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### ADJOURNED MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Tuesday, July 11, 1939, 10 A.M.

# President Wilkie presiding

PRESENT: President Dykstra; Regents Baker, Callahan, Campbell, Christopherson, Gates, Glover, Hones, Kelly, Miller, Wilkie.

ABSENT: Regents Backus. Brown, Combs. Mead, Richards.

Regent Backus was in Washington, D.C., on business; Regent Brown was in New York City because of a previous engagement; Regent Combs was absent because of the serious illness of her husband; and Regent Mead was detained because of previous engagements and the illness of Mrs. Mead, who is still in Chicago.

The reading of the minutes of the meeting of the Board of Regents held on June 16-17, 1939, was dispensed with and unanimously approved as sent out to the Regents.

The budget for the fiscal year 1939-40 was taken up for consideration. President Dykstra read his statement in relation to the budget, also presented a statement of income by funds, which he explained in detail to the Regents, and a condensed statement of all funds showing the comparison between 1938-39 and 1939-40. Regent Callahan moved, seconded by Regent Glover, that the budget for 1939-40 as presented be approved and that the statement presented by the President be also approved and made a part of the record. Regent Baker then presented a statement and moved to amend Regent Callahan's motion. Regents Callahan and Glover accepted the Baker statement with the understanding that it would be included in their motion. Called vote was then taken upon the motion to approve the budget and the statements above referred to, Regents voting "Aye" - Baker, Callahan, Campbell, Christopherson, Gates, Glover, Kelly, Wilkie (8); Regents voting "No" - Hones, Miller (2). (The statements above referred to are attached to these minutes.)

Regent Gates stated that he was voting "Aye", although he does object to any increase in fees but feels that the attitude of the legislature makes it incumbent on the Board to accept such an increase.

Regent Hones made the following statement with reference to his negative vote:

"I believe the student fee increase is (1) unfair to prospective students whose parents represent the low income workers of the state who sadly need higher educational opportunities to prevent a serious social problem in the future in the state and nation; (2) a violation of the principle of a free educational system; (3) setting a precedent for leading costs of education on students from year to year reting our school system back to the old tuition system (this can easily go as fa as the rural schools); (4) uncalled for because the Legislature is still in session and I as a member of the Regents do not admit that this deficiency budget is our problem."

Repent Miller stated that he voted "No" for the same reason as Regent Hones.

A report was presented with reference to the status of Louis J. Bersch requesting permanent employment in the University. Upon motion of Regent Wilkie, seconded by Regent Gates, it was

VOTED, That his request be denied based upon statements made in the re-

port presented.

Regent Gates presented the following resolution:

WHEREAS, competition for promising athletes, particularly when taking the form of financial bidding to effect their enrollment at one university or another, is becoming a serious threat to amateurism in and the right attitude toward intercollegiate sport, and

WHEREAS, activity of this nature by unofficial partisans of various, and perhaps all, member universities threatens eventual disruption of the commendable purpose and organization established by faculties to insure sport for sport's sake among Western Conference (Big Ten) universities, thereby endangering the virile and desirable relationships which have been developed among the students of these Mid-Western educational institutions, be it

RESOLVED, by the Board of Regents of the University of Wisconsin, that this matter be brought to the attention of the governing boards of the other Conference universities with the suggestion that the present situation holds such threat to the future of this important student activity and its proper control through faculty representatives, that it is incumbent on these boards to extend to their faculty representatives the offer of all possible support for efforts to eradicate the evil before the harm it is doing becomes irremediable.

RESOLVED FURTHER, that the chairman of this board is authorized, if and when the opportunity offers, to represent this board or provide for

its representation in any conference or discussion that may be arranged in the future by him or others for the purpose of effecting the consideration of this matter by similar representatives of any or all other universities of the Conference.

This board reaffirms its adherence to the principles underlying the Western Conference and takes this action in the belief that the meds of destruction of the Conference and of amateur intercollegiate sport are inherent in the practice which has made alarming headway during recent years. To nullify the results of this practice the following suggestion is made for consideration of Conference authorities:

That lists be furnished of all intercollegiate squad members of each university giving in detail by whom and at what work for pay such members are employed, the hours per week on such work and the total pay per month and year; that no student be allowed to compete when it is apparent that his pay is such as to more than meet a reasonable minimum student budget, or that his work or hours are such as to make it apparent that they are not the fair equivalent of the pay received.

Upon motion of Regent Christopherson, seconded by Regent Glover, it was VOTED, That this resolution be referred to the Committee on Education with the understanding that the Regent Educational Committee would meet with the Faculty Committee on Athletics before bringing the resolution to the Regents for action.

and also a request from the Director of the School of Journalism to increase the reportatory fee in the General Course of the School of Journalism from \$1.00 to \$1.500

per semester, beginning with the first semester of 1939-40.

Upon motion of Regent Christopherson, seconded by Regent Callahan, adopted.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Campbell, it was VOTED, That upon the recommendation of the Comptroller, the President and the Comptroller be authorized to request a supplemental PWA grant of \$3,886.36 for the Addition to the Law Building, PWA 1529-F, making a total PWA grant of \$82,636.36 for the project, for the reasons enumerated below:

- 1. The original estimate of \$175,000 is insufficient to complete the project in accordance with the original application, and to provide a usable and adequate improvement.
- 2. The University has available \$4,750 with which to match the additional grant of \$3.886.36.

Upon motion of Regent Kelly, seconded by Regent Campbell, the following recommendation of the Comptroller was adopted:

That the following extensions of time for completion of FWA contracts approved by the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be concurred in:

Time for completing the general construction contract extended from June 24, 1939 to August 25, 1939. Various strikes in Madison, all beyond the control of the contractor, have delayed construction a total of 29 days. Shipment of Bedford stone was delayed 28 days by reason of a strike in the Bedford stone district from February 3, 1939 to March 3, 1939. Changes in design and additional work requested by the owner have delayed construction from time to time, particularly because of the complicated characteristics of the building. The contractor requested an extension of 149 days for the above and additional reasons, but an extension of 62 days was approved to bring the completion date within the project time specified by P.V.A. The contractor expressed the opinion that in the absence of further delays the project can be completed by August 25, 1939.

Extension in completion time for general contractor requires contractors for mechanical work to remain on the job until general contractor has finished.

Upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That President Dykstra be authorized to request the Emergency Board for appropriations up to \$40,000 for the purchase of materials in connection with WPA grants other than research projects.

Upon motion of Regent Hones, seconded by Regent Christopherson, it was VOTED, That the minutes of the special meeting of the Executive Committee held on July 1, 1939, as sent out to the Regents, be approved, ratified and confirmed.

The Secretary presented a communication from W. E. Atwell of Stevens Point with reference to the University purchasing the Frost property on Orchard Street, and a communication from Frank J. Harder, city real estate agent of Milwaukee, with reference to the Resents acquiring the South one-half of Lot 10 in Block 166, in Milwaukee, at the site of the University Extension Division. Upon motion of Regent Campbell, seconded by Regent Callahan, both matters were referred to the Executive Committee.

Upon recommendation of the President, and upon motion of Regent Kelly,

seconded by Regent Christopherson, it was

VOTED, That the following persons be appointed to dismantle shop equipment, Mechanical Engineering Building, beginning July 13, 1939, not to exceed three months, at the salaries indicated; charge to 1-E, engineering remodeling (total for the full time \$2460):

Upon recommendation of the President, and upon motion of Regent Gates,

seconded by Regent Hones, it was

VOTED, That the quarters occupied by the School for Workers in Industry be rented to house the research project under Carnegie Corporation for the year 1939-40 at a cost of \$520, plus maintenance. (\$200 of this is available from a fund which was provided for part-time secretarial service and which will not be used and which can be used for rental. The total amount required from Regents Unassigned for rental will be \$320, plus maintenance.)

President Dykstra presented the request of the Department of Art Education (Miss Wilson and Professor Varnum) to manufacture cheese containers from Wisconsin clay. The Schlitz Brewing Company had indicated that they would like 4000 of these containers for which they would pay \$.50 each. It is understood that any excess profit from this would go to the Department for experimental work in Wisconsin clay.

Upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Christopherson, it was VOTED. That this request be approved as a temporary demonstration.

Upon motion of Regent Callahan, seconded by Regent Campbell, the following recommendations of the Comptroller were adopted:

1. That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to borrow from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation the original amount, \$66,000.00,

at 4%, amortized over thirty years, for the construction of the Addition to the Chemistry Building, PMA Doc. Wis. 1592-F; that the mortgage of \$66,000.00 heretoformade by the Annuity Board to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be satisfied by payment of the amount advanced on this mortgage (\$50,000.00) plus accrued interest at 4%.

2. That the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be authorized to borrow from the Wisconsin Alumni Research Foundation the original amount, \$157,500.0 at 4%, amortized over thirty years, for the construction of the Agricultural Chemistry Addition, PMA Doc. Wis. 1493-F; that the mortgage of \$137,500.00 heretofore made by the Annuity Board to the Wisconsin University Building Corporation be satisfied by payment of the amount advanced on this mortgage (\$75,000.00) plus accrued interest at 4%.

The Secretary presented a communication from Robin C. Buerki in which he advised that he planned very definitely to return to Madison within the term of his leave of absence.

Upon motion of Regent Gates, seconded by Regent Miller, it was VOTED, That the meeting adjourn subject to the call of the President of the Board.

To the Regents:

Cutting the budget of a going and growing educational institution is a difficult undertaking. Cuts in expenditures are not always economies in the business sense and may lower the level of service and accomplishment in a university. Having no alternative this year and with deficits facing the University of Wisconsin, certain normal expenses have been eliminated and certain services curtailed. It is hoped that what has been done to meet our financial situation will be well received by the people of Wisconsin and their official representatives.

Herewith is transmitted the suggested University budget for 1939-40 drawn in accordance with the policies laid down at the last meeting of the Board. The real problem presented this year has to do with Code 1-A, the operating code for the University as a teaching and research institution at Madison. Code 1-A covers operations for all the colleges of the University except the Extension Division and includes not only the teaching budget of the Agricultural College, but also a part of the cost of operating the State Agricultural Experiment Station and Farms. The State appropriation in the Budget Bill passed by the Legislature and approved by the Governor carried a cut of \$323,619 per year in 1-A Operation alone.

The Legislature has subsequently made an appropriation to the Emergency Board which it is understood includes \$100,000 to supplement the 1-A eperation appropriation of the University. This appropriation to the Emergency Board came from unexpended balances in the fiscal year ended June 30, 1939, and it should be remembered that a few weeks ago the University contributed some \$80,000 to the State treasury in savings for 1938-39. The supplemental allotment of \$100,000 for Code 1-A does not, therefore, increase the basic appropriations of the State for the 1939-41 biennium.

The University budget for 1939-40 presented for your consideration meets the cut of \$323,619 in the State appropriation for 1-A as follows:

Including the recent appropriation to the Emergency Board (\$100,000 to 1-A, \$30,000 to 2-A Extension) and the specific appropriations of \$15,000 for the Library School, \$9,500 for Game Management and \$15,000 for Fur Farming research, the total appropriations to the University from the State for 1939-40 will be \$3,695,110 as against \$4,151,205 (includes Emergency Board and Radio) for last year - a difference of \$456,095 with radio provided for in the appropriations to the Department of Agriculture and Markets. Item for item by State appropriations and excluding all nonrecurring items and WPA allotments, the final net reduction in State appropriations to the University for continuing services is \$166,323. This final figure takes account of the Emergency Board allotment of \$130,000, the amount to run the Library School, (\$15,000), Game Management (\$9,500), and Fur Farming research (\$15,000). This final figure of \$166,323 is the one which will interest the taxpayer. It makes up a final cut to the University of about 5% on the same group of items. The University is now on the same basis with all other departments which received a 5% cut by action of the Legislature.

The revenues to the University which do not come from the State will be increased for the coming year. Appropriations from the federal government, receipts from student fees and from revolving operations are higher than in the 1938-39 budget. The new dormitories will bring in an estimated increase of \$166,930 to be expended in feeding and housing those who live in these facilities. Estimates indicate also that Intercollegiate Athletics will have an increase of about \$24,000. There will be an increase in Federal Funds for Agricultural Extension and Research of \$33,716. None of these increases helps University operations as such however. The net result of increases in non-state revenues and student fees will operate to make the total University funds handled larger by \$193.684 even though State appropriations are down. By this time, however, Wisconsin citizens should be able to realize that this increase in our total funds does not mean that educational costs are rising but that we are simply handling more board and room money, for instance. Educational costs are down as against last year and way down as compared with ten years ago when the State appropriated \$4,579,224 for all University services.

This fact may be illustrated by the following table:

This table indicates that the Federal Government puts into the University operation in Wisconsin about 20% of what the State appropriates, and that the State appropriates to the University only 39% of the University budget

for the coming year.

Coming now to a more generalized statement on State appropriations we find that out of the 26 codes in the budget there are increases in two - 12, Psychiatric Institute \$15,500, - 14, Hygieric Laboratory \$13,600, and there are three new codes and new appropriations for them, 1-T, Library School \$15,000, 3-U Game Management \$9,500, and 3-M Fur Farming Research \$15,000. In spite of these increases in five codes the total State University cost for 1939-40 will be \$455,052 less than in these same items for last year when we include Emergency Board grants.

In Code 5-1 the Legislature gave the University \$95,000 for increases in staff, premetions, adjustment on old salary cuts, etc. A part of this sum is used in this budget for certain necessary new positions and to make promotions and some partial salary restorations. The rest of it will have to be used to belster such things as cuts in maintenance and miscellaneous capital.

There are some adjustments in salaries in Revolving Funds and from Federal Grants, particularly for county agents and federal extension employes.

All of these details are extended in the budget as presented herewith. order to carry out the understanding with the Joint Finance Committee and the Emergency Beard that the University absorb a part of the cut by fee increases and to balance the budget as presented some action on fees is necessary. The Legislature has already acted to give the Emergency Board \$130,000 for the 1-A and 2-A codes and the Regerts should now take final action to complete the understanding. Most members of this Board and the President along with them naturally hesitate to increase fees even slightly. There is a deep-rected feeling against this procedure. We owe it to the State and the students as well, however, to keep up the quality of University work and of our faculty by every pessible means. This budget proposes roughly to absorb the cut by a three-fold arrangement - to cut operating costs, and have the State and the students pick up the balance. This three way split seems to be the only way to maintain the University at somewhere near its current level of excellence. The Board at its last meeting instructed the President to appreach the Emergency Board with the proposal of a cut, an appropriation and, pending action by the Emergency Board, a consideration of fee increase. This has been done and \$130,000 has been made available to the University by Legislative appropriation to the Emergency Board.

One of the Board members at the last meeting indicated that any raise in fees should carry with it some assurance that our library facilities would be increased. The budget can be balanced and these facilities provided if the Board will act as was suggested by several members at the last meeting. The sections of the regulation having to do with fees will have to be changed to provide as follows: that the semester incidental fees at the university be increased from \$27.50 to \$32.50. Of these fees \$5.00 will go to the Student Union, \$1.00 for physical education, at least \$3.50 to the Infirmary and \$1.50 for increasing library facilities. This \$1.50 should not be paid by law students who already have a library facility fee enacted last fall.

# REGENT BAKER'S STATEMENT

In this connection the regents make the following statement: This budget reflects an increase in student fees of \$5.00 per semester, \$3.50 of which will be made available for operating expenses and \$1.50 of which will be set aside to finance the construction of additional library facilities. These facilities have been imperatively needed for years. The need has increased each year for the last several years, due to increasing use of the University by the people of the state:

We are opposed in principle to increase of student fees as a means of taking care of operating expenses. The University is part of the public school system of the state. We feel that as such it should be kept as free as possible in its opportunities to the people of this state. A majority of our male students are wholly or partly self-supporting. It is fully as difficult for them to pay additional fees as it is for taxpayers to pay their taxes.

We are authorizing this \$3.50 per semester fee to secure funds for operation with the hope that it will not be necessary to continue it beyond the biennium of 1939 to 1941 which is now commenced. This fee is imposed only because our only other alternative would be to resort to reductions in salaries and wages and a denial of such necessary restorations, adjustments and increases as must be granted in order to maintain our staff in such manner as to fairly well preserve the educational standards of the University.

The present compensation of our experienced teachers still reflects a considerable part of the cut imposed during the depression. In this present budget, in spite of the increase in student fees, much of that cut is still preserved. When compared to other outstanding universities, Wisconsin is at a disadvantage in the level of salaries paid. Wisconsin has been fortunate in retaining many men and women of outstanding ability in spite of financial disadvantage here. But to now impose additional disappointments on the faculty would in our opinion do irreparable harm to the morale of the staff and would seriously injure the University for many years to come.

In respect to new construction for necessary library facilities there is no way in which it can be financed except by some additional fee for that purpose. The new addition to the Law Building is being financed in this way by an increased fee on law students only. Hence the library fee hereby imposed should not and will not apply to law students.

We feel that some of the reductions in expenditures in this budget are undesirable and do not represent any real economy. However, the policy has been adopted of reducing the expenditure where it will do the least harm. It is our desire that the University should be made as useful as possible to the people of this state and that its high reputation as an institution of higher learning and of research should be maintained. We are fully convinced that to continue to do so, and supply the services which the people of this state desire, increasing financial support to the University will be essential.

Dear President Dykstra:

The revised and final budget of the Summer Session of 1939 is submitted to you herewith for presentation to the Regents.

Every effort has been made to pare the budget down to the lowest figure. The drop in registrations—probably a hundred or so, not as serious as we had feared—will doubtless mean a small deficit when the accounts are finally closed and we have striven earnestly to save every dollar, in order to keep this deficit as low as possible.

We had expected to keep the budget total some \$600 lower, but this aim was frustrated by an unexpected increase in fee basis registrations in Agriculture. This represents no loss, whatever, for the fees paid in cover the payments for instruction, but it does raise both expenditures and receipts above our anticipation.

The distribution of registrations among departments is apparently fairly normal and we have had no great amount of additional instruction to supply.
