## LAKE SHORE PROBLEM SETTLED

At last the Village of Williams Bay owns the lake shore land at the Bay.

It is expected that the papers in the transaction will be brought out from Chicago this week with the signatures of President F.W. Sargent of the C & N W Railway Co. and Mr. Charles Megan, Trustee of C & N W Railway Company deeding the property including the proposed new highway and all the land South of it to the village of Williams Bay and the check for \$2500 turned over to the railroad's representatives by the Village Board of Williams Bay.

The C & N W Railroad Company secured possession from the Williams family back in the 80's and have had control of the Bay beach. For a number of years the Village Boards of the village have wrestled with the problem. The re-location of Highway 36 through the village brought the problem to a head again.

Through the kindly interest of Mr. S.B. Chapin, New York and Lake Geneva, Mr. Rufus C. Abbott, Chicago, a director of the C & N W Railroad, became interested in our problem here and took up the matter with President Sargent of the Railroad Company, and other fellow directors.

Mr. Chapin and Mr. Abbott together with officials of the Land department of the Railroad Co. attended the October meeting of the Village Board with authority to come to some agreement regarding the highway. The Village Board voted to offer \$2500 for the land, including the lake shore, and that offer has been accepted by the Railroad Company.

The newly acquired land will make an attractive parkway all along the lake shore and add considerably to Edgewater Park.

Congratulations to Col. J.E. Atkins, village President; and Trustees H.A. Bradt, Harry Breen, Roy Johnson, Alfred Pederson, Louis Rasmussen and Eric Werner on the solution of the problem which has been before the village for so
