Mr. James Corner

Dear Sir:

After a long time I have taken my pen in hand to answer your letter and inform you that we are all well at present hoping these few lines may find you all enjoying the same blessing. I have nothing of much interest to write at present. We have had a tremendous hard winter and a very late spring. We finished sowing wheat on the 21st day of May and finished sowing oats on the 28th day and I planted five acres of corn and the prairie squirrels took all that come up and I'm going to sow the ground in oats few rows of corn of the seeds brought out with me it come nice and looks fine. It is now knee high wheat and oats look fine. We have fine growing showers this spring.

We have seen very hard times since you left there what I call hard scratching. We was glad to see spring come. Our cattle, what is left of them look well now. We turned them out to the woods for to shift for themselves the first of April. Our horses don't look well. We had very hard plowing to do this spring and we had to harrow it so often to get it in good order we harrowed our ground three times once before sowed the grain and twice after. Carrow Hodges on the eighth of this month which gave us great satisfaction to hear that you was all well. He also writes that your grain market is down and nothing doing of consequence in the grain market.

Our market has come down since the southern produce has been shipped up here. Pork is worth from 18 to 19 dollars per barrel, wheat 1.25 per bushel, corn from 60 to 65 cents per bushel, oats 65 cents per bushel. Sack included potatoes 60 cents per bushel. Flour \$6.50 to \$6.75 per barrel, corn meal two dollars per 100 pounds, sack included butter from 20 to 25 cents per 1b. Pork retails at 10 and 12 cents per lb. We still continue to have as good appetites as ever, we can eat everything before us, yet there's the stripe of vituals we will have an abundance of wild fruit here this summer such as plums, sarve berries, strawberries, black berries, raspberries, gooseberries, and quantity from bushels to wagon loads and the game is plenty (during) - or see2 - in to the river in sight of the house. The Bear is coming in here this spring, right plenty, there has been some six or eight been seen in our neighborhood and they have killed a couple of boys. T. Phillips killed two during this morning before sun up in the river opposite my field. It was plenty last winter, we have plenty of fish this spring. I made a little trap in the river opposite the house and caught lots of fish. Trout and suchers chub, etc.

I also received a letter from William W. Anderson on the 13th of May stating that his mother was quite uneasy about me. Tell her she needn't be alarmed about me. If anything serious should happen she would here it immediately. Every month I stay here the better I like the country and if I can work through and get my place paid for, money would hardly tempt me to sell it. There is a great many imigrants coming here this spring and a general rush for land. The land office is shut at this time on account of the railroad and will continue so till the railroad lands is selected, lands is raising in value very

fast and all near to the settlement is taken up. I forgot to mention anything about cattle and horses, the prices is about as they was when you was here, the health is good. We don't hear of anybody scarcely being sick, there has been but one olath that we have heard of in the neighborhood since we come here and that case was said to be coleramorbus. I want you to write to me as soon as you get this and give me a full detail of everything from a needle to an anker, the prices of things generally, and who got the place I left, the oats, and so on, deaths, marriages and tell all the rest I will write by turns if it is slow. You all live close together and when one hears from me you all can hear it is the reason why I haven't written often. I must confess that I am too neglectful about writing but that is no reason why you should be so. I want you all to write every opportunity. When you write direct to River Falls, Pierce County Wisconsin, as we haven't got any Post Office on Rush River yet. When you write I want to hear how many is coming to our country next fall. If none of you move here I want alot of you to come and take a hunt. There will be plenty deer and bear and bring a good gun and please don't bring Popguns or you will kill no game. We have only seen one party of Indians since we came here and that was a war party of the ones they had been out on a scout after the Chippewas. The two parties met near Holmans station about 8 miles north of us and there took a battle killing several on both sides. We saw them returning home to Minnesota after the battle, 50 or 60 in number. I am getting near the bottom of my paper and will have to come to a close by requesting you to write to me soon. We send our best respects to all.

So no more at present but still remain yours with respect.
