Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the regular meeting of the Board held on January 8, 1955, be approved as sent out to the Regents.

Upon motion of Regent Renk, seconded by Regent Steiger, the above report of the Vice President of Business and Finance was approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Vice President of Business and Finance presented the report of budget transfers for January, 1955, for the information of the Regents. (EXHIBIT C attached)

Vice President Peterson reported on further consideration of the construction of a new dormitory for women on the Chadbourne Hall site. Upon motion of Regent Rennebohm, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was

VOTED, That, as it is the considered opinion of the Regents that a new dormitory for women should be constructed on the site of Chadbourne Hall, the previous action taken by the Regents in this regard be respectfully reiterated to the Governor with an explanation of the need for the dormitory and the reasons for its location; and that the approval of the Governor be requested for the immediate employment of architects and for construction of the dormitory on the Chadbourne Hall site.

President Werner expressed the pleasure of the Board in having the Secretary present after his recent illness; and the Secretary stated that he was happy to be back and expressed his appreciation of the good wishes of the Regents for his recovery.

Regent Gelatt presented the report of the Educational Committee.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That the following recommendations of the Educational Committee be adopted:

- 1. That the resignation of D. Alexander Severino, associate professor of art education, be accepted; to take effect February 1, 1955.
- 2. That the resignation of John W. Harman, associate professor of pathology, be accepted; to take effect February 15, 1955.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That William S. Middleton, Dean of the School of Medicine, be granted leave of absence, without pay, from March 1, 1955 to March 1, 1956.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Rennebohm, it was VOTED, That Walter J. Blaedel, associate professor of chemistry, be granted leave of absence, without pay, for the second semester of 1954-55.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Watson, it was VOTED, That Otto A. Mortensen, Associate Dean of the Medical School, be appointed Acting Dean of the Medical School from March 1, 1955 to June 30, 1955.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That I. C. M. Place be appointed associate professor of forestry and wildlife management, on the twelve months! basis, beginning July 1, 1955; salary at the rate of \$8,500 per annum, charge to the 1955-56 budget.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That \$300 be appropriated from the income in the Anonymous Trust Fund to the Graduate School to be paid to the Institute of International Education for 1955.

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Jones, it was VOTED, That, upon the recommendation of the Faculty of the College of Agriculture, Honorary Recognition be conferred during Farm and Home Program upon the following persons who have rendered unusual service to agriculture and rural living:

Upon motion of Regent Gelatt, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the Board go into executive session.

The Board went into executive session at 10:20 A.M.

The executive session recessed at 10:55 A.M. and the Board meeting was reconvened, all Regents present as indicated on the original roll call.

President Werner stated that the executive session had been recessed until later in this meeting.

Regent Jones presented the report of the Business and Finance Committee.

Following a discussion of the advantages and disadvantages of the Pharmaceutical Gardens area, the Midvale Boulevard area and the Fahrenbrook Court area as sites for married student apartments, and, upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was

VOTED, That, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, the Pharmaceutical Gardens area be approved for the site of 100 units of

married student apartments.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the action of the Regents on February 6, 1954, approving the plan for landscaping the area between the Memorial Library and the State Historical Society Building, as shown in the sketch identified as Plan 5, be rescinded; and that, upon recommendation of the University Campus Planning Commission, the plan as shown in the sketch identified as Plan B (copy on file), be approved.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the Vice President of Business and Finance be authorized to sign a renewal lease with the Wisconsin Tower, Inc., for the second floor of the Wisconsin Tower Building, Milwaukee, for the period July 1, 1955 to June 30, 1956, at an annual rental of \$21,074.90, with an option to extend the lease for one additional year upon ninety days advance notice and with an option to cancel the lease upon ninety days notice.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Renk, it was VOTED, That the resolutions adopted by the Regents on June 28, 1946, and October 25, 1947, relating to the certification of lists for disbursements from University appropriations and University trust funds be rescinded; and that, in lieu thereof, the following resolution be adopted:

RESOLVED, That one person shall be required to certify all lists covering disburgements from University appropriations and from University Trust Funds;

AND, that the persons authorized to make such certifications shall be:

- I. University Appropriations Disbursements.
 - (1) The Vice President of Business and Finance, or
 - (2) The Secretary of the Regents, or
 - (3) Any member of the Board of Regents, or
 - (4) The Controller, or
 - (5) The Administrative Assistant to the Controller designated by the Controller.
- II. University Trust Funds Disbursements.
 - (1) Any one of the persons designated under I. above, or
 - (2) The Trust Officer, or
 - (3) The Assistant Trust Officer.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Steiger, it was VOTED, That the Governor be requested to release \$2200 from the appropriation for remodelling the Home Economics Building for the purpose of providing funds to build a corridor connection between the East Wing and the central hallway area of the center part of the Home Economics Building.

Regent Jones moved and Regent Steiger seconded the adoption of the following recommendation of the Business and Finance Committee:

That, upon the recommendation of the Athletic Board, the price of individual football game tickets be established at \$3.60 effective with the 1955 season.

It was explained that the reason for the proposed increase in the price of football tickets was to bring the prices more nearly in line with other conference schools. A called vote was taken on the above motion - Regents Jones, Renk, Rennebohm, Steiger, Werner voting "Aye", Regent Watson voting "No", and Regent Gelatt refraining from voting. The motion was declared carried.

Upon motion of Regent Jones, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was VOTED, That subject to the approval of the Governor, which the Regents urge that he grant, the appended resolution marked EXHIBIT "D" relating to acquisition of Federal surplus land in the Camp McCoy-Sparta area for school forest purposes be adopted.

A report was made on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on Agricultural Lands. Regent Rennebohm, reporting on the subject of the sale of the Hill Farms, stated that Professor Ratcliff was now devoting one-half of his time to work on the planning of the sale of the farm lands; and that, although this planning involves much more work than one might think, a great deal of progress has been made. Regent Renk, reporting on the purchase of agricultural lands, stated that the committee and Dean Froker have been working on this matter and hope to be able to report to the Regents at the March meeting regarding the purchase of three parcels of agricultural land.

Regent Watson, on behalf of the Special Regent Committee on the School of Education Deanship, reported that the committee was making progress in cooperation with the administration and the faculty of the School of Education.

Regent Watson suggested that, while President Fred was away receiving an honorary degree at Michigan State College, the Board go on record in expressing pride and admiration for the great credit being brought to this institution by Dr. Fred. Upon motion of Regent Watson, seconded by Regent Gelatt, it was unanimously VOTED, That this Board go on record expressing its congratulations to President Fred for the honor being conferred upon him by Michigan State College, and expressing appreciation for the outstanding service he has rendered this institution which led to this honor being conferred upon him.

The Board went into executive session at 11:15 A.M.

The Board arose from executive session at 1:40 P.M. and reconvened, with all Regents present as indicated on the original roll call.

President Werner requested the Secretary to present the statement prepared by the Regents in the executive session. The Secretary read the following statement:

"The Regents conferred last week with Governor Kohler and members of his staff and have today conferred with a member of the Governor's staff regarding the problems of higher education in Wisconsin.

"A large majority of this Board believes that the interests of higher education will best be served by continuing separate governing boards for the University and the State Colleges. We recognize the need for cooperative planning. The Board has appointed a committee consisting of Regents Werner, Jones, Steiger and Gelatt to work with the Governor and members of the Legislature in the consideration of any proposed legislation relating to problems of public higher education."
