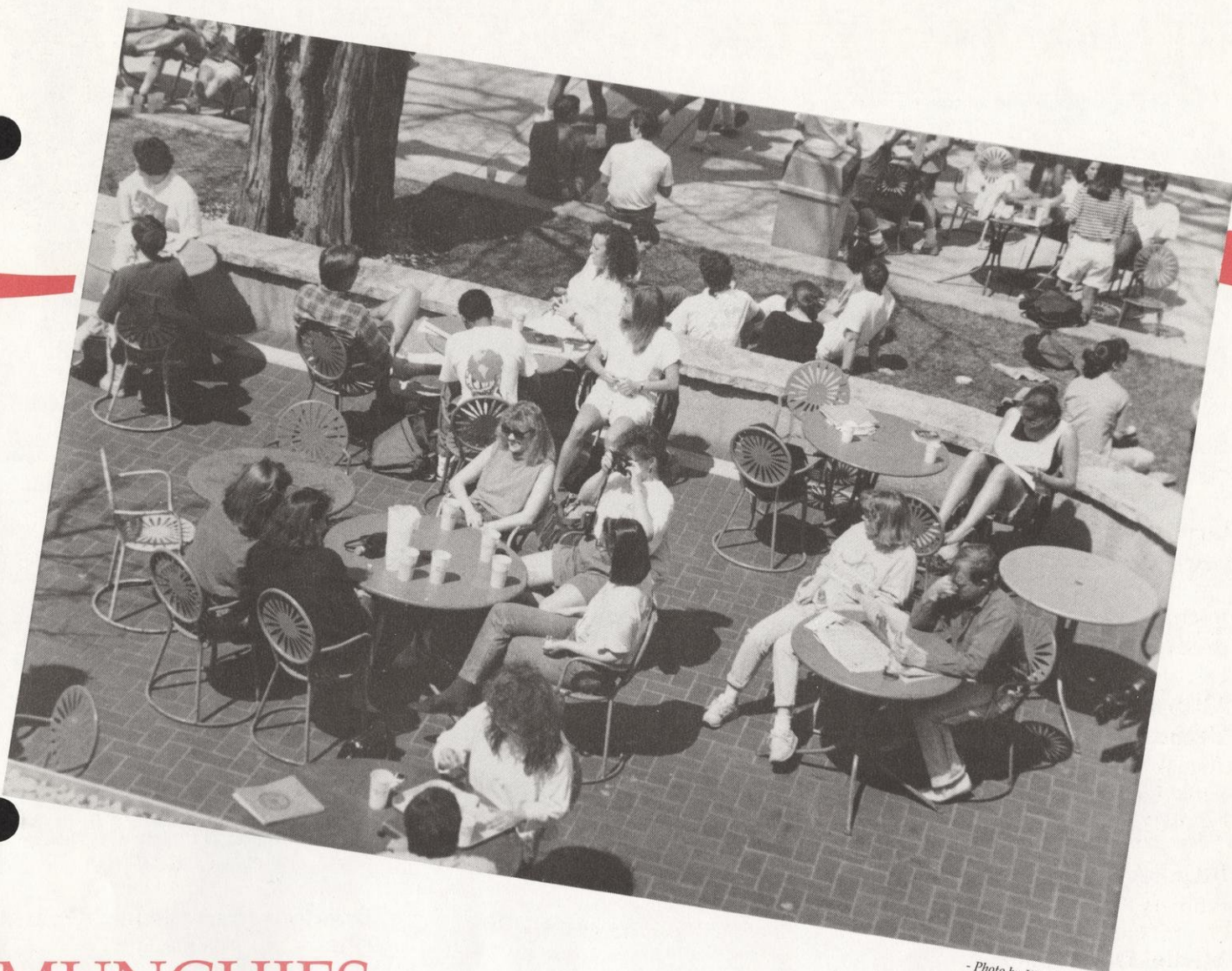

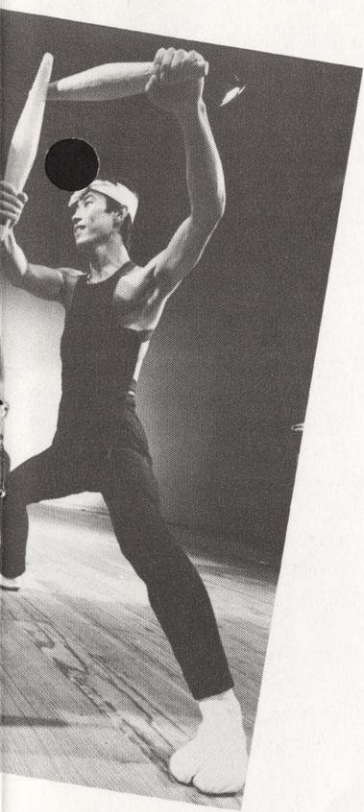

THEATER SERIES RECOGNIZED NATIONALLY

This past December, reports the Union Marketing and Promotions staff, the Wisconsin Union Concert Series was honored with the *Harold Shaw Award for Excellence in Recital Programming*. "Administered through the Association of Performing Arts Presenters, the award was established in 1985 by artist manager Harold Shaw to recognize the successful presentation of solo recital concerts, and carries a cash prize for both the concert series and for the series administrator."

"Applicants were judged on the depth and breadth of their recital programming, the degree to which the performance space suits recitals, and the success of their marketing and promotional efforts. Theater Director, Michael Goldberg, and the Union Theater were congratulated on the Concert Series' 70th anniversary. 'A list of the series recitalists since 1920 reads like a catalogue of 20th century musical titans,' read the award announcement. 'The series has an attractive setting and enthusiastic, knowledgeable audiences for both celebrated masters and emerging talents.'"

Proceeds from the award will support the Wisconsin Union Theater Program Endowment Fund.

YOUNGBLOOD

Lying in lawn chairs with their eyes closed, college students are thinking of anything other than the present. Summer break? No these students are giving blood.

On January 22, 1973, history was made on the third floor of Union South - Youngblood was opened. This life-saving organization, established and run by the combined efforts of The American Red Cross and the Wisconsin Union Directorate (WUD), is the only blood center on a university campus in the country, according to Youngblood's Mac Walker, R.N. Mac has been supervising Youngblood since the doors were opened to donors, and estimates that more than 75,000 units of blood have been donated on campus since that time.

Approximately 80% of the donors are students, the remaining 20% are One-A-Week Club members. Club members include student organizations, residence halls, university departments and university affiliated organizations. Each week, a minimum of one person representing each organization donates blood at Youngblood.

Student nurses work with two full-time registered nurses to keep the center running safely and efficiently. The students take medical histories of donors, segment tube units that are sent to

hospitals and assist with clerical work. Donor medical histories are vitally important to the Red Cross. Questions concerning AIDS are asked more than once to guarantee the safety of the Red Cross blood supply. Every unit of blood is tested for syphilis, hepatitis A and C, and the HIV antibody.

Only registered nurses actually draw the blood. Following a donation, the donor is required to remain at Youngblood for at least 15 minutes. She/he must consume two cups of liquids, and cookies are provided to restore their blood sugar level.

The blood units are stored at 68-72 degrees fahrenheit until they are sent to the American Red Cross on Sheboygan Avenue, Madison, where they are processed. The primary use is to maintain the platelette supply.

Since whole blood is useable for only 42 days, an undersupply of blood is a continuous problem. Each year 160,000 units of blood are required in the Badger Region

alone. Youngblood has a goal to collect an average of 35 pints daily. In the early part of the semester, a minimum of 30 people donate blood each day. This number decreases as the end of the year approaches and students begin studying for, and taking, final exams.

Throughout the year, various student organizations sponsor blood drives to encourage increased student participation. These campus events assist in maintaining the regional supply.

The final blood drive of the current academic year will be June 28th, in Great Hall, Memorial Union.

Youngblood welcomes donors from both inside and outside the campus community. Youngblood will reopen its doors in room 319, Union South, September 4.

1990 HOOFER SAILING CLUB YOUTH SAILING INSTRUCTION PROGRAM

This exciting program accommodates young sailors at all levels of experience. Students receive individualized attention from instructors who are experienced in teaching sailing to youth. There will be a minimum of one instructor for every three participants in the 10-12 age group, and one instructor for every four participants in the 13-17 age group. The majority of the time will be spent on the water, but alternate fun activities will be held in the event of bad weather. The 14-foot Tech Dinghy will be the primary boat used for on-the-water instruction. If time and conditions allow, participants may have the opportunity to use other sailing crafts, possibly even sailboards.

ALTERNATIVE SPRING BREAK

Wisconsin Union Directorate and the student honors committee of the College of Letters and Sciences co-sponsored an Alternative Spring Break program in March. Rather than playing in the waves and dancing on sandy beaches, 25 UW-Madison students traveled 30 hours, by van, to help people in need. Ten of the students spent their spring break in Immokalee, Florida, working with Habitat for Humanity, building homes for the poor. The other 15 students, led by Catherine Colyer, WUD Vice-President of Personnel, worked for the United Farm Workers in San Juan, Texas. The students helped migrant workers with forms for nutrition and housing programs, and they canvassed white, middle class neighborhoods with petitions supporting the California grape boycott.

The two sites were chosen for their "racially diverse communities," according to Litza Ansell, student coordinator for the Alternative Spring Break's planning committee. "The purpose of this program was to allow students to work with people from various backgrounds on a volunteer level, while becoming more culturally aware," Ansell said.

According to the UW News Service, Habitat for Humanity, whose most famous volunteers are former President Jimmy Carter and his wife Rosalyn, is an

ecumenical Christian organization devoted to building homes for the poor. The planning committee received assurances from Habitat officials that students of all faiths would be comfortable working with the group.

In a telephone interview with *The Milwaukee Journal*, Juanita Valdez-Cox, United Farm Workers director in San Juan, said she was inspired that college students would travel so far to lend support and, despite the language barrier, live as migrants do, without such conveniences as running water.

"They were one terrific group," Valdez-Cox said. "They were like an answer to our prayers down here, a big inspiration to the farm workers."

THE LITTLE RED MUG THAT COULD!



The Wisconsin Union has recently received phone calls from restaurateurs and universities across the country regarding the Union's red, recycle mug.

"What mug," you ask?

In November, the Wisconsin Union introduced a bright red mug as part of an overall plan to encourage recycling at both Union buildings. The mug is sold for \$2 at Memorial Union's first floor Deli and at Union South's Red Oak Grill. Patrons who purchase the mug receive a discount on hot beverages in all Union food service areas.

With the mug, patrons get more for less. Patrons receive a 20 percent discount on hot beverages when using the mug and get 14 ounces of hot beverage rather than the standard 12-ounce polystyrene fill. "We want people to choose to recycle and

not fill the landfills," says Memorial Union Assistant Food Service Director Paul Algiers. "The cost savings is an incentive to encourage people to recycle."

With more than 7,000 mugs sold, the response has been tremendous; and so are the environmentally positive results. The Union has experienced a 20 to 50 percent reduction in the use of polystyrene.

Since the start of the mug program there seems to be no end to the demand for mugs. "We continue to sell 50 to 70 mugs a day at Memorial Union," notes Algiers. "It's been a great surprise to us that mug sales haven't slowed." Ultimately, this means less polystyrene into area landfills - 8,000 fewer cups each week!

Other restaurateurs are looking on with positive curiosity. Inquiries about the mug and the Union's program are filtering in from local and Chicago businesses, and other universities, including UW-La Crosse, UCLA and Northwestern.
