WALWORTH COUNTY LUMBERMEN
INVITE BANKERS, HARDWARE DEALERS
and NEWSPAPER MEN TO HEAR SPEAK-
ERS TELL OF H.O.L.C and F.H.A.

The Walworth County Lumber-
men's Association held its month-
ly meeting at Big Foot Country
Club Tuesday evening. The members
invited as guests their local
bankers, hardware dealers and
newspaper men for six thirty
dinner.

Mr. Arthur Goodwillie of the
H.O.L.C. office, Chicago, gave a
survey of his particular depart-
ment which deals with the recon-
ditioning of properties on which
home loans had been made and show-
ed how it differed from the Feder-
al Housing Administration.

In brief the former is to
take care of the necessary repairs
on property where loans had been
made in order to keep the rate of
depreciation down to normal rate.,
Thus, a leaky roof would cause
damage to the inside, etc.

The F.H.A. is a business stim-
ulator. The government does not
make the loan in the latter inst-
ance, such a loan being made by
bankers or other loan agencies.
However, the government guarantees
up to 20% on such loans.

It works out about this way--
Suppose a property owner wishes to
add a room, paint or put in a bath-
room. He gets a figure on its
cost and secures an application
from his local lumberman and other
material man and goes to his banker
for a loan to cover the cost of the
improvement. These loans are strict
business propositions but have the
endorsement of the American Bank-
ers Association and are allowed by
bank examiners. The rate of inter-
est is regulated by the F.H.A. and
is very reasonable for small loans.

GIVES DINNER PARTY

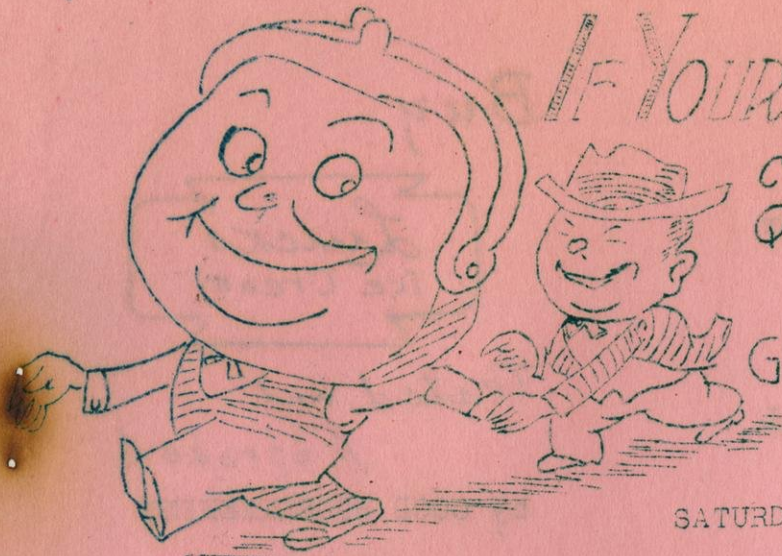

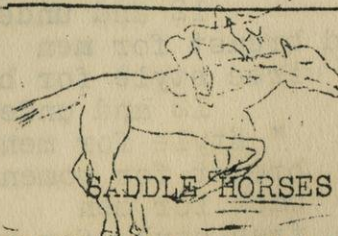

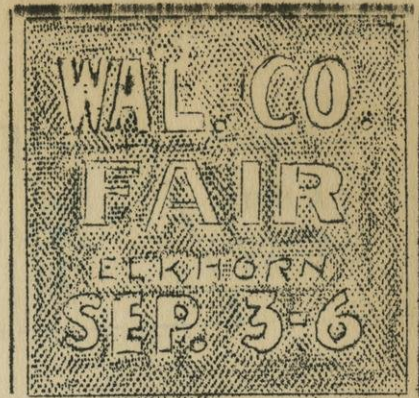
