REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

December 5, 1923, 10 A. M.

President Kohler presiding.

Communications were received from Regents Mahoney, Gale and Schmidtmann in explanation of their absence.

Upon motion of Regent Butler, seconded by Regent Seaman, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the meetings of the Executive Committee held on October 26 and November 30, 1923, as sent out to the regents, be ratified, approved and confirmed.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

-Letters and Science-

1. That Charles S. Slichter, dean of the graduate school and professor of mathematics, be given leave of absence for the second semester of 1923-24, on the summer session basis. Adonted.

2. That \$1200 be transferred from unassigned instruction to pronting, to cover cost of bulletins from the department of education (Bureau of Educational Research.) Adopted.

3. That the salary of Michael I. Rostovtzeff, professor of history, be increased to \$6500 per annum, beginning with the academic year 1924-25; and in order that Professor Rostovtzeff may be in a position to prosecute his researches either here or abroad most advantageously it is further recommended that he be granted the right to withdraw from teaching, without prejudice to his salary, in the sixth semester of every three-year period, beginning with the academic year 1923-24.

Knih regents) Regent Seaman presented the report of the sub-committee appointed to secure a location for the University Extension Division in Milwaukee. He stated that the committee favored the purchase of the Wisconsin University School Broperty at Broadway and Milvaukee Streets, if it could be secured for the sum of \$150,000, as

it was offered verbally by the officers of the school. He stated that school committee had now submitted a proposition in writing, in which they ask for \$230,000, which is in excess of the amount of the appropriation.

Regent Cashman addressed the regents on the subject of the

RHODES SCHOLARSHIPS,

discussing their purpose and the amount of time expended by the faculty in selecting candidates, and expressed the opinion that the continuance of these scholarships is not to the best interest of this country. Dr. Birge made a general statement outlining the manner in which the Rhodes Scholarships are administered, and spoke of the relations of the University to other countries as shown for instance by the Carl Schurz professorship.

President Birge brought up the matter of the resolutions passed by the Men's Forum of the Kingsley M. E. Church of Milwaukee, and upon motion of Regent Butler, seconded by Regent Waters, it was VOTED, That President Birge be authorized to write a letter to the Men's Forum, thanking them for the interest shown by that organization in the University and assuring them that steps are being taken to curb drinking among the students.

The President filed reports of leaves of absence and discipline with the Secretary.

At 12:05 the Regents went into EXECUTIVE SESSION.

President Birge referred to his report with reference to cooperation with the State Board of Vocational Education. Upon motion of Regent Butler, seconded by Regent Faast, it was

VOTED, That the plan as submitted by President Birge be approved. (Copy on file).

VOTED, That the Business Manager be instructed to ask the Attorney General as to whether, under the law appropriating money for the purchase of a site and construction of a <u>University Extension Building</u> in <u>Milwaukee</u>, the money could be used for the purchase of land wit with a building already constructed.
