

Those who furnished chain saws, trucks and other equipment with which to work;


The ham radio operators who sent and received messages to and from our relatives and friends;





Topics of Past Years

SELECTED BY COMMITTEE

1864 John D. Simon first known settler in area now known as Colfax.



Community first known as "Begga" town. Later named Colfax in honor of Schuyler Colfax, vice-president of the United States in 1868.

- 1864 First school built.

 A non-denominational church built by Mr. Simon.
- 1876 Holden Lutheran Church built.
- Running Valley Lutheran Free Church (now Faith Lutheran Church of Running Valley.)
 Professions and business places established:
 Eli Monteith, doctor
 Hamp Barden, dentist
 Mrs. Monteith, music instructor
 David Philander, farmer and preacher
 Halver Erickson, blacksmith
 Margaret Miller, school teacher
 Thomas Leach, barber
 W. R. Culbertson, postmaster
 Running and J. E. Mathews, storekeepers
- 1884 Wisconsin Central Railway completed to Colfax. Hardware store opened, Peter Running, owner Millinery store opened, Mrs. A. C. Hayner, owner. Kinney Mercantile Co., operated by O. G. Kinney and Severin Fjelstad.
- 1892 Population about 100.

 Water power flour and grist mill erected.

 Privately owned bank opened by George Bartlett and G. T. Vorland.

- 1894 Ole Noer, licensed pharmacist, handled drugs with other merchandise in his store.
- 1896 First newspaper, The Colfax Record, published for a period of six months.
- 1897 Colfax Messenger founded by Andrew Chase. Water system installed.
- 1898 272 carloads of potatoes shipped out in September. Agent Smith reported an average of 10 to 25 cars each day for six weeks.
- 1899 Methodist Church constructed.

 Kinney Mercantile Company opened its new stone store for business. Cost \$5,000. Building is now the present Noer Drug Store.

 Library started by Reading Club. This club eventually became the present Woman's Club.
- 1900 Population about 404.

 Colfax Creamery opened in March with Ludvig Ludvigson, of Elk Mound, as buttermaker.

 Work was begun on starch factory July 13.

 Building 40x110 feet, cost \$15,000.
- 1903 Colfax Telephone Exchange established by Oscar Anderson.
- 1904 Colfax incorporated as village.
- 1905 Dam washed out on 18-Mile Creek. Power cut off and town without lights. Engineer and fireman killed when railroad bridge collapsed as a result of high water.
- 1907 Tobacco sorting house built, 32x80 feet, cost \$3,000.
 Passengers were allowed the privilege of boarding the train, previously not permitted unless going some distance.
 Sons of Norway, excursion trip to Chippewa Falls by train. Round trip, 65c.
- 1908 Lutheran Church built. First car in town, Stanley Steamer, Dr. L. A. Larsen.
- 1910 High school erected.
- 1911 Soo Line took over Wisconsin Central on 99 year lease.
- 1914 Village band organized by Dr. L. A. Larsen.
- 1915 Silent movies started by G. Hammer in Municipal Building. Had his own generator. Peoples State Bank founded. W. W. Mathews first president.
- 1916 Boy Scouts organized. D. J. Toycen first scout master.
- 1918 Check of \$10,529.90 received by John Danielson for tobacco crop.

1919 American Legion and Auxiliary organized.

1924 Population about 1,000. Largest village in Dunn County.
SAF Park was made a gift to village by Scandinavian-American Fraternity.
Present high school added to school building.

1927 Rod & Gun Club organized. At one time had 500 members.

1928 Colfax school system had first school bus from Wheeler area.

1930 Girl Scouts organized.

1931 Peoples State Bank robbed on September 3.

Fred Moe, son of Theodore Moe, went to Siberia for two years to be instructor in a caterpillar tractor factory.

"Pageant of Shawls," unique performance by Woman's Club, Mrs. B. B. Baskin directing.

1932 Lloyd Ellingson selected a member of Olympic team to represent U. S. at Lake Placid, New York, February 3 to 13.


1932 Colfax Stone Mill received order for Bedford limestone for the Sacred Heart Church at Aberdeen, South Dakota; a five months'-run.
L. E. Root advertised a 10th anniversary sale—Beef roast 8 cents, steak 13 cents, pork chops 12 cents, skinned hams, whole or half 12 cents.



1933 Lyman Paul and John Russell tapped 85 maple trees for sap, Orin Larson started chicken hatchery in February.

1934 Flood disaster-Bridge across 18-Mile Creek,

a feed mill, gas station, garage and car owned by Reuben Larson, a garage and car owned by Mr. Baker, all went down stream during the night. Red Cedar River flooded the west side and residents were rescued by boats.



- 1936 Peoples State Bank robbed by lone bandit, August 25. He obtained \$2,408.00.
- 1939 Grand celebration on afternoon of May 15 for Ebert Sorkness, Civil War veteran, 100 years old. Sorkness succumbed at the age of 100 years and eight months.

15,000 people saw close of Colfax Free Fair—Registrants from 81 cities and 10 states in one booth

Ed. B. Rosenberg won grand sweepstakes at Minnesota State Glad Show. Glads grown on 40x60 plot.

- 1940 Opening of Refrigerated Locker Plant by Mr. Fladoes.
- 1941 Dedication of Colfax Vocational and Farm Shop building.
 Egg drying plant in operation at creamery.
 Handled 360,000 eggs daily. Turned out 10,000 pounds egg powder daily.
- 1942 County Trunk G from Colfax to Wheeler becomes State Highway 170.
 17 mothers organized War Mothers' Club with Mrs. B. C. Gullickson as president.

- Colfax Co-op Creamery burned mortgage with entertainment, band, free barbeque and speeches on October 3.
- 1943 Lieutenant Colonel Howard Lowry awarded the French Croix de guerre for distinguished service as liaison officer for French and American forces during Tunisian campaign.
- 1949 Colfax Garden Club planted 5,000 Norway pine on the old ball field on west side, and was instrumental in installing playground equipment and trees and shrubs in Iverson Park.

 Easter cantata with 120 singers from community
 - Easter cantata with 120 singers from community performed at Colfax and Sand Creek—Vernon Iverson, conducting.
- 1953 Sewage disposal plant completed.
- 1958 Devastating tornado on June 4, 1958. 12 dead, many hospitalized, 72 homes damaged or completely destroyed. Rehabilitation continued for months.

Eau Claire Jaycees donated and erected playground equipment in SAF Park.



1964 New elementary school and addition to high school dedicated on May 10.




