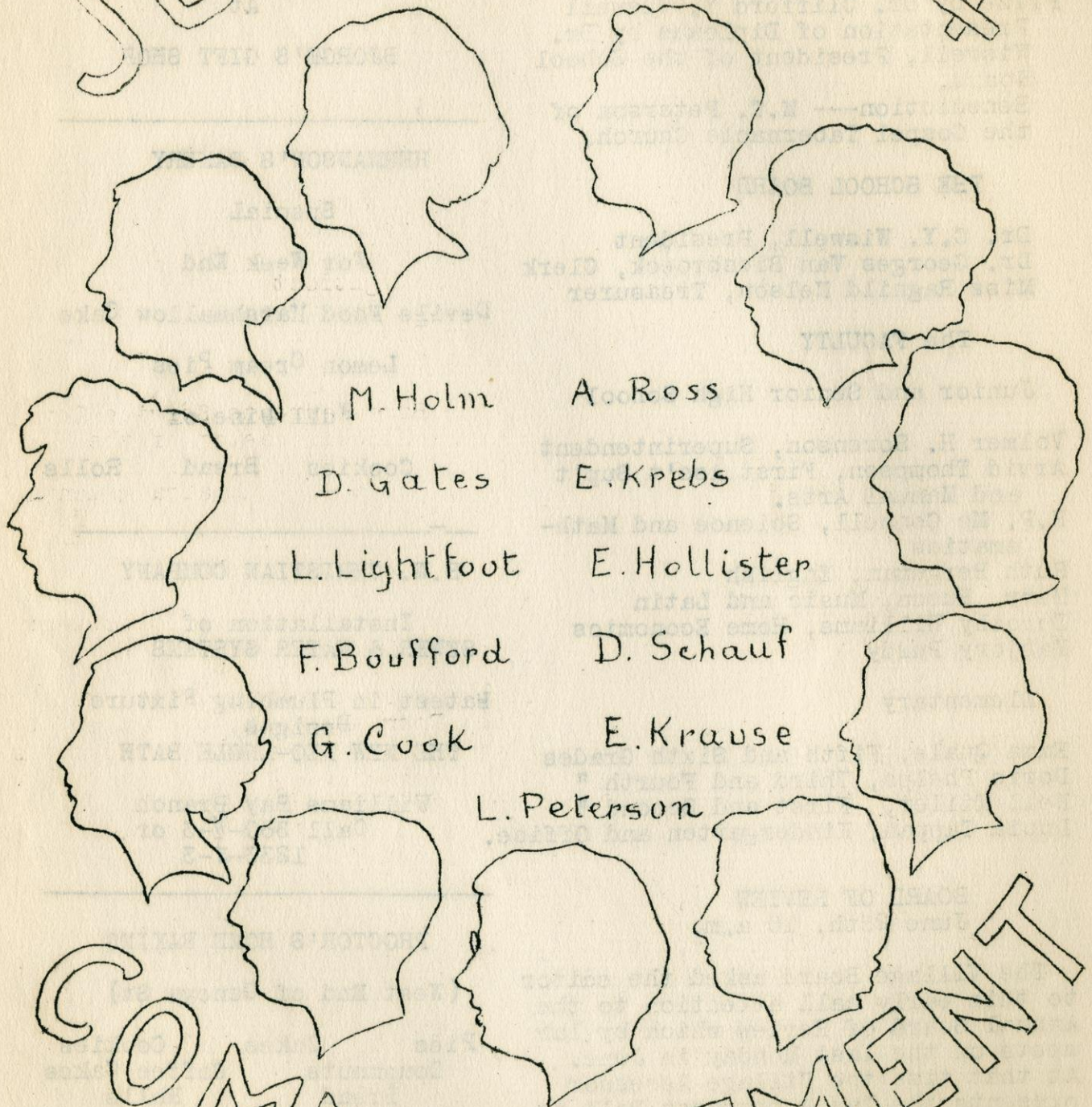

# VILLAGE BOARD in Busy Session on Monday Night.

The continued dry spell has made the water supply in sections of the village a matter of concern. Prof. S.B. Barrett presented a petition signed by the residents of Parkhurst Place asking for an extension of the Water System to include Parkhurst Place, stating that the owners would pay the cost in cash. The Board granted the extension and referred the working out of details to the Water Committee of the Board.

Mr. F.W. Johnson, representing Loch Vista Association, asked for an extension of the Water System so Loch Vista Club could connect their present system to it. The Board, after consulting with Mr. Tulley of the State Board of Health asked Mr. Johnson to find out from the Club if it would agree to finance the present line on Conference Point Road to their connecting point.

Mr. Otto Stoffregen very strongly stressed the need for water in Cedar Point Park. Mr. Freytag, Village Attorney, told of the efforts of the Village Board, both last year and this year, in trying to find a way to finance the extension.

SOME FIRSTS IN WALWORTH COUNTY

The first fruit trees were plant-  
ed by Daniel Salisbury on Spring  
Prairie in 1836 from some apple seeds  
given to him by Mrs. William Phoenix  
who came in the Fall of 1836 to  
Delavan .

The first music teacher on rec-  
ord in the County was a Frenchman,  
Monsieur Durgin, who came into the  
settlements as early as 1838 and  
conducted " sings" in the scattered  
school houses.

The first road was built by an  
ox team dragging a log from Spring  
Prairie to Delavan, after the rather  
harrowing experience of Allen Perk-  
ins in being lost for two days in  
going from his claim on Turtle Creek  
to Spring Prairie. He was found in  
Sugar Creek woods hungry and exhaust-  
ed, by Col. Samuel Phoenix.

It is hoped that many will be there at 2:30 for an afternoon of fun and genuine fellowship and enjoy the cafeteria supper.

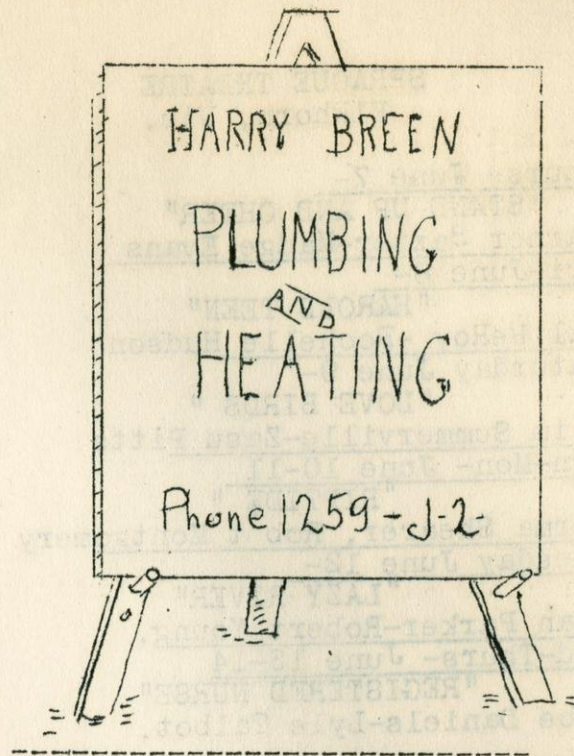

danced the "Gypsy" dance.

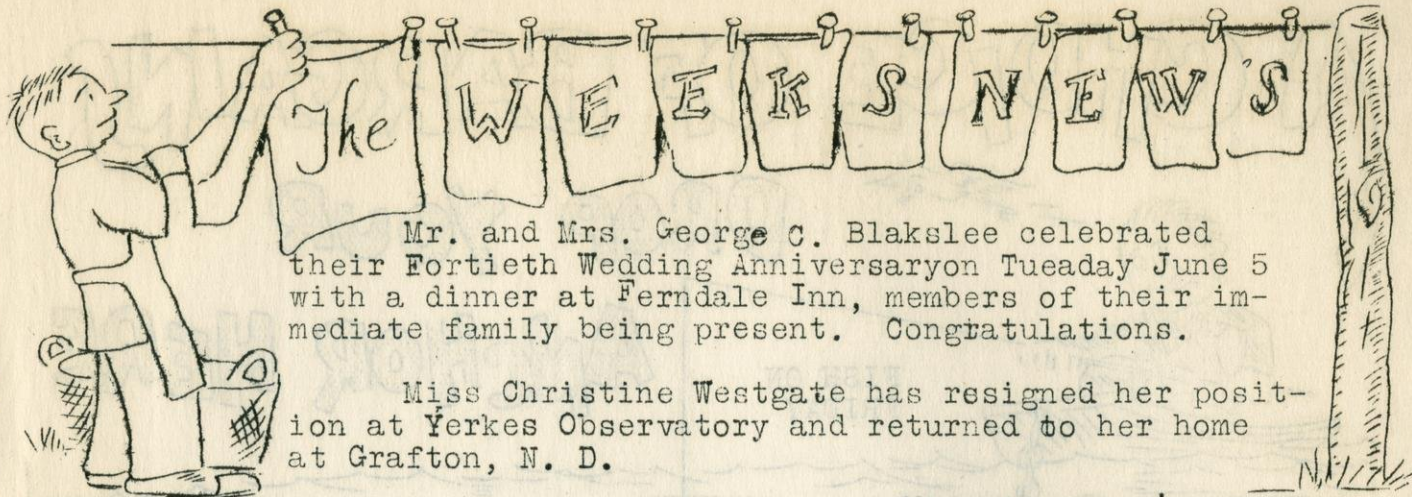
