WATCH REPAIRING.

A good watch is the most perfect and delicate piece of machinery made in the world. It requires great natural ability and the practical experience of many years to make or repair a watch *right*. Ability without experience is as incompetent to do good work as experience without ability. Both qualities are essential. Still an inexperienced hand with talent for the finer mechanical arts, will never spoil a watch, and a person thus qualified is far more able to handle a watch than the individual who styles himself "watchmaker," but who has been endowed by nature with no more ability to "fix" a watch than an elephant has been to thread a needle. There are so many poor and spoiled watches in this country, simply because there are so many "Jewelers" that do not understand their business. A watch is only spoiled when left in some shops to be repaired. Carriers of watches break them, often abuse them, but never *spoil* them. A competent mechanic can always repair them as good as ever. But alas for the time piece that chances to fall into the hands of Mr. Know-nothing-at-all-about-watches. Left with him in good faith that it will be effectually cured of all its ailments, it undergoes a course of treatment so pernicious in its effects that the beauty and perfection of its original organization is entirely destroyed, and when it is finally returned to the victimized owner and he be so fortunate as to hear it tick, tick, in spite of solders and sledgehammers, it is nevertheless so broken down in constitution, so shaky in its bones and so faint in its breath that it is hardly able to move, much less to be a correct time keeper.

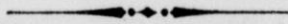
HISTORICAL AND COMMERCIAL REVIEW.

PROGRESS AND PROSPECTS OF THE CITY.

THIRTY ONE years ago this present month of June, Thos. A. Holmes and a comrade, who resided at the trading post of Solomon Juneau, at the mouth of "Milwauky" river, came to the spot now occupied by the City of Janesville, on Rock River, on an exploring expedition. No white man lived here then. All the fair and pleasant valley in which a city now nestles itself, was in a state of nature.

We, of this day, can scarcely imagine its aspect at that time, so great and marvellous has been the change. Then, as now, the smiling and pleasant river, with its pure and sparkling water, was here, but it ran free from the impediments of dams, or bridges, or the plashing mill-wheel, in a

swift current; which was afterwards called "Holmes' Rapids," in the government reports; but whether in honor of Thomas, Joshua or William Holmes, who settled here in the autumn following, is not known. On its bosom, doubtless, the first pioneer, Holmes, saw the Indian pursuing the finny tribe, spear in hand, in his bark canoe, as this was a favorite fishing and camping ground of the Red Man. This, with an occasional startled deer, as he bounded up the orchard-like slopes of oak openings, or the grouse whirring over the grassy prairie, was all that disturbed the solitude. We denizens of Janesville now call this a beautiful locality, and never is there a dissent from a new observer, especially in the "leafy month" of June, as he gazes upon the shining river that winds, reluctant to depart, between the wooded hills, or, as he looks out upon the wider glories of the prairie region, that clasps close upon the valley here. But how much more lovely it must have been before it was marred by the hand of modern improvement, as it was seen by the first white man who looked down and over upon the scene from the high bluffs on the eastern side of the valley!



FIRST SETTLEMENT.



This is a pleasant picture for the lovers of Nature to dwell upon, but civilized man cannot subsist alone upon the beautiful in Nature and Art. This the early pioneer soon realized, although not averse to the matchless scenery by which he was surrounded. In searching for a "good location," he saw instinctively, if not by reason, that this was a place destined for something more than the solitary home of the husbandman. Here was a river to be crossed, with easy approaches on either side—rough hills above, upon the stream, hills and marshes southwest for miles—which would turn the tide of travel to a point, where the bluffs sloped

down to a shallow, swift-place in the river with a rocky bed, which in low water might be forded, and in high water a ferry could be erected, a natural place for the beginning of a town.

The first point selected for settlement was just above the present Monterey bridge, where Joshua Holmes, William Holmes, Jr., John Inman, George Fulmer, and Milo Jones, put up a cabin in October, 1835, opposite the "Big Rock," which was in those days considerably larger than it is now, and was crowned with a growth of beautiful cedars. The river here was readily crossed by fording, and the place of passage was called the "Big Rock Ford."

Other settlers joined these pioneers in 1835, and in November of that year Thomas Holmes laid out the village of Rockport, as it now appears upon the map, in the Fourth Ward of our city.

In 1836, still more settlers came in, and among them Henry F. Janes, his brother Edward, John P. Dickson, W. H. H. Bailey, Levi St. John, and others, who located upon the east side of the river. Henry Janes, selected a half section for his claim, and erected a log cabin upon the spot where Lappin's Block is now located. Here he kept a pioneer's tavern, adding to it a ferry, which was known as "Janes' Ferry," to an extensive region east and west. This was really the first commencement of what is now the City of Janesville. It was soon found to be the best crossing place of travel and traffic between the Lake and the Lead Mines, and a sort of half-way station between Lake Michigan and the Mississippi river.

COUNTY SEAT LOCATED.

When the boundaries of the County of Rock came to be defined, it was evident that this point was best fitted to be-

come the County Seat, and notwithstanding there was much opposition from those interested in Rockport, Beloit, and other places, the territorial legislature established the County Seat upon the fractional quarter section located by Mr. Janes upon the east side of the river, which he platted in the spring of 1839, and the town was named by the people of the Embryo City—JANESVILLE. The land not coming into market until 1839, the County Commissioners pre-empted it under a provision of the law for the laying out of county seats, and thus Mr. Janes realized but small advantage for his enterprise. He did not remain here for a great length of time afterwards, and now resides in California, upon the shore of the Pacific. Here the old pioneer must pause in his migrations, if indeed the restless spirit of enterprise does not carry him still further to some new Eldorado in the Western Seas.

DEVELOPMENT OF THE WATER-POWER.

Thus the first step was taken in the settlement of the city. With all the advantages of a healthy and beautiful location, which this point possesses in an eminent degree, together with a natural geographical center for travel, surrounded by an exceedingly fertile agricultural country, it could not have materially increased in size had it not been for the development and improvement of its water-power. Fortunately the river has a fall here of some twelve feet, and if this could be made available for manufactures the permanent prosperity of the town would be rendered certain.

In 1843 the village could number a population of only 333, but at this time we may date the beginning of the substantial growth of the town, for during that year A. Hyatt Smith, Charles Stevens, and Lewis E. Stone, were author-

ized to construct a dam across Rock River. The dam was erected in 1845, by Smith & Bailey for a four feet head. In 1847 the "Big Mill" was completed, and was owned by A. Hyatt Smith, W. H. H. Bailey, Martin O. Walker and J. B. Doe. The completion of this mill, which has six run of stones, was an enterprise of great magnitude, especially for those days, and was an event of as much importance to the town as any other which has ever occurred in its history. Since then seven other mills have been built, the whole driving 22 run of stones.

In the autumn of 1848, the improvement of the water-power in the southern part of the city was commenced by Ira Miltimore, and was completed in 1859. It is a dam of solid mason work, and is 200 feet long and five feet in height. A flouring mill, owned by Mr. Hastings, and a woolen factory, of which F. Whitaker is proprietor, are the only works driven by this water-power. A large amount of power still remains unoccupied, and when fully used must greatly increase the manufacturing importance of Janesville.

CITY GOVERNMENT.

Up to the year 1853 Janesville had been under a township government. At that time it was thought best by the people that we should have a municipal government separate from the town of Janesville. Accordingly, the legislature of that year incorporated the City of Janesville, and it has since remained under that organization. The following gentlemen have been elected to the office of Mayor up to this time: Messrs. A. Hyatt Smith, J. B. Doe, E. L. Dimock, J. J. R. Pease, S. A. Hudson, R. B. Treat, John Mitchell, and Henry Palmer.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Soon after the establishment of the city government a Fire Department was instituted. Two companies, Rock River No. 1, Water Witch No. 2, were organized in 1854, and a Hook and Ladder company, (Rescue No. 1,) in 1857. These companies have been conducted with zeal and energy. Their spirited members deserve and receive the full reward of praise for their meritorious services to the city.

RAILROADS.

Janesville has not been behind her sister cities of the State in seeking the benefits of railroad enterprises, and her citizens have manifested commendable public spirit in the liberal use of their means to attain these objects. If all has not been secured that our position seemed to warrant, yet it is sufficient to connect us with the great markets of the country, and to place us upon an equality with the most favored cities of the State. The Milwaukee and Prairie du Chien Railway was the first to reach us, in January, 1853, and was extended west to the village of Monroe, in 1858. The Chicago and Northwestern Railway was finished to this city in November, 1857, extended to Oshkosh in 1859, and to Green Bay in 1863. The facilities of railroad communication are ample for present use, but when every foot of our rich soil is cultivated in the best manner, when population doubles, and manufactures are quadrupled, as they will be, it is easy to foresee additional lines of railroads connecting with the distributing commercial centers of the country.

STREETS AND BRIDGES.

The enterprise of a city is, to a certain extent, known by the appearance of its streets and bridges, and the expenditures upon them. Fortunately for Janesville, in this respect, the great nuisance of excessive grading was never necessary. This nature did for us, and she also gave us the limestone gravel of our bluffs as an excellent material for our roadways, and more than all made perfect drainage a necessity. Hence at no time have we any stagnant water in our streets and lanes; and mud, except in early spring is unknown. To this, more than to any other fact, may be attributed the uniform good health which has been one of the chief blessings of our favored city.

In the building of bridges Janesville has not been lacking. In 1842, the first bridge was erected upon which toll was collected for a number of years, which gave place to the one now in use, called the upper bridge, completed in 1854, at an expense of \$11,000. In 1856 the bridge between Pleasant and Court streets was built in place of the old "free bridge," at an expense of \$11,000, and a third one was erected at Monterey, costing \$12,000.

There are also two extensive railroad bridges spanning Rock River, above and below the city, which, although no part of the city improvements proper, yet they are marked features in its topography, and together cost not less than \$100,000.

MERCHANTS OF JANESVILLE.

Our wholesale and retail houses are among the first in the State, and transact a large and increasing trade, with a wide extent of country. The merchants of Janesville are distinguished for their enterprise and for the honorable

manner in which they conduct their business. While attentive and successful in their calling, they are not unmindful of their duty as citizens, and have always been foremost in efforts for the social, moral and intellectual advancement, as well as the material prosperity of the city. In the field of commercial enterprise, their own prosperity, no less than the proud position of the city to-day, attests their foresight and ability.

MANUFACTURES.

Of the manufacturing interests of Janesville, we can only say that it has grown so large that it would be impossible within the limits of this sketch, to give a detailed account of it. The aggregate of the annual manufacturing production is now estimated at \$1,623,000. It consists principally of flour, agricultural implements, furniture, woolen cloth, cigars, wagons, carriages, &c., &c.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS AND EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.

The educational interests of the city have not been neglected. As early as 1846 an Academy was established, of which Rev. T. J. Ruger was the first principal. In 1855, the public schools of the city were consolidated under the Union System, with a Board of Education to manage its affairs. Each ward is provided with schools for primary and intermediate departments, while the more advanced pupils receive instruction in the High School. The cost of the school property of this city has not been less than \$65,000. The annual cost of the free schools exceed \$10,000. This

system, with its heavy expenditure was commenced seven years ago, and so well convinced are the people that it "pays," in money as well as in the promotion of morals, that it is unflinchingly and perseveringly pursued. In addition to the public schools, there are a number of private schools, which are well supported.

The State Institute for the Education of the Blind is located in a beautiful situation in the southern part of the city. With its elegant stone edifice and fine grounds it presents a commanding appearance to the eye. It is noted for its superior internal arrangements, and for the successful system of instruction and care of the unfortunate class to whom its interests are devoted, and is regarded with confidence and pride by the surrounding population. It is at present under the superintendence of Prof. T. H. Little and a corps of teachers, and admirably and satisfactorily fulfills the benevolent designs of its founders.

RELIGIOUS INSTITUTIONS.

The early settlers of Janesville brought with them from their eastern homes their habits of religious worship, and before a house was completed for this purpose, they held meetings in the open air. It is said that the first meeting of this kind was held under some beautiful oak trees, a little east of where the Myers House now stands. Since that time nine churches have been erected to accommodate the increasing wants of the religious community, viz: Methodist, Episcopal, (two houses of worship,) Baptist, Congregational, Primitive Methodist, Catholic, Presbyterian, and Unitarian.

HOTELS.

This city has some of the most elegant and capacious Hotels in the State. Among them, the Hyatt House, Myers House, American, Schuyler and Stevens House take precedence.

BENEVOLENT SOCIETIES.

There are in Janesville two Lodges of Free Masons, one Chapter of Royal Arch Masons, one Council, one Commandry, one Odd Fellows Lodge, one Encampment, one Sons of Temperance, one Good Templars, and one Cadets of Temperance.

There is also a Young Men's Literary Association, which is in a flourishing condition, having a good library, and which furnishes an annual course of lectures, which are largely patronized by our citizens.

THE OAK-HILL CEMETERY

Association was organized on the 8th of January, 1851, for the purpose of purchasing a proper place for the repose of the dead of the city. The Association at first purchased twenty acres of land situated about two miles northwardly from the city, commanding a fine view of the river, city and surrounding country. Another purchase has added sixteen acres. The whole has been inclosed and properly laid out. It is a credit to our city, and is another evidence of the progress of a refined taste and a higher civilization. The interments to May 1st, 1866, were 983.

THE PRESS.

Fifteen different newspapers have been published in Janesville, all of which have ceased to exist except the Janesville Daily and Weekly *Gazette*, which was the first one established. The original proprietors were Levi Alden and E. A. Stoddard. It was afterwards published by Alden & Holt, Chas. Holt alone, Holt, Bowen & Wilcox, and Thomson & Roberts, the present proprietors. The *Gazette* may be regarded as one of the regular institutions of the city and county, as it is one of the best and most influential papers of the State.

The Job Printing Office of VEEDER & DEVEREUX, has been established for several years, and is doing an increasing and prosperous business. They have justly gained a high reputation in the art of typography, and the neat and correct execution of this Directory may be regarded as a specimen of their skill in Book Printing.

POST OFFICE.

The first Postmaster of the city of Janesville, was Henry F. Janes, who commenced the discharge of his duties on the 23d day of April, 1837. It is said that a cigar box nailed upon a log in the bar of the primitive Hotel, was for some months sufficient to contain all the mail matter received at the office. For the third quarter in 1852, the amount of receipts was \$335; third quarter of 1861, \$1198; and the first quarter of 1866, \$2010, from the sale of stamps alone. The following are the names of the several Postmasters of this city: H. L. Janes, D. F. Kimball, J. L. Kimball, C. L. Jordan, Sam'l H. Alden, E. H. Strong, D. C. Brown, Ezra Miller and J. M. Burgess.

DESIRABLENESS OF LOCATION.

The central position of Janesville, its fine water power, its commercial advantages, the excellent agricultural country which surrounds it, its healthful situation, excellent schools, churches and society, together with the varied and charming scenery which encompass the town, make it a most desirable place for all those who are seeking a comfortable and satisfactory place of residence. Had we space much might be added in description of the fine residences and pleasant homes which everywhere abound in our city, as well as the elegant blocks of buildings and public edifices which the wealth and taste of our citizens have erected.

ROCK RIVER IMPROVEMENT.

It was an early project of those who had studied the topography of the Rock River Valley, to so improve the river by dams and slack water as to insure navigation to the Mississippi and to the Lakes. This plan has been recently revived with every prospect of success. When it is accomplished, it will mark another era in the onward progress and prosperity of Janesville. It will add largely to its already excellent commercial and manufacturing advantages, and a corresponding increase of population and wealth may be confidently expected.

APPENDIX.

The reader is referred to the appendix at the close of this volume for a variety of statistical information, which could not be conveniently embodied in this sketch. It will be found of much value and of great convenience as a reference.

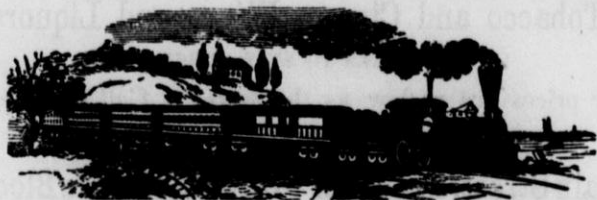

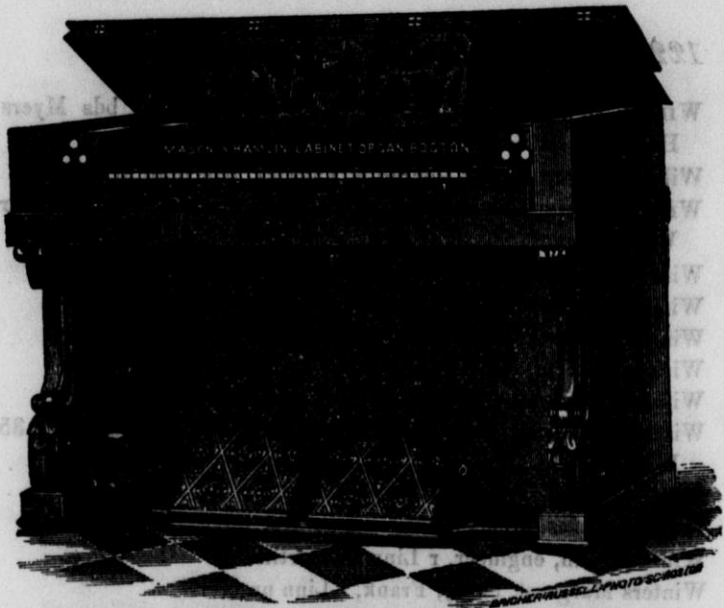

CHAPTER I.

CITY AND WARD BOUNDARIES.

AN ACT to reduce the Act Incorporating the City of Janesville, and the several acts amendatory thereof, into one Act, and to amend the same.

THE PEOPLE of the State of Wisconsin, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows :—

SEC. 1. The act entitled "an act to reduce the law in- Title of Act.
corporating the City of Janesville, and the several acts
amendatory thereof, into one act, and amend the same," ap-
proved March 25, 1858, and the several acts amendatory
thereof, are hereby consolidated, and amended so as to read
as follows :

§ 2. The district of country in the county of Rock, con- Power of Corpo-
ration.
tained within the limits and boundaries hereinafter described,
shall be a city, by the name of Janesville, and the people
now inhabiting and those who shall hereafter inhabit said
district of country, shall be a municipal corporation, by the
name of the city of Janesville, and shall have the general
powers possessed by municipal corporations at common law,
and in addition thereto shall possess the powers herein spec-
ially granted, and the authorities thereof shall have perpetu-
al succession, shall be capable of contracting and being con-
tracted with, suing and being sued, pleading and being im-
pleaded in all courts of law and equity, and shall have a
common seal, and may change and alter the same at pleasure.

§ 3. The territory lying in the county of Rock, and in- Boundary.
cluded within the following described limits and boundaries,

The said city shall be divided into four wards, as follows: All that part of said district which lies west of the middle of Rock river and north of the middle of Pleasant street and the Galena road, shall be the first ward; and all that part of said district that lies east of the middle of Rock river and north of the middle of Court street, and the middle of the highway leading from said Court street to the northeast corner of the northeast quarter of section thirty-six, of said town three, range twelve east, and all that part of said district lying in section thirty, in township three, north of range thirteen east, shall be the second ward; all that part of said district lying south of said second ward and east and south of the middle of Rock river, and east of the line between sections one and two, township two, north of range twelve east, which lies south of the middle of Rock river, shall be the third ward; and the residue of said district shall be the fourth ward.

CHAPTER II.**ELECTIONS.**

SEC. 1. The annual election for ward and city officers shall be held on the first Tuesday in April, of each year, at such place in each ward as the Common Council shall designate, and the polls shall be kept open from nine o'clock in the forenoon till five o'clock in the afternoon, and ten days previous notice shall be given by the Common Council of the time and place of holding such election, and of the ward and city officers to be elected.

§ 2. The municipal government of said city shall consist of a Common Council, composed of the Mayor and two Aldermen from each ward. The other officers of the corporation shall be a Clerk, Treasurer, Police Justice, two Justices of the Peace, and a Sealer of Weights and Measures, to be elected by the city at large; and one Constable in each ward to be elected by such ward.

CHAPTER II.
Officers of City.

§ 3. At the annual election there shall be elected by the qualified voters of said city, a Mayor, Clerk, Treasurer and Sealer of Weights and Measures, who shall hold their respective offices for one year. At said annual election there shall also be elected by the qualified voters of each ward, an Alderman who shall hold his office for two years, and a Constable, who shall hold his office for one year. There shall also be elected every two years a Police Justice, who shall hold his office for two years. All officers of said city heretofore elected under its Charter, shall hold their respective offices until the expiration of the term for which they were elected; and nothing in this act shall be so construed as to authorize the election of any Mayor, Clerk, Treasurer, Police Justice, Justice of the Peace, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Alderman, Constable or other officer whose terms of office shall commence before the expiration of the terms of office of the Mayor, Clerk, Treasurer, Police Justice, Justice of the Peace, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Alderman, Constable or other officer heretofore elected under the Charter of said city. All elective officers specified in this act, shall hold their respective offices for the terms in this act provided, and until their successors are elected and qualified. All other officers named in this act, and which are not by this act declared elective, shall be appointed by the Common Council, by ballot; *provided, however*, the Common Council shall have power, for due cause, to expel any of their own members, and to remove from office any officer or agent under the city government, due notice being first given to the officer or agent complained of, to appear and show cause before the Common Council why he should not be removed.

CHAPTER II.

Representation

§ 4. The several wards in this city shall be represented in the common council, by two Alderman who shall be residents thereof. If any aldermen remove from the ward represented by him, his office shall thereby become vacant.

§ 5. Whenever a vacancy shall occur in the office of Mayor or Alderman, Justice of the Peace or Police Justice, such vacancy shall be filled by a new election, which may be ordered by the Common Council, and held within fifteen days after such vacancy shall occur. Any vacancy happening in any other office shall be filled by the Common Council. The person elected or appointed to fill such vacancy, shall hold his office and discharge the duties thereof for the unexpired term, and with the same rights and subject to the same liabilities as the person whose office he may be elected or appointed to fill.

§ 6. All elections by the people shall be by ballot, and a plurality of votes shall constitute an election. Where two or more candidates for an elective office, shall have an equal number of votes for the same office, the election shall be determined by the casting of lots in the presence of the Common Council, and under its direction.

Qualifications for

§ 7. All persons entitled to vote for county or State officers, and who shall have resided within the ward where they offer to vote for twenty days next preceding the election, shall be entitled to vote for any officer to be elected under this act, and to hold any office thereby created.

Mode of conduct-

§ 8. The elections in said city shall be held and conducted by the aldermen of each ward and an elector of the ward to be chosen by them, which aldermen and elector so chosen shall be inspectors of election, and shall take the usual oaths or affirmations as prescribed by the general laws of this State to be taken by the judges and inspectors of election, and shall have the same powers and authority, and the said inspectors and the clerks of the election appointed by them shall be subject to the same penalties and punishments for any willful and corrupt violation of their respective duties, as such inspectors and clerks, as now prescribed for like willful or corrupt violation of duty by the general election laws of this State; and said elections shall be conducted in the

same manner, as far as consistent with this act, and vacancies in the board of inspectors thereof filled as required by the laws of this State regarding elections. CHAPTER II.

§ 9. If any person offering to vote at any election held under this act, is challenged as unqualified by an elector, or by one of the inspectors of an election, one of the inspectors shall tender him the following oath or affirmation: "You do swear (or affirm). that you will fully and truly answer all such questions as shall be put to you touching your place of residence and qualifications as an elector at this election." The inspectors of such election, or one of them shall then put to the person so challenged, the questions required by the general election law of this State to be put to persons offering to vote and so challenged, at general or special elections held pursuant to laws of this State, and if he shall refuse to answer such questions or any or either of them fully, it shall be the duty of such inspectors to reject his vote. Voters may be challenged.

§ 10. If the challenge be not withdrawn after the person offering to vote shall have answered the questions put to him as aforesaid, one of the inspectors shall tender to him the oath required to be taken by the general election laws of this State, by persons offering to vote, and challenged, at general or special elections held pursuant to the laws of this State; and in addition thereto he shall be required to swear that he has resided in the ward in which he offers his vote for the twenty days next preceding such election; and the provisions of the general laws of this State applicable to persons offering to vote, and challenged as unqualified to vote at general or special elections held pursuant to law, shall apply to all elections held pursuant to this act. Oath to be taken if challenged — not withdrawn.

§ 11. Whenever any person's vote shall have been received after having taken either or both the oaths or affirmations provided in the ninth and tenth sections of chapter two of this act, it shall be the duty of the clerks of the election to write on the poll book at the end of such person's name, "sworn;" and if any person challenged as unqualified to vote, shall be guilty of wilful and corrupt false swearing or affirming, in taking any oath or affirmation provided by this act, such person shall be adjudged guilty of wilful and cor- Duty of Clerk—penalty for taking false oath.

rupt purjury, and upon conviction thereof shall suffer the punishment attached by the laws of this State to the crime of purjury. If any person who is not a qualified voter shall vote at any election held under the provisions of this act, or if any person duly qualified to vote for the officers elected at large in said city, or on a proposition submitted to the electors thereof, shall vote in any ward other than the one in which he resides, or shall vote more than once at the same election, he shall be liable to indictment, and upon conviction thereof he shall be held and adjudged to suffer the same punishment as prescribed in this act for being guilty of wilful and corrupt false swearing or affirming in taking any oath or affirmation provided by this act.

§ 12. When any election under this chapter shall be closed, the number of votes for each candidate or person voted for shall be counted and ascertained, the said inspector shall make return thereof, stating therein the number of votes for each and every office, and shall deliver or cause to be delivered such returns to the clerk of the city within three days after any such election; and thereupon the common council shall meet and canvass the same, and declare the result of the election, and it shall be the duty of the city clerk to notify all persons elected or appointed to office of their election or appointment, and unless such persons shall respectively qualify within ten days thereafter, the offices shall become vacant.

Special elections.

§ 13. Special elections to fill vacancies, or for any other purpose, shall be held and conducted by the aldermen of each ward, and an elector of the ward to be chosen by them in the same manner, and the returns thereof shall be made in the same form, as of general or annual elections, and within the time prescribed in the next preceding section.

§ 14. The term of every officer elected under this act, shall commence on the 3d Tuesday in April of the year for which he was elected, and shall, unless in this act otherwise provided, continue for one year, and until his successor is elected and qualified.

§ 15. Should there be a failure for any cause by the people to elect any of the officers herein required to be

elected on the day designated, the common council may order a new election for such office to be held, ten days' notice of the time and place of holding such election being first given.

CHAPTER III.

OFFICERS—THEIR POWERS AND DUTIES.

SEC. 1. Every person chosen or appointed to an office or place of trust under this act, shall take and subscribe the oath of office prescribed in the constitution of this state, to be taken by executive and judicial officers, and file it, duly certified by the officer before whom the same was taken, with the clerk of the city. To take oath.

§. 2. The mayor shall, before he enters upon the duties of his office, in addition to the usual oath, swear or affirm that he will devote so much of his time to the duties of his office as an efficient and faithful discharge thereof may require. He shall, when present, preside over the meetings of the Common Council, and shall have a vote only in case of a tie, but shall in no case have a vote in the appointment of any officer or agent appointed under this act; and every ordinance passed by the Common Council shall, before it takes effect, be presented by the clerk to the Mayor. If he approves, he shall sign and return it to the clerk; but if not, he shall return it, with his objections, to the Common Council at its next stated meeting. The Common Council may then reconsider the vote by which such ordinance was passed. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of the members of the Common Council pass such ordinance, it shall take effect and become an ordinance of the city. The Mayor may also withhold his signature to any order directed to be drawn upon the city treasurer, but the Common Council may, at any stated meeting thereafter, by a two-thirds vote of its members, direct the Mayor to sign such order. Thereupon the clerk shall immediately indorse upon the back of such order, "the Mayor is directed by two-thirds vote of the Common Council to sign this order." The clerk shall then sign such indorsement, and such order shall then be as valid Mayor—his powers and duties.

CHAPTER III.

against the city as if signed by the Mayor. He shall also take care that the laws of the State and the ordinances are duly enforced, observed and respected, and that all other executive officers of the city discharge their respective duties. He shall from time to time give the Council such information and recommend such measures as he may deem advantageous to the city. The Mayor shall likewise have the power, *ex officio*, to administer any oath required to be taken by this act, and shall be the chief executive officer and the head of the police of the city, and he shall have the power, whenever in his opinion the exigence of the case shall require it, to appoint as many special or temporary police as he may deem necessary; but such appointment of such police shall not continue after the next meeting of the Council, without the approval of the Council.

§ 3. At the first meeting of the Common Council in each year, the aldermen shall proceed to elect by ballot one of their number president, and in the absence of the Mayor, the said president shall preside over the meetings of the Common Council, and during the absence of the Mayor from the city, or his inability from any reason to discharge the duties of his office, the said president shall have and exercise all the powers and perform all the duties of Mayor until the Mayor shall resume his office, or the vacancy be filled by a new election. In case the Mayor and president shall be absent from any meeting of the Common Council, they shall proceed to elect a temporary presiding officer, who for the time being shall discharge all the duties of Mayor. The president, or temporary presiding officer, while presiding over the Council, or performing the duties of Mayor, shall be styled acting Mayor.

§ 4. The members of the Common Council shall be fire-wardens and conservators of the peace, and shall be exempt from jury duty during their term of office.

Clerk's duties.

§ 5. The clerk shall keep the corporate seal and all papers belonging to said city, and make and keep a record of the proceedings of the Common Council, at whose meetings it shall be his duty to attend; and copies of all papers duly filed in his office, and transcripts from the records of

the proceedings of the Common Council, certified by him under the corporate seal, shall be evidence in all courts in like manner as if the originals were produced. He shall likewise draw and countersign all orders on the treasury, in pursuance of any order or resolution of the Common Council, and keep a full and accurate account thereof in books provided for that purpose. He shall file in his office all chattel mortgages presented to him for that purpose, and safely keep the same, receiving therefor the same compensation as clerks of towns; and all chattel mortgages so filed, shall be as valid and have the same effect as if the same had been filed in the town clerk's office of any town. It shall be his duty to do and perform every act required to be done by the clerks of towns, not inconsistent with the provisions of this act, and shall have authority to administer oaths and affirmations, and shall receive a salary to be fixed by the Common Council.

§ 6. The Treasurer shall receive all moneys belonging to the city and to the several wards, and keep his books and accounts in such manner as the Common Council may prescribe, and such books and accounts shall be always subject to the inspection of the members of the common council, and committees appointed by the council to inspect the same.

Treasurer's duties.

§ 7. All orders drawn upon the treasurer must be signed be the Mayor or presiding officer of the common council, and countersigned by the clerk, stating therein the particular fund or appropriation to which the same is chargeable, and the person to whom payable, and no money shall be otherwise paid from the treasury than upon such orders so drawn.

Orders—how drawn and signed.

§ 8. The Treasurer shall keep a separate account of the funds of each ward and the city, and of each fund or appropriation, and the debts and the credits belonging thereto. He shall give every person paying money into the treasury a duplicate receipt therefor, specifying the date of payment and upon what account paid, and he shall also file copies of such receipts with the city clerk, at the date of his monthly reports, as therein provided.

CHAPTER III.

Monthly Report

§ 9. The Treasurer shall, at the end of each and every month, and oftner if required, render an account to the finance committee appointed by the common council, showing the state of the treasury at the date of such account, and the balance of money in the treasury, and it shall be the duty of said finance committee to report the same to the common council at its next meeting thereafter. The treasurer shall also accompany such account with the duplicate of all receipts issued by him for moneys received into the treasury, together with all orders redeemed and paid by him, which said account and receipts and orders, with any and all other vouchers held by him, shall be delivered over to the city clerk, and filed in his office, after the same shall have been examined by the common council.

§ 10. The Treasurer shall also report to the common council annually in the month of March, at least two weeks before the annual election, and oftner if required, a full and detailed account of all receipts and expenditures, and the state of the treasury. He shall also keep a register of all orders redeemed and paid into the treasury during the year, describing such order, its date, amount, number, the fund from which payable, and persons to whom paid, specifying also the time of the receipt thereof; and all such orders shall be examined at the time of the making such annual report to the common council by the finance committee, who shall examine and compare the same with the books of the clerk and files in his office, and report discrepancies, if any, to the common council.

§ 11. The Treasurer shall keep all moneys in his hands belonging to the city or any of the wards, distinct and separate from his own moneys, and he is hereby expressly prohibited from using, either directly or indirectly, any such moneys, or the orders in his custody and keeping, for his own use and benefit, or that of any other person or persons, whomsoever; and any violation of this provision shall subject him to immediate removal from office by the common council, which is hereby authorized to declare said office vacant, and to appoint a successor to said officer, who shall hold his office for the remainder of the unexpired term of

such officer so removed. And if the treasurer, or any person or persons connected with him in the collecting, safe keeping and disbursing of said city and ward funds, or either of them, shall convert to his or their own use, in any way whatever, or shall use by way of investment in any kind, of property or merchandise, or shall loan with or without interest, any portion of said city or ward funds entrusted to him or them for safe keeping, disbursement, payment, transfer, or for any other purpose, every such act shall be deemed and adjudged to be an embezzlement of so much of the said moneys as shall be so taken, converted, invested, used or loaned, which is hereby declared an embezzlement within the meaning of section 30 of chapter 165 of the revised statutes of this State; and every officer or agent of said city, and all persons advising or participating in such act, or being a party thereto, shall upon conviction before a court of competent jurisdiction in this State, be punished as provided in section 31 of chapter 165 of the revised statutes of this State.

§ 12. The Treasurer shall have the power and perform the duties hereinafter prescribed in the collection of taxes and assessments, and in addition thereto, have the same powers, duties, and be subject to the same liabilities, as treasurers in towns, so far as said powers, duties and liabilities are not inconsistent with the provisions of this act, and shall receive for collecting all taxes levied by said city, a fee of one-half of one per cent., and for disbursing the same a fee of one half of one per cent, which shall be in full payment for all services performed by the treasurer for said city.

§ 13. The Treasurer of the city shall, in each year, and within ten days after he enters upon the duties of his office, file with the city clerk a report stating the amount of money in his hands belonging to the different funds, and a full statement of the situation of the treasury. If the treasurer shall refuse or neglect to make such report within the time aforesaid, his office shall be deemed vacant, and the common council shall proceed to elect his successor by ballot.

§ 14. The Treasurer shall, on the first Tuesday of April,

in each year, file a report in the city clerk's office, which shall contain a full statement of all moneys received by him during the year, and the manner in which the same has been disbursed, and a full and complete statement of the treasury at the date of such report; and the reports mentioned in the last two sections shall be under oath, and shall be published by the common council in the city paper; and the reports required by sections 13 and 14, shall not be construed to dispense with the making of any reports now required to be made by the treasurer.

§ 15. If The Treasurer shall refuse or neglect to make his report in accordance with the preceding section, he shall forfeit and pay for the use of said city, the sum of one hundred dollars; but this provision shall not in any way effect his liability upon his official bond.

§ 16. The Police Justice shall have and possesses all the authority, powers and rights and jurisdiction of a justice of the peace, in civil proceedings, and shall have sole and exclusive jurisdiction to hear all complaints and conduct all examinations and trials for criminal acts committed within said city, and shall have exclusive jurisdiction in all cases to which said city shall be a party, and shall have the same power and authority in cases of contempt as a court of record; *provided*, that nothing herein contained shall be deemed to divest the judges of the circuit or county courts of their authority as conservators of the peace, nor to affect in any manner the powers or jurisdiction of the circuit or county court for Rock county. The police justice shall be entitled to receive for his services the same compensation in fees as is allowed by law to justices of the peace in towns for similar services; but the said city shall not be liable to said police justice for his said fees, except such as shall accrue in prosecutions for the violation of the charter or ordinances of said city, wherein the offender shall have been discharged from imprisonment or custody by direction of the common council. In case of the absence, sickness or other inability of said police justice to discharge the duties of said office, the common council may appoint and authorize, by warrant signed by the Mayor and clerk of said city,

any justice of the peace within said city to perform the duties of police justice, and the justice so appointed shall, for the time being, possess all the authority and powers and rights, and discharge all the duties of police justice, during his absence, sickness or other inability to discharge the same. Appeals shall be allowed in all cases to the circuit court from the police justice, and taken in the same manner as appeals from justices of the peace.

§ 17. The Police Justice shall monthly report to the common council a list of all proceedings instituted before him in behalf of said city, and the disposition made thereof, and shall at the same time account and pay over to the treasurer the amount of all penalties and fines collected by him, which may by law accrue to said city. Said city shall not be liable for or pay any costs in any action or proceeding for violation of any law of this State, but such costs shall be a county charge, as heretofore.

§ 18. Every person elected to the office of constable under this act, shall, before he enters upon the duties of his office, with two or more sureties to be approved by the common council, execute in the presence of the clerk of said city an instrument in writing, by which said constable and sureties shall jointly and severally agree to pay to each and every person who shall be entitled thereto, all such sums of money as the said constable may be liable to pay by reason or on account of any summons, execution or other process or proceeding which shall be delivered to him for collection, and for all moneys which may come into his hands, as such constable. The clerk shall certify the approval of the common council on such instrument, and file the same in his office and a copy thereof certified by the clerk under the corporal seal of said city, shall be presumptive evidence in all courts and places of the execution thereof by such constables and sureties; and such constable shall have and possess all the powers of constables in towns.

§ 19. The common council shall have power from time [to time] to require further and other duties of all officers whose duties are herein prescribed, and prescribe the powers and duties of all officers appointed or elected to any of

office by this act, whose duties are not herein specifically mentioned, and fix their compensation. They may also require bonds to be given to the city of Janesville by all offices for the faithful performance of their duties.

§ 20. The treasurer and all other officers and agents of said city shall severally, before they enter on the duties of their respective offices, execute to the city of Janesville a bond in such sum and with such sureties as the common council, shall approve, conditioned that they shall faithfully execute the duties of their offices, and account for and pay over all moneys and other property received by them, which bonds with the approval of the common council certified thereon by the clerk, shall be filed with the clerk.

§ 21. If any person having been an officer in said city, shall not within ten days after notification and request, deliver to his successor in office all the property, papers and effects of every description in his possession belonging to said city, or appertaining to the office he held, he shall forfeit and pay for the use of said city one hundred dollars, besides all damages caused by his neglect or refusal to deliver, and such successor shall and may recover possession of the books &c., appertaining to his office, in the manner prescribed by the laws of this State.

CHAPTER IV.

OF THE COMMON COUNCIL, ITS GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES.

Common council.

SEC. 1. The mayor and aldermen shall constitute the common council of said city, and the style of all ordinances shall be, "The mayor and common council of the city of Janesville do ordain," &c. The common council shall meet at such time and place as they by resolution shall direct. A majority of the aldermen shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Members not to hold office—or be interested in any contract, &c.

§ 2. No member of the common council shall, during the period for which he was elected, be competent to hold any other office or appointment of which the emoluments are paid from the city treasury, or paid by fees directed to be paid by any act, order, resolution or ordinance of the common council, or be directly or indirectly interested in

any contract, the expenses or consideration whereof are to be paid under any ordinance or other action or direction of the common council.

CHAPTER IV.

§ 3. The common council shall hold stated meetings, and the mayor or a majority of the aldermen may call special meetings, by notice to each of the members of said council, served personally or left at their usual places of abode. Petitions and remonstrances may be presented to the common council and the council shall determine the rules of its own proceedings, and be judges of the election and qualifications of its own members, and have power to compel the attendance of absent members.

§ 4. The common council shall have the care, management and control of the property of the city, and its finances, as in this act provided. It shall have the power to make, enact, ordain, establish publish and enforce such ordinances as it shall deem expedient, not repugnant to the constitution and laws of this State or of the United States, and to alter, amend, modify and repeal the same, for the good government of the city, the preservation of peace and good order, the suppression of vice and immorality, the benefit of trade and commerce, and the health of the inhabitants thereof, and such other ordinances, rules and regulations as may be necessary to carry such power into effect. It is also particularly authorized to enact ordinances for the following purposes:

Powers of Common Council, &c.

1st. To preserve peace and good order, and to restrain and prevent vice, immorality and every kind of fraudulent device and practice.

2d. To restrain, prevent and suppress disorderly and gaming houses, billiard tables and all instruments and devices for gaming, and to authorize the destruction and demolition of all instruments and devices used for the purposes of gaming.

3d. To restrain and punish vagrants, mendicants, street beggars, drunkards and persons soliciting alms, keepers of houses of ill-fame, common prostitutes, bawds and disorderly persons, and to prevent drunkenness and disorderly and immoral conduct and obscenity in public places and streets,

- CHAPTER IV.** and to provide for arresting, removing and punishing any person or persons who may be guilty of the same.
- Disturbance, &c.** 4th. To prevent any riot, noises or public disturbance, and all disorderly assemblies.
- Auctions, &c.** 5th. To regulate auction sales, and to prevent hawking and peddling in the streets.
- Licenses.** 6th. To prevent the selling, dealing in or giving away any strong, spirituous, vinous and fermented liquor or liquors, unless duly licensed thereto by the common council, as hereinafter provided.
- Combustible materials, &c.** 7th. To regulate the keeping and conveying of gunpowder, camphene, burning fluid and other combustible and dangerous materials, and the use of candles and lights in barns and stables.
- Market places.** 8th. To appoint places for exposing for sale wood, coal, hay and lime, and regulate the selling of the same.
- Runners for Hotels, &c.** 9th. To restrain and regulate the soliciting of passengers for any means of public conveyance, and of guests for taverns, hotels and public boarding houses, and the ringing of bells.
- Draymen, &c.** 10th. To license, regulate and suppress draymen, hackman, porters, omnibus drivers, cabmen, carmen, and other persons who may pursue like occupations, with or without vehicles, and to limit their compensation.
- Exhibitions.** 11th. To restrain all exhibitions of natural or artificial curiosities or animals, all theatrical or other shows, exhibitions, musical entertainments, circuses, and all other exhibitions, amusements or performances for money.
- Weights and Measures.** 12th. To punish by fine or otherwise the use of false weights and measures.
- Mortality.** 13th. To direct and require the keeping and returning of bills of mortality by physicians, sextons and others, and to impose penalties for default therein.
- Dogs—tax.** 14th. To regulate or prevent the running at large of dogs, and to destroy them, and to impose tax upon the owners or possessors of dogs.
- Cattle, horses, &c.** 15th. To restrain the running at large of cattle, horses, sheep, swine and geese in said city, and to cause such as may be found running at large, to be impounded and sold

to discharge the penalty for the violation of the ordinance, and the expenses of impounding and sale. CHAPTER IV.

16th. To establish and regulate public pounds, and to appoint masters thereof from time to time. Pounds.

17th. To determine what are nuisances, and to prevent, abate and remove the same. Nuisances,

18th. To prevent and punish horse-racing and immoderate driving or riding in the streets or highways, and every game, practice or amusement in the streets or elsewhere, having a tendency to frighten teams or horses, or to annoy persons passing in or along the streets or highways, or to endanger property. Driving, &c., in streets.

19th. To prevent the shooting of firearms, rockets, gunpowder and fireworks of every description, in any situation which may be considered by the common council dangerous to the city or any property therein, or annoying to any of the citizens thereof. Fire arms, fire works, &c., in city.

20th. To erect and maintain lamp posts along any of the streets, or on the public grounds of said city, and to light the streets, public grounds and buildings in said city, with gas. Lamp Posts,— Lights, &c.

21st. To establish, make and regulate public wells, aqueducts and reservoirs of water for the convenience of the inhabitants of the city, and its protection against fires, and to prevent unnecessary waste of water. Public Wells, &c.

22d. To compel all persons to remove the dirt, snow and ice from the sidewalks in front of the premises occupied or owned by them, and to keep the streets swept in front of such premises, and to prevent the encumbering the streets, sidewalks and crosswalks with carriages, wagons, carts, sleds, sleighs, wheel-barrows, boxes, wood, lumber, timber or other substances or material whatsoever, and to fix and impose fines, penalties and punishment for any violation of any ordinance in relation thereto. Streets and Sidewalks to be kept clean.

23d. To remove and prevent all encroachments upon streets and highways. Encroachments upon streets.

24th. To prescribe the duties of constables designated to perform police duties, chief engineer and members of the Duties of Constables, Members of Fire Department, &c.

CHAPTER IV. fire department in said city, and the duties of citizens upon occasions of fire.

Fire Buckets, &c. 25th. To require the occupants of buildings to provide themselves with fire-buckets, and to prescribe the manner in which they shall be marked and kept and to regulate their use at fires.

Power over Corporations. 26th. To compel railroad companies and other corporations and persons to do all needful and proper draining, grading and filling upon the lands, owned or occupied by them within the limits of said city; to compel railroad companies to construct and keep in repair suitable street crossings and carriage-ways over their several tracks; to regulate and restrain the speed of cars in passing through said city, and to prevent the obstruction of street lanes and highways by the cars of said companies, and to regulate the putting up all necessary signs to beware of cars at railroad and street crossings.

Construction of Chimneys. 27th. To regulate the construction of chimneys, and to compel the cleaning thereof by the owners thereof.

Dangers from fire 28th. To prevent the dangerous construction or condition of chimneys, fire-places, hearth-stones, stovepipes, ovens, boilers and apparatus used in any building or manufactory, and to cause the same to be removed or placed in a safe and secure condition, and to direct and regulate the manner of keeping ashes.

Regulate carrying on of Manufactories. 29th. To regulate and provide the carrying on of manufactories dangerous in causing or promoting fires, or disagreeable or unwholesome odors.

Scuttles in roofs, &c. 30th. To compel the owners or occupants of buildings to have scuttles in their roofs, and stairs and ladders leading to them.

To keep from said premises to guard against fires, &c. 31st. To authorize the Mayor, aldermen, constables, engineer, and other officers of the city, to keep away from the vicinity of any fire all idle and suspicious persons, and to compel all persons in said city to aid in the extinguishment of fires and the protection and preservation of property thereat.

Inspection of premises to guard against fires. 32d. To authorize and require the fire-wardens in said city, or other officers, to enter all buildings and enclosures

at proper times, to ascertain whether their arrangements for fire or the preservation of ashes are dangerous, and to cause such as are dangerous to be put into a safe condition.

33d. To organize a board of health, and provide measures, for the preservation of the health of the inhabitants of said city, and to prevent the spread of infectious or pestilential diseases therein. The board of health shall consist of the aldermen of each ward, the Mayor, who shall be its president, and two practicing physicians. Such physicians shall be appointed by the common council, by ballot, and shall hold their office for such time as they shall be appointed, not exceeding one year. The common council may, by ordinance, authorize the board of health to make and enforce such orders, rules and regulations, not inconsistent with the charter or any ordinance of said city, as they shall deem most effectual for the preservation of the public health; but no order, rule or regulation of said board, imposing a penalty, shall take effect or be in force, until the same shall have been published at least six days successively, in a daily newspaper published in said city.

CHAPTER IV.

34. To direct and regulate the planting, rearing and preservation of ornamental trees in the streets and public grounds in said city.

35. To improve and ornament public parks and pleasure grounds, and by ordinance or resolution, regulate their preservation and use.

To cause a survey of Rock river within the limits of said city to be made, and to establish the boundary thereof, and, generally, to exercise the same powers over said river within the limits as they may do over the streets and highways in said city, under and by virtue of this act: *provided*, that nothing in this act shall be construed so as to give said city of Janesville the right to obstruct the navigation of said river: *provided, further*, that the cost of such survey shall be paid by the property bounded by said river.

§ 3. The common council shall have power by resolution, order or by-law:

1st. To compel the owner or occupant of any grocery, cel-

lar, chandler's shop, soap factory, tannery, stable, slaughter-house, barn, privy, sewer, or other unwholesome or nauseous house, building or place, to cleanse, remove or abate the same, whenever and as often as it shall deem it necessary for the health, comfort and convenience of the inhabitants of said city; and in case such owner or occupant will not or shall neglect to proceed as directed to cleanse, remove or abate the same, to cause it to be done at the expense of such owner or occupant, and recover such expense in a civil action against such owner or occupant as the case may be.

Unwholesome or offensive substances to be removed.

2d. To require the removal or destruction of any dead carcass or other unwholesome or offensive substance or substances likely to become unwholesome or offensive, from any street, lot or building, by the owner or occupant thereof, and in case such owner or occupant will not proceed as required to remove or destroy the same, then to cause the same to be done at the expense of such owner or occupant, and to recover such expense of such owner or occupant, as the case may be, in a civil action.

To prevent the introduction of disease.

3d. To make and establish such rules and regulations as it may deem necessary to prevent the introduction into said city, or the spread thereof, of any pestilential or infectious disease, and to cause any person or persons not residents of the city, infected with any such disease, to be removed to some suitable and proper house or hospital within the city, to be nursed and treated for such disease.

Removal of buildings, fences, &c.

4th. To require any building, fence or other erection which may be placed within or erected upon the boundary of any street or highway in said city, to be removed therefrom by the owner or occupant, and in case of his neglect to remove the same, to cause it be removed at the expense of such owner or occupant, and to recover such expense in a civil action against such owner or occupant.

To license and regulate exhibitions, &c.

5th. To license and regulate the exhibition of natural and artificial curiosities, caravans, circuses, and other shows and exhibitions, musical entertainments, the keeping of billiard tables, pin alleys, nine or ten pin alleys, and ball alleys, and issue licenses therefor; also, to grant and issue licenses to hotel, tavern, saloon, grocery and victualing house keepers,

and all persons who may desire to vend or deal in spirituous, vinous or fermented liquor and liquors: *provided*, that no license shall be granted for the keeping any billiard table, pin alley, nine or ten pin alley, for a less sum than twenty-five dollars for each and every billiard table, pin alley, nine or ten pin alley or ball alley so licensed, nor shall any such license be granted for less term than one year; *and provided, further*, that no license shall issue or be granted to deal in or sell spirituous, vinous and fermented liquor and liquors for a less sum than fifty dollars for each and every person or place so licensed, nor shall such license be granted for a greater or less term than one year; *and provided further*, that no license shall be granted except upon the application in writing of the applicant, therein describing particularly, the place where, in said city, he desires to deal in or vend such spirituous, vinous or fermented liquor or liquors; *and provided, further*, that no such license shall be issued to such applicant until he shall, with two or more sureties to be approved by the common council, execute in the presence of the city clerk an instrument in writing by which such person so applying for such license, and sureties, shall jointly and severally agree to pay to the city of Janesville the sum of one hundred dollars for each and every violation of any ordinance, rule or resolution or by-law of said city in the relation to the vending or dealing in such liquor or liquors in force in said city at the time of such violation. No provision in this act shall be construed as giving any power to said common council to grant a license to any person or persons to sell, vend, give or deliver in any way to any minor, any spirituous, vinous or fermented liquor or liquors, nor to sell, vend, give, or deliver in any way, to any person or persons, any spirituous, vinous or fermented liquors on the day of any election in said city, nor on Sunday. No license granted under the provisions of this act, shall be transferable, nor shall the privileges of any license granted under this act be exercised in any other place or building than the one described in the application therefor.

§ 7 [6.] The common council shall have power to compel any and all persons in said city, to appear before it and testify on any hearing or proceeding instituted to remove from office any officer mentioned in this act, or any agent under said city government, for any violation of duty or any provision of this act, or any ordinance, resolution, rule, order, regulation or by law of the common council of said city, either of omission or commission, and to revoke and vacate any license granted under this act; and for that purpose, said common council may make its order commanding the person or persons therein named, to appear before it and testify &c., which order shall be certified by the clerk of said city, under the corporate seal thereof, and personally served on the person or persons therein named, by delivering to each a true copy thereof; and for the purpose of compelling such appearance before it, and the giving of the testimony on such hearing or proceeding, the said common council are hereby vested with the same power and authority possessed by any court of record in this State, and any violation or disobedience of such order shall subject the person violating or disobeying the same, to the same penalties attached by the laws of the State to the violation of, or dis-

obedience to the commands or requirements of a subpoena issued out of any court of record in this State. CHAPTER IV.

§ 8 [7.] The common council may enforce observance of all ordinances, resolutions, rules, orders, regulations and by-laws which it is permitted to make, ordain and pass, in order to carry into effect the powers vested in it, by the imposition of penalties on the persons violating the same, not exceeding fifty dollars for one violation, except in cases herein otherwise provided, to be recovered in a civil action in any court having cognizance thereof; and shall have the power to appoint or employ an attorney to conduct the legal business of said city. Penalties may be imposed.

§ 9 [8.] Every ordinance, resolution or by-law imposing a penalty or forfeiture for a violation of its provisions, shall, after the passage thereof, be published for three weeks successively, at least once in each week, in some weekly or daily newspaper published in said city. The affidavit of the printer or publisher of such newspaper, or of its foreman, of the publication thereof, taken before any officer authorized to administer oaths, and filed with the city clerk, or a copy of such affidavit, certified by the clerk under the corporate seal of said city, shall be conclusive evidence of such publication in all courts and places. Until such publication the ordinances, resolutions or by-laws shall not become operative. Publication of all ordinances, &c.

§ 10 [9.] A copy of any resolution, order or by-law of the common council, passed pursuant to section five of chapter four of this act, certified by the clerk under the corporate seal of said city, may be served upon any person to be affected thereby, personally, or in case such person cannot be found at his or her residence, or usual place of business in said city, then by leaving it at such residence with a person of suitable age and discretion. The resolution, order or by-law shall thereafter, so far as said person is concerned, have the same effect as an ordinance duly made and published by the common council. In case the person to be affected by the resolution, order or by-law is a non-resident, no service of a copy thereof shall be necessary, unless he or she has an authorized agent in said city, when the service shall be When publication may be dispensed with.

§ 11 [10.] All actions brought to recover a penalty or forfeiture for the violation of any ordinance, resolution, rule, order, regulation or by-law of said city, or for any claim arising under this act, shall be brought in the corporate name of said city. The defendant in any such action may be arrested upon service of the warrant or process by which the action is commenced, as upon a warrant and execution upon any judgment recovered therein, except in an action for the recovery of a debt arising out of or founded on a contract expressed or implied, may require that in case nothing shall be found from which the amount can be collected, the defendant shall be taken and imprisoned in the jail of Rock County, or other place of confinement in said city, provided and fixed by an order of the common council thereof, for a term of not less than thirty nor more than sixty days.

§ 12. [11.] All penalties, forfeitures, fines or claims due to said city, when paid to the police justice, shall be paid by him to the city treasurer within one week after the receipt thereof by him. Whenever execution shall be issued by the police justice upon any judgment in favor of the city, the same shall be returned by the officer receiving the same to the justice who issued it, on or before the return day thereof: and if such officer neglect to return the same for five days after the return day thereof, the police justice shall report the fact to the treasurer, who shall cause an action to be brought in the name of the city against the officer and his sureties for the default. No officer of the city shall receive any penalty, fine, forfeiture or claim due to said city for the violation of any ordinance, resolution, rule, order, regulation or by-law of said city, or under any provisions of this act, except the treasurer of the city, the police justice before whom an action has been instituted therefor, or an officer having power by execution to collect it.

§ 13 [12.] The common council shall have the power by ordinance.

§ 14 [13.] All laws, ordinances, rules, resolutions, regulations and by-laws shall be passed by an affirmative vote of a majority of the common council present, and shall be signed by the mayor or presiding officer; *provided*, that no appropriation shall be made or order drawn upon the treasury without a vote of majority of all the members of the common council in favor thereof, which vote shall be taken by ayes and noes, and entered among the proceedings of the council.

[14.] The powers of this act conferred on the common council of said city to provide for the abatement or removal of any nuisance, shall not bar or hinder prosecutions or proceedings in the courts according to law. Depot houses, or buildings of any kind wherein more than three pounds of gunpowder are deposited, stored or kept at any one time, and gambling houses, houses of ill-fame, disorderly taverns, and houses or places where spirituous, vinous or fermented liquors are sold or dealt in, or where any billiard table, pin alley, nine or ten pin alley, or ball alley are kept, without being duly licensed within the limits of said city, are hereby declared to be public or common nuisances.

§ 16. [15.] The common council shall have power, and is hereby authorized, to provide for, construct and maintain free bridges at such points as may be designated by said council over Rock river, within the limits of said city, and said river within said limits is hereby declared to be a public highway: *provided*, that the common council shall not

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have power to construct any new bridge over Rock river, nor over spring brook without first having obtained the consent of the electors of said city thereto, such consent to be ascertained and determined by submitting the question whether a special tax shall be levied for any such purpose, stating the amount of such tax; such question to be submitted to the electors of said city in the manner required in this act for submitting questions of raising special taxes; and if two-thirds or more of all the votes cast upon any such question shall be in favor of raising any such tax, it shall be lawful for the common council to construct any such bridge, and to levy and collect such special tax and appropriate the same for the purpose for which it was raised.

§ 17. [16.] All moneys received for licenses under any of the provisions of this act (except licenses for the vending and dealing in spirituous, vinous and fermented liquors,) and for the violation of any ordinance, resolution, rule, order, regulation or by-law, and for any penalty or forfeiture incurred under any of the provisions of this act, shall be paid into the school fund of said city, and shall be expended by the common council for the support of the schools therein.

[17.] The common council shall not contract indebtedness, or incur liability, or appropriate money in any one year, payable out of any fund authorised to be raised in said city, to a greater amount than the amount of such fund so authorised to be raised in such year; and every member of the common council who shall vote to contract any indebtedness or incur any liability, or to appropriate any money payable out of any fund, in any year after such indebtedness has been contracted, liability incurred or money appropriated, payable out of such fund, to the amount of such fund authorised to be raised in such year, shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifty dollars for each and every offense.

§ 19 [18]. Every member of the common council who shall vote to draw any order on or appropriate any money from any fund, for or on any claim or demand against the city not properly payable out of such fund, shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifty dollars for each and every offense.

§ 20 [19]. The penalties given by the last two preceding sections may be sued for and recovered in the name of the city, before any justice of the peace in said city, and the proceeds shall be paid into the school fund of said city. CHAPTER IV.

§ 21 [20]. No member of the common council shall vote for the allowance of any claim against the city in which he is interested, or in relation to which he has been employed, or retained as agent, attorney or counsel. No member to

CHAPTER V.

OF FINANCE AND TAXATION.

SEC. 1. The common council shall have power within the city, by order : Power of Council

First. To annually levy and collect taxes, not exceeding three thousand dollars, on the assessed value of real and personal estate in the city, made taxable by the laws of this state, to defray the current expenses of the city, and other expenses of the city not herein otherwise especially provided for, which taxes shall constitute the general fund. To levy tax for

Second. To annually levy and collect a school tax, not exceeding six thousand and five hundred dollars, on all real and personal property in said city, to meet the expenses of repairing school houses and supporting and maintaining schools, which shall constitute a part of the school fund. Tax for School

Third. To annually levy and collect taxes, not exceeding two thousand dollars, on real and personal estate, for the erection and maintenance of bridges, which shall constitute the highway, street, and bridge fund. Also, to annually levy and collect taxes, not exceeding seven hundred dollars on real and personal estate, for the erection of lamp-posts and lighting the streets and public grounds in said city with gas, which shall constitute the gas fund. Highway, Street
and Bridge Fund.

Fourth. To levy and collect taxes as may be required, on all the real and personal property in said city, to pay the interest on the bonded debt of the city, and the principal thereof as it shall become due (for the current year,) which shall constitute the bonded debt fund. Bonded debt

sand dollars, to purchase hose for fire engines, but shall raise no greater sum for that purpose, whether the same shall be raised in one or more years, and to levy and collect a tax of five hundred dollars annually, to defray the current expenses of the fire department.

§ 2. The common council shall have the power by order to annually levy and collect a tax on the real and personal property in each ward, now or hereafter existing in said city, not exceeding five mills on the dollar on the assessed value thereof, to defray the expenses of the construction in said wards, respectively, of drains across streets, alleys, lanes, highways and public grounds, and of streets and walks in front of and across public grounds, and of culverts and sewers in the streets, alleys, lanes, highways and public grounds, and keeping the same in repair, and also the cleaning and cleansing the streets, alleys, lanes, highways, cross walks, drains, culverts and sewers; and all the money raised for the purposes in this section specified, upon the real and personal property in any ward, shall be kept by the treasurer as a separate fund for such ward, and shall be known as the ward fund of the ward in which raised, and shall be drawn from the treasury only on orders specifying that the same is drawn to meet the expenditure for which the money is raised.

§ 3. No money shall be paid from the treasury except by orders as is in this act provided, and no money shall be drawn from any fund in the treasury, except for the purposes for which it was raised and appropriated.

CHAPTER VI.

OF THE COMMON COUNCIL, ITS GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES.

SEC. 1. The common council shall have full control and power over and management of all streets, alleys lanes and public grounds in said city, and shall have power to accept by order or resolution, any street, lane, highway, or alley in the original plat of the village of Janesville, or any recorded addition thereto, and to establish the grades of all such streets, lanes, highways, alleys or public grounds; and such

acceptance shall, to all intents and purposes, make such street, lane, highway or alley, a highway; and until the common council shall have accepted any street, lane, highway or alley, as herein before provided, which has not been improved by the order of the common council, the city shall not be liable for any damages resulting from the unimproved condition of said streets, lane, highway or alley; and shall have power to improve public squares or grounds, and to lay out streets, alleys, lanes, highways and walks, and to alter, widen, contract, straighten, and discontinue the same: *provided, however*, that nothing in this act contained shall be construed as giving to the common council any power or authority to lay out public squares or grounds, streets, alleys, lanes highways or walks, or to alter, widen, contract, straighten or discontinue any already laid out upon any lands not included within the limits of the recorded plat of the village of Janesville, or of any addition to said village; but all public roads and highways hereafter to be laid through or across that portion of said city not included within any recorded plat, shall be laid out, established and opened in the same manner that public roads and highways are now laid out, established and opened in the several towns in this State, and for that purpose the aldermen of the several wards of said city are hereby vested with all the power and authority of town supervisors: *provided, further*, that the expense of grading, graveling, planking and paving of said streets, walks, roads and highways, shall be chargeable to and payable by the lands through or over which said streets walks, roads or highways shall pass, in the same manner as is prescribed in this act in the case of city lots.

§ 2. The common council shall have power to lay out and construct bridges, culverts, drains and sewers in the city, with all the necessary wells, grates and other things requisite and proper for the use of such culverts, drains and sewers, or for carrying off the surface matter from the streets and highways; but the common council shall not lay out any street, square, public ground, alley, lane, highway or walk, or alter any such as may already be laid out or used, so as to extend or run across or over the site of any

§ 3 The common council shall cause all streets, highways, alleys, lanes, side and crosswalks, culverts, drains, sewers, public squares and grounds in said city to be surveyed, described and recorded in a book to be kept by the city clerk for the purpose, and to cause maps thereof to be made and filed with the clerk. Such records and maps shall be *prima facie* evidence of the facts therein described and portrayed in all actions and places between the city and other persons touching their location.

Notice to be given of intention to alter, or discontinue any street.

§ 4. Whenever the common council shall intend to lay out, alter, widen or discontinue any street, highway, lane alley or public square or ground, it shall cause a notice of such intention to be published for eight days in some daily or weekly newspaper printed and published in said city, stating the day upon which it will act thereupon, which day shall be at least eight days subsequent to the first publication of the notice.

May proceed on the day fixed.

§ 5. In case it shall not be necessary to appropriate for the purposes contemplated in section four of this chapter, any real estate which shall not belong to the city (*or which shall not belong to the city,*) or which shall not be given to the city for the purpose, the common council upon the day fixed in the notice, may proceed to lay out, alter, widen or discontinue such street, highway, lane, alley or public square or ground mentioned in the notice.

If objection made, what to do

§ 6. In case it shall be necessary to appropriate for any street, highway, lane, alley or public square or ground, any real estate not belonging to the city, or which the city may not be permitted by the owner freely to appropriate, the common council, before it shall determine to make such improvement, shall make an order appointing some discreet persons, or directing some officer of said city, to ascertain and report a description of the real estate required to be ap-

propriated, with the names of the owners; what the whole expense of the improvement would amount to; whether any, and if any, what part thereof ought to be borne by the city, and whether any, and if any, what real estate would be immediately benefited by the improvement requiring the appropriation of such real estate, specifying the same in parcels described with certainty, with the names of the owners, if they can be ascertained. It shall cause a notice to be published in some weekly or daily newspaper published in said city, for three weeks, specifying the proposed improvement, the estimated expense thereof, and the real estate in said city to be assessed therefor, and shall require all persons interested in the subject matter of such improvements, to attend the common council at a time and place in such notice to be specified. At the time and place so stated, the common council shall proceed to hear the allegations of the owners and occupants of the houses, lots and parcels of land required and real estate to be assessed for such improvement so specified as aforesaid, and after hearing the same, shall make such further order in respect to such improvement as it shall deem proper.

Notice to be published, &c.

§ 7. If the common council shall, after hearing the parties interested as aforesaid, determine to make any of the improvements in this chapter specified, and that the lands of any person will be necessary for the purpose, it shall enter in its minutes a resolution declaring such determination, and containing a brief description of the lands so deemed necessary, and also of the real estate deemed benefited by such improvement. The common council may purchase the land so deemed necessary, of the owner or owners thereof, upon such terms and for such compensation as it shall judge reasonable, and thereupon receive a conveyance or conveyances thereof to the city, and thereupon proceed as provided in this chapter, to cause the price paid for such land, except such portion thereof, if any, as the common council shall have determined ought to be borne by the city, to be assessed upon and collected out of the real estate benefited thereby, as described in the report of the person appointed by the common council, or officer men-

tioned in section six of this chapter, as nearly as may be, in proportion to the amount of benefit which each shall be deemed to receive said improvement.

When copy of resolution with map to be filed in city clerk's office.

§ 8. In case no agreement for such purchase can be made, the common council shall cause a copy of the resolution mentioned in the preceding section, together with a map of the proposed improvement, to be made, designating on such map the lots, tracts or parcels of land which are deemed necessary to be taken, and showing the commencement and termination of the proposed improvement, and also the land and real estate deemed to be benefited thereby, to be filed in the city clerk's office.

Notice and application to Judge of circuit court.

§ 9. The common council shall cause to be published in some daily or weekly newspaper published in said city, a notice specifying and describing the land necessary for such public improvement, and the lands and real estate in said city deemed to be benefited by the making thereof, and stating that an application will be made to the Judge of the Circuit Court or County Court in and for the county of Rock, on a certain day, in said notice to be specified, which shall be at least fifteen days after the first publication of such notice, for the appointment of three commissioners, to ascertain and determine what damage and compensation the owner or owners of such land to be taken, and the occupants, will be entitled to have for the same. The common council shall also, at the least ten days before the time named for such application, cause a copy of such notice to be served upon each of the owners and occupants of the premises to be taken, and also upon the owners of lands and real estate deemed to be benefited by such improvement. Such notice shall be served personally upon all such persons residing within said city, or by leaving the same at their usual places of abode, with some person of suitable age and discretion. Upon non-residents it may be served personally, or upon their agent residing in the city, if any, or by mailing it, addressed to such owner or owners, at their reputed places of abode, in case the owners are unknown or their places of abode cannot, on due inquiry, be ascer-

tained, the publication of the notice as aforesaid shall be equivalent to personal service. CHAPTER VI.

§ 10. At the time and place in said notice specified, or at such other time as the judge shall appoint, and upon being satisfied by competent testimony of the publication and service of such notice as above provided, and upon hearing the city, by their authorized agent or attorney, and the parties interested, if desired, the judge shall appoint such commissioners, who shall be freeholders, of said city, and not interested in any of the land described in said notice, nor of kin to any owner or occupant thereof, to appraise and ascertain the compensation to be made for such land, and the damage consequent on the taking the same for such improvement. Duty of Judge.

§ 11. The commissioners so appointed shall, before they enter upon the duties of their office, take an oath, before some person competent to administer oaths, faithfully to discharge their duties as such commissioners, and to make report according to the provisions of this act, without favor or partiality. They shall give public notice, by notice published in some daily or weekly newspaper published in said city, of the time when they will meet to enter upon the discharge of their duties, and at the time appointed, they shall proceed to view and examine the lands and premises to be taken, and shall ascertain and appraise the damage which the owner or owners and if there be any occupants who are not owners, which such occupants shall respectively sustain by reason of the taking such lands for such improvement, and the compensation which such owners shall severally receive for the value of such lands. Commissioners —
duty of

§ 12. The said commissioners shall, with all convenient speed, make their report, signed by them, or a majority of them, to the common council of said city, in which report they shall describe with all practical certainty, the several pieces and parcels of land or premises to be taken for such improvement, the names and residences of the owners or occupants thereof respectively, if known, the rights of such such owners or occupants, so far as can be ascertained, and the amount of damage and compensation which should be to make rep r'.

CHAPTER IV.

Fees of Com.

paid to each of said owners and occupants, and shall file a copy thereof in the office of the clerk of the city. They shall be entitled to the sum of one dollar and fifty cents each as their compensation, for each day actually and necessarily spent by them in making said appraisal and report.

Report to be published with notice, &c.

§ 13. On the coming in of the report provided in the last preceding section, the common council shall cause the same to be published in a weekly or daily newspaper published in said city, with a notice thereto annexed, that at a time therein fixed, and which shall be at least six days after the first publication thereof it will act upon the same, prior to such day. Any person objecting to the matters contained in the report, or to the proposed improvement, may file with the clerk his objections, in writing, which objections shall be read before and considered by the common council, before any action is had thereupon. The common council may then confirm the report, or may set the same aside, and refer the matter to the same or new commissioners to be appointed, as hereinbefore provided; and upon the coming in of the second report, the same shall be published like the first, and with a like notice of the day when the common council will act thereon. The second report shall be final, without further confirmation, but subject, nevertheless, to the right of any of the parties to appeal to the circuit court in and for the county of Rock, within ten days after the confirmation of such first report, or ten days after the day fixed for the common council for acting upon the second report; and it shall be the duty of the judge of said circuit court to frame and establish such rules for conducting the trial of such appeal, as he may deem necessary to carry out and give full force and effect to the provisions of this act.

Objections may be filed.

§ 14. If no appeal be taken from the report of the commissioners and confirmation as aforesaid, within the time as in the next preceding section provided, the common council shall cause an order to be entered in its proceedings, authorizing and directing the appropriation of the real estate and the making of the improvement. The common coun-

cil shall thereupon appoint three respectable freeholders of said city, not interested in any of the real estate to be taken or assessed therefor, nor of kin to any person or persons interested therein, who shall proceed to apportion and assess the whole amount of such damages and value so reported by the commissioners, together with all the costs and expenses of such improvements (except such portion thereof, if any, as the common council shall have determined ought to be borne by the city,) upon the real estate benefited thereby, as described in the report of the person appointed by the common council, or officer mentioned in section six of this chapter, as nearly as may be in proportion to the amount of benefit which each shall be deemed to receive from the said improvement. The said freeholders shall be sworn by some person competent to administer oaths, faithfully and impartially to discharge their duties according to the best of their ability. The said freeholders shall examine the said lands deemed necessary to be taken for such improvement, and the lands and real estate deemed to be benefited thereby, and may hear the statements of the parties interested, and shall make their assessment. The said freeholders shall, as speedily as may be, make their report to the common council, in the form of an assessment list, in which they shall specify and set down in separate columns, an accurate description of each parcel of real estate assessed, the name or the owner or occupant, if known, the amount assessed upon each parcel, the amount of compensation, if any, to which each owner or occupant is entitled by the award of the commissioners, and the amount to be collected of each. The assessment list shall be made to resemble in form, as near as practicable, the annual assessment roll of said city, and be provided with a column in which payments can be entered by the treasurer. Two copies thereof shall be made and signed by the mayor or presiding officer of the common council and clerk, one of which shall be filed with the clerk, and the other the clerk shall deliver to the treasurer, together with the warrant of the common council thereto annexed, signed by the mayor and clerk, and with the corporate seal of the city thereto affix-

ed, for the collection of said assessments, which warrant shall be substantially the same as annexed to the annual assessment roll of said city for collection thereof. The said assessment filed with the clerk, and the one delivered to the treasurer, shall in all courts and places be conclusive evidence of the regularity of all prior proceedings and of the assessment therein specified; and all sums of money assessed therein upon or in respect to any real estate, shall be liens thereon from the time the assessment list is filed with the clerk.

§ 16. Upon receiving the said assessment list, the treasurer shall cause a copy thereof to be published in some daily or weekly newspaper in said city, with a notice similar to the one on receiving the annual assessment roll, and the treasurer shall proceed to collect said assessment in the same manner as in this act provided for the collection of annual city taxes; and all the provisions of this act relating to the collection of annual city taxes, so far as the same can be applicable, shall govern the collection of assessments for said local improvements.

If city is to bear any portion—From what fund to be paid.

§ 17. In case it shall appear by the report mentioned in section six of this chapter, that any portion of the expense of such improvements ought to be borne by the city, the same shall be a charge upon the city treasury, and shall be paid from the highway, street and bridge fund.

Grading of streets, ac. Making, repairing, ac., of sidewalks, cross-walks, sewers, ac.

§ 18. The common council shall have power to cause any street, highway, lane or alley, or any part of any street, highway lane or alley in said city, to be graded, worked, graveled, macadamized, paved or repaved, planked or replanked, and repaired, and to cause any sidewalks, cross-walks, drains, sewers or culverts to be made therein, as it shall deem necessary, and the same shall be repaired or relaid as may be ordered by said common council: *provided*, that no street, highway, lane or alley, or any part thereof, shall be graded, macadamized, paved or repaved, planked or replanked, without a recommendation in writing, signed by a majority of the resident owners of property which is bounded by such street, highway, lane or alley on which said work is proposed to be done or improvement made, ex-

you will see that referring to

cept as hereinafter provided, which recommendation shall be entered at length by the clerk upon the record of the proceedings of the common council.

§ 19. The common council, prior to ordering by resolution, ordinance or otherwise, any street, highway, lane or alley, or any part thereof to be graded, macadamized, paved or repaved, plank or replanked, shall cause a plain and accurate specification of the proposed work to be prepared and filed in the office of the clerk of said city. If after the filing and examination of such specifications, said council shall be of opinion that such proposed work should be done, it shall order the same to be done, and shall fix the time within which the same shall be completed. The said council shall then cause to be published in some daily or weekly newspaper published in said city, such specifications with a notice signed by the clerk, giving notice that on a certain day fixed in said notice, at least eight days after the first publication thereof, the common council will proceed to act in relation to the work mentioned in such specifications; and said notice shall specify that sealed proposals for the performance of said work will be received by the city clerk up to the time fixed in said notice for the opening of such proposals, and the time fixed by said council within which said work shall be completed. Upon the day mentioned in the above required notice, all such proposals shall be opened in the presence of the common council, when said common council shall determine which is the most favorable of each proposals and may by a vote of a majority of its members, accept such proposal, and authorize and direct the construction of the proposed work, and direct the expense thereof to be assessed in the manner hereinafter specified: *provided, however,* that the common council are hereby authorized to reject all of such proposals as in their opinion they shall be deemed unreasonable. The common council shall require the person or persons whose proposal or proposals will be accepted, to execute a bond with one or more sureties, to be approved by said common council, and in such penalty as said council shall fix, conditioned that the person or persons whose proposal has been

accepted, shall perform the work mentioned in such proposal within the time fixed by said council, and according to the published plan and specifications, subject to the supervision of the alderman of the ward in which such work is to be done, or of an overseer to be appointed by said aldermen, and to the approval of the common council, with such other conditions as said council may prescribe; and if said work shall not be completed within the time fixed by said council for the completion thereof, said council shall have the power to declare the contract for such work at an end, and said bond forfeited, and to proceed by action, in the name of said city, against the sureties therein for the amount of such penalty.

Grading, graveling, &c.

1st. In case the work shall be the grading, graveling or leveling any street, highway, lane or alley, or any part thereof, the common council shall appoint some competent person to ascertain the front length of each lot and parcel of land on both sides thereof, throughout its whole extent, with a correct description thereof, and the name of the owner, if known, and also the aggregate front length of all lots and parcels of land fronting on such street. The said common council shall then determine the expense of the whole work, including the surveying, specifications, advertising, treasurer's commission, ascertaining the value of existing improvements of the same or a similar kind and character, if any, and preparing the assessment lists, and cause the average expense upon each foot front of lots and parcels of land on both sides of such street, highway, lane or alley, throughout its whole extent, excluding cross streets from the computation, to be ascertained; and each lot and parcel of land on both sides of such street, highway, lane or alley throughout its whole extent, shall be assessed with its proportion of the expense, to be ascertained by multiplying its number of feet front by the average expense per foot: *provided*, that when the owner or owners of any lot or lots, parcel or parcels of land fronting any street, highway, lane or alley upon which said improvement is proposed to be made, have already made any improvement on said street, highway, lane or alley, in front of his or her said lot or lots, parcel or

parcels of land, of the same or a similar kind and character as the proposed improvement, at the time when the same was made, the common council shall ascertain the value of such improvement, and for that purpose shall have power to subpoena witnesses, administer oaths and take proofs, in such manner as it may direct, and the value of such improvement, when so ascertained, shall be added to the expense of the proposed improvement, and assessed therewith upon all the lots fronting upon such highway, lane or alley in the manner hereinbefore specified; and when so assessed, the value of such improvement so made by such owner or owners as aforesaid, shall be credited on the assessment of his or her said lot or lots, parcel or parcels of land, but the value of such improvement so assessed as aforesaid but once; and in case the value of such improvement shall exceed the amount assessed upon such lot or lots, parcel or parcels of land, such excess shall be paid to such owner or owners who shall have made such improvements as aforesaid: *provided*, that any such improvement hereafter so made by such owners, shall not be assessed, credited or paid for as hereinbefore provided, except the same shall have been made pursuant to a petition or leave to do the same, by said owner or owners, signed by at least two-thirds of the resident owners upon such street, highway or alley. In case the work shall be the paving, macadamizing, planking or curbing any street, highway, lane or alley, or any part thereof, the common council shall appoint some competent person to ascertain the aggregate front length of lots and parcels of land on both sides thereof, limited to the proposed improvement, and bounded thereon, and the front length of each lot and parcel of land bounded on such improvement, with a correct description thereof, and the name of the owner, if known. The said council shall then determine the expense of the whole work, including the surveying, if any, the specifications, advertising, treasurer's commission, and preparing assessment lists, and cause the average expense upon each foot front of lots and parcels of land on both sides of such street, highway, lane or alley within the limits of such improvement, and bounded thereon, ex-

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cluding cross streets from the computation, to be ascertained, and each lot or parcel of land shall be assessed with its proportion of the expense, to be ascertained by multiplying its number of feet front by the average expense per foot: *provided*, that whenever the owner or owners of any lot or lots, parcel or parcels of land, fronting any street, highway, lane or alley where such improvement is proposed to be made, and within the limits of said proposed improvements, and bounded thereon, have already made any improvement on such street, highway, lane or alley, in front of his or her lot or lots, parcel or parcels of land, within the limits of said proposed improvement, and bounded thereon, of the same or of similar kind and character as the proposed improvement, said lot or lots, parcel or parcels of land, so improved by such owner or owners, shall be excluded from the computation and assessment; and all expense of such improvement to be made, shall in such case be assessed upon the other lot or lots, parcel or parcels of land so fronting on the street, highway, lane or alley where such improvement is proposed to be made, and within the limits and bounded on said improvement, as hereinbefore specified.

2d. In case the work shall be the constructing of any crosswalk or drain across any street, lane or highway, or public ground, or of any culvert or any sewer in any street, alley, alley, lane, highway or public ground, or the keeping in repair of crosswalks, drains, sewers, culverts, streets, highways, lanes or alleys, after the same have been constructed, graded, graveled, leveled, macadamized, planked or paved, as in this chapter provided, or the cleaning and cleansing of the same, the expense thereof shall be paid out of the moneys mentioned in section two of chapter five of this act, belonging to the ward in which said work shall be done.

Expense to be paid from Ward Fund.

Sidewalks.

3d. In case the work shall be the construction, repairing, relaying or replanking any sidewalk, each lot or parcel of land fronting thereon shall be assessed with its just proportion of the expense of such work. The work specified in this subdivision may be ordered by the common council, on

the written application of either of the aldermen of the ward in which the proposed work is situated, at any regular meeting of said council, after filing with the city clerk a specification of the work proposed. After said work shall have been ordered by said common council, the aldermen shall give notice to the resident owner or owners of the several lots or parcels of land fronting thereon, requiring such owner or owners to perform the work proposed in front of his or their respective lots or parcels of land, according to said specifications, within twenty days from the service of such notice, and in default thereof, that said work will be done by contract without publication; and in case such owner or owners shall neglect to do said work within said twenty days, said aldermen shall proceed to have such work done by contract.

§ 20. The notice required by section nineteen of this chapter, may be published at least eight days before the time therein specified for opening and acting upon the proposal to be received under it; and in case the common council do not meet on the day mentioned in such notice, the proposals received by the clerk pursuant thereto, shall be open at the next subsequent meeting of the common council. After opening proposals received pursuant to notice published according to said section, and determining whose is the most favorable, the common council may postpone further action upon the construction of the proposed work and the acceptance of the proposals, from time to time not to exceed one month from the day specified in the notice for opening the proposals.

§ 21. Whenever all the proposals received pursuant to such notice, are deemed by the common council to be unreasonable, they may make a contract for the work to be done, according to the published specifications, by such person or persons as they may deem proper, at a specified price, which price shall not exceed the lowest sum proposed; and in case the work be of the class mentioned in subdivisions one and three in section nineteen of this chapter, it shall assess the expenses thereof, including surveying and advertising, in the manner provided the said subdivisions

Publication of notice.

CHAPTER VI. one and three of said section ; and in case the work be of the class mentioned in subdivision two of said section, the expense shall be paid out of the moneys mentioned in section two of chapter five of this act, belonging to the ward in which said work shall be done.

§ 22. No plan of any crosswalk, sidewalk, paving or planking need be published under said section nineteen of this chapter, and when a plan of any work is required, it shall be sufficient publication thereof to file the same with the clerk, and refer thereto intelligibly in the published notice.

Several separate works, &c.

§ 23. When practicable, several separate works, may by notice ordered and assessments made, at the same time, and for the purpose of all expenses of advertising and assessment, be considered as one work. When such expenses are paid in common by more than one work, each work shall be assessed with its just proportion thereof.

Refusal to sign recommendation—power of Council in the matter.

§ 24. Whenever it shall appear to the common council, by affidavit or petition duly verified, that any street, highway, lane or alley, or any part thereof, in said city, should be graded, macadamized, paved, repaired, planked, or re-planked, and that a majority of the resident owners of property bounded by such street, highway, lane or alley, refuse to sign the recommendation mentioned in section nineteen of this chapter, the common council shall have power to appoint a committee consisting of one alderman from each ward of said city, to make an examination of such street, highway lane, or alley, mentioned in such petition, and report to the common council the condition of such street, highway, lane or alley, and whether in their opinion the same should be graded, macadamized, paved or re-paved, planked or re-planked ; and upon receiving the report of such committee, the said common council shall have the power to order such street, highway, lane or alley to be graded, macadamized, paved, re-paved, planked or re-planked, in the same manner and with the same effect as though a recommendation, signed as required by said section nineteen had been presented to said council.

§ 25. The common council may order the repair, cleaning

and cleansing of any street, alley, lane, highway, sidewalk, crosswalk, drain, culvert or sewer, when it shall be necessary; and when in its opinion its repair cannt be judiciously let upon contract, when the same shall be completed, cause the expense thereof to be paid out of the moneys mentioned in section two of chapter five of this act, belonging to the ward in which such repairing, cleaning or cleansing shall be done.

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Repair and cleansing of streets, &c.

How paid.

§ 26. Upon the assessment being made as provided in this chapter, an assessment list shall be made, to resemble as nearly as practicable the annual assessment roll in its form, and be provided with a column in which payments can be entered by the treasurer. Two copies thereof shall be made by the clerk, and signed by the Mayor or presiding officer of the common council, and the clerk, one of which copies shall be filed with the clerk; to the other the common council shall annex its warrant for the collection of such assessment, and the clerk shall forthwith deliver the same with the warrant so annexed, to the treasurer for collection. Said warrant shall be signed by the Mayor and clerk, and shall have the seal of the city affixed thereto, and shall be substantially the same as the warrant annexed to the annual assessment roll for collection thereof.

Assessment list—Warrant, &c.

§ 27. The said assessment filed with the clerk and the one delivered to the treasurer, shall in all courts and places be conclusive evidence of the regularity of all prior proceedings and of the assessments therein specified: and all sums of money assessed, and all costs, charges and interest thereon, shall be liens on such real estate, and have and be considered both in law and equity to have priority over all other liens, except prior liens, for taxes on real estate so assessed.

Evidence of what assessment to be.

A lien.

§ 28. Upon receiving the said assessment list, the treasurer, shall take the like proceedings, as far as practicable, in the collection thereof, as in the collection of the annual city and ward taxes of said city, as provided in this act.

Treasurer—how to proceed.

§ 29. All moneys received by the treasurer upon any assessment list made pursuant to the provisions of this chapter, shall be kept by him distinct from all other mon-

Money—how kept and drawn.

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eys, and shall be drawn from the treasury only by orders expressly directing their application to the payment of the expenses for which assessment was made.

Additional assessment—when to be made.

§ 30. In case the common council shall at any time ascertain that the expense of any public improvement cannot be defrayed by the moneys raised upon the assessment list provided therefor, it may cause the deficiency to be assessed upon the real estate described therein, in sums proportioned to the former assessment; and all the provisions of this chapter relative to the assessment list therein mentioned, to the assessment therein, and the collection and payment of the moneys thereon, shall be applicable to the second assessment list in this section provided.

Payment for real estate taken for streets, &c.

§ 31. No real estate situate and being within the limits of the recorded plat of the village of Janesville, or of any addition to said village, shall be taken or appropriated under any of the provisions of this chapter, for the opening, widening or altering any street, lane or alley, or other public improvement, of said city, without the leave of the owner, until the recompense reported by the commissioners to be proper therefor, be paid or tendered to the owner, or deposited to his or her use in one of the banks in the city, to be designated by the common council for that purpose. Upon such payment, tender or deposit being made, the same may be appropriated for such purpose.

In case owner is an infant.

§ 32. When any owner of such real estate shall be known to be an infant under the age of twenty-one years, any officer authorized by law to appoint guardians of infants, may on the application of the infant, or of the common council, appoint a guardian for such infant, taking from him adequate security for the faithful performance of his duties as such; and all notices required to be served upon the infant, shall be served upon such guardian, who shall see to the protection of the rights of such infant.

Highway work—who to perform, &c.

§ 33. Every person residing in said city, who would be required to perform highway work by the general laws of this State, shall be required to perform one day's work annually on the streets and highways in said city, to be performed in the ward where he resides, under the direction of

the aldermen of such ward, or of such person as said aldermen may appoint to superintend said work. But every such person so liable to perform work, may at his option pay to said aldermen or to the person so appointed by them, at the rate of one dollar per day, in lieu of such work.

§ 34. The Clerk of said city shall annually, on or before the first Monday of May, in each and every year, make or cause to be made a correct list and enrollment of all persons within the several wards so liable to perform highway work. One copy thereof he shall deliver to the alderman having the longest time to serve in each ward, and one copy thereof shall be filed in his office.

Clerk to make a list, &c.

§ 35. The Aldermen of each ward, or the person appointed by them, may add to said list [of] persons liable to perform highway work in the several wards, the names of persons omitted who ought to have been included, and of new inhabitants or residents in the ward, whose residence in said ward may have commenced after said lists shall have been made out by said city clerk.

Aldermen may add names, &c.

§ 36. The Alderman to whom said list shall be delivered shall cause at least three days' notice to be given to each person in his ward liable to perform highway work, either personally or in writing, left at his usual place of abode, of the time and place within his ward when such labor shall be required; and said aldermen or the persons appointed by them, may require of all persons offering to pay in labor, to furnish a spade, shovel ax or hoe.

Aldermen to give notice, &c.

§ 37. Every person intending to pay his said tax in labor, who shall, upon notice required to be given, appear and work agreeably to the direction of said aldermen or of the person appointed by them as an overseer, shall be credited on his tax, one dollar for each day's work of the eight hours actually performed by him. If any person notified shall neglect to appear and work on any street, highway or lane at the time and place specified in the notice required to be given, such person shall not thereafter be entitled to pay his highway tax for that year in labor.

§ 38. If any person or persons liable to perform highway work, shall, after being duly notified, neglect or refuse

to perform such work, or pay in lieu thereof said sum of one dollar, the alderman to whom such list was delivered shall, on or before the second Monday in August, make a return to the city clerk of such person or persons, which return shall be verified by the affidavit of such alderman, or the person appointed as overseer, showing that each person named in said list is required to perform highway work in such ward, that each of said persons has been duly notified to perform such work, and that each of said persons has neglected or refused to perform such work or pay the sum of one dollar in lieu thereof. Such return shall be *prima facie* evidence in all courts and places of the facts therein contained.

§ 39. The city clerk on receiving the return mentioned in the last section, shall file the same in his office, and shall enter in the assessment roll for that year, opposite the name of each person named in said return, in a column for that purpose, the sum of one dollar, which sum shall be collected by the treasurer of said city in the same manner as other taxes and assessments are collected, and when collected, the same shall be paid into and become a part of the war fund of the ward for which such return was made.

§ 40. The aldermen of each ward in said city, shall faithfully apply and expend all moneys collected by them, or the person appointed by them, on account of said highway work, in procuring labor, and in the purchase of implements and materials deemed by them most beneficial for repairing streets, highways and lanes in their respective wards, and shall annually, at the first regular meeting of the common council in the month of December, make a report of all moneys so collected and expended by them; and if there be any unexpended balance in their hands, shall pay over the same to the city treasurer, for the benefit of the ward fund of the ward in which the same may have been collected, and said treasurer shall credit the same to said ward fund.

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CHAPTER VII.

ASSESSMENT OF TAXES AND ASSESSMENTS.

SEC. 1. The common council shall, between the first day of May and the first day of June, in each year, appoint two assessors, whose duty it shall be to assess the property in said city according to law. One of said assessors shall reside in the first or fourth ward in said city, and the other in the second or third ward of said city. Such assessors shall, on or before the first Monday in July next ensuing their appointment, make out and deliver to the city clerk of said city a copy of the return required by law to be made by them and returned to the clerk of the board of supervisors. They shall each receive as compensation for their service, two dollars and fifty cents per day, for thirty days only, which shall be in full for making such assessment and taking the statistics required by law.

§ 2. The city clerk at the first meeting of the common council after the receipt of the assessment roll by him, whether the same shall be a regular or special meeting, shall lay the same before the common council for its consideration, and said council are hereby authorized, and it is hereby declared to be their duty to examine said assessment roll; and if it shall be defective in form, or if the certificate of the assessors shall not be in due form, or there shall intervene any irregularity or error in making or certifying said assessment roll, they shall cause it to be corrected, amended and rectified by the assessors. The common council may also make such rules and give such directions in relation to revising, altering or adding to the rolls as they may deem proper and expedient.

§ 3. After the assessment roll for any year shall have been examined, amended and corrected, as provided in the next preceding section, the clerk shall indorse thereon a certificate signed by him, that the same has been examined and approved by the common council, stating the time of such approval. Thereupon, the common council shall levy such sum or sums of money as may be sufficient for the several purposes for which taxes are in this act authorized to be lev-

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ied, but not exceeding the authorized per centage or sum, particularly specifying the purpose for which the same are levied, and if not for general city purposes, the ward upon which the same are levied; and all taxes, whether for general, city or ward purposes, levied under this act, shall be and remain a lien upon the lands and tenements upon which they may be assessed, in preference to any other lien, except prior taxes and assessments, until the same shall be paid, together with all legal charges thereon, and on all personal property of any person, or body politic assessed, for the taxes levied thereon, from the day of the date of the warrant for the collection thereof, until such taxes shall be paid, and no sale or transfer of such real or personal estate shall affect such lien.

§ 4. On or before the third Monday of August, in each year, and as soon as the taxes shall be levied by the common council in any year, the city clerk shall apportion and enter the same in the assessment roll for such year, setting opposite to each parcel, lot or tract of land therein mentioned, and opposite to the name of each person and body politic therein contained, under proper columns each, the just and several proportion of the amount or sum of all taxes levied by the common council in such year. When the city clerk shall have completed the assessment roll, and apportioned the taxes as hereinbefore provided, the common council shall make their warrant and annex it to such roll. Said warrant shall be directed to the city treasurer, and shall be in such form as shall be a substantial compliance with this act, commanding him to collect from each of the persons and bodies politic named in the annexed assessment roll (or list,) and of the owners of the real estate described therein, each therein their several proportion as therein set down, of the sum total of taxes levied or assessments set down in said roll, (or list,) opposite to their respective names, and to the several lots, pieces and parcels of land therein mentioned, in the time and manner as prescribed in this act. Said warrant shall be signed by the Mayor and city clerk, and shall have the seal of the city affixed thereto. Said assessment roll (or list,) with the warrant annexed, shall then

forthwith be delivered by the city clerk to the city treasurer for collection. The city clerk shall make a copy of the assessment roll (or list,) delivered as aforesaid, and file the same in his office, and shall note thereon the time of delivering the same to the treasurer for collection.

§ 5. Upon the receipt of said assessment roll and tax warrant by the treasurer, it shall be his duty to cause a notice to be published in some daily or weekly newspaper published in said city, that such assessment roll and warrant is in his hands for collection, briefly describing the nature thereof, and requesting all persons (forthwith) to make payment thereof at his office, or that the same will be collected at the cost and expense of the persons liable to the payment of such taxes or assessment; said notice to be published for the term of twenty days.

§ 6. On the expiration of the twenty days mentioned in the preceding section, in case any person or body politic shall have neglected or refused to pay the taxes imposed on him or it, the city treasurer shall levy the same by distress and sale of the goods and chattles of such person or body politic wherever the same may be found within the city of Janesville, in the manner specified in title five of the revised statutes; and if any taxes on personal property shall not be paid or collected in consequence of the neglect or delay of the said treasurer, the common council may, by action, recover the amount thereof from the said treasurer and his sureties, and if, from any cause, the taxes and assessment charged in such assessment roll to which such tax warrant is annexed, upon any lands or lots described therein are not collected or paid on or before the first Monday in October ensuing the date of said warrant, it shall be the duty of said treasurer to prepare and make a report thereof to the circuit court in and for the County of Rock, and file said report with the clerk of said court, and on such report make or cause an application to be made at the next term of said court ensuing the making and filing said report, for judgment against the lands, lots and parcels of land for the amount of the taxes, assessments, interest, cost and charges respectively due thereon; and he shall give public notice of

such intended application, at least ten days before the first day of the said term of said court, briefly specifying the nature of the taxes and assessments for the collection of which the application is to be made, and requesting all persons interested therein to attend at such term of said court, which notice shall be published in some daily or weekly newspaper published in said city of Janesville, and the notice so published shall be deemed and taken to be sufficient and legal notice, both of the aforesaid intended application to said court for judgment, and a demand and refusal to pay the said taxes and assessments: *provided*, that if the taxes on any state school or university lands in said city held upon contract, or upon any lands in said city mortgaged to the state, are not collected or paid on or before the said first Monday in October, the treasurer of said city shall immediately make and forward to the State Treasurer a certified list of such lands, with the amount of tax due and unpaid on each description thereof. The State Treasurer shall charge such returned taxes against the lands upon which the same were assessed, and if the said taxes shall not be paid before the the first day of June next succeeding, he shall add thereto twenty-five per cent. penalty; but if such tax shall be paid before the said first day of June, he shall add thereto twelve per cent. penalty, which penalty shall be collected with other charges against said lands, and when collected, such tax and penalty shall be returned by said State Treasurer to the treasurer of said city.

§ 7. The Treasurer shall obtain a copy of the said advertisement, together with affidavit by the printer or publisher of the newspaper in which the same was published, of the due publication thereof, and shall file the same with the said clerk of the said circuit court at said term thereof, which affidavit shall be attached by the clerk to the treasurer's report on file in his office.

Clerk of Court—duty of.

§ 8. The Clerk of said court, upon the filing of such report and affidavit of publication by the treasurer, shall record the same in a book kept for that purpose, in which shall be entered all judgments, orders and other proceedings of said court in relation thereto, and the same shall be pre-

served as other records of his office; and the said clerk shall place the said report and the affidavit attached, at the head of the issue calendar for said term, in the following form, as nearly as may be, to wit: "City of Janesville against John Doe and others; suit for taxes." Or if it be an assessment for some specific improvement, shall also enter said report, returned by the treasurer, in similar forms, as nearly as may be, or as follows: "City of Janesville, against John Doe and others: suit for assessment on assessment list and warrant for paving—— street," or "planking —— street," or "building sidewalk on —— street," or "the opening —— street," or such other title as will sufficiently indicate the nature of the improvement for which the charge or assessment is due, entering a separate suit on each assessment roll and warrant upon which such report or reports are made.

§ 9. It shall be the duty of the court upon calling the calendar of said term, if any defense be offered by any of the owners of said property, or any person having a claim or interest therein, to hear and determine the same in a summary way, without pleadings; and if no defense be made, the said court shall pronounce judgment against the said several lots, lands, pieces or parcels of land, as described in said treasurer's report, and shall thereupon order and direct the said lots, lands, pieces or parcels of land to be sold for the amount of the taxes and assessments, and interest at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum, computed from the date of the warrant for the collection thereof, and costs and charges so levied, assessed or charged upon them, as provided in this act, or under any section or provision thereof: *provided*, that in all cases where a defense is interposed, the trial of an issue or issues therein shall have priority over all other cases in said court, and shall be disposed of with as little delay as possible, consistently with the demands of public justice at said term; but should justice require that for any cause the proceedings as to one or more should be delayed for more than ten days, judgment shall then be rendered as to the other owners and lands, and process shall issue for the sale thereof, the same as in all other cases.

§ 10. It shall be the duty of the clerk of said court, within twenty days after such order is granted, as in the next preceeding section provided, to make out, under the seal of said court, a copy of the treasurer's report in such case, together with the order of the court thereon, which shall constitute the process on which all lots, parts of lots, land, pieces or parcels of land, shall be sold under and by virtue of the judgment and order of said court, and the provisions of this act; and the said treasurer is hereby expressly authorized and empowered in like manner as sheriffs may do, acting under process of execution from any court of record of this State, under the laws thereof, to make sale of such lots, parts of lots, lands, pieces or parcels of land, upon previous notice of such sale, to be published in some daily or weekly newspaper published in said city, the first publication of said notice to be at least twenty days prior to such sale.

§ 11. The said notice of sale so to be published in each case of a judgment upon any city or ward assessment list or assessment roll and warrant aforesaid, and report as aforesaid shall contain a list of the delinquent lands, pieces or parcels of land, lots and parts of lots to be sold, the names or the owners, if known, the amount of taxes, interest, costs, and charges, or the amount of the assessment with interest, cast and charges, as the case may be, due respectively thereon, and the account upon which the same is due, the court which pronounced the judgment, and the time when, and that said lands, pieces or parcels of land, lots and parts of lots will be exposed to public sale at a time and place in said city, to be named in said notice of sale by said treasurer. The proceedings may be stopped at any time upon payment of said taxes or assessments, interest, costs and charges to said treasurer.

§ 12. It shall be sufficient to describe lands in all proceedings relative to assessing, advertising or selling the same for taxes or assessments under any provision of this act, or any section thereof, by initial letters, abbreviations and figures to designate the township, range, section, or parts of

a section, and the number of blocks and lots, and also the year, amounts of such taxes or assessments. CHAPTER VII.

§ 13. The sale shall be conducted in the same manner as now provided by the laws of this state for the sale of lands for state, county, and town taxes, by county treasurers, except as otherwise provided in this act; and the treasurer shall give to each purchaser, on the payment of his bids, and if the same be struck off to the city, then to the city, a certificate in writing, which certificate shall contain the name of the purchaser, a description of the premises sold, the amount of the tax or assessment, with the interest, cost and charges for which the same was sold, the date of the sale, and the time when the right to redeem will expire, which certificate will be assignable. The treasurer shall also immediately after the close of any sale of lands for taxes or assessments, make and deliver to the city clerk a statement containing a particular description of each lot, part of lot, tract and parcel of land so sold by him, specifying the name of the person to whom sold, the amount for which the same was sold, and the name of the owner, if known; and the said treasurer and clerk shall each record such statement in a book to be kept by each of them for that purpose, in their respective offices. For every certificate issued by said treasurer in pursuance of this section, he shall receive the sum of fifty cents, which sum shall be added to the costs of said sale, and be included in the amount for which the premises shall be sold.

§ 14. The assignee of any tax certificate of premises for taxes or assessments, by virtue of this act, shall be entitled to receive a deed of such premises in his own name, and with the same effect as though he had been the original purchaser.

Assignee of a tax certificate.

§ 15. If at any sale of real or personal estate for taxes or assessments, no bid shall be made for any parcel of land of the amount of the taxes or assessments, interest, costs and charges thereon, the same shall be struck off to the city, and if no bid be made for any goods and chattels, the same shall be struck off to the city, and thereupon the city shall receive in the corporate name, certificates of sale of such land, and

When no bidders—City to take.

CHAPTER VII. such goods and chattels, and shall be vested with the same rights as other purchasers are. If the city shall become the purchaser of any personal property by virtue of this act, the treasurer shall have the power to sell the same at public sale; and in case the city shall become the purchaser of any real estate at any tax sale, the treasurer is authorized to sell the certificates issued therefor, for the amount for which sold and interest, and to indorse and transfer such certificate to the purchaser.

Certificates and personal property held by city.

Redemption.

§ 16. The owner or occupant of any land sold for taxes, or any other person, may at any time, within three years from the date of the certificate of sale, redeem the same, or any part thereof or interest therein, by paying to the treasurer of the city, for the use of the purchaser, his heirs and assigns, the amount for which such land was sold, and all subsequent charges thereon authorized by law, or such proportion thereof as part or interest redeemed shall amount to, with interest on the amount of purchase money, at the rate of twenty-five per cent. per annum, from the date of such certificate: but whenever any land sold for taxes, shall be redeemed within six months after the sale thereof, interest as aforesaid shall be paid for six months: *provided, however,* that in all cases, any such person may in like manner redeem any such lands, or any part thereof or interest therein, at any time before the tax deed executed upon such sale is recorded, and when so redeemed, such deed shall be void as to the lands or interest so redeemed.

Proviso.

Minors, married women and idiots.

§ 17. The lands of minors, or any interest they may have in lands sold for taxes, may be redeemed at any time before such minor becomes of age, and during one year thereafter; and the lands of idiots, married women and insane persons so sold, or any interest they may have in the same, may be redeemed at any time within five years after such sale; and such redemption shall be made in the same manner as provided in the last preceding section.

Deed when to issue.

§ 18. If any land sold for taxes, shall not be redeemed as aforesaid, the city clerk shall after the expiration of the time prescribed by law for the redemption thereof, and on the presentation to him of the treasurer's certificate of sale,

execute in the name of the city, as such clerk, under his hand and the seal of the city, to the purchaser, his heirs or assigns, a deed of the land so sold and unredeemed as aforesaid, and shall acknowledge the same. An abstract of all deeds so made and delivered, shall be entered by the clerk in the book where tax sales are recorded. A fee of one dollar may be charged by the clerk for every deed so issued, which deed shall vest in the grantee an absolute estate in fee simple in such land, subject, however, to all unpaid taxes and charges which are a lien thereon; and such deed duly witnessed and acknowledged shall be *prima facie* evidence in all controversies and actions, in relation to the right of the purchaser, his or her heirs or assigns, to the premises thereby conveyed, of the following facts:

First. That the land or lot conveyed was subject to taxation or assessment at the time the same was advertised for sale, and had been assessed in the time and manner required by law.

Second. That the taxes or assessments were not paid at any time before the sale.

Third. That the land conveyed had not been redeemed from the sale at the date of the deed, and shall be conclusive evidence of the following facts: First. That the land or lot was advertised for sale in the manner and for the length of time required by law. Second. That the land was sold for taxes or assessments as stated in the deed.—Third. That the grantee in the deed was the purchaser. Fourth, That the sale was conducted in the manner required by law; and in all controversies and suits involving the title to land claimed and held under and by virtue of such deed, the person or persons claiming title adverse to the title conveyed by such deed, shall be required to prove, in order to defeat the said title, either that the land was not subject to taxation or assessment at the date of the assessment of said tax, or making said assessment; that the taxes or assessments had been paid; that the land had never been assessed for taxation or assessment, or that the same had been redeemed according to the provisions of this act, and that such redemption was made for the use and benefit

of the persons having the right of redemption under the laws of this state; but no person shall be permitted to question the title acquired by the said deed, without first showing that he, she or they, or the person under whom he, she or they claim title, had title to the land at the time of the sale, and that all the taxes and assessments due upon the lands have been paid by such person or persons under whom he she or they claim title as aforesaid.

Tax sales—when to be made.

§ 19. All sales of property for the non-payment of taxes and assessments for any improvements of what kind soever, shall be held at the same time with the general sale of property for the non-payment of city taxes in each year, unless, in particular cases, said sale is stayed by examination or process of law. the intent hereof being, that there shall be but one general collection, by sale, of all taxes and assessments whatsoever, in each and every year, which sale shall take place in the manner hereinbefore provided, and at the same time in each year.

Per cent—when to be added.

§ 20. In all cases where taxes or assessments are not paid on or before the day of the filing of the treasurer's report for judgment of the court, as hereinbefore provided, twelve per cent. shall be collected as additional costs, and be added to and collected with the other taxes or assessments, as the case may be, and expenses authorized to be collected on the property assessed; and for this purpose the treasurer shall add to his said report, on a separate column, the amount of such additional costs; and on all taxes and assessments paid between the time of the expiration of the twenty days' notice, as provided in section four of this chapter, and the time of sale of the real estate on which such taxes and assessments are a lien, interest at the rate of twelve per cent. per annum, to be computed from the date of the warrants for the collection thereof, to the date of such payment, shall be added to the same and collected therewith; and said treasurer shall also collect with such taxes and assessments, all fees, costs and expenses incident, the proceedings consequent upon the non-payment of taxes and assessments, as provided in this act, and such fees, costs and expenses are hereby declared to be legal charges upon the

real estate on which any tax is levied or assessment made under the provisions of this act. The fees for publishing notice of sale of lands for taxes or assessments under this act, shall be the same as provided in section 133 of chapter 15 of the revised statutes for publishing notice of sale for taxes; and for publishing all other notices, proceedings and advertisements required to be published under this chapter, the same fees as allowed for publishing legal notices, &c., by section 37 of chapter 131 of the revised statutes; and the clerk of the circuit court shall have and receive the same fees on proceedings in said court under the provisions of this chapter, as for similar services in other cases in said court. Said fees, costs and expenses shall be apportioned equally upon the several parcels of land concerning which said notice or notices were published, and said proceedings taken.

§ 21. Any action or proceeding for the recovery of any land sold for taxes or assessments under the provisions of this act, except in cases where the taxes or assessments have been paid, or the lands redeemed as provided by this act, shall be commenced within one year from the time of recording the deeds of said sale executed under the provisions of this act, and not thereafter.

Action for recovery of land—When to be brought.

§ 22. If any tax hereafter levied or assessments made shall be set aside in whole or in part, for any cause whatsoever, by the order or judgment of any court, the common council are hereby authorized, directed and required forthwith to relevy and reassess, as the case may be, the tax or assessment so set aside, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, from the date of the warrant for the collection of such tax or assessment so set aside, upon the property, lots, pieces or parcels of land in such first assessment roll or list so apportioned and set down opposite to each lot, piece or parcel of land therein described, and opposite to each person therein named, and as to which such tax or assessment shall have been so set aside.

Right to levy—re-assess—taxes hereafter levied.

§ 23. If any tax heretofore levied by said city shall be set aside, in whole or in part, for any cause whatsoever, by the order or judgment of any court, the common council of

CHAPTER VII. said city are hereby authorized, directed and required to relevy such tax, or as much thereof upon each and every lot, piece or parcel of land as to which such tax shall be so set aside, as should and might have been legally assessed and levied thereon, at the time the said tax so set aside was first levied; and such tax so relevied shall be and continue a lien upon such lots, pieces or parcels of land upon which so relevied, from the date of the warrant for the collection of the tax so set aside, in preference to any other lien thereon, except of taxes levied prior to the time of the first levying of such tax so set aside, till the payment thereof together with all legal charges.

Taxes other than annual — collection of,

§ 24. The common council of said city shall cause the taxes and assessments levied and assessed as in the nineteenth and twentieth sections of this chapter provided, to be collected forthwith, notwithstanding the time for collection of the annual city taxes of said city, as provided in this act, shall not have arrived, and the treasurer of said city shall take the like proceedings, as far as practicable, in the collection thereof, as in the collection of the annual city and ward taxes and assessments, as in this act provided.

§ 25. No injunction, order or other process or order, shall be allowed or issued by any court, judge or commissioner in this state, to enjoin or restrain the sale of any lands in said city of Janesville, for taxes, or to enjoin, restrain or interfere with any proceedings taken, or attempted or threatened to be taken, for the collection of taxes; and no action or proceedings shall be commenced in any court of this state, for the purpose of setting aside the taxes on any lands situate in the city of Janesville, or to invalidate or set aside any certificate of sale or land in said city of Janesville for taxes, or any tax deed conveying any land in said city, or for the purpose of recovering the possession of lands in said city, held under a tax deed, unless the person or persons commencing such actions or proceedings shall first pay to the treasurers of said city the amount of all taxes remaining unpaid thereon, whether such taxes have been regularly assessed or not; and the person commencing such action or proceedings shall allege in his com-

Conditions to right of action for recovery of land.

plaint or papers, either that all taxes on such lands have been paid within the time required by law for the payment thereof, or, if payment is not made by virtue of this section, he shall allege the amount which has been paid to the city treasurer, to enable such party to commence such action or proceedings, the time of payment, and the year for which such payment is made; and if it shall appear upon the trial or hearing of such action or proceeding, that the amount so paid is not the amount of taxes justly chargeable upon such lands, such action or proceeding shall be dismissed, and costs taxed against the plaintiff; and no costs shall be recovered against the defendant in any action commenced to set aside any tax or tax deed, or to prevent the collection of taxes in said city.

CHAPTER VIII.

PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

SEC. 1. There shall be elected every two years, by the qualified electors in each ward in said city, a school commissioner, who shall be a resident of the ward in which he is elected. There shall also be elected every two years, by the qualified electors* of said city, one school commissioner at large for said city. The term of office of such school commissioners, shall be two years, and they shall within ten days after their election take the oath of office prescribed by this act for city officers. The school commissioners heretofore elected under the charter of said city, shall hold their office until the expiration of the time for which they were elected, and until their successors are elected and qualified; and nothing in this act shall be so construed as to authorize the election of any school commissioner in any ward in said city, whose term of office shall commence before the expiration of the term of the school commissioners heretofore elected in said ward.

§ 2. The said school commissioners so elected, together with the commissioner at large, shall constitute a board, to be styled, "the board of education of the city of Janesville." Said board shall appoint and hold stated monthly meetings,

and a majority thereof shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. At the first meeting of said board in each year, the members thereof shall elect one of their number president, and whenever he shall be absent, a president *pro tem.* may be appointed. They shall also appoint a clerk, and fix his compensation, which shall not exceed the sum of three hundred dollars per annum, and he shall hold his office during the pleasure of the board. The said commissioners shall not receive any compensation for their services.

Record of proceedings to be kept.

§ 3. The clerk of said board shall keep a record of the proceedings thereof, and perform such other duties as the board may prescribe, which record, or a transcript thereof, certified by the president and clerk of said board, shall be received in all courts and places as *prima facie* evidence of the facts therein set forth; and such records, and all the books and accounts of said board, shall at all times be subject to the inspection of the common council and of any committee thereof duly appointed for that purpose; and the said board shall examine all teachers making application to each in the public schools of said city, and all certificates to teachers, granted by said board, shall be substantially in the form prescribed by the state superintendant of schools. The clerk of said board shall visit all schools in said city, at least twice during each month, and report their condition to the "board of education," with such suggestions for their improvement as he may deem proper. He may also make such suggestions to said board as he may deem necessary for improving and repairing school houses, grounds, fences and appurtenances thereto belonging.

§ 4. The clerk of said board shall, in each year, and at the time and in the manner now or hereafter to be required of town superintendents of schools in the several towns of this State, make and transmit to the clerk of the board of supervisors a report in writing, which report shall, in form, be such as is now required by law to be made annually by town superintendents of schools, and transmitted to said clerk.

§ 5. The common council of said city shall have power to

pass such ordinances and regulations as the board of education may report as necessary and proper for the protection and safe keeping, care and preservation of the school houses in said city, and lots and appurtenances to the schools, and also to impose penalties for the violation thereof. All such penalties shall be collected in the same way that other penalties authorized to be imposed by said council under said act as amended, are collected.

§ 6. The title of the school houses, sites, furniture, books, apparatus and appurtenances, and all other property in this chapter mentioned, shall be vested in the city of Janesville, and the same while used or appropriated for school purposes, shall not be levied upon or sold by virtue of any warrant or execution, nor be subject to taxation or any purpose whatever; and the said city shall be able to take, hold or dispose of any real or personal estate transferred to it by gift, grant, bequest or devise for the use of the schools of said city, whether the same shall be transferred in terms to said city by its proper style, or by any other designation, or to any person or persons or body for the use of said schools.

§ 7. The Treasurer of said city is hereby authorized, empowered and directed to apply for, demand and receive from the county treasurer, for Rock county, all moneys appropriated for the use of schools in said city, and all other moneys in the possession of said county treasurer, at any time, raised, appropriated or intended for the use and benefit of schools in said city, and the said county treasurer is hereby directed and required, on demand of the said city treasurer, to pay over to him the said moneys, without delay or set-off, taking his receipt as such treasurer therefor; and all such moneys shall be placed to the credit of the school fund of said city, and shall only be drawn from the treasury in payment of teachers wages.

§ 8. The said board of education shall have power, and it shall be its duty:

1st. To establish and organize such and so many schools in the several wards of said city, as they shall deem necessary and expedient, and to alter and discontinue the same.

3d. To contract with and employ in behalf of the city, all teachers in the common and ward schools, and the high school, who shall have been licensed by said board, and at their pleasure to remove them.

To have all respects the superintendence, supervision and sole management of all the public schools in said city, and from time to time to adopt, alter, modify and repeal, as they may deem expedient, rules and regulations for their organization government and instruction, for the reception of pupils, and their transfer from one school to another, and, generally, for the promotion of their good order prosperity, and public utility.

5th. To cause all repairs to be made to school buildings and other school property in said city, and to contract for all things necessary or proper for the support and maintenance of the schools of said city, for the current year; and to have the exclusive management of, control and disbursement of all moneys raised by tax in or received from any source by said city for school purposes, and to audit all accounts and indebtedness incurred for school purposes in said city, and to draw orders on the treasurer for the same.

6th. To prepare and report to the common council such ordinances and regulations as may be necessary or proper for the protection, safe keeping, care or preservation of the school houses, lots, sites and appurtenances, and all the property belonging to said city connected with or appertaining to the schools therein, and suggest proper penalties for the violation of such ordinances and regulations, and annually to determine and certify to the common council at its first meeting in June, of each year the amount of money in their opinion necessary or proper to be raised under subdivision two of section one of chapter five of the act of which this is amendatory, specifying the sum for each of the purposes therein mentioned, and the reason therefor, which sum shall not exceed sixty-five hundred dollars.

§ 9. No contract shall be made or liability or indebtedness incurred by said city, for the sale or purchase of school house sites, or the constructing of school houses, by the common council of said city, except upon the recommendation in writing to said common council by the board of education, and then only to the extent and in the manner so recommended by said board of education; and all liability or indebtedness on the part of the city incurred under the provisions of this section, shall be audited by and paid on the order of the board of education, and not otherwise: *provided*, that no contract shall be made or liability or indebtedness incurred for either of the purposes specified in this section, without a vote of two-thirds of all the members of the common council.

CHAPTER VIII.

Sale and purchase of School property.

Proviso.

§ 10. All moneys raised by tax in or received by said city from any source for school purposes, of every kind and description whatsoever, shall be kept by the city treasurer separate from any other funds of said city, and also from the private funds of said treasurer, and shall only be drawn from the treasury upon the order of said board of education, signed by the president and clerk of said board; and if said treasurer shall fail to keep said fund separate as aforesaid, or shall misapply the same, or shall fail to pay the order of said board of education on demand, at any time before he shall have fully paid out all the moneys received by him for school purposes, the office of said treasurer shall be forfeited and immediately become vacant, and in addition to such treasurer's liability upon his official bond, he shall forfeit and pay to the city of Janesville the sum of five hundred dollars for such failure or refusal to pay such order, to be sued for and recovered by said board of education in the name of the city of Janesville, for the use of the school fund of said city.

School fund—how kept and drawn upon.

§ 11. The treasurer of the city of Janesville, shall, at the end of each and every month, and oftener if required, render an account to said board of education, showing the condition of the school fund of said city, and the balance of moneys in his hands belonging to said fund, giving also a full and detailed account of all moneys received by him, be-

longing to said fund, and all expenditures therefrom since his last report to said board; and if said treasurer shall neglect or fail to make such report when required by said board of education, his office shall be forfeited and become and be vacant; and in addition to said treasurer's liability upon his official bond, he shall forfeit and pay to the city of Janesville the sum of five hundred dollars for such neglect or failure to make such report, to be sued for and recovered by said board of education in the name of the city of Janesville, for the use of the school fund of said city.

Books of account open to inspection.

§ 12. The books and accounts of the treasurer of the city of Janesville shall always be subject to the inspection of the members of the board of education of said city, and of committees appointed by said board to inspect the same.

Children not residents of city may be admitted to schools.

§ 13. The said board of education shall have power to allow the children of persons not residents of said city to attend any of the schools therein, under the care and control of the said board, upon such terms as said board shall by resolution prescribe, fixing the tuition that shall be paid therefor. All moneys so received for tuition shall be paid into the treasury, and credited to the school fund of said city.

Board of education to report to council condition of schools.

§ 14. It shall be the duty of said board of education to report to the common council at its first meeting in the months of January and July, in each year, the condition of the several schools in said city, and the average number of pupils in attendance; the names and rate of compensation of the several teachers; the cost of supporting said schools since their previous report, and the estimated cost thereof to the time of their next succeeding report, specifying the items thereof under their appropriate heads, together with such other matter as the common council shall require.

Board not to contract indebtedness.

§ 15. The board of education shall not contract indebtedness, incur liability, or appropriate money in any one year to a greater amount than the amount of school funds to be raised by tax and received from other sources in such year, and every member of the board of education who shall vote to contract indebtedness, incur liability or appropriate money to a greater amount than the amount of such funds to be

raised and received in such year, shall forfeit and pay the sum of fifty dollars, to be sued for and recovered in the name of the city, for the use of the school funds. **CHAPTER VIII.**

§ 16. The board of education shall report monthly to the common council all accounts audited or orders drawn by them upon the school fund, and the same shall be published by the council in the official paper of the city. **Monthly report to council.**

CHAPTER IX.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

SEC. 1. The common council, for the purpose of guarding against the calamities of fire, shall have power, and it shall be its duty, by ordinance, to prescribe the limits within which wooden buildings, and buildings of other materials that shall not be considered fire-proof, shall not be erected or repaired, and to direct that all and any buildings within the limits prescribed, shall be made and constructed of fire-proof materials, and to prohibit the repairing of wooden buildings within the fire limits, when the same shall have been damaged to the extent of fifty per cent. of the value thereof, and to prescribe the manner of ascertaining such damage. **Fire limits.**

§ 2. The common council shall also have power to purchase fire-engine and other fire apparatus, and to authorize the formation of fire-engine, hook and ladder and hose companies, and to provide for the due and proper support of the same, and to prescribe the duties of all such companies, and to make rules and regulations for their government, and to order such companies to be disbanded, their meetings to be prohibited, and their apparatus to be delivered up to said city. Each company so formed shall not exceed in number seventy able-bodied men, between the ages of eighteen and fifty years; and every member of each company hereby authorized to be formed, shall be exempt from poll tax, from serving on juries, and from military duty during the continuance of such membership; and any person having served for the term of seven years in either of said companies, shall be forever thereafter exempt from serving on juries, from **Fire engines—companies.**

poll tax, and from all military duty except in cases of insurrection or invasion.

§ 3. Each of such companies may elect its own officers and form its own by-laws, not inconsistent with the laws of this State, or the ordinances and regulations of the city. Such companies shall be formed only by voluntary enlistment.

Chief Engineer, election of.

§ 4. There shall be a meeting of the members of said companies on the third Monday of March, in each year, at such place as shall be designated by the Mayor, when they may nominate and recommend to the common council for appointment, one chief engineer, one first assistant engineer, and one second assistant engineer; and the common council may thereupon appoint the persons recommended, respectively, as aforesaid. The chief and assistant engineers, appointed as in the next preceding section provided, shall be the chief and assistant engineers of the fire department of the city of Janesville, and they with the other firemen, shall take the care and management of the engines and other fire apparatus and implements used and provided for the extinguishment of fires, and preservation of property at fires; and at fires the chief engineer, and in his absence the assistant engineers, according to their respective appointments, shall have the command and control over the said fire department and the fire-engines, and all other fire apparatus and implements used and provided for the extinguishment of fires. It shall be the duty of the chief engineer to report to the common council at its first meeting in the month of November, in each year, the names of the members of the fire department, and the condition of the engines, and the quantity and condition of the hose and other apparatus belonging to said department. The common council may more fully define the power and duties of said chief and assistant engineers.

§ 6. [5] Whenever any person shall refuse to obey any lawful order of any engineer or other person having command of the fire department at any fire, it shall be lawful for the officer, giving such order, to arrest, or direct orally any officer of said city or citizen to arrest, such person, and

to confine him temporarily in a safe place, until such fire shall be extinguished; and such officer, or any of them, may in like manner, arrest or direct the arrest and confinement of any person at such fire who shall be intoxicated or disorderly; and any person who shall refuse to obey any such lawful order, or who shall refuse to arrest or aid in arresting any person so refusing, shall be liable to pay such penalty as the common council shall prescribe, not exceeding fifteen dollars.

§ 8. [7] The common council shall have power to organize a sack company which shall be known as sack company No. 1, to consist of not more than twenty members. Such company shall constitute a part of the fire department, and at fires shall be subject to the control of the chief engineer. The members of said company, either collectively or individually, shall be, and are hereby authorized and empowered, to act as special police in and for the city of Janesville, and are hereby vested with all the power and authority which is now or may be hereafter vested in any police officer of said city, and shall be entitled to all the rights and immunities of members of the fire department. At fires they shall take charge of all property which may be exposed or endangered, and, so far as it may be in their power, preserve the same from injury or destruction. Said company may from time to time adopt such by-laws and regulations as they may deem necessary, not inconsistent with this act and the laws of this State. The members of said company shall not be entitled to any pay or compensation for services rendered in their official capacity. They shall, in case of riot or disturbance of the peace, have free access to all licensed places of public amusement in the city, and shall perform such services as may be necessary for the peace and good order of the same. The members of said company shall severally take an oath of affirmation that they will faithfully discharge the duties of their said office; and when any member of said company shall cease to be a member thereof by resignation, expulsion or otherwise, notice thereof shall be given to the city clerk, who shall preserve a record of all members of said company.

CHAPTER IX.

Independent fire companies.

§ 8. [7] All independent fire companies which shall organize in said city, shall be subject to all the provisions of this chapter.

CHAPTER X.

CITY CEMETERIES.

Cemeteries.

SEC. 1. The city of Janesville is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase, hold, take and convey such tracts of land without the limits of said city, for the purpose of establishing such cemeteries for the interment of the dead therein, as the common council of said city may think necessary, which shall be exempt from tax under any law of this State.

Same.

§ 2. The said city is hereby authorized and empowered to take, hold and dispose of any and all real estate without the limits thereof, heretofore transferred to it by gift, grant, bequest or devise for cemetery purposes, by any and all persons and corporations whatsoever, whether the same have been transferred in terms to said city, by its proper style, or by any other designation, or to any other person or persons or body, for the use aforesaid.

Council may regulate.

§ 3. The common council of said city shall have power to pass such ordinances, rules and regulations with regard the improving, preservation, laying out and ornamenting, and of the burial of the dead therein, as they shall think necessary.

Jurisdiction of council and police justice—in regard to,

§ 4. The said common council is fully empowered and authorized to provide, by ordinance, for the punishment of all persons, who shall without said limits, be guilty of any violation of the regulations, rules and ordinances established by said city in relation to such cemeteries, the same as if such offense had been committed within the boundaries of said city; and the police justice of said city is hereby authorized and empowered to issue process for the apprehension of any and all persons guilty of any such violation, and to have the same jurisdiction in every respect as of the violation of any other ordinance, rule or regulation of said city.

CHAPTER XI.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

SEC. 1. No money shall be appropriated by the common council of said city, for any purpose whatsoever, except such as are expressly authorized by this act.

Appropriation of money by council

§ 2. No penalty or judgment recovered in favor of the city, shall be remitted or discharged, except by a vote of two-thirds of all the aldermen.

Penalty or judgment—how remitted.

§ 3. Execution shall issue forthwith on rendition of any judgment for a violation of any of the provisions of this act, and any ordinance, rule, order or regulation of said city, unless the same be stayed or appealed from according to the laws of this State.

§ 4. No person shall be an incompetent judge, justice, witness or juror, by reason of his being an inhabitant of or taxpayer in said city, in any proceeding or action in which the city shall be a party.

§ 5. If any election by the people or common council shall not be held, from any cause, at the time or in the manner herein prescribed, or if the common council fail to organize as herein provided, said city corporation shall not be dissolved, but such election or organization may be had on any subsequent day, by order of the common council thereof; and if any of the duties enjoined by this act, or the ordinances or by-laws of said city, to be done by any officer or agent at a specified time, and the same is not then done or performed, the common council may appoint another time at which the said act or acts may be done or performed.

§ 6. The general laws for this State for the preservation of bridges and trees, and the punishment by such laws provided for willful and malicious injuries done to the same, are hereby extended to and shall include all trees belonging to said corporation and within said city, and to all bridges now built, and all that shall be hereafter built in said city, and shall apply to any willful or malicious damage which may be done to other same by any person or persons what-

ever, and the common council may from time to time make such by-laws or ordinances as they may deem necessary for the preservation of such trees and bridges, and enforce by adequate penalties.

§ 7. Service of process for the commencement of any action against said city, shall be made by leaving a copy of the same with the mayor, and it shall be his duty forthwith to inform the common council thereof, or take such other proceedings as the nature of the case shall require, or as by ordinance or resolution of the common council in such cases directed.

§ 8. When a judgment shall be rendered against the city, or against any city or ward officer or agent of said city, for any act of said officer or agent while in the employ of the city, no execution shall be awarded or issue upon such judgment, except as herein provided, but the same, unless reversed, shall be assessed, collected and paid as other city or ward charges, and when so collected the same shall be kept by the treasurer separate from all other funds in the treasury, and only paid out by the treasurer on orders drawn to pay such judgment, which orders shall distinctly specify the demand or judgment to pay which the same are drawn; but if said orders so drawn shall not be paid on demand, in thirty days after the amount of such judgment shall have been so assessed and collected, as in this section provided, execution may be issued thereon upon the order of the court authorized to issue such execution, on special application therefor; but no personal or real property of any inhabitant of said city, or of any individual or corporation, shall be liable for or be levied on or sold by virtue of any execution issued to satisfy or collect any debt, obligation or contract of said city.

§ 9. The said city may have, purchase and hold real or personal property sufficient for all public purposes, and may sell and convey the same, and the same shall be free from taxation for any and all purposes.

§ 10. All real estate exempt from taxation by the laws of this State, shall be subject to taxation and assessment for street and other similar improvements in said city, the same as other real estate under this act.

§ 11. The city of Janesville shall be and is hereby made the lawful owner of all property donated to the public by the original recorded plat of the village of Janesville, and by the recorded plat of every and all additions since made, or which shall hereafter be made thereto, except the block in the original recorded plat of the village of Janesville, bounded northerly by Court street, easterly by Division street, southerly by South First street, and westerly by Bluff Street.

CHAPTER XI.
Property donated by plats, city to order exception.

§ 12. All officers of said city created conservators of the peace by this act, shall have power to arrest or cause to be arrested, with or without process, all persons who shall break or threaten to break the peace, commit for examination and if necessary detain such persons in custody over night in some safe place, and shall have and exercise such other powers as conservators of the peace as the common council may prescribe.

§ 13. This act shall not invalidate any legal act done by the common council of the city of Janesville, or by its officers, nor divest their successors under this act of any rights of property or otherwise, or liability which may have accrued to or been created by said corporation prior to the passage of this act.

This act not to invalidate any act done.

§ 14. This act shall be deemed a public act, and may be read in evidence without further proof, and judicial notice thereof shall be taken in all courts and places; and all ordinances, orders, rules, resolutions or regulations and by-laws of said city, when printed and published as in this act provided, shall be received and read in evidence in all courts and places, without further proof.

§ 15. The city of Janesville shall be regarded as one of the towns of Rock county, for the purpose of raising and collecting the annual county and state taxes, and the same provisions of law which shall apply to the assessment and collection of said county and state taxes in the several towns in this State, and the duty of all officers concerned therein or connected therewith, shall be applicable thereto.

§ 16. The common council shall, at least ten days before the annual election in each year, cause to be published in

Annual publication of receipts and expenditures by city.

one or more newspapers in said city, a full and correct statement of the receipts and expenditures from the date of the last annual report, together with the sources from whence the former are derived, and their mode of disbursement, and also a distinct statement of the whole amount assessed, received and expended in the respective wards for the same period, together with such other information as may be necessary to a full understanding of the financial concerns of the city.

Ordinances heretofore passed.

§ 17. All ordinances, orders, resolutions, regulations and by-laws now in force in said city of Janesville, and not inconsistent with this act, shall remain in force under this act until altered, modified or repealed by the common council, after this act shall take effect.

Repealing clause.

§ 18. All provisions of law conflicting with this act, are hereby repealed.

Manner of submitting questions to the electors of city.

§ 19. The manner of submitting any question to the electors of said city herein before required by the provisions of this act to be so submitted, shall be as follows: The common council shall cause a notice to be prepared, which shall be signed by the Mayor and clerk, and published in some daily, if any and if not, then in some weekly newspaper printed in said city, the first publication to be at least ten days previously to the day fixed for any election to be held under such notice. Said notice shall particularly set forth the question to be determined by such election, the form of the ballot to be used by such electors as may vote in favor or against the proposition submitted, the time of holding such election, the place where in each ward the polls of such election will be held, and the hour of opening and closing the same; and if any such question so submitted shall involve the raising of money by tax, such notice shall state the precise amount of such tax. All such elections shall be conducted and returns thereof be made and canvassed, and the result thereof declared, in like manner as annual city elections are under this act required to be conducted and returns thereof made, canvassed and declared. But any such question so submitted shall be declared lost, unless it shall appear upon such canvass that two-thirds or more of all the legal votes so cast thereon shall be in favor thereof.

When to take effect.

§ 20. This act shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication.

RULES

OF COMMON COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF JANESVILLE.

RULE 1. The regular meetings of the Common Council shall be held on Monday of every other week, at 7½ o'clock in the evening. Special meetings may be called at such times as the Mayor or a majority of the Common Council, when in session, may direct.

RULE 2. The Mayor, or in his absence, the President of the Board, shall take the chair, at the hour above named, or at the hour to which the Council is adjourned, and if a quorum be present, shall direct the journal of the preceding meeting be read. The presiding officer for the time being shall preserve order and decorum, and decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Council.

RULE 3. When the presiding officer shall have called the members to order, the Clerk shall proceed to call the roll in alphabetical order, noting who are present, and who absent, and if, after having gone through with the call it shall appear that a quorum is not present, the fact shall be entered on the journal and the Council shall stand adjourned to the time appointed for the next regular meeting.

RULE 4. In case of the absence of the Mayor and President of the board, the Council shall, at any regular or special meeting, proceed to elect one of their number to preside at the meeting.

RULE 5. Every ordinance, or resolution in the nature of an ordinance, shall receive three several readings previous to its passage; but no such ordinance or resolution shall have its third reading on the same day, unless by suspension of the rules as hereinafter provided.

RULE 6. All demands, claims, or account against the city, shall be presented, and referred to the finance committee and if reported favorably, shall before they are allowed by the Council, be approved by said committee.

RULE 7. All petitions, remonstrances, and accounts, when presenting the same or shall be read at length by the the member presenting the same, by the presiding officer or clerk, unless otherwise ordered.

RULE 8. Every member previous to his speaking, shall rise and address the presiding officer, and shall not be interrupted except by a call to order.

RULE 9. When a member is called to order by the presiding officer, he shall take his seat and shall not be suffered to proceed without leave of the board.

RULE 10. No member shall speak more than twice on any question without first obtaining leave of the board.

RULE 11. The ayes and noes shall be ordered upon any question at the request of a member, and the Clerk shall call the roll in alphabetical order.

RULE 12. When a motion has once been decided, it shall be in order for any member who voted in the majority to move a reconsideration thereof, at the same or next succeeding meeting, and if a majority of the members present shall be in favor of reconsideration, the subject shall be before the board for farther action.

RULE 13. The following standing committees, consisting of three members each, shall be appointed by the Mayor, viz: 1st, Finance; 2d, Judiciary; 3d, Police; 4th, Fire Department; 5th, Printing; 6th, Licenses; 7th, School, one from each ward; 8th, Gas Light, one from each ward; 9th, Bridges, one from each ward; 10th, Parks, one from each ward; 11th, Railroads, one from each ward.

RULE 14. The committee on printing shall carefully examine all ordinances and resolutions required to be published, after the same have been passed, and shall superintend the printing of the same and no such ordinance or resolution shall be signed by the Mayor until such examination is made.

RULE 15. The order of business shall be as follows: 1st, The presentation of petitions, memorials, and accounts; 2d, Reports of standing committees; 3d, Reports of select committees; 4th, The presentation of ordinances or resolutions; 5th, The consideration of unfinished business.

RULE 16. It shall be the duty of the Clerk of this board, in addition to the duties prescribed in the city charter, to record all ordinances passed by the Common Council in a suitable book, and to furnish the chairman of committees and all city officers, with the resolutions and other matter that may be referred to them, and to perform all such other clerical duties as may be required by this board.

RULE 17. No rule shall be suspended, rescinded, or amended, without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present at any meeting.

RULE 18. The rules of parliamentary practice, comprised in Jefferson's or Cushing's Manual, shall govern the proceedings of this board in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the rules or the laws of the state.
