REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

Introduction of Regent Saunders

President Lawton introduced Mr. Philip T. Saunders, who became a member of the Board of Regents upon his election in July as President of the State Board of Vocational, Technical and Adult Education.

Appointment to Council of Trustees, UW Hospital and Clinics

It was moved by Regent Knowles, seconded by Regent Fish and unanimously carried that Resolution 3132 be adopted.

Report of the Council of Trustees, UW Hospital and Clinics

Regent Finlayson, Chairman of the Council, summarized issues discussed at the September 6 meeting, noting first that Superintendent Derzon had reported on current patient activity at the hospital. For the first two months of the fiscal year, the number of admissions was up by 7.9 percent, while the average length of stay declined by .6 percent from the previous year. Outpatient activity increased by about 12 percent.

Stating that approval had been granted for the hospital to operate a helicopter critical care service for a one-year period, Regent Finlayson said, "I think all of us feel very good about the improved health care on an emergency basis that can be achieved through that service." It was hoped that the service could started by December 1984 or January 1985.

The Council heard a report by Dr. Folkert O. Belzer on the hospital's transplant program, which was considered one of the best in the country.

Reporting that the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals had reaccredited the UW Hospital and Clinics for three years contingent on standardization of quality assurance mechanisms, Regent Finlayson explained that the contingency was based on more strenuous standards for record keeping.

In conclusion, she welcomed as new members of the Council Regent Hanson (Vice Chairman), Regent Weinstein and Mr. Lorenz.

Regent Lawton commented on the accreditation matter, pointing out that it was extremely important because many federal programs would not compensate a hospital that was not accredited. Overall, he emphasized, the Joint Commission's report on the UW Hospital and Clinics was excellent; fault was found only with minor bookkeeping details that did not affect quality in any way.

Report of the President of the Vocational, Technical and Adult Education Board

Regent Saunders, President of the State Vocational, Technical and Adult Education Board, prefaced his report by commenting that insights he gained as a Regent would have an important impact on the VTAE Board and that he had been struck at the outset by the many similarities between the functions and responsibilities of the two boards. "I look forward to getting to know all

of you on a personal basis and doing together what we can to provide the absolute best postsecondary educational systems possible."

Reporting on the July VTAE Board meeting, he noted that in addition to his election as President, Mr. Paul Larson was elected Vice President and Mr. Lonnie Hanson was elected Secretary.

In program development, the VTAE Board approved a number of courses at Fox Valley, including administrative assistant and information processing programs. For Milwaukee, computerized machine technician, plastic technician, supervisors' management, industrial plastics, and machine operations had been approved.

Regent Saunders then spoke about student waiting lists, which in 1983 included 7,936 applicants who were denied access to full-time VTAE programs. About one-third of all programs were not only completely filled but had applicants who could not be admitted. Stating that the VTAE Board was very concerned about this problem, he said consideration would be given to seeking funds through grants, foundations and increased state aid. In addition, there was the possibility of changing the delivery system to place greater emphasis on individualized study.

The VTAE Board also gave preliminary review to the 1985-87 biennial budget request and approved 1985-86 statewide achievement goals.

Regent Conroy inquired about the percentage of students enrolled in college transfer courses and the percentage denied admission to such programs due to lack of space.

Regent Saunders indicated that he would provide those figures.

Noting that a summary of items considered at the July 20 meeting had been included with Regent agenda materials, President Lawton invited Regent members of HEAB to make additional comments.

Stating that there was much concern about the proposed reorganization of HEAB, Regent Finlayson expressed hope that the matter could be resolved satisfactorily.

Regent Weinstein asked if the Regents who served on HEAB had a position on the proposal from the standpoint of the UW System.

Regent Nikolay replied that he did not support the restructuring because it would take control of the agency out of the hands of those who controlled the purse strings.

Regent Finlayson said her decision would be based on whether reorganization would provide better service to students. While it appeared that might be the case, she preferred to await further discussion on whether or not efficiency would be greatly improved before taking a position.

Regent Conroy noted she had not attended the meeting because she had not been properly sworn in at the time. However, she had been much involved in discussing the proposal with people who expressed a variety of views about its consequences. Because the results of reorganization were so uncertain, she would have opposed it as being ill-timed and inadequately researched.

President Lawton reported on a recent meeting in Stevens Point about compensation matters, at which participants included eight Regents, a sizable number of legislators, President O'Neil, other administrators and faculty. Overall, he felt a very positive exchange of ideas had taken place. Noting that he had met with Governor Earl on the same subject, and that he and Vice President Knowles had also met with President O'Neil and Acting Executive Vice President Lyall, Regent Lawton stated: "The necessary numbers for us in making the recommendation--and I emphasize the 'us'--are coming forward. It is very clear in talking to the Governor that he expects us to carry out our statutory duty; namely, to make the recommendation. And that is fully my intention. We will keep the Regents posted as this evolves, but as you know, there are missing pieces in the puzzle. We do not yet have the academic staff report; that report will be forthcoming soon. We do not have all the numbers from peer institutions on current salaries, and also a crucial item is how much revenue is going to be available. These will be developed over the next month or six weeks, and you will be kept informed as they are developed."

Elderhostel - Presentation to Board by Ann Ostrom, director of state programs, pp. 6-9

Presentation on Elderhostel Program

Introducing the presentation, President O'Neil indicated that the Elderhostel Program in Wisconsin, involving twelve System institutions and eleven independent colleges and universities, was truly a statewide activity. He then called on Ms. Ann Ostrom of UW-Extension, who served as state director of the program.

Ms. Ostrom explained that Elderhostel was a week-long program in which participants stayed in campus dormitories and took up to three university-level courses especially designed for them. The program began on a Sunday with an orientation session, followed by classes and other activities on Monday through Friday.

Initiated in 1975 in New England, Elderhostel was the brain child of Marty Knowlton, a philosopher and educator who was inspired by the youth hostels and folk schools of Europe. The program had spread across the country by 1978, at which time Wisconsin became involved with 115 people taking courses at five campuses: UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee, UW-River Falls, UW-Stevens Point, and Mount Senario. By 1984 there were programs in all 50 states and 13 foreign countries, with more than 47,000 people attending nationally. In Wisconsin, 50 week-long programs at 25 locations were attended by 1,300 students. Each program was limited to 40 people in order to preserve an atmosphere in which participants could easily get to know one another.

The Elderhostel organization consisted of a national office in Boston with computerized registration and directors in all states who handled publicity and trained campus coordinators. The campus coordinators assembled faculty and managed individual programs. Ms. Ostrom then introduced the following campus coordinators: Al Loomer, of UW-Green Bay, Cora Forbush, of UW-Whitewater, and Margaret Geisler and Virginia Marks, of UW-Madison. It was also noted that Chancellor Marshall, of UW-Stevens Point, served on the national Elderhostel Board.

With respect to financing, Ms. Ostrom explained that Elderhostel was generally a break-even operation, with tuition of \$180 covering room, board, instruction, and activities. Although it was not a money-making program, she observed, faculty found it a worthwhile and revitalizing experience because of the great interest shown by students. There was in addition a public relations benefit since participants often spoke favorably to others about the campuses they visited.

As examples of how the program was viewed, Ms. Ostrom read the following quotes. In an interview for the 1983 Elderhostel Annual Report, Billy Franklin, President of Texas A&I University, said: "Teaching in the

Elderhostel program renews faculty excitement in teaching; it provides an opportunity for a faculty member to pursue a favorite topic in a concentrated time period with participants who are there strictly because they wish to be; and finally new teaching strategies suggest themselves. I'm not sure who benefits most from the experience--the students or the teacher. An institution doesn't enter into the Elderhostel program to make money. Instead, most universities consider participation as a public service, a means of faculty development, and an effective public relations effort. I fully expect to see students coming to Texas A&I in future years as a result of 'word of mouth' advertising of our Elderhostel participants."

An article in Perspective on Aging, written by a professor who taught an Elderhostel course, stated: "What happened then and continued throughout the week were volleys of insightful questions, charging up my own enthusiasm for the material. If a teacher enjoys himself, it is a fairly reliable sign that the students are doing likewise. We were well under way, developing a corporate personality. I told the class, 'I wish I could bottle up your enthusiasm for those dreary days of the regular term.'"

The hosteling part of the program, Ms. Ostrum noted, involved moving from campus to campus to take different courses. She then introduced Louise and Gerald Lawton, of Madison, who had attended many Elderhostel programs.

Commenting on the programs in which they had participated, Mrs. Lawton said, "We have enjoyed every one of them. Each one seems better than the last one, and we have no criticism whatsoever. The Elderhostel program in Wisconsin is excellent." The Elderhostel experience, she noted, provided an opportunity to meet interesting people, as well as to take a variety of courses without pressure.

Ms. Ostrom added that in Elderhostel there was no homework, no exams, and no grades were given.

In response to a question by Regent Hanson, Mrs. Lawton said she and her husband had participated in about seven Wisconsin programs, as well as programs in Kentucky, Canada and Minnesota. While all were excellent, she felt the art courses were exceptional.

Mr. Lawton said that in addition to meeting new people, a primary benefit of Elderhostel was the opportunity to study unfamiliar subjects, which provided motivation to continue learning at home.

Ms. Ostrom explained that a wide variety of people attended Elderhostel, ranging from professionals to those with little formal education. Scholarships were offered through the national Elderhostel office, in addition to which many organizations funded scholarships for their members. She then read the following quotes from program evaluations: "I'm not afraid of growing old any more." "Normally, I would hesitate to take a trip alone, but I do see elderhostelers coming by themselves and being graciously accepted by the group. Great, I'll do it next year." "I wish I had started earlier. Seventy-nine is not too late. There's still life to be lived and enjoyed."

Regent Hanson asked about the opening age for admission, to which Ms. Ostrom replied that both spouses could attend if one was at least 60 years old.

Regent Clusen said she was pleased to know that financial assistance was available since the cost of tuition would otherwise be beyond the reach of a good many older people. Since the size of the group was limited to 40, she asked how decisions were made as to which applications would be accepted.

Replying that selections were made by computer on a random basis, Ms. Ostrom said applicants were encouraged to make alternate choices in the event that their first preference was filled.

Regent Clusen asked if there was more than one session on a campus during the year, to which Ms. Ostrom responded that many institutions offered more than one program, the largest number on one campus in Wisconsin being four. In New England, however, some institutions ran programs all summer, and the level of demand there was expected to spread across the country.

In reply to a question by Regent Knowles as to whether program revenues were sufficient to cover the cost of the program, Ms. Ostrom said that most expenses were paid by those funds but that the coordinator's salary was usually subsidized by the campus.

Regent Fish inquired as to the type of courses offered by Elderhostel.

Indicating that programs covered a wide range of subject matter--from astronomy to literature to nuclear power--Ms. Ostrom emphasized that all were college-level courses.

Regent Saunders asked if Elderhostel was strictly a summer program.

Although it began as a summer program because dormitory space was available, Ms. Ostrom explained, some campuses now offered courses in other seasons. Because dormitories were often filled at those times, arrangements had been made for camper elderhostels and for programs at the American Baptist Assembly and Trees for Tomorrow.

Regent Lawton asked if the curriculum was centrally or locally determined.

While there were central guidelines, Ms. Ostrom explained that each campus made the decisions as to what programs to offer and that faculty were eager to participate in Elderhostel.

In response to a question by Regent Hanson, Ms. Ostrom said a national newsletter, listing courses all over the country, was published quarterly.

President O'Neil observed that the UW System's level of involvement in the Elderhostel program was remarkable in that twelve institutions participated, the next largest number being the California State University System with ten. The University of North Carolina System, approximately the same size as the UW System, had four campuses involved; the State University

of New York had six participating institutions, and the University of Texas System had one.

Report on Enrollments

Observing that the expected enrollment decline had not yet begun, President O'Neil reported that projections based on preliminary enrollment figures indicated there would be an all-time high of about 162,000 students this fall, an increase of about 400 from the fall of 1983. Enrollments were up at several institutions, the largest increase being at UW-Madison. "Overall," he said, "it seems that more students--most of them Wisconsin residents as in the past--want to begin and to continue their postsecondary education at our institutions than ever before, and that is a very encouraging sign."

Enrollment Decline - (Same as above)

Although the numbers of high school seniors had been declining for several years, the size of freshman classes had not decreased. The explanation, he pointed out, was in part that a higher proportion of those from the freshman age pool were going to UW System institutions, although the reasons for that rising participation rate were not altogether clear. At the time of the Vietnam War, about 29 percent of the age cohort matriculated at System institutions, but by the mid-1970s, that figure had dropped to 23 percent. It then moved slowly upward to a level in 1983-84 that was about equal to the Vietnam War peak, and this year it was expected to exceed the previous high, with no evidence of slowing down. While the number of potential students had declined by 19 percent from the high of 1978-79, the number of actual students continued to grow because more potential students had chosen to study in the UW System.

At one time, it was thought the best explanation lay in the depressed economy--that people for whom employment prospects were uncertain chose to go to college rather than attempting to join the work force. As the economy improved, however, that theory lost credence. Noting that low tuition at System institutions might have encouraged enrollment growth, the President said he would prefer to believe, however, that the real reason was that the System offered an exceptionally fine education and the promise of excellent career opportunities. "We must, in short, be doing something right, or many things, and our faculties and campus administrators ought to take the credit for attracting ever-larger numbers of students despite the demographic trends."

With regard to fields of study, the President reported on shifts in student preference from 1978-79 to 1983-84. During that period there were increases of 104 percent in computer science, 145 percent in area and ethnic studies, 25 percent in engineering, 30 percent in mathematics and statistics, 20 percent in business, 25 percent in geology, and 34 percent in interdisciplinary studies. In many of those areas, he observed, the increases would have been significantly higher but for constraints imposed by limitations of space, resources and faculty.

Turning to the area of foreign languages, President O'Neil reported that students had increased in credit hours their study of foreign languages by 25 percent during the five-year period, a figure which seemed to surpass even the encouraging national trends. Growth was largest in Russian, followed by French (20 percent), Italian, Spanish and German, in that order, all showing increases well over ten percent. In that regard, the UW System's experience also paralleled the national trend, though at a higher level of increase in virtually all of the modern languages. Noting that all

but one of the System institutions required some foreign language study, he thought that although retention of that requirement might have something to do with the recent renaissance of language study, it was the exceptional quality of the System's foreign language faculties, the close ties to both area studies and overseas study programs, and a long tradition in Wisconsin of international consciousness that offered the best explanation of this trend.

While the above data referred to campus-based enrollments, President O'Neil pointed out that UW-Extension enrolled in a typical year more students than all other System institutions combined, mainly for noncredit learning through General Extension, but also for independent study and other forms of credit. Considering all Extension contacts around the state, he said more than a million people were reached each year in some significant educational way by the University of Wisconsin System, a contribution to the welfare of the state in which a special pride should be taken.

Report of United Council of UW Student Governments

Mr. Scott Dacey, President of United Council, spoke first about the issue of faculty/staff compensation and its impact on students. Legislative approval of the recommendations which had been made, he stated, could bring \$43 million for salaries to the System, a significant portion of which would be paid by students. "As partners, we will be investing in a valuable commodity--the best education possible within the state. I believe that this investment will, without question, prove to be a profitable one for the students. However, I also believe, as do many other student leaders from around the state, that we may at this point be paying just enough for education, and I hope that we do not tend to increase it."

Compensation - United Council's position regarding increase in faculty/staff compensation in relation to (state) student fee ratios, pp 11-12
 Indicating that the question of compensation was one of many topics considered at United Council's last meeting, he said the group also unanimously endorsed implementation of comparable worth guidelines as a way of correcting pay discrimination.

In response to a move by the federal government to increase the legal drinking age to 21, United Council had developed a campaign to advise state legislators of its view that such action would not only be an affront to states that had not voluntarily adopted a 21-year-old drinking requirement, but also would discriminate against one segment of the population and would have wide-ranging effects on the students attending Wisconsin schools, including loss of income-producing jobs.

Referring to the problem of sexual harassment, Mr. Dacey commented that a recent accusation made on the UW-Madison campus showed the limits of existing policies. Stating that firm action against sexual harassment was essential, he urged development of a systemwide policy which would define more specifically those behaviors which constitute harassment and set forth procedures for handling such complaints. In addition, he felt there should be increased distribution of pamphlets to advise women students and employees of their rights and to outline grievance procedures and disciplinary sanctions against those found guilty of harassment. He also

suggested that student handbooks include a section devoted solely to the nature of sexual harassment.

Turning to another matter, Mr. Dacey reported that he would meet with student government organizations at UW-Eau Claire, UW-Parkside and UW-Platteville in an effort to gain their support for United Council. He was also working to include UW Centers students in the United Council structure.

In conclusion, Mr. Dacey thanked President O'Neil for giving him the opportunity to serve on the Academic Staff Compensation Committee.

Regent Weinstein made reference to Mr. Dacey's comment that students felt tuition was as high as it should be. Noting that it was not his intention to express an opinion on the matter at this time, he pointed out that studies showed fees in the UW System to be among the lowest, while quality was ranked among the highest. He asked Mr. Dacey how he would reconcile those two facts and whether he thought that situation could continue and still provide enough funds for the level of compensation needed to maintain quality.

Mr. Dacey responded that he felt students were willing to contribute money needed to offset faculty and academic staff salary imbalances, but not in excess of the current student percentage of cost. Stating that maintenance of a relatively inexpensive educational system of high quality was an achievement in which Wisconsin residents should take pride, he urged that consideration be given to the financial problems of students, particularly in view of recent reports on the growing burden of student indebtedness.

Regent Weinstein asked if Mr. Dacey's statement that students did not want to pay more referred only to the percentage of the cost and not to dollars.

Replying in the affirmative, Mr. Dacey said it was understood that dollar amounts would increase. If ratios changed, however, fees would increase at a greater rate. "We also realize that, if the ratio stays the same, if we are having to increase the student dollar amount, then the state share will also have to increase, and the students will get a better education all the way around."

Regent Lawton called attention to the fact that September 5 was the fourth anniversary of President O'Neil's inauguration as head of the UW System.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

Vice Chairman Clusen presented the Committee's report.

Calendar - Testimony from State Rep. Larry Swoboda and member of the tourism industry, to begin fall school semester after Academic Year Calendar Development (Labor Day) pp 13-17

Introducing discussion of this topic in Committee, Vice President Lyall cited a number of considerations in developing academic year calendars. Set by faculty two years in advance, calendars were then checked by System Administration to ensure that the requirement of thirty-four weeks of instructional activities and thirty-nine contractual weeks was met. She pointed out that faculty committees which developed calendars had to balance varying interests of students, faculty and parents, as well as administrative questions, and that both educational and economic considerations entered into these decisions. It was stated that this fall about half the institutions in Wisconsin began instruction after Labor Day but that on a nationwide basis only about six percent of the universities did so. All institutions of the UW System had provisions for both late registration and for starting classes after Labor Day to accommodate students who wished to work through that weekend.

Representative Larry Swoboda, together with his constituent, Mr. Doug Butchart of Fish Creek, then presented their concerns to the Committee, stating that business people in tourist areas were greatly troubled by pre-Labor Day school openings, with one person, for example, reporting the loss of 60 percent of his student help just before the Labor Day weekend. They felt that students were needed by Wisconsin tourism less in May than they were at Labor Day--a key holiday for tourist-oriented businesses. Especially since tourism was Wisconsin's second largest industry, they thought these needs should be taken into account by those who set academic year calendars.

Mr. Butchart observed that students lost income by leaving their jobs before the Labor Day weekend but that they also needed time to rest before the beginning of school. Tourist businesses thus lost revenues and the state, in turn, lost tax dollars. He cited results of the Heberlein, Baumgartner Research Services survey which indicated that 84 percent of Wisconsin residents wanted public universities to begin classes after Labor Day.

In answer to questions by Committee members, Mr. Butchart referred to a survey done in Wisconsin Dells and other tourist areas showing a loss of 46 percent to 62 percent of student employees before the Labor Day weekend, even when businesses offered incentives for workers to stay through that holiday. He also noted that the problem extended to private college opening dates as well as the UW System. Indicating that he had received a petition on this issue signed by 1,400 constituents, Representative Swoboda expressed the view that no appreciable progress had been evident since the matter was brought before the Board in 1980.

United Council - Opposition to school year beginning after Labor Day, pp 13-15
Ms. Jean Prasher, Academic Affairs Director of the United Council of UW Student Governments, then appeared before the Committee to state United Council's continuing opposition to legislation which would mandate a post-Labor Day opening for the UW System. She referred to the popularity of the current calendar among students, special January interim programs which would be disrupted by a change, and student participation on faculty committees that set the calendars.

UW-Madison Vice Chancellor Bernard Cohen summarized constraints on calendar setting, including contractual mandates, statutory faculty governance rights, the fixed dates for Christmas and New Year's, and student preferences. He cited a survey conducted on two occasions at UW-Madison which demonstrated that a larger percentage of students needed to be available for work before Memorial Day than needed to be available through Labor Day.

Describing the calendar as a compromise among a series of conflicting interests, UW-Stout Vice Chancellor Wesley Face pointed out that the calendar at his institution contained two quarters within each semester which would be disrupted if the semesters were not of equal length, and that teacher education programs would be negatively affected by a post-Labor Day mandate, since a large portion of school districts began classes before Labor Day. He explained methods used by UW-Stout to accommodate students who wished to start classes after Labor Day, including registration in the spring and permission to miss classes before that weekend. Many tourist businesses, he observed, might not be informed about the accommodations that UW System institutions can make for their student employees.

Presenting a written statement on the difficulties of setting the 1984-85 UW-Milwaukee calendar, Professor David Luce, Chair of the UW-Milwaukee University Committee, stressed the importance of academic considerations and institutional autonomy in making such decisions.

After considerable Committee discussion, Representative Swoboda made a concluding statement in which he suggested that the Board hold hearings on the calendar issue in the northern part of the state; that the System do independent research on the subject; that campuses consider multiple starting dates for the fall; and that the tourism industry be fully informed of possible accommodations in registration and class attendance available to students working in tourist enterprises. In response, Vice President Lyall agreed to provide Representative Swoboda with a full written description of the options available at each institution and to do so in a form suitable for distribution to employers.

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Weinstein remarked that this fall 70 percent of the System institutions began classes before Labor Day.

It was indicated by Vice President Lyall that the number varied somewhat from year to year, depending on the date of Labor Day and other factors.

Recalling that the calendar issue had been debated by the Board as early as 1970, Regent Fish explained that although the argument for starting classes after Labor Day held some appeal initially, it soon became clear that the situation was more complex than it first appeared. While he thought providing information on institutional procedures would be useful, he cautioned against any legislative or Regent mandate on exact starting dates as being an unworkable solution. He suggested, however, that the chancellors attempt to make calendars as uniform as they considered reasonable so that information provided to the tourist industry and others did not carry a multitude of confusing exceptions.

If the objective were to end the semester by Christmas, which was a fixed date, Regent Weinstein inquired as to why the starting date changed from year to year. While he would not vote for mandating that classes start after Labor Day, he thought the effort to encourage business in Wisconsin argued for taking greater notice of the importance of that holiday for tourism than was indicated by the calendars for this fall.

Regent Clusen observed that some variation in starting dates was due to the fact that each institution set its own calendar, taking into account a number of restrictions.

Adding that the date of Labor Day and institutional differences in the registration process or examination periods also accounted for some variation, Vice President Lyall noted that half the institutions might thus start after Labor Day one year, but that the proportion could change in other years. She explained that current procedures to accommodate students who worked through the Labor Day weekend were a direct result of campus response to the problem as previously expressed to the Regents. Although the issue had been addressed persistently by faculties, she noted, it was also necessary for them to weigh other interests (such as the need of students employed in the construction industry to be available for work in May) in order to devise the most workable calendar that could be found.

Regent Weinstein pointed out that 80 percent of System campuses would open before Labor Day in 1985. Although 50 percent might be an historical average, it was not the actual proportion for this year or the next.

During Committee discussion, Regent Clusen noted, it became clear that neither Representative Swoboda nor his constituents in the tourist business were aware of the accommodations which various campuses made to students. Therefore, she felt making that information widely known would be a considerable step forward. In addition, it was pointed out that employees in tourism businesses came not only from the University System but also from high schools or vocational/technical institutes and that it was therefore necessary to address the problem from the standpoint of those educational systems as well.

Regent O'Harrow thought the Education Committee acted wisely in attempting to respond to the tourism industry's concerns. Inasmuch as the Legislature would soon be asked to provide a substantial sum for salary increases, he said it would be beneficial to also let one of the state's major industries know that the university sympathized with its needs.

Regent Heckrodt inquired about the way in which students viewed this matter.

Replying that there had been much discussion in Committee about that question, Regent Clusen said United Council strongly opposed any change in the present calendar and much preferred that the semester end before Christmas. It was also interesting, she added, that there seemed to be a difference in need based on location of the tourism area, with those in the north beginning their busy season in mid or late June, while those further south were eager to have student help by Memorial Day. While there was no

answer which would satisfy everyone, she emphasized that the Committee wished to be responsive to the concerns that had been expressed.

It was noted by President O'Neil that after the 1980 presentation to the Board, efforts had been made to communicate to businesses information on accommodations for students who worked through the Labor Day weekend, and that earlier in the year he and Vice President Lyall met with a representative of the industry who was aware of those options. Since it was now apparent, however, that existing procedures were not well understood, he thought the university could be helpful in making this information more widely known.

Regent Clusen suggested that such information also be given to interested legislators and legislative committees.

Observing that students were not the only labor pool on which businesses could draw, Regent Conroy pointed out that there was a high unemployment rate among young people in Milwaukee, and that employers might consider reaching beyond college campuses for the help they needed.

Regent Clusen added that there also was considerable unemployment near the Door County area but that Mr. Butchart had indicated there were more help-wanted ads in Fish Creek than there were job applicants.

Because there was little low-cost housing in tourist areas, UW-Green Bay Chancellor Weidner remarked, students employed there were often those who did not need money urgently and who would be likely to take some time for vacation no matter what the university did to enable them to work through Labor Day. In order to solve the problem, therefore, it would seem necessary to develop low-cost housing to accommodate employees who really needed the jobs and who would work for as long as possible.

Regent Weinstein asked for an explanation as to why several universities would end the 1984 fall semester on the same day but started as much as a week apart.

In response, Vice President Lyall said the requirement of 34 weeks of instruction was a minimum, with some institutions offering more than that. There also were reading periods and examination periods of varying lengths, as well as differing amounts of time needed for registration.

Regent Saunders observed that his company hired many students as vacation replacements and that vacation schedules became very heavy by mid-May, a time at which it was difficult to find available students. "I could appreciate the problem that the people were addressing yesterday, but on the other hand, we also have a problem at the beginning of the summer trying to get students so that we can start our vacations. And I know that is shared by many of the industries in the metropolitan Milwaukee area."

It was suggested by Regent Weinstein that a survey of student opinion be conducted so there would be no question about their views on the issue.

Regent Lawton noted UW-Madison had conducted such studies, most recently in 1980, and that the results overwhelmingly supported the present calendar. "I think that Regent Clusen has described it quite well as a

no-win situation. But we don't want to give the impression that we are not concerned or that we have a magic solution. The Regents are not about to set calendars. The faculty is going to do this on academic grounds."

✓ UW - La Crosse - Degrees + Programs - First reading of new academic programs B.S. in Microbiology pp 17-18

First Reading of New Academic Program: B.S., Microbiology, UW-La Crosse

Summarizing Committee discussion of this item, it was reported by Regent Clusen that Vice President Lyall reviewed the process by which the Board conducted a first reading of new degree program proposals one month and voted on them the following month.

Vice Chancellor W. Carl Wimberly and Professor Jerry Davis, the UW-La Crosse Biology Department Chair, then described the history and context for the proposed program. The Biology Department at UW-La Crosse was large, serving undergraduate majors, M.S. candidates, general education students and students majoring in health-related programs. The proposed program had been a submajor in biology since 1974, with its graduates finding employment particularly in allied health and food or dairy industries. In contrast to existing microbiology offerings at UW-Madison, UW-Milwaukee, and UW-Oshkosh, the program at UW-La Crosse would be at the undergraduate level only. It was noted that faculty and curriculum necessary to sustain a major had been developed through offering the submajor and that the proposal was supported by the West Central Wisconsin Consortium.

Because the Committee was sensitive to the need for careful scrutiny of new programs, Regent Clusen stated, members asked a considerable number of questions. It was indicated in response that about 66 students enrolled this fall in the microbiology submajor and 75-100 would be anticipated as majors as soon as the new program was offered. Vice Chancellor Wimberly addressed the question of funding for the program by describing the evolutionary process of base reallocation to support needed faculty and other resources. The curriculum was already in place and was serving students in other majors.

✓ Academic Programs - First reading of new academic program, B.S. in Microbiology, UW-La Crosse; discussion about process for new academic programs, pp 17-18

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent O'Harrow referred to comments made at the Stevens Point meeting about proliferation of programs. He was particularly aware of the need to question closely addition of new programs because it was a normal tendency for institutions to seek expansion of their offerings.

↓ and program duplication

Since there already existed within the Biology Department a concentration in microbiology, Regent Clusen explained, it was in that sense not a new program. The status of the program would simply be changed from having a biology major with a concentration in microbiology to an undergraduate degree in microbiology.

Expressing confidence in Vice President Lyall's recommendation, Regent Fish stated that he intended to support the program. He felt the justification was adequate and did not believe anyone was suggesting that

there be no new degree programs--only that they be reviewed carefully and that others be dropped along the way.

Regent O'Harrow indicated that his intention was to reinforce understanding of the process. Noting that the recommendation stated that the UW-La Crosse program would be the only one in the state concentrating exclusively on providing an undergraduate degree, he commented that such a reason did not provide strong justification, inasmuch as other institutions would probably be glad to seize a similar opportunity. Reading from the recommendation that "both lecture and laboratory sections of all the microbiology courses are taught by faculty members who have earned advanced degrees in microbiology, with specialization in their areas of instructional responsibility," he asked if that meant other cluster campuses would not have the same kind of specialization.

Dr. Lyall replied that the purpose of that statement was to indicate that the program would be staffed by fully qualified faculty--not to suggest that others might not also be well qualified.

It was further stated, Regent O'Harrow continued, that faculty of the proposed program had presented seven research papers at the annual meeting of the North Central Section of the American Society for Microbiology and six at national ASM meetings. He asked if faculty at other institutions also might have made such presentations, and Dr. Lyall responded in the affirmative.

Regent O'Harrow then inquired as to what Vice President Lyall's recommendation would be if other institutions requested establishment of similar programs.

Responding that consideration would be given to the number of such programs in the System, their location, and the demand for them, Vice President Lyall stated that if she did not believe the proposal would be a justified addition to the curriculum, she would not recommend it for approval. The basis of this recommendation, she explained, was the belief that there was strong demand for the program, there were well-qualified staff to teach it, and it would not duplicate resources available elsewhere in the System. Since the process was to respond to proposals as they were submitted by the faculties, any future requests would have to be evaluated in the context of the programs that were in place at that time.

Regent O'Harrow commented that it would be helpful, particularly for Regents who were not on the Education Committee, to have an early orientation into the process for proposing and evaluating new programs.

Vice President Lyall responded that a presentation on that subject could be made to the Board.

Revision of AP 7.2--Academic Year Progress Standards

Continuing the report of the Education Committee, Regent Clusen stated that the purpose of the proposed revision was to bring written System policy into conformity with a federal mandate which required universities to

stipulate academic progress standards for those receiving federal financial aid. The responsibility for the specifics of those academic standards was left to the universities.

Adoption by the Board of Resolution 3136 was moved by Regent Clusen, seconded by Regent Finlayson, and unanimously voted.

Resolution 3136: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System the addition of the underlined clause "and deemed to be making satisfactory academic progress," to the appropriate paragraph of System Analysis Paper 7.2 be approved. The paragraph reads as follows:

It is the right of the faculties of the several institutions to set academic progress standards and it is their obligation to see to it that such standards are maintained. In no case shall academic standards of progress or grades for state or federal financial aid funds (other than those which have been specified by the donor) be established by anyone other than the faculty. All students considered eligible for enrollment or continued enrollment and deemed to be making satisfactory academic progress according to the standards set by the faculty shall be considered eligible for financial aid. In allocating aid funds received from state or federal sources, financial aid officers shall adhere to all state and federal policies concerning the administration of such funds, including priority to be assigned to the most needy applicants, and the standard of measurable academic progress established by the faculty of the institution for determining continuing eligibility. For campus discretionary funds, policy for allocation shall be set by the Institution."

The Education Committee was advised that it was necessary to rescind these policies, which specified certain retirement ages, in order to conform with new state and federal age discrimination legislation.

Regent Clusen moved adoption by the Board of Resolution 3137, and the motion was seconded by Regent Finlayson.

Financial Aid - Revision to System Analysis Paper 7.2, adding (rest same as above)

Regent Policy - To conform with state & federal legislation eliminating age discrimination, Regent Policies 72-18, 75-11 & 76-6, dealing

Resolution 3137: That, upon the recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System and in response to the state legislation (1983 Wisconsin Act 391) and federal age discrimination legislation, the Regents rescind Regent Resolutions 237, 1115 and 1359 effective immediately.

with mandatory retirement ages for university employees are rescinded. R 3137, pp 19-21

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Lawton expressed concern about the application of these new laws in the field of medicine. One could envision difficult situations in dealing with medical incompetence, he pointed out, adding that the UW Medical School had a long-standing policy that at age 65 a person should step down as chief of service.

Regent Fish asked if under the new laws a tenured faculty member could in theory continue to teach for as long as he or she wished, regardless of age.

Vice President Lyall said that would be true, unless the person were to be dismissed from the position for cause.

Having discussed the matter with the senator who introduced the state legislation, Regent Weinstein said the senator was willing to work with the System to design legislation to deal with problems that might result from the nondiscrimination law. Therefore, Regent Weinstein suggested that the resolution be amended to provide for the System to identify problems that might arise and to discuss them with the Education Committee, so that the issue would not lie dormant until serious problems arose.

✓ x ref - Affirmative Action (same as above)

While such a motion would be in order, President Lawton did not think formal action was needed. He felt instead that informal direction would be sufficient to accomplish the purpose.

President O'Neil said he had testified before the Senate committee, urging that a transitional period of 15 years be provided along the model which had been agreed to in federal legislation to remove mandatory retirement. For a variety of reasons, it had not been possible to insert anything of that kind in the state legislation, which passed in a form immediately applicable to tenured faculty along with others. Since then, he had several discussions with Senator Feingold and planned to meet with him again soon. The senator acknowledged that there might be special problems in the academic community, although specific solutions had not yet been discussed. Consideration within the System was being given to a number of questions: First, how many of the relatively small number of faculty already teaching in their 69th or 70th year wished to continue beyond that time. Second, to what extent might earlier awareness and better description of early retirement options might help to reduce potential problems. Third, to what extent might phased retirement be made more feasible by various benefit programs. If the Board concurred, the President said he would carry to future meetings the sense of this discussion, which accorded with his own views about the matter.

Even if the state law were to be amended, Regent Fish asked if federal legislation would still create problems for the university.

✓ x ref - Discrimination - (same as above)

In response, President O'Neil indicated that if the federal law were eventually passed with a 15-year grace period, it would not now apply in Wisconsin because states were free to uncap completely. Noting that private universities shared the concern, he felt they might collectively be able to work out some way to ease the transition period. He was less apprehensive about the matter than many people, he added, partly because he thought the numbers remaining on the faculty until age 70 had been and were likely to remain relatively small.

Regent Weinstein asked if post-tenure evaluation was being considered in conjunction with this issue.

Replying that changes in evaluation procedures were not being suggested at this time, President O'Neil noted that the only policies currently in effect to terminate tenure status were those providing for dismissal for cause or removal because of disability.

Regent Fish inquired about whether it would be legal under state law to place a termination date on tenure, so that it would be less difficult to deal with the case of a nonperforming faculty member.

Regent O'Neil did not think such a solution would be consistent with the definition and conditions of a tenure appointment under Chapter UWS 3 of the Administrative Code.

Following this discussion, Regent Weinstein withdrew his proposed motion.

The question was put on Resolution 3137, and it was adopted unanimously.

Technology Development Fund - Report on efforts to encourage university/business relationships to enhance Wisconsin's economy, pp 21-22
Report of the Vice President

Regent Clusen summarized a report made by Acting Executive Vice President Lyall about the Technology Development Fund on whose Advisory Board she served. This fund was established by the Legislature to encourage university/business partnerships in research and development in order to enhance Wisconsin's economy. The law required a 40/60 percent split of state/private funds to support projects and mandated that participating businesses be headquartered in Wisconsin--a requirement that was recently revised.

The Advisory Board reviewed 45 proposals, of which 17 were funded, in the categories of (1) development of new products or processes, and (2) information transfer and dissemination. Approval was focused on projects that could be completed in two years and that offered the likelihood of additional jobs and sales in Wisconsin. Vice President Lyall concluded her remarks with the hope that continued state funding would allow expansion of university-business partnerships, which must be fostered over a long period to be fruitful.

In Committee, Regents asked a series of questions about the Advisory Board, its processes, and its plans. Chaired by Lt. Governor Flynn, the Board included representatives of an engineering firm in Milwaukee and a

packaging business in Green Bay, as well as a certified public accountant. Businesses were invited to compete via press releases and Department of Development direct mailings, while Vice President Lyall informed UW System institutions. Program guidelines reflected a preference for engineering and product development, which led to most awards going to doctoral cluster campuses. Chancellor Horton commented that since the program was new and lacked a track record, many businesses were initially slow to respond. However, by word-of-mouth in this first round, there was expected to be considerable encouragement for more proposals in the second round.

Because the projects ran from eighteen months to two years, the required evaluations had not yet occurred. The Advisory Board was to meet this fall to discuss possible improvements in program guidelines, should funds to continue the program in 1985-87 be provided to the Department of Development.

Regent Clusen indicated that the Education Committee felt the program was an exciting one and had asked a number of questions relative to the kinds of projects accepted and criteria employed in selecting projects for funding.

Chancellor Shain spoke to the Committee about the difficulties in filling these sorts of positions, with worldwide recruitment being necessary in some cases. The entire program, including salaries, was to be funded by a National Science Foundation grant.

Regent Clusen moved adoption by the Board of Resolutions 3140-3142. The motion was seconded by Regent Heckrodt and unanimously voted.

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

Chairman Weinstein reported for the Committee, noting that the first order of business was introduction of the new UW System Vice President for Business and Finance, Mr. Floyd B. Case.

Approval of Gifts, Grants and Contracts

Reviewing the monthly lists of gifts, grants and U.S. government contracts, Vice President Case advised the Committee that the total of \$90,639,097 for the first two months of the fiscal year was \$2,736,000 greater than for the same two months of the previous year. In 1983-84, there had been an increase of \$18,900,000 (14 percent) over the prior year. It was noted that the current report included two cancer research awards to UW-Madison, a \$1,645,000 comprehensive support award in its ninth year, and a \$1,036,900 project grant entitled "Regulatory Mechanisms in Tumor Biology" in its seventh year. UW-Madison's research efforts also continued to receive support of just over \$7 million to date from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation (WARF).

Regarding these and other awards, Mr. Glenn Watts, UW-Madison Budget Director, informed the Committee that the National Institutes of Health (NIH) and National Science Foundation (NSF) were the two major sources of federal funds in support of that institution's research efforts. NIH was largest with \$55 million (40 percent), followed by \$19 million (18 percent) from NSF.

Mr. Case noted also that UW-Stevens Point had received a \$400,000 grant from the Department of Interior, Bureau of Indian Affairs, for training select groups of Native Americans in a variety of vocational skills.

Upon motion by Regent Weinstein, seconded by Regent Hanson, Resolution 3145 was adopted unanimously by the Board.

Resolution 3145: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts, grants and contracts presented at this meeting (copy on file with the papers of this meeting) be accepted, approved, ratified and confirmed; and that, where signature authority has not been previously delegated, appropriate officers be authorized to sign agreements.

These assets included a house in Wisconsin Dells, which would be sold, with proceeds to be added to the approximately \$45,000 being transferred from the trust.

The fund was to provide scholarships for graduates of the high school in Antigo, Wisconsin. Erwin C. Goebel graduated with a B.A. degree from the UW-Madison in 1927. At this time, the estate was estimated to be over \$150,000.

Report of the Vice President

In his report to the Committee, Vice President Case indicated that the UW System ended the 1983-84 fiscal year with unspent appropriations lapsing to the state general fund in the amount of \$2.9 million, which was one half of one percent of the GPR appropriation of \$543 million. Utility and fringe benefit savings accounted for \$2.6 million of the total, both being restricted accounts which were not available for reallocation at the discretion of the System.

The sum of \$7.5 million of continuing appropriations would be carried into the 1984-85 fiscal year, \$6.2 million of which was to satisfy prior obligations not settled by July 31. The balance of \$1.3 million, (.2 percent of the 1983-84 general purpose budget) was to guard against the possibility of revenue shortfalls and expenditure contingencies in the System for 1984-85.

In Committee discussion, Regent Knowles expressed concern about having to return to the state unspent utility appropriations, and the administration was asked to make a recommendation at the next Committee meeting regarding the pros and cons of sum-certain and sum-sufficient funding.

Vice President Case then advised that the Physical Planning and Development Committee was considering action to allow prepayment of federal facility loans at a reduced rate, per an offer to sell by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development. If the prepayment occurred, the Business and Finance Committee would be apprised of the outcome at a future meeting.

Reporting next on student loan funds, Mr. Case informed the Committee that there were loan repayment terms of \$50 per month minimum for guaranteed student loans and a 120-month maximum repayment time for both guaranteed student loans and national direct student loans. The 1982-83 NDSL delinquency rate for the System averaged 7.5 percent, with a high of 12 percent and a low of 3.8 percent. State GSL default rates for 1982-83 were 4.6 percent, while the national rate was 4.8 percent. The Committee asked for further information on that point, since loans that were determined delinquent were not considered in the percentage of default, and it was thought to be more instructive to know the actual default rate.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The Committee's report was presented by Chairman Heckrodt.

✓ Budget Capital - Approval of 1985-91 Capital Budget Planning Principles, L.R. 3.5., and 1985-91 Capital Budget Planning Guidelines, L.R. 3.5.1., R3148, pp 28-29

In reviewing these two documents, the Committee was advised that the purpose of L.R. 3.5. was to provide basic direction to the individual universities and System Administration in formulation of capital development programs during the 1985-1991 period, with the understanding that the principles would be reviewed biennially. L.R. 3.5.1., a companion paper to L.R. 3.5., was to provide specific guidance to the units of the System and System Administration in developing the 1985-87 capital budget which was to be brought to the Board for action at the December meeting. The planning guidelines, which were consistent with the principles set forth in L.R. 3.5., were further supplemented by instructions issued by the Division of State Facilities Management for development of the 1985-87 capital budget.

Regent Heckrodt pointed out that with a physical plant currently valued in excess of \$2.6 billion located throughout the state, it was clear that a fundamental underlying principle of all long-range capital budget planning for the System must be to protect, maintain and enhance for future generations the investments made by past generations in these facilities.

Adoption of the following resolution was moved by Regent Heckrodt and seconded by Regent O'Harrow:

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Lawton asked if these documents constituted a revision of previous long-range planning papers.

Regent Heckrodt replied that the guidelines had been tightened and revised to some degree.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3148 was unanimously adopted.

Regent Heckrodt reported that the Committee considered two major project concept and budget reports for UW-Madison, the first of which involved remodeling of the ground floor and third floor of the Home Economics Building. The Board had previously approved a \$1,650,000 remodeling project for the facility as a whole, but it was thought best to proceed first with ground floor and third floor remodeling at a cost of \$550,000. A presentation was made to the Committee by Dean Elizabeth Simpson and her staff from the School of Family Resources and Consumer Sciences as to the impact on the school's academic program of the proposed project.

It was noted in that regard that this portion of the building housed the Helen Allen textile collection, which was one of the most important fabric collections in the world. Used extensively by undergraduate and graduate students in the school, the collection was also utilized by other university departments and by private businesses such as the Johnson Wax Company, which studied the collection for its research and development program. It was important to proceed with this portion of the remodeling because of deterioration of the exhibit due to air conditioning and ventilation problems.

Upon motion by Regent Heckrodt and seconded by Regent O'Harrow, the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the Board:

Resolution 3149: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report be approved and authority granted to plan, bid and construct the Home Economics Building Remodeling Project at an estimated total project cost of \$550,000 from General Fund Supported Borrowing.

The second concept and budget report considered by the Committee was for the Charter Street Heating Plant emission control project, which involved construction of a 100 percent full-flow "baghouse" system on the east side of the plant, at a cost of \$11,420,000 from general fund supported borrowing - air quality compliance and fuel conversion allocation funds. The system was needed to assure compliance with Department of Natural Resources code requirements for a 100 percent coal-use operation. In order to meet air-quality standards at the present time, it was necessary to burn more than 40 percent natural gas along with the coal, at an excess cost of approximately \$2 million a year, while conversion to a "baghouse" system would enable the plant to burn 100 percent low-sulfur coal, thus providing a very fast pay-back.

Charter Street Plant - same as above

It was moved by Regent Heckrodt and seconded by Regent O'Harrow that Resolution 3150 be adopted by the Board.

Resolution 3150: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report be approved for the Charter Street Heating Plant Emission Control Project and authority be granted to plan, bid and construct at an estimated total project cost of \$11,420,000 from GPR-General Fund Supported Borrowing - Air Quality Compliance and Fuel Conversion Allocation funds.

Air Quality - same as above

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Fish recalled that the plant had burned only coal until 1970, at which time it was converted to a gas-burning facility. "Then a couple years ago, we changed it back to coal, as we had said would happen in 1970. We have reconverted this thing three times now in the last 13 years." He inquired about the capabilities of the plant upon completion of this latest project.

Fuel - (same as above & insert after "3" & before reference;

In response, Mr. Frank Rice, Director of the UW-Madison Physical Plant, explained that the Charter Street plant had five different boilers, the first three each being 100,000-pound-an-hour boilers capable of burning gas, oil and coal. The fourth boiler was a 200,000-pound unit with only a coal capability, and the fifth was a gas/oil boiler only. So there would be capability for coal, gas and oil utilization in various amounts, depending on availability, cost, and other considerations. *regarding coal/gas/oil conversion capability*

In response to further questions by Regent Fish, Mr. Rice indicated that because three of the five boilers had full flexibility of all three fuels and because it was not necessary to actually reach the plant's full capacity in order to meet the campus' needs, it would be possible to burn 100 percent coal unless there was an equipment break-down.

Regent Heckrodt added that another factor in the situation was that the university was on an interruptible schedule for gas, and it was therefore all the more important to have this combined capability.

The question was put on Resolution 3150, and it was unanimously adopted.

Air Quality - Advance planning approved for UW-Oshkosh air quality compliance & fuel conversion project in heating plant, R 3151, p. 31

Continuing the report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee, Regent Heckrodt summarized consideration of a request for \$26,000 of advance planning funds to develop preliminary plans and specifications and a concept and budget report relating to heating plant air quality improvements at UW-Oshkosh. Based on the information derived from the study of the Charter Street plant at UW-Madison, it was expected that a baghouse filter solution would be recommended for the UW-Oshkosh heating plant as well, at an estimated project cost of \$1.5 million. The simple pay-back for such a project would be about 6.5 years, based on the annual cost savings of \$230,000 achieved by burning 100 percent coal. The permitted level of particle emission from coal was lower there than in Madison, since Oshkosh was a more industrial community.

Fuel - (Same as "Air Quality" above)

The following resolution was unanimously adopted by the Board, upon motion by Regent Heckrodt, seconded by Regent O'Harrow:

Regent Heckrodt reported that the Committee approved granting a flowage easement to the Village of Rock Springs which would permit surface water from the Baraboo River to run on university property (Abelman's Gorge), located in Sauk County. This action would allow the Department of Natural Resources to change the designation of the downtown Rock Springs area from "floodway" to "flood plain fringe." The theoretical impact on the UW-Madison property, if the downtown area of the Village of Rock Springs were filled in above the 100-year flood level, would be to raise the estimated flood crest by 2.4 inches, and granting the flowage easement would therefore require the placement of 2.4 inches of additional fill beneath any new building constructed on university land.

The UW-Madison Department of Geology and Geophysics, which administered the property, supported approval of this request, as did the state director of The Nature Conservancy, which had transferred title to this property to the university several years previously.

It was moved by Regent Heckrodt and seconded by Regent Nikolay that the following resolution be adopted by the Board:

Resolution 3154: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Madison Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the President or Vice President and Secretary or Assistant Secretary of the Board of Regents be authorized to sign a flowage easement granting flowage rights to the Village of Rock Springs to permit surface water from the Baraboo River to run on the Abelman's Gorge property in the Town of Excelsior, Sauk County, Wisconsin.

In discussion at the Board meeting, Regent Hanson asked whether the flowage would go over the highway and railroad to reach Abelman's Gorge.

Responding in the affirmative, Regent Heckrodt explained that part of the plan for flood-plain control was for flowage to be diverted from the village. Without this action, further construction in downtown Rock Springs would be prohibited, he pointed out, adding that the purpose was for the university to cooperate in assisting the people of Rock Springs and that no serious problems were expected with respect to the university's property.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3154 was adopted unanimously.

The Foundation had coordinated fund-raising efforts to purchase these lots in the Lower Eagle Heights Woods and was making application for federal LAWCON funds as a further contribution toward the purchase. To obtain the grant, it was necessary to assure that a sufficient parcel of adjacent university-owned property would be restricted to a use consistent with that of the property to be acquired with the LAWCON funds, and this would be assured by signing of the Deed of Conservation Easement.

Regent Heckrodt moved adoption by the Board of Resolution 3155. The motion was seconded by Regent Nikolay and unanimously carried.

Approval of Annual Release of Advance Land Acquisition Funds and Authorization to Purchase Specific Parcels at UW-La Crosse, UW-Milwaukee, UW-River Falls, UW-Stevens Point & UW-Stout, out of 1983-85 funds.

It was reported by Regent Heckrodt that the Committee approved R 3156, PP 34-35 acquisition of seven parcels of land at five universities, using \$324,000 of 1983-85 advance land acquisition funds and \$36,000 of gift and grant funds. Each parcel was within the approved campus plan and had been previously identified for purchase. Any parcel which could not be acquired at a cost equal to or less than the average of two appraisals would require further Regent action prior to purchase.

Resolution 3156 was adopted unanimously by the Board, upon motion by Regent Heckrodt, seconded by Regent O'Harrow.

Resolution 3156: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-La Crosse, Milwaukee, River Falls, Stevens Point and Stout Chancellors and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to seek the release of \$324,000 of 1983-85 Advance Land Acquisition Funds and to expend \$36,000 of Gift and Grant Funds to appraise, option and purchase the specified parcels within approved campus boundaries at a cost which is at or below the average of the appraised values. Land Purchase/Requisition - Approval of purchase of 2.7 acres of land for
Regent Heckrodt reported that a request by UW-Green Bay to purchase a parcel of land for the Cofrin Arboretum failed in Committee on a tie vote of 2-2. *UW-Green Bay Cofrin Arboretum, R 3157, pp 35-36*

Regent O'Harrow stated that he had voted against Resolution 3157 in Committee, but that he now supported it and wished to move its adoption at this meeting.

UW-Green Bay - Bldgs & Land - Approval of purchase of 2.7 acres of land
It was moved by Regent O'Harrow and seconded by Regent Nikolay that the following resolution be adopted: *for Cofrin Arboretum, R 3157, pp 35-36*

Resolution 3157: That, upon the recommendation of the UW-Green Bay Chancellor and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, authority be granted to purchase a 2.7 acre improved parcel of land for the UW-Green Bay Cofrin Arboretum at a cost of \$125,000, to be fully reimbursed by a Federal Heritage Conservation Recreation Service (LAWCON) fund grant of \$102,000 and a cash donation of \$23,000 from the UW-Green Bay Foundation.

Regent Clusen requested further explanation of the Committee's views on this matter.

In response, Chairman Heckrodt explained that the land in question was a 2.7-acre parcel containing a house and a small chapel. Partly wooded and with a significant outcropping of the Niagara Escarpment on it, the parcel had a panoramic view of the campus and was fronted on Bay Settlement Road to the east. With the deeding by the UW-Green Bay Foundation of an 11.8-acre parcel, there would be a total of 14.5 acres added to the existing 200-acre Cofrin Arboretum. The LAWCON grant of \$102,000 was greater than the normal 50 percent match because of the UW-Green Bay Foundation's donation of the

11.8-acre parcel which was appraised at \$130,000. Two adjacent parcels on the Niagara Escarpment had been acquired using this same procedure. Noting that the land to be purchased was appraised at \$125,000 and \$96,500, with an option obtained for \$125,000, Regent Heckrodt said opposition in Committee was based on the discrepancy between the two appraisals and on the fact that the higher one was recommended for acceptance.

It was brought out subsequently, he continued, that the appraisal of \$125,000 had been approved by the Department of Natural Resources after a four-six week study and also had been approved by the corresponding federal government body at Ann Arbor, Michigan. It also was the price which was acceptable to the owner. In addition, he pointed out that deferral of action at this time might result in loss of LAWCON funding.

Put to the vote, Resolution 3157 was adopted, with Regent Gerrard voting "No" because he did not believe it was a proper use of funds to pay the highest price.

Reversion of Leased Property Rights to Barron County, UW Center-Barron County

Regent Heckrodt reported that the Committee approved executing a release of a portion of property which had been leased from Barron County for use by the local UW Center. A portion of the area in question was to be used by the City of Rice Lake to construct an access road to the adjacent industrial park. The request was supported by the Dean of the UW Center-Barron County on the basis that traffic now had to cross the campus to reach the industrial site.

Upon motion by Regent Heckrodt, seconded by Regent O'Harrow, the following resolution was adopted unanimously by the Board:

A. The lease between the Board of Regents and the Presbyterian Student Center Foundation for UW-Madison parking spaces at 439 North Murray Street has been renewed for a three-year period, beginning September 1, 1984 through August 31, 1987. The annual rate will be \$3,216 (a decrease of \$1,000) because of a reduced number of available spaces. - *Lease agreement with Presbyterian Student Center Foundation for parking spaces at 439 N. Murray St. for 9/1/84 - 8/31/87 Nonpersonal item A*

B. Under authority granted by the Board of Regents, the UW-Madison Chancellor has authorized the razing of buildings located on several of the farms of the Arlington Experimental Station, as follows:

All of these are farm buildings which existed when the individual farms were acquired by the University and are fifty or more years old, have little utilitarian value, are in poor condition, and do not warrant the investment of resources that would be necessary to make them useful. C. A lease between Fran Wagman and UW-Madison for lease of 1,200 square feet of storage space at 1009 Jonathon Drive for the two-year period of August 1, 1984 through July 31, 1986, has been signed by the Vice President for General Services. The lease provides for a one-year renewal option.
