REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF RECENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, September 29, 1945, 9 A.M.

President Sensenbrenner presiding

PRESENT: Regents Callahan, Campbell, Cleary, Grady, Hodgkins, Holmes, Jones, Kleczka, Sensenbrenner, Werner

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Fleczka, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the special meeting of the Board held on September 15, 1945, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Business and Finance -
- 1. That \$1,500 be transferred from Regents' Unassigned to the budget of the housing bureau for the employment of additional part-time help.

 Adopted.
- 2. That upon the request of the Director of Residence Halls, Mr. Rudolph F. Hauser, maintenance man I, who has reached retirement age, be continued on full time basis until July 1, 1946.

 Adopted.
- 3. That \$10,000 be transferred as a temporary loan from 20.41 I-E to the cashier's contingent fund.

 Adopted.
- 4. That Glenn E. Fisher be appointed university policeman with police powers as authorized by statute.

 Adopted.
- 5. That in accordance with the recommendation of the Registrar, a refund of \$6.00 be made to Miss Amy Allen, 121 West Gilman Street, Madison, Wisconsin, against whom a \$6.00 fine was levied for late registration.

 Adopted.
 - 6. That the following recommendations of the Testing Office be approved:
 - A. That the University provide test scoring service to schools, ment agencies, and business and industrial firms of the state; provided that

- 1. The testing service will be furnished only to institutions or agencies maintaining trained counselors or personnel officers who are qualified to interpret test results.
- 2. The testing service will not be rendered to private individuals.
- 3. The testing service rendered to extra-University agencies will not be permitted to interfere with the services required by the University students, departments and offices.
- B. That the following schedule of service charges be made for test scoring:

2 cents per test for the first run $\mathbf{1}_{2}^{L}$ cents per test for each additional run

In case of additional work, clerical in nature, a charge will be made to cover actual cost, at a rate of not less than 70 cents per man hour.

Adopted.

7. That students who register and pay fees on a unit (per credit or per semester hour) basis may receive refunds of fees for courses dropped in accordance with the schedule of refunds for students withdrawing from the University. The schedule for students withdrawing from the University follows:

Upon recommendation of the Registrar, refunds of tuition and fees will be on the following basis to students withdrawing from the University: withdrawal before and during the first week, 100%; during the second week, 80%; during the third and fourth weeks, 60%; during the fifth and sixth weeks, 40%; during the seventh and eighth weeks, 20%; and after the eighth week, no refund.

Students who withdraw to serve in the armed forces are entitled to a full refund of their semester fees.

Adopted.

8. That upon the recommendation of the Director of Extension, approval be given for the use of approximately 1,300 square feet of space in the State Highway Laboratory by the Extension Division at an estimated monthly cost of \$39, to cover the cost of electricity, steam, water, gas, etc.

Adopted.

9. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a memorandum of agreement with the City of Racine for the use of McMynn School as a University Extension Center, for a period of three years, with the option to renew for additional periods of time and with the understanding that the agreement may be terminated at the end of any academic year following the minimum period of three years.

Adopted.

10. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign an agreement with Johns Hopkins University for confidential research work to be carried on in the Department of Physics. The estimated cost of the project, \$20,000, is to be paid by the Johns Hopkins University.

Adopted.

11. That upon the recommendation of the Registrar the following regulation be rescinded and that students reentering the University whose records are being held for payment of the registration fee be released from this obligation:

"Students who register during any semester, attend classes without paying fees, and then withdraw from the University, will, upon reentering the University, be assessed delinquent fees according to the following schedule: withdrawal during the first two weeks, 20%; during the third and fourth weeks, 40%; during the fifth and sixth weeks, 60%; during the seventh and eighth weeks, 80%; after the eighth week, 100%. The full amount of the fire dollar registration fee will be assessed in all cases."

Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Jones, recommendations 1 to 11, inclusive, listed under Business and Finance were adopted.

- Agriculture -

- 1. That the salary of George H. Werner, assistant professor of dairy husbandry, be increased from \$3,000 to \$3,600 for the academic year 1945-46; increase, \$600, to be charged to vice Musbaum, p. 80, fund 15AE.

 Adopted.
- 2. That a three day short course be given at the College of Agriculture on pollorum testing, September 11, 12 and 13, 1945; that a fee of \$2.00 per person be charged; and that the receipts be budgeted as follows:

Receipts: 25 registrations @ \$2.00 \$50.00

Expenditures: Supplies \$20.00

Extra Labor 30.00 50.00,

3. That a six day short course be given at the College of Agriculture for the Dairy Herd Improvement Association testers, November 5 to 10, 1945; that a fee of \$3.00 per person be charged; and that the receipts be budgeted as follows:

Receipts: 15 registrations @ \$3.00 \$45.00

Expenditures: Supplies \$30.00

Extra Labor 15.00 45.00.

- 4. That the salary of William P. Mortenson, associate professor of agricultural economics, be adjusted from \$3,680 to \$3,800 for the academic year 1945-46; the additional amount, \$120, represents the restoration of waiver on his salary.

 Adopted.
- 5. That Don S. Anderson be promoted from associate professor of agricultural economics to professor of agricultural economics for the academic year 1945-46; that his salary be increased from \$4,750 to \$5,000 for the academic year; charge \$1,250 to item for Clarenbach, p. 67, fund 15A-R, \$1,250 to item for Summer (on leave), p. 75, fund I, and \$2,500 to item for Burcalow, p. 75, fund 15A-E.

 Adopted.
- 6. That Harry Steenbock, professor of biochemistry, be granted leave of absence (without pay) for the first semester of 1945-46.

 Adopted.

7. That the leave of absence granted to Churchill Eisenhart be terminated at the beginning of the academic year 1945-46; that he be appointed associate professor of agricultural statistical service for the academic year 1945-46; salary \$1,900 from the College of Agriculture and \$1,600 from Letters and Science (Mathematics); charge agricultural salary as follows: \$1,450 to vice Delwiche, agronomy, \$186.42 to item for Eisenhart, and \$263.58 to item for assistant professor, Home Economics (clothing), pp. 75 and 85.

Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendations 1 to 7, inclusive, listed under agriculture were adopted.

- Education -

- l. That Blanche M. Trilling, professor of physical education, women, be granted leave of absence, for the second semester of 1945-46; salary \$2,500 for the semester; charge \$1,242 to summer session trust funds, \$600 to School of Education, physical education women, vice Mahoney (p. 60); \$200 to Physical Education Women (p. 26) vice Bronkhorst, \$411.39, department of education (p. 56), vice K. Little; \$46.61, Physical Education Women (p. 26), part time help. Adopted.
- 2. That Marie L. Carns be appointed acting professor of physical education, acting director of Physical Education Women and acting chairman of the four-year course in physical education women for the second semester of 1945-46; salary \$2,500 for the semester; to be charged as follows: \$1,285 to Physical Education Women, p. 26, and \$1,215 to School of Education (physical education women), p.60. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Campbell, recommendations 1 and 2 listed under Education were adopted.

- Medicine -

- 1. That Ruth C. Foster, associate professor of clinical medicine, Student Health, be reinstated on the full time basis, beginning September 24, 1945; salary at the rate of \$3,250; charge to Student Health budget, fund 1-A.

 Adopted.
- 2. That Marie L. Carns, associate professor of medicine, be granted leave of absence without pay from July 1, 1945 to July 1, 1946.

 Adopted.
- 3. That Otto A. Mortensen be promoted from associate professor of anatomy to professor of anatomy; that his salary be increased from \$5,000 to \$5,500 per annum, beginning October 1, 1945; charge to Medical School salaries.

 Adopted.
- 4. That upon the recommendation of the Medical School faculty, Brian Hawkes-ford McCracken be granted the degree of doctor of medicine as of September 29, 1945. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendations 1 to 4, inclusive, listed under Medicine were adopted.

- Law -

1. That the leave of absence granted to Jacob H. Beuscher be terminated at the close of the first semester of 1945-46; that he be appointed associate professor of law for the second semester of 1945-46, salary \$2,600 for the semester, charge to Law School salaries.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, recommendation No. 1 under Law was adopted.

- Military Science and Tactics -

- 1. That Major John B. Crone be appointed associate professor of military science and tactics, beginning September 12, 1945; salary at the rate of \$833 per annum, 12 months' basis, for the period September 12 to September 30, 1945, inclusive, and without University salary effective October 1, 1945.

 Adopted.
- 2. That Colonel Willis S. Matthews be appointed professor of military science and tactics effective October 1, 1945; salary at the rate of \$833 per annum, 12 months' basis.

Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Kleczka, recommendations 1 and 2 listed under Military Science and Tactics were adopted.

- Gifts and Grants -

- 1. That the following gifts and grants be accepted:
 - (a) \$ 300 Oscar Mayer & Company, Madison, Wisconsin, for the establishment of four scholarships of \$75 each for students enrolled in the Farm Short Course for the year 1945-46, the scholarships to be known as the "Oscar Mayer & Company Farm Short Course Scholarships"; and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
 - (b) 4,000 Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation for the continuation of an industrial fellowship in the Departments of Agricultural Engineering and Dairy Industry for the period November 15, 1945 to October 31, 1947, to study the functional requirements of dairy cattle in the way of housing; and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
 - (c) 4,500 Michigan Chemical Corporation, St. Louis, Michigan, for the establishment of an industrial fellowship in the Department of Economic Entomology, for a twelve months' period, beginning September 15, 1945, to aid the Agricultural Experiment Station in its study of DDT and related compounds when used as insecticides.
 - (d) 2,475 The Lilly Research Laboratories, Indianapolis, Indiana, for a post-doctorate fellowship in chemistry for one year, beginning September 1, 1945.

- (e) § 2,400 The Lederle Laboratories, Inc., for the renewal of an industrial fellowship in the Departments of Biochemistry and Agricultural Bacteriology to study the factors affecting the production of penicillin by molds for the period October 1, 1945 to September 30, 1946; and that the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the agreement.
 - (f) 200 George Bockl, Milwaukee, for a scholarship to a student in the School of Commerce majoring in Real Estate; the scholarship shall be designated "Milwaukee Real Estate Board Scholarship".
- (g) 4,000 a year for a two year period, from the Trustees of the University of Wisconsin Trust Fund (Brittingham) to support studies in medical electronics.

Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Callahan, recommendation 1 (a) to (g) listed under Gifts and Grants was adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That resignations numbered 1 to 30, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That appointments numbered 1 to 112, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That salary and service adjustments numbered 1 to 21, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That leaves of absence numbered 1 to 3, inclusive, listed under Actions by the President, be approved.

The above actions of the President taken since the September 15, 1945, meeting of the Board and approved by the Regents in the foregoing resolutions are made a part of the records of this meeting.

Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That Louis B. Slichter be appointed professor of geophysics, beginning with the second semester of 1945-46, at a salary of \$3,250 for the semester; charge \$1,625 to geography and \$1,625 to physics, pp. 37 and 40.

Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was

VOTED, That Joseph 0. Hirschfelder be appointed professor of chemistry, effective with the beginning of the academic year 1946-47, at a salary of \$5,000 for the academic year.

President Fred reported upon Joint Resolution No. 95, A, regarding instruction in Greek at the University. This matter was referred to him by the Regents at the meeting held on August 11, 1945. The President stated that the University is now giving instruction in classical Greek and is in position to teach modern Greek if there is sufficient demand for it. Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That the Secretary send this information to the Chief Clerk of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the Assembly.

President Fred presented the following resolution of commendation of V. E. Kivlin, Associate Dean of the College of Agriculture:

"The University of Wisconsin expresses its gratitude to Vincent Earl Kivlin, Acting Dean of the College of Agriculture, February 21, 1945 to September 15, 1945, for his untiring zeal, his splendid cooperative spirit, his continuing interest in and sympathy of youth, his complete understanding of the true purposes of education, his encouraging and stimulating companionship, his high ideals and his inspiring leadership.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Werner, the resolution was adopted.

President Fred presented a statement on student enrollment for 1945-46 up to September 27, 1945. (Copy attached)

Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Kleczka,

seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That the recommendation of Dean Ingraham for an addition of \$18,000 in the Letters and Science salaries and wages budget on account of increased instruction, be approved; charge to Regents' Unassigned 1E.

Upon recommendation of the Medical School, and upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That Dr. Joseph S. Evans be employed on a special contract for the period October 1, 1945 to July 1, 1946, at a salary of \$3,000, chargeable to Regents' Unassigned, to assist the Centennial Committee in the preparation of the history of the University of Wisconsin, particularly with reference to the evolution of medical education in Wisconsin.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE DIRECTOR OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

- 1. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to request the Governor to release \$58,927.72 for the purchase of the properties located at 514 North Lake Street, 705 Langdon Street, and 717 Langdon Street.

 Adopted.
- 2. That the Director of Business and Finance be authorized to complete the purchase of the following described properties:

"Parts of Lots Ten (10), Eleven (11), and Twelve (12) of Block Six (6) of Madison, Wisconsin, to-wit: Commencing at the Southeast corner of said Lot Twelve (12), thence running North Forty (40) feet, thence running West Sixty-six (66) feet, thence running North Ninety-two (92) feet more or less to the South line of Langdon Street, thence Thirty-four (34) feet, thence South One Hundred and Two (102) feet,

thence West Fifty (50) feet, thence South Thirty (30) feet more or less to the South line of Lot Ten (10), thence East along the South line of Lots Ten (10), Eleven (11) and Twelve (12) to the place of beginning. It being expressly agreed that the West Six (6) feet of the above described tract of land is to constitute one half of a private driveway Twelve (12) feet in width between the land hereby conveyed and the land conveyed by Samuel D. Hastings and Margaretta Hastings, his wife, to John M. Olin on September 10, 1890, and recorded September 13, 1890, in Vol. 142 of Deeds, page 289, which driveway shall be for the joint use of all subsequent owners after said Samuel D. Hastings and wife, their heirs, administrators, executors and assigns and the said John M. Olin, his heirs, executors, administrators and assigns and shall be forever kept open and unobstructed for the use of above parties, their heirs, executors and assigns for a private driveway."

Consideration - \$52,000,

and, the following described property:

"All that part of the West 52 feet of Lot 10, Block 6, City of Madison, which lies North of a line 5 feet from the North side of a barn, subject to easement or right of way over and under the Mast 6 feet thereof, as described in deeds recorded in Volume 142, page 289 and Volume 163 of Deeds, page 46; embracing 52 feet on Langdon Street, with a depth of 72 feet, and meaning to convey all of the land which is owned by the party of the first part in said block."

Consideration - \$6,927.72

All of the above chargeable to the postwar construction appropriation. Adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Cleary, recommendations of the Director of Business and Finance numbered 1 and 2 were adopted.

Upon recommendation of the Director of Business and Finance, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the reversion clause in the warranty deed from the William F.

Vilas Estate providing for the payment of \$18,000 for the property at 820 Irving Place be extended for ten years from October 1, 1945, but without any other change in terms.

The Director of Business and Finance discussed the matter of sending student publications to the 470 high schools in the state. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was

WOTHD, That \$2,000 be appropriated from Regents' Unassigned to the Department of Public Service to send the Daily Cardinal, the Wisconsin Country Magazine and the Wisconsin Engineer to the high schools and that the question of sording the Badger to the various high schools in the state be re-explored to see if sufficient paper is available. (An additional appropriation of \$1,200 would be necessary to send the Badger to the high schools.)

The Director of Business and Finance reported that prior to the change in University Extension fees approved by the Regents at the special meeting on September 15, the University Extension Division had begun the registration and enrollment of students in certain class centers in and near Madison on the basis of the former fee schedule of §5.00 per credit hour.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the Director of Extension, the Regents approve a rate of \$5.00 per credit hour for University Extension class instruction in Madison, south central, and southwestern Wisconsin areas for the first semester of 1945-46, and for which registration was under way before the change in fees was approved by the Regents on September 15, 1945.

Upon recommendation of President Fred, and upon motion of Regent Kleczke, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was

VOTED, That Lloyd M. Parks be appointed associate professor of pharmacy effective with the beginning of the academic year 1945-46, at a salary of \$4,000 for the academic year.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That the Secretary of the Regents, who is Executor of the William H. Kipp Estate, be authorized to sell to M. T. Myers of Cklahoma City, Oklahoma, the assignment on the production of oil, heretofore assigned to the George Oil Company and recently purchased by Mr. Myers, for production below the 3500' level for the sum of \$3,500.

Regent Jones, as Chairman of the Constructional Development Committee, reported upon the visit of his committee to the site of the University Extension Center in Milwaukee but stated that the committee had decided to explore the situation further before making any recommendation with respect to the construction of very urgently needed building facilities there.

Regent Jones presented the following recommendation:

That upon recommendation of the President of the University and the Campus Planning Commission, James G. Woodburn be appointed executive secretary of the Steering Committee and the Campus Planning Commission on a half-time besis from September 17 to November 1, 1945, at a salary for the period of £293.33, chargeable to Regents' Unassigned, and that he be appointed to the same position for the balance of the fiscal year after November 1 on a full-time basis, if possible, in any event for not less than one-half time, and that his salary for services to the Commission be charged to Regents' Unassigned.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Kleczka, adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That the Regents grant an easement to the City of Madison to install sanitary sewers and water mains on the line of proposed Midvale Boulevard between Regent Street extended and University Avenue, in consideration of which easement the University, its assigns and successors in ownership of land fronting on proposed Midvale Boulevard and on Meadow Lane shall be held free from property assessments for installation of sewers or water mains in either of those streets, but shall be allowed to make connections with said sewers and water mains for any residence or establishments which may be erected on said land.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That the proposed 200' FM radio tower be placed on the following site recommended by the Campus Planning Commission:

Approximately 30' north of North Hall and just west of the driveway approaching North Hall

The Director of Business and Finance reported that a request had been made to the Attorney General for an opinion regarding the legality of charging the nonresident fee for Wisconsin veterans enrolled under the provisions of Public Law Fo. 346 but that no answer had been received as yet.

At 10:05 A.M. the meeting adjourned.
