RECOLEMDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

-Agriculture-

- 1. That L. J. Merriam be reappointed county agricultural agent for Dane County, beginning January 1, 1930; salary at 930-31 the rate of \$3500 per annum, twelve months' basis, to be distributed as follows: University \$1800 (increase \$100 - Capper Ketcham fund); County \$1700 (increase \$200); charge to item for Dane County, p. 75.
