ACADEMICS & ATHLETICS

Achieving national recognition in both academics and athletics is a difficult challenge for universities and colleges today. The University of Wisconsin is one of the few institutions that has earned praise for its work in the classroom and on the field of play.

With its admittance to the Association of American Universities (AAU), one of the most prestigious organizations of higher education, the UW-Madison has been recognized for its solid reputation in the academic world. Indeed, only 56 schools nationally are in the AAU.

Balancing the academic requirements of an outstanding institution with the demands of collegiate athletic competition is difficult. However, the University of Wisconsin has attacked the challenge and succeeded.

Besides its academic prowess, UW-Madison is one of the top total-sports programs in the country. According to a survey conducted by *USA Today*, Wisconsin had the sixth-most successful athletic department in the nation for 1991-92.

The Badger men's program was rated 10th and women's department was eighth. Wisconsin was one of just six schools that had both its men's and women's programs ranked.

Inclusion on both the AAU and *USA Today* lists clearly demonstrates that academics and athletics do mix at the University of Wisconsin.

Fans from all over the state of Wisconsin invade 77,745-seat Camp Randall Stadium every fall to witness Badger football.







COACHING STAFF

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Pat Richter, who made his mark as a Wisconsin all-America football player in the 1960s, is realizing similar successes as an administrator. The Madison native is entering his fourth year as the Director of Athletics.

Richter, the last nine-time letterwinner inschool history, is responsible for overseeing one of the nation's most successful athletic programs.

As an administrator

Named to his position in December of 1989, Richter is in charge of a division that includes 20 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes, more than 160 employees and a large physical plant.

Since Richter joined the department, UW athletics have made giant strides. Among his biggest impact moves, Richter hired former Notre Dame defensive coordinator Barry Alvarez and former New York Knicks coach Stu Jackson to head the football and basketball teams.

He oversaw an improvement in facilities, helped regain program support from every corner of the state and worked diligently to return the department to fiscal solvency. After inheriting a department that was \$2.1 million in debt, Richter and his staff have trimmed the deficit by 85 percent in just three years.

Success on the field of play has been a trademark of Richter's department. Badger hockey and crew teams have won national championships during his tenure and the men's cross country and women's track squads placed second at NCAA meets in the last year.

The 1991-92 season will be remembered as one of the most successful in school history. *USA Today* rated Wisconsin's total program as the nation's sixth best. Only six schools (including Wisconsin) had both their men's and women's pro-

grams ranked in the newspaper's top 10. Additionally, the Badgers realized a surplus of \$1.3 million over its budget projections in '91-92.

Wisconsin football and men's basketball caught people's attention last year. Alvarez' gridiron team was one win short of a bowl bid and was third nationally for attendance increase.

Badger basketball, in Jackson's first year, earned its third National Invitation Tournament berth in the last five seasons. The Badgers were nationally ranked for the first time since 1974 and had five sellouts in the Field House, the most since 1950.

As an athlete

Richter's love for Badger athletics started as an undergraduate, when he earned three letters each in football, basketball and baseball.

Pat earned all-America (1961-62), academic all-America (1962) and all-Big Ten (1961-62) honors as a football end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl and caught a game-record 11 passes in the Badgers' 42-37 loss to USC.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior, Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor (given for proficiency in scholarship and athletics) and received the Knute Rockne Award (given to the nation's top lineman).

Richter earned all-conference honors in baseball (1963) and led the Badgers in hits, home runs and runs batted in three times. Pat earned his scholarship for basketball, where the 6-6 center played three seasons.

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture in 1964, Pat was a first-round draft pick of the NFL's Washington Redskins. He played nine years (1963-71).



Professional life

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After employment with a Madison law firm, he worked his way up to Vice President of Personnel at the Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association. Pat was included in the inaugural class of the Athletic Department Hall of Fame in 1991.

He is a regular contributor to many charitable organizations, including the UW Children's Hospital and the Four Lakes Boy Scouts.

Personal life

Richter and his wife, Renee, have four children: Scott, Brad, Barry and Tim.

MADISON

Located in southern Wisconsin, Madison is home to both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital. The city was designed so that the school and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of academics and politics.

One of the Midwest's most vibrant communities, Madison offers an endearing quality of life to both its residents and students.

The centerpiece of the city is the State Capitol. The campus is west of the Capitol and offers easy access to shopping malls, restaurants for every taste and popular night spots.


With a diverse population of nearly 190,000, Madison offers the unique combination of bigcity excitement and small-town charm. Madison is an action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, sports, arts and recreation.

Madison was listed as the 11th most livable city in the United States in a 1992 *Money* magazine survey.

Besides the UW Athletic Department, the city offers a large quantity and high quality of outdoor leisure activities. *Outside* magazine ranked Madison as one of the top 15 sports towns in the nation several years ago.

CAMPUS LIFE

Situated among gentle rolling hills and wooded areas between Lakes Mendota and Monona is the 900-acre University of Wisconsin campus. Located in the state's capital city, Madison, the UW campus is one of the nation's most picturesque.

Two movies have been filmed on the UW-Madison campus, including the 1986 hit *Back To School*, featuring Rodney Dangerfield.

There are many famous landmarks on campus, including tree-lined Bascom Hill, North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise Hall (the tallest building on campus) and Picnic Point (a 129-acre peninsula). A favorite gathering spot for students is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace.

Wisconsin students include some of the nation's foremost scholastic achievers. The diversification of the student body and its campus life make the UW a truly special educational experience.

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, founded in 1848, throughout its history has been recognized as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, with many departments ranked among the nation's top 10.

Nobel Prize-winning research, a liberal tradition of shared governance and a diverse student body have given UW-Madison a worldwide reputation. Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly pursuit since 1910.

In what is the most extensive study on graduate level education of its kind, the five-volume Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States rated Wisconsin tied for eighth (with UCLA and Michigan) for its academic quality.

Political atmosphere

Because of its roots in Wisconsin legislation, UW-Madison has always maintained close links with the state. With the passage of a federal act in 1862, it became one of the nation's first land grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life sciences.

A number of centers and programs exist on the campus specifically to facilitate the exchange of information between the university and government, business and industry. Mandated by Wisconsin statute, faculty governance has been a hallmark of the university since its founding.

Physical setting

UW-Madison is considered one of the most beautiful college campuses in the country, lying as it does along the shore of Lake Mendota. There are five lakes in the Madison area, two of which — Mendota and Monona — form an isthmus on which sits the state capitol building.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty. Hollywood filmmakers have selected the campus as its location for films about college life; one film was the 1986 hit *Back to School* with Rodney Dangerfield.

Academic leader

The UW has been a leader in many areas. Among the breakthroughs at UW: establishing the first academic programs in the U.S. for Scandinavian Studies (1875), Psychology (1888), Agricultural Economics (1909), Genetics (1910) and Wildlife Management (1939); launching the world's first space observatory; conducting the first bone marrow transplant in the United States; operating the nation's first radio station (WHA) in 1917; discovering Vitamins A and B; and finding evidence to link cancer with saccharine and cyclamates.

Student body

From an initial enrollment of 17, the student population has grown to more than 43,000, making it one of the nation's largest universities. Although almost 80 percent of the students come from Wisconsin—representing every county of the state — Madison's isthmus is truly an international community.

UW students come from more than 125 countries, and the UW ranks fifth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment (over 3,000). It is one of the nation's most diverse student populations.

Faculty

The UW-Madison faculty routinely wins national citations for teaching excellence, research and service. Much of the university's international reputation comes from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW faculty and alumni have accounted for 11 Nobel and 16 Pulitzer Prizes. There are 44 UW-Madison faculty members who have won Presidential Young Investigator awards (second to MIT); eight winners of the National Medal of Science; and three Searles Scholars. Fortytwo professors at the UW-Madison are enrolled in the National Academy of Sciences, nine are members of the National Academy of Engineering and three have been named to the National Academy of Education.

One of the nation's leading institutions for higher learning, the UW-Madison includes 11 schools, 133 academic departments, 14,000 employees and a \$1 billion budget. Majors are offered in 151 bachelors, 191 masters and 123 doctorate programs.



UW-Madison Rankings


Five stars for academics. The *Fiske Guide to Colleges* 1993 gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of just eight public universities to receive the five-star rating.

Top 10 rankings. The Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States, the most comprehensive and recent survey conducted, ranked departments in all areas as some of the best in country. Sociology, German, chemical engineering and geography were ranked No. 1 or 2 in the nation, according to the 1983 study.

Leading executives. The university produced the third-highest percentage of CEOs at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies according to a 1987 *Wall Street Journal* survey. A 1992 *Standard & Poor's* survey ranks UW-Madison second for executives with undergraduate degrees.

First in private support. With gifts totaling more than \$128 million in 1990-91, UW-Madison is the leading public institution in gaining private support and sixth among all U.S. higher education institutions.

Scientists cited third most. UW-Madison scientists are the third-most frequently cited scientists in the world, according to a 1983 study by the *Surveys of Science Resource Series*.


ACADEMIC SUPPORT


The primary objective of the Department of Academic and Student Affairs office is to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes. Counseling and advising services, plus a number of academic help programs, are offered to all student-athletes at the University.

The academic and student affairs staff is available to assist the UW's 700 student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitor progress toward degrees, offer career guidance and serve as valuable resource people.

Staff members work with student-athletes who desire extra academic help. The department utilizes the services of more than 100 tutors to provide one-on-one assistance or group study help.

The department maintains a five-station computer center, arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and coordinates the grantin-aid program. Support groups are offered to students who become medically or academically ineligible for competition.

BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Big Ten Statement of Guiding Principles

The association of universities known as the Big Ten was founded in 1895. Member institutions cherish a mission of research, graduate, professional and undergraduate teaching and public service. They have accorded athletics an important place within that array of missions. The Big Ten has always asserted that it will excel in athletics without relinquishing or compromising the priority its member institutions assign to their academic standards and commitment to student academic success.

From its beginning almost 100 years ago, the Big Ten continues to be recognized as one of the premier athletic leagues in the nation. In a time when consistent excellence is difficult to maintain, the Big Ten continues to be a showcase for the finest achievements in athletics and academics.

Rich in tradition

Nine national champion football teams have come from the Big Ten since 1936. Minnesota (four), Ohio State (three), Michigan (one) and Michigan State (one) have been crowned national champions by either the AP or UPI. Wisconsin's top finish was second in the final polls of 1962. The Badgers lost to USC, the national champ, in the Rose Bowl that season.

Individual players have also brought much prestige to the league. A dozen players from the Big Ten have won the most prestigious award in college football, the Heisman Trophy. From Jay Berwanger (Chicago), who won the first trophy in 1935, to Michigan's Desmond Howard (1991), seven past or present Big Ten schools have had a Heisman

Trophy winner. Wisconsin's Alan Ameche received the trophy in 1954.

The Big Ten also stands at the forefront in college football attendance. On any given weekend during the fall, several hundred thousand football fans fill stadiums around the Midwest. The Big Ten was the first league to draw more than four million fans in one season (1985), and the league has been first or second nationally in attendance 34 consecutive years.

Conference members have also been popular with bowls. A record six schools received bowl bids in 1984, 1985 and 1990. The league champ automatically qualifies for the Rose Bowl each season, while the second-, third- and fourth-place teams play in the Florida Citrus, Holiday and Hall of Fame Bowls.

Big Ten institutions have played in 18 different bowls: All American, Bluebonnet, Cherry, Citrus, Copper, Fiesta, Freedom, Garden State, Gator, Hall of Fame, Holiday, Independence, John Hancock, Liberty, Orange, Peach, Rose and Sugar.

Conference leadership

Under the leadership of James Delaney, the Big Ten Conference has a vision for college athletics in the 1990s. Sponsoring championships in 11 men's and 10 women's sports, the league has helped popularize many sports on its campuses.

The Big Ten has long been recognized for its its excellence in athletics, but more importantly is dedicated to the academic well-being of its participants. The league has long pushed for higher standards for student-athletes.

With its founding principles still serving as the guiding force, the Big Ten will continue to be a national leader.

Wisconsin football players receive media coverage on a national, regional and local basis. Additionally, hundreds of thousands of fans watch Badger football each fall in person and millions more follow on national television.



Playing college football in the Big Ten Conference and at the University of Wisconsin is an opportunity for success, excitement and exposure.

Badger football is unique with its intense media coverage. All three television networks, three radio stations and four major newspapers—two in Madison and two in Milwaukee—cover the club at home and on the road. Approximately a dozen media members interview Badger players after practice every week.

Wisconsin football was showcased in the national media last fall with articles that appeared in *USA Today, Sports Illustrated, The Sporting News* and several large national newspapers. ESPN and ABC own the rights to televise Big Ten football each week, and the Badgers played on those networks three times last fall.

Badger games are heard on a 34-station state-wide radio network. Home games are replayed on television each week. Coach Barry Alvarez has a weekly media session that routinely draws 20 reporters, plus TV and radio shows that are heard in all corners of the state.

Badger football attendance has jumped more than 20,000 per game since 1990. Wisconsin played before more than 600,000 fans in 1992 and millions more followed the Badgers on national TV.

Part of the exposure for Wisconsin football is related to its schedule. Besides the highly competitive Big Ten slate, the Badgers have games scheduled in the next several seasons with Colorado, Southern Methodist, Syracuse and Stanford plus a trip to Hawaii.



CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

Camp Randall Stadium, built 76 years ago, is the home for Wisconsin's football team. The 77,745-seat facility is among the nation's largest collegeowned stadiums.

The facilities

Distinguished by its impressive double-deck structure and horseshoe design, Camp Randall Stadium has been the Badgers' gridiron facility since 1917. Since its opening game on Nov. 3, 1917, Camp Randall Stadium has hosted 404 Badger football games and attracted more than 19 million fans.

Besides the playing field, Camp Randall houses the athletic department offices, lounge and study areas for athletes, film, training and weight rooms and a display of Badger football memorabilia.

The Stadium is the centerpiece of Wisconsin's large athletic complex. Located on the same block on the west side of campus are the Dave McClain Athletic Facility, the Badgers' state-of-the-art indoor practice building, and the Wisconsin Field House.

The history

Camp Randall Stadium and its grounds have a rich history prior to its affiliation with Wisconsin Badger athletics.

In the days before the Civil War, the site was owned by the Wisconsin Agricultural Society, which held its annual state fair on the grounds. When hostilities broke out in 1861, the society gave the land to the government for a major military training center. More than 70,000 troops attended training drills at the Camp Randall complex.

After peace was restored in the nation, the land was returned to State Fair property. The Fair later moved to Milwaukee, and Wisconsin's Civil War veterans urged the legislature to purchase the land. In 1893, the state presented

the site to the university as a memorial athletic field.

Intercollegiate athletics had begun on campus in 1881, and football joined the scene in 1889. The first games were actually played on a field on the lower part of campus. The stadium was built at its present site in 1913. However, a tragic collapse of the wooden bleachers in 1915 prompted the UW to formulate plans for concrete stands.

Stadium construction

Two years later, a 10,000-seat concrete stadium was started with a grant of \$15,000 from the legislature. The rest of the money was earned from athletic department revenues.

The first game played in the present Camp Randall Stadium was a thrilling 10-7 homecoming victory over archrival Minnesota in 1917. Capacity of the structure has increased several times, jumping to 51,000 by 1951.

A revision of the seating arrangements in 1955 boosted the capacity to 52,788. In 1958, the running track was removed,

the playing field was lowered 10 feet and 10,647 seats were added (raising capacity to 63,435). Capacity was increased to its current figure in 1966 with the addition of the second deck on the west side. The facility is designed so that all seats point toward the center of the field, providing excellent sight lines.

The Communications Center, which is one of the Midwest's best facilities for working media, was also built after the 1966 season. The three-level structure includes areas for media members, game personnel, athletic department officials and corporate booths.

Facility improvements have been continued into the 1990s with the installation of an artificial turf playing field in the summer of 1990 and a computerized scoreboard and message center added in the spring of 1992.


Crowds and successes

Badger football teams have averaged better than 70,000 fans per game a dozen seasons since 1972. Wisconsin has drawn more than 70,000 spectators to 62 games since 1970, including a record 80,024 against Michigan in 1978.


The Badgers drew an average of 61,378 to its home games last fall, an increase of more than 11,000 from the previous season. That gain was the nation's third-highest.

Under Alvarez, Wisconsin has played before three Camp Randall Stadium crowds of at least 70,000. Since Alvarez came to Madison, attendance at UW home games has skyrocketed more than 20,000 per game.


Success on the field has also been evident in Camp Randall Stadium. Last fall, the Badgers posted a 5-1 record, the best season winning percentage at home since 1962.




Wisconsin is one of the few schools in the nation that has an off-campus training facility for its fall camp. The Badgers spend their fall training session at the Holy Name Seminary in Middleton, Wis. Wisconsin's football team has several practice fields, auditorium and classroom facilities, a swimming pool, game room, dining areas and living quarters for players and staff at its fall camp.





McCLAIN FACILITY

Opened in 1988, the Dave McClain Athletic Facility is a symbol of the Athletic Department's commitment to maintaining a first-class sports program.

The 166,264-square foot facility compares favorably with the best indoor training centers in the nation. Named in honor of the late Wisconsin football coach Dave McClain, the structure provides a suitable environment for practice during inclement weather.

A 76,380-square foot main floor features an artificial playing surface with a ceiling high enough for kicking drills. The lower level includes locker rooms, state-of-the-art training facilities (including on-site X-ray machines) and a spacious weight room.

On the second level, a theater-style auditorium (seating for 150), classrooms for individual position meetings and a player's lounge are some of the highlights. The entire facility cost \$9.5 million to build.

Located immediately north of the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center, the domed structure is bordered by the University of Wisconsin Engineering building, Camp Randall Stadium and Camp Randall Park.

The McClain Athletic Facility was constructed in two phases. The first project consisted of a 330-foot by 220-foot concrete floor supporting the 90-yard practice field. The second phase included the lower level construction of lockers,

showers, storage areas, a sauna, a steam room and a rehabilitation lap pool.

To build the structure, more than 70,000 cubic yards of soil was moved. Among the materials used in the construction were: 75,000 concrete blocks, 1,550 gallons of paint, 4,300 square feet of carpeting, 5.3 miles of piping, 27 miles of electrical wiring and 101,000 square feet of stainless steel roof material.

McClain, the Badgers' head coach from 1978-85, compiled a 46-42-3 record in eight seasons. Included were four consecutive seven-win seasons from 1981-84. McClain led the Badgers to bowl games in 1981, 1982 and 1984. He died of a heart attack in the spring of 1986.



Wisconsin recruits its student-athletes from coast to coast. Badger players come from 17 states: Wisconsin, Arizona, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Missouri, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York, Ohio and Pennsylvania.

The Badgers have three players from Columbus. Jevon Brunston hails from Columbus, Ohio, Matt McCormick is from Columbus, Wis., and Henry Searcy is from Columbus, Ga.

Nassau (N.Y.) Community College has four graduates on the 1993 roster. They are Kenny Gales, Donny Brady, Sylas Pratt and Royston Jones.

Edgewood Regional High School in New Jersey has sent a trio of players — Lee DeRamus, Michael London and Keith Jackson — to the UW football program.

WEIGHT TRAINING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game.

During the off-season, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshman players arrive, baseline measures of

strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measures of body composition, weight and frame-size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Individual programs are established for each player by strength and conditioning coach John Dettmann.

The UW also offers a sports nutrition program, coordinated by Dave Ellis. The program assists athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals. Badger athletes also benefit from conditioning workouts designed by former track all-American Robert Hackett, a sprint specialist.

TRAINING ROOM

The Wisconsin Sports Medicine program features state-ofthe-art facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

Headquartered in the McClain Center, the department also maintains facilities at Camp Randall Stadium, the UW Field House, the Natatorium, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium and the Dane County Coliseum.

Services

The Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provide dietary analyses, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility. Should injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians from the UW Hospitals and Clinics.

The UW is one of a handful of schools with an on-site X-ray machine, enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries and prescribe treatment and rehabilitation. Daily

orthopedic and urgent care clinics plus counseling and nutrition services are available by appointment.

Athletic trainers and physicians work together to design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A wide variety of facilities and equipment, including a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters, and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of general fitness during recuperative time.

Professional staff

Dennis Helwig, a 1974 UW graduate, coordinates the Sports Medicine Program. He is assisted by five athletic trainers, one physical therapist, two graduate assistant trainers and 30 student trainers. Team physician coverage is headed by Dr. Jim Keene and Dr. Greg Landry of the UW Hospitals and Clinics. Orthopedists Dr. Ben Graf and Dr. John Orwin round out the medical staff.

WISCONSIN BAND

From its origination in 1885, the University of Wisconsin Band has established an enviable reputation as one of the nation's best marching bands.

Director Michael Leckrone, entering his 25th year at Wisconsin, is nationally renowned for his arrangements. He was one of the band's real innovators in helping the group achieve its national acclaim.

The 240-member band has developed its reputation with electrifying performances throughout the country. A regular at all Wisconsin home football games, the band also travels to bowl games, other postseason competitions and at least one road football game each season. Next fall, the band will accompany the UW football team on its trip to Tokyo for an appearance in the Coca Cola Bowl.

Along with impressive pre-game and halftime shows, the UW band is nationally recognized for its "Fifth Quarter" post-game celebration. Fans typically remain in Camp Randall Stadium after the game until the bands' audience-participation gala is completed.

Known for its innovative shows, precise marching and playing style and intense energy, the band has drawn attention wherever it appears. After a Badger football trip to Las Vegas several years ago, the performance earned a headline of "Best Show in Town" in the local paper.


Beyond its regular appearances at Badger sporting events, the Wisconsin band performs concerts around the state and throughout the Midwest. Its annual spring concert routinely draws more than 15,000 fans to its two-day performance at the UW Field House.







PAUL BUNYAN AXE



Paul Bunyan's Axe has stayed in Madison two years in a row after consecutive UW victories over Minnesota in the nation's longest-running football rivalry.

The most-played rivalry in Division I college football history continues this fall when Wisconsin and Minnesota meet in Minneapolis on Oct. 23. The Badgers and Golden Gophers play for the 103rd time in a series that began in 1890.

The UW-UM series is the nation's oldest and has been played continuously for 86 years. The neighboring schools have met on the gridiron in 102 of the last 103 seasons (the exception was 1906). The game has alternated sites between the university campuses since 1946.

Much prestige was always associated with the game, and the significance was emphasized with its place on the schedule. Between 1933 and 1982, the Wisconsin-Minnesota game was the final regular-season contest each season.

The series took an added twist in 1948 when more than state bragging rights were on the line. After a 16-0 setback that season, the Wisconsin lettermen's group, the National "W" Club, presented Minnesota with the axe wielded by Paul Bunyan. He was the mythical giant of Midwestern lumbercamps.

Each year since, the winner of the annual battle between the Big Ten rivals is presented with the axe, complete with scores inscribed on the handle, for display on its campus. Since the tradition was started, UW leads the series 22-19-3.

The Badgers kept possession of the Axe after last year's 34-6 win in Madison. The trophy is displayed in the Wisconsin football office.

BADGER TRADITIONS

Badger nickname

The University's nickname, "Badgers," was borrowed from the state. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of the animals in the region, but rather an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

"On, Wisconsin"

The university's school song was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago. Words were written by UW alumnus Carl Beck. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. The copyright to "On, Wisconsin" is owned by Michael Jackson, who purchased the music from Paul McCartney.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainstorm of UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He saw Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed Wisconsin students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank after each game.

Graduating law students

At the homecoming game, graduating law students throw canes over the crossbar of the goal post in a pregame ceremony. If they catch their canes, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the University of Wisconsin in 1910.

Fifth Quarter

Football games traditionally last four quarters, but there is a special post-game celebration at Wisconsin games known as the "Fifth Quarter." Win or lose, the Wisconsin marching band performs a half-hour post-game concert. Members play their instruments, dance the polka and generally tear around the field. Fans wait for the celebration since Band Director Michael Leckrone added crowd-participation gimmicks. A local sportswriter dubbed the ritual the "Fifth Quarter."

Bucky Badger


Badgers in various forms have been recognized as the UW mascot for decades. The version currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white letter sweater, was developed in 1940 by artist Art Evans. A 1949 homecoming pep rally contest was staged to give a name to Madison's favorite badger. The winner was Buckingham U. Badger, or Bucky, for short. The name apparently came from a line in the song. The lyrics encourage the Wisconsin football team to "buck right through that line."



Bucky Badger has been recognized as the university's mascot for more than 40 years. The popular mascot is a regular attraction at UW sporting events.



Coach Barry Alvarez

For the first time in his four-year tenure, Coach Barry Alvarez feels he has Big Ten-quality talent and depth on his Wisconsin football team. "I feel like we are a legitimate Big Ten football team," Alvarez says.

"These players have had success," says Alvarez, whose 1992 club was one win shy of a bowl bid. "They know they can compete successfully in the Big Ten."

Last year's Badgers were 5-6, including a 3-5 Big Ten mark. Wisconsin tied for sixth in the league standings, its best effort since 1984 and the third season in a row of improvement. Back-to-back five-win campaigns have provided as many victories as the five prior years combined.

Defense was the team strength in 1992 as the Badgers finished fourth in the conference in total and scoring defense. The strides made on offense, however, had Alvarez smiling the most. Wisconsin rediscovered its rushing offense of the mid-1980s and improved its per-game average by 77 percent over 1991. The Badgers were fifth in the Big Ten in scoring offense (19.2).

Wisconsin made giant strides last season by being competitive in every game. In the three years prior to Alvarez' arrival, Wisconsin was outscored by an average of 14.4 points per game. In 1992, Wisconsin outscored its opponents for the first time since 1984. Seven of the Badgers' last nine games were decided by a TD or less, and six went down to the last drive.

Much of the Badgers' optimism for this fall comes from an established line on both sides of the ball. Alvarez equates formidable line play with victories, and his 1993 stable of linemen has him excited. "We have quality starters on both lines," says Alvarez. "That's the area where you decide who wins a ballgame."

The defense

The Badgers are again building around their defense. Wisconsin's run defense allowed just 122 yards per game last season, the fourth-lowest total in

school history. All three down linemen—noseguard Lamark Shackerford and tackles Mike Thompson and Carlos Fowler—have started for at least two seasons. The three have started 64 games between them.

Shackerford, an all-America candidate, became the first Badger noseguard to make first-team all-league since Tim Krumrie in 1982. The senior was fifth in the Big Ten in tackles for loss (14) a year ago as the Badgers established school season records for sacks and tackles for loss. Shackerford was the second UW lineman in three seasons to gain first-team all-conference honors. His teammates voted him a co-captain for 1993.

Thompson, a junior who has started 22 consecutive games, led the team and finished second in the conference with 17 tackles behind the line. He is already ranked fifth in career tackle for loss yardage. Thompson is a two-time honorable mention all-Big Ten performer. Fowler, a steady senior and two-year starter, had 76 tackles in '92. Fowler needs 78 tackles to move into the school's top 20 career list.

Senior Lee Krueger and redshirt freshman Neil Miklusak are the backup noseguards. Sophomore Jason Maniecki and 1992 Scout Team Defensive Players of the Year Rod Spiller and Al Gay are promising tackles.

Among the outside linebackers, junior Chad Yocum is an impact player. Alvarez says Yocum was one of the conference's most disruptive pass rushers in 1992. He earned a starting berth at midseason and had three QB sacks in an upset over Ohio State. Senior Nick Rafko and consensus prep all-America Bryan Jurewicz are the understudies.


Two Wisconsin natives — juniors Chris Hein and Chad Cascadden — were impressive in the spring and head the lineup at drop outside linebacker. Hein has progressed from special teams to starter, and Cascadden moved from SS last spring.

Establishing a tandem of inside linebackers was a spring priority. Senior Yusef Burgess and sophomore Eric Unverzagt hold down the spots entering the fall. Burgess is coming off an 11-tackle performance in the spring game, and Unverzagt is coming off a redshirt season.

Freshman Pete Diatelevi and junior college transfer Sylas Pratt are the second teamers. Pratt, a junior, enrolled in the spring after leading Nassau (N.Y.) Community College to a 21-1 record over two seasons. Senior Todd Orlando, who missed the spring with an injury, and Pratt's Nassau teammate, Royston Jones, are also in the hunt.

Seniors **Scott Nelson** and **Reggie Holt** comprise one of the most veteran safety combinations in the nation. They rank 17th and 19th, respectively, in career tackles at the UW. Each has received all-Big Ten mention in his career. Nelson led the team in interceptions last fall. Holt is entering his third season as a starter at SS.

Junior Jeff Messenger, a third returning secondary starter, topped the club with eight passes defended. He will move to boundary cornerback. Junior college all-American Kenny Gales, a speedy pass defender, will

assume Messenger's former spot at field cornerback.

Senior **Henry Searcy** is the top back-up at both corners, while SS **Jamel Brown** and FS Melvin Tucker are listed behind Holt and Nelson.

The offense

Wisconsin has scored progressively more points in each of Alvarez' three seasons, and the improvement is expected to continue.

On the offensive line, the Badgers return three starters from what was the most improved area of the team. Tackles **Joe Panos** and **Mike Verstegen** and center **Cory Raymer** started all 11 games in '92. Alvarez says the three are among the finest in the league at their spots.

Panos, a former walk-on who will be a co-captain in 1993, is being pushed for all-America honors. He has played center, guard and tackle as a Badger. The second-team all-conference pick will stay at RT. He graded out at better

than 90 percent seven times last fall.

Verstegen, a 300-pound junior, has started for one-and-a-half seasons and is a steady performer. Raymer has received all-league mention twice in his career and is a potential star at center. **Joe Rudolph**, a four-game starter at RG in 1992, has moved to the left side, where he will start in 1993.

Alvarez says his offensive line will include "the best five guys." Panos can play either guard or tackle depending on who the fifth-best lineman is. Sophomore **Steve Stark**, the long snapper last year, emerged from spring camp as the No. 1 right guard.

Five redshirt freshmen make up the second-team line. Tackles Manny Castro and Jerry Wunsch, guards Derek Engler and James Darby and center Mike Rader comprise the young but talented second team. Senior tackle Tyler Adam, junior center Brian Patterson, sophomore tackle Alex Ilich and freshmen guards John Rohde and Mike Galletti also figure in.

Darrell Bevell is the incumbent quarterback after leading the Badgers to a 5-5 mark in his 10 starts as a firstyear freshman. Bevell, who was married in the offseason, is 15 pounds heavier and a step faster this season. He is 20th in career passing at the UW after one season. Second teamer Jay Macias started half of 1991 as a true freshman and rescued the Badgers in a 19-16 comeback win over Purdue last fall.

Freshmen **Kevin Lyles** and **Cyrill Weems** are intriguing prospects based upon their prep credentials. Lyles is an imposing 220 pounder and Weems is a fluid runner/passer. Both players may need seasoning, especially Weems, who missed the spring with a shoulder ailment.

Split end **Lee DeRamus** is on a pace to become the school's all-time receiving leader. With more than 1,000 career receiving yards in two years, DeRamus is ninth in UW history. He was honorable mention all-Big Ten as a sophomore and had the best average per catch (16.2) among league receivers with at least 30 receptions.

Wisconsin had four graduation losses at receiver. Junior J.C. Dawkins was strong in the spring and will line up opposite DeRamus. Sprinters Kerwin Badie and Michael London, sure-handed Jevon Brunston and Vince Zullo, plus JC all-American Keith Jackson, will share time.

Perhaps the thinnest area on the team is tight end, where Michael Roan, a two-time honorable mention all-league pick, is the only player with game experience. Matt Nyquist, an academic all-Big Ten pick, progressed in the spring after moving from full-back.

The Badgers will split tailback chores between juniors **Brent Moss** and **Terrell Fletcher**. Moss rushed for 739 yards (the most at Wisconsin in six years) and nine TDs last season. Fletcher, who started as a true freshman in 1991, was hampered by injuries but gained 496 yards (5.2 average). Moss needs 42 yards and Fletcher 58 yards to go over 1,000 for their careers.

Sophomore **Ron Johnson** played sparingly as a freshman but has drawn some notice with his size and speed.

Fullback Mark Montgomery is one of just two seniors (Panos is the other) on Wisconsin's offensive two deep. A three-year starter, he is coming off his most productive spring. Jason Burns, who has alternated between tailback and fullback throughout his career, will bring breakaway ability to fullback. He had the Badgers' longest scrimmage run (48 yards at Washington) in 1992.

Special teams

Two-year regular **Sam Veit** will handle punting chores. The Badgers led the Big Ten in net punting last year to the credit of Veit, who had just 19 of his 56 punts returned.

Redshirt freshman **John Hall** will take over placekicking responsibilities. Hall scored 14 points in the spring game, including a 48-yard field goal into the wind.

Brunston (punts) and Johnson (kickoffs) were the top returners in the spring. They will be pushed by Jackson, the JC transfer, who joins the team this fall.



Football at the University of Wisconsin is quickly gaining nation-wide credibility behind the guiding hand of fourth-year head coach Barry Alvarez.

The Badgers posted their second straight 5-6 overall mark in 1992, including a 3-5 record in the Big Ten. Wisconsin posted the school's best Big Ten record since 1984 and climbed in the league standings for the third straight season. The Badgers have improved from 10th to eighth (tied) to sixth (tied) in the final league standings under Alvarez.

When Alvarez took the reins of the program in 1990, people asked for a competitive team. After all, the Badgers had lost 13 games by at least three touchdowns in the two seasons before his arrival. The '92 Badgers were competitive indeed. Seven games were decided by seven points or less and six games went down to the last drive.

Wisconsin's two-year victory total of 10 (vs. 12 losses) includes more wins than in 1986, 1987, 1988, 1989 and 1990 combined. It took Wisconsin 55 games (10-45) prior to 1991 to reach double-figure triumphs.

Among the memorable accomplishments of 1992 was the 20-16 upset of 12th-ranked Ohio State. It was the UW's first win over a nationally rated foe in eight years. The Badgers received votes in the national polls and ended the season one victory shy of a bowl bid.

Four players were named first-team all-Big Ten, the most at Wisconsin since 1984. The Badgers had the second-most players honored on the all-league teams. The club set several tackle for loss records, and the offense improved its total yardage and scoring figures by 33 and 23 percent, respectively.

Besides the obvious improvement on the field, the Badgers have become winners at the gate. Average attendance at Camp Randall Stadium has jumped an unbelievable 20,000 since Alvarez came to Madison. The Badgers were fourth in Big Ten attendance last fall, their highest league ranking in eight seasons.

Wisconsin improved its home attendance average by 11,702 fans per game over 1991. That improvement was third-best in the nation, marking the second time in three seasons that the Badgers' increase was

ranked in college football's top three. The UW returned to the nation's top 20 (19th) in home attendance last year, something they accomplished 14 consecutive seasons between 1972-85.

The Badgers' recruiting classes the last two years, rated 16th and 10th nationally, have drawn much notoriety. Twenty-one all-Americans signed with Wisconsin in 1991-92, including six *Parade* magazine honorees. Prior to 1991, only one *Parade* all-American played for the Badgers.

People around the country have noticed Badger football, too. Alvarez and his team were featured in national publications like *USA Today*, *Sports Illustrated* and *The Sporting News*, and played on national television three times last season.

The on-field improvement actually started in 1991, when the Badgers were the nation's fourth-most improved squad. Three straight non-conference wins to open the year earned Wisconsin several votes in the Associated Press poll. It was the UW's longest winning streak since 1985. Close losses to Top 20 teams Iowa and Indiana at midseason caught people's attention, and a two-game winning streak to end the season were Alvarez' first Big Ten wins.

After inheriting a program that won nine games in four seasons, Alvarez' first Badger team (1990) won one game. However, the Badgers were within striking distance in the fourth quarter in 10 games.

Alvarez was appointed as the school's 27th football coach on Dec. 31, 1989. An improvement in play, growth in fundraising, nationally recognized recruiting efforts and the return of fans to Camp Randall Stadium are products of Alvarez' work.

1992 — earned three national television appearances, the most at the UW since 1984

1992 — had the second-most players (29) honored on the all-Big Ten teams, including four first-team selections

1990-92 — led Badgers to the same number wins in his tenure (three years) as the five seasons prior to his arrival combined

1991 — UW's total defense (24th) and pass defense (14th) were nationally ranked ... pass defense led the Big Ten ... led the league in turnovers created

The former assistant coach at Notre Dame and Iowa has been associated with strong winning traditions. He coached in a bowl game nine consecutive years at Notre Dame and Iowa.

For three seasons, Alvarez was a defensive assistant for Lou Holtz at Notre Dame. He served as linebackers coach in 1987, was promoted to defensive coordinator in 1988 and worked as assistant head coach in 1989.

Notre Dame finished 17th, 1st and 2nd in the final Associated Press poll the three seasons Alvarez was there. The Fighting Irish won an incredible 23 consecutive games in 1988 and 1989.

The 1988 Fighting Irish team won a national championship and posted a perfect 12-0 record. As coordinator, Barry's defense ranked third nationally in scoring, 10th against the run and 13th in total defense. A Fiesta Bowl victory over West Virginia capped the undefeated season.

Notre Dame was 12-1 in 1989 and the nation's No. 1 team for 11 straight weeks. Alvarez' defense keyed a 21-6 Orange Bowl victory over top-ranked Colorado. The 1989 Notre Dame defenders were nationally ranked in every category: scoring defense (12th), turnover margin (13th), rushing defense (14th), total defense (14th) and passing defense (43rd).

Alvarez coached all-America linebackers in each of his three seasons in South Bend. Michael Stonebreaker was a consensus all-America pick in 1988. Ned Bolcar, Cedric Figaro and Wes Pritchett also made all-America squads under Alvarez.

As an Iowa assistant, Barry coached linebackers from 1979-86. The Hawkeyes went to postseason games the last six years, including Rose Bowls in 1982 and 1986. Alvarez helped the Hawkeyes turn a program that hadn't had a winning season in 17 years into a regular bowl game participant.

Alvarez coached five first-team all-Big Ten line-backers at Iowa. His prize pupil was Larry Station, a two-time consensus all-America linebacker. An academic all-American as well, Station is the Hawkeyes' career tackle leader.

Barry got his coaching start in 1971 as an assistant at Lincoln (Neb.) Northeast High School. The squad won a state title in 1972, his second year there.

His first head coaching position was at Lexington (Neb.) High School from 1974-75. He was 16-4 and the Nebraska prep Coach of the Year in 1974. Alvarez then coached at Mason City (Iowa) High School from 1976-78, compiling a 21-9 mark. Included was a 4A state title in 1978, when he was conference and district Coach of the Year.

A three-year letterman at Nebraska, Alvarez earned his bachelor of science degree in 1969. He added a master of arts degree from Nebraska in 1970. Barry, a Cornhusker linebacker, played in the Orange and Sugar Bowls for Nebraska, as well as the Senior and Blue-Gray all-star games.

Barry and his wife, Cindy, have two daughters, Dawn (Mrs. Brad Ferguson) and Stacy, and a son, Chad. Alvarez was born Dec. 30, 1946, in Burgettstown, Pa.





1954 Heisman Trophy winner

Alan Ameche, the bruising fullback from Kenosha, Wis., is the only Badger football player to win the Heisman Trophy, given to college football's top player.

Ameche, a two-time all-American, won the trophy in 1954, the same season he earned first-team all-America mention from 21 different organizations.

The Big Ten's leading rusher twice in his career, Ameche brought much distinction and honor to the UW. He was an academic all-American as a junior and senior.

Nicknamed "The Horse" for his rugged running style, Ameche left Wisconsin as the NCAA's career rushing leader. He led the Badgers to a 26-8-3 record during his career and a berth in the 1953 Rose Bowl.

W CLUB HALL OF FAME

The National W Club, in cooperation with the Wisconsin Athletic Department, established a Hall of Fame in 1991. Listed below are Hall of Fame members whose main sport at the UW was football.

Alan Ameche

Alan Ameche is one of the most decorated gridiron stars in Wisconsin history. Winner of the 1954 Heisman Trophy, Ameche set Big Ten (2,463 yards) and NCAA (3,345) career rushing marks. Nicknamed the "Horse," Ameche was a three-time all-Big Ten selection, two-time all-American and two-time academic all-American. He was named to CoSIDA's academic all-America Hall of Fame in 1992. The Big Ten MVP in 1954, Ameche went on to star for the Baltimore Colts of the NFL. The native of Kenosha, Wis., is a member of the Wisconsin State, National Football Foundation and W Club Halls of Fame. His jersey No. 35 is one of four retired at Wisconsin, and Ameche was named the University's greatest football player of all time in 1969.

Marty Below

"The greatest lineman I ever played against" was the way Red Grange described Badger lineman Marty Below. The native of Oshkosh, Wis., transferred to Wisconsin and won all-Big Ten first-team honors in 1922 and 1923. He was an all-America lineman as a senior. The 1923 Badger team captain is a member of the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

Milt Bruhn

One of the legendary coaches in Wisconsin history, Bruhn is the only coach to lead the Badgers to two Rose Bowls. He posted an 11-year record of 52-46-6 and three of his teams — 1958 (eighth), 1959 (sixth) and 1962 (second) — finished in the nation's Top 10. Bruhn, a

Minnesota native, guided the Badgers to a 20-6-1 regular-season mark between 1957-59, the best mark at the school since the turn of the century.

Howard Buck

The native of Eau Claire, Wis. played tackle on the Badgers' 1913, 1914 and 1915 squads. The team captain as a senior, Buck was an all-Big Ten and all-America selection. Buck, nicknamed "Cub," played pro football with the Canton Bulldogs and Green Bay Packers. Canton teammate Jim Thorpe called him the finest lineman he'd ever played with. Buck is a member of Wisconsin's all-time team and the Wisconsin state and Packers' Halls of Fame.

Robert Butler

The Badgers' first-ever football all-American (1912), Robert Butler was a lineman on teams that compiled a 15-4-2 mark. He was a first-team all-Big Ten pick in 1912 and 1913. He was one of 11 players that played the entire game on both sides of the ball in a 14-0 victory over Minnesota. Butler played for the Canton Bulldogs following graduation and was later named to the National Football Foundation Hall of Fame.

Pat Harder

An all-American and all-Big Ten fullback, Pat Harder helped the 1942 Badgers to a No. 3 national ranking. A three-year star, Harder led the Big Ten in rushing and scoring as a sophomore and concluded his career by being named MVP of the 1943 College All-Star game. The Milwaukee native led the NFL in scoring three times and became a league official when his playing career ended. Harder was named to college football's Hall of Fame in '92. He is a member of the W Club and Wisconsin state Athletic Halls of Fame.

Elroy Hirsch

One of the most loved personalities in UW history, Hirsch made his mark in many arenas. A triple-threat halfback, Hirsch led the Badgers to a No. 3 national ranking in 1942 and an 8-1-1 record. His jersey No. 40 was retired by the school. Hirsch played just one season at Wisconsin, but returned as Athletic Director from 1969-87. Nicknamed "Crazylegs," Hirsch also had a distinguished NFL career. He set NFL records for receptions, yards and TDs in 1951 as the Rams won the league title. Elroy is on all-time teams for the NFL and the UW plus Halls of Fame for the NFL, the state of Wisconsin, the Madison Pen and Mike Club and the National Football Foundation.

Eddie Jankowski

Eddie Jankowski was a three-time Wisconsin letterman as a fullback and linebacker between 1934-36. Named Wisconsin's Most Valuable Player twice, Jankowski participated in the 1936 East-West Shrine game and the 1937 *Chicago Tribune* All-Star game. The native of Milwaukee was picked in the first round of the NFL draft by the Green Bay Packers in 1937.

Arlie Mucks Sr.

A two-sport star from Oshkosh, Wis., Arlie Mucks Sr., made his mark on the gridiron and on the track. He was an all-Western Conference and all-America guard in 1914. A member of the school's all-time football team, Mucks was a silver medalist at the 1912 Olympic Games as a teenager. He was the only athlete to win two national track events (shot put and discus) three consecutive years. Mucks is also a member of the Madison Pen and Mike and Wisconsin state Halls of Fame.

Pat O'Dea

The fabled "Kangaroo Kicker" came to Wisconsin from Australia and was an outstanding punter and fullback from 1896-99. His brother preceded him in Madison and served as the school's crew coach. Pat excelled as a drop-kicker and once made four field goals in a game. His 65-yard field goal in a snowstorm at Northwestern in 1898 and 110-yard punt vs. Minnesota in 1897 added to his legendary status.

Pat Richter

Pat Richter is the last nine-time letterman in Wisconsin history (1961-63) and currently the Director of Athletics at his alma mater. Richter, a native of Madison, Wis., was a twotime all-America end and academic all-American as a senior. He made all-Big Ten teams in football and baseball. The Big Ten's top receiver two years in a row, Richter also topped the conference in punting in 1962. The first-round NFL draft pick (Washington) played eight seasons in the NFL. He was the school's Medal of Honor winner in 1963 and won an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award in 1988.

Harlan Rogers

One of the most consistent and dependable athletes in Wisconsin history, Harlan Rogers was a letterwinner in three sports. He started at left end for the Badgers from 1906-08. Rogers captained the 1908 gridiron team that was 5-1. Rogers also played forward on the basketball team and center field in baseball. Rogers has been named to the National W Club and Wisconsin State Halls of Fame.

Dave Schreiner

The two-time all-America end (1941 and 1942) was the Big Ten's Most Valu-

able Player as a senior. He captained the Badgers as a senior and led the team with 386 yards receiving. Schreiner once caught three touchdown passes in a quarter in a 35-7 win over Marquette. The Lancaster, Wis., native played in the 1943 East-West Shrine Game and was drafted by the Detroit Lions. His jersey No. 80 has been retired by the school. Schreiner is a member of the Wisconsin State and National W Club Halls of Fame and was named to the school's all-time football squad in 1969.

Howard Weiss

A senior class president from Ft. Atkinson, Wis., Weiss was a stalwart on Badger squads of the late 1930s. Weiss was a two-time Wisconsin MVP and the Big Ten's Most Valuable Player in 1938. He also received all-Big Ten and all-America mention as a fullback. The three-time letterwinner played in the East-West Shrine game in 1938 and the College All-Star game in 1939. Weiss went on to play two seasons with the Detroit Lions.

Rollie Williams

An exemplary scholar and athlete, Rollie Williams made his mark as a player, coach and administrator. A three-sport letterman, Williams earned all-conference honors in football and basketball. He also was class president as a senior. Upon graduation, Williams coached collegiately at Millikin and Iowa. He later returned to Wisconsin where he was assistant director of athletics following 40 months of duty with the Navy.

Ivan Williamson

A standout college player at Michigan, Ivan Williamson compiled a 41-19-4 mark as the Badgers' head coach from 1949-55. His 1952 squad shared the Big Ten championship with Purdue but represented the conference in the Rose Bowl. Williamson later served with distinction as the Wisconsin Director of Athletics from 1955-69.

Robert Wilson

The only three-time Wisconsin Most Valuable Player, Robert Wilson was the Big Ten's MVP in 1949. A four-year starter in baseball, Wilson was senior class vice president and the Big Ten Medal of Honor winner in 1950. Wilson was named Big Ten baseball Most Valuable Player in 1948 and later played professionally for Chicago, Detroit and Cleveland of the American League. He is a member of the Wisconsin State, National W Club and Madison Pen and Mike Club Halls of Fame. Wilson was born in Milwaukee.

Ed Withers

A high school star at Madison Central, Ed Withers was a three-time gridiron letterman at Wisconsin. He was an all-America defensive halfback in 1950 and had eight career interceptions. He picked off three passes in a 14-0 win over Iowa in 1950. The all-Big Ten defensive back was drafted by the Green Bay Packers in 1951.

HONORED BADGERS

Wisconsin's All-Time Team

In conjunction with the centennial celebration of college football in 1969, Wisconsin fans were asked to select the University's all-time team.

The 11-man unit features Heisman Trophy winner Alan Ameche, who was voted Wisconsin's all-time greatest player. Ameche, a two-time all-American, concluded his brilliant career as the NCAA's all-time rushing leader. The other members of the squad:

Ken Bowman — three-year letterman (1961-63), first-team academic all-Big Ten and academic all-America center.

Howard Buck — captained the 1915 squad and was named all-Big Ten and consensus all-American.

Pat Harder — led the Big Ten in rushing as a sophomore and was an all-America fullback in 1942 ... named the Badgers' team MVP in 1941.

Elroy Hirsch — halfback on the 1942 Badger team that was ranked third in the nation, he later served as UW Athletic Director (1969-87).

Dan Lanphear — three-year letterman on the line and a 1959 all-Big Ten pick at tackle.

Arlie Mucks — an all-American in 1914, he won a silver medal in the discus at the 1912 Olympics.

Pat Richter — all-American on the field and in the classroom, Richter was named Wisconsin's Director of Athletics in 1989 ... won an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award.

Dave Schreiner — two-time all-America end and the 1942 Western Conference Player of the Year ... captained the Badgers in 1942 when he was team Most Valuable Player.

Ron VanderKelen — led Badgers to the 1963 Rose Bowl where he passed for a record 401 yards ... finished ninth in the voting for the 1962 Heisman Trophy.

Robert Wilson — Big Ten MVP and UW's 1950 Medal of Honor winner.

Retired Numbers

Alan Ameche — fullback

One of the greatest backs in UW history and the 1954 Heisman Trophy winner. Nicknamed "The Horse," Ameche was a two-time all-American and ended his career as the NCAA's all-time leading rusher. He led the Badgers to the 1953 Rose Bowl, where he rushed for 133 yards against USC. The five-time Pro Bowl pick was inducted in the NFL Hall of Fame in 1975.

Elroy Hirsch — tailback

Although he played football only one season at Wisconsin, Hirsch is one of the most beloved figures in Badger sports history. Hirsch, nicknamed "Crazylegs," rushed for 786 yards for Wisconsin's 8-1-1 team in 1942. He also starred for nine seasons with the Los Angeles Rams before returning to Wisconsin as Director of Athletics from 1969-87.

Dave Schreiner - end

The two-time all-America end (junior and senior) was named Western (later the Big Ten) Conference Player of the Year in 1942. Schreiner lettered three seasons at Wisconsin as an end both on offense and defense. He is a member of the National Football Foundation and the National W Club Halls of Fame and the University of Wisconsin's all-time team.


Allan Shafer — quarterback

The memory of former QB Allan Shafer is continued with the "Living Memorial" Scholarship that is given in his name. Shafer was fatally wounded during the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa game. Shafer is one of two Badgers (Jay Seiler is the other) to die from a football injury.

GRIDIRON HISTORY



Coach Dave McClain guided the Badgers to three bowl games between 1981-84.

1889—Played first game.

1890—First win, a 106-0 shutout over UW-Whitewater. Wisconsin played Minnesota for the first time. Except for 1906, the Badgers and Gophers have played every year since. It is the longest running series in Division I-A.

1895—Wisconsin played vital role in the organization of the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives, which eventually became the Big Ten.

1896—Wisconsin claims first outright Big Ten championship on the way to 7-1-1 record for Coach Phil King.

1897—Coach Phil King produces second straight Big Ten title and outscores opponents 210-14 in 9-1 campaign.

1901—First undefeated team (9-0) in UW history. Coach Phil King wins third conference title in six years. Eight shutouts highlight the season as UW has 317-5 scoring advantage.

1902—Lost 6-0 to Michigan, breaking a 17-game Badger winning streak.

1906—Dr. C.P. Hutchins coaches Badgers to 5-0 record and the Big Ten title.

1912—Last undefeated team (7-0) won the school's fifth Big Ten title for firstyear coach William Juneau. Seven Badgers named to Walter Eckersall's all-Western team.

1942—UW is named mythical national champion by the Helms Foundation after 8-1-1 season. A stunning 6-0 loss to Iowa prevented the Badgers from earning a conference championship.

1951—The "Hard Rocks" team led the nation in total defense and set five Big Ten records in a 7-1-1 campaign. The UW defense outscored the opponents' offense 58-53. Four Badgers earned all-America honors.

1952—Wisconsin voted to represent Big Ten in '53 Rose Bowl after tying Purdue for the conference title. USC scores a third-period TD for a 7-0 Rose Bowl victory.

1953—Badgers upset then No. 1-ranked Illinois 34-7 at Camp Randall Stadium.


1954—Alan Ameche becomes the only Badger to win the Heisman Trophy, given to the nation's top collegiate football player.

1959—UW rallies to defeat Minnesota 11-7 and earn second Rose Bowl berth. Badgers lose to Washington 44-8 at Pasadena.

1962—The No. 2-ranked Badgers make second Rose Bowl appearance in three years. The foe was top-rated USC. Badgers' 23-point fourth quarter rally falls short in 42-37 Rose Bowl loss. Ron VanderKelen was named Big Ten MVP, and UW led the nation in total offense.

1974—Billy Marek scores five touch-downs and rushes for 304 yards as Badgers close season with 49-14 win over Minnesota.

1981—Matt VandenBoom intercepts three passes to spark Badgers' 21-14 victory over No. 1-ranked Michigan.



Don Davey earned his fourth academic all-American award in 1990.

Wisconsin earns trip to Garden State Bowl under guidance of Coach Dave McClain, but falls to Tennessee 28-21.

1982—John Williams tallies the only score in a 6-0 win at Ohio State, the Badgers' first triumph in Columbus since 1918. Randy Wright's 87-yard TD pass keys 14-3 win over Kansas State in the Independence Bowl.


1983—Al Toon sets Big Ten record with 252 yards receiving in a 42-38 victory at Purdue.

1984—Fourth consecutive seven-win season ends with 20-19 loss to Kentucky in the Hall of Fame Bowl.

1990—Don Davey becomes the first four-time first-team academic all-American in NCAA university division history.

1991—Troy Vincent is the Badgers' first all-American since 1987 and runner-up for the Thorpe Award.





1953 Rose Bowl — January 1, 1953 at Pasadena, CA

PASADENA, Calif. — Southern Cal scored the game's only points on a 22-yard touchdown pass from Rudy Bukich to Al Carmichael in the Trojans' 7-0 win over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl. It was the Badgers' first postseason appearance.

The Badgers dominated the game from a statistical standpoint, outgaining USC by 120 yards. Led by tailback Alan Ameche's 133 yards, Wisconsin had a 211-48 advantage on the ground. However, both defenses rose to the occasion when necessary.

One of Wisconsin's best scoring chances came in the opening minutes of the third quarter. Ameche broke loose for a 54-yard run as the Badgers moved to the USC 21-yard line. On third down, Archie Ray Burks fumbled on an end run and the Trojans recovered.

USC then put together the game-winning drive (73 yards), which ended on Bukich's touchdown pass. Wisconsin countered with a 13-play, 84-yard drive that ended at the Trojan 2-yard line when Jerry Witt was stopped a yard short of a first down on a fake field goal play.

Coach Ivy Williamson's club became the first in Badger history to play in a bowl game and the first to play before a crowd of more than 100,000.

1960 Rose Bowl — January 1, 1960 at Pasadena, CA

PASADENA, Calif. — Underdog Washington scored the game's first 17 points en route to a 44-8 Rose Bowl victory over the Badgers. It was Wisconsin's second Rose Bowl trip.

Washington tallied the first TD on a 6-yard run by Don McKeta about 10 minutes into the game. George Fleming booted a 26-yard FG after the Huskies recovered one of four Wisconsin fumbles. Fleming then returned a punt 53 yards for a score on the final play of the period for a 17-0 first quarter lead.

Badger fullback Tom Wiesner tallied Wisconsin's only points on a 4-yard run with 5:27 left in the opening half. Dale Hackbart connected with Al Schoonover for a two-point conversion, cutting the lead to nine points (17-8).

Husky quarterback Bob Schloredt, who shared game MVP honors with Fleming, tossed a 23-yard TD pass to close first-half scoring. Schloredt completed four passes for 102 yards and was the game's top rusher (81 yards).

Wisconsin mounted a final challenge in the third quarter, but four plays inside the Husky 10-yard line failed. Washington then marched 93 yards on 10 plays for another tally.

Milt Bruhn's Badgers entered the game with a defense that had surrendered barely 10 points per game for the regular season.

1963 Rose Bowl — January 1, 1963 at Pasadena, CA

PASADENA, Calif. — A 23-point fourth quarter explosion wasn't quite enough as the Badgers dropped a 42-37 Rose Bowl encounter to Southern Cal. The Trojans had claimed a 42-14 lead on the first play of the fourth quarter before the huge Badger comeback.

USC raced to a 21-7 halftime lead and extended it on the first play of the third stanza. Quarterback Pete Beathard hit Hal Bedsole for a 57-yard score. But then Badger QB Ron VanderKelen led one of the biggest charges in bowl history.

VanderKelen reached paydirt on a 17-yard scamper, reducing the margin to 28-14. Southern Cal responded with a pair of TD passes by Beathard and USC led 42-14 with 14:54 left to play.

Lou Holland (13-yard run) and Gary Kroner (4-yard reception) tallied for the Badgers within three minutes. A bad center snap on a punt resulted in a UW safety and a 42-30 Trojan advantage. After the free kick, VanderKelen hit three straight passes, including a 19-yard score to Pat Richter for the final tally.

VanderKelen, the game MVP, set both Wisconsin and Rose Bowl records with 401 yards passing. Richter caught 11 of those aerials for 163 yards. The 79 total points was a Rose Bowl record that stood for 28 years.

1981 Garden State Bowl — Dec. 13, 1981 at E. Rutherford, NJ

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Tennessee scored 18 straight points in the first half and held on to defeat Wisconsin 28-21 in the Garden State Bowl.

The Badger defense limited UT to 89 yards rushing, but Volunteer QB Steve Alatorre unleashed a potent passing attack, throwing for 315 yards. WR Anthony Hancock caught 11 passes for 196 yards.

After Fuad Reveiz booted a field goal in the first quarter, Wisconsin assumed its only lead of the game on a 3-yard run by Jess Cole. Willie Gault returned the ensuing kickoff 87 yards to give Tennessee a lead it never lost.

Reserve quarterback Randy Wright came off the bench to throw a pair of second-half touchdown passes for the Badgers. Wright hit Jeff Nault and Thad McFadden on scoring tosses in the final period.

The game featured two high-powered offenses that combined for 49 points, 793 total yards and 49 first downs. The teams averaged just under five yards per offensive play.

Wisconsin's fourth bowl game in school history and first non-Rose Bowl drew a crowd of 53,220. The Badgers' seven victories were the most since UW won the same number in 1974.

SHREVEPORT, La. — Wisconsin won its first bowl game in the school's history with a 14-3 Independence Bowl victory over Kansas State.

Randy Wright threw a bowl-game record two touchdown passes and the Badger defense set a scoring record in the matchup between Big Ten and Big Eight schools before 24,684 fans. The anticipated crowd was more than 49,000, but a 23-mile-perhour wind dropped temperatures to 10 below zero.

Wright, the game offensive MVP, completed only nine of 24 throws. However, his 87-yard throw to Tim Stracka was the longest in Wisconsin and Independence Bowl history. The UW defense limited Kansas State to 192 total yards in the Wildcats' first-ever postseason appearance.

"Winning our first bowl game was a big accomplishment for our program," Coach Dave McClain said.

KSU had taken a 3-0 lead on Steve Willis' 29-yard field goal before the Badgers scored 14 straight points. Tim Krumrie was the game Defensive MVP. He helped limit the Kansas State running attack to less than two yards per carry.

Game totals showed five turnovers, 14 punts, 22 completions in 59 attempts (37.3 percent) and 14 penalties.

Trailing by a point after the Wildcats' Joe Worley booted a 52-yard field goal with eight minutes left, the Badgers drove inside Kentucky's 20-yard line.

Todd Gregoire's field goal attempt with 1:55 left never materialized after holder Bob Kobza dropped the center snap. Gregoire, a freshman, had tied a school record with four field goals earlier in the game.

Wisconsin assumed a 13-0 lead on a pair of Gregoire three pointers and a 3-yard TD pass from Mike Howard to Thad McFadden. The Badgers outgained their SEC foe both on the ground and through the air.

However, UW was assessed 13 penalties for 133 yards, both Hall of Fame Bowl records. The Badgers threw two interceptions. Kentucky, which was making its second straight postseason appearance in Birmingham, had no turnovers.

More than 7,500 Badger fans made the trip to the UW's third bowl game in four seasons.





Minnesota set many school records on offense last fall but placed ninth in league defense. Wacker is concerned about his offensive line, which lost three starters, and finding a replacement for 2,000-yard passer Marquel Fleetwood. Omar Douglas (61 receptions) is an excellent receiver. Antonio Carter has led the club in rushing two years in a row. DE Dennis Cappella, a second-team all-league selection, keys the defense. Doyle Cockrell and Ed Hawthorne both started on the defensive line last year. Russ Heath (108 tackles) is the top linebacker. Drinon Mays and Jeff Rosga are returning starters in the secondary. The Golden Gophers must locate a punter to replace four-year starter Dean Kaufman. Sophomore Mike Chalberg is the kicker.



Credentials

Press box: Requests for credentials to cover Wisconsin football should be sent on company letterhead to: Steve Malchow, Sports Information Office, University of Wisconsin, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. The fax number is (608) 262-8184. Requests should be received at least one week in advance of the game. Credentials, which cannot be mailed, are left at the Will Call window (Gate 6 on the west side of the Stadium).

Credentials will be issued according to the following priority guidelines: 1) national publications and newspapers filing for the following day's publication; 2) newspapers designated by the visiting sports information director; 3) television and radio stations originating a live broadcast; 4) television and radio stations covering for nightly news; and 5) all other requests will be evaluated on a space-available basis. Spouses, dates, non-workers and children are not allowed in the media area as dictated by the NCAA Media Guidelines book.

Photographers: Sideline credentials will be issued only to accredited photographers on assignment. Photographers must display both their credential and an armband prominently to be on the field level. Armbands must be picked up in the Reinke Room of the Wisconsin Field House. Flipcards and a pre-game lunch are available in the Reinke Room. Photographers cannot shoot between the 25-yard lines. The University of Wisconsin follows NCAA and Big Ten guidelines regarding event photography.

TV: Credentials for TV allow access on the sidelines (if you have an armband too) and on the third-level photo decks of the Communications Center. Armbands are available in the Reinke Room of the Field House two hours before kickoff.

Parking: A limited number of parking passes are available to working media. They will be issued as available.

Game-day services

Media services: Wisconsin's working facilities are located on the fourth level of the Communications Center. Flipcards, pre-game notes and programs are delivered to each working location prior to kickoff. A complete statistical package will be made available to the media after the game.

Interviews: With approximately four minutes left in the fourth quarter, media members will be escorted to the interview areas by Associate SID John Estes. Coach Barry Alvarez meets the media in the McClain Center Auditorium (second floor). Badger players are available in the weight room (lower level of McClain facility).

Phones: Several courtesy lines provided by the Sports Information Office are available on a first-come, firstserved basis. Media requiring their own phones should call Wisconsin Bell (800/447-7738) to order lines. Additionally, contact UW Telecommunications (608/262-0521) to confirm that lines have been ordered from Bell.

Interview requests

Players: Player interviews during the week are conducted on Tuesdays and Wednesdays at the players' convenience between 7-10 p.m. CT. Interviews should be arranged through the Sports Information Office (608/262-1811) by noon of the day the player is requested. Players will return phone calls to out-of-town media on Tuesdays and Wednesdays only. The Badgers' mandatory off-day, as required by the NCAA, is Monday.



From the Dane County Airport — Take Packers Drive south to Johnson Street. Johnson Street (which changes into Pennsylvania Avenue then Gorham Street then University Avenue) winds through residential areas and past Lake Mendota. Stay on University Avenue until Randall Street (look for Milan's Sub Shop). Turn left on Randall Street. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe Street). Camp Randall Stadium is located on the right side of Monroe Street.

From I-94 — Take I-94 to Highway 30 west. Take Highway 30 to Washington Avenue south (left). Take Washington Street to First Avenue. Right on First Avenue to Pennsylvania Avenue. Left on Pennsylvania Avenue, which becomes Gorham Street and then University Avenue. Stay on University Avenue through campus until Randall Street (look for Milan's Sub Shop on the left side of University Avenue). Turn left on Randall Street. Go approximately three blocks until Randall forks. Take the right fork (Monroe Street). Camp Randall Stadium is located on the right side on Monroe Street.

From I-90 — Take the Madison beltline (Highway 12 & 18). West on the beltline. Exit on Park Street north (right turn). Take Park Street to Regent Street. Turn left on Regent Street and go approximately six blocks. Camp Randall Stadium is on the right.
