

WHO HAS OWNED WALWORTH COUNTY?



There recently was unearthed by Beloit College students the skeleton of one of the Mound Builders, who lived in this vicinity several centuries ago. The early settlers found many evidences of these early people on Lake Geneva, Lake Como and Delavan in mounds made in the shape of animals, lizards, etc.

The Potawattomie Indians, who occupied this vicinity when the white men came had no traditions which in any way connected them to the Mound Builders. The Potawattomies were a part of that large Indian group of Algonquians, who originally lived East of Lake Huron in Canada and migrated by way of the Upper Michigan to Wisconsin.

Green Bay is celebrating this year the Tercentennial of the coming of Jean Nicolet in 1634, who claimed the region for France. During the Revolutionary War the region was nominally under British control and by the Treaty of Paris in 1783 it became a part of the United States. In 1787 Wisconsin was included in the Northwest Territory, in 1800 it became a part of the Indiana Territory and in 1818 to Michigan Territory; and in 1836 Wisconsin Territory, which included Iowa, Minnesota and portions of North and South Dakotas, was organized. In 1848 it became in its present form the thirtieth American State.

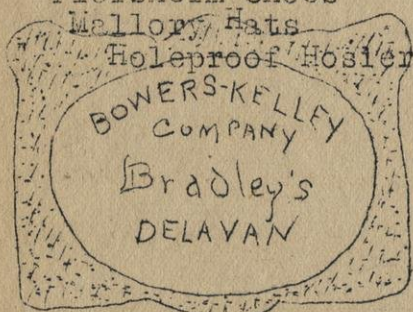
