

# **Minutes of the regular meeting of the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin: March 11, 1950. 1950**

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REGULAR MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS  
OF THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN

Held in the President's Office

Saturday, March 11, 1950, 10 A.M.

Vice President Werner presiding

PRESENT: Regents Arveson, Gelatt, Grady, Jones, Kleczka, Watson, Werner.

ABSENT: Regents Campbell, Hodgkins, Sensenbrenner.

Regent Sensenbrenner was absent due to illness, and Regents Campbell and Hodgkins were absent due to absence from the state.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was  
VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on  
February 11, 1950, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Faculty Actions -

1. That the following actions by the Faculty be approved:
  - (1) Recommendation of the College of Letters and Science in order to implement the action of the Regents establishing a School of Pharmacy as an independent administrative unit effective July 1, 1950:

ADMISSION.

"That admission to the School of Pharmacy shall be granted after a minimum preparation of one year of collegiate work. Normally this freshman work will be taken in the College of Letters and Science. (Faculty members of the Department of Pharmacy will

normally serve as freshman advisors for pre-pharmacy students registered in the College of Letters and Science.)

"That applicants for admission to the School of Pharmacy must present a minimum grade-point average for all of their collegiate work of 1.3. (Pre-pharmacy students in the University of Wisconsin who fail to attain a minimum grade-point average of 1.3 at the end of their first year of pre-pharmacy work may continue their registration in the school or college of their original registration provided that they have met the minimum requirements of that school or college. No student may be registered as a pre-pharmacy student for more than four semesters. Pre-pharmacy students will not be allowed to carry courses in the Department of Pharmacy after their first year of pre-pharmacy work.)

"That minimum registration in a school of pharmacy, in order to qualify for the degree of Bachelor of Science in Pharmacy, shall be three years.

"That the minimum residence requirement for the bachelor's degree shall be 30 credits and 30 grade-points at the University of Wisconsin. Substantially, all of the last year of work shall be taken in residence in the School of Pharmacy at the University of Wisconsin."

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Arveson, recommendation No. 1 (1) listed under Faculty Actions was adopted.

- (2) Recommendation of the College of Letters and Science for the adoption of revised curricula leading to the degree of Bachelor of Music. (EXHIBIT A attached.)

- (e) 200.00 - Dr. M. T. Erickson, Highland, Wisconsin, to be added to the Medical School Library Building Fund. (Fund 15-764)
- (f) 50.00 - Miss Alta Stauffer, to be used in support of cancer research in the University of Wisconsin Medical School. (Fund 15-327)
- (g) 50.00 - University of Wisconsin Women's Club, Detroit, Michigan, to be added to the University of Wisconsin Women's Club of Detroit Student Loan Fund.
- (h) 25.00 - University of Wisconsin Alumnae Club of Chicago, for the establishment of a fund to be used for the construction of a cooperative house patterned after Tabard Inn and Andersen House, or to be used for improving cooperative houses now administered by the University Women's Building Corporation. Additional contributions may be added to this fund from time to time. (Fund 15-470)
- (i) 25.00 - From friends of the late Theodore Herfurth for the establishment of a memorial fund which is to be used for any of the projects at the University of Wisconsin in which he evidenced interest. (Fund 15-475)
- (j) 200.00 - American Foundation for Pharmaceutical Education, New York City, for scholarships and grants-in-aid for needy students enrolled in the School of Pharmacy. This gift is provided through the Madison Drug Company of Madison, Wisconsin. (Fund 15-635)

- (a) \$ 4,000.00 - The Robert Gould Research Foundation, Inc., Cincinnati, Ohio, for the renewal of an industrial research grant to study "the use of amino acids as the sole source of protein in the diet", during the period February 1, 1950 through December 31, 1950, in the Department of Biochemistry. (Fund 15-885)
- (b) 1,500.00 - The Clyman Canning Company, Clyman, Wisconsin, for the establishment of an industrial research grant to study "The Control of Weeds in Canning Crops Through the Use of Pre-emergence Sprays and Other Treatments", during the period February 1, 1950 through January 31, 1951, in the Department of Horticulture. (Fund 15-471)
- (c) 3,348.00 - American Trudeau Society of the National Tuberculosis Association, New York City, for the continuation of graduate research on "Chemical and Immunological Investigations in Tuberculosis" during the period April 1, 1950 through March 31, 1951, in the Departments of Chemistry and Agricultural Bacteriology. (Fund 15-236)
- (d) 13,662.00 - National Institute of Health for the continued support of research in the Medical School on "Physical, chemical and enzymatic characterization of the soluble proteins of normal and neoplastic tissues" during the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951. (Project No. C-822(C) Dr. Philip P. Cohen.) (Fund 15-472)
- (e) 3,240.00 - National Institute of Health, for the continued support of research in the Medical School on "The Nature of Biochemical Syntheses Connected with Growth" during the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951. (Project No. C-646(C2) Dr. Van R. Potter.) (Fund 15-473)

- (f) \$ 7,020.00 - National Institute of Health, for the continued support of cancer research in the Department of Zoology on "Induced Pituitary Hyperplasias" during the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951. (Project No. C-1091(C), Drs. Rolland K. Meyer and W. H. McShan.) (Fund 15-474)
- (g) 1,250.00 - Standard Oil Company of California, San Francisco, California, for the renewal of a research fellowship in chemical engineering during the period July 1, 1949 through June 30, 1950, to study problems in reaction kinetics dealing with the regeneration of catalysts and formulation of the operating variables involved therein. (An amount sufficient to pay the incidental fees of the fellow selected will also be contributed by Standard Oil Company of California if the fellow is not eligible for payment of fees by the Veterans Administration.) (Fund 15-814)
- (h) 50.00 - The Wisconsin Alumni Club of Cincinnati, Ohio, to be added to the fund for grants-in-aid to worthy students under the conditions approved by the Regents at their meeting on October 15, 1949. (Fund 15-977)
- (i) 1,410.00 - Ethyl Corporation Research Laboratories, Detroit, Michigan, to sponsor a fellowship in mechanical engineering which will involve "Preliminary Investigation in Steady Flow Combustion" during the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951. (\$1,200 is to be used for the stipend of the Fellow selected and \$210 is to be used for the payment of incidental fees.) (Fund 15-476)
- (j) United States Rubber Company, Passaic, New Jersey, for the continuation of the "United States Rubber Company post-graduate fellowship in Chemistry" during the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951. The recipient shall be a male candidate for a Ph.D. degree. The grant is to be expended as follows:
- (a) \$1,200 for a single man and \$1,800 for a married man;
  - (b) \$1,000 for tuition and fees;
  - (c) Any balance remaining after payment of the tuition and fees may be expended for any scientific purpose by the Department of Chemistry. (Fund 15-725)

- (k) \$ 2,000.00 - Socony-Vacuum Laboratories, New York City, for the continuation of a graduate fellowship for fundamental research in the field of organic chemistry, during the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951. (Fund 15-717)
- (l) 3,758.00 - American Cancer Society, New York City, in support of a Cancer Research project entitled "Mechanism of action of penicillin" during the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951, in the Department of Biochemistry. (Project No. MET-3, Dr. M. J. Johnson.) (Fund 15-477)
- (m) 1,000.00 - American Smelting and Refining Company, New York City, for the renewal, during the 1950-51 academic year of the ASARCO scholarship plan in the College of Engineering. An award of \$500 is to be made to a student in mining and a like amount to a student in metallurgy. Any student in these fields is eligible for the award but preference is to be given to juniors and seniors. (Fund 15-978)
- (n) 1,500.00 - Shell Fellowship Committee, New York City, for the establishment of a post-graduate fellowship in chemistry during the period July 1, 1950 through June 30, 1951. In awarding the fellowship, preference is to be given to doctoral candidates, particularly those in their last year of doctorate work, but the fellowship may be awarded to a candidate for a master's degree. The grant is to be expended as follows:
  - (a) \$1,200 shall be used for the stipend of the fellow;
  - (b) \$ 300 for research materials, equipment and other expenses incident to the fellowship. Any of the \$300 not expended will remain with the Chemistry Department for general departmental expenses;
  - (c) In addition, the Shell Fellowship Committee will pay all fees and tuition of the fellow unless he has G.I. entitlement in which case Shell will pay all fees and tuition costs in excess of \$500. (Fund 15-478)

for the period February 10, 1950 to June 30, 1950, for research work under an Office  
of Naval Research contract at a salary not to exceed \$2650 for the period, subject  
to the terms and conditions and the execution of a contract between the Regents and  
the Office of Naval Research; and that authority be given for the execution of a  
contract for the special services of Professor Roebuck. *On file with papers.*

## RECOMMENDATIONS AND REPORT OF THE VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS AND FINANCE

I. Report of Actions Taken

1. Contracts and agreements signed with the United States Government for research work, educational programs and for services requested by the Government for military personnel and veterans, and for other educational services of the University:

- (a) Amendment No. 8 to Navy Department Bureau of Ordnance Contract No. NOrd-9938, providing for extension of the term of the contract through August 31, 1950, an increase of \$14,000.00 in the estimated cost to cover continuation of work under Task WIS-2 only through the extended term (it being anticipated that the necessary funds to cover continuation of Task WIS-1 subsequent to March 31, 1950, will be added to the contract at a later date), and revision of Articles 18, 19, 21 and 24 as set forth in Exhibit A attached to the Amendment.
- (b) Office of Naval Research, Contract Task Order N7onr-28505, providing approximately \$4670.00 for research in the Department of Biochemistry on "Chemical Intermediates Involved in Photosynthesis" during the period March 1, 1950 through February 28, 1951.
- (c) Veterans Administration Contract No. V3030V-455, entered into as of February 20, 1950, for the period June 18, 1949 through June 17, 1950, providing for the furnishing by the University, with reimbursement from the Veterans Administration as agreed upon in the contract, of the necessary books, supplies and equipment in connection with courses of vocational rehabilitation for veterans under the provisions of Public Law 16, 78th Congress, as amended, and for education and training of veterans eligible to enroll or be enrolled in courses under the provisions of Public Law 346, 78th Congress, as amended.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Kleczka, action No. 1 (a) to (c), inclusive, listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) was approved.

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2. In accordance with the authority granted by the Regents on September 27, 1947, for the Vice President of Business and Finance to sign contracts and leases not in excess of \$2500, the following agreements and orders have been signed:

- (a) Contract of Deposit with the Wisconsin Union for the custody of forty-four (44) Japanese woodcuts, valued at \$973.00, which will be in the immediate custody of the Department of Art History for instructional and exhibition purposes. The contract may be terminated upon thirty days notification by either party.

- (b) Contract of Deposit with the State Historical Society for the custody of fifty (50) original Piranesi etchings, valued at approximately \$1,000.00, which will be in the immediate custody of the Department of Art History for instructional and exhibition purposes. The contract may be terminated upon thirty days notification by either party.
- (c) Lease with Carrie P. Kyser, Coddington, Wisconsin, for the rental of 120 acres of land in the Township of Buena Vista, Portage County, at a rental of \$125.00 for the period April 1, 1950 to November 30, 1950, for use in connection with the operation of the Coddington Branch Experiment Station.
- (d) Rental of public address system and of the Fern Room, Pfister Hotel, Milwaukee, for five days during January, 1950, for meetings of the National Conference of the American Association of Schools of Social Work, under the auspices of the Association and the University of Wisconsin. Total cost - \$285.00.
- (e) Lease from Hubert Hundt and Anna Hundt, his wife, Coon Valley, Wisconsin, of approximately 15 acres of land near the La Crosse Erosion Experiment Station, for soil conservation experiments and demonstrations of strip cropping, at an annual rental of \$100.00 to be paid from farm receipts. This lease to be in force for a five-year period beginning May 11, 1950, subject to cancellation annually.
- (f) Assignment effective March 1, 1950, from E. W. Conway, owner of Conway's Store, Sauk City, to John F. W. Meagher, Sauk City, of lease of space in the Commercial Building at Badger, for the purpose of maintaining and operating a men's, women's and children's clothing store during the nine months period beginning October 1, 1949, at a monthly rental of \$25.00.

Upon motion of Regent Grady, seconded by Regent Watson, action No. 2 (a) to (f), inclusive, listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) was approved.

3. In accordance with the action by the Regents on September 10, 1949, that the grant of \$291,000 by the National Advisory Heart Council (Federal Security Agency-Public Health Service) to the University of Wisconsin for the construction of cardiovascular research facilities be accepted, and that the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign the necessary agreements with the Federal Security Agency for the receipt and use of the funds, formal acceptance has been made of "Award of Grant-in-Aid for Cardiovascular Research Construction," National Heart Institute Grant No. HC-225.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, action No. 3 listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (I. Report of Actions Taken) was approved.

II. Miscellaneous

1. That Mr. Claude R. Cobbs be deputized as a University police officer.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, recommendation No. 1 listed under the recommendations and report of the Vice President of Business and Finance (II. Miscellaneous) was adopted.

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Regent Gelatt presented the report of the Finance Committee. Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the bequest by the late William S. Kies of the County of Westchester, State of New York to the University of Wisconsin of \$7,500, the income of which is to be used to maintain the scholarship in the School of Commerce previously financed by Mr. Kies, be accepted by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of William S. Kies, deceased; and that the President, the Secretary or the Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign receipts in the name of the Regents for the funds received under this bequest, or to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the Regents.

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Grady, it was

VOTED, That the bequests by the late Theodore Herfurth of the City of Madison, Dane County, Wisconsin, to the University of Wisconsin be accepted by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Theodore Herfurth, deceased; and that the President, the Secretary or the Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign receipts in the name of the Regents for the funds received under these bequests, or to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of these bequests to the Regents.

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the bequest by the late Edward M. Kurtz of the County of Los Angeles, California, to the University of Wisconsin of \$1,000 be accepted by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Last Will and Testament of Edward M. Kurtz, deceased; and that the President, the Secretary or the Assistant Secretary be authorized to sign receipts in the name of the Regents for the funds received under this bequest, or to do all things necessary to effect the transfer of this bequest to the Regents.

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That the Secretary be authorized to sign, on behalf of the Regents, all papers and documents prepared by the Attorney General's Office in connection with the settlement of the Elsie S. Wyse Estate under which the University is a beneficiary.

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was RESOLVED, That the resolution adopted by the Regents of the University of Wisconsin on December 17, 1949, designating certain banking institutions as public depositories under Chapter 34 of the Wisconsin Statutes for all public moneys coming into the hands of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, be amended to provide that The First Wisconsin National Bank, Second Ward Branch, Milwaukee, Wisconsin, qualified as a public depository under Chapter 34 of the Wisconsin Statutes, shall be and is hereby designated until further action, as the public depository for all such public moneys coming into the hands of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin which are for deposit to the account entitled "University of Wisconsin Milwaukee Extension Division Deposit Account, c/o Bernice Arlitt."

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the assignment dated September 1, 1949, to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin by Kenneth H. Parsons and John A. Commons, owners of an unpublished manuscript written by the late John R. Commons, entitled "The Economics of Collective Action", of all royalties and all other rights which they have to the manuscript be accepted by the Regents.

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That \$5,500 be budgeted from 1-E Unbudgeted Receipts for the replacement of seats in the Chemistry Building Auditorium.

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Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the Union Council, the Union Directorate, and the Memorial Union Building Committee, the Regent regulations relating to life memberships in the Memorial Union be amended as follows:

"That a regularly enrolled student who pays, or has paid, an aggregate of \$50 \$60 in Union fees or in payments on a subscription, or both together, be entitled to the regular life membership, and

that the holders of such life membership be entitled to the privileges of the Building Union without the payment of further fees; the \$60 rate to be effective after Commencement, 1950;

"Further, that any student currently enrolled be granted life membership at the \$50 rate if application is made before Commencement, 1950, with payment of any balance due to be made by Commencement, 1951."

(Changes in the previous Regent action are indicated by the underscoring of new provisions and crossing out old ones.)

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the Extension Division, the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a lease and agreement with the Student Board of the Milwaukee Extension Division for the operation of a student lunchroom in the Milwaukee Extension Division Building which provides for the payment of rent at the rate of \$300 per year to the University for use of space occupied by the lunchroom.

Regent Arveson presented the report of the Educational Committee. Upon motion of Regent Arveson, seconded by Regent Grady, the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

WHEREAS psychological and emotional conditions contribute to many important public health problems among which is the problem of delinquency among young people, and

WHEREAS the State Legislature, the Department of Public Welfare and other State departments have emphasized the need for a more effective program of mental hygiene to combat the problem of delinquency, and

WHEREAS the medical profession has recognized psychosomatic medicine as an important branch of medicine, and the need for an enlarged training program in this field is acute because of the deficiency of physicians trained in psychiatry and the methods of diagnosing and treating psychic trauma; a deficiency so great that the State Hospitals for the treatment of mental diseases have for many years been unable to secure the services of an adequate staff of physicians trained in the modern methods of treating such cases, and

WHEREAS for many years a statewide program for mental hygiene has been a goal of the Department of Public Welfare and a larger teaching and service center the goal of the University and its Medical School, and

WHEREAS the accomplishment of a satisfactory program for mental hygiene and for the medical care of the mentally ill requires the integrated action of the two State agencies, the Medical School of the University and the Mental Hygiene Division of the Department of Public Welfare, and

WHEREAS through the actions of the legislature, the Governor, the officials of the Medical School, and the Board of Public Welfare a plan for the initiation of this program has been prepared and presented to the Board of Regents, and

WHEREAS this plan requires a joint committee between the University and the Department of Public Welfare to be composed of the Dean of the Medical School, the Chairman of the Department of Public Welfare and one member of the Board of Public Welfare,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, That the Board of Regents approves the association of the University and the Department of Public Welfare in the development of a sound mental health program for the citizens of our State; and

That the Board of Regents authorize the University's participation with the Board of Public Welfare in the establishment of an integrating committee for advisory purposes only; it being understood that this committee is vested with no power of policy determination, nor with any other of the responsibilities which come under the powers and duties of the Board of Regents of the University or the Board of Public Welfare.

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Regent Gelatt presented the following report of the Welfare and Student Life Committee:

*Discrimination*  
"The Welfare and Student Life Committee has met and begun the examination of the faculty report on discrimination. The subject is an important one, and requires most careful and thorough study. Additional communications on this matter have been received by the Regents and referred to this Committee. We request an additional thirty days before submitting our recommendation."

There being no objection, the Vice President ordered that a thirty-day extension be granted for the submission by the Welfare and Student Life Committee of a report on the University Committee Report on Human Rights for Students.

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Regent Jones presented the report of the Constructional Development Committee. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was

VOTED, That whereas additional land is needed to provide an adequate site for the new State Laboratory of Hygiene building, authority be granted subject to the approval of the Governor to purchase from Frederick W. Schmelzer and Anna Schmelzer the property located at 436 Lorck Street, Madison, which is more specifically described as Lot Three (3), Block Two (2), Wald's Subdivision in the City of Madison, for a consideration of \$10,000.00, and in accordance with the other terms of the option given by Frederick W. and Anna Schmelzer on February 8, 1950; and that in order to provide funds for this purchase the Governor be requested to approve a transfer of \$10,250.00 (including purchase price, share of taxes and abstract costs) from unused balances in the allotment previously made for the Short Course Dormitories in the appropriation made by Section 20.417 Wisconsin Statutes.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Watson, it was

VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board in awarding contracts for the Additions to Camp Randall Stadium for which bids will be received on March 15, 1950, and to approve the schedule of costs and the appropriation of funds for this project.

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*Wilson*  
Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was

VOTED, That the Executive Committee be authorized to act for the Board in awarding contracts for the Extension of Steam Tunnel and Piping on Linden Drive for which bids will be received on March 24, 1950, the cost of which is chargeable to the schedule of costs for Babcock Hall.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Arveson, it was

VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to complete negotiations with owners of property adjacent to the site of the proposed University Library necessary to establish property lines and to obtain agreement on matters relating to the construction of the Library; and that the President and Secretary be authorized to sign the conveyances and agreements on behalf of the Regents as approved by the Attorney General.

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Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was VOTED, That the plans and outline specifications for the Library, as submitted by the State Architect, be approved; and that authority be granted to advertise for bids for the construction of the Library as soon as the final plans and specifications and negotiations with owners of property adjacent to the Library site have been completed.

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Regent Kleczka presented the following recommendations of the Personnel Committee:

Appointments

1. That Leslie A. Osborn be appointed acting director of Wisconsin Psychiatric Institute and professor of psychiatry, beginning July 1, 1950; salary at the rate of \$3,000 per annum, twelve months' basis; to be provided in the 1950-51 budget. (It is understood that the Board of Public Welfare is offering Dr. Leslie A. Osborn an appointment as Director of the Mental Hygiene Division with a salary of \$12,000, making a combined salary of \$15,000.)

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, recommendation No. 1 listed under Appointments was adopted.

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Resignation

1. That the resignation of Robert W. West, professor of speech, be accepted; to take effect June 15, 1950.

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Arveson, recommendation No. 1 listed under Resignation was adopted.

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Leave of Absence

1. That M. Leslie Holt, professor of chemistry, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from March 1, 1950 to the close of the second semester of 1949-50. (Professor Holt will be on temporary appointment at the Argonne National Laboratory, Chicago.)

Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Gelatt, recommendation No. 1 listed under Leave of Absence was adopted.

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The Secretary read a letter from Raymond Thompson, Route 2, Beaver Dam, Wisconsin, addressed to the Board of Regents, expressing appreciation for the scholarship which he received and which enabled him to attend the Agricultural Short Course. (Letter placed on file.)

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Regent Gelatt extended an invitation to the Regents to hold the July 15, 1950, Regent meeting at La Crosse, Wisconsin, and to inspect the La Crosse Experiment Station at that time. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Jones, it was

VOTED, That the invitation of Regent Gelatt for the Regents to hold the July 15, 1950, Regent meeting at La Crosse and to inspect the La Crosse Experiment Station be accepted, with thanks, and that it be ordered that the July 15, 1950, meeting of the Regents be held at La Crosse.

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Regent Jones called attention to the quantity and varied types of research being conducted at the University and to the amount and sources of funds provided for the support of such research. He suggested that it would be advantageous to have a complete picture of all research being done on the campus for the purpose of determining what research needs additional funds and what research is not justified in view of the limitations on funds, staff and facilities. Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That it be the sense of this Board that the administrative officers be requested to undertake a survey of research undertakings on this campus, including fundamental and applied research, and submit a report to the Board.

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Regent Kleczka reported that as a result of the action taken reluctantly by the Regents in increasing both resident and nonresident fees, there had been informal discussions with the Regents as to the needs for additional scholarships to enable worthy students to attend the University who would otherwise be deprived of the educational opportunity because of the lack of funds. Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Gelatt, and as amended following discussion, it was

VOTED, That the question of scholarships given by this University and the method of giving these scholarships be studied by the administration, including (not by way of limitation) legislators' scholarships, nonresident scholarships, student loans, and an analysis of the present administration of scholarships and the geographic distribution of recipients of scholarships.

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Regent Gelatt reported that there had been some discussion by the Regents regarding the need for lower-cost housing for students. He pointed out that the dormitories which had been built provide more than the minimum facilities needed for housing students and that the development of a lower-cost type of housing and less expensive methods of operating such housing would enable more students with limited funds to obtain housing which would provide the advantages of group living and group associations. Regent Jones suggested that the providing of facilities for cooperative student housing would benefit students who are largely dependent on their own resources in attending the University. Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Kleczka, it was

VOTED, That the administration undertake a study of the possible development of lower-cost construction, lower-cost locations, and lower-cost methods of operation for student housing, including cooperative housing.

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Upon motion of Regent Kleczka, seconded by Regent Grady, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn.

The meeting adjourned at 11:10 A.M.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR THE DEGREE OF BACHELOR OF MUSIC  
AND FOR THE TEACHERS' CERTIFICATE

Subject to the rule of the College of Letters and Science relating to quality of work (see section 12, page 23) a total of 130 credits and 130 grade-points is required as follows:

Major in Applied Music

46 credits in Letters and Science to include English, 6 credits, history, 6 credits, plus 6 additional credits in either history or English, and foreign language (see below); 84 credits in music, as specified by the School of Music.

Major in History and Theory

46 credits in Letters and Science to include English, 6 credits, history, 6 credits, and foreign language (see below); 84 credits in music, as specified by the School of Music.

Major in School Music (Vocal)

32 credits in Letters and Science to include English, 12 credits and Speech 1, 3 credits; 19 specified credits in Education 73, 74, 75, 4 and 5 (for the University Teachers' Certificate); 70 credits in Music, as specified by the School of Music; electives, 9 credits.

Major in School Music (Instrumental)

32 credits in Letters and Science to include English, 12 credits and Speech 1, 3 credits; 19 specified credits in Education 73, 74, 75, 4 and 5 (for the University Teachers' Certificate); 72 credits in Music, as specified by the School of Music; electives, 7 credits.

The Foreign-language Requirement

The foreign-language requirement may be satisfied either (1) by meeting the language requirements of the B.A. degree; (2) by passing an intermediate examination in French, German, Italian, or Spanish; or (3) by securing in high school and/or college the equivalent of 14 credits in one of the following: French, German, Italian, or Spanish. In special cases, with approval of the faculty of the School of Music, any language accepted by the College of Letters and Science for the B.A. degree may be used to satisfy the foreign-language requirement of the B.M. degree.
