- h. Department of the Army - Chicago Ordnance District - Contract No. DA-11-022-ORD-656 - Supplemental Agreement No. 1 - \$8400 additional - Termination extended to June 30, 1954 - Research in the Department of Chemistry. (16D-672)

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Renk, the above report of the Vice President of Business and Finance was approved, ratified and confirmed.

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Vice President Peterson reported that the total contributions received by the Alumni Association and the University of Wisconsin Foundation to send the

band to the Rose Bowl amounted to \$56,025.24 and that the expenditures amounted to \$42,479.31, leaving a balance of \$13,545.93 in the Rose Bowl Band Account. He stated that it is his understanding that plans are underway to arrange for the purchase of new uniforms for the band. He added that perhaps the Regents would wish to express their appreciation to the many contributors to the Band Fund by adopting a "Thank you" resolution. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the administrative officers of the University be requested to prepare a suitable statement expressing appreciation to those who contributed so widely and generously to this project of sending the University band to Pasadena. The statement follows:

The Regents of the University of Wisconsin express their sincere appreciation for the contributions, so widely and generously made, by hundreds of individuals, by business firms, and by associations and groups representing many interests, which made it possible for the University of Wisconsin Band to represent the University and the State of Wisconsin at the East-West football game in San Francisco on December 27, 1952, and at the Tournament of Roses Parade and Rose Bowl Game at Pasadena, California, on January 1, 1953.

Police Vice President Peterson reported that he had received confidential reports from the Attorney General and the Director of Business Administration Research on the complaints concerning certain alleged activities of certain members of the University Department of Protection and Security. He stated that these reports had been read to the Regents and that it was his understanding that the Regents wished to defer action on the reports until the April meeting of the Board.

The Secretary reported that the joint meeting of the Regents and the Board of Visitors was to be held at the time of the April meeting of the Regents and that at the January, 1953, meeting of the Regents a suggestion had been made that the joint meeting be held on Friday evening, April 10, 1953. The Regents agreed that arrangements should be made for dinner for the Visitors and Regents at the Memorial Union at 6:30 P.M. on Friday, April 10, 1953, to be followed by a joint meeting of the two boards.

The Secretary reported that an invitation had been received from the Madison Chamber of Commerce and Foundation for the Regents to attend, as honored guests, a buffet supper sponsored by the Madison Chamber of Commerce and Founda-

tion for the Governor, the members of the Legislature, the state elective officials, the Justices of the Supreme Court, and the President and Board of Regents of the University, to be held at the Loraine Hotel on Wednesday, March 25, 1953, at 6:30 P.M.

Regent Renk presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was
VOTED, That William J. Bleckwenn, professor of neuropsychiatry, be
granted leave of absence, without pay, from February 19 to March 13, 1953.

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Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was
VOTED, That James S. Earley, professor of economics, be granted leave of
absence, without pay, from September 1953 to June 1954.

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Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was
VOTED, That Edwin E. Witte, professor of economics, be granted leave of
absence, without pay, for the first semester of 1953-54.

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Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Renk, it was
VOTED, That Gustav Bohstedt, professor of animal husbandry, be granted
leave of absence, without pay, from March 16 to May 31, 1953.

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Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was
VOTED, That the resignation of Helen P. Davis, associate professor of
medicine, half-time, be accepted, to take effect March 31, 1953.

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Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the Memorandum of Agreement Regarding Cooperation In Higher Education Between The University of Venezuela and The University of Wisconsin be approved; that the President of the University and the Secretary of the Regents be authorized to sign said memorandum of agreement on behalf of The University of Wisconsin and The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, said memorandum of agreement having been approved by the Government of the United States of Venezuela and The University of Venezuela; and that the President of the University be authorized to appoint, from time to time, three members of the University of Wisconsin faculty to serve as the Wisconsin representatives on the supervisory and administrative committee.

(Regent Renk explained the purpose of the agreement referred to in the above action. See EXHIBIT B attached.)

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Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That the bequest by the late Minnie Riess Detling of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin of her library, with the provision that it be kept intact as a single unit, be declined by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin with regret and with appreciation for Mrs. Detling's generosity and for the confidence in the work of the University which she expressed by making this bequest. With most of the works in this library already held by the University Library, little use would be made of it if kept intact as a single unit. Therefore, this bequest is declined for the reason that Mrs. Detling's wishes would be more likely realized by permitting the Mead Public Library of Sheboygan, the alternate devisee, to accept the bequest of her library.

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Book
Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the bequest by the late Minnie Riess Detling of Sheboygan, Wisconsin, to be used for the purposes of medical research at the University of Wisconsin, be accepted by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Minnie Riess Detling, Deceased; that the funds received under this bequest be designated as The Minnie Riess Detling and John M. Detling Medical Research Fund, and be used for the primary purpose of research in the field of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis and related diseases; and that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for this bequest in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, and do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That, subject to the approval of the form of agreement by the Business and Finance Committee and the Attorney General, the President and Secretary be authorized to sign an agreement between The Regents of The University of Wisconsin and the Trustees under Section (B) of Clause Seventh of the Last Will and Testament of Minnie Riess Detling, Deceased, providing for the transfer to said Regents of the principal of the trust and for the disbursement by said Regents of the principal and income from time to time as directed by said Trustees, all in accordance with the terms and conditions of said Section (B) of Clause Seventh; and that the Secretary be authorized to sign receipts in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin for the funds transferred to the University pursuant to said agreement.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the bequest by the late Carolyn Nye, of the City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin, for the establishment of the Minerva Sommars Bryant Scholarship Fund, the income of which is to be loaned to women students, be accepted by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Carolyn Nye, Deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for this bequest in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, and do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the bequest by the late Miss Mabel C. Pratt of Beloit, Wisconsin, to be used for the purpose of cancer research be accepted by The Regents of The University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Miss Mabel C. Pratt, Deceased; and that the Secretary be authorized to accept and sign receipts for this bequest in the name of The Regents of The University of Wisconsin, and do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That, whereas bids received on February 4, 1953, for the construction of the Dairy Cattle Instruction and Research Center exceeded by more than \$100,000 the appropriation available for this purpose, therefore, upon the recommendation of the College of Agriculture, all bids received on February 4, 1953, are rejected and authority is granted to advertise for new bids on the basis of revised plans and specifications with alternates on steel and masonry structures and on various optional units and facilities to be included or excluded as may be

required to construct a functional Dairy Cattle Instruction and Research Center at a cost of not more than the \$400,000 appropriated for this purpose by the Legislature.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That the State Building Commission be requested to allot \$251,000 for remodeling, improvements and equipment needed in connection with changes required to accommodate space in the McArdle Memorial Laboratory for cancer research.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Laird, it was VOTED, That the request of the Knapp Committee to plan its 1953-54 Graduate Fellowship program on a budget of \$35,000 for next year only, instead of the customary budget of \$25,000 per year, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That, in accordance with the provisions of Section 30.02 Wisconsin Statutes, the City of Madison be requested to petition the Public Service Commission for the necessary authority to permit the University to fill in the lake shore between Park Street and Elizabeth Waters Hall in accordance with the sketch prepared by the Department of Physical Plant Planning, identified as EXHIBIT A.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the Emergency Board be requested to appropriate funds needed to continue for the fiscal year 1952-53 the policy of the State in providing supplemental appropriations to cover the costs of hospitalizing certain classes of patients in the State of Wisconsin General Hospital required by law to be admitted at reduced rates. (Estimated appropriation needed for 1952-53 is \$105,000.)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the Director of Physical Plant

Planning and the State Chief Engineer, and subject to the approval of the Governor, a contract in the amount of \$4127.82 be awarded to the American-La France-Foamite Corporation, Elmira, New York, on the basis of their low bid submitted February 16, 1953, for supplying and installing a carbon dioxide fire extinguishing system in the Volatile Solvent Storage addition to the Chemistry Building, and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the contract. (Cost chargeable to the items for equipment and contingent in the schedule of costs for this project.)

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That \$6782 be allotted from President's Unassigned 1-E to provide funds for equipment for the Hydrobiological Laboratory (Q14).

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to negotiate and sign leases for the rental of land in Nebraska for the period June 15, 1953 to September 15, 1953, costs not to exceed \$800, for the purpose of carrying out a micrometeorological research survey. This research project, under the direction of the Department of Meteorology, has been authorized under a Federal research contract (# AF19(122)-461) and the University will be reimbursed for all expenses.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That in accordance with Section 20.41 (18) of the Statutes, a transfer of \$60,000 be made from 20.41-1(e) to 20.41-3(k) to provide working cash for the seed program. The \$60,000 to be returned to 20.41-1(e) before June 30, 1953.

The Secretary read a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of West Allis on January 6, 1953, commending the University football team and band for their accomplishments and conduct at the Rose Bowl on January 1, 1953. (Copy attached.) Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the resolution from the Common Council of the City of West Allis be accepted and placed on file and that the Secretary be instructed to send an appropriate letter to the Honorable Mayor Arnold H. Klentz and the Common Council of the City of West Allis in acknowledgment of the same.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the President of the Board appoint a special Regent committee to study the feasibility of relocating agricultural lands of the College of Agriculture and to report back to the Regents.

President Werner appointed the following Regents to serve on this Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands - Regents Renk (Chairman), Jones and Kleczka. Regent Jones stated that, due to the attention that he must give to pressing matters, it would not be possible for him to give the time necessary to that committee, and requested that he be excused from serving on that committee. President Werner then appointed Regent Rennebohm to serve as a member of the committee in place of Regent Jones.

Regent Watson inquired as to what procedures would be followed to determine the necessary adjustments that would have to be made in preparing the 1953-54 University budget. There followed a general discussion of the responsibility of the Regents in this matter and whether such procedures should be determined before or after final action by the Legislature on the biennial budget of the University. Upon request, the President of the University and members of the University staff withdrew from the room for the balance of the meeting. The Regents and the members of the press remained.

Following adjournment the Regents reported that the following action had been taken:

Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Gelatt, the following resolution was voted unanimously:

WHEREAS, the administration of the University of Wisconsin is faced with tremendous problems, a proper solution of which will call for decisions of far-reaching importance affecting the future of the University and the people of the State;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Regents, that we, the Regents of the University, hereby express complete and continuing confidence in President E. B. Fred, his administrative assistants, and faculty.

The meeting adjourned at 11:52 A.M.

STATEMENT ON THE UNIVERSITY OF VENEZUELA-UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN
COOPERATION IN HIGHER EDUCATION BY REGENT RENK

A plan that will unite two great universities in a common cause, cooperation for the improvement of higher education, is proposed in a memorandum of agreement, signed by the officials of the University of Venezuela, and now submitted for the approval of the Regents of the University of Wisconsin.

The plan for cooperation between these two great American universities promises great benefits to both the University of Wisconsin and the University of Venezuela.

It is basically a program of exchange under which a limited number of senior and junior faculty members from the University of Wisconsin, and from other North American Universities, will be sent to the University of Venezuela for instruction, research, and service. Also under the plan, a number of selected graduate students from the University of Venezuela will be sent to the University of Wisconsin and to other North American Universities for training and research.

One unique feature of the plan is the provision that all costs will be paid by the University of Venezuela. A joint committee from both institutions will arrange all details of the programs, subject, of course, to the approval of the governing bodies of the Universities.

Here, I believe, is a program which honors and benefits both institutions. The South American educators believe it will aid in the improvement of their graduate education. We know that it offers unusual opportunities for research for the professors and graduate students of our own institution. It is, on the academic level, a true "good neighbor policy."

Two great nations, the United States of Venezuela and our own country, are thus, in a small but very important manner, demonstrating to the world how neighbors can work together for mutual improvement.

The Education Committee recommends approval by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin of this memorandum of agreement which has been signed by the Venezuelan officials.

RESOLUTION NO. 3951

Wisconsin skill, courage and sportsmanship were never better exemplified than by this University football team in its performance before millions of viewers.

The performance of the University band also was a source of deep pride to Wisconsinites everywhere. Their musicianship and precision were remarkable and thrilling.

It is fitting and proper that due recognition be granted the football team and the band for their outstanding achievements.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED

That the people of West Allis, by their Common Council in regular meeting duly assembled on this 6th day of January, 1953, record their approbation, affection, and pride for the University of Wisconsin football team and band for their accomplishments and conduct as hereinbefore noted. Let this resolution be properly spread upon the minutes of the Common Council of the City of West Allis.

Let a certified copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Honorable Governor Walter Kohler, and also to the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin.
