
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

I am almost tempted to say rubbish. (Turns back up)
But instead I will only say good night. (Cnutseys)

(To aud, walking to rest)

They never proceed to follow that light,
But always follow me. (Exit in rest)

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(Sings off, enter from rest. singing, "Follow on"

at end she has come to C of stage)

Gray sir, Violet Gray.

My father's name is John sir, and when I was a little girl we lived in Cohoes.

Act II

(Enter at head of Purity Brigade, carries drum Major's staff, bus)

Song

(After song turns to left, gives staff to girl)

Could anyone inform me if there is a young man here named Bronson?

(Turns and sees him, speaking quietly) Ah we have found you at last, the Purity Brigade, of which I now have the honor to be commander, has learned sir, that you are much in need of spiritual guidance.

We have come to offer you that guidance. (Curtseys)

(Up L) That might be cosy, but hardly according to Hoyle, but perhaps I might suggest that these people turn their backs for a moment.

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(Turning) People kindy look the other way.

(Takes Harry down to R) Now I have a plan.

Yes a plan, to restore you to your rights, and to your fathers favor, listen, to-morrow night the Portuguese Counts are to give a lawn party in honor of Cora Angelique, at Narragansett Pier. They have engaged Mile. Bonnebouche of the Tutti Frutti Music Hall to go and entertain the guests. (Backs to R C) But when the time comes the french woman will not appear, I shall enter in her place.

(Goes C with Harry) In order to disgust your father with me, Bonnebouche is a wicked woman, who sings dreadful songs, I have learned her songs, I have paid her double not to be at hand for the fete, when the time comes I shall be there in her place in her awful costume. (Harry goes R) And - (Going to Harry) Your father seeing me, will, loathe me for it, I can laugh at him, and tell him I am an adventuress and then he'll turn from me to you, now there is my whole plan, how do you like it?

But you can't help yourself, (Turns, calls to chorus)
Oh people you may look this way now.

then, how do you like it

I have reformed this young man, after this he promises to drink only one cocktail at a time.

(L going to Karl) Oh sir, I'm sure you would not kill anyone.

But I dont want to be loved. (Goes L quickly)

.....police, police.

(Enter with others L 2 E)

(To Harry L aside) I'm going to shock your father now.

(L crossing to Ica C) Hush (To Ica) Why of course we'll stay for the lawn party - that is if its going to be awfully jolly with lots of fizz and all that sort of thing.

.........you say fizz?
Why yes, why shouldn't I say fizz. (L)

(Going down C) Why I have my skittish moments like every other girl and when I strike a lawn party - why that's where I begin to efferverse.

(Kicks, whirls and kicks up at Counts who enter)
Hey, boys, are yougoing to the lawn party?

Nonsense, you haven't begun to enjoy New York, I'm getting one of my periodicals, hi tiddey, hi-ties, how and you just want to stick to me if you're looking for gaiety. (Aside to Harry) How am I getting on?

Good. (Aloud) Now when's the lawn party?

Well papa, and I will be there. 6Embraces Ica)
Eh papa, now smile and get into line with me.

End Scene I

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(Enter at L with Harry after Bill's song,

speaking as she enters) No, no, no, I shan't listen to you. It's the only way I can turn your father away from me, and I am going to do it, now good bye, (Starts R)

(C) Well, at all events, my conscience will be clear, now I didn't succeed in disgusting him yesterday, he believes I was hysterical and says he won't believe I am the bold girl I appeared to be, but wait till he sees me to-night as Bonnebouche, he'll never forgive me after that, but come, I shall miss my train. (Starts L)

Yes. (Starts to go R) But I've got very little time to catch my train.

A chance to do what?

.....he worships you.
Well hardly in the Grand Central Station.

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. in the world.

Well hardly in the Great Central station.

There are no trains leave this station for Egypt. Why don't you make it Narragansett Pier?

(Goes C) Well I can't prevent you riding on the railroad.

Well now you silly boy, you don't expect me to occupy both of them do you?

(Interrupting) Not here - wait till we reach Narragansetty (Exit R)

Scene III

(Runs on to music, pauses, places hand to her

continues) Oh I can't do this - I must - I will.

(Begins song, always indicating that it is a great effort to control herself, faints in Harry's arms)

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Song

(L.C. recovering and gasping) It means that you - you - oh you've been mistaken in me - I'm only an adventuress and all unworthy of -

(Weakly) No, no - I'm the wickedest of women.

Well - if - he doesn't think I would be in the way.

(Gets L with Harry inside Casino)
