUD) Art Area. Cooperation with artists, art lenders and student volunteers provides the essence of the exhibition program while ideas and support for the programs come from collaboration with University departments, art centers and museums.

In January, the WUD Art Area will join forces with Professor Frieda High of the Afro-American Studies Department, UW-Madison. Professor High, long known as an artist and lecturer on contemporary African and Afro-American art, has organized an exhibition of artists with a "Wisconsin connection." Through this exhibition of the same name, art works from all over the country will be assembled in the Main and Class of 1925 Galleries at Memorial Union. Co-sponsoring the exhibition locally is Black History, Inc. This event will appropriately start Black History Month, which is celebrated throughout the month of February.

Collaborating with Professor High is not unusual for the Art Area. She has provided subject matter, as well as inspiration and motivation, for past exhibitions both at the Unions and at the Elvehjem Museum of Art.

Chairing this exhibition is Darren DeMatoff, a second-year Art Area volunteer. DeMatoff's interest started with an African Studies course last spring. When the exhibition idea was selected last spring, he was delighted. "The Union has a chance to present an art view not usually seen," states DeMatoff. "I like working with artists around the country and with Professor High. I am excited and encourage all of you to come view our 'Wisconsin connection: Black Artist Past and Present'," DeMatoff concludes.

Plans are in gear to coordinate all WUD creative events into an April Arts Festival. Included in this event will be the George B. Hill creative writing contest, Battle of the Bands, Student Film Festival, the 59th Student Show (visual art), plus many others. 

New Videotape Rental Service

Wisconsin Union members will soon be able to rent videotapes, a new service of the Union. The new unit will provide an on-hand selection of over 1,000 tapes and will also rent video players. It will be located next to the Service Center in P3 Campus Outfitters, lower level of Memorial Union. A January opening is targeted.

All UW-Madison students and Union members will automatically be included in this new video club by virtue of their Wisconsin Union Membership. Tentative prices are \$1.99 for tape rentals and \$7.00 to use a video player. Prices will be slightly higher for non-Union member–UW faculty and staff.

An exciting additional service for Union members will be complete access to the largest selection of tapes in the Madison area. The Video Station of Madison will supply and maintain the library of tapes available in the Memorial Union. In addition, any title in their 26,000 tape collection can be reserved and delivered for pick-up at the Memorial Union. This includes an excellent selection of hard-to-find foreign, art and older films.

The hours for the unit will be 11:30 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. daily. Access will be either from the Memorial Games Room, or through P3 Campus Outfitters.


