

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THE "FATHER" OF MEMORIAL DAY.

Inasmuch as, since General Logan's decease, a certain person has set up a claim to be the originator of Memorial Day, I have deemed it proper to reproduce the following:—

Extract from General order issued by Gen. Logan Establishing Memorial Day:

HEADQUARTERS GRAND ARMY OF THE REPUBLIC, WASHINGTON, May 5. 1868 .-

General Orders No. 11.

- 1. The 30th day of May, 1868, is designated for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defence of their country during the late rebellion, and whose bodies now lie in almost every city, village, and hamlet churchyard in the land.
- 2. It is the purpose of the Commander-in-chief to inaugurate this observance with the hope that it will be kept up from year to year while a survivor of the war remains to honor the memory of his departed comrades.
- 3. Department commanders will use every effort to make this order effective. By command of John A. Logan, Commander-in-chief.

Both from the fact that General Logan was the founder of *Memorial Day*, and from the additional fact that no General of the Union Armies ever lay nearer the hearts of our volunteer soldiers than did John A. Logan, it seems very proper that Logan's name should be embalmed in our Patriotic Songs at Home, as well as in our patriotic entertainments and concerts, and *especially* upon "*Memorial Sunday*" and "*Decoration Day*."

It is therefore suggested that, before this song is sung, on *Memorial Day*, the foregoing *Order* be read, or a statement be made, so that the younger people may the better understand why we specially honor Logan's memory upon this occasion.

Wherever practicable, on Memorial Day, and at the Funeral of a Veteran, let the surviving veterans be gathered upon or near the platform and let them stand facing the audience with uncovered heads during the singing of this song, the chorus of which contains the sentiment so often uttered by Logan, and that lay so near his heart in his dying hour. The song voices the veterans' sentiment throughout, and is therefore appropriate for the living or the dying, or the last rites of the dead.
