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MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING of the BOARD OF REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

Madison, Wisconsin

Held in the Clarke Smith Room, 1820 Van Hise Hall Friday, September 7, 1973, 9:00 A.M.

President Pelisek presiding.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, Day, Dixon, Fish, Gelatt, Hales, Kopp, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, Thompson, Williams, and Zancanaro.

ABSENT: Regents Renk and Ziegler.

Upon motion by Regent Kopp, seconded by Regent Dixon, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on August 3, 1973, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

President Pelisek stated that the resolution relating to designation of former Regents as Regents Emeritus had been discussed at the last meeting.

Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Regular Board 9/7/73

Resolution 553: That all living former regents who served on The Regents of (Policy - New) the University of Wisconsin, the Board of Regents of State Universities or its predecessor Boards, and the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System be granted the status of Regent Emeritus in recognition of their service on governing boards of institutions in the University of Wisconsin System; and

> That an appropriate Regent Emeritus certificate, expressing appreciation on behalf of the Board, Faculties, Staff, Students, and Alumni, be signed by the President of the Board and sent to each former Regent. (List is <u>EXHIBIT B</u>.)

President Pelisek announced the following appointments to the Regent Committee for the selection of a Chancellor at Whitewater: Regents Kopp (chairperson), Barkla, McNamara, Pelisek, and Ziegler.

President Pelisek announced the following appointments to the Regent Committee for Provost for University Outreach: Regents Williams (chairperson), Lavine, Renk, Pelisek, and McNamara.

President Pelisek introduced Dr. Barbara Thompson, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, attending her first meeting of the Board, and Chancellor Werner Baum, Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

President Pelisek stated that he was honoring a request from a Madison Campus organization, the Open Centers Committee, for a presentation regarding the closing of the Afro-American Center and the Native American Center, and he introduced Ms. Donna Tamanaha Miller, of the Open Centers Committee, who made the following statement:

"In view of the University's unilateral action to close the Afro-American Center and the Native American Center--and outright refusal to provide funds or facilities for Asian American and Spanish American students, in direct opposition to the stated aims of the University of Wisconsin and the State of Wisconsin, and its legislature, the apparent misappropriation of funds, violations of federal laws, and other procedural irregularities, we ask that the Board of Regents review its decision concerning the closing of the Centers and consider the wants and needs of students and citizens of all colors. "In addition, the Open Centers' Committee requests that the Regents provide us with written, documented answers to the questions below:

> "1. In 1971, the University of Wisconsin was granted \$6.9 million dollars by the state and federal governments specifically earmarked for minority students, not including financial aid and assistance. What happened to this money? How much money was there in 1972 and 1973, and how was it used?

> "2. If according to the Budget Bureau, the funds for minority students not including financial aid have increased by \$4.2 million over the \$11 million last year, why does the University insist that minority funds have been cut back?

"3. The minority students on campus have already studied their problems and can explain quite well what they are. Why then does the University insist on setting up new investigating programs that waste more, cost more, and duplicate work already done?

"4. The new University budget provides for the establishment of a Native American Studies Program. What has happened to that program and the money?

"5. The document that the UW submitted to the state legislature for the minority and disadvantaged students section of the budget stated the University's intent to continue all effective programs for minority students and spoke in very high terms of increasing and improving the University's programs and facilities for minority students. How can that be reconciled with the closing of a project that is clearly of great importance to minority students?

"6. Was the closing of the Centers considered to be a result of the Regents Resolution presented by Regent Hales at the December 1972 Regents meeting?

"7. Was that the intent of the resolution as proposed by Regent Hales?

"8. If that was the intent, why wasn't the plan for closing the Centers made public at that time?

"9. The actual plan for closing the Centers was completed and submitted to the central administration on April 1, 1973. Was the legislature informed of that fact? If not, then why not?

"10. Does it not seem then, in view of the legislature's approval of funds for projects of this description, and the University's statement to the legislature that such programs were a high priority, that the legislature's mandate is being not only ignored but violated. "11. Why won't the University make public the documentation and data for the report on minority programs, submitted April 1, 1973 which 'evaluated' and chose to close the center?

"12. We request the right to examine all material used in that evaluation.

"13. Why was that evaluation of programs for minority students not carried out by minority students?

"14. The University Administration has received more than 150 letters from White citizens, taxpayers and organizations testifying to their use of the Afro-American Center. How can the University Administration continue to claim that the Center is a segregated facility?

"15. The UW Administration has given out to the press, the story that the Afro-American Center doesn't contain a single book. The entire second floor of the library is devoted to a library. In view of that:

- a. How many members of the Board of Regents have visited either the Afro-American or the Native American Center, and how often?
- b. How many members of the Board of Regents have attended any of the programs sponsored by the Centers, and how often?
- c. How much effort have the Board of Regents made to making contact with the minority students on campus or any students of this campus? How many hours a week is this contact made, and by whom?

"16. Since the University Administration has already finalized its plans for closing the centers that currently exist and for not opening any new ones, by April 1, why did the Administration continue to hold out to La Raza Unida the possibility that a Chicano/ Boricua Center might be set up?

"17. Since the University's plans for closing the Centers was already on April 1, why did the Administration wait through all of the remaining spring semester and the whole summer semester to make their announcement when no students were on campus? Was it because they knew that the students of all races supported the Centers?

"18. If the Affirmative Action Guidelines (Revised Executive Order #4) requiring <u>all</u> federal contractors to develop a written affirmative action program to actively bring minorities into the

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University became effective on December 1971, why has the Central Administration failed to write one yet? Why has the University failed to actively recruit, promote, and increase the salaries of minority employees? Why has the University failed to recognize the need for corrective action for relief of the members of an affected class who, by virtue of past discrimination, continue to suffer the present effects of that discrimination. This objective along with good faith efforts are necessary in order to truly provide equal opportunity. Procedures, without effort to make them work as has happened at this University, are meaningless; and effort undirected by specific and meaningful action is inadequate.

"19. Why is it that this University has not allowed one Spanishspeaking American to receive a Ph.D.? Why has the Medical School only allowed two Spanish-speaking students to enter and not granted one single degree to Latinos in its entire history? Why have the Law and Nursing Schools not actively recruited and worked with minority students?

"20. Why is there no La Raza Studies Program at any campus in the state?

"21. Why hasn't the University given any concern or attention at all to Asian American students?"

Mr. Pedro Delnido, of the Latin Action Council, Incorporated, then made the following statement: "We, the Latin Action Council, come here today to express support for the minority students on campus who are now fighting for their survival. Many of the questions asked here today by the students have been asked by us many times before. One example is the question of the \$6.9 million allocated for minority programs in 1971. We have been requesting the University to tell us what happened to this money since February of this year; Senator Douglas LaFollette has asked you; the Joint Finance Committee of the State Legislature has asked you several months ago, but there is still no answer.

"Another example is why you have not developed an Affirmative Action Policy even though the Federal government required you to develop one in 1971 in. order to have the University actively bring all minorities into its work force at all levels, to correct for past segregation.

"We, the Latin Action Council, would like to have prompt answers to these questions and others which the minority students raised. We also would like to know why the University has ignored the recommendations of the Latin students and faculty members to have La Raza (Chicano-Puerto Rican) studies and a Chicano-Puerto Rican Center and instead decided to spend even more money to create positions which will duplicate the work already done by the students and faculty. We urge you to reverse your decision, now, and follow the recommendations of the students because it is the only path which will lead to true integration and acceptance of all the different caltures of this country." President Pelisek directed the Chancellor of the Madison Campus and his staff to prepare appropriate answers to the specific questions set forth in the above statements.

President Pelisek pointed out that a statement on the employment of minorities had been issued by the President and by each of the Chancellors, and that these statements are available as public documents for anyone wishing to study them.

REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

President Weaver introduced the Acting Vice Chancellor of the Center System, Professor John Meggers.

President Weaver presented the report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers and of Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record for Chapter 36 and Chapter 37 Institutions:

Regent Gelatt moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 554: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record, relating to Chapter 36 and Chapter 37 Institutions (<u>EXHIBIT A</u> attached), be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

President Weaver requested Joseph W. Wiley, Assistant to the President, to report on the conference and workshop being planned on Native American problems and programs to be held in River Falls later this month.

Mr. Wiley made the following statement: "On September 27 and 28, the affirmative action office in Central Administration, in collaboration with the River Falls Campus and a non-profit organization, the Wisconsin Indian Opportunity, Inc., is sponsoring an Indian workshop. This is conceived as an opportunity to provide information about the problems, the concerns, the goals, the current status of Indians in Wisconsin and the United States and is designed as an information session as well as an advice session in which affirmative action officers, information directors, admissions directors, registrars, the Higher Educational Aids Board personnel, officers from the Department of Public Instruction, recruiters, counselors and academic staffs on the various campuses in history, sociology, anthropology, native american studies will be invited to participate. "We are trying to arrange for about 150-175 participants. The program, we believe, will offer, over a period of two days, a number of things that should be of interest to all concerned. We will have four main speakers, including the Director of Indian Studies from one of the University of Minnesota campuses. We will have Ada Deer, who is widely known in her efforts for the Menomonie people; Rosemary Christenson, who is a doctoral candidate; and Robert Bennett from the University of New Mexico, as our featured speakers. These persons are all native Indians and have not only a great deal of professional perspective but also the ethnic experience of being Indians.

"In addition to the main speakers, we will have a number of presentations by university and state organizations whose programs benefit native Americans. They will give information to us about ways in which their programs are trying to be responsive and to the extent they aren't responsive. In addition, there will be an Indian feast, featuring, as I understand, all Indian dishes, including some roast buffalo, if we can get our hands on it. There will be a dancing exhibition of tribal dancing from a group in northern Wisconsin. In addition to that there will be an art exhibit from the Indians in Phoenix, Arizona, and art and crafts exhibits from local Indians which will be available for sale.

"We see it as an unusual type of program and I believe something that has not been sponsored by the University, and something which, I think, will bring the University into its proper posture of being responsive to minority problems, particularly when they affect a group that we have so many of, as we have Indians here in the State of Wisconsin. Each of you will be receiving, in the next few days, a letter giving written details about the program and a tentative agenda for the program with a list of prospective invitees. This letter will include a form that you can return indicating whether or not you will be able to attend. I would personally like to encourage you, if you are free on those days, to attend part or all of the sessions."

Regent Kopp requested that a formal invitation be issued to Mr. Anthony Wise of Hayward, who has a tremendous interest in the Indian population in the state.

REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Dixon.

Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 555: That the personnel actions taken by the President of the University of Wisconsin System under Resolution #80, since those approved by the Regents on August 3, 1973, be approved.

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Regent Dixon reported that the faculty personnel guidelines proposed by the University Faculty Council and TAUWF have been circulated to the Chancellors and Central Administration, and that the next step is to designate a subcommittee of Chancellors and legal staff to meet with the faculty committee to try to achieve consensus on a document to bring to the Board of Regents. He noted that, on points of disagreement that persist, the Regents would be presented with alternatives to assist them in determining the final policy.

Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Kopp, and it was voted:

Resolution 556: That Resolution 80, approved February 11, 1972, be rescinded, (Policy - and that the following resolution in lieu thereof be approved: Revision)

That the President of the University of Wisconsin System be authorized to approve, on behalf of the Regents, personnel actions involving staff in or for positions other than central vice presidents, provost, unit chancellors, and vice provosts (chancellor); and that the President be authorized to delegate such authority, with the following provisions:

That, prior to authorizing recruitment to fill any academic staff position for which the planned rate of pay exceeds the maximum annual salary equivalent in Group 5 of the State Executive Pay Plan, the President shall furnish the Board with a description of the position and a justification of the salary range assigned to it. Unless a Regent requests that the appointee be considered by the Board, the President may authorize recruitment and report its subsequent accomplishment to the Board; and

That, prior to approving annual merit increases for academic staff whose rate of pay exceeds that stipulated above, the President shall review the list of such increases with the Board of Regents and obtain its approval.

Regent Dixon reported that, in the Education Committee meeting on the previous day, during the discussion of the General Guideline Statement on "Copyright, Ownership and Use of Instructional Materials," Professor Anatole Beck, Madison Campus, argued that adoption of the policy would be a great departure from the traditional concept of the role of a professor as an independent intellectual from within the University, rather than as an employee as in business or industry; and he suggested deferral of the matter until the next meeting.

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Regent Dixon noted that the proposal was the result of more than a year of study, involving legal staff, including a specialist in copyright law; and that the proposal was consistent with the practice of other major midwestern universities. Regent Dixon also noted that Professor J. Ray Bowen, UW-Madison, stated his support of the proposed guidelines. Regent Dixon reported that the proposed resolution had been approved by the Education Committee with the understanding that Professor Beck be invited to produce an amendment, when he can document its having been adopted and used by a prestigious university.

Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 557: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, (Policy - New) the General Guideline Statement on "Copyright, Ownership and Use of Instructional Materials" (<u>EXMIBIT C</u> attached), dated September 4, 1973 (revised), providing that certain materials may be copyrighted in the name of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, be approved.

Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 558: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the Mission Statement for the Joint VTAE-UW System Committee on Continuing Education, the recommendations for coordinating VTAE System and UW System continuing education activities, and the listed responsibilities of the Joint Committee on Continuing Education, as specified in the May 21, 1973 Report (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), including the initiation of regional councils involving VTAE local districts, UW Institutions, and UW Extension district staffs, be approved.

Regent Dixon reported that, in the Education Committee meeting on the previous day, the discussion centered on Senior Vice President Smith's report of August 24 relating to mission development and program review, indicating that the masters and specialist programs on the various campuses are to be reviewed through a program audit process, with faculty and campus input; and that it is hoped that the preliminary mission formulations can be brought to the Board at the October or November meeting. It was noted that, among the unresolved questions, was that of the southern tier of units, including Platteville, Madison, Whitewater, Parkside, and Milwaukee.

He reported that alternate schedules for public hearings on mission statements had been reviewed and that a Saturday session had been arranged at the suggestion of Regent Thompson. It was pointed out that several Regents were expected to attend each hearing and that arrangements for the sessions would be

made by the Central Administration. President Pelisek pointed out that the presiding officer at each meeting will be the Chairman of the Education Committee, the Vice Chairman of the Education Committee, or the President of the Board, depending upon who was at what particular meeting.

Regent Dixon moved approval of the following schedule for hearings on institutional mission statements, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

5. In addition, one hearing to accommodate those unable to be present at other scheduled hearings will be held on Saturday, December 15, 1973, in Madison from 10:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M.

Regent Williams moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine:

That this Board pledge itself to study all of the material before making judgment on graduate or undergraduate programs and that we pledge ourselves to study this material from each institution in the System.

Regent Williams stated that, in the Committee meeting on the previous day, she had made a motion asking the Committee to recommend to the Board that the action of August 3 be rescinded, due to the fact that, when the working paper that was approved at that meeting was voted on, she did not believe it was the intention of the Board to commit itself definitely to sub-clusters. All the material that has come out since, on the interpretations of the action of the Board on August 3, led her to believe that the Board is committed to that course of action by virtue of it having been reported to the press that way, by virtue of material having been sent to the campuses, and the campuses having been asked to start planning. She stated that she felt that each of the former state universities is a special mission institution and that titling various institutions or sub-grouping them tends to degrade those institutions.

Regent Williams continued that a really strong system is made up of very, very strong units administered by strong administrators. Regent Williams stated that she felt we ought to start without the process of imagery, with helping the public to understand that we are not committed to any particular course of action; and that we are going to gather material and study it before we make a commitment. She stated that, from the public response, the public thinks we are committed to a certain course of action, and that she did not believe that had been intended. Regent Williams stated that we oughtoto study graduate programs in comparison to certain standards; that these standards should be based on excellence, efficiency, and need; and that the Board should look at all programs based on those standards.

Regent Gelatt stated that his understanding of the motion was that it is a pledge to examine carefully all of the possibilities so far as elimination of low-priority programs and duplicative programs are concerned, and that he was in favor in general of that statement; but that, if we indeed have to investigate every single program in every single institution as a Board, he felt that would be an impractical goal--one that would prevent any response to the public, the Legislature, and the Governor's mandate that we as a Board make some very difficult decisions in order that the cost of higher education to the people in the State of Wisconsin increase at a much more moderate rate than during the past seven or eight years. Regent Gelatt stated that he was asking for a little clarification of the motion, as to whether or not we will do as good a job as we can in looking at the facts in order to make a decision, or is the motion to look at the facts in such detail that it will be difficult to arrive at a decision within a reasonable period of time.

President Pelisek stated the Chair would interpret the sense of the motion to mean that we will do our homework on this issue with an open mind, and he questioned whether that is something that reeds formal action.

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Regent Lavine stated that Senior Vice President Smith had been very clear when sending out material in saying that this is the starting point, this is the first look at what we have to face--here is something to get on the drawing board to talk about.

Regent Dixon stated that he felt that he had a very open mind on the matter, and that, after reading approximately 1,000 letters from every corner of the state, he was extremely proud of the citizenry, the faculties, and the administrators throughout the state for coming forward and expressing themselves. What had been accomplished through the August 3 action was to elicit a very positive response in the "good old American way."

President Pelisek stated that what concerned him about the substance of the resolution is that it speaks of the Board approaching the issue with an open mind and the Board examining all the alternatives--that by taking an affirmative action on a motion of that nature, it somehow implies that there is a contrary view that is being voted down. He stated that it is quite clear that everyone on the Board and everyone in the Administration had an open mind on the issue, and all the possibile alternatives will be examined before a final decision is reached. He stated that it is somewhat unnecessary and almost selfdefeating to adopt a formal resolution that we will have an open mind.

Senior Vice President Smith pointed out that the action already taken by the Regents in ACMS #1 makes clear that the priority on program audit was at the master's and specialist level and is systemwide; that there has never been any indication or inclination that this is other than systemwide. He also noted that ACMS #1 says that we are committed to a review of all programs, undergraduate and doctoral level, professional level; but that, obviously, one takes these in segments. He continued that the significance of that document was not that it put a constraint on what was being reviewed, but simply that this is the place where we start. He noted that ACMS #2 states very clearly that what the Administration has been directed to do is to explore and bring back to the Board recommendations and the accompanying reasons, options and alternatives, which is the process in which we are now engaged.

President Weaver stated that no one in the Administration has asked the Board to be anything but open minded and that we are trying to put forward some tentative ideas for the focusing of discussion. He stated that data will be placed before the members of the Board on every subject that they wish to examine, and that to pass a motion that would suggest the contrary would be unfortunate.

Regent McNamara stated that it was healthy that we clear the air as to our purposes in the presentation of this paper, but that he agreed with the President that admonishing ourselves to look at this with an open mind is hardly the subject for formal motion by the Board. If we could develop open minds by motions, we could indeed solve a lot of problems. Regent Solberg stated that, by innuendo, the motion implies that the only time we are going to do our job we are going to have to have a motion that we do it right. He continued that the motion suggests that we are not doing good work, that we have to be charged each time we take up a subject; and for that reason, he felt the motion inappropriate.

Regent Day stated that he was concerned about the term used both yesterday and today that somehow, if some campuses as a result of these hearings should be designated that their primary responsibility is in the undergraduate field, that is degrading; and that he did not feel this to be appropriate. Regent Day stated that he had made a preliminary inquiry to find out the status of the private colleges in the state; that there are eighteen accredited fouryear private colleges; and that only three or four offer master's degrees, including Marquette, Cardinal Stritch, Lawrence, and Beloit. He pointed out that all eighteen institutions offer teachers training, and that up to 25% of those that are admitted get their teacher's certificate.

Regent Day stated that, with outstanding private schools in this state whose primary function is at the baccalaureate level, to say that any University of Wisconsin unit having their function at the baccalaureate level would thus be degrading is not a valid assumption. He stated that he wished to go on record as opposing that as a description of a college whose primary responsibility is at the bachelor's level, because that would describe practically every private institution in the state and elsewhere.

Regent Williams stated that the motion was needed to reassure people in the State of Wisconsin--that we as a Board sometimes need to communicate more clearly what we are doing.

Regent Kopp stated that the whole problem is one of misinterpretation and misunderstanding. He stated that he wished to make it crystal clear that all we did when we met in August was to ask the Administration to make a proposal or two, which was done. He continued that the public misinterpreted that, and got the impression that we had tentatively approved it, and that it was going to be finally approved today. He continued that nothing could be further from the truth--we are going to have hearings where we are going to consider the matter, we are going to consider various alternatives, and we may accept part of the proposals or we may accept none of them. He continued that to say it is necessary to have a motion indicating we are going to consider everything carefully before we act pre-supposes other types of procedures.

Regent Lavine stated that his purpose in seconding the motion was not to cast any question on the Board or the Administration, and he agreed with Regent Day that there is nothing degrading about an undergraduate institution; but that he was concerned about the public's misunderstanding and the rumors floating about. He continued that it appeared to him that this discussion had clarified these points. Regent Lavine stated that the possibility had been laid on the table that we might be questioning ourselves or our staff in this process; and for that reason, having seconded the motion, he would vote against it because he did not want that implication.

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Regent Williams moved that the wording of the motion be changed to read as follows:

That this Board reaffirm its intention to study all of the material before making judgment on graduate or undergraduate programs, and that we reaffirm out intention to study this material from each institution in the System.

President Pelisek requested Regent Neshek to withhold his call for the question.

Regent Hales stated that he would like to have some response from the Council of Chancellors as to their attitude on this matter. Regent Barkla stated that she could see no harm in reassuring the public on this particular issue at this particular time, that each person that had contacted her was upset because they assumed that certain programs were going to be cut.

Senior Vice President Smith stated that Central Administration has files on responses from all Chancellors, and they are available to the members of the Board.

Regent Hales stated that he had been led to believe that there is concern on the part of the Chancellors that very little of the input of the whole process is coming from them; that something of such a drastic nature certainly affects them; and that we should certainly have some input from them.

President Weaver stated that all the Chancellors were invited by the August 10 memorandum to have maximum input, and that he has received volumes of material from them.

President Pelisek declared the motion out of order, stating that he did not believe the subject germane for Regent action and that the motion was far too indefinite for any specific action.

Regent Lavine withdrew his second, and the motion by Regent Williams was then seconded by Regent Barkla.

Regent Day moved that the motion be tabled, and President Pelisek responded that the Chair had ruled that the motion was out of order.

Regent Fish moved that the ruling of the Chair be challenged and the motion was seconded by Regent Kopp.

The motion to overrule the Chair failed on a roll call vote, with Regents Barkla, Dixon, Fish, Hales, Kopp, Lavine, Neshek, and Williams voting "Aye" (8), and with Regents Day, Gelatt, McNamara, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, Thompson, and Zancanaro voting "No" (8).

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Regent Dixon reported that, in the meeting of the Committee on the previous day, the following possible task force assignments to the Board of Visitors had been discussed: (a) study of the possibility of enrollment ceilings in the context of freedom of choice concept; (b) an invitation from Acting Chancellor Meggers of the Center System to come to the Center System institutions to become familiar with them; and (c) input from the Board of Visitors regarding the role of the Centers in light of pending System developments.

Regent Dixon reported that Senior Vice President Smith had announced the composition of the task force for developing the plans, policies, operating protocol, and budget requirements for the development of the Regents Statewide University as follows: Chairman, E. Nelson Swinerton, Planning Director of RSU located at UW-Green Bay; David Cole, UW Center-Baraboo; Richard Davis, UW-Milwaukee; Wesley Face, UW-Stout; John Klus; UW-Extension; Richard Rasmussen, UW-LaCrosse; Wilson Thiede, UW-Madison; Dorothy Wentorf, UW-Oshkosh; Martha Worthington, UW-Eau Claire; and Adolph Wilburn, Central Administration, ex officio.

Regent Dixon reported that the following appointments had been presented to the Education Committee at their meeting on the previous day:

> (a) Dr. Thomas W. Walterman has been appointed Campus Dean, Rock County Center, Janesville, effective on or about September 1, 1973, at an annual salary of \$21,200.

(b) John Meggers has been appointed Acting Chancellor of the Center System, at the present Chancellor's salary, with the departure of Durward Long. He will continue until a Vice Provost is named.

(c) Kenneth D. Oliver, Southwest Missouri State University, has accepted the Deanship of the Waukesha County Center, effective on or about September 15, 1973.

(d) William G. Davis has been appointed Associate Vice Chancellor for Health Sciences, UW-Madison, effective as of September 1, 1973.

Regent Hales inquired as to the possibility of the Law School on the Madison Campus losing its accreditation. Chancellor Young responded that the Law School is not in any danger of losing its accreditation, but the American Bar Association and other accrediting agencies have changed their accrediting procedures and there are different classes of law schools. He continued that,

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if you say you are "first class", they have a very high standard; and we are in a position where we think we are first class. He stated that, when the accrediting agency was here the last time, they suggested that we pay law professors more than other professors, that we should correct our faculty-student ratio, and spend more money on the Law School. Chancellor Young stated that we have put extra money in the Law School and, at the same time, we have been increasing the faculty. While the Law School does have too high a ratio of students to faculty, we are working to correct that situation; and that we need to do something about further strengthening the Law School. In response to a question, Chancellor Young stated that teaching assistants are used to help other students in legal writing.

> (The meeting recessed at 10:35 A.M., and reconvened at 10:50 A.M.)

REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Neshek.

Regent Neshek noted that the total gifts and grants accepted to date for this fiscal year is approximately \$47 million compared with approximately \$34 million for the similar period last year, and that student aid receipts total approximately \$16,700,00 this year, compared with \$15,500,000 last year. He called attention to the grant of \$4 million included from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, an increase of \$245,000 over the previous year.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted:

Resolution 559: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts and grants for the Chapter 37 Institutions, and the gifts and grants for the Chapter 36 Institutions, listed in the statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), be accepted and the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to sign the agreements; and that the Federal contracts listed therein be approved, ratified, and confirmed. President Pelisek introduced Representative Marlin Schneider of Wisconsin Rapids, a member of the Legislative Joint Finance Committee.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

Resolution 560: That the bequest of the late Bertha Giller, Madison, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Bertha Giller, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin. (133-3832)

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted:

Resolution 561: That the bequest of the late Andrew J. Snder, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, to the University of Wisconsin at Madison be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Andrew J. Snyder, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin. (133-3832)

Regent Neshek reported that the Business and Finance Committee suggested that the Board of Visitors be assigned, as a task, the investigation, coordination, and improvement of the bequest program for the University System.

Regent Neshek stated that the following resolution relating to guidelines for expense funds is the result of a joint effort by the University staff and the Department of Administration to develop procedures consistent with an Attorney General's opinion dated March 5, 1970, which stated in part, "it is my opinion that the Board may create an expense account for the several presidents for such designated purposes as the Board deems necessary to carry out the proper

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functions of the State Universities"; but that no Board action had been taken to list the designated purposes.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

Resolution 562: That, upon recommendation of the President of the Univer-(Policy - New) sity of Wisconsin System, the Guidelines for Use of System and Campus Allocations for Official Functions and Related Activities (EXHIBIT D attached) be approved.

REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 563: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the State Laboratory of Hygiene Building be named The William D. Spovall Building.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted:

Resolution 564: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-LaCrosse, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Campus School at UW-LaCrosse be named Thomas Morris Hall.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Williams:

Resolution 565: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-River Falls, and the President, University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for Administration be authorized to sign a proposed agreement with the Tri County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (Dunn, Pierce and St. Croix Counties) for use of the UW-River Falls Johnson Hall, 4th Floor North living unit, as a Halfway House facility, subject to University of Wisconsin System Legal Counsel approval of adequate liability protection. Chancellor Field pointed out that Johnson Hall was designed for 296 spaces and that approximately 150 spaces are presently occupied. He noted that the students that live there know about the experiment and have indicated they are willing and happy about the experiment.

Regent Fish pointed out that Johnson Hall is on the extreme edge of the campus complex, and that the proposed lease is quite a protective one, as far as the University is concerned. He stated the Committee believed it was the type of activity that the University and institutions in the state could well adapt itself to.

Regent Barkla pointed out that the maximum use of the fourth floor would be for eighteen people living there, which would limit the size of the program.

The question was put on Resolution 565, and it was voted.

With respect to the following resolution, relating to leasing of a portion of the Steiner Hall Dormitory, Regent Fish pointed out that the dormitory is on the extreme edge of the campus, the location least desirable from the campus standpoint; and the lease will provide sufficient revenue to meet amortization costs.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 566: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor at UW-Stevens Point and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for Administration be authorized to sign a proposed agreement with Childeda Institute, a division of Camp Childa, Inc., a non-profit organization, for lease of the Steiner Hall dormitory located at 1319 Fremont St., Stevens Point, for the period commencing September 7, 1973 and ending June 30, 1974, for the sum of \$43,700.

Regent Fish stated that the members of the Committee had commended Central Administration and the campuses for finding creative utilizations of space of this nature. He pointed out that the dormitory situation is quite good systemwide, but where there are vacancies, such utilization for the benefit of the state, the community, and the University is clearly to everyone's advantage.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

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Resolution 567: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-Parkside and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans, bid and construct the Physical Plant Building at UW-Parkside at a total project budget of \$521,100 to be financed from General Obligation Bonding.

President Pelisek requested that each of the committee chairmen convey to him the results of the discussions on the assignments to the Board of Visitors, so that he may pass the information on to the Chairman of the Board of Visitors.

Regent Fish reported that all the buildings in the capital building program are roughly on schedule. Mr. Warren Exo advised that the Building Commission approved a motion which provided funds to proceed with the planning for the conversion of a dormitory for the Adult Education Center on the Madison Campus, with the proviso that the University come back in the next meeting of the Commission to affirm its commitment to locating the program on this campus in comparison with other possibilities.

Regent McNamara moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro:

Resolution 568: That the earlier decision that the Adult Education Facility be located on the Madison Campus be reaffirmed.

Regent Lavine inquired as to the rationale offered to the Building Commission for locating the activity in Madison when there is vacant dormitory space elsewhere.

Regent McNamara responded that, among other things, the labor education program, which has been on the Madison Campus for almost 50 years, was the first labor education program in the United States conducted by any university and is considered one of the best in the world. Regent McNamara pointed out that Madison is the only campus that has the staff, facilities, the tradition, and a number of other things required for the operation of the facility. He also noted that the site which has been under consideration is the closest to the new Medical Center and would be available for additional adult education programs related to medicine. He pointed out that the facility is used by teacher's groups, professional groups, business groups, and other cultural groups, making it necessary that it be located on the Madison Campus.

Regent Lavine stated that, in listening to the report of the Commission, they seemed to indicate that it was simply a structure of concrete and steel, with beds, which could be anywhere in the state and had no relation to any academic programs.

The question was put on Resolution 568, and it was voted.

Regent Fish stated that the City of Platteville is having a problem with their sewage disposal plant being severely taxed by sources which they say are unknown, but are not University sources; and that, to make their sewage disposal plant work effectively, they have a requirement for a sludge disposal area which would require about 3.1 acres of land owned by the University. Regent Fish noted that the property is on the extreme edge of the campus, has been discussed with the environmental impact group at the University, and that the City Manager at Platteville had appeared before the Physical Planning and Development Committee. He stated that it is hoped that, in approximately one year but more probably two years, the problem will be completely corrected, and the property returned to the University. Regent Fish stated that provisions in the agreement provide for the maintenance of the top soil, probably the enrichment of the top soil, the leveling of the land, the appointment of a committee to evaluate the presence of odor, and what steps will need to be taken in that respect.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Kopp, and it was voted:

Resolution 569: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-Platteville, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Chancellor of UW-Platteville be authorized to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the City of Platteville to allow temporary use of approximately three acres of University property in connection with the emergency situation facing the City's waste water treatment plant, in accordance with and pursuant to the official request received from the City of Platteville, and with the understanding that the property will be restored to its original state by the City by no later than two years from the beginning date of the agreement.

Regent Sandin noted, in the progress report on the Madison Campus projects, that we are in the preliminary drawing stage on the Engineering-Physical Science Building, which will be located in the area where we now have outpatient housing for patients in the hospital; and that, when necessary, she hoped substitute facilities would be made available.

UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

In response to a question by Regent Williams as to a report from the Council of Chancellors, President Pelisek pointed out that the Council, at this point, is without formal organizational structure, and therefore, have no spokesman. He stated that this will be remedied at an early date in order that we can have that input.

> (The meeting recessed into Executive Session at 11:28 AM., to consider personnel matters.)

(The meeting was reconvened at 11:46 A.M.)

President Pelisek announced the following resolutions had been approved in Executive Session:

- Resolution 570: That Robert Polk be designated Executive Vice Chancellor, UW-Ospkosh, in addition to his Central Administration duties, at no change in salary.
- Resolution 571: That Lawrence G. Crowley be appointed Dean of the Medical School and Professor of Surgery, Center for Health Sciences, University of Wisconsin-Madison, beginning October 1, 1973, on a part-time basis, at an annual salary of \$38,500 plus 56% CPP supplement.

The meeting adjourned at 11:48 A.M.



UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN SYSTEM

General Guideline Statement

Copyright, Ownership and Use of Instructional Materials

The following guidelines provide that certain materials may be copyrighted in the name of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System.

These guidelines are an effort to bring into focus some of the underlying issues involved in the ownership and copyrighting of instructional materials. This is necessary because the University, with greater frequency, may have a direct interest in certain instructional materials because substantial public resources have been used in their creation and production or because a faculty member contracted with the University specifically to develop the materials. An example of this would be a written agreement between the University and the faculty member with the specific, stated intention that a video-taped lecture series with a published course outline and bibliography would be produced at University expense.

These guidelines do not assert a University property interest in materials which result from the activities of faculty members in the pursuit of their traditional teaching, research, and scholarly activities. These materials, including theses, scholarly articles, journal articles, research bulletins, monographs, and books are implicit in the faculty member's role as a faculty member and should be contrasted with materials produced pursuant to an explicit agreement where the faculty member acts under contractual arrangements to produce copyrightable materials.

Resolution of the interests of the University and of the faculty member must be on a case-by-case basis, applying the principles and considerations of these guidelines.

The following types of material are among those which may now, or in the near future, be subject to copyright:

Books, texts, glossaries, bibliographies, study guides, laboratory manuals, syllabi, tests, etc.
Lectures, musical or dramatic compositions, and unpublished scripts.
Films, film strips, charts, transparencies, and other visual aids.
Video and audio tapes and cassettes.
Live video or audio broadcasts.
Programmed instructional materials.
Computer programs.
Other materials.

These materials may be produced or developed by the faculty and staff under varying circumstances:

- (1) No University support or involvement;
- (2) Minimal University support and involvement (such as the use of laboratories and/or equipment), but with no released time (i.e. from assigned University duties);
- (3) Substantial University support and involvement and/or release time with the expectation that copyrightable instructional materials will result;

(4) "Work-for-hire" or as an assigned duty;

(5) Direct support from an extramural sponsor.

It is the policy of the University that copyrightable materials produced as stated in (1) and (2) above belong solely to the author(s), artist(s), or other creator(s).

In situations where the interested parties expect copyrightable materials to evolve, the creation of a written agreement shall be considered. In the absence of a written agreement, the rights to scholarly, research or instructional materials are assumed to lie with the author(s), artist(s), or other creator(s). Materials produced with substantial University support or during released time (as in (3) above) shall be the subject of a written understanding or agreement between the author(s), artist(s), or other creator(s), and the Chancellor or his designee, that equitably determines copyright and ownership rights. If the University choses not to copyright materials to which it has a right, the faculty member(s) may do so in his own name if he/she wishes. This latter situation will apply to the vast majority of regular scholarly and research publications of the academic staff which are part of their normal academic activities.

When the production of copyrightable materials is a primary purpose of employment, a written "work-for-hire" agreement shall be executed. Fair payment shall be made to the creator(s), for which the University shall receive all rights to the material and receive all royalties and fees. When such materials are produced as an assigned duty, the University shall own all rights and receive all royalties and fees, except where a contrary agreement has been reached between the creator(s) and his/her administrative head.

Whenever copyrightable materials are produced with extramural support, as stated in (5) above, the agreement with the extramural sponsor shall determine the copyright and ownership rights of the parties. Additional guidelines on specific types of materials will be issued by Central Administration of the UW System as needed. Guidelines for Use of System and Campus Allocations for Official Functions and Related Activities

Background: The State Department of Administration has recommended that the University of Wisconsin System adopt a policy covering use of funds allocated to the University of Wisconsin System President and the executive head of each unit for official functions and related activities. This recommendation is a result of an Attorney General's Opinion dated March 5, 1970, which addressed this matter as it regarded the former Wisconsin State Universities System. The Attorney General's Opinion stated, "It is my opinion that the Board may create an expense account for the several presidents for such designated purposes as the Board deems necessary to carry out the proper functions of the State Universities". The Board of the former Wisconsin State Universities, at that time, passed a resolution authorizing an Expense Fund for the System Director and University Presidents. However, a resolution to allow for individual Expense Funds for the former University of Wisconsin Chancellors was never proposed. A systemwide policy should be developed which establishes Expense Funds for the System President and the executive head of each unit. Such a policy should not only help to insure that all expenditures are appropriate and meet the various audit tests of the System and State, but should allow for discretion and flexibility in the use of the funds.

<u>Policy:</u> All previous letters and guidelines on this subject are rescinded. The following guidelines are to serve as the basis for determining the allowability of charges to the Expense Fund budgets. The President and the executive head of each unit should be provided annually with a specific amount budgeted from GPR funds. All charges against this fund must be in accord with the approved guidelines.

The President's and each Unit Executive Head's Expense Fund is intended to allow for reasonable and necessary expenditures (excluding alcoholic beverages) associated with hosting official visitors or guests of the university. Guest lists must be provided for meals. Expenditure reports submitted should specify the nature of the official function.

1. Specific functions and similar activities that are considered appropriate are listed below:

- a. Receptions for parents of pre-registering freshmen
- b. Receptions for graduating seniors and their parents
- c. Alumni Homecoming receptions
- d. High school counselors on campus
- e. Receptions for community leaders, prominent visitors, news media personnel, legislators and officials, or leaders of educational programs
- f. Receptions for Regents, Central Administration staff, Board of Visitors or officials from System campuses or units
- g. Receptions related to opening of new facilities and dedication ceremonies
- h. Meal costs for spouses, providing the spouse is expected to be in attendance as an official representative of the University

EXHIBIT D

Guidelines for Use of System and Campus Allocations for Official Functions and Related Activities

- i. Receptions for officially recognized student groups
- j. Receptions for distinguished visiting faculty and lecturers

Advance approval should be obtained from the Vice President and Controller for official functions not included above. The President and the executive head of each unit should have the option of providing a dinner or luncheon if it is felt that this would be more appropriate than a reception.

2. Expenditures that would <u>not</u> be considered appropriate from GPR funds are listed below:

- a. Reception or meal costs for newly hired faculty or regular University of Wisconsin faculty members
- b. Entertainment of an all-University group of employes
- c. Social functions for faculty, staff and students
- d. Retirement and resignation receptions for University personnel
- e. Receptions for prospective faculty or staff

President Pelisek presiding.

PRESENT: Regents Barkla, Day, Dixon, Fish, Gelatt, Hales, Kopp, Lavine, McNamara, Neshek, Pelisek, Sandin, Solberg, Thompson, Williams, and Zancanaro.

ABSENT: Regents Renk and Ziegler.

Upon motion by Regent Kopp, seconded by Regent Dixon, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System held on August 3, 1973, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

A. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOARD

1. President Pelisek stated that the resolution relating to designation of former Regents as Regents Emeritus had been discussed at the last meeting.

Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

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Resolution 553: That all living former regents who served on The (Policy - New) Regents of the University of Wisconsin, the Board of Regents of State Universities or its predecessor Boards, and the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System be granted the status of Regent Emeritus in recognition of their service on governing boards of institutions in the University of Wisconsin System; and

> That an appropriate Regent Emeritus certificate, expressing appreciation on behalf of the Board, Faculties, Staff, Students, and Alumni, be signed by the President of the Board and sent to each former Regent.

2. President Pelisek announced the following appointments to the Regent Committee for the selection of a Chancellor at Whitewater: Regents Kopp (chairperson), Barkla, McNamara, Pelisek, and Ziegler.

President Pelisek announced the following appointments to the Regent Committee for Provost for University Outreach: Regents Williams (chairperson), Lavine, Renk, Pelisek, and McNamara.

3. President Pelisek introduced Dr. Barbara Thompson, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, attending her first meeting of the Board, and Chancellor Werner Baum, Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee.

4. The remarks of Donna Tamanaha Miller, of the Open Centers Committee, Madison Campus, and Pedro Delnido, of the Latin American Council, Inc., relative to the closing of the Afro-American Center and the Native American Center, may be perused in the full minutes on file in the Library on each campus.

B. REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNIVERSITY SYSTEM

1. President Weaver introduced the Acting Vice Chancellor of the Center System, John Meggers.

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2. President Weaver presented the report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers and of Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record for Chapter 36 and Chapter 37 Institutions.

Regent Gelatt moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 554: That the Report of Non-Personnel Actions by Administrative Officers to the Board of Regents and Informational Items Reported for the Regent Record, relating to Chapter 36 and Chapter 37 Institutions (<u>EXHIBIT A</u> on file), be received for the record; and that actions included in the report be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

3. At the request of President Weaver, Joseph W. Wiley, Assistant to the President, reported briefly on the conference and workshop to be held at River Falls on September 27 and 28, 1973, relating to Native American problems and programs.

C. REPORT OF THE EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The report of the Education Committee was presented by Regent Dixon.

1. Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Sandin, and it was voted:

Resolution 555: That the personnel actions taken by the President of the University of Wisconsin System under Resolution #80, since those approved by the Regents on August 3, 1973, be approved.

2. Regent Dixon reported that, in the Education Committee meeting on the previous day, there had been considerable discussion of the personnel guidelines developed by the Faculty Committee. He reported that the next step is to designate a sub-committee of Chancellors and legal staff to meet with the faculty committee to try to achieve consensus on a document to bring to the Board of Regents at a future meeting.

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3. Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Kopp, and it was voted:

Resolution 556: That Resolution 80, approved February 11, 1972, be (Policy - rescinded, and that the following resolution in lieu Revision) thereof be approved:

> That the President of the University of Wisconsin System be authorized to approve, on behalf of the Regents, personnel actions involving staff in or for positions other than central vice presidents, provost, unit chancellors, and vice provosts (chancellor); and that the President be authorized to delegate such authority, with the following provisions.

That, prior to authorizing recruitment to fill any academic staff position for which the planned rate of pay exceeds the maximum annual salary equivalent in Group 5 of the State Executive Pay Plan, the President shall furnish the Board with a description of the position and a justification of the salary range assigned to it. Unless a Regent requests that the appointee be considered by the Board, the President may authorize recruitment and report its subsequent accomplishment to the Board; and

That, prior to approving annual merit increases for academic staff whose rate of pay exceeds that stipulated above, the President shall review the list of such increases with the Board of Regents and obtain its approval.

4. Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 557: That, upon recommendation of the President of the Sys-(Policy - New) tem, the General Guideline Statement on "Copyright, Ownership and Use of Instructional Materials," dated September 4, 1973 (revised), providing that certain materials may be copyrighted in the name of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System, be approved.

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5. Regent Dixon moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine, and it was voted:

Resolution 558: That, upon recommendation of the President of the System, the Mission Statement for the Joint VTAE-UW System Committee on Continuing Education, the recommendations for coordinating VTAE System and UW System continuing education activities, and the listed responsibilities of the Joint Committee on Continuing Education, as specified in the May 21, 1973 Report (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), including the initiation of regional councils involving VTAE local districts, UW Institutions, and UW Extension district staffs, be approved.

6. Regent Dixon reported that, in the meeting of the Education Committee the previous day, there had been discussion of mission development and program review, indicating that the masters and specialist programs on the various campuses are to be reviewed through a program audit process, with faculty and campus input; and that it is hoped that preliminary mission formulations can be brought to the Board at the October or November meeting.

He reported that alternate schedules for public hearings on mission statements had been reviewed and that a Saturday session had been arranged at the suggestion of Regent Thompson. It was pointed out that several Regents were expected to attend each hearing and that arrangements for the sessions would be made by the Central Administration. President Pelisek pointed out that the presiding officer at each meeting will be the Chairman of the Education Committee, the Vice Chairman of the Education Committee, or the President of the Board, depending upon who was at what particular meeting.

Regent Dixon moved approval of the following schedule for hearings on institutional mission statements, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Regent Williams moved adoption of the following resolution, and the motion was seconded by Regent Lavine:

7. Regent Dixon reported that, in the meeting of the Committee on the previous day, the following possible task force assignments to the Board of Visitors had been discussed: (a) study of the possibility of enrollment ceilings in the context of freedom of choice concept; (b) an invitation from Acting Chancellor Meggers of the Center System to come to the Center System institutions to become familiar with them; and (c) input from the Board of Visitors regarding the role of the Centers in light of pending System developments.

Regent Dixon reported that Senior Vice President Donald Smith had announced the composition of the task force for developing the plans, policies, operating protocol, and budget requirements for the development of the Regents Statewide University as follows: Chairman, E. 9. Regent Dixon reported that the following appointments had been presented to the Education Committee at their meeting on the previous day:

(a) Dr. Thomas W. Walterman has been appointed Campus Dean, Rock County Center, Janesville, effective on or about September 1, 1973, at an annual salary of \$21,200.

(b) John Meggers has been appointed Acting Chancellor of the Center System, at the present Chancellor's salary, with the departure of Durward Long. He will continue until a Vice Provost is named.

(c) Kenneth D. Oliver, Southwest **Missouri** State University, has accepted the Deanship of the Waukesha County Center, effective on or about September 15, 1973.

(d) William G. Davis has been appointed Associate Vice Chancellor for Health Sciences, UW-Madison, effective as of September 1, 1973.

D. REPORT OF THE BUSINESS AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

The report of the Business and Finance Committee was presented by Regent Neshek.

1. Regent Neshek noted that the total gifts and grants accepted to date for this fiscal year is approximately \$47 million compared with approximately \$34 million for the similar period last year, and that student aid receipts total approximately \$16,700,000 this year, compared with \$15,500,000 last year. He called attention to the grant of \$4 million included from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation, an increase of \$245,000 over the previous year.

Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted:

Resolution 559: That, upon recommendation of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the gifts and grants for the Chapter 37 Institutions, and the gifts and grants for the Chapter 36 Institutions, listed in the statement of Gifts, Grants, and U.S. Government Contracts, presented at this meeting (copy filed with the papers of this meeting), be accepted and the appropriate officers of the University be authorized to sign the agreements; and that the Federal contracts listed therein be approved, ratified, and confirmed.

2. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

Resolution 560: That the bequest of the late Bertha Giller, Madison, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin-Madison, be accepted by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Bertha Giller, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted:

Snyder, Deceased; and that the Secretary or Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign a receipt on behalf of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin System for this bequest, and to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the University of Wisconsin. Regent Neshek reported that the Business and Finance Committee suggested that the Board of Visitors be assigned, as a task, the investigation, coordination, and improvement of the bequest program for the University System.

3. Regent Neshek moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

Resolution 562: That, upon recommendation of the President of the Uni-(Policy - New) versity of Wisconsin System, the Guidelines for Use of System and Campus Allocations for Official Functions and Related Activities be approved.

E. REPORT OF THE PHYSICAL PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The report of the Physical Planning and Development Committee was presented by Regent Fish.

1. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Solberg, and it was voted:

Resolution 563: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-Madison, and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the State Laboratory of Hygiene Building be named The William P. Stovall Building.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Gelatt, and it was voted:

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Resolution 564: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-LaCrosse, and of the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Campus School at UW-LaCrosse be named Thomas Morris Hall.

2. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Williams, and it was voted:

Resolution 565: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor, UW-River Falls, and the President, University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for Administration be authorized to sign a proposed agreement with the Tri-County Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse (Dunn, Pierce and St. Croix Counties) for use of the UW-River Falls Johnson Hall, 4th Floor North living unit, as a Halfway House facility, subject to University of Wisconsin System Legal Counsel approval of adequate liability protection.

Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 566: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor at UW-Stevens Point and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Vice President for Administration be authorized to sign a proposed agreement with Chileda Institute, a division of Camp Chileda, Inc., a non-profit organization, for lease of the Steiner Hall dormitory located at 1319 Fremont Street, Stevens Point, for the period commencing September 7, 1973 and ending June 30, 1974, for the sum of \$43,700.

Regent Fish stated that the members of the committee had commended Central Administration and the campuses for finding creative utilizations of space of this nature. He pointed out that the dormitory situation is quite good systemwide, but where there are vacancies, such utilization for the benefit of the state, the community, and the University is clearly to everyone's advantage.

3. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Hales, and it was voted:

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Resolution 567: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-Parkside and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the concept and budget report be approved and authority be granted to prepare final plans, bid and construct the Physical Plant Building at UW-Parkside at a total project budget of \$521,100 to be financed from General Obligation Bonding.

4. Regent Fish reported that all the buildings in the capital building program are roughly on schedule. Mr. Warren Exo advised that the Building Commission approved a motion which provided funds to proceed with the planning for the conversion of a dormitory for the adult education center on the Madison Campus, with the proviso that the University come back in the next meeting of the Commission to affirm its commitment to locating the program on this campus in comparison with other possibilities.

Regent McNamara moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Zancanaro, and it was voted:

Resolution 568: That the earlier decision that the Adult Education Facility be located on the Madison Campus be reaffirmed.

5. Regent Fish moved adoption of the following resolution, the motion was seconded by Regent Kopp, and it was voted:

Resolution 569: That, upon recommendation of the Chancellor of UW-Platteville and the President of the University of Wisconsin System, the Chancellor of UW-Platteville be authorized to enter into a memorandum of understanding with the City of Platteville to allow temporary use of approximately three acres of University property in connection with the emergency situation facing the City's waste water treatment plant, in accordance with and pursuant to the official request received from the City of Platteville, and with the understanding that the property will be restored to its original state by the City by no later than two years from the beginning

date of the agreement.

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F. UNFINISHED AND MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

1. In response to a question by Regent Williams as to a report from the Council of Chancellors, President Pelisek pointed out that the Council, at this point, is without formal organizational structure, and therefore, have no spokesman. He stated that this will be remedied at an early date in order that we can have that input.

(The meeting recessed into Executive Session at 11:28 A.M., to consider personnel matters.)

(The meeting was reconvened at 11;46 A.M.)

2. President Pelisek announced the following resolutions had been approved in Executive Session:

- Resolution 570: That Robert Polk be designated Executive Vice Chancellor, UW-Oshkosh, in addition to his Central Administration duties, at no change in salary.
- Resolution 571: That Lawrence G. Crowley be appointed Dean of the Medical School and Professor of Surgery, Center for Health Sciences, University of Wisconsin-Madison, beginning October 1, 1973, on a part-time basis, at an annual salary of \$38,500 plus 56% CPP supplement.

The meeting adjourned at 11:48 A.M.
