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

CAMP RANDALL STADIUM :. UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN







Harry Stuhldreher

THE all around responsibilities of an athletic director and the high pressure duties of a head football coach are those of Harry Stuhldreher, who opens his 13th season as pilot of Badger gridiron fortunes this fall.

Yet the man, who was an All-American quarterback at Notre Dame in 1924, has handled this dual assignment so capably that he has established a record of tenure among Wisconsin football coaches and a foundation of good will for the University.

Stuhldreher came to Wisconsin in May, 1936, and quickly demonstrated his abilities in the toughest league in the country, the Western Conference. While his first Badger eleven in 1936 won only two out of eight games, the 1937 varsity turned in a winning season, and the 1938 combination, a winner over UCLA at Los Angeles, missed out on the Big Ten title when it bowed to Minnesota in the final game of that season.

The season of 1942, however, tops Stuhldreher's first decade of coaching at Wisconsin. The Badgers, most of them sophomores, won eight games, tied Notre Dame, but lost in a stunning upset to Iowa 6-0 to be deprived of conference and mythical national championship honors. Ohio State, the Big Ten winner and national titlist, had been defeated by Wisconsin 17-7. Elroy Hirsch, Fred Negus, Dave Schreiner, and Pat Harder, were only four of a host of players who ranked with the best in the country.

Last year, after four previous seasons had been made disappointing because of wartime uncertainties and athletic manpower drains, Wisconsin finished second to mighty Michigan in the Big Nine.

The Badger pilot has a fine record as athletic director. Under his leadership, a well-rounded development of all sports and all sports facilities has come about at Wisconsin. Chief among his accomplishments are the addition of a second balcony in the field house, making it one of the finest sports arenas in the midwest, the addition of 7,500 seats in the football stadium, and the building of new team headquarters for boxing, wrestling, and rifle ranges under the east side of the stadium. He also plans a great sports hall, vast gymnasiums, and the addition of 15,000 seats to the football stadium within the near future.

Equally impressive is his record as good-will agent for the entire University of Wisconsin. Since coming to Wisconsin, Stuhldreher has spoken before practically every Wisconsin alumni club from New York to California. He also is much in demand among state high schools, service clubs, and various other organizations. His travel mileage on speaking engagements annually runs into five figures.

Stuhldreher's proficiency is not one-sided. With the versatility he exhibited on the gridiron and in coaching togs, he is just as diverse in his cultural achievements. In the field of fiction, several of his stories appeared in national magazines while two books, "Knute Rockne, Man Builder" a biography of his great coach at Notre Dame, and "Quarterback Play" were published by the Harvard University

Library. His most ambitious effort in the field of fiction was the novel "Blocking Back" which ran serially in the American Magazine.

For some time he was a trustee in the Football Coaches Association and also a member of the national rules committee. In the summer of 1943, he was head coach of the College All-Stars who defeated the Washington Redskins of the National Professional League 27-7.

A native of Massillon, Ohio, Stuhldreher graduated from high school there in 1921 and that fall entered Notre Dame. As a prep school gridder, Harry was small, weighing only a puny 130 pounds and offering no immediate signs of the brilliance and ruggedness which made him one of the Notre Dame "greats".

His freshman record at the Irish institution was not exceptionally conspicuous, except for the determination he showed in overcoming the deficiencies his size and weight had over his desire to play varsity football. A vigorous spirit and a constant persistency combined with a keen intelligence eventually attracted the attention of Coach Knute Rockne and Stuhldreher finally got his chance at varsity rating in his sophomore year.

Thereafter, he was a regular and one of the outstanding field generals of intercollegiate football. His forward passing ability, his deadly and accurate blocking, and his excellent judgment in the midst of gridiron emergencies eventually ended in his selection as All-American quarterback following his piloting of the immortal "Four Horsemen" in the 1924 season. Of Stuhldreher, Coach Rockne once said, "Harry made one error in generalship in his sophomore year. He never made another."

Stuhldreher went directly into coaching in the fall

of 1925, guiding the football destinies of Villanova College for the next 11 years. In that time, he raised the football standards of Villanova from mediocrity to a position among the best in its class in the East. His 11-year record at Villanova included 65 victories, 25 defeats, and 10 ties.

Stuhldreher is married and the father of four sons. The oldest, Harry, Jr., graduated from Madison West high school in 1948 after winning letters as a football quarterback and a pole-vaulter in track.

GUARD AND CENTER COACH—RUSSELL RIPPE

Russ Rippe has been associated with Wisconsin football since 1935 when he became freshman coach. He moved up to the varsity staff in 1942 to take over the development of guards and centers with a fine degree of success. Prior to 1935, he was coach of all sports at Wisconsin high school in Madison, one of his basketball teams winning the state WIAA title. Russ holds degrees from LaCrosse State Teachers College and Ripon, plus a master's degree in physical education at Wisconsin. He is one of the busiest men at the Old Red Armory, teaching classes in physical education in addition to his coaching activities. The oldest of his two sons, Tom, won major letters at Wisconsin in basketball while the younger, Doug, currently is enrolled at Wisconsin. Doug was a member of the Madison West high school cage team which won the state crown in 1945.

BACKFIELD COACH—LISLE BLACKBOURN, SR.


Newest addition to the varsity coaching staff is Lisle Blackbourn, Sr., formerly athletic director and head coach of football, at Milwaukee Washington high school. "Liz," who produced eight champions in his last 11 years of football coaching at Milwaukee, joined the Badger staff last July when he replaced Guy Sundt as backfield mentor. The latter, who is assistant athletic director, had taken over as head track coach succeeding Tom Jones when the venerable coach was automatically retired at the age of 70. Blackbourn starred in all sports at Lancaster high school and later at Lawrence College where he received his bachelor's degree in 1924. After a year with his alma mater as baseball and wrestling coach, he went to Milwaukee Washington. His son, Lisle, Jr., has won two letters each in football and track, and currently is the leading quarterback candidate on the Wisconsin football team.

ASSISTANT COACH AND END COACH—GEORGE FOX

George Fox, who learned his college football under Stuhldreher at Villanova, never has coached anywhere except at Wisconsin but he made the jump from a playing career to big time coaching with the same unassuming ease which has characterized him in all his activities. Fox originally was employed as end coach, later was given the additional responsibilities of tackle coach, and now is considered chief assistant in football to Stuhldreher. He prepped at St. Rita high school in Chicago where he captained both the basketball and football teams. He then transferred to Malvern Prep and starred in all sports. At Villanova, he was all-Eastern end for two seasons, graduating in 1937. He is married and leads Athletic Business Manager Bill Aspinwall in the Stork Derby. He has seven children; Bill has six.


COACHES

TACKLE AND LINE COACH—LYNN HOVLAND

Lynn Hovland, who was All Conference guard for Wisconsin in 1938, joined the varsity coaching staff last fall as a line coach and tackle mentor. He played for Wisconsin in 1935, was out of competition in 1936, then competed again in 1937 and 1938. He played with the College All Stars in 1939. Following graduation he coached at Ashland and Rice Lake high schools, then entered the service. He was assistant to Charley Bachman while that former Michigan State football coach was in charge of Camp Grant gridiron affairs.

FRESHMAN FOOTBALL COACH—GEORGE LANPHEAR

George Lanphear, energetic and congenial freshman football coach, became a member of the Wisconsin athletic department in the fall of 1947 following success as head basketball coach and football assistant at Ripon College. George, who is more familiarly known as "Muscles," starred in sports at Beloit high school and later at Wisconsin, winning letters in football, basketball, and baseball before his graduation in 1938. He coached at Ripon College, then returned to Wisconsin to work on his master's degree, also acting as assistant freshman football coach and assistant varsity baseball coach. George played semi-pro baseball for several years with the Madison Blues and the House of David nine. He is married, 38 years of age, and has three sons.

150-POUND VARSITY COACH—ART MANSFIELD

They nicknamed him "Dynamite" because of the lashing power in his fists when he won heavyweight boxing honors in the All-University tournaments by knockouts back in 1928 and 1929. Now it's "Dynie", because of his dynamic energy and drive as Wisconsin's varsity baseball coach and head coach of the 150-pound varsity football team. He starred in all sports at West Technical high school in Cleveland, Ohio, and, during his college career from 1925 to 1929, he was on the Wisconsin baseball team, also winning letters in football and basketball. He coached at Springfield, Ohio, high school, later became associated with Wisconsin in the physical education department where he now is a full-fledged professor. He became head baseball coach in 1940.


Albright

WILLIAM ALBRIGHT won all-city, all-Big Eight conference, and all-state honors as a tackle while playing for Racine Horlick in 1946. Set school record in shot put while a senior in 1947 and wound up his athletic record with six letters, two each in football, basketball, and track. Was named to the National Honor Society. Last fall, he was a member of the Badger frosh football squad and also won his numerals in track as a weightman this spring. He is entered in the pre-forestry course.

basketball, baseball, and was all-conference left halfback on the 1938 Minnesota Valley football championship team. He won his numerals at Wisconsin in 1946 and a minor letter last fall, each time with the junior varsity team. He is married and is enrolled in the civil engineering school.

BEN BENDRICK, burly fullback who is seeking his fourth major "W" this season, has been a steady performer at his position ever since he came to Wisconsin in 1945. Big Ben was a star on Win Brockmeyer's great Wausau high school teams which dominated the Wisconsin Valley conference, being cited as the best fullback in that circuit for the 1943 and 1944 season. He also earned letters in hockey and basketball. In 1946, he led the Badgers in scoring with 30 points and had a ground-gaining average of 5 yards per try; last year his average was 4.2 yards, carrying the ball the most times for Wisconsin, an even 100 attempts. He is studying to be a forest ranger.

TOM BENNETT doubles in football and track at Wisconsin. The former Green Bay West athlete was the leading pass received last fall on the Badger eleven and also topped the pole vaulters on the track team. He shared the Western Conference outdoor pole vault title in 1947 and tied for similar laurels in the 1948 indoor meet. He has a best mark of 14 feet 2½ inches. Tom is one of six senior lettermen on the present football squad. He won numerals as an end in 1942, then entered the armed service. He won a major letter in 1946 and also did his share of the punting, averaging 39 yards. Last fall, he was



Last fall, he won freshman numerals as a center in football and pole vaulter in frosh track. He is taking business administration in the school of commerce.







STEVE BENNETT, brother of Tom, was on the football squad at Northwestern University before he entered the service. He transferred to Wisconsin in the fall of 1947 but did not report for football until spring practice. Like his brother, he starred in sports at Green Bay West high school; was most valuable player and all-conference tackle in 1943.

LISLE BLACKBOURN JR., whose father now is backfield coach at Wisconsin, is seeking his third straight football letter. At Milwaukee Washington high school, he was an outstanding athlete, winning letters in football and track. In the spring of 1946, he won state WIAA titles in the dashes and broad jump. He was all-state fullback in 1945, played in the first annual North-South all star high school game at Madison in the summer of 1946, and then earned his letter as a left halfback on the 1946 Wisconsin eleven. Last year he was second string quarterback. In 1946 he place-kicked 15 conversion tries after touchdown and repeated the stunt in 1947. He also added two field goals last season to wind up the season as Wisconsin's leading scorer with 39 points. Young "Blackie" also has won two major letters as a sprinter.

HARLAND BLOLAND won 10 letters in basketball, football, track and baseball as the outstanding athlete at Mount Horeb high school. As co-captain and left halfback, he led his team to the Southwest Wisconsin conference title and also was the leading scorer. In one game he scored 21 points. He played on the South team in the 1946 all-star high school football game then went into the service for one year. He won his numerals in frosh football last fall.

ALLEN BOSTAD graduated from P. J. Jacobs high school in Stevens Point where he won 10 letters in football, basketball, track and baseball. letter as a reserve guard on the varsity last year. He is one of eight married men on the squad.



CALVIN VERNON is a graduate of Milwaukee Lincoln high school but he first attained athletic success with Mason City, Iowa prep football teams one of which was



Early Beginnings of Wisconsin Football

A history of intercollegiate football at the University of Wisconsin, necessarily, must start with the 1889 season for that is the first year in which a score is reported and official mention made of the sport.

The student yearbook of 1885 infers that Wisconsin had a football team in 1883, but there are no names of players nor reports of activity to substantiate the statement.

Tennis and baseball were the big sports in those days and because football was in its infancy at the time, its childhood at Wisconsin until 1888 was an extremely weak one.

A football association was formed at Wisconsin in 1888 with team lineup that went like this: Back, W. H. Holcomb; halfback, J. F. Case and J. C. Bloodgood; quarterback, A. A. Bruce; forwards, J. S. Bacon, W. C. Brumder, R. B. Clarkson, J. H. Gabriel, J. S. Thatcher, H. L. Russell; center rush, A. J. Olsen. But if the team played any games, the scores never were put down for posterity.

The team of 1889 did get into action and it has probably the best claim to being the first intercollegiate varsity eleven to represent Wisconsin. But the season was far from a success. The Badgers lost both games, being trounced by the Calumet Club 27-0 and bowing to Beloit College 4-0. Members of that illustrious team were Logeman, Sheldon, Clark, L. D. Sumner, Ackert, Brumder, McNaught, Loope, Brooks, Kerr, Capt. Mayers, Prail, Bruce, and Blackburn. Andrew Bruce, law faculty member who learned Rugby in English schools, is generally credited with having helped organize the team.

Gridiron stock, however, began to boom and in the following year of 1890, two associations, promoting football were formed, one merely a local movement while the other was a league including Beloit, Northwestern University, Lake Forest, and Wisconsin.

The Badgers opened that season by mauling White-water Normal 106-0, the highest score ever rung up by a Wisconsin football team. But along came Minnesota to open the hallowed all-time Badger-Gopher series by whipping Wisconsin 63-0. Losses to Northwestern and Lake Forest completed the season.

By 1893, football was on firmer ground and the Western Intercollegiate League with Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern, and Wisconsin was formed that season. The title was decided on Nov. 11 when Minnesota beat Wisconsin at Minneapolis 40-0, the Badgers having won all four of their previous games.

Oldsters still point to the 1894 team as one "of the best." Chicago, Iowa, and Beloit were blanked by top heavy scores and Minnesota was beaten for the first time (6-0). Only bar to an unbeaten season was a 1-0 forfeit to Purdue, a story in itself.

Briefly, it was the Wisconsin team which walked off the field in the second half, protesting the ouster of its captain, T. U. Lyman for "alleged slugging" by one of the officials who happened to be the Purdue coach.

Prof. J. F. A. Pyre, of the English department, was a member of that team. As a matter of fact, he played varsity tackle on the 1891, 1894, 1895, and 1896 teams.

In an article written for the Wisconsin Athletic

Bulletin on the eve of the Chicago game in 1912, Pyre recalls that in the center of the Wisconsin line for five seasons, beginning in 1891 and ending in 1895, was Fred Kull, a giant of 225 pounds, who was a terrific player when aroused. The guards at the beginning of the 1894 season were C. W. Bunge and H. H. Jacobs, both active, heady, and aggressive. They were a pair which fitted well into the scheme of interference where fullback, guard, and tackle led off in that order.

Jacobs was taken ill of typhoid fever during the season and was replaced by "Patsy" Ryan. The other tackle besides Pyre was Walter Alexander, the latter described as "one of our headiest and most scientific linemen for a number of seasons."

At the ends were H. F. Dickinson and Walter Sheldon, the latter weighing only 150 pounds but made the grade as a regular for four years despite that handicap.

T. U. Lyman was the quarterback and Pyre portrays him as "a notable adapter of brains to football, an artful interferer of the nagging type, the coolest defense player I have ever seen and one of the most effective. As a field captain, he had quite enough for two but he failed of finality in wanting that happy recklessness which sometimes snatches a victory by taking the big chance at the right moment."

The two halfbacks were "Ikey" Karel and "Norsky" Nelson, the former being the breakaway runner and the latter the powerful line stormer. Wisconsin rooters always held full hope that "Ikey" might get loose in a game and he did just that during his five seasons of competition.

Big John Richards was the fullback of that team and Pyre meant it when he termed Richards as the "human projectile." He was the irresistible power at the head of the interference which smashed down opposition on end runs.

When the Western Conference was organized for the football season of 1896, Wisconsin marched off with the title, downing Chicago and Minnesota, but tying Northwestern. That was the first of five big Ten crowns won outright or shared by the Badgers.

The Badgers repeated in 1897, shared the title with Michigan in 1901, tied with Minnesota for the 1906 honors, then won undisputed laurels in 1912, the "golden era" of Wisconsin athletics.

No discourse on Wisconsin football ever must fail of mentioning the great Pat O'Dea, the Kangaroo Kicker, and one of the most famous players in Badger annals. As a kicker, it is doubtful if his equal ever has been seen for some of his feats never have been equalled and may never be.

Pat came to Wisconsin in 1897 from Australia where he had been very successful in association or soccer football and his uncanny kicking ability made his name a star-studded one in American football circles. Many a team would despair of making much of a showing against Wisconsin when O'Dea was in the lineup for he could kick so far and so accurately that no matter where in the field the ball was, the enemy's goal posts were in constant danger of having a ball, propelled by Pat's trusty toe, pass between them for a field goal and important points in those days.

One of his greatest achievements was in the Yale

game at New Haven in 1899 when he punted the ball nearly 100 yards. Another great kick was made against Minnesota in 1899 as the Badgers were winning 19-0. Pat had planned a drop kick from his own 45 yard line but the Gopher linemen broke through and he saw that he had no chance to kick. He ran with the ball, instead, and headed for the left sidelines. When he had nearly reached the side line, he dropped the ball a bit ahead of him and kicking it with the side of his foot as he ran, sent the pigskin whirling 55 yards to a perfect field goal!

On still another occasion, in the 1898 game with Northwestern, he made a 62 yard drop kick to help rout the Wildcats 47-0.

Wisconsin's last championship team of 1912 still is one to conjure up memories of great athletic prowess. John Richards, coach in 1911 whose team finished the season with only one defeat, left a wealth of material to his successor, William Juneau, and that worthy pilot made good use of his legacy.

On that championship eleven were such stalwarts as Joe Hoeffel and Hod Ofstie, ends; Ed Samp and Butts Butler, tackles; Max Gelein and Tubby Keeler, guards; Powell, center; Eddie Gillette, quarterback; John Van Riper and Al Tormey, left halfbacks; Noyes "Moose" Bright and Alexander, right halfbacks; and Al Tanberg, fullback.

Its record was sensational. Lawrence, the first foe, was brushed aside 13-0. Northwestern was mauled 56-0 and Purdue was subdued 41-0. Chicago put up a battle but finally lost 30-12; Arkansas was slaughtered 64-7; Minnesota was downed 14-0, and Iowa fell 28-10.

So impressive was Wisconsin's showing that, in picking his All-Western team that season, Walter Eckersall chose seven Badgers. On his All-Conference first team were nine Wisconsin players!

Wisconsin's first full-time football coach was Parke H. Davis, who had just graduated from Princeton and came to Madison for the 1893 season. However, available accounts of early Badger football exploits intimate that the 1889 team was coached somewhat by Alvin Kletsch, who had played at some eastern schools and whose exploits on the Calumet Club team of Milwaukee had so amazed the Badgers. He was prevailed upon to come to Madison for a few weekends and it has been intimated that he even played with the Badgers against Beloit. Rules were conveniently lax in those days.

After Kletsch followed Ted Mestre of Yale in 1890, Herb Alward of Harvard in 1891, and Crawford of Yale in 1892. Davis' appearance in 1893 was a boom to the Badgers, not only as a coach but as a much-needed tackle. Davis had discovered that he had only one available tackle so he enrolled as a graduate student in English and played regularly with the team. His enrollment satisfied the only eligibility requirement of 1893.

Davis remained at Wisconsin only that year and was succeeded in 1894 by Hiram Orlando Stickney, who had been a regular tackle at Harvard though weighing only 145 pounds. His coming made little change in Wisconsin tactics as everywhere, offense was practically limited to the old "T" formation and punt formation. Stickney, however, taught the Badgers to play a closer line on defense which made them effective against line plunges but put a heavy burden on the ends and backs against strong wide-running plays.

The coming of Phil King, Princeton's All-American quarterback for two years, to coach Wisconsin in 1896 started the Badgers off on a new era of football. The game the Tigers were then playing was well

suited to Wisconsin's material and King could teach and inspire a team. Although conservative in tactics, he originated plays which had great influence on the game. During King's seven-year regime, his teams won 55 games, lost nine, and tied two.

In those days, while the Badger team usually included a few outstanding individuals, Wisconsin rarely had the wealth of material available at other leading conference school. But Badger elevens were always sound in fundamentals, played a limited repertoire of plays with precision and tremendous drive, and were proverbial for fight and team morale. It was in this period that the slogan "There are no quitters at Wisconsin" originated and became potent throughout the midwest.

The period of 1903 to and including 1910 was a turbulent one in Wisconsin football history. King resigned after the 1902 season to enter a family business, and the athletic board, of which 10 of the 15 members were students, elected Arthur H. Curtis, captain of the 1901 team and right tackle for four years, as the head coach. Curtis had had one year's experience as coach of Kansas University but the board's decision was based primarily on a desire to establish the graduate coaching system.

Charles McCarthy, a former Brown University captain who had taken his PhD, at Wisconsin and who then was in charge of the legislative reference library, was made assistant coach, handling the back-field. A bad season prompted Curtis to tender his resignation but he withdrew it when the entire squad signed a loyalty pledge and urged his reconsideration. He agreed to coach the 1904 season only, announcing that he intended to pursue his chosen profession of medicine thereafter.

Eddie Cochems, brilliant teammate of Curtis as a halfback and end at Wisconsin, was engaged as the assistant coach but the partnership was not productive of victories mainly because of a clash of personalities and methods.

The experience of those two years virtually settled the question of whether or not Wisconsin should continue the policy of employing only graduate coaches. The next fall, 1905, Phil King was persuaded to return and with him came Eddie Holt, great Princeton tackle, to coach the line. The team won seven out of 10 games that season and gained its only conference victory in three years, defeating Minnesota 16-12.

After that year "came the deluge." Proselyting and subsidizing athletes (is this news?) had grown to the point in all the schools where it demanded faculty action. Faculty members from Wisconsin and Chicago took the lead in house cleaning. The Western Conference just was getting a full head of steam and its athletics were thoroughly "muckraked" in press and periodicals. Many reforms were instituted but Wisconsin faculty members went a step further, voting to abolish all intercollegiate football which would automatically have caused the abandonment of all athletics, since football receipts carried the full program.

Wisconsin alumni and sports fans let up a howl that could be heard all through the country and eventually the board of regents forced a reconsideration. Under regent pressure, the faculty modified its action limiting the football schedule to five games but barring the so-called "big games" by a provision that Wisconsin could not play its traditional rivals, Chicago, Minnesota, and Michigan. As these were the only games producing any revenue, it became apparent that the university would occupy a minor position in athletics for a long time and

would be unable to retain the coaches it had then. Immediately the football, baseball, track, and crew coaches and the graduate manager, corresponding to a director of athletics today—all resigned.

Henceforth all coaches and directors were to be, for the first time, full members of the faculty. President Van Hise selected Dr. C. P. Hutchins as director and also head football coach. There were only two returning veterans and the good Doctor soon found that he had undertaken too much. He called upon Dr. McCarthy and Arne Lerum, a former Wisconsin guard, to help him.

Well, it turned out all right from a victory standpoint, since the Badgers won all five of their games and "shared" the Western Conference title with Minnesota, although, in some instances, the conference records do not fully recognize Wisconsin's claim.

The biggest blow, of course, was in box office receipts. A meager sum of \$3,400 was realized as compared to nearly \$35,000 of the previous year.

The same staff tried it again the next year, with one "big game", that with Minnesota, permitted. The Badgers won three, lost one, and tied one, deadlocking the Gophers 17-17 despite the latter's Ralph Capron who returned the opening kickoff for a touchdown and who later kicked three field goals.

That was Dr. Hutchins' last year and in 1908, Tom Barry, an old Brown back, took over. He developed fighting teams but it was a tough road to beat back, even though Chicago was permitted on the schedule. Barry quit after the 1910 season when his club won only one game and Big John Richards was named as his successor.

Richards had coached successfully at several high schools, military academies, and Colorado College and he set out, with three veterans, to build from the ground up in 1911. The team proved, like all those he coached, a tough defensive team. The players played sound, hard football, with a vicious drive, and only Chicago managed to defeat the Badgers that season.

Richards then set about to build for the following year. Never much of a believer in going after the prep school stars, he "combed" the University campus for material and soon had gathered some 40 huskies, including about 15 youths who tipped the beam at 200 or more pounds. He intended to work them along easily on football fundamentals during the winter but his plans struck a snag when the commandant of the University regiment refused to excuse any freshman or sophomore from military drill, except for during the football season. After a lively controversy, Richards resigned, later going to Ohio State for the season of 1912.

Bill Juneau, who had played four seasons as half-back and end, captaining the Wisconsin team in 1902, then was employed to coach the Badgers. He had coached South Dakota State and Marquette teams and he came through with championship style in the 1912 season, his first at Wisconsin.

Juneau coached for three more years, then retired to devote his time to real estate business in Milwaukee. Harvard's football star, under the astute leadership of Coach Percy Haughton, then was rising and so Wisconsin went there for its next coach, Dr. Paul Withington, a famous lineman who had been assistant at Cambridge.

Withington was the first Badger coach to demand a large staff of assistants and he got them for the start of his initial season in 1916. Three Harvard stars were engaged, Dick King, All-American half-back; Ed Soucy, All-American end; and Jack Doherty, quarterback. Cub Buck, one of the greatest linemen ever to play at Wisconsin, also was on the staff.

The 1916 record added no luster to the Badger football system and that ended the so-called "Harvard" regime at Wisconsin. Richards was recalled for the 1917 season, but since he then was superintendent of recreation in the Chicago South Parks system, he came to Madison only during the football season. His only assistants were Earl "Keg" Driver, who also coached the freshmen, and Guy Lowman, who acted as scout and coached the reserves who were dubbed the "All-Americans". The latter was an interesting outfit, being composed of varsity substitutes, reinforced by a handful of ineligibles, who, several nights a week, gave the varsity real battles and who had much to do with the powerful teams which Richards developed during this period.

In his five years as head coach, Richards lost just eight games. Of these, only two defeats were by the margin of more than one touchdown. Three other games were lost by a field goal, 3-0.

Big John remained at Wisconsin through the season of 1922—he was in war service at Washington during the 1918 season while Lowman coached the team. Richards was conceded to be a remarkable defensive coach but some of his supporters believe that his ability as an offensive coach was not fully appreciated. He was one of the most successful forward pass coaches of his day, his invention of the screen pass being conceded by all but two coaches who claim it for themselves. Certainly no coach developed the play as did Richards in 1921 and 1922. Then the rule makers hemmed the play with restrictions that largely nullified its value. Richards also was highly successful in the use of the running pass from punt formation and his goal-line pass, coupled with a fake line plunge, won many a game for Wisconsin and was copied by some of his keenest rivals.

Richards retired from coaching and Jack Ryan took over the Badger grid destinies in 1923. Ryan, a Dartmouth graduate, had coached for 10 years at his alma mater, St. Viator's, St. Thomas, and Marquette.


Ryan's first team walloped Indiana 52-0 for its only Big Ten victory but the 1923 eleven tied Minnesota 0-0 and lost to Michigan only by a 6-3 margin in a game which Badger partisans always will say "we wuz robbed".

Walter Eckersall was the referee and he was generally held responsible, although the disputed decision on the play that beat Wisconsin actually was made by Colonel Mumma, the field judge. Wisconsin had punted and Tad Rockwell, the Michigan safety man, received and returned the ball 15 or 20 yards before he was thrown by two Wisconsin players near midfield by the west sidelines. He was on the ground for several seconds, then arose, walking out of the group a few steps, finally dashing madly 50 yards to cross the Badger goal line.

It seems that Eckersall had not blown his whistle and Col. Mumma stated to him that the forward progress of the ball had not been stopped while Rockwell was in the grasp of a Wisconsin tackler and, if this was true, it was properly a touchdown. Eckersall so ruled but Wisconsin players had to form a protective ring for him to leave the field unharmed after the game.

Ryan also coached the 1924 team but gave way to George Little in 1925. For some time, Wisconsin athletics had been carried on under a plan which, when adopted, had been considered a temporary one. Prof. Pvre as chairman of the athletic council, had been given supervisory authority and Coach Tom Jones of the track team, had administered the affairs of the department as acting director. During the winter of 1924-25, the council decided to secure a full time

athletic director and in March, 1925, elected Little to the job.

Little had been assistant director, later head coach at Michigan, and, when he came to Wisconsin, he decided to serve in a dual capacity. He acted as head coach for two years, during which his teams lost only three games, two to Michigan and one to Minnesota.

Little's choice to succeed himself as football coach was Glenn Thistlethwaite who had had fine success at Northwestern. Thistlethwaite coached through the 1931 season before he resigned but his 1928 team was one of the best, finishing second in the conference when it lost only to Minnesota 6-0 and was tied by Purdue 19-19. That year, the Badgers did what no other Wisconsin team has done since 1899—that of scoring a victory over Michigan at Ann Arbor. Notre Dame also was beaten that season 22-6 and Knute Rockne of the Irish eleven complained of the long grass at Camp Randall.

Thistlethwaite was replaced by Dr. Clarence W. Spears, former coach at Minnesota and Oregon. Spears' best season was his first in 1932, the team winning six games, losing one, and tying one. A 7-6 loss to Purdue and a 7-7 tie with Ohio State kept the Badgers from a title then.

Departmental disputes arose in 1934 and the upshot was the exit of Spears at the close of the 1935

season. Since then, Harry Stuhldreher has been in charge.

The 1942 team was tops for it missed Western Conference title honors and mythical national collegiate laurels by an eyelash. The Badgers opened up with a 7-0 win over a tough Camp Grant team, then held the highly-touted Notre Dame club to a 7-7 deadlock. Marquette fell victim 35-7, Missouri's strong club was outpointed 17-9, and Jack Wink's 105 yard touchdown run on a pass interception helped defeat Great Lakes 13-7 at Soldiers Field in Chicago. Purdue opened the Wisconsin conference schedule by being host at its homecoming game but the Badgers came through to win 13-0. Ohio State then was beaten 17-7 in what the majority of fans still claim the "greatest ball game in history." The loss was the only blot on the Ohio State record and the Buckeyes, by virtue of having played one more Big Nine game, took the conference title when Wisconsin lost in an upset to lowly Iowa 6-0. The Badgers came back to nose out Northwestern 20-19 on a last minute touchdown pass at Evanston and closed the ear by routing Minnesota 20-6.

Stalwarts of that team were Fullback Pat Harder, All-American End Dave Schreiner, Halfbacks Elroy Hirsch and Mark Hoskins, Quarterback Jack Wink, Tackle Paul Hirsbrunner, and Guards Ken Currier and Evan Vogds.



1948 Cross Country Prospects



Coach Guy Sundt

Guy Sundt, who has succeeded Tom Jones as head track and cross country coach at Wisconsin this season, has a splendid array of material for the title quest in the Western Conference hill-and-dale competition this fall. Only two major lettermen, John Munson who captained the team to second place last fall, and Robert Reierson, have graduated, while five emblem wearers, along with several recruits from a promising freshman group, are returning to bid for varsity posts.

The major lettermen are headed by Don Gehrman, Milwaukee junior, whose exploits in cross country and in track are well known. Don captured the individual crown in the Big Nine meet last year and was a 1,500 meter representative for the United States this summer at the Olympic games. Other lettermen are Walter Deike, Freeport, Ill.; Carl W. Metzker, Milwaukee; Glenn R. Weeks, Madison; John Kammer, Madison. Minor lettermen returning include Richard J. Beck and Wakelin McNeel, Madison.

Outstanding sophomores from last year's fine freshman group include Robert Safford, Huron, S. D.; James Urquhart, Bozeman, Mont.; John Capps, Munster, Ind.; Richard Firchow, Kenosha; Lawrence A. Tuthill, Menominee; Richard Randolph, Freeport, Ill.; William R. Miller, Marshfield.

History of Wisconsin Cross Country

CROSS COUNTRY, as an organized intercollegiate sport at the University of Wisconsin, did not get official recognition until 1905 when the Western Intercollegiate meet was staged, with Chicago, Wisconsin, Nebraska, and Illinois as competing schools. However, there is evidence that a cross country club was organized at Wisconsin in 1900, although competition was limited to class meets.

The sport of cross country first started in England where distance running always had been popular. Remarkable records are noted at various distances, as great as 120 miles. J. Sauders, on Feb. 22, 1892, in New York, ran 120 miles in 22 hours, 47 minutes and 25 seconds while W. G. George, another great British runner, set a record of 51 minutes and 20 seconds for ten miles in 1884, a mark which stood until another Englishman, Alfred Shrub, raced the distance in 50:40.6.

Running, however, had been a great sport among the Mohawk and Seneca Indians in America. Louis Bennett, a 37-year-old Seneca Indian, better known as Deerfoot, visited England in 1863 and ran 12 miles in 62 minutes, 2½ seconds; and 10 miles in 51:26, competing against William Lang, the English champion.

The first organized cross country championship by the AAU dates back to 1890 while the first intercollegiate cross country meet was inaugurated in 1899 by the ICAAAA over a distance of 6½ miles. The meet has been held annually in the East ever since that date.

Wisconsin competed three years in the Western Intercollegiate, after which the meet was taken over

by the Western Conference and run as an open affair annually until 1926 when it was closed to outside schools.

Competing as a conference school, Wisconsin has won 14* meet titles, sharing another, and finished second 7 times since 1908. During the years of 1933-37 inclusive, the conference meets were not held but Wisconsin was second in the "unofficial" Big Ten meet in 1933, tying with Indiana for dual meet season honors in 1934 and 1936.

Wisconsin has won four state AAU championships (1936, 1937, 1940, and 1943) and three times won the Loyola, Chicago, invitational midwest meet (1937, 1938-1939).

* Iowa State won meet in 1911 and 1919 but Wisconsin, as first Big Ten school in ratings, claims conference title.



All-Time History of Wisconsin Basketball

Basketball was introduced at Wisconsin in 1898, just six years after its origination, with five former Milwaukee East Side high school lads, who had learned the game at the YMCA, as its sponsors. These young men were Walter Hirschberg, Paul Stover, John Mapel, Carl Stillman, and Bob Burdick.

This quintet played a few games with amateur teams, the university backing the venture to the extent of furnishing the use of a gym, free air, and light. John Hickey, janitor at the gym and a famous character of that day, referred to the group as the "squat tag" team.

No one then had any idea to what extent the sport of basketball would develop or the degree of success and popularity it would eventually attain here.

The game existed after a fashion and it is a tribute to its natural attraction that it flourished despite complete lack of official support. When the call for candidates was issued in 1903, more than 125 men reported. They had to buy their own suits, shoes, and finance their own games, the athletic association generously donating a basketball now and then.

But in 1904, Emmett D. Angell came to Wisconsin as a gym instructor and it was he who gave real impetus to the sport of basketball. He was the first real coach and a driving one. Some excellent players

were developed and some real team work was developed. Leading players at the time were Chris Steinmetz, Harvey Schofield, Charles Meless, and Stewart McConochie.

Wisconsin had played and lost to a touring Yale team 35-20 in 1901-02 season. Minnesota also had appeared on the schedule, the Gophers winning 30-10, to inflict one of three losses on the Wisconsin nine-game slate of that season. After another successful season which counted up five wins against two defeats in the 1902-03 schedule, Wisconsin became ambitious and carded 13 games for the 1903-04 year. The Badgers won 10 of those games, touring the midwest and playing the best representative teams of that season.

The 1904-05 outfit was quite a team, although its record of eight wins against nine setbacks does not compare favorably with other seasons. That team made an extensive tour of the East and learned a lot of basketball, playing Columbia, Eastern Intercollegiate champions, and the outstanding independent club teams in New York and Pennsylvania. Columbia beat Wisconsin 21-15. The Columbia game was a rough one, Captain Steinmetz emerging with a cracked jawbone. Steinmetz, along with Bob Zuppke, who later gained football coaching fame at

Illinois, were the only members of the Wisconsin team who played every minute of that nine-game Eastern trip. Wisconsin returned to the midwest and challenged Chicago which then was claiming the western title. The Maroons were beaten 29-24 and the Badgers promptly claimed the territorial title honors.

By the 1905-06 season, Wisconsin was playing a representative conference schedule, winding up second in the Big Ten. With a similar 6-2 won and lost record in conference play the next season, the Badgers shared the title and also came in for a piece of the crown in the 1907-08 campaign but lost to Chicago 18-16 in a special playoff.

The Badgers played their first 12-game conference

schedule in the season of 1909-10, winding up third with eight wins and four defeats. Fifth place was the best Wisconsin could do the next year but with the coming of Dr. Walter Meanwell as coach for the 1911-12 season, basketball really began to boom. His first team was unbeaten in Big Ten play, winning the title. His 1912-13 team lost but one game, again taking the crown. And the next season produced another unbeaten conference team. The boom was on!

In his first 10 years at Wisconsin Meanwell produced seven title teams. By the time he retired in 1934, he could point to nine championships and three runnerup spots.

Basketball History Continued

Meanwell's revolutionary coaching methods were largely responsible for Wisconsin's success during his early regime. The short pass, criss-cross plays, dribble and block style of play used by Meanwell coached teams simply had conference competition stymied.

His record still is the best in the conference and he added luster to it when he left Wisconsin twice to coach at Missouri and each time produced a Missouri Valley conference championship team.

Meanwell coached teams always ranked high in conference ratings. Otto Stangel, forward in 1912, held the single game field goal mark of 13 for many years and was a scoring leader in the conference.

The Meanwell teams of that era excelled on defense. The 1911-12 team held its opponents to an average of 15 points a game and the next year, the average still was less than 16 points. The 1923-24 team never had more than 20 points a game scored against them.

When Meanwell resigned in 1934, he was instrumental in having Harold "Bud" Foster appointed as his successor. "Bud," who gained All-Conference and All-American rating as a center in the years of 1929 and 1930. Foster had graduated in 1930, played pro

basketball with the Oshkosh All-Stars, then was named freshman coach at Wisconsin in 1933.

Foster's first team, the 1934-35 unit, tied for the Western Conference crown. Then came five years of doldrums, chiefly caused by lack of material for the high caliber of competition of the Conference. But in the 1940-41 season, "Bud" was able to weld a winning combination, which, after a poor start, won 15 straight games to wind up as Big Ten and NCAA champions. Starring for that title team were Gene Englund, center; and John Kotz, forward, both of whom won All-American honors before they were graduated.


Wisconsin was given little hope for the 1946-47 season but the Badgers really confounded the experts.

Wisconsin won the Conference crown with a second-half defeat of Purdue a week after the regular season had ended. A bleacher crash at Lafayette, Ind., had halted the Wisconsin-Purdue game at halftime, and the game, which was to determine Wisconsin's title chances, was not completed until 10 days later at Evanston, Ill. Wisconsin lost to City College of New York in the opening game of the Eastern NCAA tournament but defeated Navy in the playoff for third place. Star players for the Badgers included Bob Cook, conference leading scorer and All-American choice; Glenn Selbo and Walt Lautenbach, all-conference guards.

The History of Intercollegiate Boxing at Wisconsin

EDITOR'S NOTE: The University of Wisconsin Sports News Service is indebted to Akio Konoshima, journalism major and a member of the Badger boxing squad, for his tireless research of facts pertaining to intercollegiate boxing at Wisconsin. His invaluable aid makes it possible to present all the available information on a tremendously popular Badger sports activity

INTERCOLLEGIATE boxing started at the University of Wisconsin in 1933, when the Badger team held its first dual match with St. Thomas College of St. Paul, Minn. The Badgers were deadlocked 4-4 by the Tommies. During that same year, Wisconsin defeated Northwestern 6-2 in the first boxing match ever held between Western Conference schools, although the Wildcat team was not officially sponsored.

Since that time, Wisconsin's boxing teams have amassed a staggering total of 83 victories, seven defeats, and six ties in dual meets against the outstanding collegiate squads of the nation.

The following are some of the outstanding records which Badger boxers have established during the 14 years of competition:

In nine of the 16 years, Wisconsin boxers have been unbeaten and untied. Those "golden years" were 1935, 1938, 1939, 1941, 1942, 1943, 1946, 1947 and 1948.

Out of 73 home matches, Wisconsin lost only one and was tied on three other occasions. The first loss came in 1945 when an Iowa Pre-Flight team from Iowa City beat the Badgers 4½-3½ in the fieldhouse. That loss snapped a string of 57 matches without defeat for Wisconsin in its own ring. During that same year, when the Badger team was greatly undermanned, Wisconsin also lost a return match with the Seahawks and was tied by three other service teams.

The teams of 1940-41-42-43-44 ran up a string of 24 consecutive victories and before then, the teams of 1938-39-40 boasted a string of 18 straight wins. In competition at the fieldhouse, Wisconsin won 51 straight matches without the mark of defeat or deadlock. Currently a 20 match win streak is intact.

In the NCAA boxing tournaments, which draw the crack boxers in college ranks, Wisconsin representatives have won 23 individual titles. In 1943, five Badgers won crowns, while in 1939, 1942 and 1948, four Badgers were title-holders each time. Two of Wisconsin's boxers, Warren Jollymore (1942) and Verdayne John (1948), were awarded the John S. LaRoe trophy as the most representative boxer of college boxing in their year of competition.

Four times Wisconsin has been host to the NCAA

tournament, the 1939, 1943, 1947 and 1948 meets establishing all-time attendance records.

Two men deserve most of the credit for this splendid record. They are the late George F. Downer, athletic publicity director for Wisconsin, until his death in 1941 and John J. Walsh, a Madison attorney, who has been head boxing coach at Wisconsin for 12 out of the 15 years.

Downer was known as the "father" of intercollegiate boxing here at Wisconsin. He was the first to see the possibilities of boxing as a successful intercollegiate sport at Wisconsin and he turned his vision into a reality.

He organized the first university team in 1933. When this team fought its first match with St. Thomas, John Walsh was coach and one of the contestants of the team which battled the Badgers. The impression Walsh made on Downer was such that, through the latter's efforts, Walsh was hired as coach of the 1934 U. W. squad.

Today, the George F. Downer memorial award, made annually, is the most coveted honor a Wisconsin boxer can attain. It is awarded to the boxer coming closest, in the coach's estimation, to George F. Downer's ideals of a champion. These ideals stress scholarship, sportsmanship, boxing ability, and fighting spirit.

Coach Walsh has said, "George Downer was my closest friend and advisor. He was a close friend of all the boys and he forgot more than I will ever know about the sport of boxing."

From 1934 through 1944, Walsh was coach of the Wisconsin teams. During that time, most of the records afore-mentioned were compiled. In September of 1944, Walsh reported for duty in the U. S. Marine corps as a second lieutenant, trained at Quantico, Va., and was sent to the Pacific theater of operations. He last served on Okinawa prior to the Japanese capitulation.

He returned to Madison late in 1945, with the boxing season already under way. Since his return was then unexpected, the University had already contracted with DeWitt Portal to coach the Badgers. On leave of absence from his duties as boxing coach at San Jose State college in California, Portal had been nominated for the 1946 coaching job upon the advice of Walsh who was still in the service. Together, DeWitt Portal, acting as head coach and Walsh, acting in an advisory capacity, the two produced a team which won all seven matches for the year.

In 1945, during Walsh's first year of absence, Tom Kenneally, a CPO with the navy radio school and, at one time, a top-ranking professional heavyweight, was co-coach along with Vito Schiro, one of Wisconsin's best boxers of several seasons before. With only the Navy V-12 and radio trainees stationed on the

campus, the available talent was meager and the record that year showed only two wins, two narrow losses, and three ties. The Navy transferred men so fast that the coaches hardly knew from week to week, who the available candidates were.

One of the most pleasing aspects of Wisconsin boxing has been the support given Badger boxers by sports fans. The fieldhouse has been jammed to capacity for many matches, with the record being set at slightly more than 15,000 persons.

Of those who have fought for the University of Wisconsin, one person who will never be forgotten is Omar Crocker. In three years of intercollegiate boxing, he lost only one decision, that coming when a judge got his score-cards mixed and later admitted it to no avail. Omar won 18 bouts by knockouts and eight by decision.

Another Badger boxer who gained world-wide fame recently is Woodrow Swancutt, NCAA champion in 1939 and 1940, who piloted the Super-Fortress "Dave's Dream" in the atom bomb tests at Bikini.

Before intercollegiate competition came into the

picture at Wisconsin, boxing was maintained on an intramural basis. Newspaper files record all-university bouts as far back as 1920 and university champions at the various weight divisions are still determined in annual tournaments.

Many of the boxers in the early days of all-university competition were those who also competed in wrestling, and it was not an unusual occurrence if a wrestling champion also won boxing laurels. Walt Mathias, a "bearcat" of a wrestler at 175 pounds, also won boxing titles in that weight division through the years of 1927-1928-1929. On one occasion, he leaped from the wrestling ring over to the boxing ring to win two championships in two sports during a single night.

The tournaments were first held in the Old Red Armory, then were shifted to the U. W. Stock Pavilion where, in 1930, some 6,000 persons saw the final bouts.

Wisconsin's baseball coach, Arthur "Dynie" Mansfield, was heavyweight champion for the tournaments of 1928 and 1929, after losing a decision to Mike Zingale in the 1927 finals. In "Dynie's" two title winning fights, he won by second round knockouts.

Gymnastics and Fencing

The early history of gymnastics and fencing as Wisconsin sports is a synonymous one for it was not until 1924 that the two were given individual status. Before that time, the sports were usually coached by the same person and the events run off as parts of one meet.

It is indicated in the Badger that a fencing club existed in 1899 with C. M. Mayers as president but intercollegiate competition didn't start until 1912. Gymnastics, in the meantime, made its intercollegiate debut in 1902 with the organization of the Western Intercollegiate Gymnastic Association by Dr. J. C. Elsom of Wisconsin. There had been some interest before but the students usually were members of some Turnverein society and had their outlet there.

When the newly formed association held its first meet in 1902, Wisconsin and Grinnell were the only entries. Wisconsin ran off with first honors, and, in 1903, when Minnesota and Chicago were newly gained members, the Badgers finished second to the Gophers. Wisconsin took the title honors in 1905 and again in 1908, the year that wrestling was added to the program in the Association meet.

Up to 1909, the basis of scoring was similar to that of track, the first three places in each event counting 5, 3, and 1 points respectively. However, in 1909, the team scores were calculated on the number of points

awarded in each event upon individual performance. Three classes of wrestling, the light, middle, and heavyweight, were the grappling events added.

When fencing was added in 1911, Wisconsin was runnerup in team honors and won undisputed championship laurels in 1912. Westphal was the only Badger to win individual honors, taking the foils event.

In the early years of gymnastics, Wisconsin's success largely was that of Felix Zeidelhack who won the all-around titles in 1906-07-08. He captained the team in those years, and later coached the Badgers in 1910.

Wisconsin won gymnastic association titles in 1915, 1916, and 1923, with runnerup spots in 1912, 1914, 1920, 1921, and 1922. In 1925, Huck Schmidt captained the team and still is rated as "the best gymnast" in Badger annals. He won the all around title in 1925 against the best in the conference.

Gymnastics held their own until 1933 when limited athletic funds curtailed the sport. It finally was dropped in 1936 but revived again this past season.

Fencing title honors, as far as teams go, are limited to the 1912 and 1915 seasons but Wisconsin swordsmen have finished second on six occasions. Art and Fred Kaftan, two brothers, provided four individual fencing titles for Wisconsin, Art winning in 1935 and 1936, while Fred took saber honors in 1937 and 1938.

All-Time Wrestling History

Wrestling, as a Wisconsin sport, was on a "catch-as-catch-can" basis in its early years and the phrase is descriptive of its status, not a technical qualification.

The sport of grappling, until 1921, had no official basis, and, for the most part, it was an adjunct to gymnastics and fencing, for the books tell us that the old gymnasium meets included fencing and wrestling as divisions of their competition.

The year 1911 is as good a date for the beginning of wrestling as a Wisconsin sport. E. R. Finley was the coach but it wasn't until 1912 that a dual intercollegiate meet was held, Wisconsin holding Chicago to a 1-1 draw. By 1914, Wisconsin was competing in the Western Intercollegiate Wrestling tournament which was held along with the gymnastic and fencing tournaments. And, by the time, official status had been attained in 1921, Wisconsin wrestlers could point to three individual conference championships. Art Knott won the 135 pound title in 1914, later came back to coach Wisconsin from 1916 to 1918 inclusive. Other champions were Freeman, 175 pound winner in 1915, and W. J. Babcock, 135 pounder, in 1917.

One day, in the old Red Armory, Acting Athletic Director Tom Jones watched a well-built man demonstrating wrestling holds to a physical education class and listened to him extoll the benefits of the sport. The speaker was a bit miffed when Jones interrupted him but he was all smiles a little later when he was asked to become the first "real wrestling coach" at Wisconsin.

That man was George Hitchcock who had come to

Wisconsin as a engineering instructor in 1919. Hitchcock had been quite a wrestler in the navy and he carried over his success in coaching. From 1921 to 1933 when he left the job, Hitchcock gave Wisconsin a decided uplift in the sport. While his teams never won a conference title, they were contenders almost every season and he produced several Conference and All-Westsen individual titlists.

Among these were Ed "Killer" Temlin, of Baraboo, who won the 145 pound title for three seasons (1922-23-24) and who won second place in the All-Western meets; Bob "Bearcat" Holmes, also of Baraboo; 135 pound champion of the Big Ten in 1924; Leslie Zodtner, Portage, conference titlist in 155 pounds for 1926 and 1927; Midget Schmitz, 115 pound winner in 1927; and Sam Swenson, heavyweight, who won second place in the conference for two consecutive years and third place in the NCAA meet.

Wrestling was on a hazardous basis in 1934 and 1935 when athletic funds were low but in 1936, George Martin, outstanding wrestler from Iowa State College, came to take over the coaching reins and rebuild the sport here at Wisconsin. George has coached ever since, except for three years spent in the navy. While coach, he produced Larry Lederman, 145 pounder in 1938; John Roberts, 165 pounder in 1941 and 175 pounder in 1942; and Clarence Self, 165 pounder in 1948, as Western Conference champions. Ed Dzirbek, a sophomore under Martin in 1942, won the 1944 conference crown as a 135 pounder while his former coach was in the Navy.

All-Time Swimming History

The era dating from 1920 to 1927 marks the high-light in swimming as a Wisconsin sport. In that eight year span, Badger natators consistently challenged for Western Conference honors, twice finishing in the runnerup spot and never less than fifth place.

Individual champions were many with John Koch, Johnson Bennett, Hugo Czerwonky, Dick Ratcliffe, Winston Kratz, taking national honors as well while Koch added All-American ratings to his laurels. In 1922, the Badgers won all five of their dual meets but finished second in the conference meet. The relay team that season won the conference title and set a record which stood for some years.

First recorded swimming events at Wisconsin were in 1903 when the Badgers won the plunge and underwater swim at Chicago meets. By 1905, Wisconsin had scheduled dual meets with Chicago teams, losing both encounters, but from here to 1912, the sport still was on a haphazard basis.

In 1912, however, a coach was appointed by the name of Chauncey Hyatt who brought the Badgers to second place in the conference by 1913. Harry Hindman followed Hyatt as coach and he was replaced by Joe Steinauer, newest coach, in 1920.

As a part of the swimming program, water polo

was sponsored as early as 1903 but it led an erratic existence, if absence of reports and scores of such events from the newspapers and other publications during the early years is any criterion. As a matter of fact, scores of games which must have been played during the period of 1930 to 1935 when the sport finally was dropped, are not available. For the most part, the game followed the regular swimming meet as a sort of nightcap for those natators who simply didn't want to go home.

Considered a "murderous" sport on much the same level as lacrosse or hockey, water polo went under that name until 1920, then was revamped into "water basketball," but it went back to "water polo" in 1926.

Wisconsin, however, came through with an unbeaten dual meet season in 1925 and went on to capture the Western Conference championship in water basketball. With most of the same veterans back in 1926 when the game was changed back to water polo, Wisconsin couldn't make the grade.

Members of that water basketball title squad were Drake, Post, Abendroth, Kinkead, Weikers, Bach, Hotton, Westrich, Clark, Pederson, Ratcliffe, Allane, Herschberger, Kratz, Ettleson, Hodges, Simpkins, Vinson, and Wray. Steinauer was the coach.

All-Time Ice Hockey History

Ice hockey as a Wisconsin sport had its beginnings in a small group which organized a club and held practices whenever the weather and ice conditions permitted. Earliest mention of hockey in the Badger is a reference to a hockey club in 1892 but it wasn't until 1922 that any semblance to an intercollegiate basis was reached.

Joe Steinauer coached the hockey clubs from 1916 to 1919, often superintending the construction of a rink on the open spaces of Lake Mendota.

When the 1921-22 school year opened, the athletic council decided that hockey should be recognized as a varsity sport and authorized the erection of a rink on the lower campus where now are located the Quonset classrooms near the historical library. Michigan and Minnesota also organized teams and these schools, along with Wisconsin, formed a triangular Conference league, each playing a four-game series with the other, making a slate of eight league games in all.

Dr. A. C. Viner, an old McGill University man, came to Wisconsin as the first varsity coach that year and Gilbert C. Grieve was elected captain. Grieve had been a member of the informal hockey clubs which had been active before and his experience was valuable even though Wisconsin failed to win one of the eight games played that year.

Dr. Viner coached the 1923 season, then gave way to Robert Blodgett, former Wisconsin hockey player, who was appointed coach for the 1924 season. The Badger rink was lighted and before long Joe Steinauer was broadcasting the games over WHA despite the handicaps of freezing temperatures and lack of comfortable radio facilities.

Wisconsin's only hockey championship came in 1926 when, under the coaching of Kay Iverson, it tied for the league crown. Still, the best showing over a period of years was turned in by the teams coached by Johnny Farquhar, each time finishing second. That was in the seasons of 1928, 1929, and 1930.

In 1933, when the depression affected athletic incomes and crippled Wisconsin's sports program, hockey was dropped as an intercollegiate sport but the Badger teams continued playing in the league until the last half of the 1935 season when the players disbanded. Since that time, the sport has not been revived, mostly because of poor weather conditions and lack of suitable facilities.

Athletic Director Harry Stuhldreher plans to restore the sport to its former basis when the athletic building expansion program is effected. An indoor rink is included in the plans.

History of Other Outdoor Winter Sports

Shortest-lived of any intercollegiate sports at Wisconsin as far as an official varsity status is concerned, are speed skating and skiing. Under the direction of George Little, a winter sports committee was formed and from the 1926 to the 1928 seasons, the Badgers did right well, winding up as national champions in 1928.

Before that brief era and since, skiing and speed skating have been conducted on an informal basis, with the Wisconsin Hoofers Club now sponsoring

midwest ski tournaments and an annual winter carnival. But, as far as recognition as a varsity sport is concerned, the years of 1926, 1927, and 1928 will have to serve as the history.

There is evidence that in the Gay Nineties a sailing club existed on the campus, while others joined the curling club, or enjoyed the figure skating club activities. Later, at the turn of the century, some of the more hardy winter sports enthusiasts took up skiing and tried out the Stoughton slide

which, at the time, was considered the steepest in the world.

Wisconsin sponsored an international ski tournament in January of 1926, a total of 70 entries from all parts of the country competing. The meet, well attended, netted the "W" club about \$700 in profits, an unprecedented and successful promotion.

Several weeks before, during the Christmas vacation, several Wisconsin students went to Lake Placid, New York, and there defeated the pick of the Eastern and Canadian collegiate universities at the huge winter sports carnival. Hans Troye, Badger ski jumper, who was born in Oslo, Norway, won his event, setting a record of 136 feet while Knut Dahl, Badger skier, won the 7½ mile cross country event, with Troye coming in second. Leon Emmert was the other Badger to score an individual championship, taking an easy victory in the half-mile speed skating event.

Troye added the national championship at Duluth to his laurels after the initial triumph at Lake Placid, but he was not with the Wisconsin group which went to the Lake Placid tournament the following year. This time, Leon Emmert won the 440 yard speed skating race with Millard Grant third. Emmert also was third in the two-mile event while Morris Waterman won sixth in the ski jump and 10th in the cross country events. In team standings, Wisconsin rated a tie for third place.

During the Christmas holidays of 1927-28, Wisconsin

again entered the Lake Placid winter carnival and outclassed such schools as McGill of Canada and Dartmouth. Wisconsin's four-man team scored 23 points before poor weather and course conditions put a halt to the long week's schedule of events. Because of the curtailment of the program, the Lake Placid committee decided to withhold the team trophy but it grudgingly admitted that the Badgers were the national intercollegiate champions.


Knut Dahl was beaten out for first place in the cross country ski run by R. W. Thompson, McGill's Canadian Olympic star, while Hans Troye took fifth place. Troye also picked up second place in the ski-jumping event, also being beaten out by Thompson in what fans today would term a photo-finish. The difference between the two was .06 of a point.

Dahl and Troye scored a total of 13 points for their efforts while the other 10 were supplied by Bobby Ocock and Fred Milverstedt, Badger speed skaters who rated high in the tournament.

With this victory as incentive, Wisconsin staged a Midwest intercollegiate tournament and easily walked off with team honors, scoring 36 points while Marquette was runnerup with 10 points. Michigan School of Mines, Wisconsin Extension, and Northwestern University were other competing schools.

Additional honors won were the State Journal silver skates derby, the Wausau sports carnival, and Oconomowoc winter sports jamboree.

Wisconsin Baseball History



Wisconsin's First Baseball Champions, 1886.

Baseball is Wisconsin's oldest intercollegiate sport, its earliest beginnings tracing back to the spring of 1870 when some of the diamond enthusiasts on the campus banded together to form a club known as the Mendotas.

It was an auspicious beginning for the University team easily defeated the Enterprise Club from Albion 24-13 and then defeated the Janesville Mutuals 41-17 in a game played on the Driving Park grounds in Madison, June 3. Since the Mutuals, only a week before, had proclaimed themselves state champions because of an unbeaten record, the university triumph kept Madison buzzing for weeks.

Lack of a suitable playing field delayed the organization of the 1871 team but before the school term closed, a game was arranged with the Albion Enterprise Club who promptly avenged the 1870 setback by whipping the University boys 26-24.

Because most of the players graduated and possibly because of the defeat, interest waned in baseball and it was not again revived until 1876 when students wrote open letters to the press advocating the sponsorship of the sport. Even so, no action was taken but in the spring of 1877, despite gloomy predictions by the press, a baseball association finally was arranged. P. V. Larson was elected president and C. E. Hooker, secretary-treasurer. All students were eligible upon payment of 25 cents. A team was organized but lost all of its games and blame was put on the lack of gym work during the winter.

If there was a season in 1878, no one kept a record of it but in 1879, the University club defeated Beloit in the principal game played although several inter-class contests are on record. By 1880, Chicago, Racine,

and Northwestern had joined together to form Western Intercollegiate Baseball League and this helped prod Badger supporters to some action.

In 1881, another athletic association was formed at Wisconsin and student members planned to get possession of the pasture between State street and the lake to form it into a campus suitable for baseball and other sports. However, the fair grounds at Camp Randall were secured instead and Wisconsin beat Beloit and twice defeated Sun Prairie. In 1882, Wisconsin and Ann Arbor formed a league and played several games, Wisconsin losing consistently.

A year later, Wisconsin sent a representative for the first time to the Western Intercollegiate Baseball League meeting and gained membership for 1883. Two losses to Northwestern that year kept the Badgers from a championship and in 1884, the question of obtaining a coach was brought up, defeats of the past having revealed that the weakness of the team was due to a lack of technical training.

By the end of that season, Wisconsin was the champion, winning five out of six games and in 1885, it repeated, including among its wins, a 2-1 triumph over Racine and a 6-2 defeat of Northwestern. Following their triumphs, bands of students met the winning Badger nine at the depot, an innovation which "greatly surprised the players." It must have been a good tonic for the Badgers again won the championship in 1886.

The next year, 1887, Wisconsin again won the championship. E. D. Swinburne, who played second base for a number of years, was captain and led the hitters with an average of .441. G. A. Brown, left fielder, was second with .434 and Charles "Maggie"

Magee Williams, pitcher, was third with .380. Other players were W. E. Kramer, third base; G. T. Simpson, first base; Carl A. Harper, right field; H. K. Spencer, shortstop; W. C. Brumder, center field; J. C. Gaveney, center field; A. E. Diment, right field; George Waldo, catcher.

The year book describes the excitement on the Hill and in Madison when Wisconsin played Racine College at Racine in the game which decided the league championship. When the news came through that Wisconsin had won 7-6, cannons on the Hill were fired, stores closed, fireworks were set off and thousands met the train bringing the heroes home. That night "The ladies of the university tendered the players a banquet" which must have been quite an affair.

With seven veterans returning the next year, 1888, Wisconsin had to be content with second place. Williams, the only Badger pitcher, developed a sore arm but no scores are available on the season. However, a cartoon shows that Wisconsin "had six pennants" so there must have been considerable baseball even before 1886. The new members of the 1888 team included R. B. McCoy, third base, and Jim McCully, first base and left field.

In 1889, the league consisted of Wisconsin, Beloit, Northwestern, and Lake Forest, but, again, there are no scores reported. McCoy was back, playing shortstop, McCully was at first base and Williams, no longer able to pitch, played centerfield and was the leading batter. W. D. "Taffy" Sheldon was catcher, with G. W. Davies, and A. J. Lunt as pitchers. Carl A. Johnson played second base, P. Collipp, third base; C. Campbell, right field, and E. Pape, left field.

Another championship was won in 1890 when Wisconsin won five out of six league games, dropping only one to Northwestern. W. E. Butt was the pitcher while Sheldon was the catcher. Other players were G. W. Achard, shortstop; S. F. Grover, first base; W. C. Brumder, second base; C. S. McCoy, third base; H. R. "Birdie" Hammond, center field; J. A. Week, right field.

The first University of Wisconsin athletic association was organized in the following year, 1891, by the merging of the baseball, football, and tennis associations along with the University Boat Club. Prior to this time, each sport had been carried on by its own association.

Under the new association, Wisconsin swept through the league in 1892 winning all games from the same opponents. Butt and Sheldon again formed the battery with Hammond back in center field, Week in right, and Carl Johnson at second base. New men were Campbell, first base; Spencer D. Beebe, third base; L. L. Prescott, left field; and W. D. Hooker, right field.

Birdie Hammond captained the 1892 team as a senior and still had the veteran, Sheldon, behind the bat, along with Week, Beebe, Joe Simpson, Campbell, and Hooker from the year before. New men were Dick Arms, second base; Frank Wheelihan, first base (he was a substitute in 1891); Tommy McGovern, shortstop; and Orson Palmer, a fine southpaw pitcher. Reserves were Frank "Indian" Dillon, pitcher; E. F. Schulz, infielder; and Lawrence Whittet, outfielder. Dillon later was a major leaguer and finished out his baseball career with Los Angeles where he managed the Angels in the Pacific Coast for many years.

The 1893 team, with Dillon and Palmer hurling and McGovern behind the plate, finished with eight victories but had nine setbacks. However, the opposition, which now included Michigan, Illinois, and Chicago, was of a greater caliber.

The 1894 team was about the same but what stood out in that season was the great victory over Michigan at Camp Randall field, then a county fair ground. The baseball diamond was located about where the Randall trailer camp is now and there was a pond in deep center field. The year before, the Wolverines had handed Wisconsin two defeats and the Badgers were really thirsting for revenge.

Michigan had one of its truly great ball clubs at that time and when the last of the ninth rolled around, it was leading Wisconsin 9-2. But the inspired Badgers, sparked by Schulz's four-run homer which sailed clear into the horse pond, won the game 11-9. It was in this game that Dick Arms, Wisconsin midget captain and second baseman, completed an unassisted triple play, one of the few ever made in collegiate baseball history.

With runners on first and second, and no one out, a Wolverine batter drove a liner almost directly over second base. Arms made an unbelievable catch, leaping high in the air to snare the ball with his ungloved right hand. He landed on second base to retire the runner for the second out, and then ran down the Wolverine baserunner who had left first base in a hurry. Imagine the effect of that exhibition on a student crowd back in that unsophisticated age when enthusiasm for athletics was not regarded as childish vice!

Wisconsin did not win another championship until 1899, although there were many good teams in that interval. The coaching was erratic and the schedules even more so. But in 1899, the ball team, like the famous Badger crew of the same year, was coached by a youngster—Bertrand J. Hustling, who had been the ace pitcher of the 1898 team. He was a junior law student but when he was asked to sign the customary eligibility certificate stating that he had never received any pay for participating in athletics, he declined, having played considerable ball for semi-pro teams. Lost to Wisconsin as an athlete, Hustling was hired as coach and his club won the Western college championship. Mainstays on the club were Joseph Jackson, George Gernon, and Wayne Moseley. Hustling went into professional ball after his graduation, playing with Milwaukee in the Western League, and later with the Philadelphia Athletics in the newly formed American League.

Wisconsin won only four Western Conference championships after that, taking the title in 1902, 1912, 1930, and 1946.

Wisconsin's baseball history is highlighted by the trip made to Japan by the 1909 club. This trip was arranged largely through the efforts of Genkwan Shibusawa, '09, a Japanese alumnus who also acted as local manager and interpreter for the party during the trip. Because Tom Barry, coach of the 1909 varsity nine, had to be at the University in time for his football coaching duties, Dr. Charles McCarthy acted as coach and Wisconsin representative on the tour of Nippon.

The Badger players, after being selected in tryouts at Madison, assembled at St. Paul, Aug. 21 and reached Seattle, Wash., on Aug. 24. They remained there a week for practice, during which they played two games, bowing to the Tacoma League team 5-2 and losing to Port Ludlow, 2-0.

Members of the team attributed the three losses to Keio University to shockingly bad umpiring—a fact conceded by Japanese newspapers. The team sailed for home on Oct. 13 and reached Seattle, Oct. 29. The entire trip which produced five wins against four defeats against Japanese teams, covered a total of 13,500 miles.

History of Crew as a Wisconsin Sport



Wisconsin's Famed "Berry Crate" Crew of 1899.

EVER since Wisconsin won the Eastern Association of Rowing Colleges Regatta on the Severn River at Annapolis, Md., in May of 1946, Badger sports enthusiasts have varied greatly in their claims as to the exact date when crew first was sponsored as a sport at the University of Wisconsin.

Fragmentary records indicate a rowing club was organized back in 1878, but apparently it was of an intramural nature. A still earlier date, 1874, is suggested in a letter from a Wisconsin alumnus, C. B. Bradish, '12, who states that his father, George P. Bradish, told him many times that "he rowed on the first crew Wisconsin ever had".

The late George P. Bradish had graduated from the four year course in 1875 and took a post-graduate course in 1876. In 1912, he was awarded an honorary "W" because of his rowing experience.

Available records also show that in 1883, the Phi Kappa Psi boat crew was organized, with G. E. Waldo, stroke; C. R. Boardman, No. 12; J. R. F. Trottman, No. 3; M. W. Krueger, No. 4; E. J. Dockery, No. 5; E. H. Parker, bow; and C. M. Wales, coxswain.

The founding of the University Boat club took place in 1886 when its sponsors were united in their belief that "the natural opportunities for boating at the University are unrivaled by those of any other college in the country."

Six professors, R. D. Irving, E. A. Birge, H. P. Armsby, Lucius Heritage, W. W. Daniells, and J. B.

Parkinson, were the patrons of crew in 1886 and other members of the club included C. K. King, H. W. Hiller, L. M. Hoskins, A. E. Thomas, W. C. Parmley, W. R. O'Neil, F. B. Phelps, James Goldsworthy, Louis Blatz, Ed Kremers, W. S. Tupper, W. N. Parker, J. B. Kern, F. Belinger, J. H. Gabriel, W. R. Rosenstengel, Chas. M. Morris, F. J. Turner, F. L. Porter, Chas. N. Gregory, J. R. F. Trottman, W. H. Merriman, Oscar Hallam, Mrs Wm. Trelease, Fred H. Whitton.

By 1892, two eight-oared gigs had been purchased and class races held each spring in these clumsy boats. That same year, 1892, a group of class oarsmen arranged for a race with the Delaware Boat Club of Chicago. Wisconsin won the race which was held at Oconomowoc. Proof of this victory is attested by a faded silk banner in the trophy room in the old red armory. That was Wisconsin's first race with a crew outside campus limitations.

The class crews that year included senior, junior, sophomore, and freshman groups, as well as junior and senior law class boats.

Charles C. "Jimmy" Case and W. T. Saucerman were the chief boosters of rowing during 1892 and 1893. Case, who captained the crew, also gave the oarsmen such coaching as they received.

The first regular coach was employed for a few weeks during the spring of 1894. He was Amos W. Marston, a former Cornell crew captain. His Badger crews of 1894 defeated the Delaware Boat Club of

Chicago, then lost a close race to the Minnesota Boat Club. That year, and the following season, the late Oscar Rohn was captain. Rohn was another rowing zealot who was able, by his enthusiasm, to bring about the engagement of Andrew M. O'Dea as a full-time coach. O'Dea, whose famous brother, Pat O'Dea, performed legendary kicking feats as a Badger gridder, had rowed as an amateur with the famous Yarra Yarra Boat Club of Melbourne, Australia. The technique he taught, accordingly, was termed the Yarra Yarra stroke.

The personnel of O'Dea's first varsity crew in 1895 was A. F. Alexander, bow; Walter Alexander, No. 2; John Day, No. 3; L. F. Austin, No. 4; M. L. Weber, No. 5; C. C. McConville, No. 6; Captain Rohn, No. 7; M. E. Seymour, stroke; and H. R. Crandall, coxswain. This crew defeated the Delawares, despite the fact that Weber broke his oar a quarter of a mile from the finish and was only a passenger thereafter. A fortnight later, Wisconsin lost to the Minnesota club by a mere second, after leading most of the way. Its time, 10:23, was the fastest two miles ever rowed by a college crew on dead water up to that time.

Wisconsin's first race with a college crew was against the Yale freshmen on Lake Salstonstall, New Haven, in 1896. The Badgers won by some dozen lengths and, in the same season, beat the Minnesota Boat Club for the first time. The '97 and '98 crews rowed only against club crews which they defeated and at the close of the 1898 season, O'Dea resigned to go to Harvard. C. C. McConville, captain and stroke of the '98 varsity, was then named coach. He had been in the varsity boat for four years, was a close student of the sport, and had the necessary qualities for leadership.

Wisconsin first entered the Intercollegiate Regatta at Poughkeepsie in 1898 and finished third but, through an incident, its 1899 crew will go down in history as one of the most famous in Badger annals.

Conceded no chance by the experts before the race, the Badgers stunned the onlookers with their challenge for honors. Away to a poor start, they forged into the lead before the first mile post was reached and maintained this position until near the finish. Just about a quarter of a mile from the finish, the now famed "berry crate" floated into the course of the Wisconsin crew.

Coxswain Dillon had to swerve the boat to avoid fouling it, since eight-oared shells are not built for ramming. Then, apparently on the belief that he would lose more than he would gain by trying again to straighten his course, Dillon kept the Wisconsin boat heading on a diagonal, to the finish, thus rowing considerably farther than any other of the crews.

When the "berry crate" loomed up, Wisconsin was leading Pennsylvania by one length, going strong with a long, powerful stroke and beautiful spacing. But the Badgers lost all of this lead and enough more to be beaten across the finish line, by a margin of five feet by Pennsylvania. Cornell and Columbia were third and fourth.

Wisconsin's crew members were F. A. Little, bow; J. Q. Lyman, No. 2; I. Mathews, No. 3; S. C. Welsh, No. 4; W. J. Gibson, No. 5; W. C. Sutherland, No. 6, and captain; A. R. Anderson, No. 7; L. A. Williams, stroke; and J. G. Dillon, coxswain. They averaged 6 feet in height and were typical oarsmen—long, lithe muscled youths with tremendous power, and great fighting spirit.

There is an interesting sequel to that famed "berry" incident. The following year, when Wisconsin's crew took its first trial row down the Hudson, Penn-

sylvania crew members lined up on their float, each one wearing a strawberry box on his head. The joke was appreciated by all concerned.

Meanwhile, it was learned that O'Dea was dissatisfied with conditions at Harvard and McConville declined re-election as coach because he felt it was better for him to take up his profession as an engineer and let Wisconsin recall O'Dea. McConville, however, never lost his interest in Badger crew activity and he was instrumental in organizing the Wisconsin Rowing Association in June, 1930. He also headed this group of former Badger oarsmen, whose purpose was to advance the interests of rowing at Wisconsin.

From 1900 on, the history of Wisconsin crew must be sketched rather rapidly. O'Dea, recalled to Wisconsin, remained as coach until the close of the 1906 season. His 1900 crew again finished second to Penn on the Hudson by the margin of 25 feet. That same year, Wisconsin also sent a freshman crew to the Hudson, which won the race in 9:45.4, with Penn second, three lengths behind.

Most of the members of that successful frosh crew were in the 1901 varsity which finished third in the Poughkeepsie, won by Cornell in 18:53, a record which stood for 27 years. Wisconsin's time was 19:07. Wisconsin was second in both varsity and freshman races at Poughkeepsie in 1902, the varsity losing to Cornell by less than a length and the frosh losing to the Cornell yearlings at about the same margin.

Following the athletic department re-organization in 1906, Coach O'Dea resigned and was succeeded by Edward Ten Eyck, winner of England's Diamond Sculls, some years before. The new Badger coach was a son of Ed Ten Eyck, veteran Syracuse coach.

The new mentor turned out a good varsity crew which was again badly equipped for rough water and nearly swamped at Poughkeepsie in 1907. Yet it finished fifth while the freshmen, stroked by Jack Wilce, later famous as a football coach at Ohio State, won their race, in 9:58.

Coach Ten Eyck believed in lots of work. As a result, he sent a well-conditioned, powerful crew to the Hudson in 1908 and the time trials proved it. In the varsity race, after Penn had sprinted into the lead, The Badgers gradually drew up, passed Penn at the mile, led by a length at two miles and also at three miles. In the last mile, a Badger oarsman collapsed, the shell dropped back, and Wisconsin registered another losing crew, finishing fifth.

The late and well-liked Harry "Dad" Vail came to Wisconsin as coach in 1911, after a Dr. Sweetland had been forced by ill health to resign, only a few days after taking charge. The 1911 crew was a hard luck crew. It set a new four-mile record on Lake Mendota (21:20) but when it reached the Hudson, things happened. The training period on the Hudson was a nightmarish affair with boils, infections, and colds decimating the Badger ranks. The crew finally started the varsity race with a freshman substitute at No. 6 because every varsity reserve oarsman was ill. Wisconsin beat Syracuse to finish fourth, inches behind Penn in third place. The frosh were last in their event.

The 1912 crew finished second to Cornell by only three seconds after losing their regular No. 2 oarsman, Cuff, through a hand infection just before the race.

Not only did the 1914 crew finish six and last at Poughkeepsie but it was the last Badger crew for some years for in 1914, the sport of rowing was banned by action of the medical faculty. This group

held that four-mile rowing was injurious to health and the council voted to send no more crews to Poughkeepsie. Then, for six years, rowing as a sport languished at Wisconsin, with only intramural competition as an incentive. However, reports in the school publications indicated even then, that as many as 165 men competed during a single season.

By 1920, the faculty relented and permitted two-mile races with boat club crews. This reawakened the old spirit and some creditable crews were developed in 1920, 1921, 1922, and 1923. Finally, in 1924, it appeared that Wisconsin again had some splendid oarsmen. Further study had changed the conviction of the medical advisors who previously felt rowing made for bad heart conditions. As a result, permission was granted to compete again at Poughkeepsie.

That 1924 varsity crew was one of the greatest in Badger history and certainly the most spectacular since the "berry crate" crew. The oarsmen were of all sizes, and physical types, but each had condition, conviction, and intestinal fortitude. Only the fact that they had started their finishing sprint too late seems to have robbed them of a victory at Poughkeepsie. Wisconsin trailed the pack at the end of the second mile and then Howie Johnson, a magnificent stroke, raised the beat and the Badgers set sail for the lead. It was a fine effort. Wisconsin cut down every crew but the great Washington eight which won the race, a bare half-length ahead of the Badgers.

In 1925, no one could be found to take the place of Johnson at stroke and events proved that this was about the factor which kept Wisconsin from being as fast as it was in the previous year. In the 1925 varsity race at Poughkeepsie, Wisconsin staged another startling sprint and passed Penn, Columbia, Cornell, Syracuse to finish third behind Washington and Navy crews.

Wisconsin finished seventh at Poughkeepsie in 1926, being timed in 20:07, just a second ahead of Cornell that year. In 1927, the varsity crew, in the opinion of "Dad" Vail, the Badger coach, was too "weak to be a worthy representative of the University at Poughkeepsie" and, as a result, the Wisconsin varsity did not compete, although the frosh crew was entered and placed sixth.

In the 1928 season, the crew again was classed as sub-standard and Coach Vail, then suffering from the illness which finally caused his death, was unable to direct the early training. When he did take hold, he was a very sick man, working only on his courage. The crew failed to show Poughkeepsie requirements and shortly before the date for the race, it was decided to withdraw from the regatta. Races against Milwaukee and Minnesota Boat Clubs afforded this crew its only competition.

At Coach Vail's death, it seemed that Wisconsin's rowing crisis had been reached and that there would be little reason for engaging a successor unless the sport again could be put on a stable basis. So the decision in regard to a coach was more than that—it was, in reality, a declaration of policy involving the whole future of rowing at Wisconsin.

When George W. "Mike" Murphy, former Washington crewman, was called from Yale where he had been freshman coach for five years, he took over as head of a rowing department that was given new life. The Wisconsin Athletic Council announced that herewith it would support crew adequately, send the varsity to Poughkeepsie each year, and, as soon as possible, send the freshmen. In addition, it was enlarging the facilities for crew training.

Murphy's first crew in 1929 finished fifth in the Poughkeepsie and, in its only other start, lost a two-mile sprint race to Washington by less than two lengths, after leading the Huskies to the first mile buoy on Lake Mendota.

Crew began to branch out in 1930. The varsity lost a two-mile sprint race to Pennsylvania by a narrow margin, being timed at 10:26.5 to Penn's 10:26. The Badger varsity also lost a two-mile test with Washington, the Huskies being clocked at 10:14 on Lake Mendota while the Badgers were 11 seconds slower. In the Poughkeepsie Regatta, Wisconsin was eighth and last.

At the close of the 1934 season, Murphy resigned as coach and Ralph Hunn, 1933 coxswain, was appointed as coach. Hunn worked hard throughout the summer of 1934, training crews for the 1935 season. He promoted four races with private boat clubs, all of which Wisconsin won with ease. He also initiated a 150-pound crew.

In 1936, Wisconsin's varsity defeated Detroit Boat Club by five lengths over a mile course and in the Mid-American Regatta at Marietta College, Ohio, the Badger crew won the two-mile race, gaining possession of the Charles G. Dawes trophy. The junior varsity won from the Detroit Boat Club in a one-mile race and, at the Mid-American Regatta, was a seven-length winner in its division.

Coach Hunn produced a better crew in 1938, one that was in superior condition, probably due to an early start in training outdoors on the Yahara River, Feb. 14, instead of the usual mid-April beginning. The preparatory rowing schedule, however, was upset by cancellation of scheduled races with Detroit Boat Club and Marietta College crews. As a result, the only tune-up for Poughkeepsie was a race on Lake Mendota with Washington's Huskies. The latter won varsity, junior varsity, and frosh races with Wisconsin at Madison.

On the Hudson, Wisconsin's varsity finished fifth as Navy won the event in the new record time of 18:19. The Badgers themselves set a lap record of 9:10 and its time for the four-mile race, though fifth best, was only one-fifth of a second slower than the previous record.

In the fall of 1940, Allen Walz, crew coach at Manhattan, was called to Wisconsin to succeed Ralph Hunn as Badger mentor of rowing. Walz introduced some startling innovations in stroke and coaching technique and his 1941 crew, along with the frosh outfit, made Wisconsin rowing followers sit up and take notice.

The 1941 varsity crew defeated Marietta College at 2,000 yards, over a wind-swept Lake Mendota course in 5:10. The losers were clocked at 5:25. Then the Badgers took on the Lincoln Park Boat club and won at the Henley distance in 6:40 with the latter at 7:10, again rowing against unfavorable conditions caused by high winds and bad water. Against Washington, the Badgers lost a mile race to the Huskies by one-half length in an exhibition race at Chicago. The varsity, however, went to Poughkeepsie and rated sixth, its time being 19:29.4. The varsity was the lightest in history, averaging only 163 pounds.

The frosh crew of 1941, however, took the spotlight by finishing second in the two-mile event at Poughkeepsie, in 10:03.4.

Wartime difficulties in transportation, manpower losses, and the general uncertainty of the time combined in 1942 to cut Wisconsin's crew activity to

competition in the Adams Cup Regatta at Boston. The Poughkeepsie regatta had been shelved for the war.

Competing with Harvard, Navy, Pennsylvania, M. I. T., the Badgers finished second to Harvard. The race was at a mile and three-quarters, with Harvard winning by 2½ lengths in 9:18.6. Wisconsin's time was 9:25.

By 1943, Coach Walz had been inducted in the navy as PT boat skipper and crew at Wisconsin was at a standstill, virtually. George Rea, varsity oarsmen of 1942, was appointed as temporary coach but his varsity, in its only race of the season, lost out to the Badger frosh crew. The Wisconsin yearlings also defeated Madison West high school and Chicago Lincoln Park Club crews in other races that year. The varsity crew, actually, was a pickup affair and included Rea, himself, at No. 3.

The seasons of 1944 and 1945 were devoid of crew competition, although, in some isolated cases, rowing enthusiasts used the equipment for informal practice.

Walz then returned from the navy in the fall of 1945 and he began rebuilding interest in crew. Arranging an elaborate schedule and using the skyways for transportation, he brought nation-wide publicity to Wisconsin.

Most of the crew members of 1942 and 1941 had returned from the service and Walz soon had a fine crew in the making.

The 1946 varsity started out by defeating the Badger Jayvees and Marietta College in a 1½ mile race over Lake Monona. The varsity four-oar boat also defeated a Marietta four in a mile race the same afternoon. Then the varsity startled its followers by winning the first major regatta crown in Badger history, sweeping to victory in the Eastern Association of Rowing Colleges regatta on the Severn River at Annapolis, Md. The time for the 1¾ mile race was 9:12.8. Navy, Columbia, Rutgers, Cornell, Pennsylvania, Princeton, M. I. T. and Harvard finished in that order.

Wisconsin did not rest on those laurels for two weeks later, the Badgers defeated Pennsylvania over

the Henley distance on the Schuylkill river course. The time for Wisconsin was 7:11, with Pennsylvania junior varsity and 150-pound crews third and fourth. In another week, Wisconsin defeated Cornell in the finals of a four-school regatta on Cayuga Lake inlet, being timed in 5:08 for the mile. Earlier in the day, Wisconsin had eliminated Pennsylvania in a semi-final race being timed in 5:01, fastest time of the regatta.

The Badgers then were invited to compete in the 2,000 meter race at Seattle, Washington, by sponsors of the Northwest Maritime Regatta. Examinations, rough water, and delays in air transportation combined to keep the Badgers inactive for five full days prior to reaching Seattle for the big test. Using a borrowed boat and drawing an outside lane, unprotected from wind, the Badgers had to settle for fourth place behind Cornell, M. I. T., and Washington, in that order. Harvard, California, Rutgers, and British Columbia were next in line. The winning time was 7:19.07 while Wisconsin's was 7:24.

Wisconsin's crew, in its race with Pennsylvania on the Schuylkill river, almost experienced another "berry crate" incident. A dredge, anchored at the quarter-mile mark forced Wisconsin's coxie, Carlyle Fay, to steer the Barger shell around this obstacle to get a straight course for the remaining mile. As the shell veered, it collided with the Penn jayvee boat and both crews locked oars for about 10 strokes. After getting cleared of this mess, Wisconsin was two lengths behind the Penn varsity. A half-mile from the finish, Badger stroke Carl Holtz "caught a crab" and lost his oar behind him for 15 seconds but he raised the beat to 40 against a severe head wind and rough water to send the Badger shell to a deck-length win over the Quaker varsity.

The Badger crew of 1946 had Carl Holtz, stroke; Dick Tipple, No. 7; Dick Mueller, No. 6; Fred Suchow, No. 5; Gordon Grimstad, No. 4; Ralph Falconer, No. 3; Paul Klein, No. 2; Chester Knight, bow; Carlyle Fay, coxswain. Jake Valentine and Tom Blacklock, spares, also saw action during the season.

Walz resigned in the fall of 1946 to coach at Yale. He was succeeded by Norman Sonju, former Washington oarsmen and assistant coach at Cornell.






Carlyle Fay, Coxswain 1946-1948

History of Wisconsin Track and Field

First evidence of track and field athletics as an intercollegiate sport at the University of Wisconsin is found in the report of the 1893 formation of the Western Intercollegiate Track and Field Association and its first meet held in Chicago, with Michigan, Wisconsin, and Northwestern as participants.

Prior to that time, an annual field day was the sum total of track athletics at Wisconsin, with most of the competition confined to the various classes in school.

Without a coach or a trainer, Wisconsin did very well to finish second to Michigan in the 1893 meet, the Wolverines scoring 52 points to 45 for the Badgers. However, it later was discovered that James Leroy, winner of the broad jump, was not enrolled at Michigan, being a high school student at Pontiac, Mich., and that Hall, winner of the shot put and hammer throw, having played professional football between the time he left Princeton and his enrollment at Michigan, was not eligible. Their disqualification at the meet would have given Wisconsin the title but no one pressed the matter much in those days.

In 1894, more schools entered the meet which again was held in Chicago and which was managed by an alumni committee of the Western Intercollegiate Athletic Association formed the year before. Rules

of eligibility were adopted but there was no faculty control except locally in each school with a resulting wide variation of standards. Protests, which were numerous, were decided by the graduate games committee, meeting on the eve of the meet.

Wisconsin, in 1894, engaged as its coach, a professional sprinter from Monroe by the name of Booth. The squad trained at the old state fair grounds on the present site of Camp Randall. The clay horse track was a mile-long affair with a weird shape, one straightaway being one-quarter of a mile long while the other three-quarters of the distance wound around through the knolls and groves on the east side of the tract.

Up to 1900, Wisconsin track teams trained all season long for just one meet, the Western Intercollegiate. The only way to win a letter was to score a point (at least a third place) in competition against the pick of the midwest. As in all other Badger sports at the time, the athletes purchased all their own equipment and uniforms. Indoor training first became possible with the opening of the old armory and gymnasium on Langdon street during the school year of 1894-95.

Illinois won the 1894 championship with Wisconsin again second and a year later, when California took the 1895 title, the Badgers were once more runnerup.

leading all midwest teams. It was in this meet that the first real sprinter of note in Badger history—James H. Maybury—made his bid for fame. Maybury was third in the 100 and second in the 220 yard dashes won by the famed Johnny Crum of Iowa, who, a week earlier, had romped away with the sprints in the ICAAAA meet in New York. Big John Richards, later to coach the Badgers in football, placed high in the hurdle events.

Wisconsin finally crashed the championship circle in 1896 with Maybury winning both sprints in the relatively fast times (in those days) of 10 and 22.4 seconds respectively on a wretched track. Richards won both the hurdles, Jack Liebler took the high jump, and Henry Cochems won the shot put to give Wisconsin 46 points. This Badger team was coached by Scottie Craigie, an all around professional athlete on leave of absence from his regular job as captain of a Minneapolis fire company.

Maybury was elected for a second time in 1897 and again he led the Badgers to a championship. The speedy Badger, each year, had to win out against a protest on grounds of alleged professionalism, but he came through with flying colors. That year he won the century in 9.8 seconds and the furlong in 21.4 seconds around a one-third mile bicycle track. Richards won the high hurdles while Alvin Kraenzlein, then a Wisconsin freshman, won the low barriers.

Kraenzlein later transferred to Pennsylvania, became a world champion broad jumper and hurdler, winning four firsts in the Olympic games.

When the graduate committee cleared Maybury of another charge of professionalism, just before the 1898 meet, Michigan, Chicago, and Illinois withdrew and held a meet of their own on Stagg field (then called Marshall field). Wisconsin easily romped to a Western Intercollegiate title, scoring 61 points but it was a hollow victory. It took 18 years before Wisconsin again won a track title.

Charles Kilpatrick, holder of the world's record in the half-mile run, came to Wisconsin as track coach in 1900 and later was elected graduate manager, a position then corresponding to that of director of athletics.

Kilpatrick was a capable coach but track material was not up to previous standard. At any rate, the best his teams did was a second to Michigan in the 1901 meet but Kilpatrick's dual meet record was more than satisfactory. One of his stars was Bredsteen who won the mile walk in 1900 with a time of 7 minutes flat, excellent time for this now forgotten event. Others were Fred Schule, broad jumper; Granke, discus thrower; George Paoge 440 yard dashman and

low hurdler; and Frank Waller, who later won U. S and Olympic titles in the 440 and low hurdles in 1904 and 1905. Emil Breitkreuz, now a famed broad jump official with national repute, set a record of 1:58.8 for the 880 yard run, a mark that stood for some years.

Kilpatrick resigned early in 1905 and was succeeded by James Temple who had trained Wisconsin football teams and also had been a trainer of professional bicycle riders. Waller's first place in the 440 was the only time that Wisconsin earned points in the 1905 meet.

In 1906 when athletics were in an upheaval at Wisconsin, Alvin Kraenzlein resigned in February after a tenure of about four months. Emmett Angell, gymnasium instructor, took over and coached the next four years with the help of Dr. C. P. Hutchins. Next coach was Charles Wilson who held the duties for the 1912 and 1913 seasons.

The year 1906 also held this incident of interest to track fans. Charlie Parsons, national champion sprinter from Portland with a time of 9.8 seconds, had enrolled at Wisconsin and Badger track hopes rose with his appearance. However, he was "conned" in one subject but wrote off the deficiency a few days before the final meet. His instructor, unfortunately, forgot to notify the chairman of the athletic council and Parsons, being held out of the meet, quit Wisconsin in disgust.

Track history of Wisconsin, from 1913 to the present, actually is the success story of Coach Tom Jones who was automatically retired from the faculty last July when he reached the age of 70 years. Tom, in his 35 years of coaching at Wisconsin, produced 14 of the 15 Badger championship cross country teams, won indoor titles in 1913, 1927, 1930, and outdoor crowns in 1915, 1916, and 1931. He built up a record of 71 wins against 25 losses in outdoor meets, placing first seven times in 11 triangular meets and winning three of nine quadrangular meets. Indoors, his dual meet teams won 52 and lost only 22 meets, took first in all 16 triangular meets ever held. In cross country his teams won 70 and lost 18 dual meets.

He produced 72 individual outdoor champions and 65 indoor titlists in Western Conference competition; five of his charges won National Collegiate titles and eight more won National AAU titles.

As a fitting climax to his splendid career, Tom Jones was named to the Olympic coaching staff for the American team. Guy Sundt, assistant athletic director and assistant track coach, succeeds Jones at Wisconsin this fall.

All-Time Tennis History

Tennis is the second oldest sport at the University of Wisconsin, dating back to 1885 when a U. W. Tennis Association was formed with E. R. Johnson as president. Competition seems to be confined to inter-class matches for the first two seasons, for no reports of intercollegiate competition are available.

However, in 1887, the Intercollegiate Tennis League was formed with Beloit and Wisconsin as members, F. W. Kelly of Madison serving as the president. The two schools met three times that season, each occasion ending in a 1-1 tie. In those days, there was only one singles representative on each team and only one doubles combination each.

A year later, in 1888, Wisconsin defeated Beloit twice 2-0 and 2-0. Tennis thus continued down through the years until 1921 when it was taken out of its informal status and made an official sport. Until that turning point, Wisconsin had a sporadic schedule and sometimes limited its competitive action to

that of participating in the Western Intercollegiate Tennis Association, never finishing better than second place in team standings.

From 1921 to 1934, Wisconsin had only average success but its 1928 season record is worthy of mention. Under the direction of Bill Winterble, a Madison businessman and former Tri-State champion, the Badgers won all seven of their dual matches and claimed the dual match title of the Western Conference. However, conference titles in tennis are conferred only in the annual tournament and Wisconsin failed to place since entries were limited to one singles player and one doubles team for each school. Another highlight of that period was the fine showing of Leo Boldenweck who finished runnerup in 1927 for the singles crown. From 1934 to the present time, Wisconsin began to improve but third place in 1943 and 1948 was the best conference showing.

All-Time Golf History

Like tennis, the history of golf as a sport at the University of Wisconsin is largely an informal one until the so-called modern era beginning in the '20's.

There is evidence in the 1902 Badger that the University of Wisconsin golf club existed in 1900 with Stanley C. Hanks as president. The charming figure of a woman golfer (dress designers would swoon at her apparel now) adorned the page on which the club officers were listed but no where is it explained about a golf course, its location, if any.

By 1906, however, the sport had attained some status for it is reported that Emmett Angell was the coach and George Hewitt the captain. The Badgers, that season, finished second in the Western Inter-collegiate Golf Association meet won by Michigan. The next season, with Angell as coach and Hewitt again as captain, the Badgers played their first inter-collegiate match, losing to Chicago 8-7.

Then came a lapse until 1912 when the sport was revived, the team being captained by Bill Fitch but losing to Illinois 7-4 and 10-2 to the Maple Bluff Country Club.

In 1922, golf was placed on an official basis but no coach was selected until 1926 when Joe Steinauer (present mentor) took over. Joe, however, held the coaching responsibilities only that season giving way to Andy Leith and George Levis, until he again took over in 1932.

While the Badgers never have won a conference title in the sport, they can point to three unbeaten seasons of dual match play—1925, 1932, 1937, and 1940. A. B. C. Bock of Sheboygan, later to become state amateur champion, was the star of the 1924 and 1925 teams, "Buster" reaching the semi-finals of conference play in 1924.
