Best Places to Live in America

Excerpts Reprinted from *Money Magazine*, July 1996

"Madison, Wis., is not the best place to live, it's the perfect place to live," insists Donna Shalala, former UW Chancellor who became President Clinton's Secretary for Health and Human Services.

We second the sentiment. This year, Madison (and the rest of Dane County) earns the No. 1 position among the 300 biggest U.S. metropolitan areas in our 1996 Best Places to Live in America ranking.

The 390,300 residents of Dane County, 80 miles west of Milwaukee in south-central Wisconsin, have a vibrant economy with plentiful jobs, superb health care, and a range of cultural activities usually associated with cities twice as big. This mid-metro area also offers up a low crime rate and palpable friendliness you might assume are available only in say, Andy Griffith's Mayberry.

So what makes us so mad about Madison? Start with a peppy economy. Madison's absurdly low 1.5% unemployment rate is the lowest of all 300 places we ranked.

Mad City, as locals call it, is also Fun City, especially if you like boats and bikes. The Mendota and Monona lakes are separated by a half-mile wide isthmus that serves as downtown Madison. Add in three other large lakes, and Dane County can satisfy any type of boating preference.

Cyclers have more than 150 miles of bike trails and routes to pedal. In winter, cross country skiers glide through more than 100 miles of trails. For cerebral outings, Madison has five museums including the little-hands-on Madison Children's Museum.

Saturdays in the fall are reserved for rooting on UW's revered Badger football team. Another popular May through October ritual is the farmer's market (on the Capitol Square). Around the corner you can catch an earful at the Madison Civic Center where the Wisconsin Chamber Orchestra and Madison Symphony perform, and Pulitzer prize-winning plays are staged.

A former Olympic coach, John Cook begins his fifth year as the head coach at the University of Wisconsin. Cook not only brings Olympic credentials but also national championship experience to the Badger program.

Cook has won at every level of volleyball that he has coached. From his days as a high school coach at Francis Parker High School in San Diego to his stint as an assistant coach with the 1992 Olympic bronze-medaling-winning U.S. men's team, the head coach of the Badgers has proven to be a winner.

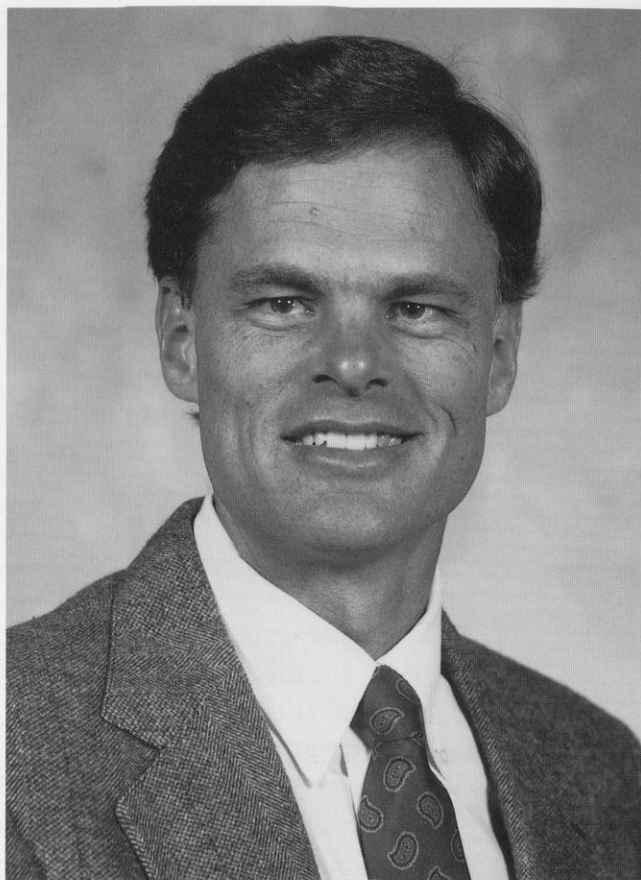
In four years, Cook has led the Badgers to three post-season tournament appearances. In 1995, Wisconsin won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship with a perfect 6-0 record. It also qualified for the NCAA tournament in 1993 and 1994.

Cook's 1996 Wisconsin team is ready to burst onto the national scene. With an experienced and seasoned group of letterwinners returning along with four high school all-American recruits, this could be the year the Badgers take another big step forward towards Big Ten and NCAA aspirations.

Cook and the Badgers have big goals this season and so far he is right on schedule. If this year's team follows Cook's pattern of success, Wisconsin volleyball will become a force on the Big Ten and national level this season.

As the first assistant coach with the United States Men's National Volleyball team, Cook aided the U.S. to a bronze medal in the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona. The team's defensive coordinator, he was also in charge of scouting, and supervising the team's flexibility, strength and conditioning programs.

For his Olympic coaching experience, Cook was honored in June of 1993 at the



NACDA/USOC Collegiate Coaches Recognition Awards Luncheon.

Prior to his appointment with the national team, Cook served as the head assistant coach with the University of Nebraska women's volleyball program from 1988-91. During Cook's tenure at Nebraska, the Cornhuskers advanced to the NCAA final four every year including a second-place finish in 1989. Nebraska also captured the NCAA Mid-east Regional and Big Eight Conference championship each of those three years.

Cook served as the Huskers' recruiting coordinator, scouting chief, strength and conditioning coordinator, and was the liaison with the academic advising center. Nebraska

garnered seven volleyball academic all-America honors during a three-year period, ranking them No. 1 in the country.

As the head assistant coach at the University of California-San Diego from 1983-84, Cook aided the Tritons to a NCAA Division III national championship in 1984 and a second-place national finish in 1983.

In the U.S. Olympic Festival competition, Cook served as head coach of the bronze medal-winning North team in 1989, and was an assistant coach with the third-place West team in 1987.

A co-founder of the San Diego Volleyball Club, Cook served as a coach with the club from 1986-88. The club won two Southern California Regional Championships and finished among the final four teams twice in the USVBA Junior Olympics for girls 18 and under.

Cook's coaching credentials also include leading Francis Parker High School in San Diego to two California state championships. During his six-year coaching stint, he had a .900 winning percentage with an overall record of 162-18, including a 90-match league winning streak.

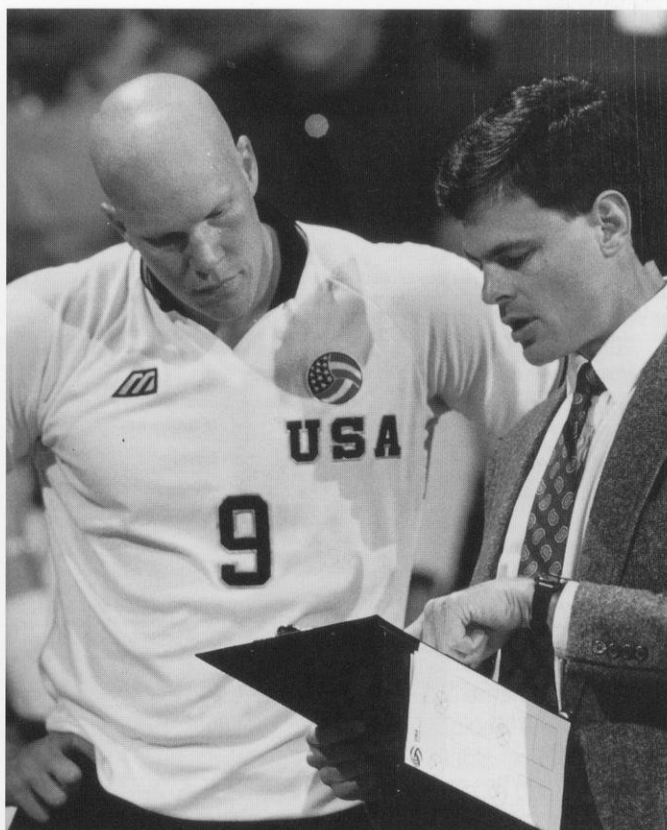
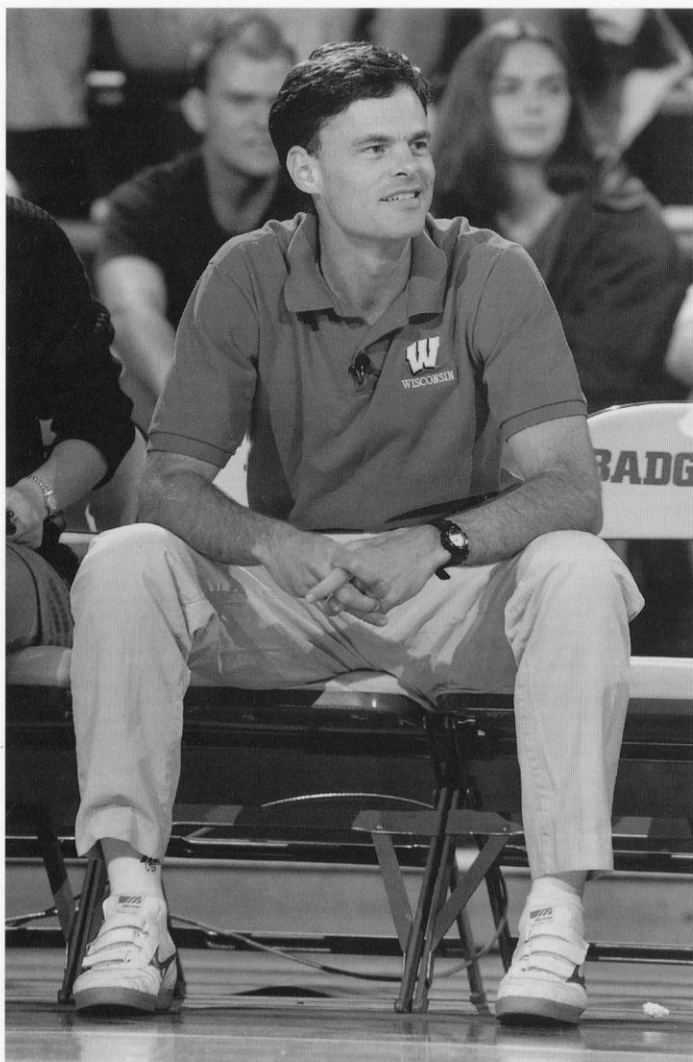
A well-known speaker on volleyball skills, Cook travels around the nation participating in clinics. He also serves as the host of the Badger Coaching Symposium, one of the best attended volleyball coaching clinics in the country, every spring.

A graduate of the University of San Diego, Cook earned his bachelor's degree in history in 1979. He completed his master's degree in teaching and coaching effectiveness from San Diego State University in 1991.

Cook and his wife Wendy, a former two-time all-American setter at San Diego State, are the parents of two children—Lauren 5 and Taylor 3.

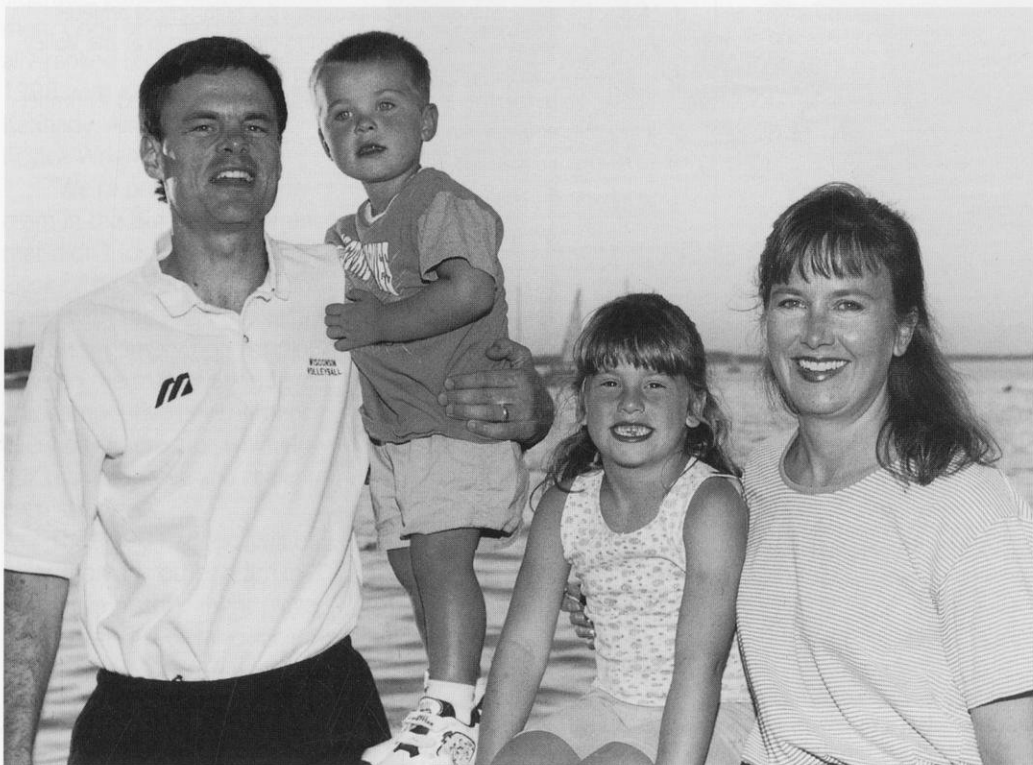

Chris Bigelow

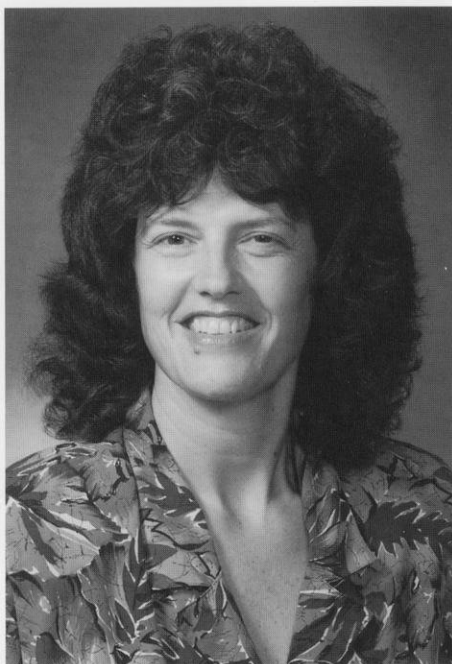
Chris Bigelow, a former assistant coach at the University of Texas, begins her first season as an assistant coach at Wisconsin.

Bigelow served as an assistant under Mick Haley at Texas from 1984-90. The Longhorns compiled a 204-48 record during Bigelow's tenure winning seven Southwest Conference titles and competing in seven NCAA tournaments. Texas won the 1988 NCAA Championship and advanced to the final four in 1985 and 1986 losing in the semifinals.

Bigelow also coached at Montana State University from 1978-82 including two seasons as the head coach of the Bobcats. She was a high school coach for one year at St. Stephens Episcopal High School in Austin, Texas.

A three-sport athlete at Eastern Washington University, Bigelow was a member of the USA Volleyball training squad from 1973-74. Bigelow graduated from Eastern Washington in 1974 with a bachelor's degree in physical education. She received her master's degree from Montana State in physical education in 1980.

After leaving Texas, Bigelow served as a volleyball radio and television analyst while also coaching in the Austin Junior Volleyball Association.



Craig Skinner

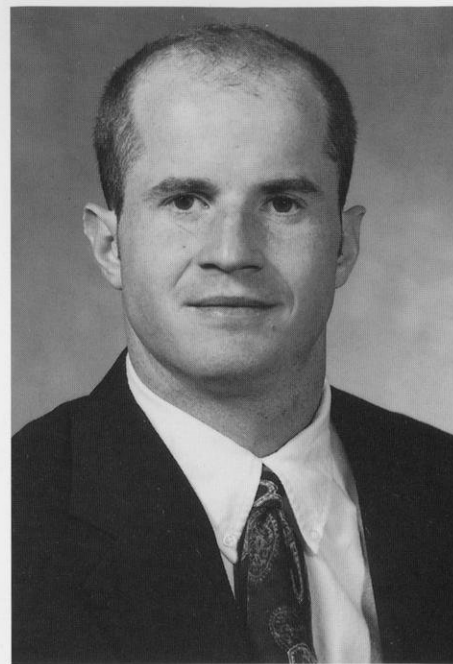
A former member of the Ball State men's volleyball team, Craig Skinner begins his third season with the Badger volleyball program.

As a member of the third-place 1990 NCAA Championship team, Skinner was team captain twice for the Cardinals. He finished 13th on the Ball State career list for service aces and digs. As a sophomore, Skinner received the Mid-American Conference Commissioner's Award for Academic Excellence. He graduated from Ball State with a bachelor's degree in accounting in 1993.

While attending Ball State, Skinner also worked as a coach and administrative assistant with the Munciana Volleyball Club, one of the most successful club volleyball programs in the country. Skinner was an assistant coach with the Munciana 18's, aiding them to three top-five finishes at the USVA Junior Olympics. He also worked as the head junior varsity coach and assistant varsity coach at Muncie's Burris High School. Skinner led the junior varsity program to an undefeated 17-0 season while the varsity program was crowned *USA Today* High School National Champions in 1990.

He is currently a head coach with the Wisconsin Volleyball Club, the Madison-area USVA volleyball program for high school athletes. Skinner led the WVC girls 18s to a division championship at the Volleyball Festival in Sacramento, Calif., the last two years.

In addition to his club experiences, Skinner has worked a number of volleyball camps around the nation.



Like any artist, the 1996 Wisconsin volleyball team is waiting to see what kind of masterpiece it can create. All the tools are in place—a master craftsman in fifth-year head coach John Cook; a talented group of artists featuring six returning starters and nine returning letterwinners; the support of some of the best volleyball fans in the nation; and a blank canvas on which any masterpiece can be created. The Badgers are anxious to begin painting a classic season.

"The 1996 Badgers are a team that is on a mission of greatness. A team that plays with reckless abandon on defense, a team that plays every point and a team that never says die," says Cook. "We have many exciting and talented players who will play confident and aggressive volleyball."

Cook has worked four years to create this masterpiece. For the first time in his career, he will have a team that is completely of his making. Cook's first recruiting class of Laura Abbinante and Holly Smith are seniors while his nationally-ranked 1994 recruiting class of Lauren Burny, Heather Dodaro and Amy Lee are juniors. His sophomore class, led by 1995 starter Marisa Mackey, saw considerable playing time as freshmen. Cook adds another nationally-ranked recruiting class in 1996 with Kate Fitzgerald, Kelly Kennedy, Allyson Ross and Keylee Wright.

"We're probably the only team in the Big Ten Conference that didn't lose a starter," says Cook of his 1996 team. "Combined with the Fab Four recruiting class, competition for playing time on the team will be fierce. The competitive environment every day in practice will help our team improve and make us even stronger."

The 1996 Badgers will be taller than any other team in Wisconsin history. Eight players come in at 6-0 or taller including Kennedy, who at 6-4 is the tallest player to ever put on a Badger uniform.

Laura Abbinante set the UW career record for assists as a junior with 4,488. She is a 1995 first-team AVCA all-District 2 and all-Big Ten selection.

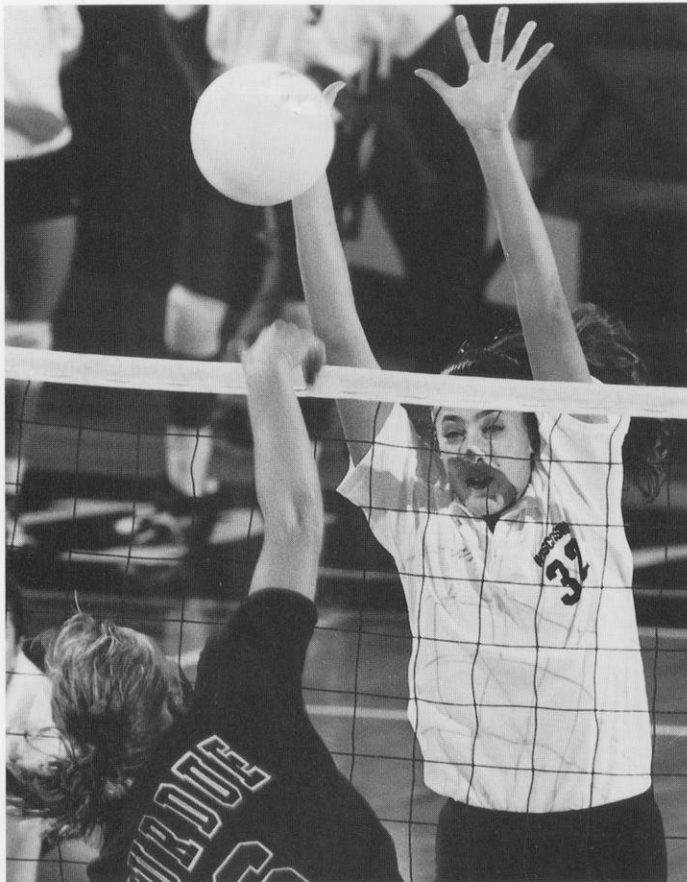
Wisconsin will also have experience and depth in 1996. In addition to returning all six starters, Wisconsin has three other athletes that saw considerable playing time last season. Include an extremely talented freshman class and the Badgers already have the first layer of their masterpiece designed.

The Badgers also have the added experience of ending their 1995 season on a winning note. Wisconsin won the National Invitational Volleyball Championship with a 6-0 tournament record. The title was the second for a Wisconsin team as the Badgers won the inaugural NIVC title in 1989, and went on to win the 1990 Big Ten title.

"The NIVC tournament was a blessing in disguise," explains Cook. "Only two teams ended their season on a winning note, the NCAA champions and the NIVC champions. Our team gained valuable experience and confidence from the tournament. We played six matches under tournament pressure, and won 15-13 in the fifth game of the championship match. We proved that we can play consistently and win the big matches."

Consistent play eluded Wisconsin for much of the 1995 season. The Badgers were 3-4 early in the season suffering losses to No. 2 Nebraska, No. 19 Houston and unranked Arkansas and Kansas State. Wisconsin won eight of its next 10 matches including an upset of then-No. 12 Ohio State in Columbus. Disaster struck as Wisconsin lost its next seven matches, including four to ranked opponents, dropping the UW to 11-13 overall and 4-9 in the league. During their losing streak, the Badgers also lost their starting setter Abbinante to a thumb injury for two matches.

"The agony of defeat is a real pain that we all lived through last year during the Big Ten season," says Cook. "The disappointment of last year's

performance provides extra motivation this year in driving the team to greatness."

Wisconsin rebounded from its losing streak to win 11 of its last 13 matches including upsets of fifth-ranked Michigan State and 24th-ranked Illinois. The Badgers won their last seven matches of the season to finish 22-15 overall.

Cook expects this year's team to continue where last year's left off—on a winning note. In fact, the Badger craftsman describes his team as "starving for a championship."

"To achieve a championship season, our entire team needs to focus on volleyball excellence—giving every ounce of physical and mental energy towards the game, and playing at the highest level we are capable of," says Cook. "If our team advances confidently and aggressively towards their dreams and goals, we will meet with success."

"When adversity and obstacles develop, our challenge will be to not let anything get in our way."

Two players that will be a key to not letting anything get in the Badgers way are seniors Laura Abbinante and Holly Smith.

Abbinante has been the Badgers starting setter for the last three years. Her experience at running Wisconsin's offense will be a key factor in this season's drive for a championship.

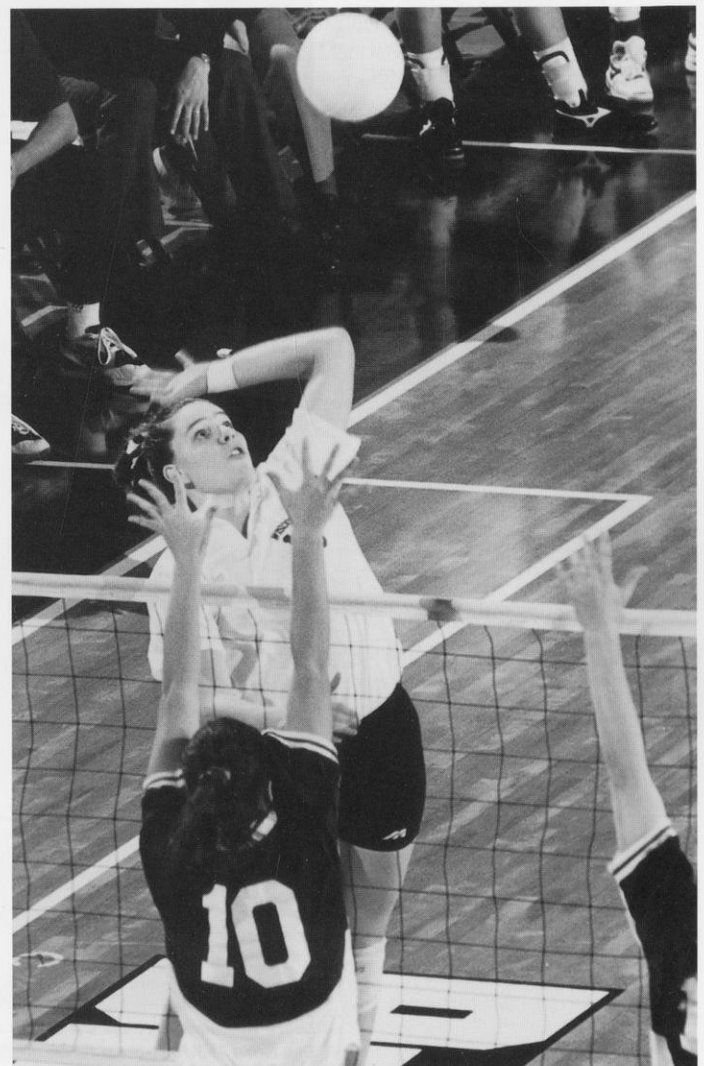
"In my opinion, Laura is the best setter in the country," says Cook. "She has broken records and achieved everything except a championship. Laura's motivation and drive may be one of our

greatest strengths. Her leadership and competitive fire will help our team be successful in close matches and big points."

Abbinante is a two-time all-Big Ten honoree and is on-track to become the conference's all-time career assist leader. On her way to setting a Wisconsin season record for assists with 1,653, she set the Wisconsin career record for assists as a junior with 4,488. Abbinante needs only 1,536 assists to break the league mark of 6,024 set by Sharon Oesterling of Minnesota from 1986-89. The 1995 American Volleyball Coaches Association all-district 2 selection averaged 12.62 assists per game last season. She also finished third on the team in digs with 2.80 per game and third in service aces with 36.

Smith and Abbinante have competed in post-season tournaments all three years as Badgers. Smith, a 6-1 middle blocker, is the team's most efficient hitter ranking fifth on the UW career hitting percentage list at .270. She is also among the UW's all-time blockers with 260 blocks assists and 27 block solos. Last season, the Wheaton, Ill., native hit .282 percent, which ranked 15th in the conference. Smith played some of her best ball during the NIVC tournament recording season highs of 14 kills and eight blocks in the championship match.

"This team has a tremendous amount of motivation that will be directed by Laura and Holly," says Cook. "We have a group of

players who are committed to showing the volleyball world that they are willing to fight for the winner's circle."

Cook not only has a strong senior class to rely on, but also an experienced junior class. All three members, Burny, Dodaro and Lee, have started at least one year for the Badgers.

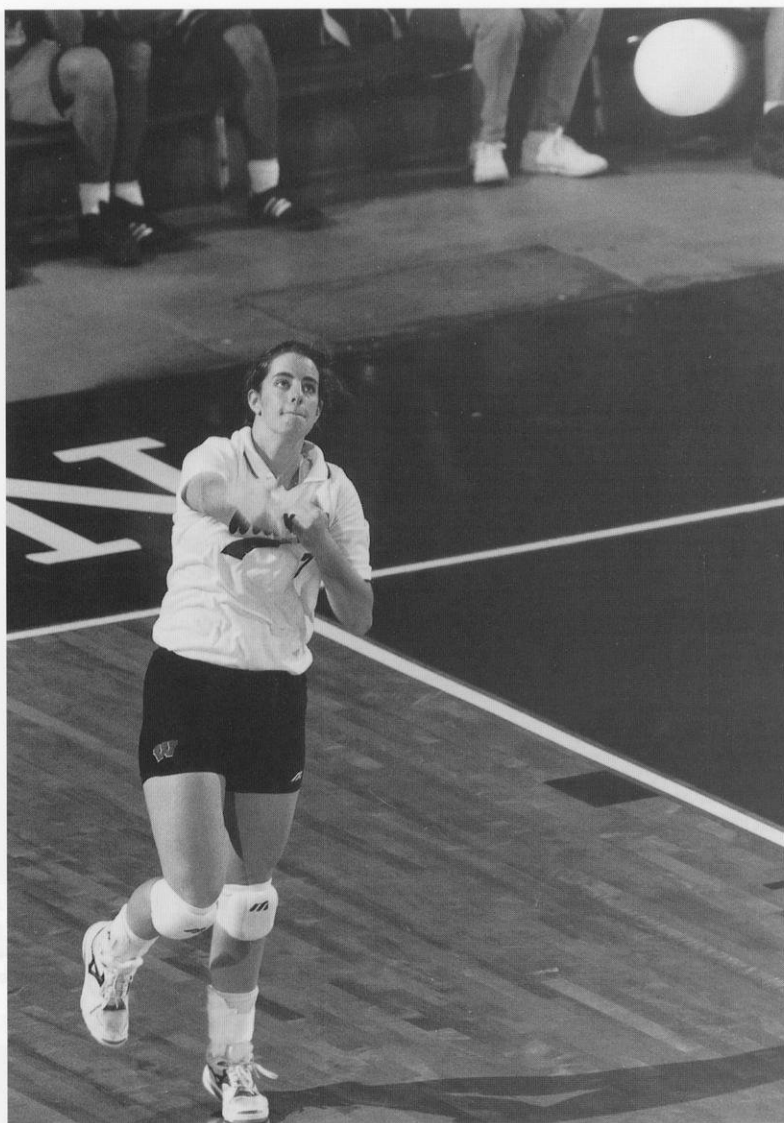
Burny, a 6-0 outside hitter, led the team in digs last season averaging 3.16 per game, which ranked eighth in the Big Ten. She set a career high of 27 digs in the NIVC championship match. The Elmhurst, Ill., native finished fourth on the team last season in kills with 1.93 per game and service aces with 28.

Dodaro, a 6-1 middle blocker, set the UW season record for block assists with 181. She led the team with 1.54 blocks per game, which ranked third in the Big Ten. The Oak Lawn, Ill, native also finished second on the team in kills with 470 (3.53 per game). After only two years as a Badger, Dodaro already ranks fourth on the UW career list for block assists with 340 and fifth in total blocks with 380. She is also one of the most efficient hitters with a career percentage of .229, which ranks eighth.

While Dodaro was setting the UW season record for block assists, Lee was setting the UW season record for kills with 628. Her 4.62 kills per game average ranked fifth in the league. Lee, a native of Milwaukee, recorded a career-high 28 kills three times last season including the NIVC championship match. The 6-0 left-handed outside hitter also proved she can block as she finished second on the team with 1.07 blocks per game.

Another season record set in 1995 was for service aces by freshman Marisa Mackey. The 5-11 outside hitter led the Big Ten with 68 service aces on the season for a 0.50 per game average. The Muncie, Ind., native started all 37 matches as a freshman finishing third on the team in kills with 2.62 per game. She also finished second on the team in digs with 2.77 per game.

Two other freshmen also saw playing time in 1995. Colleen Neels played in 26 matches primarily as a back-row specialist. The 5-9 Pewaukee, Wis., native averaged 1.61 digs per game including a career-high 16 digs in the NIVC championship match. Neels also took over the starting setter job when



As a freshman, Marisa Mackey led the Big Ten and set the UW season record for service aces with 68. She finished third on the team in kills with 356 and second in digs with 376.

Abbinante was injured. She averaged 12.17 assists per game during that stretch.

Lindsey Buswell played in eight matches as a freshman back-row specialist. The 5-5 Buswell recorded career highs of one assist and one dig.

With such a talented group of upperclassmen, Many critics would expect the 1996 recruiting class may be sitting on the bench. But Cook expects his nationally-ranked class to immediately step in and contribute.

"The Fab Four is an outstanding recruiting class," says Cook. "All four freshmen are physically capable of starting and playing in the Big Ten. Their adjustment to the college game and their competitive drive will determine playing time. This class gives our team added depth and will allow us to explore many player combinations and match-ups against our competition."

The 1996 class was ranked fourth best in the nation by *National Scholastic* magazine and three members were named *Volleyball* Fab 50 selections.

Fitzgerald, a 6-0 outside hitter, is a three-time all-state selection from Milwaukee. She was named the 1995 Metro

Conference Player of the Year leading Thomas More High School to the league title. Fitzgerald is also a three-time all-conference honoree.

Kennedy, a 6-4 middle blocker, could become a dominant force for Wisconsin at the net. She was a member of the 1995 USA Youth National team that won the Slovakia Cup. The East Barrington, Ill., native earned all-conference and all-area honors for Barrington High School. A member of the Sports Performance Volleyball Club, Kennedy was a member of the second-place team at the 1995 Junior Olympic National Championship.

Ross, a 6-1 outside hitter/middle blocker from Solana Beach, Calif., also earned *Volleyball* Fab 50 honors. She was the 1994 and 1995 county, section and league player of the year at Torrey Pines High School. Ross led her team to three appearances in the state division 2 tournament, and three league and CIF titles.

Wright, a 6-0 outside hitter, comes in with the most impressive credentials. A four-time USVA all-American, she was named the 1994 USVA National Player of the Year. Wright also earned third-team all-American honors at the 1996 Junior Olympics and third-team all-American honors by Mizuno in 1995. A native of Muncie, Ind., she played in the 1995 Mizuno all-American match being named the MVP of the USA team. Wright was also a member of the 1994 USA Youth National team and a *Volleyball* Fab 50 selection. A teammate of Marisa Mackey at Burriss High School, Wright was a member of the 1994 state championship team. She was also a two-time all-area and all-conference selection.

"The will to win and the ability to remain confident are the aspects of the game that will determine the success of this year's team," says Cook. "With this team on its mission, we have to carry through on our commitment to be the best that we are capable of becoming.

"Another goal will be to have fun. We've made a commitment to enjoy each other and the sport of volleyball. Wisconsin is one of the greatest environments in college volleyball. I want our players to enjoy the privilege of playing in the Field House in front of some of the greatest volleyball fans in the country."

The Badgers open their season on Aug. 30-31 at the Colorado Invitational. Wisconsin will face perennial powers USC, Colorado and Texas-Arlington. Wisconsin returns home for the prestigious Inntowner Invitational on Sept. 6-7 featuring teams from Loyola, Maryland and Texas A&M. The Badgers also face North Carolina, Duke, Butler, Pittsburgh, and American University during the nonconference portion of their schedule.

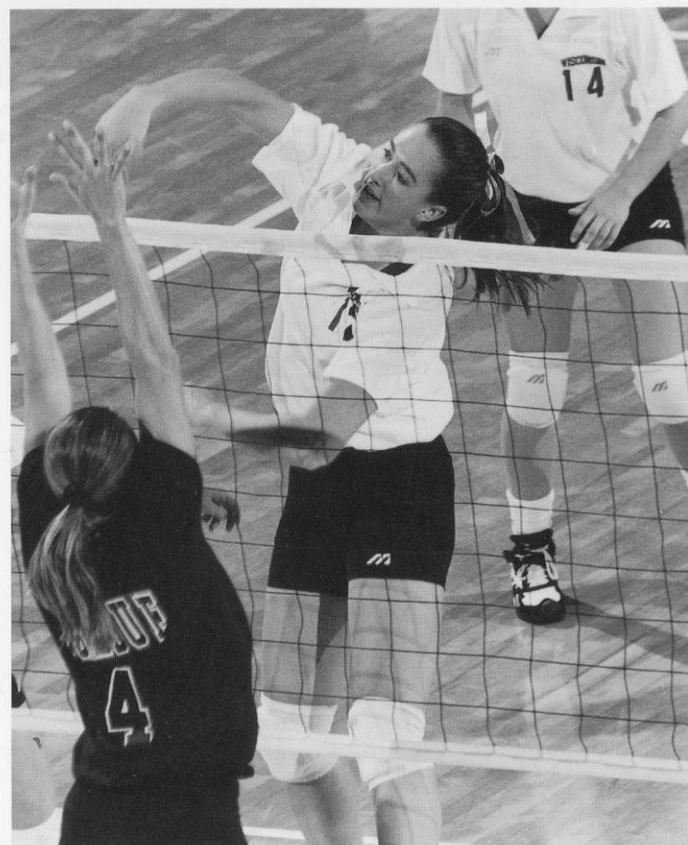
The Big Ten Conference season kicks off on Sept. 27 and 28 when Wisconsin plays host to national powers Ohio State and Penn State. Defending champion Michigan State, Illinois and Indiana will be among the 1996 league favorites.

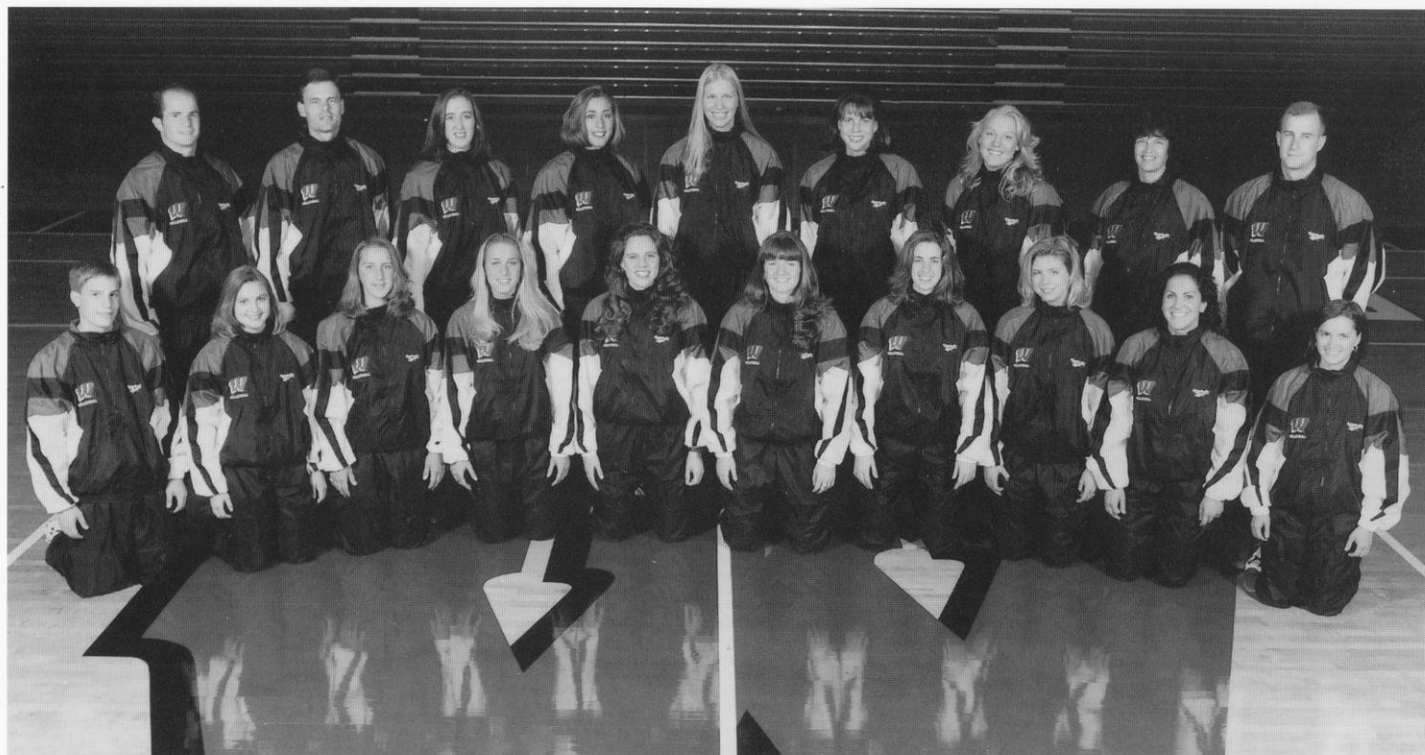
"The Big Ten is one of the toughest conferences in the country," says Cook. "Any team can win on a given night. Each year a team comes out of the pack to surprise everyone. Expect another team to emerge this year.

"To win the conference championship takes determination, leadership, balance, the ability to deal with adversity, and a deep belief in your teammates. I like our team and I think we'll have an opportunity to make a run for the championship in 1996."

NIVC Champions: Wisconsin finished the 1995 season as the winner of the National Invitational Volleyball Championship. The Badgers swept through the tournament with a perfect 6-0 mark to finish the season 22-15, their second consecutive 20-win season.

It was Wisconsin's second NIVC title having won the inaugural tournament in 1989, under the late Steve Lowe. Those Badgers went on to win the Big Ten Conference title the following season.

Wisconsin finished seventh in the Big Ten at 9-11.

Abbinante NIVC MVP: Laura Abbinante was named the most valuable player of the 1995 NIVC.

The junior setter recorded 327 assists (14.86 per game) in leading the Badgers to the team title. She had 60 digs (2.73 per game), 20 blocks (0.91 per game), 18 kills and five service aces in the six matches.

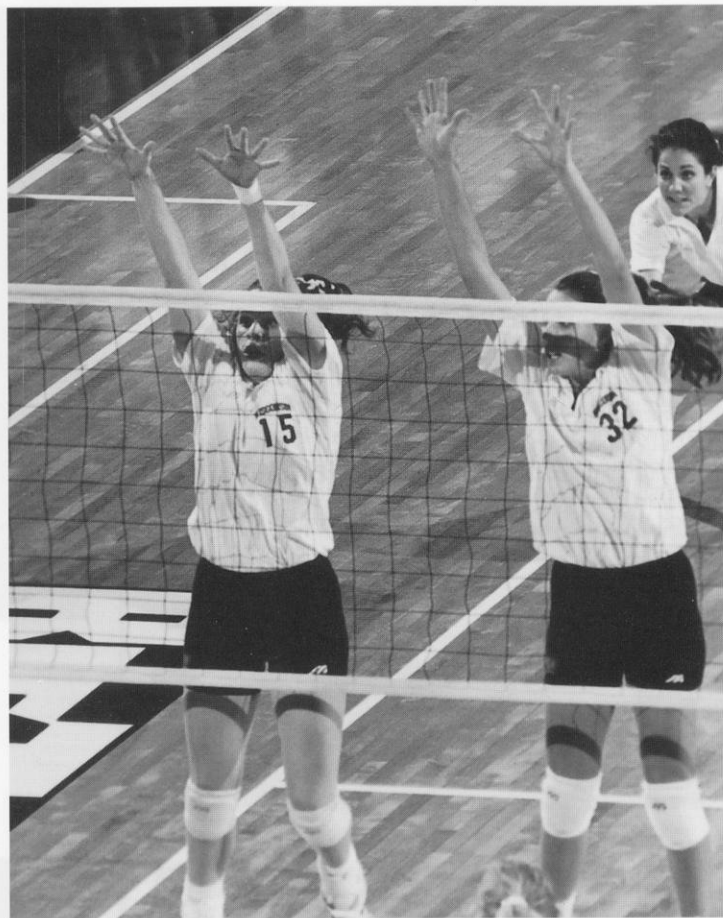
Sophomore Amy Lee was also named to the NIVC all-tournament team. The 6-0 outside hitter led Wisconsin in kills with 114 (5.18 per game). She added 28 block assists (1.27 per game), and 54 digs (2.46 per game). Lee led the Badgers in kills in four matches including tying her career high of 28 against CSU-Sacramento.

Coach John Cook: Cook wrapped up his fourth year at Wisconsin with a 76-57 (.571) career mark. He has led the Badgers to three consecutive post-season appearances.

Nationally Ranked Attendance: Wisconsin finished the season ranked seventh in the nation in attendance. The Badgers averaged 1,915 spectators per match. In Big Ten matches, Wisconsin averaged 2,217 spectators per match. The Badgers finished second in the Big Ten Conference to Illinois.

Abbinante Named All-District/All-Big Ten: Abbinante was named to the AVCA all-District 2 and all-Big Ten Conference honor teams. She set a UW record for assists this season with 1,653 (12.62 per game). Abbinante was one of only two setters named to the 13-member all-Big Ten team. She also averaged 2.80 digs, 0.28 service aces and 0.70 blocks per game.

Lee Sets Kills Record: Amy Lee set the UW season record for kills with 628. The left-handed outside hitter led the team and finished fifth in the Big Ten with 4.62 kills per game. She recorded double figure kills in 31 matches including 14 matches with 20-plus kills. Lee set a career high of 28 kills, which is tied for seventh on the UW match list, in three matches this season including the NIVC championship matches against CSU-Sacramento. She also set the UW season record for attack attempts with 1,468.

Dodaro Sets Block Record:

Sophomore Heather Dodaro broke her own UW season record for blocks assists during the 1995 season. She recorded 181 blocks breaking her mark of 159 set in 1994. Dodaro also set the UW season record for blocks assists during Big Ten matches only with 95. The old record was 92, set by Lisa Boyd in 1988.

Inntowner Champions: Wisconsin won its own Inntowner Invitational for the third year in a row with a 3-0 record. The Badgers defeated Eastern Illinois, 3-0, Marquette 3-0 and UW-Green Bay 3-1 to win the 1995 title. Wisconsin also won the tournament in 1993 and 1994.

All-Tournament Teams: Wisconsin landed players on the all-tournament teams in all four tournaments that they played in 1995.

Laura Abbinante was named to the honor team at the Houston Kickoff Tournament and at the FirstTier Invitational. She was named the MVP of the Inntowner Invitational and the National Invitational Volleyball Championship. Amy Lee was named to the all-tournament team at the

Inntowner and NIVC while Heather Dodaro was named to the Inntowner Invitational all-tournament team.

Mackey Serves Up Aces: Marisa Mackey set the UW season record for service aces with 68. The freshman outside hitter tied for the Big Ten Conference lead with 0.50 service aces per game. She recorded a career high of six service aces when the Badgers upset No. 5 Michigan State.

Three Named Academic All-Big Ten: Three Badgers were named to the Academic All-Big Ten team. In order to be named to the team, student-athletes must maintain a 3.0 cumulative grade point average, be a letterwinner, and be in at least their second year at the institution.

Senior Jaime Smith earned her third consecutive honor with a 3.39 grade point average in marketing and psychology. Sophomore Amy Lee earned her first honor with a 3.27 GPA in history while sophomore Dawn Kelly also earned her first honor with a 3.11 GPA in English.

Abbinante Sets Assist Record: Junior Laura Abbinante became Wisconsin's all-time assist leader with her eighth assist against Iowa. Abbinante broke the old UW record of 4,107 set by Liz Tortorello from 1988-91.

The 5-9 setter broke her own season record for assists with 1,653 this year bringing her three-year total to 4,488. Her total ranks ninth on the Big Ten Conference career list. Sharon Oesterling of Minnesota (1986-89) holds the all-time Big Ten mark of 6,024.

When Steve Lowe unexpectedly passed away on Aug. 22, 1991, the University of Wisconsin and the Madison community lost a true friend and a winner on and off the court.

With Lowe at the helm, the Badger volleyball program burst onto the national scene. In 1989, he directed the Badgers to the title in the inaugural National Invitational Volleyball Championship, their first post-season appearance ever.

The following year he steered Wisconsin to its first Big Ten Conference title and guided the Badgers to their first NCAA tournament appearance and first national ranking, finishing 10th in the final 1990 NCAA poll. Lowe also produced Wisconsin's first volleyball all-American with Lisa Boyd earning second-team honors in 1990.

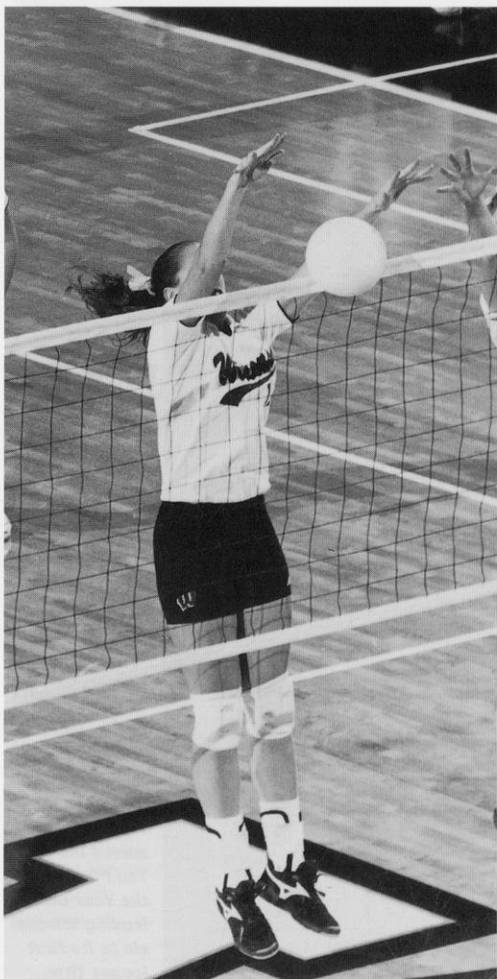
Lowe, who had a 108-64 career record in five years at Wisconsin, earned 1990 Big Ten and AVCA Midwest Coach of the Year honors.

Every year Wisconsin's Big Ten Conference home opener will be designated "Steve Lowe Night." This year's match is on Friday, Sept. 27, versus Ohio State. A portion of the gate receipts from this match will go to the Steve Lowe Memorial Scholarship fund for a UW volleyball player.

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the nation's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Founded in 1848, the first class of 17 students enrolled February 5, 1849. Today, UW-Madison ranks as the nation's seventh largest university with 40,005 students. It is one of the nation's largest and most productive institutions of higher learning and the student body is one of the most diverse in the country with students coming from every state in the country. Wisconsin also ranks third in the nation for foreign student enrollment.

More than 4,546 courses and 12,762 sections are offered in UW-Madison's 12 schools and colleges. Majors are available in 150 undergraduate, 182 master's, and 125 doctoral and professional degree programs.

Award-winning research spanning the academic disciplines has earned UW-Madison a place among the world's elite institutions of higher education. Wisconsin has ranked among the top 10 universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. The quality of its undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized around the world.

One survey rated 49 different undergraduate programs at UW-Madison among

the top 10 in the nation. Among those ranked include sociology, business, German, chemical engineering, geography, ecology, genetics, statistics, molecular biology and biochemistry, French, Spanish, political science, industrial engineering, computer science, chemistry, mathematics, and history.

UW-Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 13 Nobel Prizes and 21 Pulitzer Prizes. There are 44 faculty members who are winners of Presidential Young Investigator awards, nine winners of the National Medal of Science, and four Searles scholars. Forty-six professors are members of the National Academy of Sciences, 14 are members of the National Academy of Engineering, three in the

National Academy of Education and 48 are fellows in the American Physical Society.

UW-Madison is one of the nation's first land-grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life science. The founders of the university developed the "Wisconsin Idea" as making "the beneficent influence of the university available to every home in the state."

UW-Madison is the largest institution in the University of Wisconsin System. It has the only public law and medical schools in the state as well as the only school of veterinary medicine.

■ A Scenic Campus

One of the most picturesque college campuses in the country, UW-Madison lies along the beautiful shores of Lake Mendota.

One mile from the capitol, traveling down historic State Street, the city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Madison's lakes, rolling hills, architecture, parks and arboretum have enhanced UW-Madison's reputation for scenic beauty. The city of Madison is frequently listed among the top five best places to live in the nation.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall, the first building on campus; the Carillon Tower in front of the Social Science building; the Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain; and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

A favorite area for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lake-side terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and breezes from Lake Mendota.

■ The Student Body

More than 40,000 students populate the 900-acre UW campus, including more than 11,500 graduate and professional students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 119 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks third in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students and faculty. In the fall of 1995, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority groups accounted more than nine percent of the student body.

■ The Community

Located in southern Wisconsin, Madison is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital.

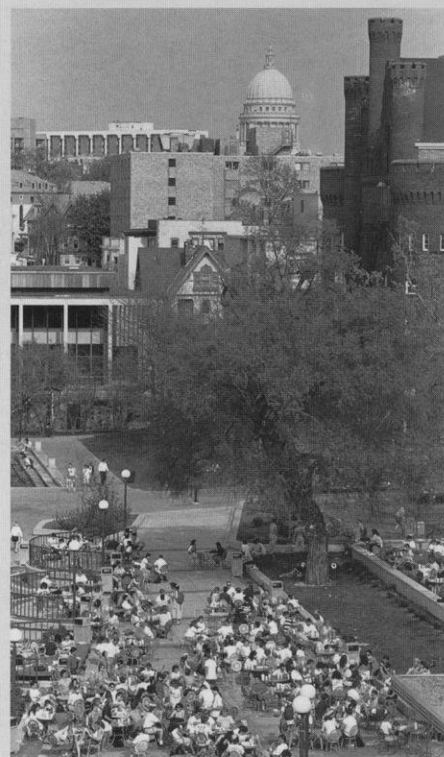
With a diverse population of 200,814, Madison offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family and, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports, and recreational activities.

"A list of first-rate academic programs at Madison would be as complete as a college catalog elsewhere. There are 70 programs considered in the top 10 nationally.

Madison was named the best place to live in America for 1996 by *Money* magazine. The July 1995 issue of *Outside* magazine called Madison a "Dream Town". The magazine also rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country. *U.S. News and World Report* named it one of the country's 10 Hottest Cities. Madison was also featured on the front page of the Life section of *USA Today* on July 12, 1995.

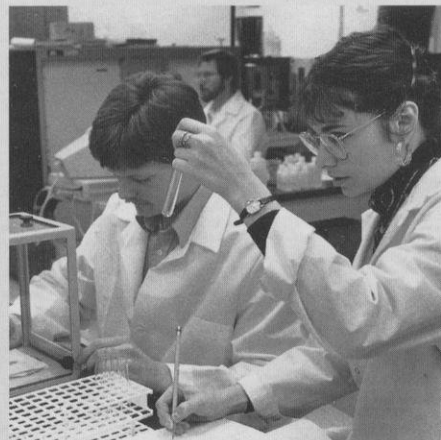


WHERE WISCONSIN RANKS

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top 10 lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

The 1996 *Fiske Guide to Colleges*, the best-selling guide to colleges, gives the UW-Madison its highest academic ranking. In fact, UW-Madison is one of only eight public institutions in the country to receive the five-star rating. In 1995, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison as tied for third for academic reputation among public universities and 17th among all universities.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW-Madison among the top 10 in the nation. Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.



Funding and Support

► **Federal Grants:** UW-Madison ranked ninth nationally in 1993, receiving 1.2 percent of the federal budget for university research support.

► **Research and Development Funds:** UW-Madison ranked third in the country for research and development expenditures in 1994, with \$372 million, according to the National Science Foundation.

► **Tuition:** Over the last 10 years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.

► **Private Support:** UW-Madison ranked fifth in the nation, and first among public institutions in 1995-96 by receiving nearly \$176 million in private support.

► **Alumni:** UW-Madison's independently financed alumni group is the No. 1 ranked group in the Midwest and the second largest in the U.S.

Degrees

► **Graduates:** Standard & Poor's 1994 survey lists the University of Wisconsin as one of the nation's top producers of corporate executives, ranking second in undergraduate degrees.

► **Doctoral Degrees:** UW-Madison is a national leader in number of doctoral degrees awards ranking third in 1995. Between the school's founding and 1993, the University of Wisconsin-Madison awarded 29,628 Ph.D.s.

Departmental Academic Rankings

► **Liberal Arts:** In its ranking of graduate programs in the liberal arts in 1995, *U.S. News & World Report* listed UW-Madison's sociology department as tops in the country. The magazine also ranked education fifth, social work seventh, psychology and political science ninth, and history and public administration tenth.

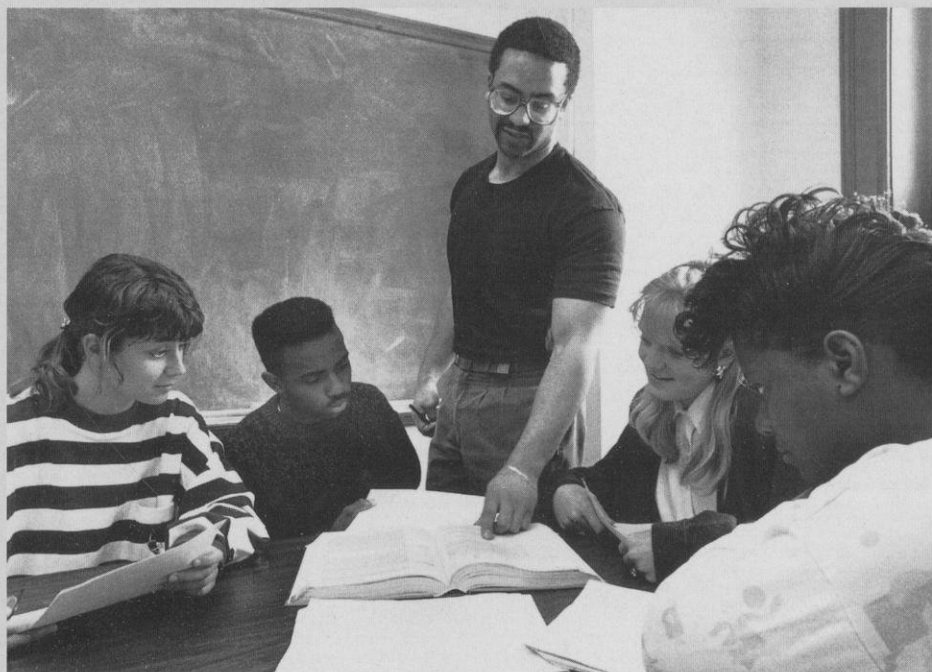
► **Education:** The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1994. The UW's educational administration and elementary education rank second.

► **College of Agricultural and Life Sciences:** In 1993, the College of Agricultural and Life Sciences was ranked one of the top 10 agricultural schools in the country according to *Farm Futures* magazine

► **Science Programs:** According to *U.S. News and World Report's* annual graduate school ratings, published in March 1995, six UW-Madison science programs ranked in the top 10: computer science, eighth; biology, ninth; chemistry, 10th; and nursing, 10th.

► **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 13th largest university library collection in the United States, with more than 5.5 million books in 45 locations across campus.

► **Business:** The School of Business's undergraduate program ranks seventh in the nation according to *U.S. News & World Report* (1995). The MBA program ranks in the top five percent, the real estate program ranks third and the school's risk management insurance program ranks fourth.



■ UW-Madison Sets the Pace

- ▶ with the oldest Scandinavian studies (1875), psychology (1888), agricultural economics (1909), genetics (1910) and wildlife management (1939) departments in the United States
- ▶ in establishing the nation's first magnetic observatory (1876)
- ▶ in discovering Vitamins A (1913) and B (1916)
- ▶ with the oldest radio station in the nation—WHA—which began broadcasting in 1917
- ▶ as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer in 1933

- ▶ with the Biotron, a research building that can control environmental conditions for experimental purposes



- ▶ with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. A UW team also discovers how to predict the success of bone marrow transplants by matching genes.
- ▶ in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharin and cyclamates
- ▶ in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously
- ▶ as UW Hospital and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories
- ▶ with the first and only medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school
- ▶ as UW-Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of a common cold virus
- ▶ with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university (1986)
- ▶ in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need



transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers

- ▶ with the development of the world's first genetically altered trees
- ▶ in Hector F. DeLuca, discoverer of a "super vitamin-D" compound, and continuing techniques for synthesizing the compound





David Ward

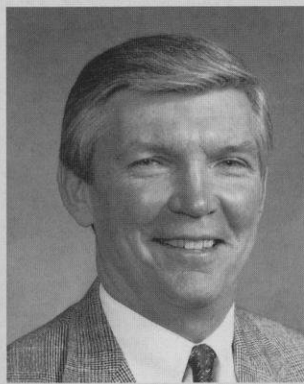
Chancellor David Ward is actively positioning the University of Wisconsin for continued excellence in the next century.

Ward insists that the university must be sensitive to societal changes relevant to higher education, and envisions the university as a stronger partner with public schools, businesses, industry, its alumni and friends.

"We have a tradition of excellence upon which to build and much to preserve, but I believe it is time for the university to start doing some things differently—not just doing the same things better," said Ward.

To this end, Ward has led efforts to improve the quality of undergraduate education, improving class access and increasing undergraduate engagement in research. He has enhanced university's diversity and restored support for the university's infrastructure.

Ward, who also holds the Andrew Hill Clark Professorship of Geography, was born in Manchester, England. He earned a Fulbright Travel award to the United States in 1960, received a doctorate from UW-Madison in 1963, and joined the faculty in 1966. He served as chair of the geography department and as associate dean of the Graduate School. He was named chancellor in June 1993 after serving as vice chancellor for academic affairs and, additionally, as provost.



Pat Richter

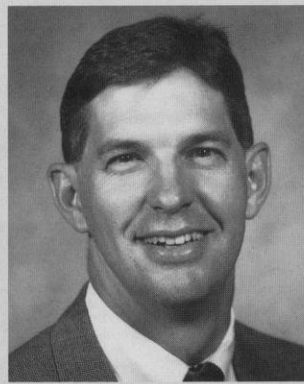
Pat Richter, the guiding force behind University of Wisconsin Athletics, is no stranger to the sports or business worlds.

A former UW student-athlete, professional football player, and successful businessman, Richter was the perfect choice to become Wisconsin's athletic director in December of 1989.

He was an all-America tight end for Wisconsin's 1963 Rose Bowl football team. Richter also earned Academic all-America honors in 1962, and was named Wisconsin's Big Ten Medal of Honor recipient in 1963. He earned his bachelor's degree in landscape architecture from the UW in 1964 and returned to the UW where he received his law degree in 1971. In 1995, he was inducted into the GTE/CoSIDA Academic Hall of Fame.

Richter enjoyed a long and distinguished career as a standout with the National Football league's Washington Redskins. After employment with a Madison law firm, he joined the Oscar Mayer Foods Corp., and worked his way up to vice president of personnel.

Richter has the essential experience as a student, athlete and administrator. He is committed to excellence in the classroom as well as on the playing field. Richter is committed to Wisconsin, and to providing UW student-athletes with an experience they will cherish the rest of their lives.



Al Fish

Al Fish begins his eighth year as the administrative officer for the division overseeing facility planning, event management, personnel, sports medicine, strength and conditioning, technical services, and equipment. He also serves as liaison to the Athletic Board, and to campus and state governments.

Fish is currently coordinating the planning for the Kohl Center, a multi-use sports facility scheduled to open in January 1998.

In 1989, Fish came to the division after three years as the Director of Policy and Budget for the Department of DHSS. He worked previously as a liaison for Governor Tony Earl to the State Assembly, a budget analyst for the State Budget Office and a program evaluator for the Legislative Audit Bureau.

A 1973 graduate of Luther College where he was a four-year letterwinner in golf, Fish is married to Susan Goodwin. They have three children: Cassie (16), Molly (10) and Nick (8).



Cheryl Marra

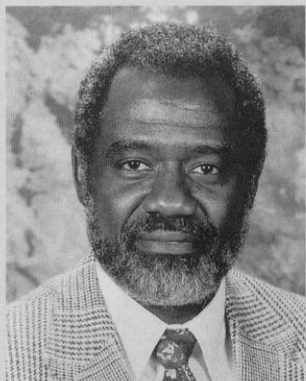
Cheryl Marra begins her seventh year as an associate athletic director at Wisconsin. Marra oversees the men's and women's programs of basketball, golf, soccer, tennis, swimming and diving, and women's volleyball. She also serves the primary women's athletic administrator to the Big Ten and the NCAA.

Since Marra's arrival at Wisconsin, the university has served as the host to several highly successful NCAA and Big Ten events including the 1993 NCAA Division I Women's Volleyball Championship, which garnered record-setting attendance. Wisconsin was also the site of the inaugural Big Ten women's soccer championship in 1994.

Marra came to Wisconsin from Denison University where she served as the women's athletic director from 1983-90. She was also an assistant professor in the physical education department, and the women's soccer and track and field coach.

Marra serves on the NCAA subcommittee for post-graduate scholarships. She has also chaired the NCAA women's soccer committee, the NCAA committee on women's athletics, and various Big Ten committees.

A 1977 graduate of Slippery Rock State College with a bachelor's degree in physical education and health, Marra received her master's degree in physical education from Ohio State in 1983.



■ Mike Moss

The newest member of the UW administration is Mike Moss. Moss begins his first year as the associate athletic director in charge of football, ice hockey, men's and women's rowing, men's and women's cross country and track, and wrestling. He also oversees the Office of Academic Affairs and chairs the department's Support Program, a wellness program for student-athletes.

Moss comes to Wisconsin after serving as a Director of Sports Operations for the Atlanta Committee of the Olympic Games since 1993. He was responsible for coordinating all aspects of six sports including archery, boxing, cycling (road and track), equestrian, modern pentathlon and tennis. Moss was also the primary department administrator for procedural matters.

■ Nancy Seifert

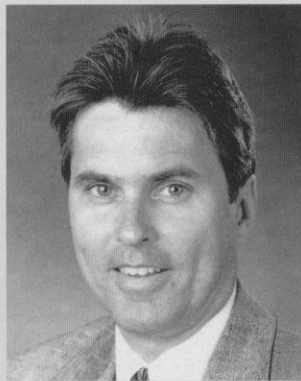
A member of the Wisconsin Athletic Department staff since 1992, Nancy Seifert serves as the chief financial officer.

With a number of sports begun more than 100 years ago, men's teams compete in basketball, cross country, football, golf, ice hockey, rowing, swimming and diving, soccer, tennis, track and field, and wrestling.

Established July 1, 1974, the 11-sport women's athletic program offers basketball, cross country, golf, lightweight rowing, rowing, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, and volleyball.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top 20 NCAA Division I programs for the past three years. In 1995-96, Wisconsin finished 15th in the Sears/National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics Directors Cup competition, which recognizes the best Division I college sports program in the nation.



The Wisconsin men's soccer team won the 1995 NCAA title defeating Duke in the championship game.

Sixteen of Wisconsin's 20 sports qualified as teams or individuals for their respective national championships. The men's soccer team won the 1995 NCAA Championship while Badger athletes won five individual NCAA titles. Teams qualifying for post-season tournaments as teams or individuals were men's and women's basketball, men's and

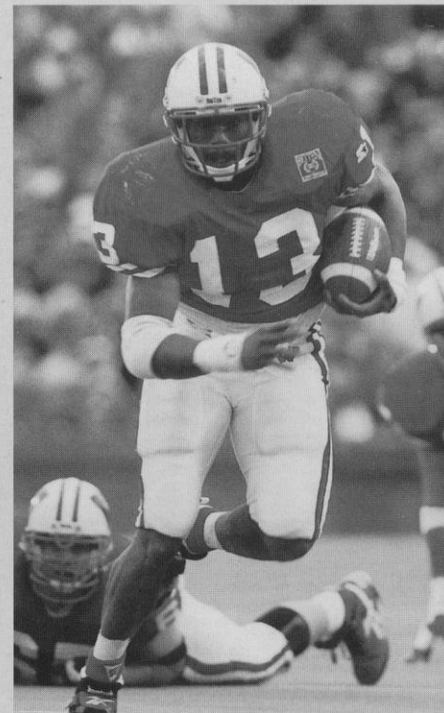

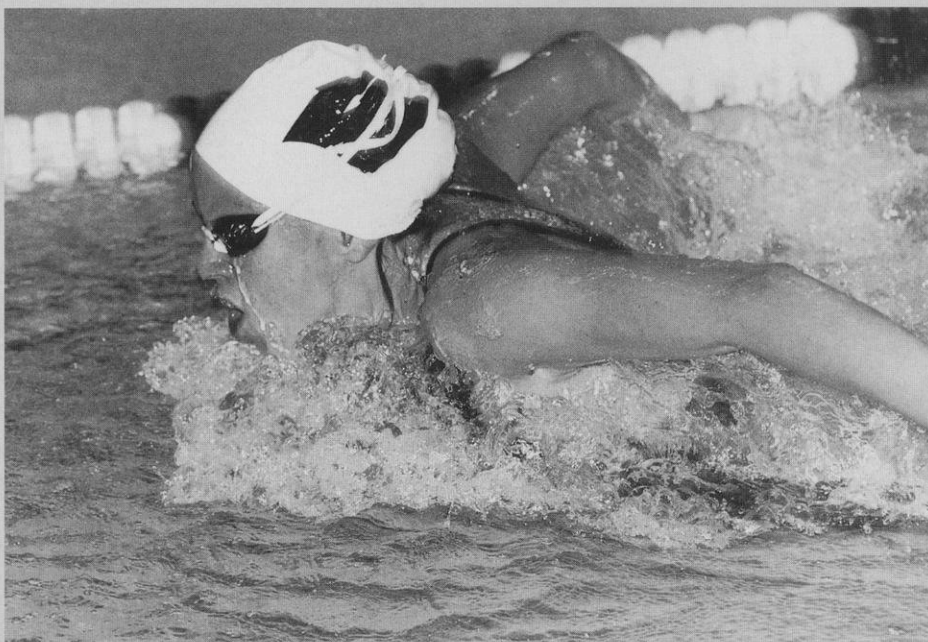
Wisconsin finished second in the 1995-96 Big Ten Conference composite rankings. The Badgers crowned seven Big Ten champions with the men's and women's

cross country, men's soccer, women's tennis, men's indoor track, and men's and women's outdoor track teams winning league titles. Big Ten Coach of the Year honors were won by Wisconsin coaches six times during 1995-96 while Big Ten Athlete of the Year honors were won in four sports. Wisconsin athletes also won 25 Big Ten individual titles.

Big Ten Conference composite rankings are not sanctioned by the conference office. Points are awarded for each school's finish in 12 men's and 10 women's conference championships. The first-place team receives 11 points while the 11th-place team receives one point. The total points are divided by the number of sports in which each school participates.



The Wisconsin women's swimming team recorded its highest NCAA finish ever in 1996 scoring 35 points to finish 21st. The Badgers also crowned seven all-Americans.

Academic & Student Services

Academic excellence is emphasized at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the advising system available to the student-athletes.

Director **Alan Zussman** supervises a staff of six advisors which conduct the program offered to the nearly 700 UW student-athletes. The advising staff of **Mary Weaver, Craig Hudson, Christine Sayler, Doug Tiedt, Mary Moroder, Andrew Berns, and Jerry Darda** have a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments.

For those student-athletes who request assistance, advising sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. Wisconsin athletes are degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The advising staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, personal or academic.

Student-athletes may receive academic honors in a number of ways. The Big Ten Conference honors scholar athletes with Academic all-Big Ten honors while the UW Athletic Board names Athletic Board Scholars for the highest grade point average in each sport. In addition, student-athletes may be nominated for Academic All-America honors through the sports information office.

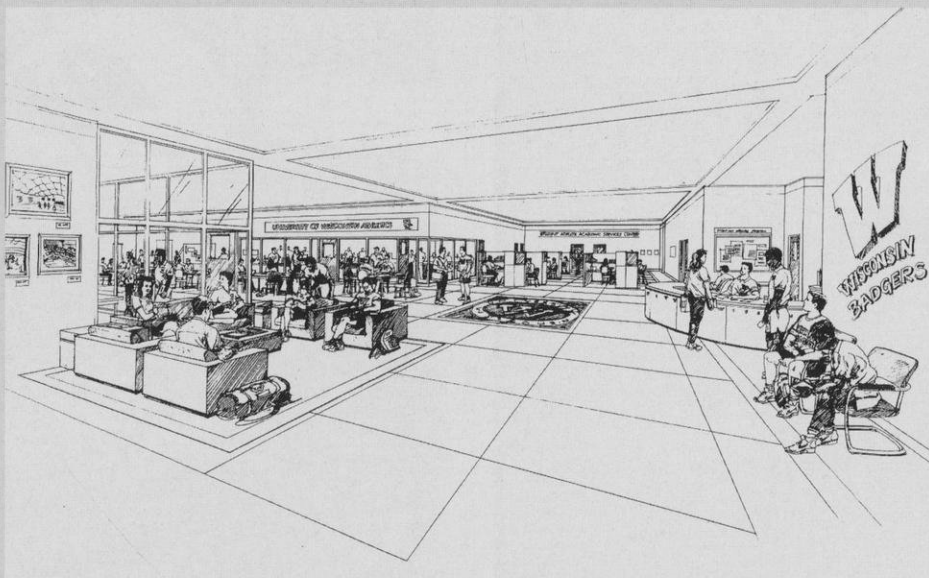
Academic Learning Center

Beginning in 1996-97, Wisconsin student-athletes will have the added advantage of a new academic learning center.

Located on the lower level of the McClain Athletic Center, the Academic Learning Center features a 50-person study hall, a large computer lab, 11 study rooms, two open study

areas and offices for the academic services and grant-in-aid staff.

The over 16,000 square foot center is scheduled to open by the beginning of the second semester of the 1996-97 academic year.



The new Student Academic Services center in the lower level of the McClain Athletic Facility is scheduled for completion in January of 1997. The project includes study and tutorial areas for student-athletes as well as a computer lab for 45 people.

Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year renewable basis if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of rowing, which does not grant scholarships. Full scholarships include the cost of room and board in addition to tuition and fees. The selection of scholarship recipients is based on athletic ability and projected academic success at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Strength & Conditioning

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete.

Weight training areas in the McClain Center and Camp Randall Stadium feature free weights and stereo music in spacious, carpeted rooms. Four full-time and two part-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes. Head strength and conditioning coach **John**

Dettmann along with assistant coaches **Chris Doyle, Steve Myrland, Stieg Theander, Scott Hettenbach** and **Christine Heinrich** work with the individual sport coaches to develop programs specific for that sport.

The UW also offers a sports nutrition program to assist athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals.



Wisconsin student-athletes also utilize the strength and conditioning area in Camp Randall Stadium to meet their performance goals.

Sports Medicine

The goal of the sports medicine staff is to provide all University of Wisconsin student-athletes with high quality health care. Wisconsin's Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

The sports medicine staff consists of team physicians, dentists, athletic trainers, and other medical and allied health professionals. The day-to-day care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is conducted by a staff of eight full-time and three graduate assistant N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. Under the direction of head athletic trainer **Dennis Helwig**, the sports medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members **Chuck Hart, Jan Helwig, Mike Johnson, Barb Pearson, Henry Perez-Guerra, Heidi Stettler, and Andy Winterstein** utilize functional measures, provide dietary analysis, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve flexibility.

The sports medicine facility in the McClain Center features an extensive collection of therapeutic and rehabilitation equipment including a 50-foot, two-lane rehabilitation pool, and an on-site x-ray facility. Considered one of the nation's finest, the McClain Sports Medicine Center offers an environment conducive to expedient care, and a healthy return to competition.

Should an injury occur, athletes are seen immediately by team physicians affiliated with

the UW Hospitals and Clinics. Medical director **Dr. Ben Graf** is responsible for all services provided to our student-athletes. Orthopedic care is directed by team physician **Dr. John Orwin** while general medical care is directed by the head of primary care, **Dr. Greg Landry**.

In addition to the main headquarters in the McClain Athletic Facility, auxiliary athletic training rooms are located in the Stadium, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Field-House. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus.

■ Sports Information

Directing the communications for the 20 sports in the Division of Intercollegiate Athletics is the responsibility of the University of Wisconsin Men's and Women's Sports Information Offices.

These offices utilize a variety of communications systems to provide student-athletes the opportunity to be recognized for their athletic endeavors.

The offices provide and maintain many resources such as records, fact sheets, photographic files, statistics, media guides and event programs in meeting the information requests of the media, coaches, administrators, opponents and the general public.

The director's of women's and men's sports information, **Tamara J. Flarup** and **Steve Malchow**, and their respective offices, maintain close contact with local, regional and national media as well as the athlete's hometown media in providing information. These offices prepare news releases, design sports brochures and media guides, provide event coverage for all Wisconsin intercollegiate sports, and provide post-event results for print and electronic media. Besides the SI directors, members of the women's staff include associate director **Diane K. Nordstrom** and intern **Heidi Pearce**. The men's office includes associate director **Justin Doherty**, assistant director **Julie Kluge** and intern **Dan Meyer**, as well as a number of student assistants.

Athletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from outstanding sports facilities. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its athletes.

The Wisconsin Field House, which seats 11,500, is the practice and competitive facility for the Badger basketball and volleyball teams. The Field House features four locker rooms, an athletic training area and state-of-the-art scoreboard, sound and lighting systems.

The Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center or Shell, located next to Camp Randall Stadium, is a multi-purpose facility. A newly resurfaced 200-meter Martin rubber track surrounds four basketball/volleyball courts that double as throwing and jumping areas for indoor track meets. With a seating capacity of 2,500, the Shell is the site of a numerous track meets.

One of the most versatile buildings is the McClain Athletic Facility. Over 76,000 square feet of artificial turf offers the ideal indoor practice facility for football, soccer and track. The lower level features the headquarters of the Badgers Sports Medicine staff and a fully-equipped weight room. Locker rooms for football, and men's and women's track are also located on the lower level.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have the competitive advantage of playing year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States—the Nielsen Tennis Stadium. The stadium features 18 tennis courts (12

indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, one squash doubles court, and seats 1,500 spectators. The stadium is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

The Wisconsin track teams practice and compete at the Dan McClimon Memorial

Track, located at the west end of campus. Named for the former UW men's coach, the track features a newly resurfaced 400-meter Martin rubber track.

An Olympic size, natural grass soccer field inside the track is the competition home of the soccer teams. The track and soccer facility, which is fully lighted, was completed during the fall of 1993. Building permanent seating with locker rooms and a media facility is scheduled to begin in the near future.

The swimming and diving teams have the luxury of two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium and Southeast Recreational Facility. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The SERF facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

Situated between five lakes, Madison is the perfect location for a rowing program. The Badger crews

are headquartered in the boat house, situated on Lake Mendota. The boat house provides the Badger crews with an indoor rowing tank during the winter season. During the warm months, crews can often be seen on any one of the Madison lakes.

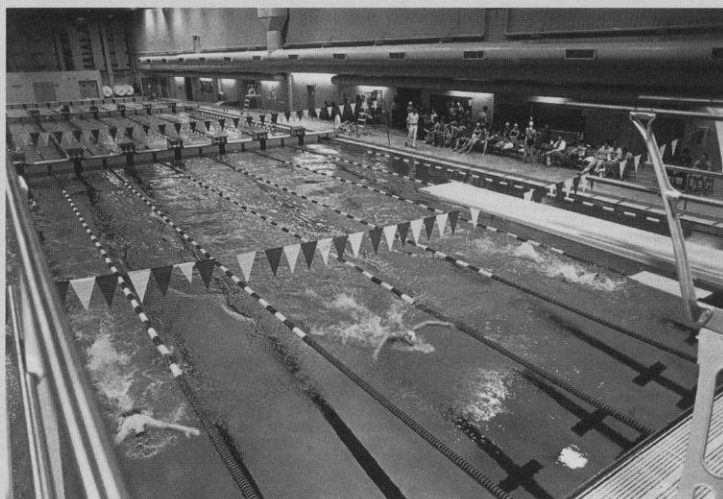
With the opening of University Ridge in 1991, UW golfers now have the opportunity to compete on one of the finest facilities in the Midwest. The par 72, 18-hole course was designed by Robert Trent Jones Jr. The facility also features a 15,000 square foot practice green and 5,000 square foot chipping green.

The UW Softball Complex, located on the west end of campus, features an NCAA-regulation, natural grass field with a centerfield distance of 225 feet, and left and right field foul line distances of 200 feet.

The Southeast Recreational Facility (SERF) is one of two pools used by the swimming and diving teams

Bucky Badger

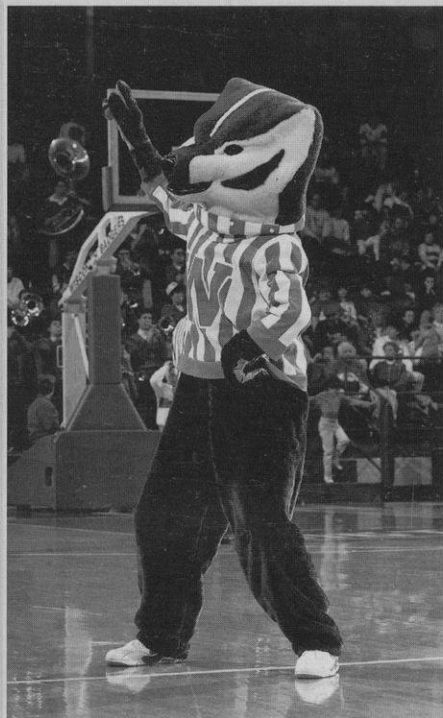
Although badgers in various forms had been the University of Wisconsin mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as Bucky, sporting a cardinal and white sweater, was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans.

The original badger mascot was too vicious to control. On more than one occasion, the live badger escaped handlers before a sideline hero recaptured the animal. It was decided in the interest of fan and player safety that Wisconsin's mascot be retired to the Madison zoo.

In 1949, a student in the university's art department, Connie Conrad, was commissioned to mold a paper-mache badger head. Gymnast and cheerleader, Bill Sagal, of Plymouth, Wis., was directed by homecoming chair Bill Sachse, to wear the outfit at the homecoming game. A pep rally contest was held to determine the mascot's name. The rally committee opted for its own name: Buckingham U. Badger. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On, Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW to "buck right through that line."

On Wisconsin

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with the words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in

1951. The song was an instant hit at the Wisconsin campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs.

Varsity

The traditional arm waving that comes at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He had originally gotten the idea from University of Pennsylvania students who waved their caps after a losing game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Fifth Quarter

The Wisconsin band has become nationally famous for its post-game celebration called the Fifth Quarter. Win or lose, fans sing, dance and cheer the band as they play traditional favorites like "On, Wisconsin" and the Bud song. Originally, the post-game concert was designed to give the fans something to listen to on their way out of the stadium, but it developed into a post-game party as the band built in audience participation.

Bud Song

An integral part of any Wisconsin band performance in the playing of the Bud song. The tune is a spinoff of the song "You've

said it all," a jingle with words and music originally written by Steve Karmen for Budweiser beer commercials. Copyrighted by Sandlee Publishing Corporation in 1970, the song has become legendary at the University because of its polka-like rhythm. Band director Michael Leckrone said the song's popularity got started at a 1975 hockey game. "The crowd wanted to hear a polka," he said. "I didn't have any polkas. We had, just by accident, this beer commercial in the tunes we play. I told the band if we substituted the word 'Wisconsin' for 'Budweiser' it would work."

Leckrone said the song became a football tradition after a 1978 come-from-behind victory over Oregon. "Wisconsin was behind by three touchdowns, and the crowd was really dead. I played the song to get everyone pepped up. About 20 seconds after that, Wisconsin scored a touchdown. I played it again, and Wisconsin scored another touchdown. From then on, the band could never play enough 'Bud.'"

Badger Nickname

The sports program's nickname "Badgers," was borrowed from the state of Wisconsin. The territory was dubbed the "Badger State," not because of animals in the region, but rather an association with lead miners in the 1820s. Prospectors came to the state looking for minerals. Without shelter in the winter, the miners had to "live like badgers" in tunnels burrowed into hillsides.

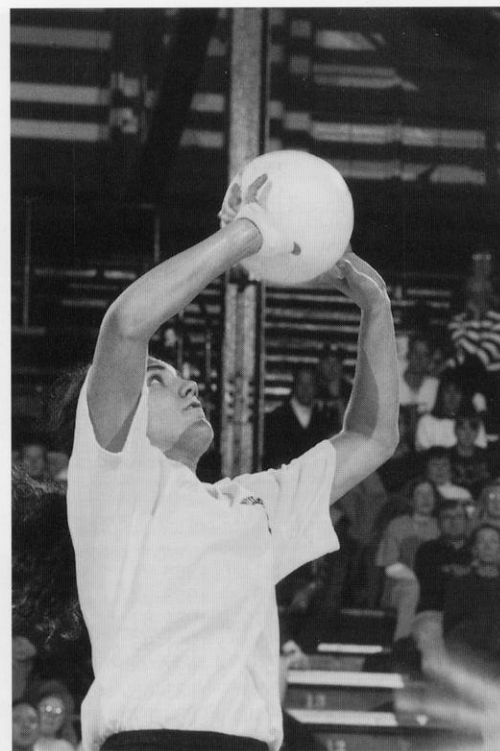

Begun in 1895, the Intercollegiate Conference of Faculty Representatives (popularly known as the Big Ten) has changed little from its original philosophy of faculty control of athletics with emphasis on the student-athlete. The conference is celebrating its centennial anniversary during 1995-96 season.

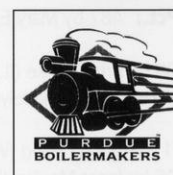
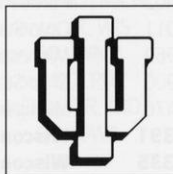
The women's athletics programs became affiliated with the Conference officially in 1981, although unofficial conference championships had been held among the member institutions since 1972. Penn State became the 11th university to join the conference in 1991.

As a Big Ten school, Wisconsin women athletes compete in conference championships in basketball, cross country, golf, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, indoor and outdoor track and field, and volleyball.

The Big Ten Conference volleyball champion is determined by the match record within the conference. The teams play a double, round-robin schedule with all teams playing each other twice, both at home and away, for a total of 20 matches.

The conference champion earns an automatic bid to the NCAA tournament. In 1994, the Big Ten was represented by five universities in the NCAA Volleyball Championship. Michigan State University advanced to the NCAA Championship losing in the semifinals.

For five consecutive years, the Big Ten Conference has led the nation in volleyball attendance. In 1995, six schools finished in the top 20 in attendance, and overall the league drew a total of 176,881 spectators for the season. The University of Illinois led the conference and finished fourth in the nation in attendance averaging 2,347 spectators per match. Wisconsin was seventh averaging 1,915; Michigan State finished 11th with a 1,590 average; Minnesota was 13th averaging 1,453; Penn State averaged 1,390 to finish 15th; and Purdue was 16th average 1,368.

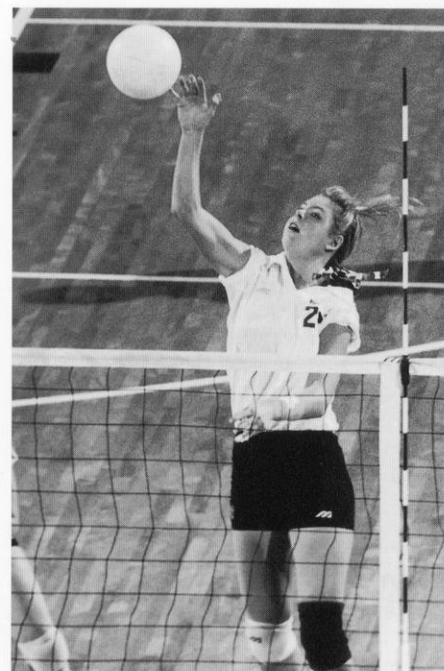
