Upon motion of Regent Fitzgerald, seconded by Regent Veneman, it was VOTED that the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, held May 9, 1980, be approved as mailed to the members of the Board.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Vice President Erdman assumed the Chair to accept nominations for President of the Board.

Regent McNamara nominated current President Grover for a second term as President. Regent Beckwith seconded the nomination and, there being no further nominations, Vice President Erdman declared the nominations closed. Regent Grover was unanimously re-elected President of the Board.

President Grover resumed the Chair.

Upon motion of Regent Lawton, seconded by Regent Thompson, Regent Erdman was nominated for re-election as Vice President of the Board. It was moved by Regent DeBardeleben, seconded by Regent Barkla, and carried, that nominations be closed, and the Acting Secretary was directed to cast a unanimous ballot for Regent Erdman.

In response to Regent DeBardeleben's inquiry, Regent Barkla explained that Mr. Patterson contended that he had not resigned, but had been discharged, from his position at the UWC-Barron County campus. The Center System Appeals and Grievance Committee decided that he was not discharged and that, therefore, it had no jurisdiction to hear his appeal. The Regent Review Committee's

Resolution 2173:

Resof condolence -Harvey Dueholm. P.2173, P344.

Whereas, Harvey Dueholm, the son of a Danish immigrant, was a Polk County dairy farmer who brought his conscience, his courage, and his good humor to the Wisconsin Legislature more than 20 years ago; and

Whereas, he deserved his reputation as a fighter for liberal and sometimes unpopular causes. His cause was the poor, not the privileged, and he fought to keep the doors of Wisconsin's public universities open to all.

In the late 1960s, when the fury and frustration of the Vietnam War touched off campus protests, support mounted in the State Assembly for legislation to bar out-of-state students from Wisconsin's public universities.

Dueholm, the Chamber's premier humorist, was surprisingly serious when he took the floor to join the debate. Some out-of-state students stay on, said Dueholm, living their lives in Wisconsin and sharing the benefits of their knowledge and professional skills. Some, he continued, were the researchers, the physicians, and the surgeons helping him win his battle with cancer.

The Wisconsin Legislature should fund more research rather than curb out-of-state students, Dueholm concluded. When the roll was called, his colleagues agreed.

Whereas, Harvey Dueholm fought cancer for 23 years, and used his humor to help others fight. "I just hope," he mused, "that I'll be forgiven for some of the stories I've told to make people laugh."; and

Whereas, the death of Harvey Dueholm on Thursday, May 29, 1980, silenced one of the most loyal friends and effective supporters of the University; and

Whereas, the life of Harvey Dueholm remains an inspiration to us all;

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that the Board of Regents extends to Hazel Dueholm and their four sons the deepest sympathy and heartfelt condolences of the University of Wisconsin System.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

Upon motion of Regent McNamara, seconded by Regent Elliott, the following resolution was adopted (EXHIBIT B):

President O'Neil introduced Frank E. Horton who began his duties as UW-Milwaukee Chancellor on June 1, 1980.

President O'Neil reported on the status of the Task Forces on UW-Center System and UW-Superior, stating that the report on the Center System had been received; and that the report on UW-Superior would be released in Superior on June 16 and 17, with Task Force Chairman Ratner in attendance with him. (At that time, President O'Neil would also be presenting the 1980 President's Award to the UW-Superior student government for their outstanding activities and programs for 1979-80.) The President's recommendations on the Task Force reports will be presented to the Board at its November meeting.

Movemence - proposed study reviewed. , P.5.

The proposed study of faculty governance was reviewed. Study groups, consisting largely of faculty members, will be convened in the fall. At the conclusion of their studies, a System group will be appointed by the System President to meld the results of the first stage. It is anticipated that a comprehensive report would be brought to the Board no later than December, 1980.

Basic-Skills - formation of Basic Skills an Council announced: p.5

Formation of the Basic Skills Council was announced by the President, with Professor William Lenehan, UW-Madison, as Chair. Composition of the Council and its charge are included in these minutes as EXHIBIT C. As the Council progresses, further reports will be made to the Board.

Budget - report on 1981-83-Brennial Budget.

President O'Neil gave a brief prospectus on the next biennial budget, stating that 100% of the budget—which would not even continue the current level of operation—had been assured by the Secretary of the State Department of Administration, Kenneth Lindner. He stated that conservative calculations show 101% would be needed to meet projected utility costs in the 1981—83 biennium; 102.5% would be necessary to meet the bare cost—to—continue requirements because of inevitable inflation; and at least 103—103.5% would be needed if some of the essential program priorities are to be addressed. He emphasized that limitation to a figure of 100% would result in substantial program reductions or inability to meet rising costs of such needs as instructional equipment and library materials. Planning on the basis of the guidelines received will continue, he said, along with development of a limited set of proposals for funding essential goals which cannot be met from the current base.

Ms. Kim Kachelmyer, the new President of the United Council of Student Government, was introduced by President O'Neil. She then introduced her new staff. Ms. Kachelmyer and United Council's Legislative Director, Mark Hazelbaker, reported on the Council's proposed mandatory refundable fee program. They indicated that eight out of nine referenda held on the proposal have been passed and that the program's continuation would be subject to campus votes every two years. Indicating that they expect to provide more than a dollar in benefits for each dollar collected, they urged favorable action by the Board on this proposal.

Vunited Co-report on funding proposal; p. 5 +6

Pointing out that campus administrations would be closely involved in implementing the program, Regent Erdman asked if United Council representatives had met with System Student Affairs officers to discuss the reservations that group had expressed about the proposal. Ms. Kachelmyer replied that Tim Fleming, Past President of the United Council of Student Government, was currently attending a meeting on that subject in Milwaukee and that the results would be presented to the Board later.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

President Grover reported the Executive Committee's action on June 5 (EXHIBIT D), which resulted in the appointment of Judith Temby as Secretary of the Board. Her duties will begin June 16, 1980, at an annual salary of \$27,000.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Chairman Lawton presented the report of the Education Committee.

Prostum Churge - report of Churge approved by System Administration for 1979-80 was reviewed in the Education Committee by Senior Vice President Smith. The changes involve approvals of submajors, renaming or restructuring of existing degree authorizations and/or academic departments, and budgetary/accounting changes with academic implications. Dr. Smith noted that the record of majors and submajors is especially important to the HELP (Higher Education Location Program) office in providing accurate information to inquiring stydents.

Regent Lawton reported on proposed and R. 2175, PGYZ.

Regent Lawton reported on proposed amendments to UW-Milwaukee Faculty Personnel Policies and Procedures, stating that President O'Neil and Senior Vice President Smith informed the Education Committee that the provision sought by UW-Milwaukee is found in many prestigious institutions. Professor Marilyn Miller, Chair of the UW-Milwaukee University Committee, told the Education Committee that the University desired the provision primarily to accommodate the needs of professional schools and departments which may wish to hire a person of accepted reputation and expertise in his/her field, but want to determine how well that person will function in the academic setting before granting tenure. Regent DeBardeleben indicated to the Education Committee that he opposed these amendments as being inconsistent with the purpose for which tenure is provided.

The following resolution was moved by Regent Lawton and seconded by Regent McNamara:

Resolution 2175: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee Acting Chancellor and Faculty Senate, the amendments to Sections 3.07, 4.04, 5.13(1), and 5.51 and the additions of Sections 5.12(2), 5.131(3), and 5.161 of the UWM Policies and Procedures as contained in UW-Milwaukee Faculty Document No. 1189 be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

Asked by Regent Beckwith for a statement of his objections to this resolution, Regent DeBardeleben replied that the thrust of the resolution is to disconnect the granting of tenure from the granting of rank, which would permit persons to be appointed with the rank of associate professors or professors at UW-Milwaukee without tenure. This seemed inconsistent to him since tenure is meant to guarantee the freedom of the scholar. He said that freedom is obtained after an individual has been tested, one measure of which is appointment to the rank of associate professor or professor. "It seems to me that it is inconsistent with that concept to say, 'You can have the rank, but you can't have the guarantee to go with the rank; you can't have these protections that are inherent in the position.' Just because someone else has done it, I don't think that makes it right." He understood that this provision would be used in very few cases, and he was not persuaded that an exception for these few cases should be made.

Regent Beckwith asked Regent DeBardeleben why it would not be valid for UW-Milwaukee to recruit a person with a distinguished academic career who holds the rank of professor or associate professor from another institution and to offer a salary consistent with that rank, while allowing the faculty to have a short period of time--perhaps a year or two--to evaluate that person additionally before granting tenure. Regent DeBardeleben replied that, if the institution believed a person to be entitled to the rank of professor or associate professor, there should be enough confidence in him or her to grant tenure as well.

Regent O'Harrow asked Regent DeBardeleben if he was suggesting that a person of this caliber would feel restrained in his thinking without tenure, to which Regent DeBardeleben replied that the person would lack the guarantees of tenure but that the effect on that individual would be subjective.

Put to the vote, Resolution 2175 was carried (Regents DeBardeleben, O'Harrow, and Veneman voting "No").

Ww-Milw-staff - Amondment- to personnel Policies & Procedures, Sec. 5.13 Regent Lawton explained the proposed explained to personnel Policies & Procedures, Sec. 5.13

Regent Lawton explained the proposed amendment which concerned the calculation of the probationary period in the exceptional circumstance under which a member of the teaching academic staff achieves a terminal degree and accepts an appointment as a probationary faculty member. This proposed amendment was introduced to the Board at its June, 1979 meeting at which time action was deferred. After considering alternative language suggested by System Administration, the UW-Milwaukee Faculty Senate reaffirmed its support of the language of the original submission and asked that the proposal be advanced again for Regent consideration. During the Education Committee meeting, Professor Miller explained the reasons for the faculty's support of the language in the original submission.

It was moved by Regent Lawton, seconded by Regent McNamara, and carried, that this resolution be adopted as follows (Regents DeBardeleben, O'Harrow, and Veneman voting "No"):

Resolution 2176: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee Acting Chancellor and Faculty Senate, the amendment of Section UWM 5.13(4) and the change of UWM Section 5.13(4) to 5.13(5) shown in UW-Milwaukee Faculty Document No. 1090 be approved as required under UWS 2.02.

Annual Board 6-6-80 uw-Ext-stuff prospectus on proposed of faculty Personne policies relations to rankatania presented; P.L

The Education Committee was informed by Vice President Smith that the prospectus entitled Proposed Review of Faculty Personnel Policies Relating to Faculty Rank and Tenure, UW-Extension had been prepared by the UW-Extension University Committee in cooperation with the Chancellor's office and System Administration Associate Vice President Dallas Peterson. The purpose of the prospectus is to define the nature of the study, to present the questions and concerns on which the review of faculty personnel policies will be based, and to describe the methodology to be used. The review will be a joint endeavor of UW-Extension faculty and administration, with appropriate consultation from System Administration personnel. The timetable calls for the report, along with System Administration recommendations, to be submitted to the Board in November, 1980.

Regent Lawton stated that Senior Vice President Smith had explained to the Education Committee that the authority to determine emeritus professorships is delegated to the institutions and that the awards are made at the ranks held by the individuals at the time of their retirement.

The following resolution concerning emeritus designations for 1980-81 was approved, upon motion of Regent Lawton, second of Regent Fitzgerald (EXHIBIT E):

That, for their many years of dedicated service to higher education in the State of Wisconsin, the Board of Regents Ros of appreciation expresses its deepest gratitude to the members of the faculty and staff who have been granted emeritus status by the President and the Chancellors. Further, the Board of Regents extends to emeritus faculty and staff its best wishes for many productive years ahead.

Regent Lawton suggested that members of the Board individually convey their appreciation to any recipients of emeritus designations who may be known to them It was suggested that the Board Secretary write a letter to each of these individuals expressing the Board's appreciation for their years of service, and Senior Vice President Smith indicated such action was intended in introducing the resolution.

The request for authorization to plan and implement an MS in Nursing at UW-Eau Claire was presented to the Board by Regent Lawton for a second reading. It was advanced out of cycle in order for UW-Eau Claire to be in a position to accept extramural support should such become available over the next few months. The program was unanimously recommended by the Health Science Advisory Council, and members of the Education Committee agreed that the program is badly needed.

The following resolution was moved by Regent Lawton and seconded by Regent Fitzgerald:

University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire, the Chancellor of wisconsin-Eau Claire be authorized to plan and implement a Master of Science degree in Nursi with actual implementation contingent on the availability of extramural support and/or the redeployment of exist institutional recourses; and that IW-Eau Claire will the University of Wisconsin-Eau Claire be authorized to plan and implement a Master of Science degree in Nursing with actual implementation contingent on the availability of extramural support and/or the redeployment of existing institutional resources; and that UW-Eau Claire will assume full program costs following the termination of any extramural support should such support be initially available.

Regent DeBardeleben stated that concern had been expressed in the Education Committee over vagueness of the resolution's language which makes "implementation contingent on the availability of the extramural support and/or redeployment of existing institutional resources." He added, however, that the resolution expresses the determination of the committee to move forward with the program and to try to obtain GPR funding if extramural support is not available.

Put to the vote, Resolution 2178 was adopted.

Regent Lawton reported that during the 1980 Annual Budget Review, the Legislature provided funding for a pesticide monitoring and research program at UW-Stevens Point (s. 2154(12) of the Budget Review). The Governor vetoed the reference to Stevens Point and, in his veto message, called upon the Board of Regents to determine the appropriate location for the study. Senior Vice President Smith informed the Education Committee that Associate Vice President Dallas Peterson and Senior Academic Planner Albert Beaver had convened a meeting of representatives believed to have major interests in pesticide research. group designated a subgroup which prepared a report outlining nine different research needs and recommendations for managing the project funded under s. 2154(12).

In Education Committee discussion, members raised questions about the involvement of the Union Carbide Corporation as an active cooperator in the program. It was explained that Union Carbide is the manufacturer of Aldicarb, an insecticide used commonly on potatoes. Its presence in groundwater has been confirmed on Long Island, New York, and in Portage County, Wisconsin. corporation agreed to make its research data available to the Wisconsin research team and to cooperate in defining the methodology to be pursued. However, the University System's own scientists would conduct the research.

Upon motion by Regent Lawton, seconded by Regent Fitzgerald, the following resolution was adopted:

Extended Degree Program - report on enrollment, p. 10.

Regent Lawton stated that Senior Vice President Smith had reported to the Education Committee on the enrollment in the Extended Degree Program, pointing out that each of the three programs (General Studies, UW-Green Bay; Individually Designed Major, UW-Superior; and Business Administration, UW-Platteville) exceeded 100 students with a combined FTE enrollment of 370. He also cited the following statistics:

- --55% of the students are women.
- --73% are between the ages of 25-44.
- --19% are over 44; only 8% are below 25.
- --minority enrollments constitute 2.8% of the students.
- --55 countries are represented in the three programs.
- -- the credit load of students over a 12-month period averages slightly over 13 at UW-Platteville and UW-Green Bay, with 9 being the average at UW-Superior.

Dr. Smith observed that it is clear that adults are interested in extended degree programs; but in the present fiscal climate, the prospects of serving a greater number of them remain doubtful. Such programs, he said, require the support of the Regents, the Governor, and the Legislature in order to meet the educational needs of the many adults who would take advantage of them.

In closed session of the Education Committee, the following resolutions were adopted.

He stated his pleasure that these two professorships were created and that the fine people mentioned were named to them.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Chairman Fox reported for the Business and Finance Committee.

The meeting focused on two matters: (1) the final report on UW-Extension Special Studies (on file with papers of the meeting) and the required response to the Legislature, in accordance with ss. 2054(2) and 2054(3) of Chapter 34, Laws of 1979, and (2) a review of UW-Extension's evaluation of the Dairy Sciences Program. In the committee meeting, UW-Extension Associate Chancellor Peter Pere, who served as Chairman of the Academic Advisory Task Force, summarized from a paper entitled "Academic Program Evaluation Policy Refinements" five preliminary recommendations for improving future evaluation processes:

- 1. Clarify purposes of program evaluation.
- 2. Develop specific recommendations.
- 3. Increase depth of evaluation.
- 4. Strengthen external evaluation procedures.
- 5. Reduce time and cost of evaluation.

UW-Extension Chancellor Jean Evans commented to the committee that future evaluations would be made more meaningful through the establishment of these standards.

Those who spoke to the Business and Finance Committee about the evaluation of the Dairy Sciences Program were: Professor James Crowley, UW-Extension and UW-Madison College of Agriculture and Life Sciences, who had led the self study, providing background on the Dairy Program; Mr. Thomas Lyon, General Manager of Midwest Breeders Cooperative, summarizing the work of the External Review Panel; and Professor Melvin Weinswig, UW-Madison Pharmacy Department and member of the Academic Program Advisory Council, summarizing the Council's review.

Regent Fox stated that Senior Vice President Smith reviewed for the Business and Finance Committee the proposed response to the Legislature. Dr. Smith felt the report is responsive to the legislative mandate and that the processes and policies discussed in the report can bring the result desired by insuring reprogramming where appropriate, qualitative improvements where necessary, and user fee levels consistent with Regent priority judgments and public policy criteria.

Regent Veneman stated that he is very much in favor of UW-Extension services because they provide self-improvement opportunities for individuals and community groups, most of whom, he felt, are willing to pay for that education. He viewed these services as job-oriented assistance which makes people capable of achieving more for themselves. "While I'm strongly in favor of UW-Extension, I'm just as strongly opposed to cooperative programs that do not charge fees." Realizing that federal funding is involved and that charging fees would not be practical in some agricultural programs, he concluded that cooperative programs should be "assessed and evaluated for potential application of fees."

In response to Regent Veneman, Regent Fox stated that the charging of fees in some areas where it has not been done previously is under consideration by Chancellor Evans' office.

Regent Lawton said that he opposed Regent Veneman's suggestion, noting that some of the faculty had expressed concern that charging fees would have the effect of denying these services to people who really need them.

The following resolution was moved by Regent Fox and seconded by Regent Walter:

Resolution 2182:

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That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Extension and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the document entitled "The University of Wisconsin-Extension: Meeting the Challenge of Changing Priorities in the 1980s" and its appendices, written in response to ss. 2054(2) and 2054(3) of Chapter 34, Laws of 1979, be approved for transmittal to the Governor and the presiding officer of each House of the Legislature.

Regent DeBardeleben stated his belief that charging fees is quite proper in instances where the instruction given improves a person's ability to derive economic return. "But, I don't want to get on the bandwagon for charging fees for all Extension courses because I think there are courses that don't have any economic implications. And I think there may be a societal advantage (like there is in all forms of education) in getting people to take advantage of the courses. They might not do so if they have to pay for them." He also expressed concern about economically handicapped people being unable to pay for instruction which might allow them to become self-sufficient. "I don't think very many farmers are in that category any more. I don't think such people as lawyers, doctors, accountants and pharmacists are in that category. But I do think there may be people who are, and I would oppose a blanket policy to impose a fee in every case having economic implications." He added that the matter deserves continuing study and that the UW-Extension Chancellor should have considerable discretion.

Regent Veneman agreed that he also would oppose a blanket policy of charging fees without adequate assessments, "but I believe it deserves proper study."

Regent Lawton said he thinks there are many marginal farmers in this state. "And the disappearing number of farms and farmers is testimony to it. These are the people whom we are not going to reach if we start charging fees, and I do not see how you can differentiate by saying 'we'll charge the guy who can, but we won't charge the fellow who can't.' It would be a very difficult policy to apply." He thought that the broad principle of promoting food production capabilities, expressed during the committee meeting, justifies the use of public funds.

Regent O'Harrow noted that it was his understanding that a study of the fee issue would be made. "I'm in the one percent of the population that produces the majority of the food and fibers of the United States and, for those Regents who are not farmers, I think it behooves you to be cautious about making a rash decision to charge for Cooperative Extension." He noted that Regent Lawton had mentioned during the committee meeting that some of the farmers he knew were \$200,000 in debt, "and you know what that means in interest if you borrow money. We're paying 16% for short-term, and 10.5% for long-term loans. Our fuel costs

have gone from \$6,495 a year ago to \$10,000 this year. Truman said that the buck stops at his office. The cost of energy stops at the farm." He felt that the production of food is being threatened seriously by these increased costs. "Now, I pay taxes as you do--county taxes for the County Agent, state taxes for the County Agent and federal taxes, and when Cooperative Extension gives me the results of research, I could pay again. Perhaps we should pay user fees, but I hope we study it and know what we're doing when we make a decision in this area."

Regent Beckwith said that he thinks the sense of the Board is to study the issue. He observed that much of what is said about the importance of providing information to farmers for the vital production of food could also be said about providing information to workers, small businessmen and other segments of society, since farmers are dependent upon the state's economy to produce such equipment as tractors. "In a time when we're desperately looking for ways to fund our university and when we have ever-increasing problems in obtaining money, we should not overlook the possibility, in certain areas of agriculture, of charging fees where they are appropriate."

Put to the vote, Resolution 2182 was adopted.

Regent Comms - - comm to study ut -Ext - - Establishment suggested, p.14.

Regent Fox indicated that, during the committee meeting, Regent Beckwith had suggested that a small committee with Regent membership be appointed to study the fundamental structure and organization of UW-Extension, the organization, funding and administration of its urban program, and user fee experiments and evaluations. It was agreed that System Administration, together with UW-Extension, would bring back to the Board at its July meeting a suggested prospectus for the structure and objectives of such a committee. UW-Extension will also file periodic reports on its new evaluation and priority study process.

In the committee meeting, Vice President Lorenz announced a \$376,000 grant from Kelab, Inc., which receives the net operating proceeds from the Hilldale Shopping Center and, in turn, makes them available to UW-Madison. The six Hilldale professorships approved at the May, 1980 Regent meeting will be supported in part from this grant.

Thirty-five grants from the National Institute of Health, totaling over \$3.5 million, were also reported.

Gifts, grants and contracts this year total \$203 million, \$26 million more than last year, with \$23.5 million of that increase coming from federal sources. Student aid increased by \$16 million and research by \$15 million. Funding for instruction decreased \$8 million. The UW-Madison had a total increase of \$14.4 million, including increases of \$16 million in research, and \$4.6 million in student aid, with a reduction of \$8 million for instruction. Student aid increased about \$11.5 million at the other campuses. This report covers a 12-month period.

Upon motion by Regent Fox, seconded by Regent Beckwith, the following resolution was adopted by unanimous vote:

Resolution 2183:

That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

The bequest of the late Winifred Webster Timm provides \$10,000 to UW-Madison for educational purposes. Chancellor Shain advised the Business and Finance Committee that the funds will be used by the Law School.

Regent Fox moved and Regent Walter seconded the following resolution which was adopted unanimously:

That the bequest of the late Winifred Webster Timm of Cape Girardeau, Missouri be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the will; and that the Trust Officer or Assistant Trust Officer be authorized to sign receipts and do all things necessary to effect the transfer for the benefit of the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Regent Fox stated that the Book A, Supplement, 1980-81 Annual Budget Documentation (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) provides a general explanation of the 1980-81 unclassified pay plan, its administration by each of the System institutions, and the Department of Employment Relations guidelines. The nine percent available for increases is the same as for the previous year, as are the guidelines for its distribution. Authority to set salaries at or below \$53,165 is delegated to the President who, in turn, has delegated salary actions at or below \$40,000 to the Chancellors, while tenure awards require approval by the Board of Regents. System Associate Vice President Gene Arnn informed the committee that average salaries by rank will not necessarily increase by the same amount as the overall percentage increase for continuing personnel. As an example, he indicated that, whereas last year the full professors at UW-Madison had a higher average salary than those at UW-Milwaukee, this year the opposite is true, the different rates of change in the average being caused by different patterns of promotions and retirements.

It was moved by Regent Fox, seconded by Regent Veneman, and unanimously carried, that the following resolution be adopted:

Regent Fox then reported that a review had been conducted of the possibility of charging students a special one-time emergency fee, in light of the serious problems of inflation and underfunding in the non-salary line of the System budget. After extensive discussion, System Administration recommended that no such special fee be implemented for 1980-81, a conclusion supported by the Chancellors. No action was taken by the Business and Finance Committee.

Enrollment Fundins

System Administration Associate Vice President Elwin Cammack explained the relationship of fixed and variable costs. On the basis of current enrollment projections, acceptance of the proposed fixed cost ratios would result in a reduced base budget reduction of over \$4 million by 1985-86. Without changing the formula, the System would be subjected to base budget reductions in excess of funding received during the period of enrollment increases. The following recommendations from the draft report were outlined by Mr. Cammack:

- 1. Improve the accuracy of the definition of fixed and variable costs currently being applied.
- 2. The costs associated with the part-time/extended-day students should be reflected in the formula.
- 3. The five-year average enrollment variable used in computing the formula should be continued.
- 4. Inflation should be addressed outside of the formula.
- 5. There should be modifications to more accurately reflect the costs of shifts in the program enrollment mix of students.
- 6. There should be provision for phasing funding in the event of large unanticipated shifts in workload.
- 7. The funding formula should not be modified to accommodate shifts in fee increase due to a change in mix between residents and nonresidents.

UW-Madison Chancellor Shain then distributed a paper in the Business and Finance Committee meeting entitled "Index of Budget Erosion 1972-79" which illustrated the effects of inflation and other funding shortfalls on the University's base budget. He stressed that enrollment funding formula modification would not solve the problem, but that it would prevent further exacerbation of it.

The committee discussed the inclusion of some factors in the formula to achieve full inflation funding. However, System Administration recommended that inflation funding be handled outside the formula because: (1) the formula funds only incremental changes and inflation affects the entire base budget; (2) without adjusting the base for inflation, adjusting the formula would result in paying back dollars the System never received; and (3) in the November 30, 1979 Report, System Administration agreed to exclude budget deficit issues from the enrollment funding formula reform.

In committee, Regent Beckwith suggested that System Administration prepare 1981-83 budget requests that would accommodate three priorities related to enrollment funding: (1) the base should be restored to the 1972-73 level; (2) the enrollment funding formula should be adjusted in accordance with the administration's proposal; and (3) the revised base should be indexed to an appropriate inflationary index to assure maintenance of the base budget.

System Administration Vice President Lorenz stressed to the committee that this is a discussion paper on a draft report, and he encouraged additional Regent input.

Regent DeBardeleben requested a full discussion of System Administration's view that the enrollment funding formula should not be indexed to inflation. He strongly supported Regent Beckwith's comments and was not persuaded by the argument against indexing the formula to inflation. "I think the history of our efforts shows that, to treat inflation outside the formula has been unsuccessful. We go to the Legislature and ask for money to catch up with inflation. Then we don't get the money; or, if we do get some money, it's so long after we've been damaged that we're getting the money in inflated dollars and there's no way of catching up. I feel that we are getting hurt very badly." He was dismayed that state agencies are being asked to submit preliminary plans in the range of 98% to 104% of the current biennial base and by Department of Administration Secretary Lindner's statement that the University System's target would not be less than 100%. Given the rate of inflation, he considered these figures completely unrealistic. "This Board has the responsibility to protect the quality of this System by requesting what we need. If the Governor and the Legislature want to take the responsibility for not meeting those needs, that is their decision to make." He did not think it proper to submit an inadequate budget in order to comply with administrative guidelines, since the Board's duty is to determine the needs of the University System, including money to combat inflation. Pointing out that the Chronicle of Higher Education recently carried an article about a federal government study which shows that the United States is falling seriously behind in mathematics and science, he stated that more funds should be requested for enlargement and improvement of programs. "We should index to inflation. I support very strongly what Regent Beckwith said, and I think this Board must address itself to this issue before we are seriously into the preparation of the new biennial budget."

Senior Vice President Smith did not think anyone in System Administration would disagree with Regent DeBardeleben's assessment of what needs to be done. "But, I think we do have to do our best in determining the most prudent and effective ways to approach those multiple problems. If too much is put into the enrollment funding formula," he said, "not only is attention to the nature of the formula itself lost but there is the danger of causing it to be counterproductive in unanticipated ways. I think Regent Beckwith's idea that we approach the question of inflation under the category of indexing is something that needs very serious consideration. I think there is a very persuasive argument to say that since tax rates are indexed for inflation, why should we not index the impacts of inflation upon the University?" He indicated that there are a number of costs outside of those included in enrollment funding which are also impacted by inflation, such as state-supported research. "So if we try to solve our inflation problems simply through enrollment funding, we will leave a considerable part of the problem untouched."

"The other problem," Senior Vice President Smith continued, "is that if we're dealing with incremental and excremental effects during a period when the effects are detrimental and indexing inflation is put into the enrollment funding formula, there is the danger of increasing by inflationary rates the rate of give-back to the state when those increases were not made at a time of growing enrollments. That is, there is the danger of creating a formula which will take money away from us at a rate that we were not given it in the 1970s." Agreeing that the notion of indexing and the effects of inflation are crucial, he thought they should be addressed forthrightly in a base budget review. He also felt that very serious deficits in instructional funding must be addressed in the budget generally, but not in the formula per se. "We're not in disagreement as to what we need to do, but it's a matter of how it can be brought before state government in a way that will bring about genuine response to the nature of our problem."

Regent Beckwith said that his point is that the enrollment funding formula is, in fact, based upon a base budget which is an integral part of the formula. "What we are doing by altering the formula but not addressing the problem of future corrosion of the base is that we're dealing with an obsolete base. Admittedly, if you increase the base each year and apply the formula, you may, in a period of enrollment decline, have greater pay-backs. But that would be true as well," he added, "if there is a one-time action to bring the base back to where it was in 1972 in 1981-83 dollars." He also felt that the formula does not include many costs that should be indexed. "I do think it's a problem that should be addressed because the prospect of going to the Legislature every two years or every year to try to get money for inflation is a dismal prospect. And I don't know an economist in the country who does not predict that we will have inflation in the range of 10 percent for the next decade. So it's going to be a continuing problem."

Regent Veneman felt indexing could offset some of the enrollment declines and that figures on its impact should be brought to the Board for evaluation.

Senior Vice President Smith had no objection to an increased impact on the formula if the base is restored first. "But to have an increased impact that doesn't include restoration of the base, I think, is biting ourselves in the back." He said that care must be taken to insure that the desired results are achieved.

Regent Beckwith thought it entirely appropriate that cooperative working relationships between the staff of the System and the staffs of the Governor and the Department of Administration be maintained, and that the Board receive counsel from System staff. "On the other hand, we have a duty to return a responsible budget to the Legislature. The Governor has a right to believe that the budget we submit is not inflated just for the purposes of bargaining. But, more importantly, we also have a responsibility to submit a budget that will maintain the proven quality of these institutions." He added that making those judgments is a responsibility that the Board should savor.

Regent Fox continued the report of the Business and Finance Committee, stating that Vice President Lorenz informed the committee of the anticipated year-end balance which is now projected at \$2.3 million.

Annual Board 6-6-80 united council - action on funding proposal defended,

The committee agreed not to remove from the table the United Council of Student Governments' request for mandatory fees. Since informational material was only recently received by the committee, it was felt that the July meeting would be a more appropriate time for consideration.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Vice Chairman Barkla reported for the Physical Planning and Development Committee.

Approval was requested of concept and budget reports for two major projects. The first is to make the Red Gym, Music Hall and Babcock Hall, all located at UW-Madison, accessible to physically handicapped people. The second project concerns the interior renovation of Merrill, Johnston and Greene Halls at UW-Milwaukee. This project will complete renovation of the Downer College buildings.

Upon motion of Regent Barkla, seconded by Regent McNamara, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Regent Barkla reported that the Solar Heating System Project, School of Veterinary Medicine Main Campus Facility, at UW-Madison had been withdrawn from the agenda at the request of Chancellor Shain, with the understanding that the solar heating system will be bid as a separate "add alternate" in the bidding specifications. When the bids are let and the exact project cost is known, it will be possible to determine whether the solar heating system can be financed from the original funding authorization or whether consideration should be given to requesting additional funding from the special energy conservation project funds which were established by the 1977 Legislature.

Jun-Mon-Bidgs - Solar heating project, Sch Veternay Med.

Requests for approval of two GPR-supported energy conservation projects (a summer boiler installation project at UW-Milwaukee, and a chilled water cross-connect project at UW-River Falls) were presented to the Board by Regent Barkla, who pointed out that the project at UW-River Falls will reduce the operation of a main heating plant there from 16 hours a day in the summer to 12-1/2 hours, resulting in more energy savings.

It was moved by Regent Barkla, seconded by Regent McNamara, and unanimously carried, that the following resolution be adopted:

Resolution 2187: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Milwaukee and UW-River Falls Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authorization be granted to plan, bid and construct the following minor projects, at the cost and from the funding sources indicated:

Regent Barkla then outlined an informational report on air emissions controls at the UW-Madison Charter Street Heating Plant. This study was requested to enable UW-Madison to use coal as the primary fuel in the Plant within the mandates of the Clean Air Act of 1977. In order to use coal as a primary fuel in the existing boilers, equipment must be provided to remove fly ash particles from the flue ash; and the preliminary recommendation of the consultant is to install reverse air cleaned baghouses with associated induced draft fans and other equipment at an estimated cost of \$7,680,000. Additional study will be given to the report by UW-Madison and the Division of State Facilities Management staffs. No action was taken by the committee.

When Bldgs - report on air emission Controls at Charles St Neating Plant, Plant, Plant, Plant, Control of Contr

A preliminary draft of the UW System Policy Relating to Parking Facilities and Transportation Planning was reviewed by the Physical Planning and Development Committee. Regent Barkla explained that the draft is intended to satisfy several provisions of the law recently created by Chapter 221 relating to parking fees, transportation planning, and the development of a comprehensive ride-sharing program for state employees. A policy will be considered for approval at the Board's July meeting, and Regents with special concerns regarding this matter were asked to submit their comments to the System President.

Regent Barkla presented a request for purchase of land at UW-Milwaukee. This parcel is within the boundaries of the UW-Milwaukee 1979 Campus Development Plan which the Board approved in April, 1979. The parcel has been appraised at \$82,000, \$83,500, and \$86,500, with an option secured for \$83,500.

It was moved by Regent Barkla, seconded by Regent O'Harrow, and unanimously voted, that the following resolution be adopted:

The new appraisal, indicating an estimated value of \$10,000 per acre (\$98,000 for the parcel) supported the optioned price.

Federal Legislation

A Wisconsin Study Group, the purpose of which is to influence new Vocational Education Act legislation is now being established. current Vocational Education Act will expire on September 30, 1982 and the House of Representatives is scheduling reauthorization hearings for the Spring of 1981 so that a bill can be readied by late 1981 or early 1982. Since Wisconsin Congressmen and Senators serve on committees critical to vocational education, this will be an opportunity for the State of Wisconsin to bring its viewpoints to the attention of the federal legislators and to effect improvements in the current Act. Consequently the state level agencies are proposing a series of task forces addressing specific areas of concern to the VTAE. Wisconsin has traditionally been active in vocational education leadership and hopes to maintain that stance.

Program Development

The WBVTAE approved 16 new programs recently submitted by the various VTAE districts. There continues to be high demand for new occupationally related programs in higher education. An interesting perspective of future program directions is gained from the list of programs in development stages. This list is attached for your information.

100 Wisconsin River Dr. Certification of Personnel

Considerable time was spent by the WBVTAE in discussion of the final version of the personnel certification code which is about to be presented to the legislature for approval. A copy of this code is available to interested Regents in the Office of Academic Affairs.

District 4 Matters (Dane and surrounding counties)

A considerable part of the May Board meeting was taken up with matters relating to the site selection and environmental impact statement procedures for the Madison Area Technical College comprehensive facility location. This continues to be a perplexing and time-consuming issue facing the local and state boards.

It is my pleasure to ask you to serve on the University of Wisconsin System Basic Skills Council. The Council will be composed of seven representatives from institutions in the University of Wisconsin System and a representative from the Department of Public Instruction, Wisconsin Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education, and a private college in Wisconsin. The director of the Council for its first year of operation will be Professor William T. Lenehan, UW-Madison, who so ably chaired the UW System Basic Skills Task Force, and Sandra McGahan, UW-Madison, who filled the key role of coordinator of the UW Basic Skills Task Force.

I am especially grateful for the diligent and thoughtful work of the Task Force contained in the two documents previously submitted to the Board of Regents: Final Report of the UW System Basic Skills Task Force (May, 1979) and the Basic Skills Task Force Campus Visit Report (May, 1980).

The Council grows out of the unanimously approved first recommendation of the Task Force "that the UW System should maintain a coordinative function to stimulate and facilitate activity in Wisconsin relating to improvement of basic skills at every educational level," and that "the System provide assistance in developing and evaluating efforts in basic skills instruction." As a result of the high visibility of Basic Skills Task Force efforts throughout the UW System and other state educational agencies such as the Department of Public Instruction and the public secondary school system, and as a natural progression from present systemwide entry-level assessment efforts, strong pedagogical groundwork, instruments, and communication lines are in place to accommodate such a coordinative effort.

EXHIBIT C

The University of Wisconsin Basic Skills Council will proceed with the work of the Task Force, using the recommendations as guidelines for project emphases and priorities, but responding to the expressed needs of individual faculty or academic departments to assist with the actual substantive implementation of various aspects of the recommendations. An examination of the formal campus responses to the Task Force report revealed a great need for a supportive and organizational framework that would also serve as a combined resource research center spanning all related statewide activities in the basic skills. As a national example of a comprehensive coordinative effort that elicits participation from an entire university system, Wisconsin would be second to none. The possibilities for sharing on a regional network basis are nearly limitless, and Wisconsin has a long tradition of willingness to reach out and aid colleagues.

If any single concern is of importance to the Council, it would be the concern identified by the Board of Regents at the May, 1980 meeting, namely, the preservation of educational quality in the face of declining enrollments.

The dimension of educational quality contains three elements:

- 1. Timely basic skills placement testing and guidance of incoming freshmen toward appropriate curricular course sequences.
- 2. Assurance that all UW students are capable of meeting minimum basic skills standards at appropriate points during their undergraduate education.
- 3. Assurance that graduating seniors are capable of demonstrating basic skills proficiency at levels expected of baccalaureate degree holders in their respective fields.

In addressing the complex issue of collegiate skills, the Council will operate in the context of campus autonomy recognizing that basic skills decisions can only be resolved by each UW institution in response to its unique mission and curriculum.

The attached schematic diagram identifies the key responsibilities, secondary responsibilities and anticipated relationships of the Council.

The Council will have a director, coordinator and ten representatives. Seven of the representatives are appointed from campus faculty, staff and administration and three will represent DPI, WBVTAE, and the Wisconsin Association of Independent Colleges and Universities respectively.

The Council will report to the UW System Academic Vice President and the President. As indicated in my remarks to the Board of Regents, two of the Council representatives also will serve on the UW System Advisory Committee for Minority Disadvantaged Students. In addition, the Council will cooperate with the already established Undergraduate Teaching Improvement Program.

Responsibilities

The central function of the Council will be to integrate a diverse range of statewide activities and to provide a measure of synthesis and direction. A brief sketch of the most salient activities and services of the Council is listed below.


- -- Continued support of the UW System Enlgish Placement Test (UWEPT), the development of a UW System Mathematics Placement Test (initiated by the Basic Skills Task Force in 1979), and consideration and research assistance in the areas of reading and discipline-specific assessment of basic skills proficiencies prior to graduation. This will require continued and increased liaison efforts between the Office of Statewide Testing and Evaluation Services (located at UW-Madison) and the many UW System institutions that have indicated their wish to participate in a statewide Regional Testing Program. (The recommendation for the creation of such a program is contained in the Report of the University of Wisconsin System Advisory Board on Regional Placement Testing (April, 1979). The Regional Placement Testing Advisory Board will be a subset of the Council.)
- -- Improvement and initiation of curriculum articulation with Wisconsin's secondary feeder schools, including active participation within the existing statewide professional organizations—the Councils of Mathematicians, English teachers, the College Writing Association, Communication Arts teachers, and reading specialists, whose memberships consist of teachers from pre-collegiate and collegiate institutions. Through coordination and communication, working relationships may be structured for influencing a more effective integration of basic skills education in the state. This may include replication of programs such as the Madison Area Writing Project (modeled after UC-Berkeley's seminal Bay Area Writing Project). During its existence, the UW Basic Skills Task Force supported pilot efforts in Green Bay and Stevens Point as well as Madison.
- -- Many institutions have expressed sincere interest in organizing faculty development activities aimed at increasing awareness and sensitivity for necessary new directions in their educational programs and individual courses. The Council staff would provide organizational support and assist in securing financial assistance for intensive long-range efforts in this area, engaging junior and senior faculty members from across the curriculum, providing forums and workshop settings for the sharing of competency and proficiency expectations. Pilot efforts already have been supported by the Task Force at UW-Eau Claire, UW-Platteville, UW-Whitewater, and UW-River Falls.
- The Center should serve as an ongoing clearinghouse for literature and resource materials on all aspects of teaching and evaluation methods in use throughout the UW System and selected institutions across the nation. Council members and Council resource persons will serve liaison functions on their home campuses. An extensive library and communication network already exist.
- -- The staff of the Council and their advisory groups should work with UW System and individual campus committees identifying applicants for faculty development, sabbatical, and undergraduate teaching improvement funds to assure that proposals for basic skills development receive a high priority. Council staff and psychometric consultants should be available to aid individuals and/or departments and schools as they formulate research and grant proposals to external funding

sources, and provide an informed view of the entire UW System's progress and remaining problems so that unnecessary replication is avoided and the most immediate curricular needs are addressed. It is expected that assistance with evaluation of programs and teaching innovations would be available.

The Council should continue efforts of the UW System to work with the employers of our graduates concerning skills proficiencies needed in the workplace and improve the communication of these expectations and the "hidden requirements" between the teaching faculty and the employer, and the employer and the student. A portion of the membership of the Council would consist of the principals involved in the ongoing CETA/GETO (Governor's Employment Training Office) Interagency Basic Skills Program, including those from the Department of Public Instruction, Wisconsin VTAE, and UW System. Presently, the UW System is participating in a three agency—UW, VTAE, DPI—project funded by the Governor's Employment Training Office. It is the first year of a proposed three-year project with a separate Advisory Council. Experience of the first year clearly indicates that it would be better placed and assisted as a subset of the Council.

You have a busy agenda for the year ahead and I wish you the best of success in your efforts. I am especially pleased to inherit the fine work of the Task Force and to recognize the concern and dedication of our faculty and administration. We are continuing this venture in the finest tradition of the University of Wisconsin System.
