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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF RECENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Saturday, September 28, 1940

Meeting called to order at 10:20 A.M.

Vice President Vergeront presiding, as President Glover and other members of the Executive Committee and the Comptroller were at the Capitol to meet with Governor Heil

PRESENT: Regents Callahan, Cleary, Ekern, Glover, Hodgkins, Holmes,

Kleczka, Vergeront, Werner.

ABSENT: Regent Sensenbrenner.

A communication was presented from Regent Sensenbrenner in explanation of his absence.

Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the annual meeting of the Board held on June 15, 1940, and the special meeting of the Board held on July 13, 1940, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

The <u>President</u> referred to the actions taken by him since the July 13, 1940, meeting of the Board and asked that they be made a part of the record of this meeting. Upon motion of Regent Holmes, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, these actions were approved.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

Comptroller

l. That upon the recommendation of the College of Agriculture authority be requested of the Governor to purchase a <u>pick-up truck</u> at an estimated cost of \$558.00 for the use of the Agricultural Experiment Station in

the operation of truck crop insect projects, the cost to be distributed as follows: \$298.00 to 15-B gifts, Sinclair Refinery and \$260.00 to 1-D miscellaneous capital budget of the College of Agriculture. (Confirming approval by the Executive Committee.)

That in addition to continuance of the summer school of six weeks, courses or institutes during the winter months be established and that E. E. Schwartztrauber be reappointed as Director beginning November 1, 1940, budget \$3,400 for 1940-41.

After a discussion of the matter and upon motion of Regent Cleary,

seconded by Regent Holmes, it was

VOTED, That the question of opportunities for workers both on and off the campus and the matter of the appropriation be referred to the Educational Committee for report at the next meeting of the Board.

Upon recommendation of the President, and upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was
VOTED, That a \$.50 laboratory fee in Education 74 be established in the School of Education

President Dykstra presented the matter of arrangements for students who are called into the national defense service. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED, That registered students who enter the service during the school year have their semester fees returned to them, including the registration fee.

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra, and upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Werner, it was VOTED, That \$1,000 be transferred from Regents Unassigned to provide for the increase in salary of Dr. John C. McCarter, assistant professor of pathology, from \$3,000 to \$4,000, beginning August 1, 1940.

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra, and upon motion of Regent Hodgkins, seconded by Regent Cleary, it was VOTED, That Sinclair Lewis be appointed professorial lecturer in English, without pay.

Upon recommendation of President Dykstra, and upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Retent Cleary, it was

VOTED, That Lancelot T. Hogben be appointed visiting professor of natural history for the academic year 1940-41, a portion of his salary, \$1000, to be paid by the University and charged to Regents Unassigned 1-E; \$1000 to be charged to Fund 9; (Rockefeller Foundation to pay \$3000).

The President presented a report of the National Defense Committee on scientific research at the University. Upon motion of Regent Werner, seconded by Regent Hodgkins, it was

VOTED. That the report be accepted and placed on file.

The President reported upon the enrollment at the University for the current semester, advising that the total registration at this time was 11,378.

The President reported that the bids for the construction of the Aeronautics Building at the Milwaukee Center of the Extension Division were in excess of the estimates. Upon motion of Regent Cleary, seconded by Regent Werner, it was

VOTED.

- (1) That the Emergency Board be requested to appropriate an additional \$5,500 to supplement the appropriation of \$18,000 previously alloted for the construction of an aeronautics building at the Milwaukee Center of the Extension Division.
