Madison, One of the Best Places to Live in America

"Madison, Wis., is not the best place to live, it's the perfect place to live," insists Donna Shalala, former UW Chancellor who became President Clinton's Secretary for Health and Human Services.

It comes as no surprise to Madison residents and UW-Madison alumni that Wisconsin's capital city consistently ranks as one of the top most livable cities in the nation. It owes its picturesque beauty and isthmus setting, surrounded by four lakes, to a centuries-old glacier. As a political, educational and social center, Madison (area population 390,300) offers big-city amenities like cultural attractions and ethnic restaurants, while retaining its small town flavor and warm hospitality.

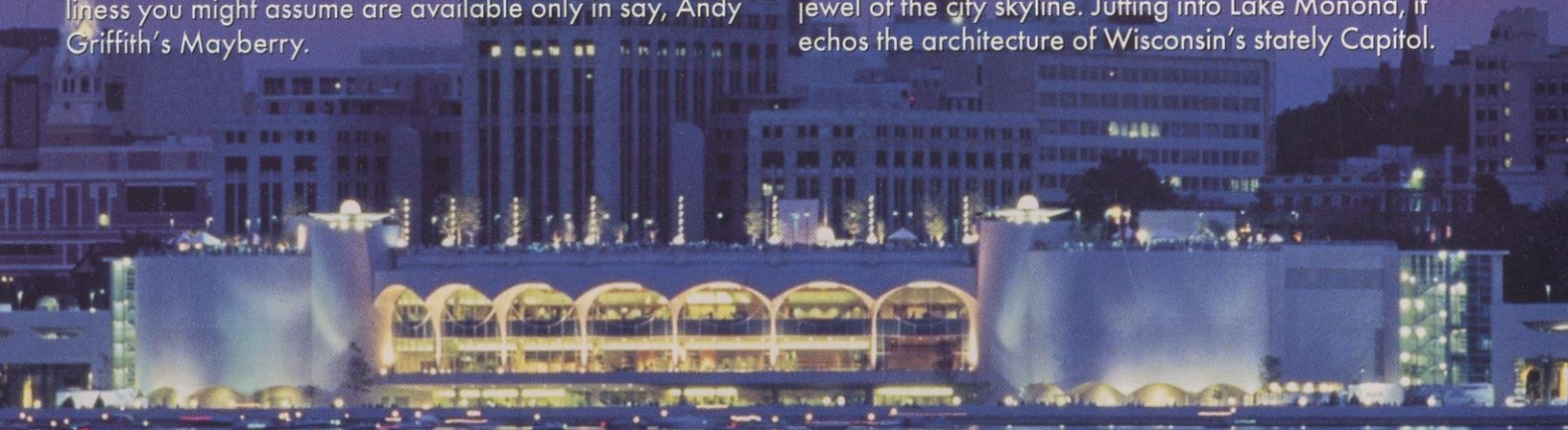
Ranked the No. 1 best place in the country to live in 1996 by *Money Magazine*, Madison was again a top 10 pick ranking seventh in 1997. The magazine wrote, "Madison has a vibrant economy with plentiful jobs, superb health care, and a range of cultural activities usually associated with cities twice as big. This mid-metro area also offers up a low crime rate and palpable friendliness you might assume are available only in say, Andy Griffith's Mayberry."

"Mad City, as locals call it, is also Fun City. The Mendota and Monona lakes are separated by a half-mile wide isthmus that serves as its downtown.

"Madison's best trait, though, may be its healthy mix of people and diversions. Walk along State Street's pedestrian mall and you'll see retiree's, college kids, and boomers in business suits winding their way among the street vendors, coffee shops and New Age stores.

"You'll also see locals strolling in the area's 220 parks, enjoying the farmer's market (on the Capitol Square) or catching an earful at the Madison Civic Center where the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra and Madison Symphony perform."

In 1997, Madison opened the Monona Terrace Convention Center (pictured below). Designed by famed architect Frank Lloyd Wright, it has become the crown jewel of the city skyline. Jutting into Lake Monona, it echos the architecture of Wisconsin's stately Capitol.



Madison is on everyone's short list for ideal places to live. Here is a sampling:

HEAD COACH JOHN COOK

A former Olympic coach, John Cook begins his sixth year as the head coach at the University of Wisconsin. Cook not only brings Olympic credentials but also national championship experience to the Badger program.

Cook has won at every level of volleyball that he has coached. From his days as a high school coach at Francis Parker High School in San Diego to his stint as an assistant coach with the 1992 Olympic bronze medal-winning U.S. men's team, the head coach of the Badgers has proven to be a winner.

In five years, Cook has led the Badgers to four post-season tournament appearances. Wisconsin qualified for the NCAA tournament in 1993, 1994 and 1996. In 1995, Wisconsin won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship with a perfect 6-0 record.

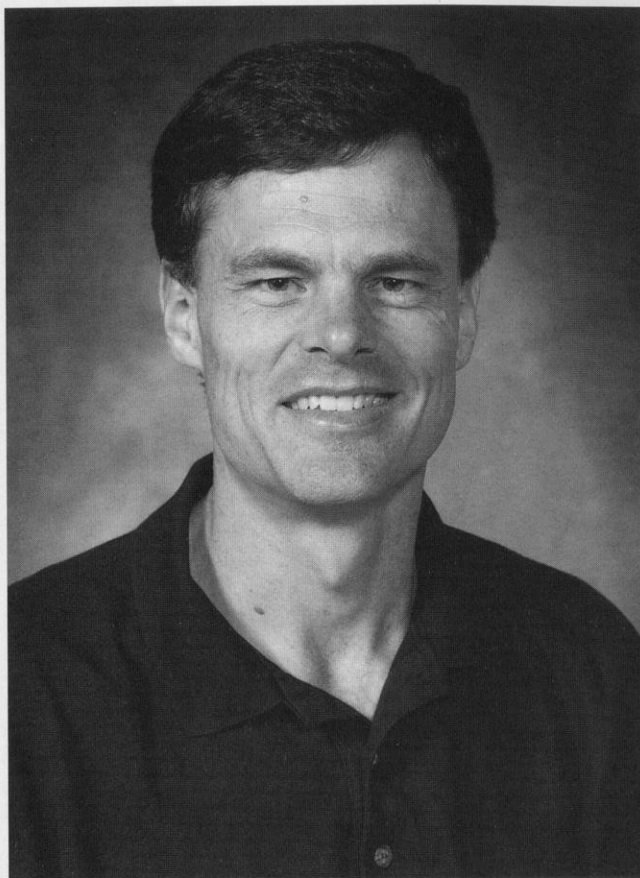
In 1996, the Badgers recorded the most wins under Cook with 25. They also tallied the most Big Ten Conference wins with 13.

Wisconsin tallied its third consecutive 20-win season in 1996. The Badgers were 21-12 in 1994 and 22-15 in 1995. Cook won his 100th career match in 1996 becoming only the second UW coach to accomplish that feat.

Cook has coached one all-American and three all-Big Ten honorees at Wisconsin. He has also had 12 Academic all-Big Ten selections during his five years.

As the first assistant coach with the United States Men's National Volleyball team, Cook aided the U.S. to a bronze medal in the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona. The team's defensive coordinator, he was also in charge of scouting and supervising the team's flexibility, strength and conditioning programs.

For his Olympic coaching experience, Cook was honored in June of 1993 at the



NACDA/USOC Collegiate Coaches Recognition Awards Luncheon.

Prior to his appointment with the national team, Cook served as the head assistant coach with the University of Nebraska women's volleyball program from 1988-91. During Cook's tenure at Nebraska, the Cornhuskers advanced to the NCAA final four every year including a second-place finish in 1989. Nebraska also captured the NCAA Midwest Regional and Big Eight Conference championship each of those three years.

Cook served as the Huskers' recruiting coordinator, scouting chief, strength and conditioning coordinator, and was the liaison with the academic advising center. Nebraska garnered

seven volleyball academic all-America honors during a three-year period, ranking them No. 1 in the country.

As the head assistant coach at the University of California-San Diego from 1983-84, Cook aided the Tritons to a NCAA Division III national championship in 1984 and a second-place national finish in 1983.

In the U.S. Olympic Festival competition, Cook served as head coach of the bronze medal-winning North team in 1989, and was an assistant coach with the third-place West team in 1987.

A co-founder of the San Diego Volleyball Club, Cook served as a coach with the club from 1986-88. The club won two Southern California Regional Championships and finished among the final four teams twice in the USVBA Junior Olympics for girls 18 and under.

Cook's coaching credentials also include leading Francis Parker High School in San Diego to two California state championships. During his six-year coaching stint, he had a .900 winning percentage with an overall record of 162-18, including a 90-match league winning streak.

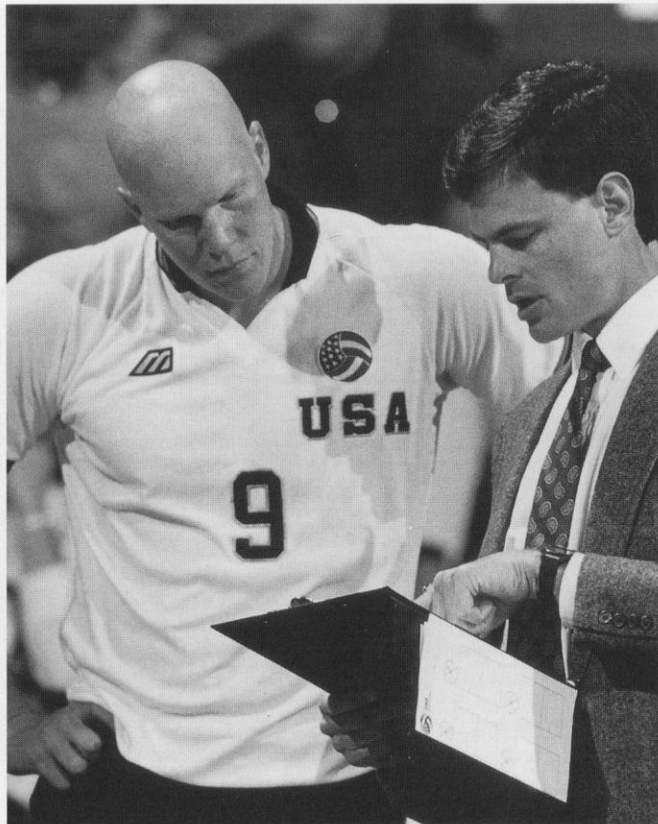
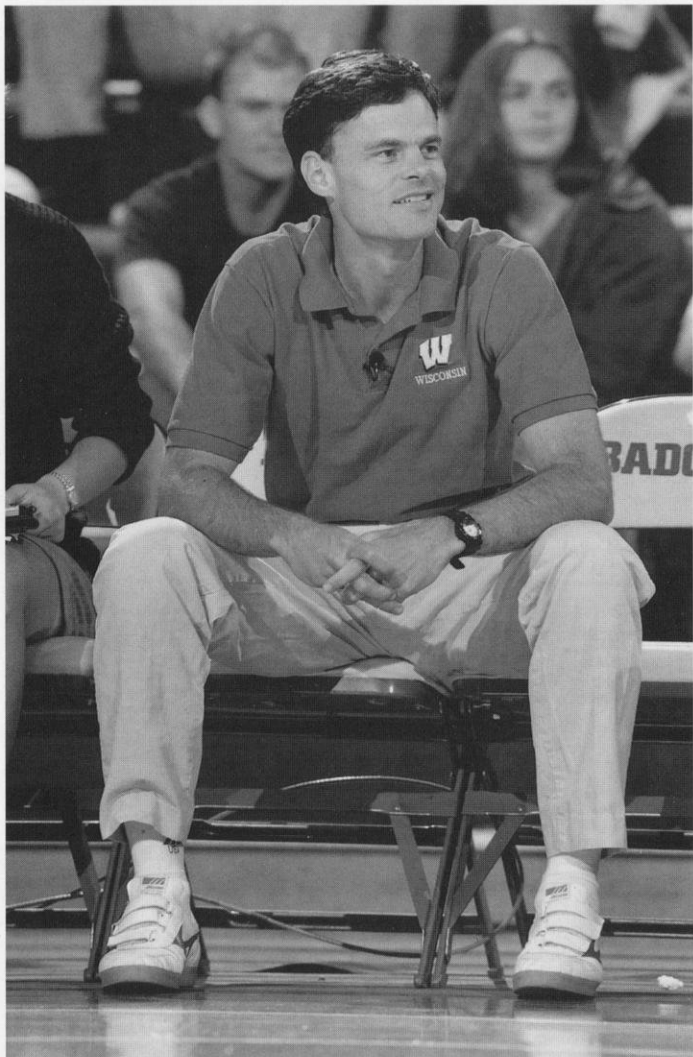
A well-known speaker on volleyball skills, Cook travels around the nation participating in clinics. He also serves as the host of the Badger Coaching Symposium, one of the best attended volleyball coaching clinics in the country, every spring.

A graduate of the University of San Diego, Cook earned his bachelor's degree in history in 1979. He completed his master's degree in teaching and coaching effectiveness from San Diego State University in 1991.

Cook and his wife Wendy, a former two-time all-American setter at San Diego State, are the parents of two children—Lauren, 6, and Taylor, 4.

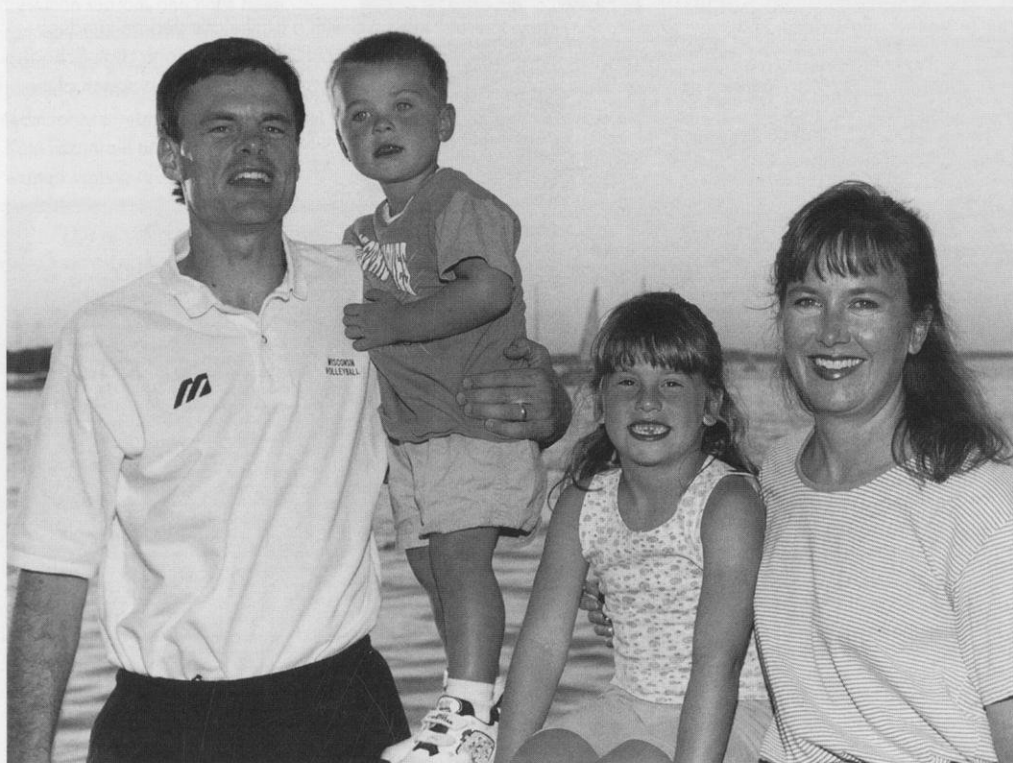

Chris Bigelow

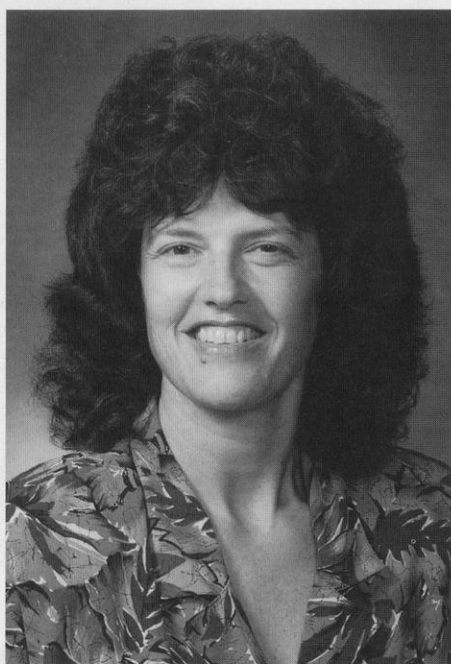
Chris Bigelow, a former assistant coach at the University of Texas, begins her first season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Bigelow served as an assistant under Mick Haley at Texas from 1984-90. The Longhorns compiled a 204-48 record during Bigelow's tenure winning seven Southwest Conference titles and competing in seven NCAA tournaments. Texas won the 1988 NCAA Championship and advanced to the final four in 1985 and 1986 losing in the semifinals.

Bigelow also coached at Montana State University from 1978-82 including two seasons as the head coach of the Bobcats. She was a high school coach for one year at St. Stephens Episcopal High School in Austin, Texas.

A three-sport athlete at Eastern Washington University, Bigelow was a member of the USA Volleyball training squad from 1973-74. Bigelow graduated from Eastern Washington in 1974 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. She received her master's degree from Montana State in physical education in 1980.

After leaving Texas, Bigelow served as a volleyball radio and television analyst while also coaching in the Austin Junior Volleyball Association.



Christy Johnson

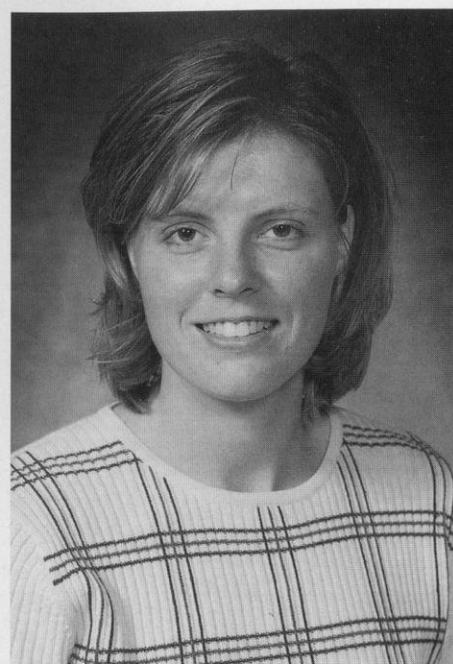
Christy Johnson, a two-time all-American at the University of Nebraska, begins her first year as an assistant volleyball coach at the University of Wisconsin.

Johnson, a 5-8 setter, earned all-American honors for the Cornhuskers in 1994 and 1995. She was the starting setter on the 1995 Nebraska team that won the NCAA Championship. The Cornhuskers made four NCAA tournament appearances and won three Big Eight titles during Johnson's years.

A two-time all-district selection and two-time all-Big Eight Conference honoree, Johnson was also named to the 1995 NCAA Championship all-tournament team, the 1994 and 1995 NCAA Regional all-tournament team, and the 1994 and 1995 Big Eight Conference all-tournament team. In addition to her athletic honors, Johnson was a 1995 second-team Academic all-American and a three-time Academic all-Big Eight honoree.

Johnson has international experience as a member of the 1989 U.S. Junior National team and as a member of the 1993 U.S. National "B" Team. She continued her playing career after college and serves as the 1997 captain of the Nebraska Tornadoes, a women's professional indoor volleyball team.

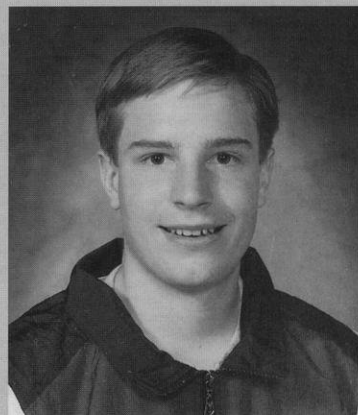

BADGERS ON FIRE IN 1997

The temperature starts to rise in the Wisconsin Field House at this time of year. Heat hovers near the rafters and steam radiates out of the darkened windows. The reason for the rising temperature is the Wisconsin volleyball team preparing for the upcoming season. The Badgers are ready to turn up the heat in 1997.

Wisconsin started to flare up in 1996 when it had its most successful season under coach John Cook. The Badgers advanced to the "Sweet Sixteen" of the NCAA tournament and finished with a 25-8 record.

"Going to the the Sweet Sixteen was a major step for our program," says Cook, who begins his sixth year as the Badgers' head coach. "We had to win a big match on the road in order to get to the regional. Unfortunately, our match against Penn State (in the regional semifinals) was a disappointment. We often talk about that you are only as good as your last match so we have a ways to go. Our challenge will be to improve again this year; the next step will be even more difficult."

The next step for Cook and the Badgers is to improve upon a fifth-place finish in the Big Ten Conference and advance even further in the NCAA tournament. Cook certainly has fuel for the fire this season with the return of five starters.

"Our team is deep, experienced, physical, motivated and exhibits tremendous team chemistry," says Cook. "Our goals for 1997 are the same as every year—win the Big Ten, compete for a national championship and be successful in the classroom."

The Badgers will rely on seniors Heather Dodaro and Amy Lee to carry the leadership torch. Both have been starters since their freshman seasons and have been red-hot embers on the Wisconsin team. Junior Marisa Mackey has played a starting role on the Badger team for two years while the duo of Kate Fitzgerald and Kelly Kennedy earned starting roles last season as freshmen.

"Our recruiting classes each year have been stronger and more athletic," says Cook. "We are now starting to reap the rewards of having a relatively young team with only two seniors, but lots of experience because these players have been on the court from day one. I'm counting on that experience to help us win the close games."

The Badgers lost two players to graduation including all-American setter Laura Abbinante, but junior Colleen Neels has been readying herself to become the UW quarterback for two years.

"The biggest question everyone will ask is can Colleen Neels take Laura's position," says Cook.

"Our team is deep, experienced, physical, motivated, and exhibits tremendous team chemistry. Our goals for 1997 are the same as every year—win the Big Ten, compete for a national championship and be successful in the classroom."

"After what I've seen this spring and this summer in Russia, is that she's more than an adequate replacement. Colleen brings some added dimensions to our team and the way she runs our team. We'll definitely have a different style offense than we had last year which I think will be a strength."

Neels has already shown that she is more than capable of running the Wisconsin offense following the spring season and the Badgers' summer training and competition trip to Russia. Neels' readiness for her new role as well as the strength of the team should make 1997 a hot year for Wisconsin.

While the Badgers were a fiery 12-2 in the Field House last season, they struggled to a 13-6 mark on the road. The strength of the Big Ten Conference is part of the reason. In 1996, five teams competed in the NCAA tournament with four, including Wisconsin, advancing to the "Sweet Sixteen," the most of any conference.

"As always, the Big Ten is no place for the faint of heart," says Cook. "The top teams just reload and usually a surprise team surfaces during the conference race. I don't expect anything to be different this year. Much of the conference race will come down to injuries and luck."

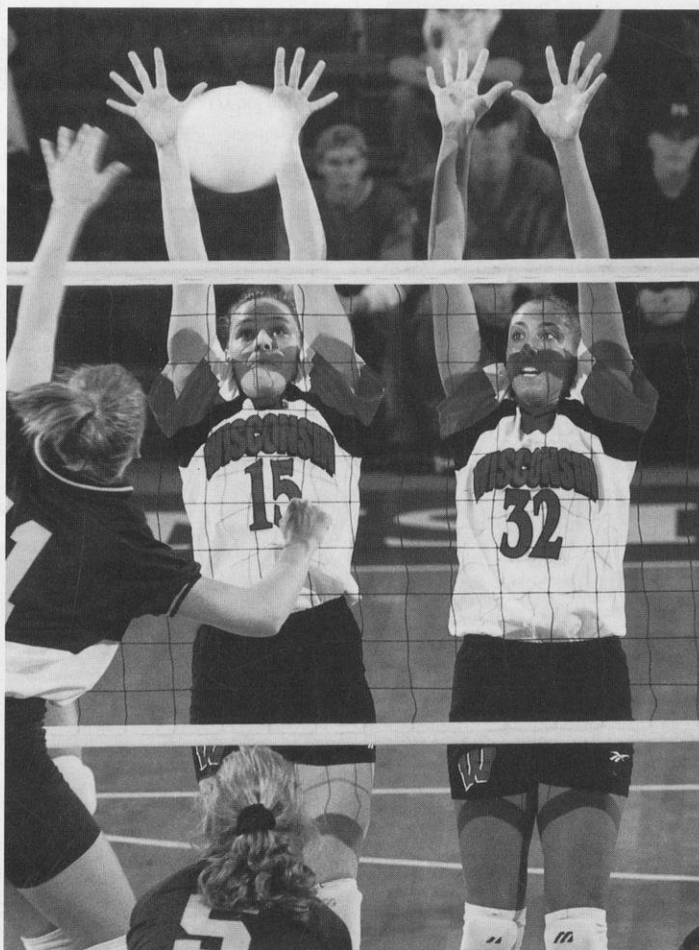
With a little luck, the Badgers will be in the middle of the conference race. Wisconsin is picked to finish third in a pre-season vote of conference coaches with defending champions Penn State and Michigan State picked to finish first and second, respectively.

Not only will the conference season be tough on the Badgers, but they also have one of their most competitive nonconference schedules in Wisconsin history.

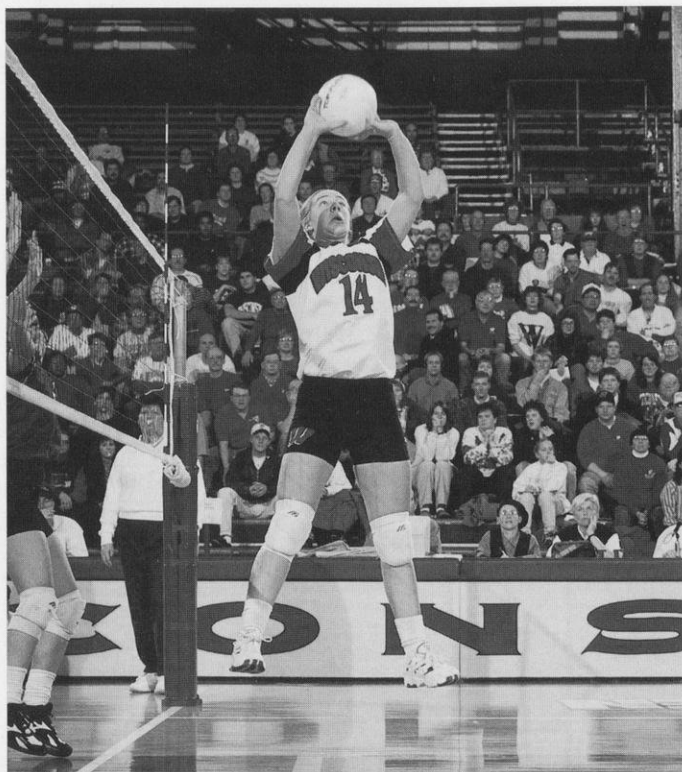
"Our nonconference schedule is very ambitious and will provide some very tough challenges," says Cook. "The schedule is not designed to help my career-win record."

"We have a team that is capable of handling this schedule and winning some big matches against nationally-ranked teams. Playing two tournaments at home is also important when you look at the first couple of weeks of the Big Ten schedule."

Wisconsin's nonconference schedule features five teams that competed in the 1996 NCAA tournament including final four participant Nebraska. The Badgers open the season at the Notre Dame Invitational on Aug. 29-30 where they play NCAA qualifiers Louisville, Oral Roberts and Notre Dame. Wisconsin also competes in the Big Ten-SEC Challenge against Alabama and Georgia before returning home for two tournaments. The Badgers play host to the Inntowner Invitational on Sept. 12-13 featuring Ball State, Pittsburgh and UW-Green Bay. One of the premier tournaments in country will be held in the Field House on Sept. 19-20 when Nebraska, Penn State and Texas come to town for the Wisconsin Volleyball Classic. The Big Ten Confer-

ence season opens on Sept. 24 with the Badgers playing three of their first league matches on the road.

Wisconsin has a head start on its competition after spending 20 days this summer training and competing in Finland and Russia. The Badgers played seven matches against some of the top Finnish and Russian teams finishing with a 3-4 record. The Badgers competed well considering much of their trip was spent traveling or being tourists. In addition, three of the losses were in five games.

"The Russia trip allowed our team to train over the summer," says Cook. "We trained and competed for about 30 days all total. We spent most of that time teaching and working on our systems. I think we will start ahead of schedule and I'm hoping that by the Big Ten season, we will have an edge over our opponents because of our training and experience this summer."

Setters

The loss of a four-year starting and all-American setter would make many teams ice cold, but not the Badgers. Junior Colleen Neels has had two years to prepare for her new role and she's ready to blaze into action. The Pewaukee, Wis., native has missed only five matches her entire UW career, all her freshman season. Neels played in all 33 matches and 112 games last season primarily as a back-row specialist. She ranked third on the team with 29 service aces and fourth in digs with 229. The 5-9 Neels earned starting setter honors in three matches in 1996 including the first-round NCAA win over Colgate. She also set for a match-and-a-half as a freshman when she recorded a career-high 61 assists versus Indiana.

During the Badgers summer training trip to Russia, Neels ran the Wisconsin offense in all seven matches and 29 games. She averaged 12.59 assists per game and hit .296 percent.

As a back up to Neels, a new face joins the Badger line-up. Sophomore Julia D'Alo comes to Wisconsin after playing one year at East Carolina University. A native of Pittsburgh, D'Alo was the starting setter for the Pirates averaging 7.82 assists per game. She was named the most valuable player of the Cornell Invitational and to the all-tournament team at the Campbell Invitational. The 5-8 D'Alo was also named the Colonial Athletic Association Player of the Week on Sept. 16.

"Colleen has been preparing for the setter position for two years and will be ready to run the team," says Cook. "She played an important back-row position the last two years and has played in some big matches. She understands what needs to happen for this team to be successful."

Middle Blockers

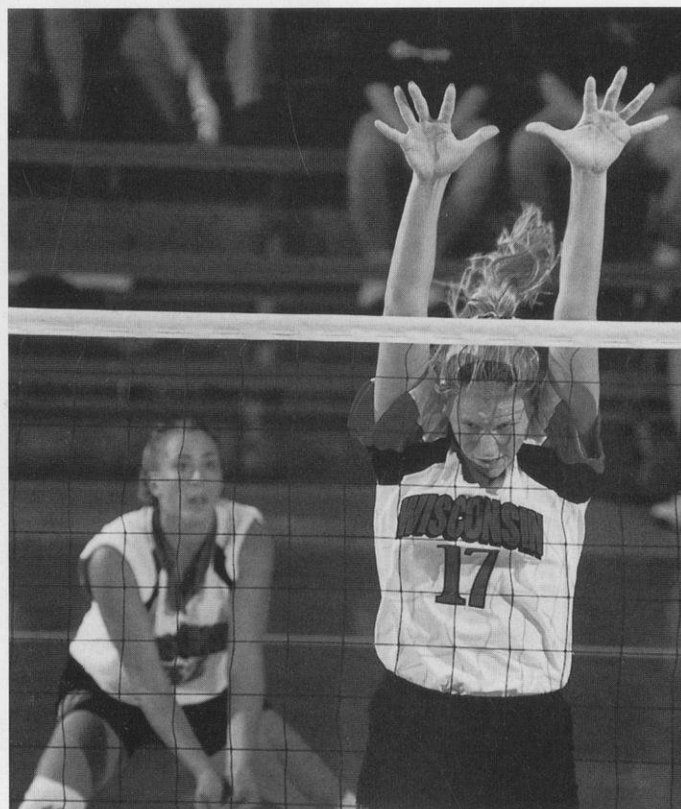
Wisconsin ranked eighth in the nation last season in blocks per game thanks in part to its middle blocking duo of Heather Dodaro and Kelly Kennedy. The Badgers averaged 3.39 team blocks per game which was also second in the Big Ten. Dodaro ranked fifth in the nation with 1.77 blocks per game while Kennedy was fourth in the league with 1.31 per game.

Both middle blockers are back to once again ignite the Badger net minders.

Dodaro, a 6-0 senior, earned all-Big Ten and AVCA all-District 2 honors in 1996. In addition to her blocking skills, she ranked second on the team last year with 3.54 kills per game and second in hitting percentage at .323.

The Oak Lawn, Ill., native is on-track to become Wisconsin's all-time blocker. She set the Big Ten and UW career record for block assists with 500 last season. Dodaro also ranks second on the UW list for total blocks with 557 and needs only 62 to break the record of 618 set by Arlisa Hagan from 1989-92. She set the UW match record with 15 block assists against Iowa last season and the Big Ten season only record for block assists with 113.

Dodaro is also one of the top offensive UW players of all time ranking fifth in kills with 1,092. She has a career hitting percentage of .259, which ranks seventh on the UW career list.



Kennedy, a 6-4 sophomore, earned a starting role as a freshman. The tallest player ever at Wisconsin, she set a season record for individual hitting percentage at .335 percent, which ranked sixth in the Big Ten. Kennedy, from Barrington Hills, Ill., averaged 2.42 kills per game, which was fourth on the team.

"When you look at a team that has two middle blockers at our level, there's probably only a handful of teams in the country that can match up with us in the middle," says Cook. "That's going to be a strength of our team—the blocking and hitting of Heather and Kelly. That's only going to make the outside hitters that much better if we can get the middles the ball. As always it will be can we dig a ball to the target, can we pass a ball to the target so we can set the middle. If we can do that we're an outstanding team."

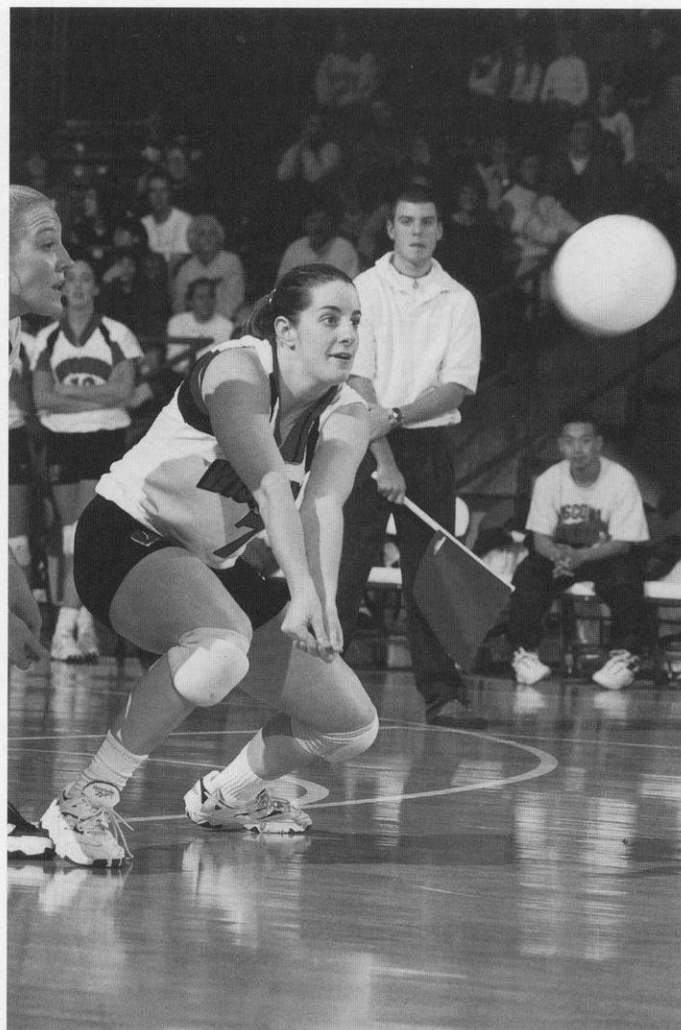
Cook has three other potential middles that will also see action. Allyson Ross, a sophomore from Solana Beach, Calif., played both middle blocker and outside hitter last season. The 6-1 Ross played in 29 matches averaging 2.04 kills and 1.56 digs per game. She set career highs of 18 kills, seven blocks and three service aces against Iowa. Ross could also see time at outside hitter.

Two freshmen will also be challenging for playing time at middle blocker. Jenny Maastricht from Silver Lake, Wis., and Hayley Jones from Germantown, Wis., are all-state honorees who are outstanding athletes.

Maastricht was the 1996 Southern Lakes Conference player of the year. She led her high school team with a .510 hitting percentage while putting down 346 kills. A three-time all-conference, all-area and all-county selection, the 6-1 Maastricht was also all-state selection in basketball and a state qualifier in track.

Jones was a two-time all-conference honoree at Pius XI High School. The 6-1 Jones led her team to a second-place finish in the 1995 state championship and a third-place finish in 1996.

Both Maastricht and Jones played club volleyball for the Milwaukee Sting. The Sting finished third in 1995, and fifth in 1997 and 1994 at the USVBA championships.

Outside Hitters

The Badgers are deepest at outside hitter with all three starters returning and four other talented athletes looking for playing time.

Leading the outside hitters is senior co-captain Amy Lee. The 6-0 left-hander is on-track to become Wisconsin's all-time kill leader. She ranks second on the UW career list with 1,242 and needs only 254 to break the all-time record of 1,495 set by Arlisa Hagan from 1989-92. Lee has led the Badgers in kills the last two seasons including averaging 3.69 per game last year. As a sophomore, she set the UW season record for kills with 628.



"This is the first year that I feel like we have a lot of depth at every position. We have seniors down to the freshman class in all positions. We have a wide range of players that we can go pretty deep in our roster. We're solid in all our positions."

The Milwaukee native is also one of the team's top blockers. She averaged 1.19 per game last season which ranked third on the team and ninth in the Big Ten. Lee finished second on the team with 262 digs and fourth in service aces with 23.

A two-year starter, Marisa Mackey is one of the Badgers' top defensive players. She led the team in digs last season with 3.00 per game, which ranked 10th in the Big Ten. The 5-11 Mackey also led the team in service aces with 0.35 per game, which ranked fifth in the league. Mackey was fifth on the team with 2.25 kills per game.

One of the most potent outside hitters on the team is sophomore Kate Fitzgerald. As a freshman, the 6-0 Fitzgerald averaged 3.09 kills per game, which was third on the team. She was also second on the team in digs with 2.53 per game. The Milwaukee native is one of the best all-around players as she averaged 0.61 blocks and 0.22 service aces per game last season.

After missing most of her freshman season to injury, Keylee Wright is anxious to show Badger fans what she could do. The 6-0 Wright suffered a hip and back injury prior to coming to Wisconsin and played in only 10 matches last season. She averaged 2.00 kills and 2.38 digs per game. The Muncie, Ind., native is one of the most promising Badger players and could be a blazing part of the Wisconsin offense this season.

Ready to show her stuff is junior Pauline Bresky. The 5-10 Scarborough, Ontario, native has seen only limited playing time her first two seasons but saw considerable action during the Badgers' summer training trip. Bresky averaged 1.50 kills, 2.78 digs and 0.56 service aces per game in four matches in Russia.

"We really have six outside hitters I feel very confident putting in a match," says Cook. "One of our goals this year will be to have a balanced attack where we're getting equal sets to five hitters."

Defensive Specialists

Wisconsin has the advantage of having two athletes that specialize in back-row play.

Junior Lindsey Buswell, from Sparta, Wis., played in 24 matches last season. The 5-5 Buswell averaged 0.97 digs per game as a reserve. She is the academic star of the team as the Athletic Board Scholar in 1996-97. Buswell also earned Academic all-Big Ten honors.

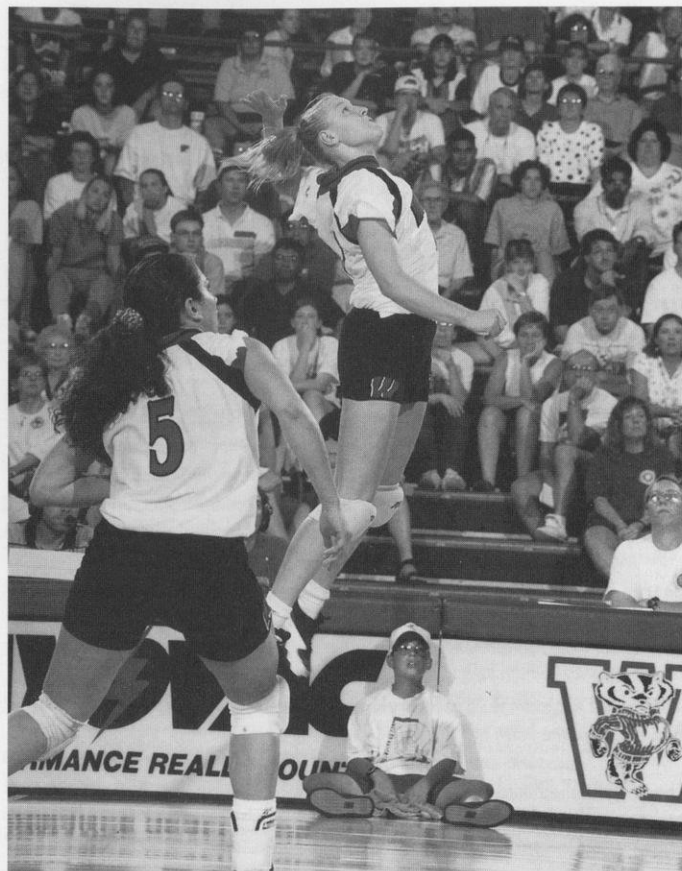
Freshman Jamie Gardner will also see action in the back row. The 5-8 West Bend, Wis., native is a first-team all-state, all-conference and all-county selection. She aided her team to state titles in 1993 and 1995.

"It's going to be fun to watch Jamie and Lindsey compete this year for playing time as back-row subs," says Cook. "They both can really add a lot to our team by either resting players in the back row or starting in the back row. I can see both those people having major playing time in all three positions."

The 1997 Badgers are more experienced and have more depth than any other team during coach Cook's tenure. From the senior class that has competed in three post-season tournaments, to the freshman class that is experienced on the national level, Wisconsin is ready to cook this season.

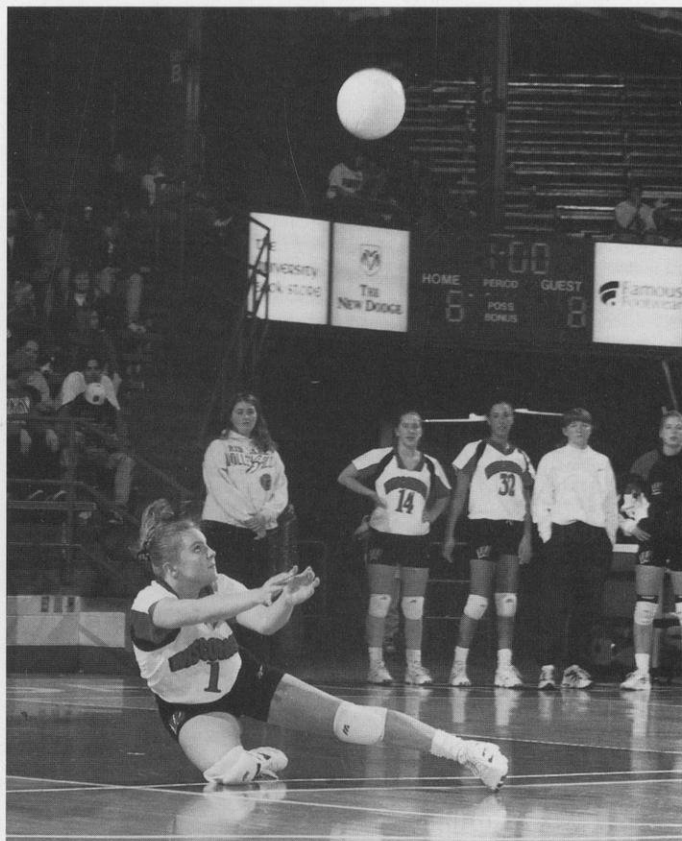

So when you pass by the Field House on a fall evening and feel the heat wave, stop in and watch a blazing Wisconsin volleyball team!

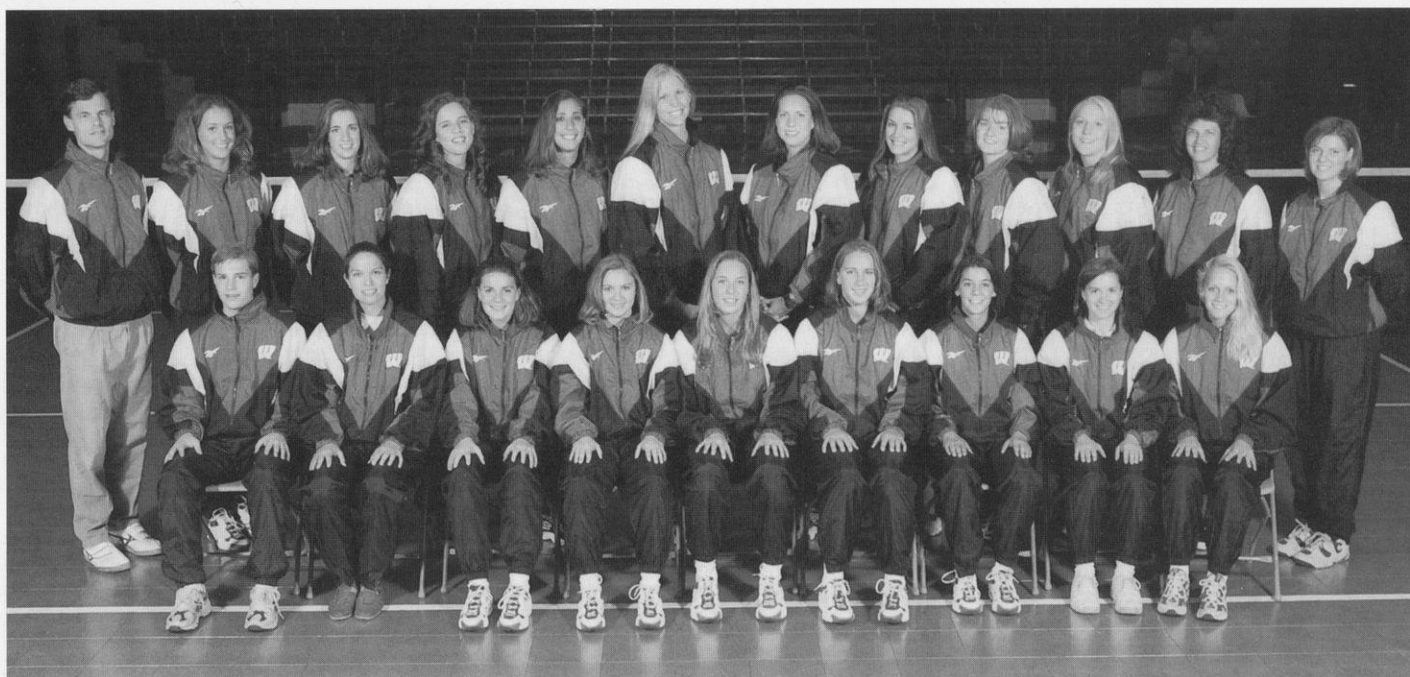


TOP: Kate Fitzgerald earned a starting role at outside hitter as a freshman. She ranked third on the team with 3.09 kills per game.

1996 IN REVIEW

Badgers Advance to Regional Wisconsin advanced to an NCAA Regional (Sweet Sixteen) for the first time since the tournament bracket was enlarged to 48 teams in 1993.

The Badgers defeated Colgate, 3-0, in the first round before downing George Mason, 3-1, in the second round on the road. Wisconsin faced Big Ten nemesis Penn State in the regional semifinals losing 0-3.

Abbinante Named All-American Senior Laura Abbinante was named a 1996 Kaepa/American Volleyball Coaches Association second-team all-American. The honor is only the second ever received by a University of Wisconsin athlete. (Lisa Boyd earned second-team all-America honors in 1990.)

A 5-9 setter, Abbinante averaged 13.32 assists per game this season. She also averaged 1.19 kills per game while hitting .340 percent. The Itasca, Ill., native ranked third on the team with 2.43 digs per game and second on the team with 0.33 service aces a game. She is a three-time AVCA all-District selection and a two-time first-team All-Big Ten honoree.

Abbinante, Dodaro Named AVCA All-District and All-Big Ten Senior Laura Abbinante and junior Heather Dodaro were named to the 1996 AVCA All-District 2 and All-Big Ten Conference teams. Abbinante is a three-time all-District selection and a two-time all-Big Ten honoree while Dodaro is a first-time selection to both teams.

Cook Wins No. 100 Coach John Cook earned his 100th career victory with a 3-0 win over Colgate in the first round of the NCAA tournament. Cook has a five year record of 101-65 (.608).

In 1996, the Badgers recorded the most season wins under Cook with 25. It was also the third consecutive 20-win season for Wisconsin. Cook led the Badgers to a 21-12 record in 1994 and 22-15 last season. With a winning percentage of .781, the 1996 Badgers are the most successful team at Wisconsin since the 1990 (.784).

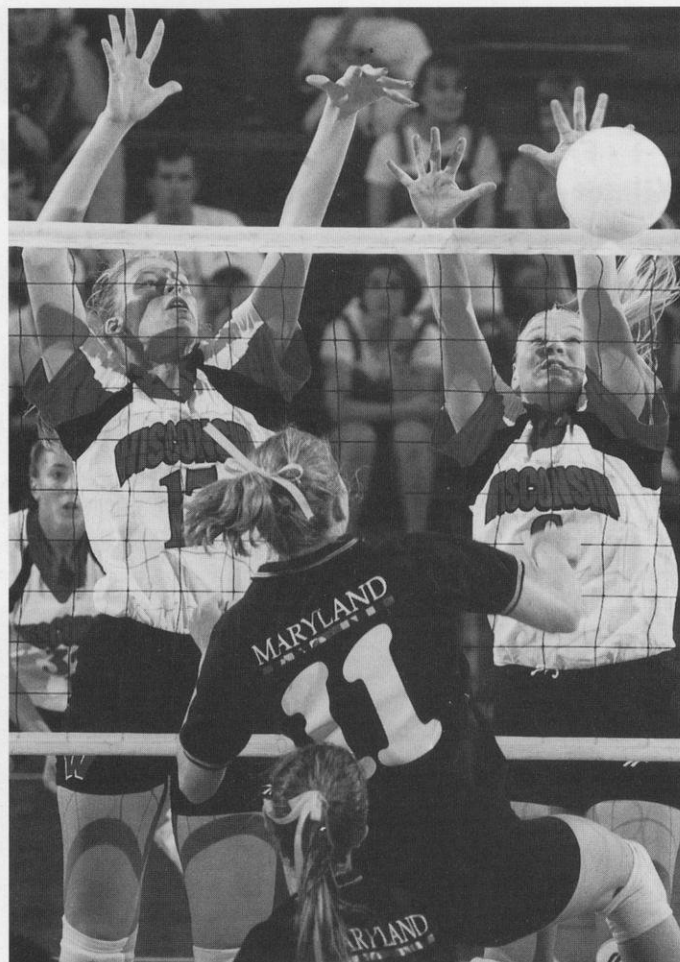
Badgers Ranked Among Top 20 Wisconsin was ranked among the top 20 teams in the nation for a record 14 consecutive weeks. The previous record for time spent in the top 20 was 11 weeks during the 1990 season. The Badgers achieved their highest ranking ever in the USA Today/AVCA Coaches Poll and Volleyball polls during two weeks in October when they reached No. 9.

Dodaro Sets Big Ten Record Junior Heather Dodaro became the Big Ten Conference's career block assist leader. The 6-0 middle blocker upped her career block assist total to 500. She also set the UW conference-season only record for blocks assists with 113 and the total blocks record with 122. In addition, Dodaro set the UW match record for block assists with 15 against Iowa on Nov. 1.

Dodaro led Wisconsin with 1.77 blocks per game, which ranked second in the league. She ranked second on the team with a .323 hitting percentage and 3.54 kills per game. Dodaro became the seventh UW player to record 1,000 kills in her career and currently ranks fifth with 1,092 kills. Dodaro also ranks second on the UW career list for total blocks with 557.

Academic All-Big Ten Five members of the Wisconsin volleyball team were named to the Academic all-Big Ten team. Sophomore Lindsey Buswell, junior Amy Lee, sophomore Marisa Mackey, sophomore Colleen Neels and senior Holly Smith were named to the honor team. In order to be named to the team, a student-athlete must maintain a grade point average of 3.00 or above, be a letterwinner and non-first year student.

Kennedy Named Big Ten Player of the Week Freshman Kelly Kennedy was named the Big Ten Conference Co-Player of the Week on Oct. 7 leading Wisconsin to wins at Illinois and Iowa. The 6-4 middle blocker was Wisconsin's leading blocker averaging 2.44 per game. She had a career-high 11 blocks against Illinois and tied that mark at Iowa. Kennedy was also the Badgers' leading hitter against Illinois (.347) and tied her career high of seven digs at Iowa.

Abbinante Tallies 5,000 Assists Senior Laura Abbinante became the first Wisconsin player to record 5,000 career assists and only the second to record over 1,200 career digs. The 5-9 setter is the first UW player to record over 1,000 assists in each of her four seasons of competition.

Abbinante finishes with 5,833 assists in her career, which ranks second on the Big Ten list and ninth on the NCAA list. She ranks second on the UW career list in digs with 1,246, fifth in service aces with 133, eighth in block assists with 304, seventh in total blocks with 339 and eighth in hitting percentage at .233.

Lee Becomes Fastest to 1,000 Kills Junior Amy Lee became the fastest UW player to reach 1,000 kills in her career. The 6-0 outside hitter tallied kill No. 1,000 on Oct. 4 at Illinois. Lee wraps up her junior season ranked second on the UW career list with 1,242 kills.

Badgers Open Season 11-0 Wisconsin opened the 1996 season by winning its first 11 matches, the best start ever by a Badger team.

The Badgers set a school record for the longest match winning streak with 18 at the start of the 1996 season. Wisconsin won the last seven matches of the 1995 season and won the first 11 of 1996.

Nationally Ranked Attendance Wisconsin ranked eighth in the nation in attendance for the 1996 season. The Badgers averaged 2,218 spectators per match, which ranks third in the Big Ten Conference behind Illinois (2,414) and Michigan State (2,391). Wisconsin had a season-high 3,947 spectators against Penn State, which ranks eighth on the UW all-time list.

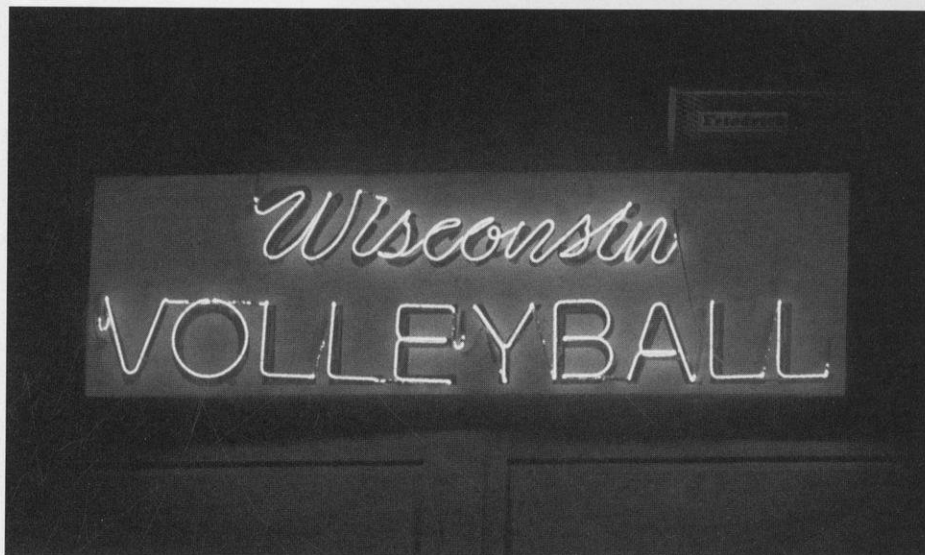

STEVE LOWE MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP

When Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the title in the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first post-season appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title and guided the Badgers to their first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking, finishing 10th in the final 1990 NCAA poll. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball all-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors in 1990.

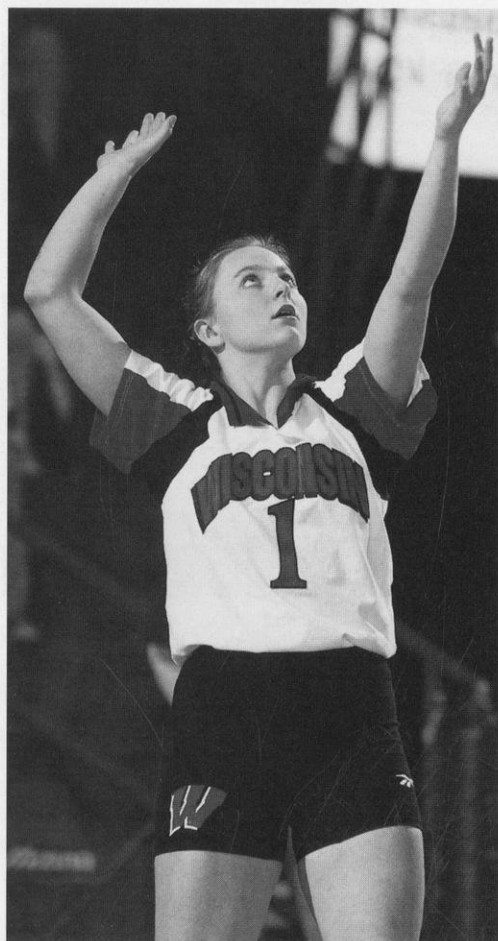
Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Mideast Coach of the Year honors.

Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten Conference home opener will be designated "Steve Lowe Night." This year's match is on Wednesday, Sept. 24, versus Illinois. A Badger volleyball player is also named the Steve Lowe Scholarship recipient with this year's honoree being junior Lindsey Buswell.

A World-Class University

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Founded in 1848, the first class of 17 students enrolled February 5, 1849. Today, UW-Madison ranks as the nation's seventh largest university with 39,826 students. It is one of the nation's largest and most productive institutions of higher learning and the student body is one of the most diverse in the country with students coming from every state. Wisconsin also ranks fourth in the nation for foreign student enrollment.

More than 4,571 courses and 12,861 sections are offered in UW-Madison's 12 schools and colleges. Majors are available in 145 undergraduate, 171 master's, and 124 doctoral and professional degree programs.

Award-winning research spanning the academic disciplines has earned UW-Madison a place among the world's elite institutions of higher education. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. The quality of its undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized around the world.

One survey rated 49 different undergraduate programs at UW-Madison among the top 10 in the nation. Among those ranked include sociology,

business, German, chemical engineering, geography, ecology, genetics, statistics, molecular biology and biochemistry, French, Spanish, political science, industrial engineering, computer science, chemistry, mathematics, and history.

UW-Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 13 Nobel Prizes and 22 Pulitzer Prizes. There are 44 faculty members who are winners of Presidential Young Investigator awards, nine winners of the National Medal of Science, and four Searles scholars. Forty-six professors are members of the National Academy of Sciences, 15 are members of the National

Academy of Engineering, three in the National Academy of Education and 48 are fellows in the American Physical Society.

UW-Madison is one of the nation's first land-grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life science. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" as making "the beneficent influence of the university available to every home in the state."

UW-Madison is the largest institution in the University of Wisconsin System. It has the only public law and medical schools in the state as well as the only school of veterinary medicine.

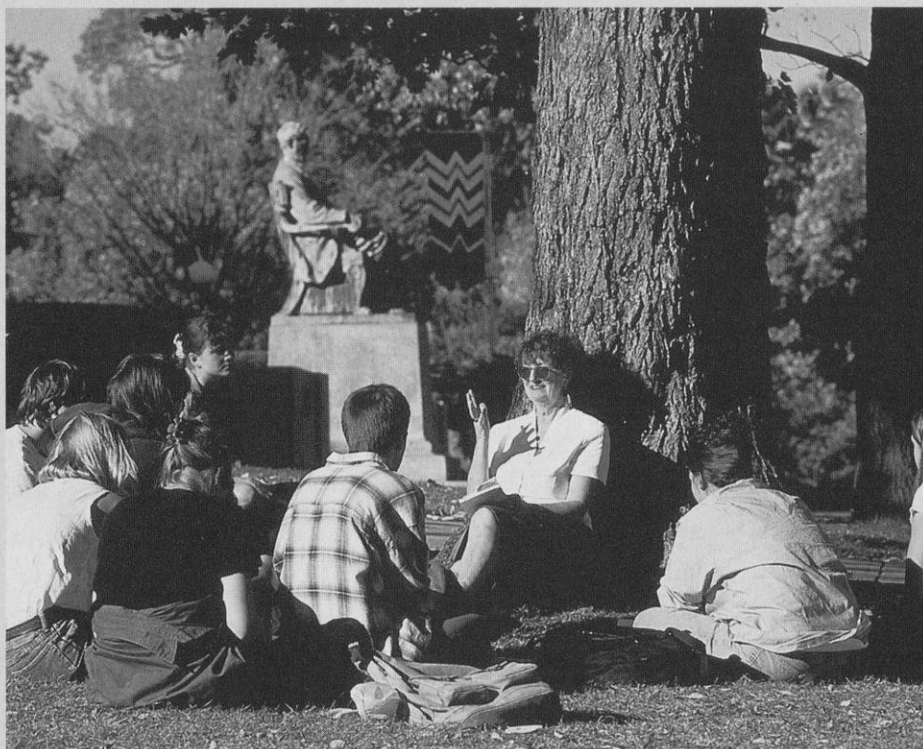

A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison covers 929 acres along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty. The city of Madison is frequently listed among the top five best places to live in the nation.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; the Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

A favorite area for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Lake Mendota.

The Student Body

Almost 40,000 students populate the UW campus, including more than 10,900 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from 119 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 1995, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted for more than nine percent of the student body.

The Community

Located in southern Wisconsin, Madison is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital.

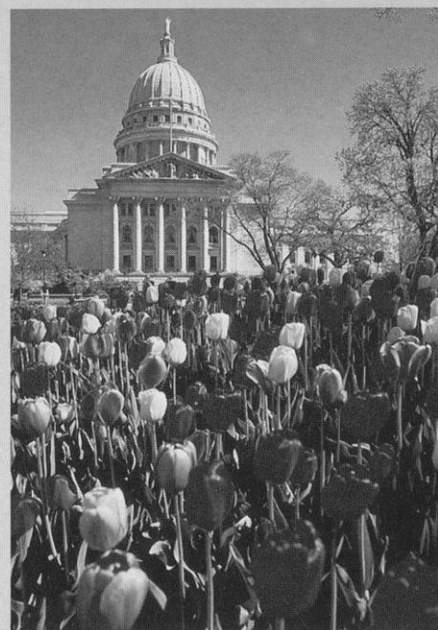
With a diverse population of 200,814, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family and action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports, and recreational activities.

Madison was named the best place to live in America in 1996 by *Money* magazine. The July 1995 issue of *Outside* magazine called Madison a "Dream Town". The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. *U.S. News and World Report* named it one of the country's 10 Hottest Cities. Madison was also featured on the front page of the life section of *USA Today* on July 12, 1995.



WHERE WISCONSIN RANKS

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top 10 lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

The *1996 Fiske Guide to Colleges*, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of only eight public institutions in the country to receive the five-star rating. In 1995, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison as tied for third for academic reputation among public universities and 17th among all universities.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW-Madison among the top 10 in the nation. Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



Funding and Support

► **Federal Grants:** UW-Madison received over \$265 in federal awards in 1996.

► **Research and Development Funds:** UW-Madison ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1996, with \$423 million, according to the National Science Foundation.

► **Tuition:** Over the last 10 years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.

► **Private Support:** UW-Madison ranked fifth in the nation, and first among public institutions in 1996-97 by receiving nearly \$320 million in private support.

► **Alumni:** UW-Madison's independently financed alumni group is the No. 1 ranked group in the Midwest and the second largest in the U.S.

► **Internet:** UW-Madison was named one of the Most Wired Colleges by *Yahoo! Internet Life* magazine, finishing 39th.

Degrees

► **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1996 survey lists the University of Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees.

► **Doctoral Degrees:** UW-Madison is a national leader in number of doctoral degrees awards ranking third in 1996. Between the school's founding and 1996, the University of Wisconsin-Madison awarded 31,922 Ph.D.s.

Departmental Academic Rankings

► **Liberal Arts:** In its ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1996, *U.S. News & World Report* cited UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked education fifth; library science sixth; social work seventh; psychology and political science ninth; and history 10th.

► **Science Programs:** According to *U.S. News and World Report's* annual graduate school ratings, published in 1996, six UW-Madison science programs ranked in the top 10: computer science, 10th; chemistry, 10th; and nursing, 10th.

► **Education:** The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1994. The UW's educational administration and elementary education rank second.

► **Film and TV:** *The College Finder* ranked UW-Madison as one of the top 35 schools in the nation for studying film and television.

► **College of Agricultural and Life Sciences:** In 1993, the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences was ranked one of the top 10 agricultural schools in the country according to *Farm Futures* magazine.

► **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 14th largest university library collection in the United States, with more than 5.5 million books in 50 locations across campus.

► **Business:** The School of Business' undergraduate program ranks seventh in the nation according to *U.S. News & World Report* (1996). The MBA program ranks in the top five percent and the real estate program ranks third.

Business Week ranked the school among the top 50 business schools in the nation.

Computerworld ranked the business school's Information Systems program as one of the top 25 in the nation.

► with launching the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space

► in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the age-old compound urea during brain surgery on a human (1957)

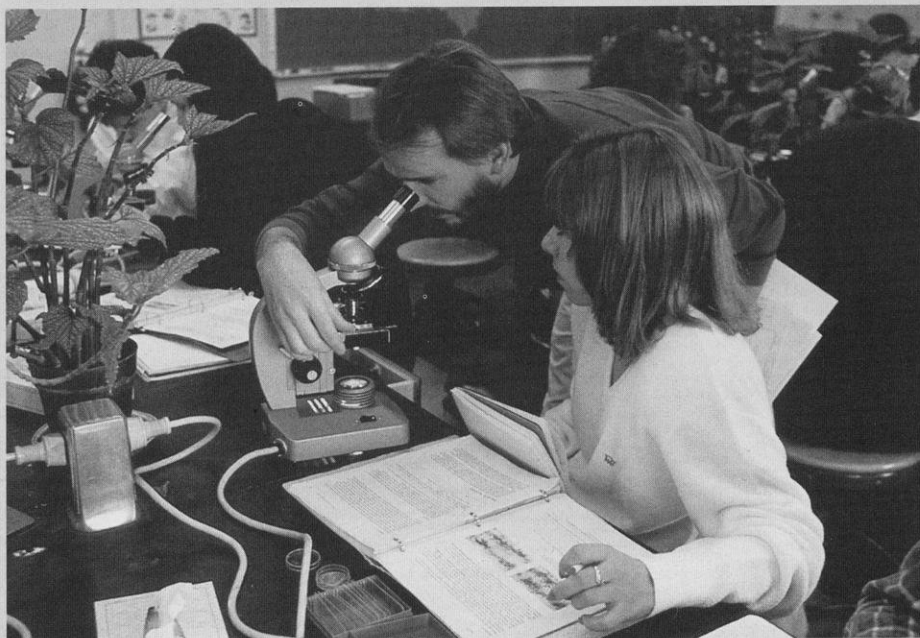
► in laying the foundation for the U.S. Food and Drug Administration adoption of Sun Protection Factor (SPF) on sunscreens (1960)

► National Organization for Women is first housed in Kathryn Clarenbach's faculty office on UW-Madison campus

► in developing new techniques to measure bone tissue loss, known as osteoporosis

► with the Biotron, a research building that can control environmental conditions for experimental purposes

► with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. A UW team also discovers how



to predict the success of bone marrow transplants by matching genes.

► in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharin and cyclamates

► in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously

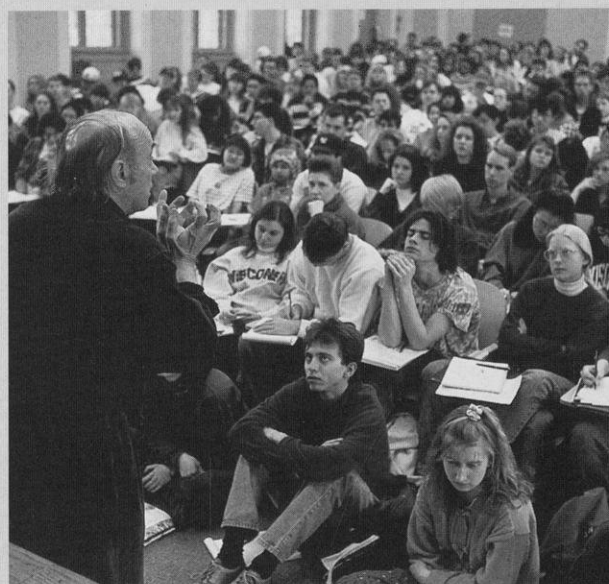

David Ward

David Ward was named chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison in June 1993.

Ward has provided strong leadership for efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education. Changes inspired by Ward include: enhanced student advising, particularly for freshmen and sophomores; expanded course access; a core curriculum; and increased opportunities for undergraduates to conduct research.

The next step, says Ward, is to redefine undergraduate education, not simply through improvements of existing programs and process, but by developing new ways for learning to occur on college campuses. To that end, he recently published a comprehensive strategic planning document, outlining priorities for the next decade as the university works toward balancing its teaching, research and outreach missions.

During his tenure, Ward has given new expression to The Wisconsin Idea, the venerable philosophical framework for the university's public service role.

"The university's commitment to the citizens of Wisconsin is stronger than ever as we approach the 21st century," says Ward.

Ward was born in Manchester, England, and received bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Leeds. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960 and received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963.



Jim Hoyt

Jim Hoyt, a professor in the UW's School of Journalism and Mass Communication, has served as the chair of the UW Athletic Board since 1991. He has also served as a UW Faculty Representative to the Big Ten Conference, NCAA and Western Collegiate Hockey Association during that time.

As the chair of the Athletic Board, Hoyt oversees the 24-member governing body that supervises the day-to-day running of the athletic department. As a faculty representative, he serves on the rules and legislation committee, and television advisory committee for the Big Ten, and chairs the executive committee of the WCHA.

Hoyt has served as a professor since 1981. From 1981 to 1991, he was the director of the School of Journalism and Mass Communication. During his tenure as director, he served as a part-time news consultant to a number of television stations including NBC News in New York.

Hoyt received his bachelor's, master's and Ph.D. from UW-Madison.



Pat Richter

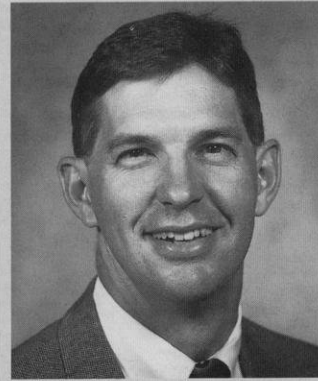
Pat Richter, the guiding force behind University of Wisconsin Athletics, is a former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman. As such, he was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

He was an all-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team, and has since been inducted into the National Football Foundation College Hall of Fame and the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame. Richter also earned Academic all-America honors in 1962, and was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963.

He earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964, and returned to the UW where he received his law degree in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame, and was honored as an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award winner for post-college achievements.

Richter enjoyed a long and distinguished career as a standout with the National Football league's Washington Redskins, 1963-71. After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., and worked his way up to vice president of personnel.

Richter has the essential experience as a student, athlete and administrator. He is committed to excellence in the classroom, on the playing field, and to providing UW student-athletes with an undergraduate experience they will cherish the rest of their lives.



Al Fish

Al Fish begins his ninth year as the administrative officer for the division overseeing facility planning, event management, personnel, sports medicine, strength and conditioning, technical services, equipment services and the University Ridge Golf Course. He also serves as liaison to the Athletic Board, and to campus and state governments.

Fish is currently coordinating the planning for the \$76.4 million Kohl Center, a multi-use sports facility scheduled to open in January, 1998. Future projects include the Goodman Softball Complex, and new and expanded rowing facilities.

In 1989, Fish came to the division after three years as the Director of Policy and Budget for the Department of Health and Social Services. He worked previously as a liaison for Governor Tony Earl to the State Assembly, a budget analyst for the State Budget Office, and as a program evaluator for the Legislative Audit Bureau.

A 1973 graduate of Luther College in Decorah, Iowa, Fish was a four-year letterwinner in golf.





Cheryl Marra

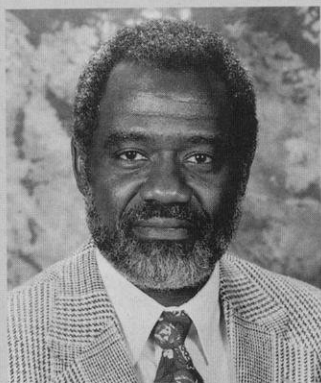
Cheryl Marra begins her eighth year as an associate athletic director at Wisconsin. Marra oversees the men's and women's programs of basketball, golf, soccer, tennis, swimming and diving, and women's volleyball. She also serves as the primary women's athletic administrator to the Big Ten Conference and the NCAA.

A 1977 graduate of Slippery Rock State College with a bachelor's degree in physical education and health, Marra received her master's degree in physical education from Ohio State in 1983.



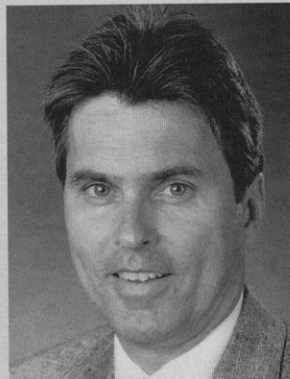
Mike Moss

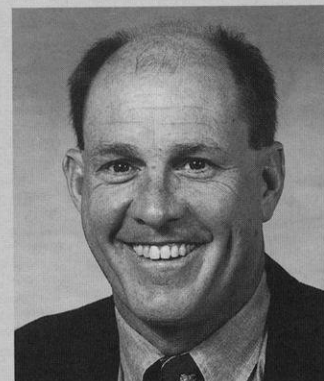
Vince Sweeney

In his second season as athletic ticket director, John Sheffield supervises a full-time staff of nine which issue season and single event tickets for all men's and women's home events.

Sheffield comes to Wisconsin from Florida State where he was the chief administrator for the Seminoles Athletic Ticket Office from 1983-95. He oversaw annual ticket sales of more than \$8 million, and also handled advance team travel arrangements for the FSU football team.

Sheffield implemented the Seminole Booster ticket priority seating plans for football and basketball, and he is working closely with the ticketing procedures for the Kohl Center.

Prior to Florida State, Sheffield was the ticket director for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers from 1978-83. He has served as a special assistant for ticket operations at the last 18 Super Bowls.



UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN ATHLETICS

The University of Wisconsin-Madison offers its student-athletes one of the premier inter-collegiate athletic programs in the country.

As a member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, athletic opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

With a number of sports begun more than 100 years ago, men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 11-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, lightweight rowing, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 25 NCAA Division I programs for the past three years. In 1996-97, Wisconsin finished 24th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports programs in the nation.

Thirteen of Wisconsin's 22 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships. The women's track team tied for second at the 1997 NCAA Indoor Championship while the men's track team tied for fourth at the 1997 NCAA Outdoor Championship. Badger athletes won four individual NCAA titles while 28 earned 37 all-American honors. Teams qualifying for post-season tourna-

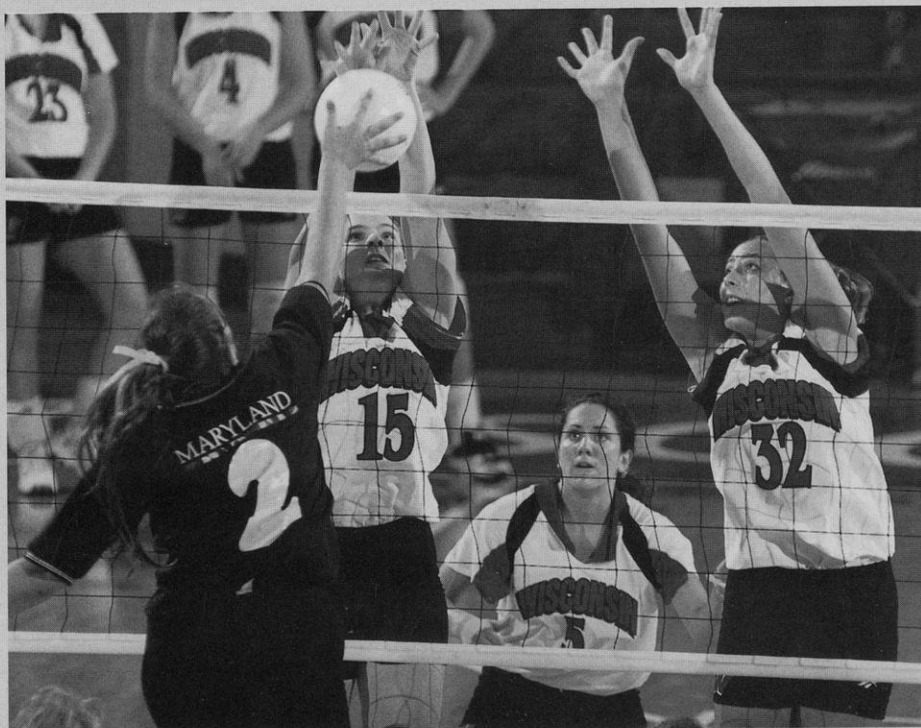

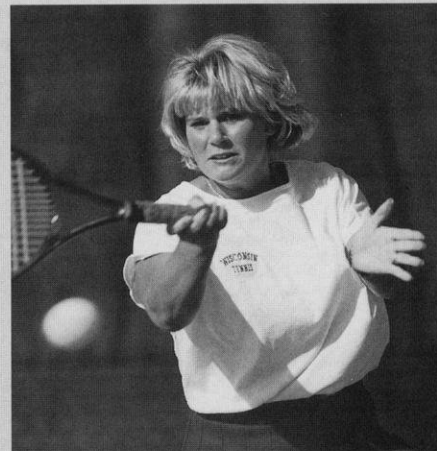

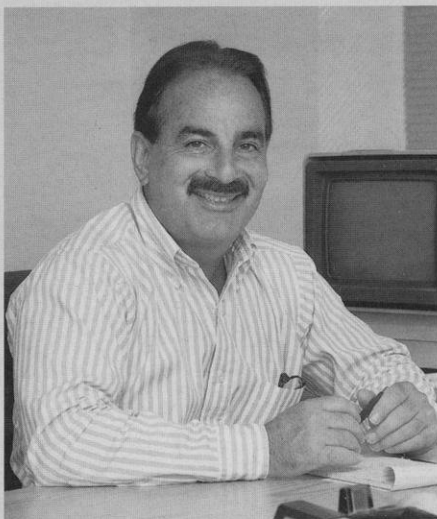
Academic & Student Services

The mission of the Academic Affairs Office is to provide student-athletes with the maximum opportunity for academic and athletic excellence. University of Wisconsin athletes have a history of academic success and much of the credit for that impressive record is the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director **Alan Zussman** supervises a staff of six advisors which conduct the program offered to the nearly 700 student-athletes. The advising staff of **Mary Weaver-Klees, Craig Hudson, Christine Sayler, Doug Tiedt, Liane Kosaki** and **Jerry Darda** have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all university departments. The staff renders quality academic and personal support to student-athletes and assist coaches in providing the best possible collegiate experience.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes at Wisconsin may receive recognition for outstanding academics in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board names Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center

Opened in the spring of 1997, the Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Center is the newest aid to Wisconsin student-athletes in achieving their academic goals.

The 15,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art facility serves the needs of all men and women student-athletes. The center features an open area with carrels that can accommodate up to 30 students. There are 11 study rooms of differ-

ent shapes and sizes including a 55-seat auditorium. A computer room houses 22 PC's while the entire center is wired with voice/data jacks and power ports.

Student-athletes can drop in before practice or between classes to study or meet with the counselors and grant-in-aid staff whose offices are also located in the center.



The Fetzer Student Athlete Academic Services center, a state-of-the-art facility located in the lower level of the McClain Center, opened in 1997. The \$2.1 million center is one of the best of its kind in the nation and includes 11 study rooms, a computer room, and a 55-seat auditorium.

Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year renewable basis if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of men's rowing, which does not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

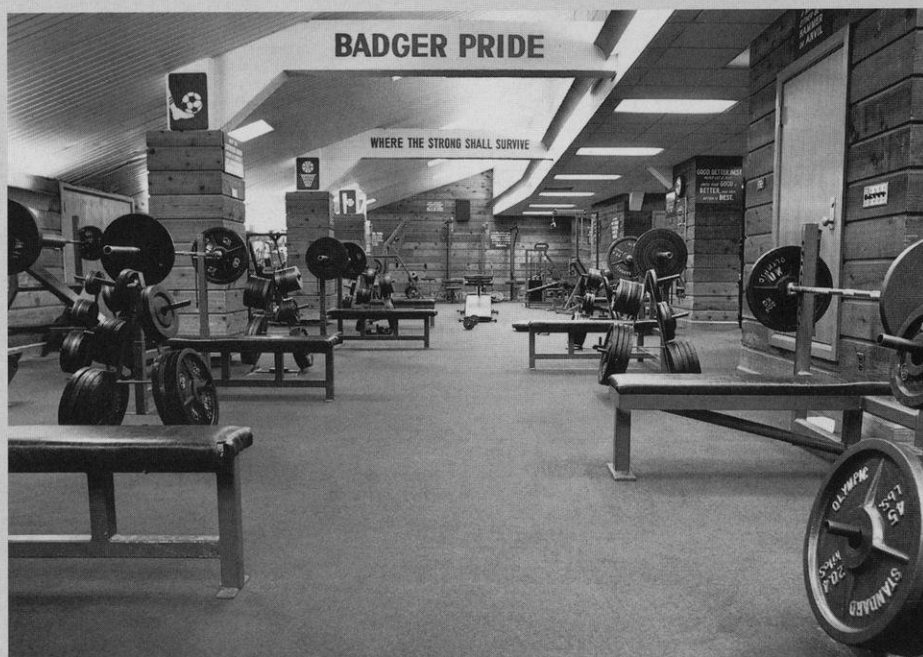

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete.

Weight training areas in the McClain Center and Camp Randall Stadium feature free weights and stereo music in spacious, carpeted rooms. Four full-time and two part-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes. Head strength and con-

ditioning coach **John Dettmann** along with assistant coaches **Chris Doyle, Steve Myrland, Scott Hettenbach** and **Christine Heinrich** work with the individual sport coaches to develop programs specific for that sport. The UW also offers a sports nutrition program to assist athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals.



Wisconsin student-athletes also utilize the strength and conditioning area in Camp Randall Stadium to meet their performance goals.



Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a staff of eight full-time and three graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Under the direction of head athletic trainer **Dennis Helwig**, the Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members **Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Mike Johnson, Barb Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Heidi Stettler**, and **Andy Winterstein** utilize functional measures, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

The Sports Medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane-rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with the UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director **Dr. Ben Graf** is responsible for all services

provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician Dr. John Orwin while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, Dr. Greg Landry.

In addition to the headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic train-

ing rooms are located in the Stadium, Coliseum, Natatorium, UW Field House and the soon-to-be-completed Kohl Center. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

Sports Information

Directing the communications for the 22 sports in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is the responsibility of the University of Wisconsin Sports Information Offices.

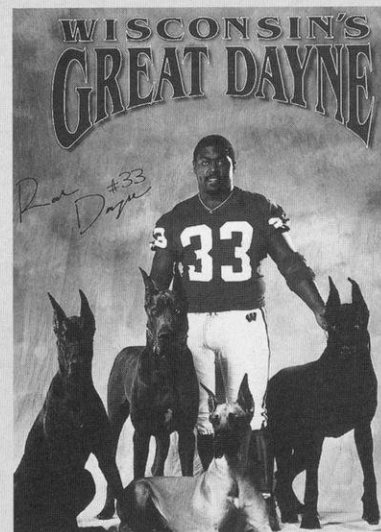

WISCONSIN SPORTS FACILITIES

Athletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from outstanding sports facilities. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its athletes.

The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 11,500, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger basketball, wrestling and volleyball teams. The Field House features four locker rooms, an athletic training area and state-of-the-art scoreboard, sound and lighting systems.

Opening in January of 1998, the Kohl Center, the future home of the Badger basketball and hockey teams, will be among the finest on-campus athletic facilities in the nation. The \$76 million facility will seat 16,500 for basketball. Included in the building is a separate practice gym, locker rooms and lounge areas, and coaches' offices. The multi-functional facility will also host a variety of concerts, graduations and state high school championships throughout the year.

The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell, located next to Camp Randall Stadium, is a multi-purpose facility. A newly resurfaced 200-meter Martin rubber track surrounds four basketball/volleyball courts that double as throwing and jumping areas for indoor track meets. With a seating capacity of 2,500, the Shell is the site of a numerous track meets.

One of the most versatile buildings is the McClain Athletic Facility. Over 76,000 square feet of artificial turf offers the ideal indoor practice facility for football, soccer and track. The lower level features the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine staff and a fully-equipped weight room. Locker rooms for football, and men's and women's track are also located on the lower level.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have the competitive advantage of playing year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators. The stadium

is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

The Wisconsin track teams practice and compete at the Dan McClimon Memorial Track, located at the west end of campus. Named for the former UW men's coach, the track features a newly resurfaced 400-meter Martin rubber track.

An Olympic size, natural grass soccer field inside the track is the competition home of the soccer teams. The track and soccer facility, which is fully lighted, was completed during the fall of 1993. Building permanent seating with locker rooms and a media facility is scheduled to begin in the future.

The swimming and diving teams have the luxury of two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility.

The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

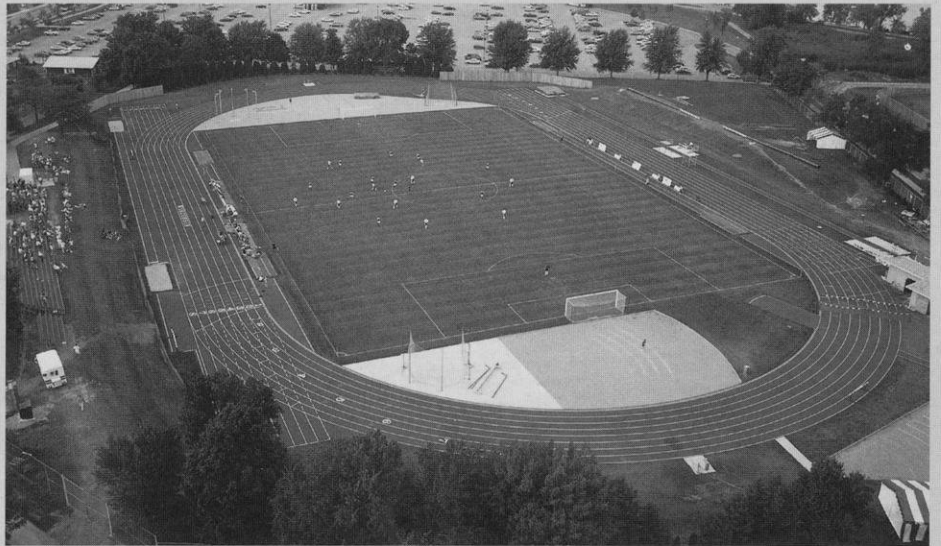

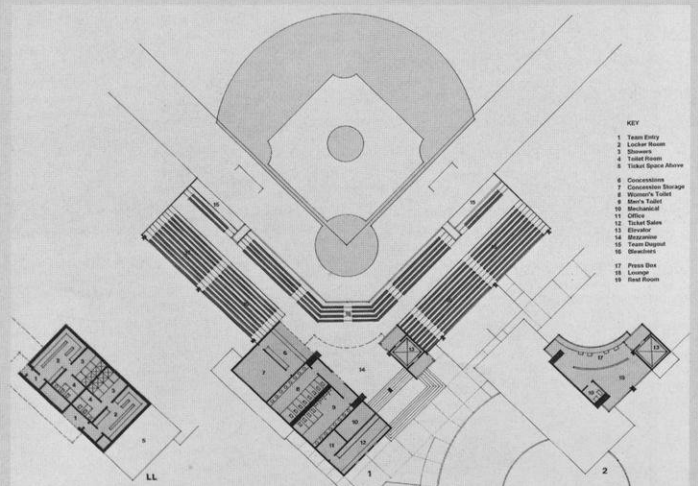
Situated in an area of five lakes, Madison is the perfect location for a rowing program. The Badger crews are headquartered in the boat house, located on Lake Mendota. The boat house contains an indoor rowing tank for year-round practice even during the winter season. During the warm months, crews can often be seen on any one of the Madison lakes.

With the opening of University Ridge in 1991, UW golfers now have the opportunity to compete on one of the finest courses in the Midwest. The par 72, 18-hole course was designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr. The facility also features a 15,000-square foot practice green and 5,000-square foot chipping green.

The UW Softball Complex, on the west end of campus, features an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 225 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet. Construction will begin in the summer of 1998 on the new Goodman Softball Complex. The facility will include a new field, dugouts, locker area, players' lounge, grandstand seating for 2,500 and press box.

WISCONSIN TRADITIONS

Badger Nickname

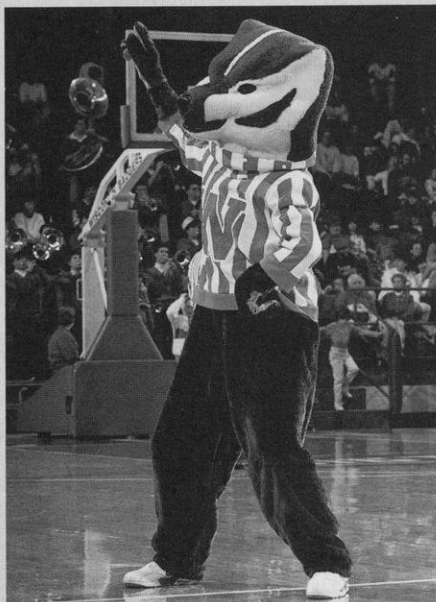
The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather by an association with lead miners in the 1820's. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like Badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot would be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW to "buck right through that line."

On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance is the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. Just by accident, we had this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"

Spending an afternoon at the MSCA Camp

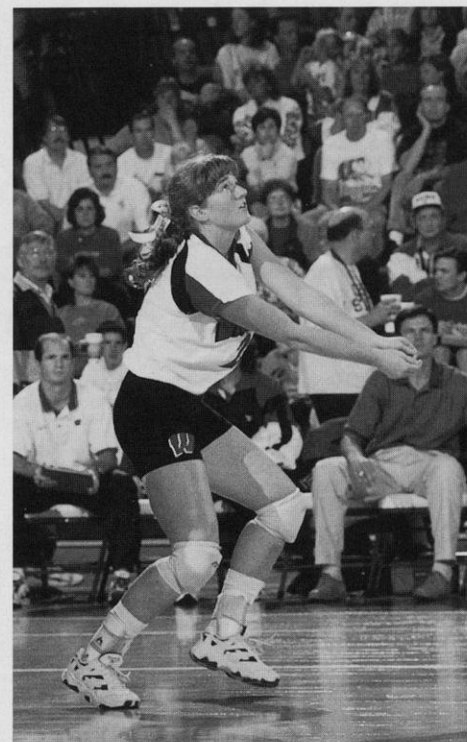

The University of Wisconsin benefits from the interest and media exposure associated with the Big Ten Conference, one of the premier athletic conferences in the nation. Big Ten women's athletics programs take pride in leading the nation in basketball and volleyball attendance, and in receiving more network and cable television exposure than any conference in the nation.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. The conference is celebrating its centennial anniversary during 1995-96 season.

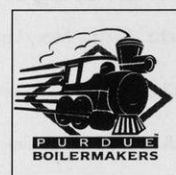
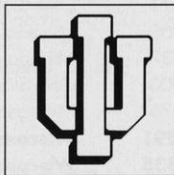
The women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

As a Big Ten school, Wisconsin women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

The Big Ten Conference volleyball champion is determined by the match record within the conference. The teams play a double, round-robin schedule with all teams playing each other twice, both at home and away, for a total of 20 matches.

The conference champion earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. In 1996, the Big Ten was represented by five universities in the NCAA Volleyball Championship. Four teams, including Wisconsin, advanced to the Sweet Sixteen, the most for any conference.

For five of the last six years, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in volleyball attendance. In 1996, six schools finished in the top 20 in attendance, and overall the league drew a total of 209,776 spectators for the season, which was second in the nation. The University of Illinois led the conference and finished fifth in the nation in attendance averaging 2,414 spectators per match. Michigan State was sixth averaging 2,391 with Wisconsin eighth with a 2,218 average. Minnesota was also in the top 10 coming in ninth with a 1,867 average. Penn State ranked 12th with a 1,623 average and Purdue was 17th with a 1,364 average.
