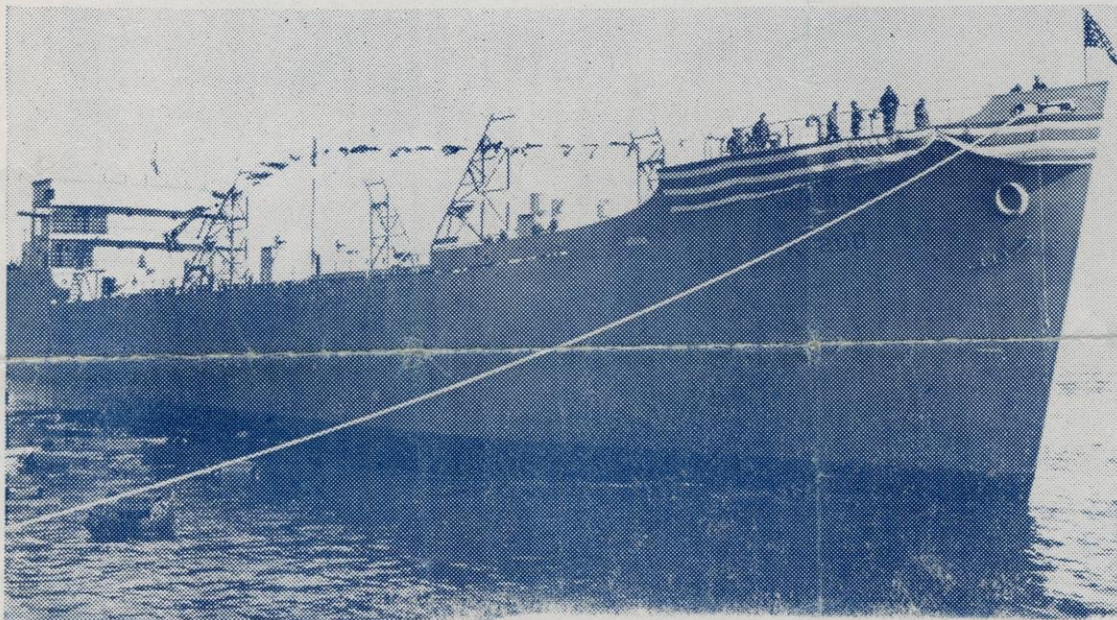
Today we present a pictorial review of M-S Day at the Globe Shipyard, Saturday, October 14, 1944.

Lower right: High U. S. Maritime commission, National Safety council, labor and shipbuilding officials were present on the launching stand.



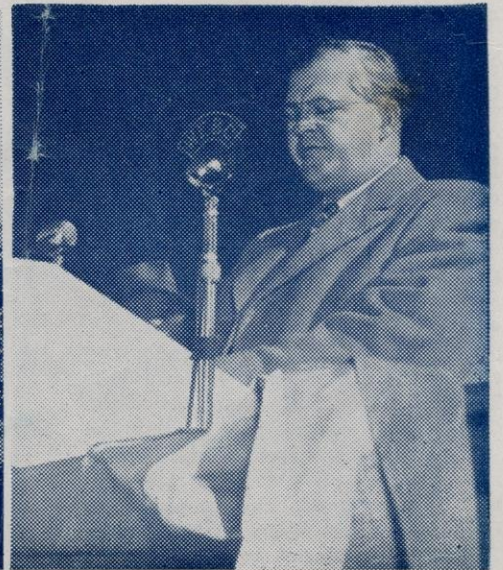
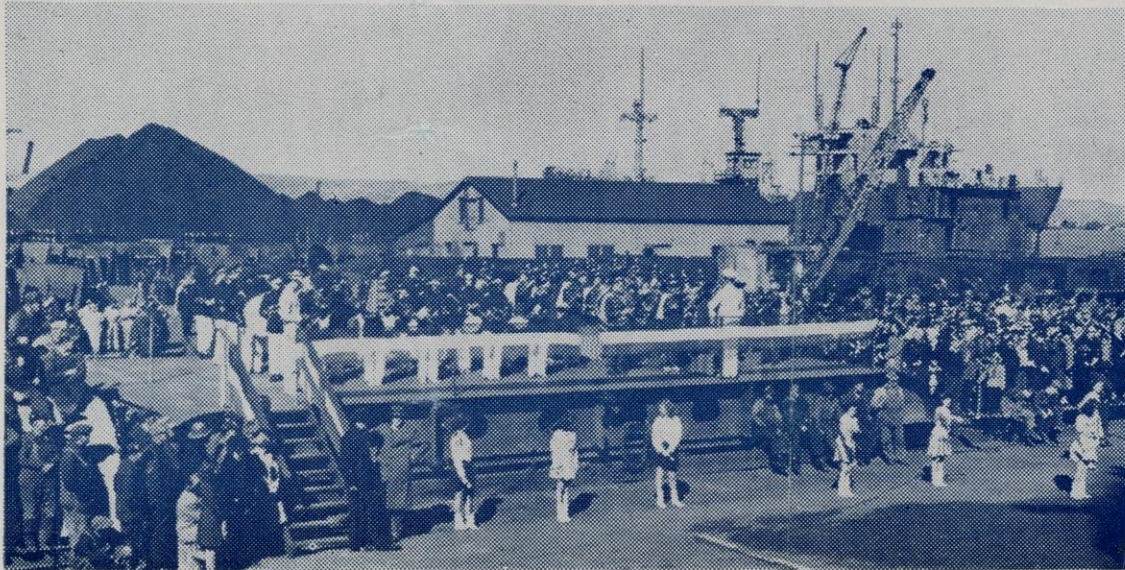
At right: Climaxing the M-S Day program was the launching of the M. V. Pembina. The camera catches the big splash.

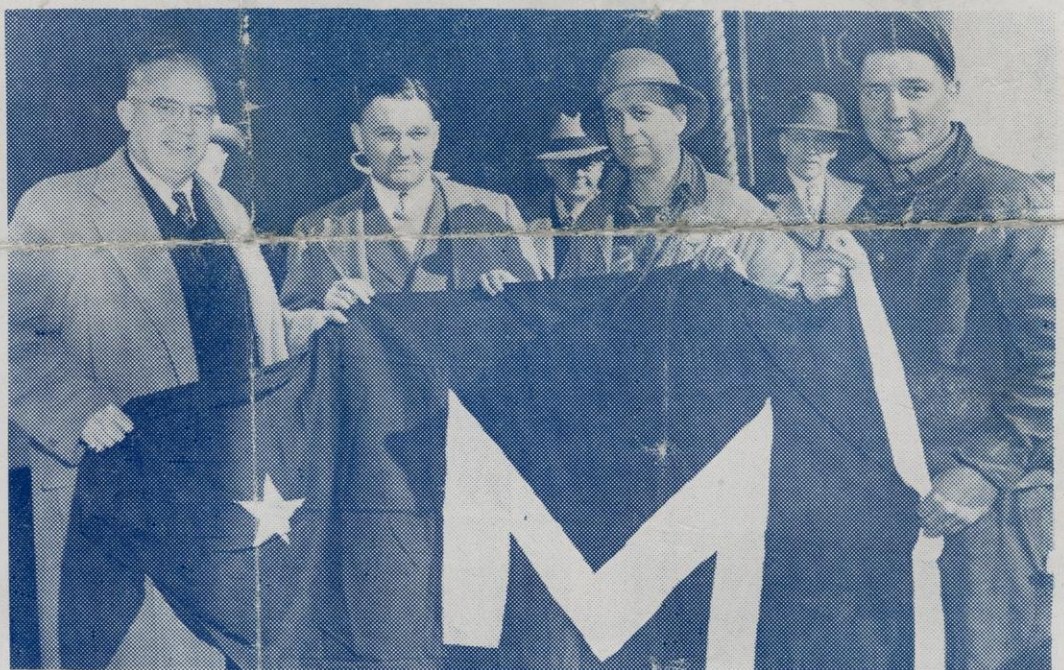
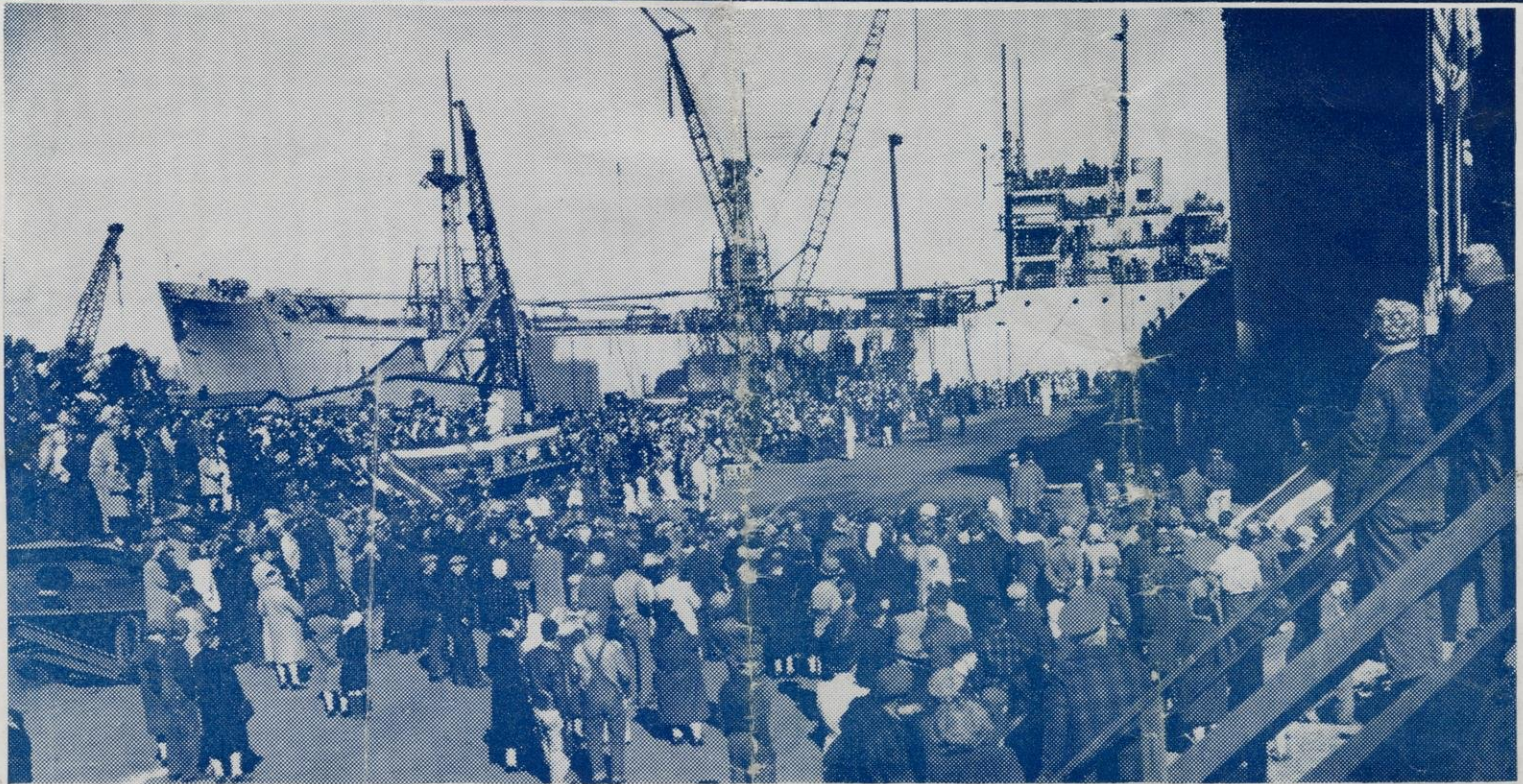
