The BBC taped interviews at the conference, and Pacifica Radio is planning to broadcast their tapes of the program during October-November 1979. Continuation of the business meeting on March 31:

- 5. Discussion continued about the 1981 Symposium. It was decided:
- -- It will take place in March 1981.
- -- The location will probably be California but the choice is up to the committee.
- --The productions should range from professional to college theater, therefore we should invite as participants professional theaters, college theaters, and directors without groups.
- --Katja Scott will be attending the ATA Conference in August and should receive instructions as to making contacts.
- --Also, Brecht agents throughout the world should be asked for information on plans to produce Brecht plays internationally.
- --Productions of Brecht plays are preferred. If other productions are offered, only those should be accepted that somehow link up with Brecht (or else, scholars could not participate).
- --Participating theaters should be asked to videotape their rehearsals at various stages and bring the tapes along.
- -- In addition, films or videotapes should be solicited of theater groups that cannot participate themselves.
- --Plays to be offered should be announced well in advance to give scholars a chance to do work on them.
 - 6. Internationalization.
- -- The first newsletter in the fall will be made up to serve as a vehicle for recruiting new members.
- --Every member is asked to provide Dick Rundell [address on p. 2] with names and addresses, preferably outside the United States, to send this newsletter to.
