# Approval of Minutes

Minutes of the special meeting of the board held on February 4, 1988, and of the regular meeting held on February 5, 1988, were unanimously approved, upon motion by Regent Clusen, seconded by Regent Fish.

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REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

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Vice President Schilling welcomed Fred D. Poellnitz, Jr., who had been appointed in February as UW System Vice President for Business and Finance, effective July 1, 1988. He currently served as Vice President for Finance and Business at Meharry Medical College, Nashville, Tennessee.

# Report on the Council of Public Broadcasting

Regent Clusen, Chair of the UW System Council on Public Broadcasting, reported on the council's March 9 meeting, at which the main topic of discussion was capital equipment needs at university broadcast stations.

Vice President Trani and Associate Vice President Sell were present to answer questions regarding the concern that teacher education majors might not be receiving enough course work in use of up-to-date media instruction and the concern that outmoded station equipment might be hindering preparation of students, for careers in broadcasting. With respect to the first question, Dr. Trani advised the council of a new Department of Public Instruction certification requirement that mandated a minimum of one course in instructional technology. That requirement already was being met at UW-Madison, and similar courses were to be in place elsewhere by fall 1988.

On the second question, there was discussion as to whether the laboratory modernization fund could be used to update outmoded equipment. Associate Vice President Sell reported on the Decision Item Narrative working group process and suggested that this might be a way to approach equipment needs. She defined the distinction between operating and capital budget requests and noted that for television production centers a joint request was to be made by UW-Extension, UW-Green Bay and UW-Stout. council planned to compile a profile of university broadcast stations in order to obtain a better view of their roles and the status of equipment needs.

The council also received reports on radio and television activities, including joint efforts between UW-Extension and the Educational Communications Board.

The next meeting of the council was to be held in mid-October 1988 at UW-Oshkosh, with the schedule to include a tour of the campus radio and Emeritus Chan, status granted to station. Regent Clusen suggested that regents might wish to tour facilities of this type when visiting various institutions.

Resolution of Appreciation Chancellor Swanson w-Stut, R 3989, PP 2-3

Regent Clusen presented the following resolution and moved its adoption:

WHEREAS Robert S. Swanson has served as chancellor of Resolution 3989: the University of Wisconsin-Stout with distinction for over 15 years, from the time of his appointment

to that position in 1972; and

WHEREAS his service to that university has been singularly devoted and effective: first expressed as the ambition of his boyhood, later realized in his achievements as a student, then brought to fruition in his years as a teacher, and finally culminated in a brilliant administrative career as dean and chancellor; and

WHEREAS he has an earned the personal affection and gratitude, not only of his campus colleagues and students, but the entire University of Wisconsin System, the officials of Wisconsin State Government, and the leaders of Wisconsin business, industry and commerce; and

WHEREAS he has advanced the quality and stature of UW-Stout, and in every respect enhanced the esteem in which this proud institution is held; and

WHEREAS Margaret Swanson has provided dedicated support and assistance in these efforts and has made an important contribution to the development of UW-Stout;

THEREFORE be it resolved that the Board of Regents hereby commends Robert Swanson for his exceptional educational leadership, expresses deep appreciation to him and his wife, Margaret, and grants him, as of March 21, 1988, the status and title of Chancellor Emeritus of the University of Wisconsin-Stout.

The resolution was seconded and adopted by the entire board with a standing ovation.

Report on Status of Review of Process for Faculty Grievances, USS 6,02, P/3-4

Regent Schilling referred to a memorandum to the board from President Shaw and himself relating to the topic of UWS 6.02, Wisconsin Administrative Code. In December, a committee of the board, composed of Regents Schilling, Hanson, and Nicholas, brought to the board two recommendations: first, that an appeal from a particular faculty member regarding a grievance not be considered by the board; and second, in light of the committee's interpretation of s. 6.02, that the board review the entire matter of the circumstances under which access to the board should be provided for a faculty member who had a grievance. The memorandum indicated that the president and committee concurred in a recommendation that UWS 6.02 be amended to make the process the same as in UWS 6.01; namely, that the decision by the chancellor, on recommendation of a grievance committee, or on the grievance in the absence of committee recommendation, shall be final, except that the board at its option may grant a review on the record. That would enable a committee of the board to review the matter and to apply criteria to determine whether it merited board attention. The draft letter attached to the memorandum was to be sent to chancellors, vice chancellors and faculty representatives, requesting comments on this matter. After receiving those comments, President Shaw would bring a specific recommendation to the board.

Regent Nikolay inquired as to whether it would be necessary to make this change through the administrative rules amendment procedure, and Regent Schilling replied in the affirmative.

Regent Hanson noted that the first step would be to solicit recommendations from each institution.

Regent Nicholas commented that the proposed change would ensure fair treatment of all parties.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE SYSTEM

### Approval of Nonpersonnel Actions/Informational Items

Resolution 3990 was moved by Regent Jarvis, seconded by Regent Nikolay and carried unanimously.

Resolution 3990: That the report of nonpersonnel actions by administrative officers to the Board of Regents and informational items reported for the record (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified and confirmed.

UW System and Core Mission Statements (first reading), pp 4-8

President Shaw outlined the following principles which he had developed in response to discussion at the February board meeting: First, as constitutions under which universities operate, mission statements should provide broad statements of direction which reflect areas of long-term and continuing focus for an institution. They should be amended infrequently and by an open process of consultation among those governed by them. Faculty, staff and students, as well as the Board of Regents should feel an ownership in these statements and take pride in each institution's focus and strengths.

Second, more topical interests, such as program array, would be more apt to change quickly than the mission statements themselves.

Third, a university's uniqueness should be defined only in part by its mission statement, with program array also doing much to describe its special character. Centers of Excellence would provide the last piece of the picture, by focusing on special efforts that build on the mission.

Fourth, each institution's overall mission should be defined by the system, core and select missions, which should be considered as a set.

Fifth, duplication of some items between select and core missions might be appropriate when meant to convey a special institutional focus or emphasis.

Sixth, all degree-granting institutions offer a solid core of liberal arts programs. At some institutions, such as UW-Stout, the liberal arts and sciences support more specialized technical professional programs. At other institutions, such as UW-Eau Claire and UW-Oshkosh, the missions were defined as offering primarily a strong liberal arts program with a small number of professional programs. First-quality institutions of both kinds are considered appropriate.

Based on those principles, President Shaw made the following recommendations as to system and core missions. No changes were recommended in the system mission, and it was felt the statement as set forth in Chapter 36 of the statutes remained suitable.

Core mission statements for the UW Centers and UW-Extension had been eliminated, and both institutions would have the opportunity to incorporate portions into their select mission statements. Added to the core missions for both doctoral and university clusters were statements regarding minority/disadvantaged opportunities, economic development, research and scholarly activity, and extension/outreach.

No suggested changes had been made in the select missions. With board concurrence, the system and modified core statements would be sent to the institutions, which would be asked to review their draft select missions in light of these changes. They would be asked to determine, first, whether there were now duplicative items in the select mission that they would like to eliminate; second, whether there were additional items they would like to add to the select mission to focus the statement further; and, third, whether greater specificity could be obtained. Because regents had expressed the desire for greater specificity in certain select missions, the president's letter to the institutions would convey the essence of any discussion at this meeting and would also include specific suggestions made in writing, so that these views could be transmitted accurately.

As to next steps, President Shaw made the following recommendations: First, that the regents review the system and amended core mission statements and indicate approval or desired modifications at this meeting; second, that duplication of items between the core and select mission statements be allowed, in order to convey a particular institutional commitment; third, that all catalogues carry the full set of system, core and select mission statements; fourth, that diversity in the degree of program specificity described in select missions be accepted, with recognition that some institutions offer more specialized technical and professional programs, while others are more broadly liberal arts based, with limited professional programs.

The President proposed the following timetable for proceeding with further institutional reviews of select missions and for hearings:

- -- By March 15, the modified core statements would be sent to the institutions with the request for review of the select mission statement.
- -- By April 15, the select missions would be returned to system administration, and they would be shared immediately by mail with all regents.
- -- From April 21-28, hearings at each campus would be held.
- -- On May 4-5, the board would review the hearing results.
- -- At the June meeting, there would be board action on the mission statements.

Noting that this was an ambitious schedule, President Shaw indicated, however, that if it were delayed, faculty would have left campus for the summer, and it would be necessary to defer hearings until fall. He hoped, if possible, to finish the project by July 1.

In conclusion, the president noted that the select mission statements, together with program array and Centers of Excellence, would describe the diversity in the UW System, with program array offering a more complete and detailed picture of the select mission statement, and Centers of Excellence focusing special efforts consistent with the mission and program array at each institution. The result would be a strong finished product, which would focus and guide the UW System's priorities in the future.

Regent Fish asked if the chancellors and Vice President Trani found these suggestions workable.

President Shaw responded that his discussions with the chancellors and Dr. Trani indicated that the proposed procedure was realistic but that the time frame was constrained. The process as outlined allowed for review and for the regents to give guidance. While the majority of the chancellors might prefer no review beyond what had already occurred, he felt this was a workable way to proceed.

Regent Lyon stated that he supported maintaining the existing system mission statement, which was deliberately broad and which he considered preferable to the initially proposed modifications.

Inviting discussion with regard to core mission statements, Regent Lyon commented that the emphasis on quality in the Regents' Plan for the Future did not seem fully projected in the core statements. The statements did not seem entirely consistent with directions set forth in the Regents Plan in the areas of enrollment management, quality assessment, Centers of Excellence, and program review--all of which suggested improvement of current efforts, rather than expansion. In that regard, he referred to addition of the phrase "including research" to the proposed university cluster mission. Noting that the existing core mission statement called for "scholarly activity," he pointed out that, depending upon interpretation, addition of the words "including research" could constitute substantial change. If that statement were intended to include expanded laboratories, libraries, GPR funding, or reallocation of staff time, he questioned whether it was consistent with recent actions, and whether it could establish a competitive environment for funding among the university cluster and doctoral institutions.

Replying that the issue had been carefully considered. Vice President Trani noted that the word "research" had been removed from the University Cluster mission statements the last time they were formulated. However, faculty, staff, and administrators at University Cluster institutions felt the existing statements did not accurately reflect existing faculty responsibility for teaching, research and public service. The distinction between the University Cluster and the Doctoral Cluster missions was that programs of research at the doctoral institutions are organized and funded through GPR, with focus on the institution, while at University Cluster institutions, focus of research efforts is on the individual faculty member. without expectation of GPR support. Although research is considered a criteria for promotion and tenure at all UW institutions, it was not currently recognized in the University Cluster mission statements; and faculty members, therefore, were being evaluated on a basis that apparently was not part of the institutional mission. The proposed statement attempted to resolve this dilemma by recognizing research as part of the individual faculty member's responsibility, and the same wording was repeated in the select mission statements.

Regent Clusen spoke in favor of retaining the phrase "including research" in the core mission statement, on the basis that it clarified the existing expectation that faculty at University Cluster institutions had a responsibility for scholarly activity, including research. In that sense, it was not an addition to the University Cluster mission but only a recognition of the current situation.

Regent Hanson urged that, in making any suggestions to the various universities, the regents recognize that the decision on select mission statements belonged primarily to the faculties and the individual universities. She considered it their prerogative to determine whether their statement should be general or more specific, and she felt it would be inappropriate for the board to dictate the decision in that regard.

Regent Schilling noted that the Board of Regents was required by law to establish missions, although there had been and would continue to be extensive institutional involvement.

Stating disagreement with Regent Hanson's position, Regent Grover commented that the statutorily defined responsibility for establishing missions required the board to take an active role in the process. In that regard, he felt consideration of issues, such as inclusion of research in the University Cluster mission, clearly was a proper function of the board. To simply accept whatever was decided by the individual universities, he stated, would be to abdicate a fundamental role of the Board of Regents.

Regent Flores inquired as to Regent Hanson's interpretation of the regents' role in preparation of the mission statements.

In response, Regent Hanson pointed out that the Board of Regents had established guidelines for the mission reviews in its Plan for the Future. She felt the institutions had responded in good faith and that it would be unfair to change those directions now. While the board retained overall responsibility, she believed that the content of select mission statements should be determined primarily by the individual institutions.

In response to a request by Vice President Schilling, President Shaw outlined his view as to the format of the hearings, each of which would be chaired by a member of the Board of Regents. First, there would be a presentation by the institution of its proposed select statement. In conjunction with that presentation, a dialogue could occur in terms of regent suggestions, so that there would be an opportunity to discuss reasons why the institution had presented its proposal in a particular way. Others also would have the opportunity to express their views. As a result of the hearings, any unresolved areas of difference could be identified.

Regent Fish asked if it would be the responsibility of the regent chairs to write statements covering the hearings.

President Shaw replied that he saw the responsibility of the regent chair as being to comment on the kinds of concerns that were expressed. Staff would be present at the hearings and would be prepared to draft reports as needed for the regent chairs.

Regent Schilling inquired as to how the hearings would be publicized so that community leaders and other interested persons would be advised of them.

In response, Vice President Trani indicated that there would be wide publicity, both by the individual institutions in their service areas and through public notices to be published by the Office of the Secretary of the Board of Regents. To facilitate planning, he hoped the previously made assignments for regent chairs could be retained. Chancellors would contact those regents to establish a hearing date during the week of April 21 to April 28.

Vice President Schilling inquired as to whether there was consensus as to the principles in President Shaw's letter of March 4 regarding the substance of the system and core statements and the procedure to be followed for the remainder of the review. No objections were stated.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Chairman Nikolay presented the report of the committee.

Approval of Concept and Budget Reports for Facility Performance Improvements Projects

Regent Nikolay moved adoption by the board of Resolutions 3991 and 3992, which were unanimously approved by the committee, and the motion was seconded by Regent Jarvis.

In response to a question by Regent Fish, Vice President Brown explained that these requests represented an approach to the overall maintenance of facilities, which tied in with emphasis on all-agency funding. It was expected that buildings would be viewed in total, with identification of the various kinds of modifications that should take place, including energy conservation, handicapped access and overall maintenance of the building.

Regent Fish asked if that approach meant projects funded by all-agency accounts would not be enumerated in the capital budget.

Replying in the affirmative, Mr. Brown explained that enumeration would be by funding source--maintenance, handicapped access, or energy conservation. Projects applied against those accounts could exceed the \$250,000 limitation.

Regent Fish asked if the Building Commission supported this approach, which was a change from previous practice.

Mr. Brown indicated that the Building Commission favored this change. All-agency accounts were growing and now were funded at a level of about \$60 million.

Put to the vote, Resolutions 3991 and 3992 were then unanimously adopted by the board.

### Approval of Major Projects for Maintenance and Energy Conservation

Regent Nikolay reported unanimous committee approval of two major projects, to be funded from the statewide allocations for maintenance and energy conservation. The first was for UW-Superior and involved replacement of a leaking portion of the underground steam distribution system which served seven buildings on the north end of the campus. The second request was for the chiller installation in the UW-Whitewater Andersen Library, to handle the increased load resulting from construction of the Computer Center.

UW-Madison: Approval of Concept of Pursuing Lease/Lease with Option to Purchase for Medical Office Space

Regent Nikolay reported on committee consideration of a request for authority to solicit proposals for a lease or lease with option to purchase of approximately 39,000 assignable square feet of space for a tertiary care out-patient building at University Station on University Avenue in Madison or a comparable site in close proximity to the University Hospital. committee was advised that this space was needed to alleviate space shortages in the Clinical Science Center. The most cost effective alternative that met program needs was to be presented for approval of the board at the April meeting.

Adoption by the board of the following resolution, which was unanimously approved by the committee, was moved by Regent Nikolay and seconded by

In response to a question by Regent Fish, Regent Nikolay stated his

In response to a question by Regent Fish, Regent Nikolay stated his concern that the lease would contain a clause providing for five percent cost escalation each year of a 20-year contract.

Regent Flores, Chair of the Council of Trustees of the UW Hospital and Clinics, noted that the terms of the lease when negotiated would be provided to the Board of Regents for approval and that the lease would include an option to purchase. The negotiations would be conducted by the Department of Administration, in consultation with UW Hospital and Clinics' officials. The most important concern, he commented, was the space shortage at the hospital for outpatient activity, due primarily to changes in health care over the past decade. Discussions with Vice Chancellor Noren and Superintendent Derzon had convinced him that the need was critical and that existing space at the hospital was fully utilized, with shortage of space even for inpatient activity. What was requested at this time was only approval to solicit proposals and negotiate terms of a lease, subject to approval by the board and by the Building Commission. If the option to purchase were contemplated as exercisable in the future, approval by the board and the Building Commission again would be required.

Regent Nicholas commented that a five percent escalator clause for 20 years would be unacceptable. The time period seemed too great a commitment without knowing what changes might occur over the years.

Chancellor Shalala noted that five percent was not a firm number and that the Department of Administration would negotiate as favorable a contract as possible for the university.

Vice President Brown explained that the five percent figure had been discussed in initial talks with the developer of the University Station property. Proposals also would be solicited from others who might be interested and negotiations would be conducted accordingly.

Regent Lyon inquired about how the proposed expansion would affect the UW Hospital and Clinics' competitive position with other medical providers.

Regent Flores replied that, without provision of additional space, the university's competitive posture would be adversely affected, inasmuch as patients were being lost because of the lengthy waiting periods for appointments at some clinics. It also was necessary to be able to compete with other regional medical centers, including the Mayo Clinic, which was expanding its facilities greatly.

Dr. Noren added that, as specialty care facilities, the clinics were in competition with the University of Michigan, the University of Minnesota, the Mayo Clinic and other regional clinics, as well as with other local providers. At the present time, the Ophthalmology Clinic was unable to meet patient demand, with waiting periods of one to two-and-a-half months for appointments. In a new facility, it was estimated that ophthalmology visits on an annual basis would increase about 50 percent--from 20,000 to 35,000-40,000. The Ophthalmology Department was one of the top research departments of its kind in the country, but lack of ability to see patients made faculty retention and recruitment difficult. The Rheumatology Clinic, which also would be housed in the new facility, had a 38-day waiting period. The Diabetes Center also had difficulty in meeting patient demand due to lack of space.

Noting that the lease costs would be paid by program revenue, Regent Flores asked if it would be possible to cover those costs and still be competitive in terms of pricing.

Dr. Noren replied that it would be essential to remain competitive in order to attract the number of patients needed to fulfill teaching, research and service responsibilities.

Regent Fish pointed out that location of the facility had not been determined, that the developer was not yet identified and that the terms of the lease were unknown. Observing that negotiations could be conducted without action by the board, he expressed concern that adoption of the resolution would indicate approval of a lease which the board had not seen. While he might well support the project when the specifics were presented, he saw no need for the resolution before the board and therefore intended to vote against it.

Vice Chancellor Noren indicated that the Department of Administration required advertising of the project, after which the department would negotiate formal terms with the appropriate firm. It was known that at least one developer had land which met the university's specifications. Noting that plans for the space had been developed over a 15-month period, he explained that the project was being brought to the board at this time, rather than in April, because of its size and complexity and because it was considered advisable to inform the regents about the project in advance of requesting approval of the terms.

Chancellor Shalala added that the plan had been to request concurrence at this time with the need for the project and with the proposal to lease space. After that, the lease would be negotiated and specific terms would be brought to the board. This process was recommended by Vice President Brown as a means of presenting complex projects.

Regent Fish disagreed with that procedure on the basis that the board should not approve a project without first being informed of the specifics. To adopt a resolution at this time would build into the process regent approval of a project for which the cost, location and other important information were not known.

Although regent approval was not needed in order to solicit proposals from developers, Vice President Brown indicated that failure to pass a resolution like the one before the board would indicate lack of support for the project. Because this was a complicated issue, the intent was to advise the board in advance of what was being proposed, so that there would be an opportunity for the regents to react to it prior to negotiation of terms.

Regent Fish felt the matter should have been brought to the board for information rather than for action.

Regent Schilling asked if the Physical Planning and Development Committee had been informed about the reasons for proposing a lease rather than construction of a facility, and Chancellor Shalala replied in the affirmative.

Regent Flores suggested that the resolution might be amended by adding the words, "subject to final approval by the Board of Regents" after the words "and negotiate terms." While he agreed that the project could have been presented for information only at this meeting, he saw no problem with approving the resolution before the board and thought solicitation of proposals should be allowed to proceed. It was important for the regents to be informed now about the project, he emphasized, adding that it had been helpful to hear about regent concerns regarding a possible escalator clause and other aspects of the plan.

Regent Clusen agreed with Vice President Brown that to defeat the resolution would imply a negative view of the project. She suggested instead that the resolution might be tabled.

Regent Fish requested unanimous consent to change the agenda item from a resolution to an informational item.

Regent Nicholas asked if to do so would detract from the ability to solicit proposals, and Chancellor Shalala replied in the negative.

There being no objection to Regent Fish's request, the agenda item was changed to an item for information only.

President Shaw indicated that a protocol was needed to give the board information about these kinds of major issues early enough so that there were not unanswered questions when the time came to make a decision.

The committee also was advised that, at the recommendation of UW System staff, Governor Thompson had initiated a proposal to amend the budget presently before the Joint Finance Committee to add \$1 million of self-amortizing bonding authority to the building program to allow construction of a shell addition to the Synchrotron Radiation Center at Stoughton, There was approximately \$25 million of federal funding available for research and development in the field of X-ray lithography which could be conducted at a facility such as this, the only other comparable facility in the country being located at Brookhaven, New York. These funds could not be used for construction but could be used for leases and equipment. felt that with the shell building, UW-Madison could be successful in attracting businesses to lease the space at the Synchrotron facilities and that bonds could be paid from lease payments. This program was considered very beneficial for the university and the state in the highly competitive electronics industry. Contacts had been made with legislators to request the amendment to the budget bill.

Chancellor Shalala explained that departmental executive committees were careful not to disrupt the salary balance within the department in setting pay levels. Increases provided in the compensation plan were distributed on the basis of merit, rather than across the board, which enabled necessary adjustments to be made.

In reply to a further question by Regent Fish, Dr. Cohen indicated that the two percent figure going to the department for this position would be calculated on the salary of the incumbent as of last October's payroll.

Regent Nicholas asked if the proposed salary took into account the significant change which had taken place in the field of business since the October 1987 stock market crash.

Replying in the affirmative, Chancellor Shalala offered assurance that, with limited resources, the department would make the best deal it could with the person to be hired, using knowledge of current market forces.

Regent Nicholas commented that highly qualified business faculty were needed and that he supported the resolution as a means toward that end.

Regent Schilling added that, in committee discussion, System Counsel Hodulik had been asked if she had reviewed the policies from a constitutional perspective. She indicated that she had and would recommend their approval.

Regent Fish said he was in favor of open campaigning in the dormitories, restrained only by the right of privacy of the students. Where campaigning was to be limited to the lobby of the dormitory, he inquired as to how the restriction would affect students who wished to put campaign signs in the windows of their rooms.

It was Attorney Hodulik's opinion that this type of activity would not be considered campaigning within the context of the administrative rule.

Regent Schilling noted that the institutional rules were diverse because they were developed by the students on the various campuses. The board was required by the administrative code to approve the institutional rules rather than simply to accept them.

Expressing agreement with Regent Fish's support for open campaigning, Regent Nikolay stated that he intended to vote against the resolution on the basis of his belief that this was not a matter which should come before the board.

# REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Chairman Lyon presented the committee's report.

At a joint meeting of the Business and Finance Committee and the Education Committee, with other regents invited to participate, action was taken on decision rules for distribution of new faculty positions, a report to the Legislative Joint Finance Committee and enrollment targets for 1988-89.

Haculty Paperoval of Decision Rules for Distribution of 1988-89 New Faculty
Positions and Report to Joint Finance Committee, R 4010 \$ 4011, pp 25-26

At the joint meeting, President Shaw presented a series of reports to be submitted to the Joint Committee on Finance to support the UW System's request to release the new positions and funding for the second year of the biennium. In the last biennial budget, 341 new positions were added to the UW System, 20 of which were to be used for financial aid counselors, and seven to be used for teacher education programs. In 1987-88, 100.5 instructional positions and seven teacher preparation positions were released, with the 1988-89 allocation to total 240.5 positions, of which 215.5 would be released on July 1, 1988, and the remaining 25 on January 1.

Budget - (sur)

Summarizing the impact of new positions on the ability to improve educational quality, the president noted that a commitment was made to the Legislature to generate a minimum of 2.5 sections per full-time equivalent position. In actuality, more than three sections per faculty position were added. About 10,000 new class spaces also were created. The departments that received the most positions were teacher education, business, communications, English and mathematics/statistics. The UW System was successful in recruiting additional minority staff, with twenty-two FTE positions filled by minority hires, 14 of which were from historically underrepresented ethnic groups.

fices - (sans) The plan for allocation of the 1988-89 positions then was reviewed. Three factors to be considered were: (1) the Composite Support Index (CSI) adjusted for 1990-91 enrollment management targets; (2) teacher preparation needs based on workload; and (3) special management considerations. positions to be released January 1, 1989, would be allocated after assessment of actual enrollments for next fall and results of minority faculty recruitment.

X and / Legislation - (2000)
Reviewing the report on faculty workload, President Shaw indicated that comparison of teaching loads based on student credit hours, weekly contact hours, and other common indicators showed that UW System institutions had workloads heavier than in peer groups. The average faculty work week was 58.8 hours.

> Also included was a report on the legislatively mandated plan for the efficient use of instructional academic staff.

Turning to another section of the report, the president pointed out that add/drop policies had been or were being reviewed at all institutions. Substantial changes were made at some, including shortening of the drop period, placing drops on student transcripts, and using automatic or administrative drops for students who missed initial classes. Options being considered included limiting credits in initial registration, imposing a transaction fee for add/drops, and imposing minimum standards on credit completion. While recognizing the need for more regulation to protect access, regents cautioned against making add/drop policy too rigid.

Also included in the report was an update on the ongoing study of the feasibility of implementing a per-credit tuition structure. Consideration was being given to a straight per-credit fee model and a revised plateau for the definition of full load, as well as other options. It was indicated that the administrative burden of a per-credit structure would be substantial. The full report would be presented to the board, after which it would be submitted to the Joint Finance Committee.

Subsequent to the president's summary of the reports, the committees unanimously approved Resolution 4010.

Adoption by the board of Resolution 4010 was moved by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Nikolay and unanimously carried.

Resolution 4010: That the Board of Regents approve the Decision Rules included in the Plan for Allocating the New Instructional Positions in 1988-89, item I.2.a.(1). These rules will form the basis for actual allocations, which will be finalized in the 1988-89 annual internal operating budget but are included in the attached plans for informational purposes.

Reporting unanimous approval by the committees of Resolution 4011, Regent Lyon moved its adoption by the board. The motion was seconded by Regent Fish and voted unanimously.

Resolution 4011: That the Report on Use of 1987-88 Instructional Positions, including the Report of the Use of the New Faculty Positions and Plan for Allocating the New Positions in 1988-89; the Report on Faculty Workload in the University of Wisconsin System; the Plan for the Efficient Use of Instructional Academic Staff; the Report on Add/Drop Procedures; and the Update on Per Credit Tuition Study be received and approved for transmittal by the Board of Regents to the Joint Committee on Finance as directed by 1987 Wisconsin Act 27, Section 3054 (2b) and (3b).

Approval of 1988-89 Enrollment Targets, R4012, pp 26-27, YEXA

Regent Lyon summarized a review by the committees of 1988-89 enrollment targets, which included minor changes to targets previously set for 1988-89 in the Regents' Plan for the Future of the the UW System. These adjustments

were being made to more accurately reflect the experience of the past fall and to allow for smoother movement toward the 1990-91 targets. Enrollment targets for two institutions had been reduced, while targets were raised at UW-Whitewater and the UW-Centers to adjust for problems of the previous fall and to allow a smoother transition to the 1990-91 goals. Additional funding would not be provided for those increased enrollments. Other institutional targets remained the same.

Regent Nikolay expressed concern about the impact of enrollment limits on minority students. President Shaw indicated that students most affected by enrollment management would be those who were not well prepared for higher education.

With Regent Nikolay dissenting, the committees approved Resolution 4012.

Upon motion by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Jarvis, Resolution 4012 was adopted by the board, with Regent Nikolay voting "No."

Resolution 4012: That, on the recommendation of the President of the UW System, the Board of Regents approve the Enrollment Management Targets for 1988-89, item I.2.a.(2), as targets for each institution and that these targets serve as the basis for establishing student tuition and fee levels.

(The 1988-89 enrollment targets are attached as EXHIBIT A.)

After conclusion of the joint meeting with the Education Committee, the Business and Finance Committee reconvened to complete its agenda.

### Approval of Gifts, Grants and Contracts

Acting Vice President Marnocha reported to the committee that gifts, grants and contracts for the eight-month period ending February 19, 1988, totaled \$233.3 million--\$14.2 million more than the same period last year. The federal share increased \$3.8 million, which included increases of \$2.6 million in instruction and \$2.1 million in student aid, partially offset by decreases in extension of \$.8 million and research of \$.5 million. The non-federal share increased \$10.3 million, or about 20 percent over a year ago. A significant portion of the increase was support from the UW Foundation for UW-Madison.

Regent Lyon moved adoption by the board of the following resolution which was unanimously approved by the committee. The motion was seconded by Regent Jarvis and carried unanimously.

Resolution 4013:

That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

Bequest of Lillian R. Gay, R 4014, P.28

Resolution 4014, which was unanimously approved by the committee, was moved by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Nicholas and adopted unanimously by

The amount of the scholarship and the number of students shall be at the discretion of the Institution's Scholarship Governing Board.")

Tenarcial aid -

Report to the Joint Finance Committee on Lawton Undergraduate Minority Retention Grants, R 4015, PP 28-29

Regent Lyon reported unanimous approval by the committee of the UW System's report to the Joint Committee on Finance on the Lawton Undergraduate Minority Retention Grant Program. Wisconsin Statutes required an annual evaluation to be provided by March 1 of each year to the Joint Committee on Finance.

XM Legislature - (com)

The intent of the program was to improve retention and to reduce student borrowing. While it was too early to tell whether the program had been successful in that regard, the overall feeling was that results were positive. These need-based grants were to be provided after all other forms of grant aid had been exhausted. Recipients must be enrolled for a minimum of six credits and must be in good academic standing. While sophomores currently were being targeted as recipients, the intent was to expand the program to juniors and seniors as funds increased. Freshmen were not eligible for the program.

About \$1.4 million in Lawton Grants were awarded in 1986-87, representing about 982 individual grants. The average award totaled approximately \$1,400 per student. Of the Black, Hispanic and American Indian students receiving financial aid, approximately 27 percent received a Lawton Grant, which amounted to about 30 percent of their total financial aid package.

Upon motion by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Nicholas, Resolution 4015 was adopted unanimously by the board.

Resolution 4015:

Sertland-

That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Board of Regents accepts the report of the 1986-87 Ben R. Lawton Undergraduate Minority Retention Grant program activity for transmittal to the Joint Committee on Finance as directed by s. 36.34(1)(b), Wis. Stats.

Ocreation of Wisconsin Scotland Trust, R4016, pp 29-30

At the committee meeting, Legal Counsel Stathas described the Scotland program, which was being administered by UW-River Falls on behalf of the West Central Wisconsin Consortium. By assigning the Scotland program to the "Wisconsin Scotland Trust," a qualified United Kingdom charitable trust, it would qualify for a 50 percent reduction in property taxes. It was estimated the tax savings would be about 20,000 pounds per year. The lease cost was fixed at 48,500 pounds for five years but the landlord could choose not to renew due to financial hardship. Without the reduction, the program might have to be closed in May 1989. Now in its second year, the program had approximately 80 students participating each semester.

Xuf Vur River factor ( same )

Resolution 4016 was moved by Regent Lyon, seconded by Regent Jarvis, and adopted unanimously by the board.

Resolution 4016:

That, upon the recommendation of the West Central Wisconsin Consortium and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board of Regents are authorized to sign a Deed of Trust constituting the "Wisconsin Scotland Trust," a separate United Kingdom Charitable Trust, for the purpose of promoting, establishing, and supporting within Scotland a place of learning for students of The University of Wisconsin System. The initial trustees shall be:

- 1. The person holding the position of Resident Director, Dalkeith House, Scotland.
- 2. The person holding the position of Chairperson, Board of Trustee, West Central Wisconsin Consortium.
- 3. Attorney David Houldsworth, of Edinburgh, Scotland.

The operation of the existing program in Scotland will be assigned to the "Wisconsin Scotland Trust" which will be a qualified United Kingdom Charitable Trust enjoying a preferred operating status for which our current program does not qualify.

Faculty 
Amendment to 1981 Regent Resolution on UW-Madison Faculty Retention Fund, R 4017,

Regent Lyon reported unanimous committee approval of Chancellor Shalala's request to expand the allowable use of the UW-Madison Faculty Retention Fund. In accordance with a resolution adopted in 1981, the income could be used to promote faculty retention through one-time compensation adjustments for existing faculty. The request was for authority to use this fund not only for faculty retention but also for recruitment of new faculty. Funds would be used to support first-year salaries of new faculty or visiting faculty or for one-time start-up grants for faculty research projects. UW-Madison had found the funds to be useful in retaining faculty and felt needs of faculty recruitment could be met through the expanded use of the funds. Only the income, currently around \$100,000, would be expendable; the principal of \$340,000 would remain intact.

Yef Compensation - (San)
It was moved by Regent Lyon and seconded by Regent Jarvis that the
following resolution be adopted by the board:

Resolution 4017: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the resolution which established the UW-Madison Faculty Retention Fund be amended to allow expenditures of the Fund to be used for the purpose of recruiting "for potential faculty members, including visiting faculty, for whom it is clear that the campus administration must act if the person is to be recruited", and that the title of the Fund be changed to the UW-Madison Faculty Retention and Recruitment Fund.

In response to a question by Regent Hanson, Chancellor Shalala explained that the request would provide flexibility for use in recruiting when a start-up package was needed, but that the major use would continue to be for retention. It was hoped that the fund would be particularly helpful in recruiting minority and women faculty. Monies from the fund used for new faculty salaries would be worked into the budget on a transition basis. The fund also could be used to purchase equipment needed by new faculty members.

Regent Nikolay questioned use of the fund for equipment purchases.

As an example of how the fund could be used, Chancellor Shalala explained that, in recruiting a new faculty member in engineering, a package might include not simply the salary, but also equipment and laboratory space. Money from the fund could pay for part of that package.

Regent Fish pointed out that, in addition to \$100,000 of accrued interest, there would be a maximum of \$30,000-\$35,000 annually which could be expended.

to the vote, Resolution 4016 was unanimously adopted by the board.

Municipal Services 
Recommended Methodology for Assessment of Municipal Services Charges, \$4018,

The committee heard a report on the recommendations of the working group appointed by President Shaw in response to the June 4, 1987, Board of Regents' resolution to develop a recommended distribution of municipal services chargebacks for 1988-89. The working group was asked to address the following four questions:

1. What allocation guidelines should be used in distributing the total UW System bill for municipal service charges among institutions?

How should federal research grants be treated in determining institutional liability?

How should the UW Hospital be treated in determining an equitable distribution of this bill?

Once institutional shares of the total bill are determined, should each institution determine for itself how to pay its assigned amount or should there be systemwide guidelines? If the latter, what guidelines should be developed?

Xief Rufiliaries - (source)

After reviewing the recommendations of the working group, which were endorsed by President Shaw, the committee unanimously approved Resolution 4018.

> Regent Lyon moved and Regent Nikolay seconded adoption by the board of the following resolution:

That, upon the recommendation of the President of the Resolution 4018: University of Wisconsin System the following guidelines be adopted as the methodology for assessment of municipal services charges:

- 1) a fair cost for providing fire and police protection service at the UW Hospital and Clinics be determined and the annual assessment be equal to that amount.
- 2) remaining State charges be distributed to the other program revenue and federally funded programs, except for academic fees, in a two step approach:

- a) prorate the assessment by involved funds on the basis of the percent each individual fund is of the total of all funds.
- b) except for the amount assessed to auxiliaries, prorate the fund assessment to the institutions on the basis of their percent of fund total. Distribute the assessment to auxiliary operations on a flat per student basis.
- 3) the institutions have maximum flexibility to determine how to pay for charges assigned to auxiliary operations. The Chancellor should seek the advice and counsel of the appropriate student body before making a final recommendation.
- 4) by May 1, 1988 each institution submit its plan for the payment of the assessed charges to System Administration for approval.
- 5) in the absence of an approved plan for auxiliaries each student of the institution be charged an across-the-board fee in an amount sufficient to pay the assessment. Said fee should be paid for each academic term including summer session and may be prorated for interim sessions of less than four weeks.

Regent Flores asked who would decide the fair cost of providing fire and police protection for the UW Hospital. In response, Acting Vice President Marnocha said System Administration would work with UW-Madison to determine that figure.

In response to a question by Regent Hanson, Regent Lyon explained that this year's charge for municipal services had not been determined but was expected to total \$3.5-\$4 million. About one third would come from auxiliaries, with the remainder charged to federal grants/contracts, UW Hospital, and other non-GPR sources.

President Shaw added that the assessments resulted from legislation charging the university for municipal services previously paid by Department of Administration funds. As an interim measure last year, institutions were allocated a portion of the assessment and then made determinations on how to pay it. While many charged students an across-the-board amount, some charged a certain fee and also charged extra for parking and other auxiliary activities. While the resolution before the board was an attempt to rationalize the process, it was not possible to make it completely fair because charges by municipalities varied widely.

In response to a question by Regent Nikolay, Regent Fish noted that the state refunded money to the municipalities and then recovered that money from state agencies, including the UW System.

Put to the vote, Resolution 4018 was adopted by the board, with Regent Hanson voting "No."

Meeting with WHEC on GSL Defaults, p.33

Mr. Marnocha reported on a visit he and Internal Audit Director William Brunkow made to the Wisconsin Higher Education Corporation (WHEC), in order to determine if additional effort could be put forth by the UW System to reduce defaults on GSL loans.

The discussion indicated WHEC was pleased with the cooperation received from UW System institutions. WHEC suggested that it would be helpful if the lender and WHEC could be notified when students were no longer enrolled, rather than waiting for the required reporting date, so that WHEC and the lender could get an earlier start in contacting them. They also suggested that the university might send a letter to students indicating their responsibilities for loan payment.

The default rates, as calculated for the various UW System institutions, ranged from 5.1 percent at UW-Madison to 16.8 percent at UW-Superior, with the majority falling between 6 percent and 9 percent. All were within the acceptable default rate of 20 percent proposed by Secretary of Education William Bennett. The default rates supplied by WHEC were somewhat different from those presented by the Department of Education, in that they were based upon total dollars of loans in default at the institution divided by the total loans guaranteed, rather than the number of individuals in default.
