



The Coaches

Head Coach—Steve Lowe

Steve Lowe enters his third year as head coach of the University of Wisconsin women's volleyball team after last season leading the Badgers to their most successful finish since 1978. Lowe inherited a 7–24 team in 1986, and has posted a 37–29 record while moving his team from a ninth place Big Ten finish to a tie for fifth in the conference last year.

A native of Iowa City, Iowa, Steve was the assistant coach at the University of the Pacific from 1983 until his appointment at Wisconsin in 1986. As the first assistant and primary recruiter, Steve aided the Tigers in winning the 1985 NCAA Division I Championship title. UOP claimed the 1986 NCAA championship title as well. The Tigers also made it to the NCAA Championship semi-finals two other years placing third in 1984 and fourth in 1983.

In addition to his coaching duties, Steve works as a technical consultant in sports psychology with the United States National Women's Volleyball team. Teaching techniques in goal setting, concentration and motivation, Steve develops individual mental preparation programs for each national team player. He has also worked as a mental preparation consultant with university and high school athletes.

Steve is a 1978 psychology graduate of the University of Iowa. He received his master's degree in applied behavior analysis with a specialization in athletics from the University of the Pacific in 1981. He served as a lecturer in psychology of coaching and volleyball at the UOP two years.

Active in the USVBA, Steve augmented his UOP coaching duties as head coach of the Stockton Volleyball Club, and assistant coach of the Cascade Steelers, two United States Volleyball Association teams.

He has been active in writing performance enhancement curriculum, and is a frequent speaker at symposiums and clinics. He has produced several videotape training packages for use in university and high school volleyball programs.

Steve and his wife Lori have two children-lan, six, and Jeffrey, two.

Lowe's Coaching Philosophy

"Central to my philosophy of coaching is the belief that coaches are primarily teachers, and that their main task is to provide a positive learning environment. In this environment, the players should be rewarded for developing and improving their skills. The players should be challenged to maximize their potential. They should be presented with new creative ideas that will challenge them to be the best they can be.

"As a coach, I must try and develop the total person—physical, mental, social and emotional. In collegiate athletics, a coach must never lose sight of the academic, social and athletic needs of the athletes. I truly believe in the concept of the student-athlete.

"I believe sports should be fun. I love my job because it is both challenging and fun. I want the players who play for me to feel the same way. I feel they will play to the best of their ability if they truly enjoy playing. There are numerous rewards from athletics, and it is my job as a coach to make sure my players receive these rewards. I will have succeeded as a coach if I can honestly say I provided as positive an experience as possible for each one of my athletes."



Assistant Coaches— Stephanie Hawbecker

Stephanie Hawbecker joined the Badger program as assistant coach in 1987, bringing with her strong playing and coaching credentials.

A former volleyball standout at Illinois State, Hawbecker started three years for the Redbirds. She led State to the Gateway Conference Championship in 1982, and an appearance in the NCAA post-season tournament that same year. Hawbecker also competed for the Redbird basketball team one year prior to receiving her degree in physical education in 1983.

Hawbecker gained extensive clinic and camp coaching experience while earning her master's degree in physical education at Illinois State. She was served two years as the assistant volleyball coach and instructor of physical education at Southwest Missouri State prior to coming to Wisconsin.



Hua (pronounced Hwa) joins the Wisconsin coaching staff as the program's first graduate assistant coach. A native of China, Hua brings with him international coaching experience and expertise in setting and defense.

Prior to joining the UW program, Hua served as an assistant coach for the Ball State men's team while earning his master's degree. Before coming to the United States, he was a head coach in his native China, as well as a consultant to the 1984 Olympic gold medal Chinese National Team.

Hua is working on his Ph.D. in physical education at the University of Wisconsin–Madison. He is married to Xialing Zhang, and they have a five-year-old daughter.



1988 Badger Preview

There will be many new faces in the UW Fieldhouse when the 1988-89 University of Wisconsin women's volleyball team takes the court. Not only will there be many new Badger fans after last year's successful season, but also seven new players to fill the shoes of the seven graduated seniors. Like all new situations, there exists a feeling of excitement and uncertainty, but the 1988 Badgers have much to look forward to.

Anticipation for success runs high in the Badger program after last season's 21-11 record and fifth place conference finish. Head Coach Steve Lowe, in only his second year at the helm of the Wisconsin program, guided the Badgers to their best season finish since 1978.

Lowe is reserved, however, about making predictions for the upcoming season. 'Since this year's team is so young, confidence must be established in the players. and they need to discover for themselves that they are every bit as good as players who are older and more experienced. The players will have to learn that our team will be able to compete with the powerhouses of the Big Ten and achieve success," says Lowe.

Confidence-building is something Lowe knows a lot about. As a psychological consultant to the United States National Volleyball team, Lowe is aware of the importance of the mental aspects of the game. Over the summer, he traveled to the Soviet Union in order to help the Olympic team get prepared for the Seoul Olympic Games. He will apply many of his mental conditioning exercises this fall as he charts the progress of his young Badger team.

Wisconsin's lone returning senior is captain Lori Lang from Libertyville, Ill. Lang will be looked upon for guidance and leadership, and will serve as an excellent role model for the incoming freshmen. She will be vying for a starting outside hitting position, and will provide excellent defense in the back row.

Also returning is sophomore Mary Penosky. Penosky, from Joliet, Ill., was one of the top freshmen in the Big Ten Conference last season and was picked the Conference Player of the Week, an honor no other volleyball Badger had ever achieved. Penosky will play both the outside hitter and setter positions, and has proven that she is an outstanding all-around player.


Penosky shared setting duties with junior Susan Temple. Temple, from San Clemente, Calif., is a very intelligent setter and serves as an extension of the coach when playing. "Susan has played for the two years I have been here, and she knows very well what I want to have done on the court at all times," Lowe added.

Another returning sophomore is Lisa Boyd from Dolton, Ill. Although playing behind three senior middle blockers last season, she contributed each time she was on the court and was considered one of the most improved players on the team. A very good defensive player and passer, Boyd will

is sophomore Jackie Johnson from Madison West High School. Johnson can play both the middle blocker and outside hitter positions, and because of her outstanding athletic ability, has the versatility to adapt

Alison Abraham, a sophomore from Menomonee Falls, Wis., will begin her collegiate career after an

last season. "Alison is going to be a very fun player for the fans because she plays with a lot of emotion, excitement, and energy," Lowe said. "We think that Alison will develop into one of the top blockers in the Big Ten. She will also be the only lefthanded middle blocker in the conference."





Gone from the Wisconsin squad are "Co-Players of the Year" Margaret Kaminski and Tracy Tiffany, who were named to the honorable mention and second All—Big Ten teams, respectively. Also gone are all-time career kill and dig leader Kristen Roman, and last year's "Hardest Working Player," Connie Venzke, as well as spirited players Amy Lienhard and Beth Sweeney. But the 1988 recruiting class promises to help fill the void left by graduation.

Lowe believes he recruited one of the top-five freshman setters in the country in **Liz Tortorello**. Tortorello, from Joliet, Ill., and a former high school teammate of Mary Penosky, is expected to contribute immediately to the Badger effort, and should be an integral part of the team from the outset of the season. Tortorello was named to three all-state teams, and is considered to be one of the top two freshman setters in the midwest.

Recruits Marianne Kelm and Susan Wohlford were both cited by Volleyball Monthly magazine as two of the top 50 players in the country as high school seniors. Kelm, from Oak Park, Ill., and her high school teammate Wohlford, from River Forest, Ill., were both selected first team all-state, and bring with them very impressive credentials.

Three additional freshmen will be joining the "Red Roof" squad. **Lisa Hagan** from

Louisville, KY., could have played basketball or run track in college instead of volleyball, which indicates her exceptional athletic ability. Playing as a middle blocker, the 6–I Hagan will add size, quickness, and jumping ability to the position.

A Palatine, Ill., native, **Jeanette Simenson** possesses an exceptionally strong transition game, and according to Lowe, should develop into a fine collegiate player. Wisconsin fans will have more reason to cheer as Portage, Wis., native **Andrea York** joins the team as the tallest Badger at 6–2. "Andrea is one of the finest athletes in the state, and we are fortunate that she chose Wisconsin and volleyball, as she could have decided to play basketball at another institution," says Lowe.

As difficult as it will be to immediately fill the voids left by the graduated seniors, the task is not impossible. Last year, the Wisconsin team was noted for its blocking abilities. But it will take time for the new team to become good blockers, since team cohesiveness creates good blocking. Wisconsin must therefore make a transition from being a power team to being a ball-control/finesse team.

The Badgers will continue to use a 6-2 offense, but according to Lowe, "We have three very talented setters, and I'm going to do my best to find a creative way to use all three of them. We will have the look of a

totally new team, which will be to our advantage."

Moreover, the Wisconsin coaching staff believes that the freshmen constitute one of the top recruiting classes in the country. "I believe we have attracted an extremely talented group of athletes to the University of Wisconsin, and now I am eager to see how this team develops with my philosophy of coaching coupled with our style of play," comments Lowe. "I am confident the results will be outstanding."

Besides the obvious goals in the wins and losses columns, Lowe has long-range goals as well. "Last year we started to turn the corner in terms of attracting large numbers of fans to our matches. We had some exciting matches at home that were basically determined by the crowd. We were able to defeat the second place team in the Big Ten (Purdue) because of the support we got from the crowd," says Lowe. "This year, we would like to establish an even stronger home court advantage, and it is a goal of ours to have the best-supported team in the country, as well as in the Big Ten."

With the tide changing and the wave of the future coming in, this year promises to be another exciting one for Wisconsin volleyball. It could become a tidal wave, overpowering everything in its way. Surf's up, Wisconsin fans! Grab your boards and take in the action.

Sports Facilities

Athletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from some of the finest sports facilities found anywhere in the country. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its women athletes.

The basketball and volleyball teams practice and compete in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse, which seats 12,204. The Fieldhouse features four remodeled locker rooms and a modern athletic training area. Other recent additions include a new lighting system and new sound system.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have a competitive advantage in their ability to play year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States. Ranked in 1984 by the USTA as the number one indoor tennis facility in the country, Nielsen Tennis Stadium seats 1500 spectators and is valued at over eight million dollars. It features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, and one squash doubles court.

The stadium, located close to the lakeshore dormitories, is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.


Wisconsin's track teams benefit from practicing and competing during the indoor season in the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. Located next to Camp Randall Football Stadium, the "Shell" contains a 220-yard Mondo rubber track, throwing and jumping areas in the infield, and a seating capacity of 2500.

During the outdoor season, Wisconsin track and cross country athletes have the opportunity to use one of the finest tracks in the Midwest. The newly renovated 400-meter, Mondo rubber outdoor track is located on the west side of campus. The Dan McClimon Memorial Track, dedicated in honor of the former Wisconsin head men's track and cross country coach, was the site of the 1986 Men's and Women's Big Ten Outdoor Track Championships. Planning and fund-raising are underway for the next phase of construction: the addition of permanent spectator seating with press box and locker room facilities.

The swimming and diving team has the luxury of having two pools where they practice and compete—the Natatorium adjacent

to Unit II, and the new Unit III facility, or SERF. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with a fully automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50'x40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The recently completed Unit III facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

The Wisconsin men's and women's gymnastics teams train and compete in the renovated Armory located on central campus along Lake Mendota. Better known on campus as the Red Gym, the facility provides over 15,000 square feet of training space and spectator seating. Gymnasts are pro-

vided plenty of working space and equipment, including a large foam training pit, 10 balance beams, four sets of uneven parallel bars, and ample floor exercise practice space.

Outdoor facilities at Wisconsin include soccer fields adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium. The crew boat house, situated on Lake Mendota, provides the Badger crews with a modern facility, including an indoor rowing tank for year-round practice. Construction was just completed on an additional shell storage area, and other construction plans include a second indoor rowing tank and additional locker room space.


Our teams also have access to several other facilities on campus. The soon-to-be-

completed McClain Athletic Facility will offer an indoor practice facility for soccer as well as lockers for both track and soccer teams. The Natatorium and SERF feature numerous multi-purpose gyms, weight rooms, running tracks, and other athletic facilities for practice and competition.

Other facilities that are an integral part of the athletic program are the coeducational weight training and sports medicine rooms in Camp Randall Stadium. The modern weight training area features Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in a spacious, fully carpeted room in Camp Randall. Two full-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.

The care, prevention and treatment of injuries to all Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a six-person staff of N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. They are supported by a staff of 25 student trainers and two certified graduate assistants as they care for the nearly 900 men and women athletes at Wisconsin.

The staff utilizes training rooms in the Stadium, Armory, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Fieldhouse. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists assigned to intercollegiate athletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.

Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to women athletes on a one-year basis, renewable from year to year if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Full and partial scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of crew and fencing, which do not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

Academic excellence is emphasized at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the men and women student athletes.

Three full-time staff members, Assistant Athletic Director **Dr. Diane Johnson** and Counselors **Alan Zussman** and **Mary Weaver**, conduct the Wisconsin Student Affairs program offered to the nearly 900 Badger athletes. As former members of the academic dean's office, Diane and Alan have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments.

For those athletes who do request assistance, Diane, Alan, and Mary offer counseling sessions on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, whether the needs be personal or academic in nature.

The University of Wisconsin is a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association. The NCAA, which established women's championships in 1981-82, conducts 33 women's championships in 15 sports.

In addition to its national affiliation, the University of Wisconsin-Madison benefits from the interest and media exposure associated with the Big Ten Conference. As a Big Ten school, Wisconsin athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, golf, gymnastics, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball. The basketball and volleyball teams compete in roundrobin conference action, both at home and away. The other Big Ten sport seasons culminate in a Big Ten Championship event.

Other Big Ten institutions include Illinois (Champaign, Ill.), Indiana (Bloomington, Ind.), Iowa (Iowa City, Iowa), Michigan (Ann Arbor, Mich.), Michigan State (East Lansing, Mich.), Minnesota (Minneapolis, Minn.), Northwestern (Evanston, Ill.), Ohio State (Columbus, Ohio), and Purdue (West Lafayette, Ind.).

The Big Ten Conference is considered one of the premier athletic conferences in the nation. From Indiana's 1987 NCAA basketball championship title to Iowa's NCAA field hockey championships, the Big Ten schools have been well represented in national competition.


Begun in 1895, the "Intercollegiate Con-

ference of Faculty Representatives" (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics, and emphasis on the student-athlete.

Women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972.

Included among the services the Conference provides are:

- ☐ Determines champions in 10 sports for men and 10 sports for women
- ☐ Publishes an annual "Records Book" with historical data. Pre-season sports outlooks are also published and distributed, and media guides are provided for football, basketball and volleyball.
- ☐ Collects, compiles, and distributes official statistics weekly during the sports seasons
- ☐ Negotiates for television exposure on behalf of the membership
- ☐ Provides education on rules governing college athletics, including those covering eligibility, financial aid, practice and competition, and recruiting
- ☐ Provides awards and recognition for Big Ten male and female athletes by selection as player of the week, athlete of the month, All-Big Ten academic and athletic. Conference Medal of Honor, and Athlete of the Year.







Madison: All-American City



Nestled in a chain of four sparkling lakes, the dominant feature on the Madison skyline is the majestic capitol building, whose 200-foot illuminated white dome is visible for miles both day and night.

Madison is a clean, vibrant city whose chief businesses are education and government. Located just three driving hours from Chicago, one-and-one-half hours from Milwaukee, and five hours from Minneapolis, Madison is consistently rated as one of the most attractive places to live in the country. In 1978, Madison proudly accepted the designation of All-American City given by the national Municipal League.

The Madison campus is located just one mile from the state capitol on a series of hills overlooking scenic Lake Mendota, the largest of the chain of lakes.

The campus covers over 900 acres—most within two blocks of Lake Mendota. Many of the residence halls have the lake in their backyard, and there are numerous bathing beaches along the Mendota shoreline. In addition, the UW Arboretum, a nature study and hiking area, offers another 1,224 acres to the campus community. Also located near the campus is Picnic Point, a 129-acre, park-like peninsula which extends into Lake Mendota and is used for nature study and recreation. Jogging paths and bike trails extend along the entire campus shoreline of Lake Mendota.

UW-Madison has ranked among the top ten universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910.
