## The Travel Center: Now Better Than Ever

In order to provide Union members with more services and information on all aspects of travel—here and abroad, the **Wisconsin Union Travel Center** has moved into larger quarters.

To celebrate the completion of their move into their spacious new office (formerly Memorial Union's second floor TV lounge), a week-long medley of special events have been planned for the week of February 10-14 from 11 a.m.-5 p.m.

A potpourri of guest speakers daily at noon and 4:30 p.m., ethnic snacks and music, travel tips, slides, door prizes and contests will be featured. Each day's celebration will highlight a different facet of the **Travel Center's** resources—work abroad, study abroad, featured group tours and general travel, cultural awareness and special opportunities for non-student travelers. The **Travel Center** will be inaugurating a new program called "Travel Tips of the Month" during the week. Center director Janie Johnson explained that the program is for "everyone who has an interesting travel, work or study abroad tip which they would like to share."
