Media Credentials: All print, photo and electronic media requesting credentials to cover Wisconsin volleyball should contact Diane Nordstrom at the Women's Sports Information Office at least 24 hours in advance of the match. Credentials will be placed at the Pass Gate, located to the north of Gate A in the Field House, on the night of the match.

Parking: Parking for media during Wisconsin volleyball matches is reserved in lots 18 and 19. Please contact Diane Nordstrom for parking credentials one week in advance of the match. Free parking is located north of Camp Randall Stadium.

Media Services: Media covering Wisconsin volleyball in the Field House will be provided with event programs, media guides, and pre-match notes. Working facilities for press/radio/television are located on the west side of the Wisconsin Field House, just below the first balcony. Electrical outlets are available at every seat. Telephone lines must be installed in advance of the match. A complete box score will be available at the conclusion of the match.

Photographers: Photographers may work from the ends of the court and any side of the floor, except in front of team and scoring benches.

Head Coach John Cook

ith Olympic and national championship credentials as an assistant coach, John Cook begins his first collegiate head coaching position at the

University of Wisconsin.

As an assistant coach with the United States Men's National team, Cook aided the U.S. to a bronze medal in the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona. The team's defensive coordinator, he was also in charge of scouting, and supervising the team's flexibility, strength and conditioning programs.

Prior to his appointment with the national team, Cook served as the first assistant coach with the University of Nebraska women's volleyball program. During Cook's tenure at Nebraska, the Cornhuskers advanced to the NCAA final four every year including a second-place finish in 1989. Nebraska also captured the NCAA Mideast Regional and Big Eight Conference championship each of those three years.

Cook served as the Huskers' recruiting coordinator, scouting chief, strength and conditioning coordinator, and was also the liaison with the academic advising center. During that time, Nebraska garnered seven academic all-America honors, ranking them No. 1 in the country.


As a coach with the U.S. Olympic Festival, Cook served as head coach of the bronze medal-winning North team in 1989 and was an assistant coach with the third place West team in 1987. He is also a knowledgeable speaker on the national level in areas of motivation, goal-setting, specialization, and drill design.


Cook's coaching credentials also include leading Parker High School in San Diego to two California state championships. During his six-year coaching stint, he had a .900 winning percentage with an overall record of 162-18, including a 90-match league winning streak.

A co-founder of the San Diego Volleyball Club, Cook served as a coach with the club from 1986-88. During that time, the club won two Southern California Regional Championships and finished among the final four teams twice in the USVBA Junior Olympics for girls 18 and under.

A 1979 graduate of the University of San Diego, Cook earned his bachelor's degree in history. He completed his master's degree in teaching and coaching effectiveness from San Diego State University in 1991.

Cook and his wife, Wendy Wheat, have one daughter, Lauren.

Assistant Coaches



Assistant Coach Margie Fitzpatrick

Margie (Kaminski) Fitzpatrick resumes the role of assistant coach after serving as the Badgers' interim head coach during the 1991 season.

Fitzpatrick took over the coaching reins of the Badgers after the death of Steve Lowe in August. She led Wisconsin to its second consecutive NCAA post-season appearance and a second-place tie with Penn State in the Big Ten Conference. Overall, the Badgers finished 23-10 including a first-round NCAA tournament win over Bowling Green State. Wisconsin advanced to the Mideast Regional for the second year in a row losing to Nebraska in the semifinals.

In her first year as an assistant coach in 1990, Fitzpatrick realized a championship dream when the Badgers won the Big Ten title. A former UW volleyball player, Fitzpatrick was Wisconsin's most valuable player in 1986 and 1987. She served as captain of the 1987 team and is a three-time all-Big Ten honorable mention selection.

A former outside hitter, Fitzpatrick ranks among the top 10 in every hitting and blocking career category at Wisconsin. She is also the UW record holder for most service aces in a career (166), in a season (61) and in a match (8).

A native of South Bend, Ind., Fitzpatrick was a member of the St. Joseph's Academy varsity team four years, and the South Bend Junior Olympic volleyball team from 1981-84. She played on the AAU Junior Olympic gold medal team in 1982, and received the Indiana President's Award for volleyball in 1983. Her teams won the Indiana State White River Games Championships in 1987 and 1988.

A 1989 graduate of the University of Wisconsin in recreation resource management, Fitzpatrick's coaching resume includes experience with the USVBA in West Allis, Wis., and Sports Camp International in Grand Rapids, Mich. In addition, she worked with the Badger volleyball camp for four years while a studentathlete at Wisconsin.

Prior to becoming an UW assistant coach, Fitzpatrick worked as a recreation therapist for Warren Barr Pavilion in Chicago.



Assistant Coach Kathy Cunningham

Kathy Cunningham, a former volleyball standout at Notre Dame, begins her first season as an assistant coach with the Badger program.

As captain of the 1989 Fighting Irish squad, Cunningham earned Most Valuable Player honors. She set the Notre Dame record for most kills in a match with 33 and also led the team in hitting percent at .262. Cunningham led the Irish to an appearance in the 1988 NCAA tournament where they lost to Illinois in the first round.

A competitor in the 1987 U.S. Olympic Festival, Cunningham was named one of the best freshmen in the Midwest by Midwest Volleyball Magazine. As a prep, she was a member of the Sports Performance Volleyball Club earning a gold medal in the 1986 AAU Junior Olymics. She earned AAU all-American honors and also played in the Chicago Tribune all-star game.

For the past two seasons, Cunningham has served as a gradute assistant with the women's volleyball program at the University of Illinois aiding the Illini to two NCAA tournament appearances. In addition to her practice and on-court duties, she served as an academic liaison, and coordinated matchnight duties including videotaping and statistics.

A native of Naperville, Ill., Cunningham graduated from Notre Dame in 1990 with a degree in English. She earned her master's degree in athletic administration from Illinois in 1992.

Building A Better Badger Volleyball Program

'hen building a home, you need several important tools—an experienced architect with a solid plan, the proper materials, quality workers, a solid foundation and the time to do it right.

Now apply this formula to the Badger program. Start with a solid foundation found in a program that has competed in two consecutive NCAA championships. Bring in first-year head coach John Cook as the architect with a winning plan. Six returning letterwinners and four talented newcomers are the quality workers that will provide the proper materials, and all that remains is the time to do it right.

"I want to establish a program that's good year in and year out," says Cook. "I'm expecting the first year to be one of re-establishing the program, setting a good foundation and building from that. We have to be patient and build it right, but it's going to be better later on.

With Cook's experience as an assistant coach with the bronze medal-winning U.S. men's team in the 1992 Olympic Games, and his collegiate experience as an assistant coach with the top-

ranked Nebraska women's team, the Badgers' new head coach is ready to apply all he's learned to Wisconsin.

"I'm very competitive, very intense," says Cook of his coaching style. "I demand a lot of the players in practice. I demand that they perform their best when they're in the gym and I want their full attention when they're in practice. We want to work hard, get better, and give our best every time we put on a Badger uniform.

"I want to be competitive in every match. I want to see us get better every match of the year, and see daily improvement. That will be my main focus—are we getting better every day? I'll ask them that when they come into practice and after practice is over, did we improve some way?"

Cook expects the Wisconsin rebuilding process to take time considering the changes the program underwent last season. After the unexpected death of head coach Steve Lowe in August of 1991, interim head coach Margie Fitzpatrick led the Badgers to a second-place tie in the Big Ten Conference and their second NCAA tournament bid.

Wisconsin lost five letterwinners (three starters) from that squad, including all-Big Ten selections Sue Wohlford and Liz Tortorello, leaving only six returning letterwinners. Cook took over the coaching reins on Jan. 1, an appropriate date for beginning a new era in Wisconsin vol-

'Wisconsin has made a commitment to women's volleyball—they want to have a good program and they want to succeed," says Cook. "I think that the support from the town and the State of Wisconsin is excellent. It's an exciting place to be involved with women's volley-

The excitement over Badger volleyball began two years ago when Wisconsin won its first Big Ten Championship and qualified for its first NCAA tournament advancing to the Mideast Regional in 1990. The UW set attendance records in almost every match of the season leading the Big Ten Conference in attendance and finishing third in the nation with an average of 2,199 spectators per match.

Despite losing its coach, the 1991 Badger team tied for second in the Big Ten and returned to the NCAA tournament for the second consecutive year again advancing to the Mideast Regional. Wisconsin continued to set attendance records leading the league in attendance with an average of 2,639 fans per match and moving to second in the nation.

Cook came to Wisconsin not only because of its community support, but also because of its never-say-die style of play and its home-court advantage in the Wisconsin Field House.

'When I first walked in [the Field House], I just fell in love with the place," says Cook. "I could feel the tradition, the excitement. I know what it's going to sound like when you get people in there. It's going to be an advantage for us and an advantage in recruiting as well.

"There's a tradition at Wisconsin of having teams that compete really hard and players that go all out and really put a lot into every match. I want to make sure we continue that tradition because that's a trademark of the Badgers.'

One athlete that Cook will rely on to continue that tradition is Arlisa Hagan. A six-foot, one-inch middle blocker from Louisville, Hagan earned second-team all-Big Ten and second team all-Mideast

> Region honors last season. She led the team in kills per game for the second year in a row, and in blocks per game. Hagan averaged 3.67 kills per game, finishing fifth in the conference, and 1.35 blocks per game, the fourth best in the league. She also led the team in hitting efficiency at .274.

> "She's going to be the rock that we work around," says Cook of Hagan. "She's one of the top middle blockers in the country. We want her to have a good enough year where she can be considered for all-America honors."

Hagan has 1,027 kills in her three-year career, becoming the third player in UW history to achieve the 1,000 mark. She is on track to becoming the all-time Badger kill leader this season, needing only 134 kills to surpass the record of 1,161 set by Kristen Roman from 1984-87. Hagan is also close to setting all UW blocking records. She needs just 18 block solos and 76 block assists

With the quick players on the Badger roster this season, Cook expects Wisconsin to play the same style of game as in recent years—defensively oriented with good ball handling and passing to run a more precise offense.

"I think we have some talented outside hitters and I think our passing will be excellent because those two usually go hand in hand," says Cook. "I'll be trying

to design ways to highlight the players' talents so we can really succeed at what they're good at. Instead of trying to take people and fit them into a puzzle, we're going to utilize the existing talent and

solve the puzzle.

Several important pieces of the puzzle are already in place with the return of sophomores Brigitte Lourey, Cathy Dezutel, Samantha Scott and Laurie Smith. Each saw considerable playing time as freshmen and they are ready to contribute even more this season.



to become the all-time blocking leader. In addition, Hagan is the UW career leader in hitting efficiency, connecting on .295 percent of her swings for her career.

Hagan and junior Kristin Sobocinski are the only two upperclassmen on the young Badger team. Sobocinski, a five–foot, eight–inch setter/outside hitter from Hales Corners, Wis., is the leading candidate for the starting setter position vacated by Tortorello. After playing in 103 games last season as a right-side hitter, Sobocinski can add a new twist to the Wisconsin offense.

"Based on last year, Kristin got a lot of hitting and blocking work so I think that is a strength," says Cook. "I think she has a lot to prove and hasn't really been tested (as a setter). She's a real critical part of the formula for success for our team this year. She's mentally tough and I think that's real important to have in a setter. Her toughness, her competitiveness will be a real strength for her and the team."

Sobocinski averaged 1.36 kills per game and 0.60 blocks per game last season. She was third on the team in digs with 199 and tied for third in service aces with 24. Sobocinski set career highs for kills (10) and blocks (6) last season and also tied her career best for assists (20) versus Texas Tech.





Lourey earned a starting role as an outside hitter last season playing in 97 games. A native of Columbia Heights, Minn., she finished third on the team in kills with 2.40 per game, including leading the team in seven matches. Lourey also played tough defense recording 170 digs and 51 blocks. A very talented player according to Cook, Lourey will be viewed as a team leader this season with her experience.

Dezutel, a five-foot, eight-inch outside hitter from West Chicago, Ill., and Scott, a five-foot, nine-inch outside hitter from Templeton, Calif., both saw action in 31 matches last season at service and as back-row players. Dezutel finished the season with 98 digs and 13 service aces while Scott was fourth on the team in digs with 176 and tied for third in service aces with 24.

"They're both real good defensive, ball-handling type players," says Cook of the defensive duo. "They can win a lot of matches for us by excelling in those areas."

This could be the year for Smith, a five-foot, eleven-inch outside hitter from Wheaton, Ill., to fully blossom. After backing up Sobocinski at right-side hitter last season averaging 1.25 kills and 1.08 digs per game, Smith will be ready to challenge for a starting spot. Smith's strengths are her ability to block and to hit the quick set, according to Cook.

"Whenever you take over a good program, you want to come in where there's young talent or a lot of scholarships left over," says Cook of the situation at Wisconsin. "I'll be able to build the foundation the way I want to build it and the way I think will work."

Part of Cook's foundation includes four newcomers. Amy Biddick from Livingston, Wis., Tricia Landry from Milwaukee, Michelle Miller from Worth, Ill., and Jaime Smith from El Toro, Calif., make up Cook's first recruiting class.

Biddick, a five-foot, eleven-inch middle blocker, was a third-team all-state selection as a senior at lowa-Grant High School. She earned two all-conference honors and was named the conference MVP as a senior. A member of the honor roll all four years in high school, Biddick was named her high school's senior athlete of the year

Battling Biddick for the starting middle blocker position opposite Hagan will be Landry. A six foot middle blocker, she earned all-state and all-conference honors as a junior and as a senior at Thomas Moore High School. She was also named the most valuable player of her high school team and of the Whitewater elite camp

Miller, who will challenge for the starting setter position, earned all-state honors as a senior and was an all-area selection for three years. A five-foot, ten-inch setter/outside hitter, she was four-year letterwinner in volleyball earning all-conference honors all four years at Alan B. Shepard High School. Miller was named the most valuable player of the 1991 Chicago Sun Times all-star game, and rated among the top 50 players in the area by the Chicago Tribune for three years. A member of the Neris Volleyball Club, she was named to the all-tournament team at the 1987 AAU Junior Olympics leading her team to a firstplace finish.


Smith, a five-foot, nine-inch outside hitter from El Toro High School, led her high school team to the 1991 state championship. The team leader in kills and digs, she earned all-state, all CIF and all-conference honors in volleyball as a junior and as a senior. Smith was named the conference female athlete of the year as a senior while also earning all-conference honors in softball.

"I think it's going to take time to be successful because we're going to be young and we have a lot of players who are in a transition period," says Cook of his returnees and newcomers. "With everything that happened last year and all the changes, it takes time for everything to become consistent again.

"It's a whole new start, a whole new beginning. I think people are going to be pleased if they give us time to develop. We're going to have a really good program and a good team."





The University of Wisconsin benefits from the interest and media exposure associated with the Big Ten Conference, one of the premier athletic conferences in the nation, Big Ten women's athletics programs take pride in leading the nation in volleyball attendance and in receiving more network and cable television exposure than any conference in the nation.

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete.

The women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.


As a Big Ten school, Wisconsin athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, golf, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

The Big Ten Conference volleyball champion is determined by the match record within the conference. The teams play a double, round-robin schedule with all teams playing each other twice, both at home and away, for a total of 20 matches.

The conference champion earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. In 1991, the Big Ten was represented by four universities, including the University of Wisconsin, in the NCAA Volleyball Championship.

For two consecutive years, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in volleyball attendance. Five schools finished in the top 15 in attendance and overall the league averages 1,055 spectators per match. The University of Wisconsin led the league and finished second in the nation in attendance average with 2,639 in 1991. Illinois was sixth with 2,242, Purdue 11th with 1,303; Ohio State 12th with 1,280; and Penn State 15th with 1,151 spectators per match.





A World-Class University

he University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the UW-Madison ranks as the nation's fourth largest university with 43,695 students, 11 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, 14,000 employees, over 5 million volumes in 28 libraries, and a \$1 billion budget. The University's national ranking of fifth in research and development expenditures supports its reputation as a world-class research institution.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. In what may be the most extensive survey done on graduate level education—the five-volume Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States—Wisconsin finished eighth in the nation, tied with Michigan and UCLA.

More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections are offered at UW-Madison. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's and professional degree programs.

Some of the UW's departments ranked among the top ten nationally in recent years include sociology, mathematics, chemical engineering, economics, political science, zoology, geography, statistics, history, plant pathology, molecular biology, biochemistry, Spanish, and

Much of the University's international academic reputation stems from the quality of its faculty. UW-Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 11 Nobel Prizes, with Professor Howard Temin receiving the most recent prize in 1975

for his study of retroviruses.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, research and public service, and education of physicians and other health professionals. It includes the professional schools of medicine, nursing, and pharmacy; UW Hospital and Clinics; the State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and the Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center—one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country

The Elvehjem Museum of Art, the second largest art museum in the state, houses the University's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C., and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.

ocated between Lakes Mendota and Monona, amid rolling hills and wooded areas, Madison is one of the nation's most beautiful campuses.

The city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Two major films, including the 1986 summer hit *Back To School* starring Rodney Dangerfield, have been shot on the picturesque UW campus.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise (the UW's tallest building at 19 stories), Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain, and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

A favorite area for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and cool breezes from Lake Mendota.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.


Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 125 foreign countries. UW–Madison ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students. In 1990, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority



groups accounted for 6.86 percent of the student body, an increase from 5 percent ten years ago.

The University's diversity is also evident in the more than 500 student groups. Organizations ranging from political action groups and student newspapers to recreational clubs, fraternities and sororities allow students to extend their collegiate life beyond the classroom. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.









Athletics at the UW

The University of Wisconsin–Madison offers its students one of the most diversified and complete intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

A member of the prestigious Big Ten Conference, Wisconsin offers its student-athletes the best in education, opportunities, coaching and on-field competition at the NCAA Division I level.

Competition in men's sports includes football, basketball, ice hockey, track and field, soccer, swimming and diving, tennis, crew (rowing), wrestling, cross country, and golf. Women's sports include basketball, track and field, cross country, volleyball, tennis, soccer, swimming and diving, crew, and golf.


The Chancellor

r. Donna E. Shalala is the first woman to ever lead the UW–Madison. She assumed her position as Chancellor and Professor of Political Science and Educational Policy Studies in January 1988.

One of Shalala's major goals has been rededicating the institution to the "Wisconsin Idea"—confirming a commitment to public service and social welfare, as well as an awareness that the borders of the University extend to the borders of the state and beyond.

Dedication to public service has been a trademark of Shalala's career. She spent two years in the Peace Corps, teaching English and working in community development. While a professor at Columbia University, Shalala served as a Director and Treasurer of the Municipal Assistance Corporation for the City of New York, the agency set up to help solve New York City's fiscal crisis.

Shalala earned her bachelor's degree from Western College for Women in Oxford, Ohio, in 1962, and her doctoral degree from Syracuse University in 1970. She has received 14 honorary degrees, and has been elected to the National Academy of Education and National Academy of Public Administration.















Athletic Director Pat Richter

Pat Richter, the guiding force behind University of Wisconsin Athletics, is no stranger to the sports or business worlds.


The Community

adison is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital, and is also considered one of the Midwest's most vibrant communities.

With a diverse population of 191,000, the Madison community offers an endearing quality of life for full-time residents and students. It offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family-, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports, and recreational activities.

The May 1989 issue of *Outside* magazine rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country, based on quantity and quality of outdoor activities, the surrounding environment, and the participation of its population in various sports and recreation.







Where Wisconsin Ranks

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top ten lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW–Madison among the top ten in the nation. The university has also ranked third for the last several years in research funding among the nation's universities.

In data taken from the 1983 Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States, Wisconsin tied for eighth in reputation for scholarly quality and second on the basis of faculty publications

Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality at the University of Wisconsin–Madison.

Funding

- Federal Grants: UW–Madison ranked 13th nationally in 1988, receiving 1.7% of the federal budget for university research.
- Research and Development Funds: UW-Madison ranked fifth in the country for research and development expenditures in 1989, with almost \$286 million, according to the National Science Foundation.
- Tuition: Over the last ten years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW–Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW–Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.
- Voluntary Support: UW–Madison ranked eighth in the nation, and first among public institutions in 1988-89 by receiving \$102 million in private support.
- Wisconsin Money Appropriated for Higher Education: Wisconsin ranked 21st in 1988-89 in the amount of state tax support appropriated for higher education per state resident.



Research and Programs

- Research Activity Index: In 1986, the UW–Madison ranked second in a new multidimensional study that evaluated research activity at U.S. universities.
- **Doctoral Degrees:** Between the school's founding and 1990, the University of Wisconsin–Madison awarded 27,584 Ph.D.s. Few institutions in the world can match this record.

Departmental Academic Rankings

- Business: The School of Business ranks fifth in the nation in research productivity. The faculty's scholarly output ranks first among business schools at public institutions.
- Education: The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1990. The UW's educational administration and educational policy studies rank second.
- Forestry: In 1986, the UW's forestry department was named top research department in the country by the USDA.
- Journalism and Mass
 Communication: The faculty at the
 School of Journalism and Mass
 Communication was rated first in the
 nation in research productivity in 1988 by
 Journalism Quarterly.
- Plant Pathology: In 1986, the UW's Plant Pathology department tied for a first place ranking with the University of California-Davis.
- Libraries: The UW–Madison has the 13th largest university library system in the United States, with 5 million books in 28 locations across campus.
- **Graduates**: According to a 1987 Wall Street Journal survey, UW–Madison produced the third highest percentage of CEOs at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies.





WISCONSIN

Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the UW-Madison mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as "Bucky" was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a pep rally contest was held to determine the best name for Madison's mascot. The name Buckingham U. Badger arose at the drawing and credit was given to a randomly selected sorority. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW football team to "buck right through that line."

Band Caps

When one of the Badger teams wins a game, the members of the band turn their hats around and wear them backwards. According to UW Band Director Michael Leckrone, the practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at their victory in the days when they marched out with the departing crowd.




Graduating Law Students

At Homecoming, graduating law students march down the football field and throw their white canes over the crossbar of the goal post. If they catch the cane when it comes down on the other side, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the UW–Madison in 1910.

Halloween


In 1979, the Wisconsin Student Association began sponsoring what for years had been a spontaneous event—the annual Halloween State Street costume party. The party grew in size and fame each year as costumed revelers filled the eight blocks between the Capitol and the Mall. In 1988, WSA sponsored its first non-alcoholic indoor party at the fieldhouse.



Abraham Lincoln Statue

Unveiled in 1909 as a gift of the sculptor Adolph Weinman, the statue is the only replica of one he had previously erected in Hodgenville, Kentucky—Lincoln's birthplace. However, the inscription attributes the gift to Madisonian Thomas Brittingham, who had paid for the casting of the statue and its pedestal.

Lincoln is considered a patron of the



university because he signed the Morrill Act in 1862 that provided federal aid to land-grant colleges such as UW-Madison. Tradition holds that Lincoln stands up when a virtuous coed passes by.


"On, Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the UW–Madison campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. The copyright to "On Wisconsin" is currently owned by Michael Jackson, who purchased the music a few years ago from former Beatle Paul McCartney.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brain-child of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He came up with the idea after witnessing University of Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Historic Buildings at the UW



Camp Randall

During the Civil War, Camp Randall was used as both a training ground, the state's largest Army staging point, and a hospital and stockade for confederate prisoners. Today it is owned by the university and is the home of intercollegiate athletic and recreational facilities, a small park, and the Memorial Arch, completed in 1912.

Bascom Hall

Bascom Hall was constructed in stages to become the large building it is today. Bascom was originally called University Hall and later Main Hall. In 1920 it was renamed for John Bascom, president from 1874 to 1887. The architecture is of the classic Italian High Renaissance (Federal classic), Wren-modified. The building's original ornate dome was destroyed by fire in 1916. Bascom Hall houses the UW-Madison's main administrative offices including the Chancellor's office, Dean of Students office and Graduate School. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Bascom Hill Historic District.

Memorial Library


Dedicated to those who died in our nation's wars, Memorial Library is the main research library. Along with the catalog for the holdings for campus libraries, Memorial houses the Mills Music Library, the official archives of the university, and an extensive rare books collection.

Memorial Union

Memorial Union has been called the "living room of the campus." With additions added steadily over the last half century, the Union now includes several dining rooms, theaters, study halls and game rooms, as well as the lakeside terrace. In 1933, Memorial Union became the first public university union in the country to sell beer.







North and South Halls

North Hall was the first building erected by the University (1851), serving as a dormitory for male students. Later it was converted into a classroom and office space. In 1966, North Hall became a National Historic Landmark. It now houses the political science department.

South Hall has had a wide variety of uses, including housing the old Department of Agriculture and the Hygienic Laboratory. Now it houses the dean and administrative staff of the College of Letters and Science.

Red Gym

Built in the Norman style in 1894, with Romanesque arches and heavy turrets, the Red Gym was originally intended as an armory and a gymnasium for men's physical education. A fire during the Vietnam protest era closed the gym for a few months in 1970. The building was included in the Bascom Hill Historic District in 1974. The report of a campus committee studying renovation in 1989 called the gym "a gateway building to the campus because of its central location and its historic architecture—a friendly and welcoming place for visitors, prospective students and their parents, and primarily undergraduates from all our academic schools and colleges."

Van Hise Hall

Built in 1967, at 19 stories, Van Hise is the tallest building on campus. The 17th floor houses the administration of the University of Wisconsin System. Van Hise Hall is to the UW System what Bascom Hall is to UW–Madison. Several foreign language departments make their homes here, and classrooms are located in the lower five floors.



Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year basis, renewable yearly if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Full and partial scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of rowing, which does not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



Wisconsin Sports Facilities

thletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from some of the finest sports facilities found anywhere in the country. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its women athletes.

The basketball and volleyball teams practice and compete in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse, which seats 12,204. The Fieldhouse features four remodeled locker rooms and a modern athletic training area. Other recent additions include a new lighting system and new sound system.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have a competitive advantage in their ability to play year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States. In 1984, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium was ranked by the USTA as the number one indoor tennis facility. It seats 1,500 spectators and is valued at over \$8 million. It features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, and one squash doubles court. The stadium, located close to the lakeshore dormitories, is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

Wisconsin's track teams benefit from practicing and competing during the indoor season in the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. Located next to Camp Randall Football Stadium, the "Shell" contains a 220-yard Mondo rubber track, throwing and jumping areas in the infield, and a seating capacity of 2,500.

During the outdoor season, Wisconsin track and cross country athletes will be able to use the 400-meter, Mondo rubber outdoor track, located on the west side of campus, once construction is completed in 1993. The Dan McClimon Memorial Track, dedicated in honor of the former Wisconsin head men's track and cross country coach, was the site of the 1986 Men's and Women's Big Ten Outdoor Track Championships. Planning and fund-raising are underway for the next phase of construction: the addition of permanent spectator seating with press box and locker room facilities.

The swimming and diving teams have the luxury of two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium adjacent to Unit II, and the new Unit III facility, or SERF. The "Nat" contains an eightlane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter

Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The recently completed SERF facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

Outdoor facilities at Wisconsin include soccer fields near the University Hospital. The crew boat house, situated on Lake Mendota, provides the Badger crews with a modern facility, including an indoor rowing tank for year-round practice. Construction was recently com-

pleted on an additional shell storage area, and other construction plans include a second indoor rowing tank and additional locker room space.

Our teams also have access to several other facilities on campus. The McClain Athletic Facility offers an indoor practice facility for football, soccer and track, as well as lockers for both the men's and women's track teams. The Natatorium and SERF feature numerous multipurpose gyms, weight rooms, run-

ning tracks, and other athletic facilities for practice and competition.

Other facilities that are an integral part of the athletic program are the coeducational weight training and sports medicine rooms in Camp Randall Stadium. The modern weight training area features Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in a spacious, carpeted room. Two full-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.

The care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a six-person staff of N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. They are supported by a staff of 25 student trainers and two certified graduate assistants as they care for the nearly 900 men and women athletes at Wisconsin.

The staff may use training rooms in the Stadium, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Fieldhouse. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists assigned to intercollegiate athletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.




