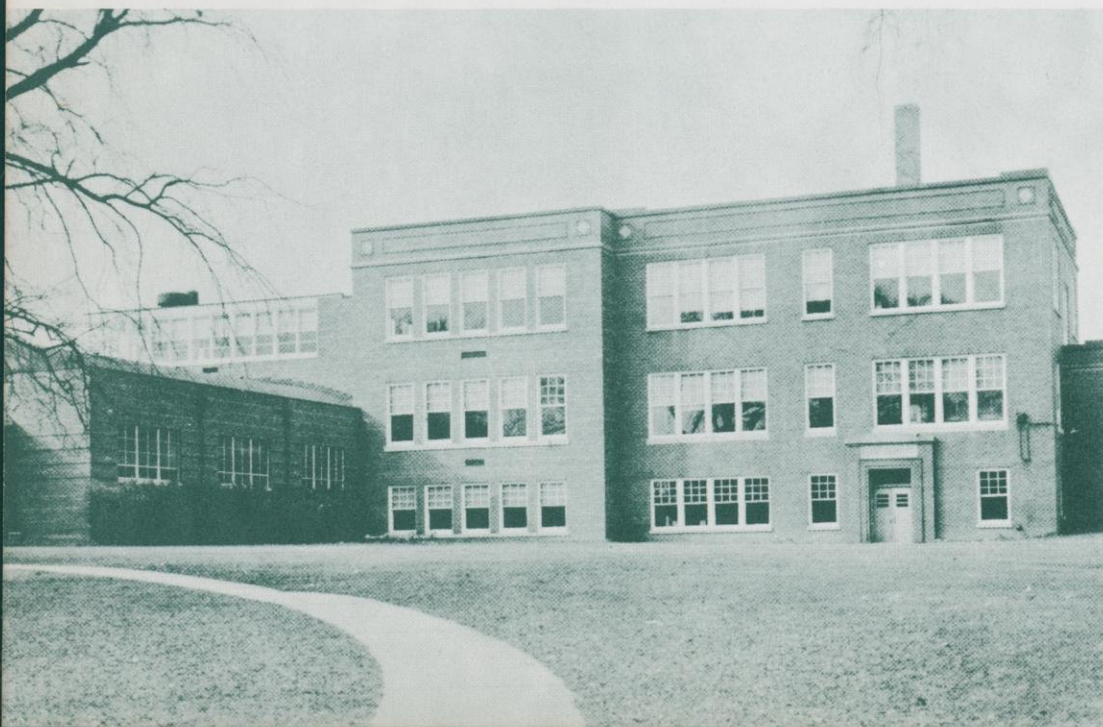


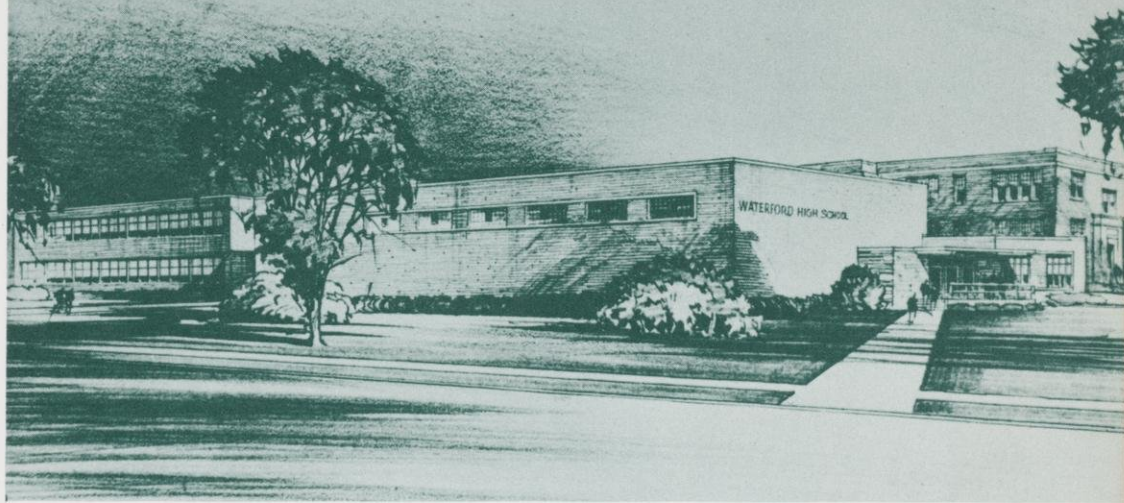



# ADMINISTRATION

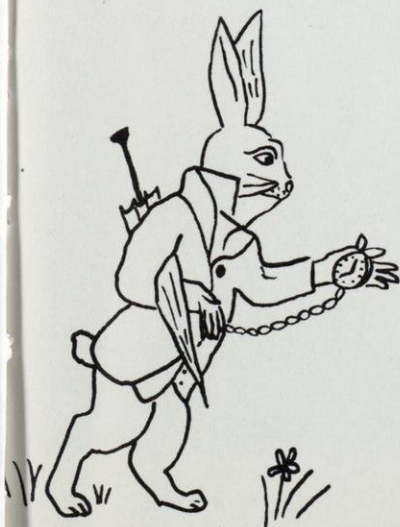

Competition is sponsored annually by the General Mills Company and is open to all senior girls in high schools throughout the country. The written examinations test the girls' knowledge of homemaking abilities and reflect their attitudes as future homemakers.

Each state winner receives a \$1500 scholarship and a trip to Washington, D.C., Williamsburg, Virginia, and New York City.

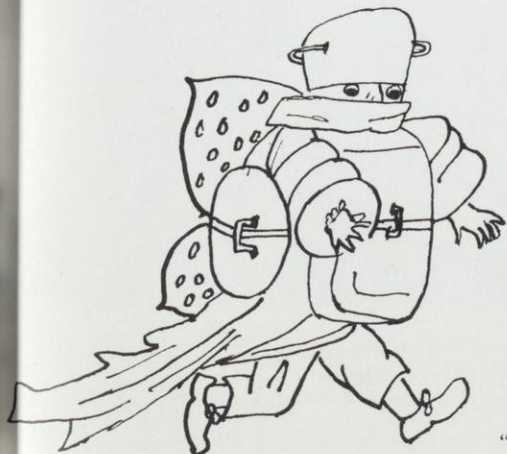
## FOOTBALL

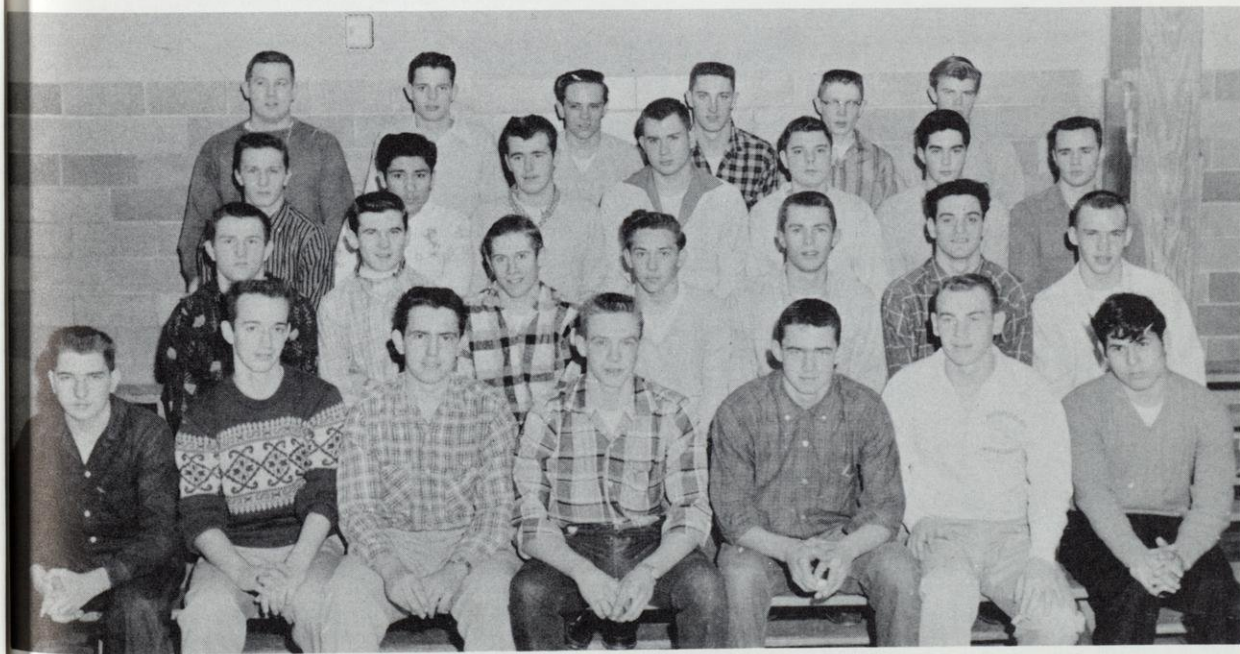
# LETTERMEN'S CLUB

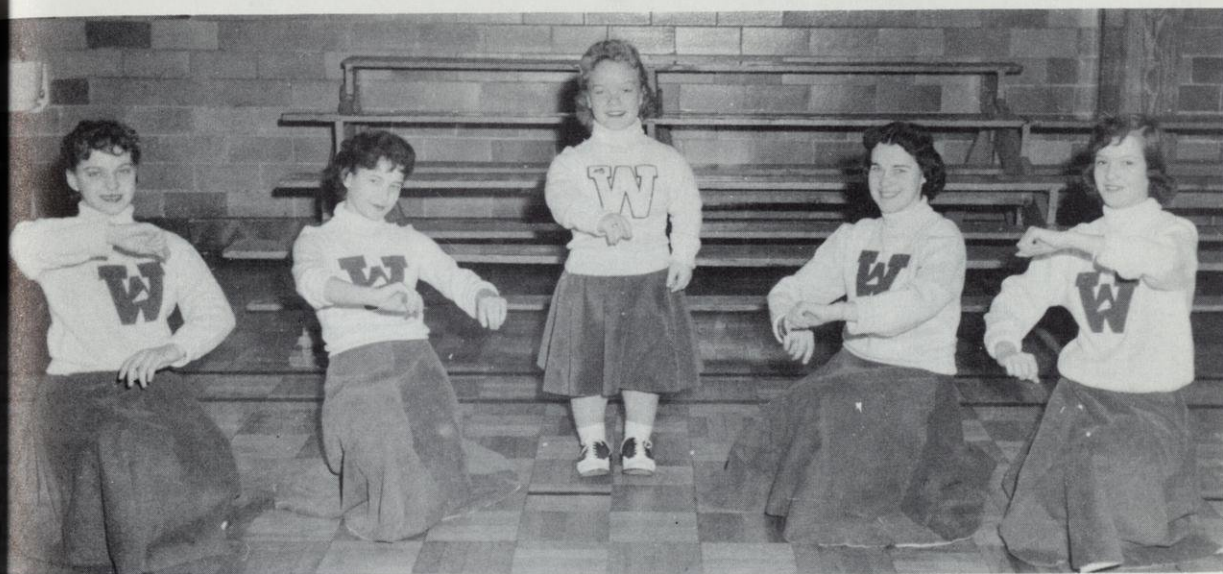

# THE EMERALD ANNUAL

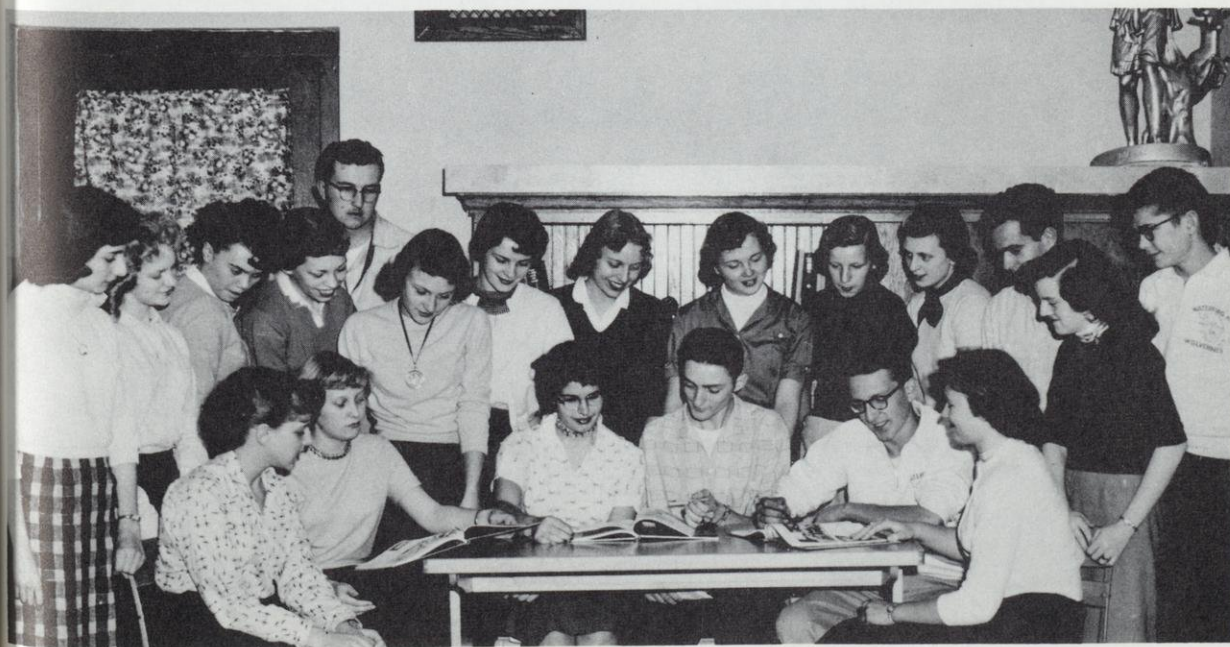
The Emerald Annual this year was published by a staff of members from all the classes. This has enabled some of the underclassmen to gain experience in the preparation of the year book before their senior year.

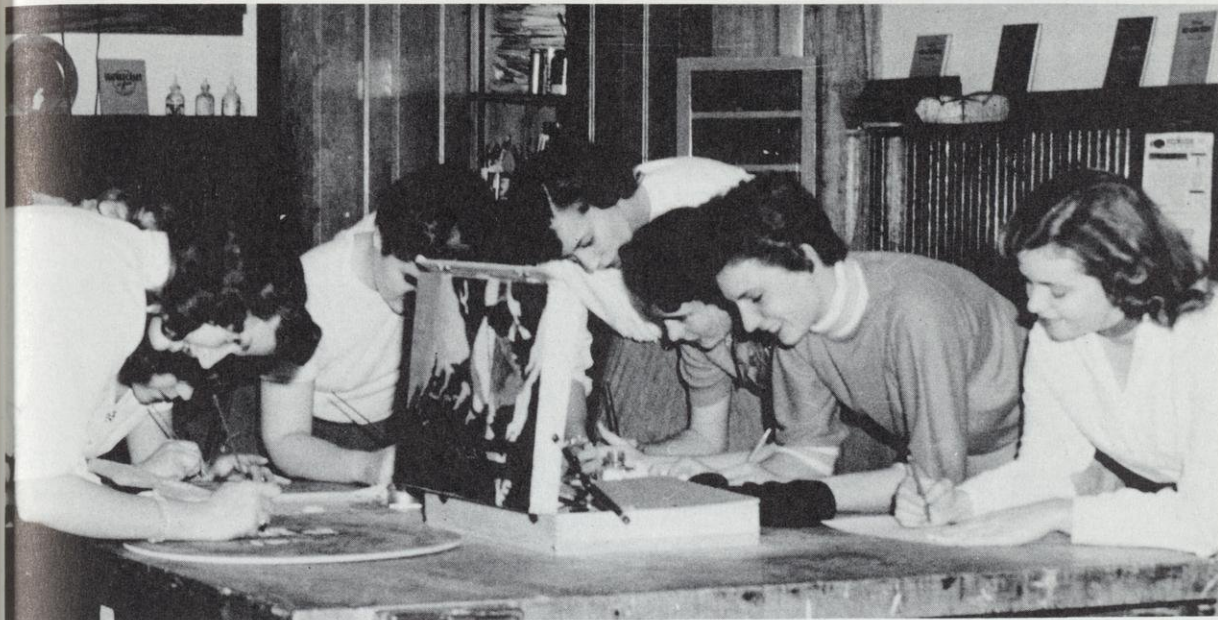

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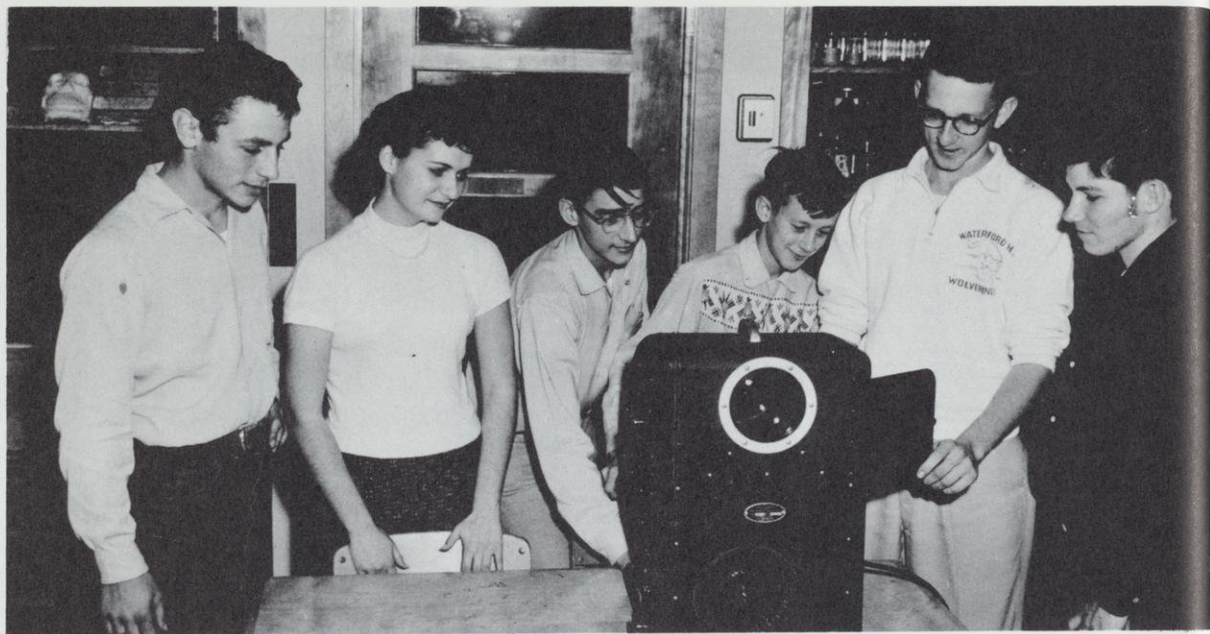
## ART

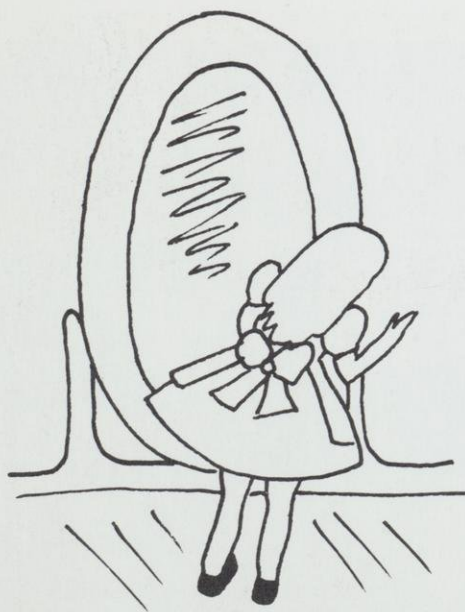

"Oh, what fun it'll be, when they see me through the glass in here, and can't get at me!"

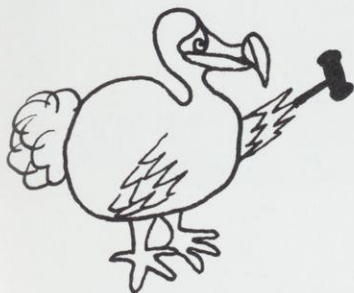

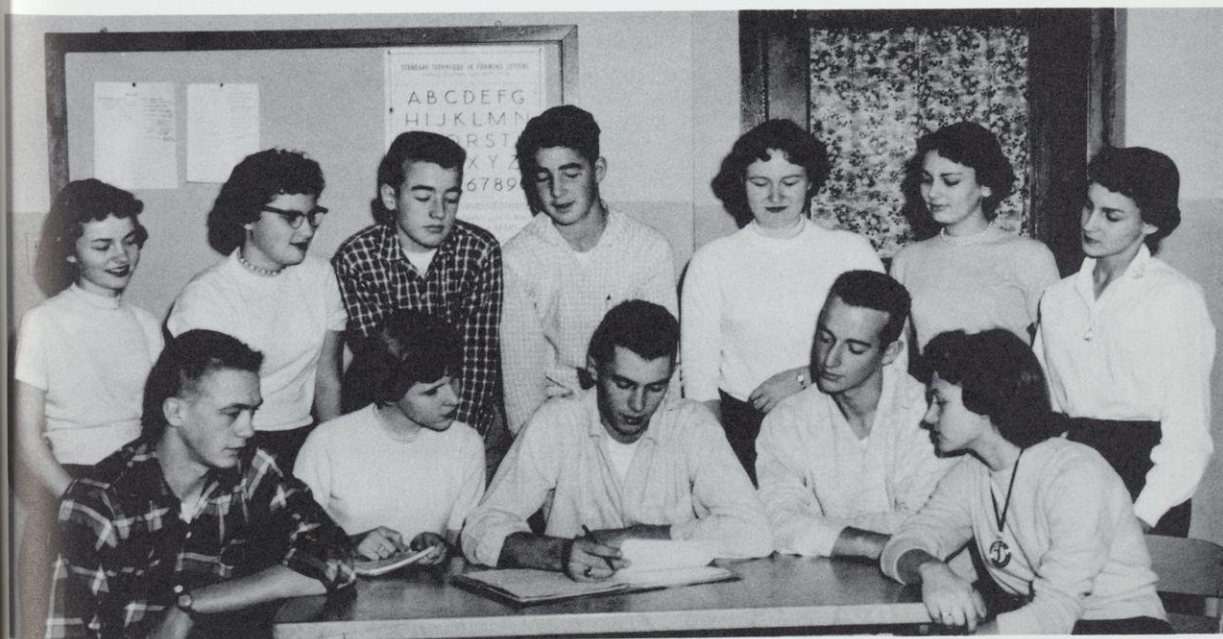
# STUDENT COUNCIL

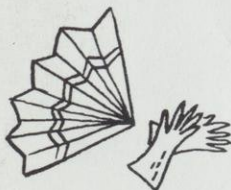




## JUNIOR CLASS PLAY

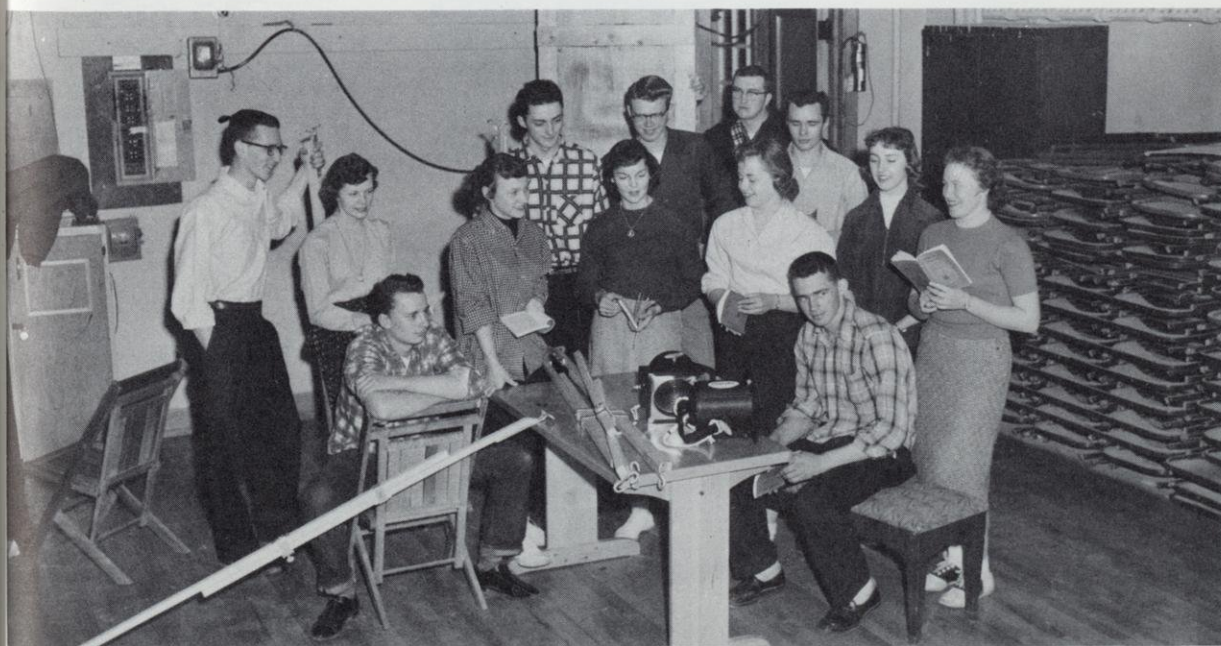


"Two lines!" cried the Mock Turtle.

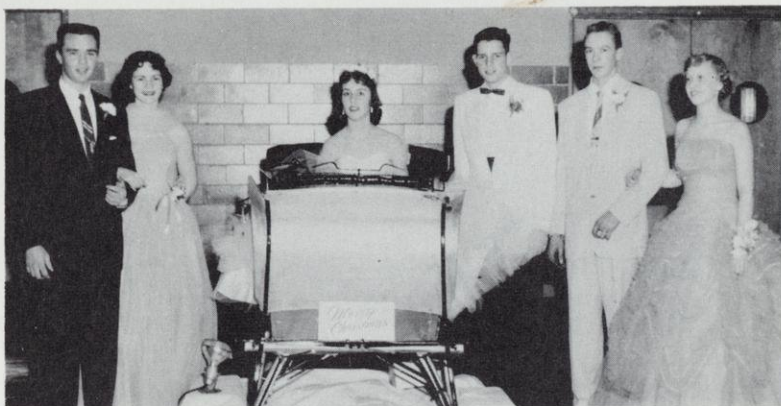

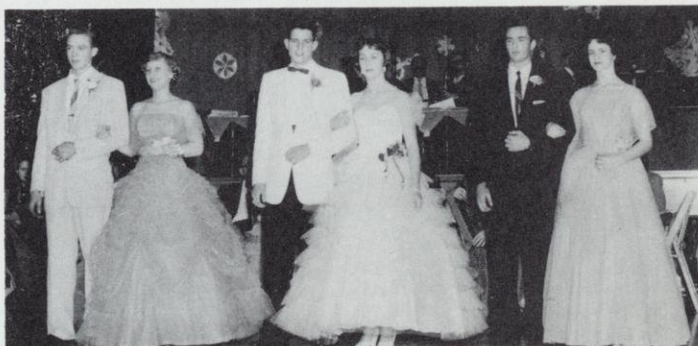


# SENIOR PROM

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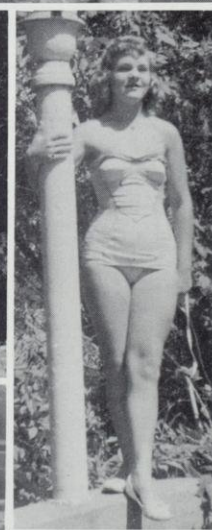
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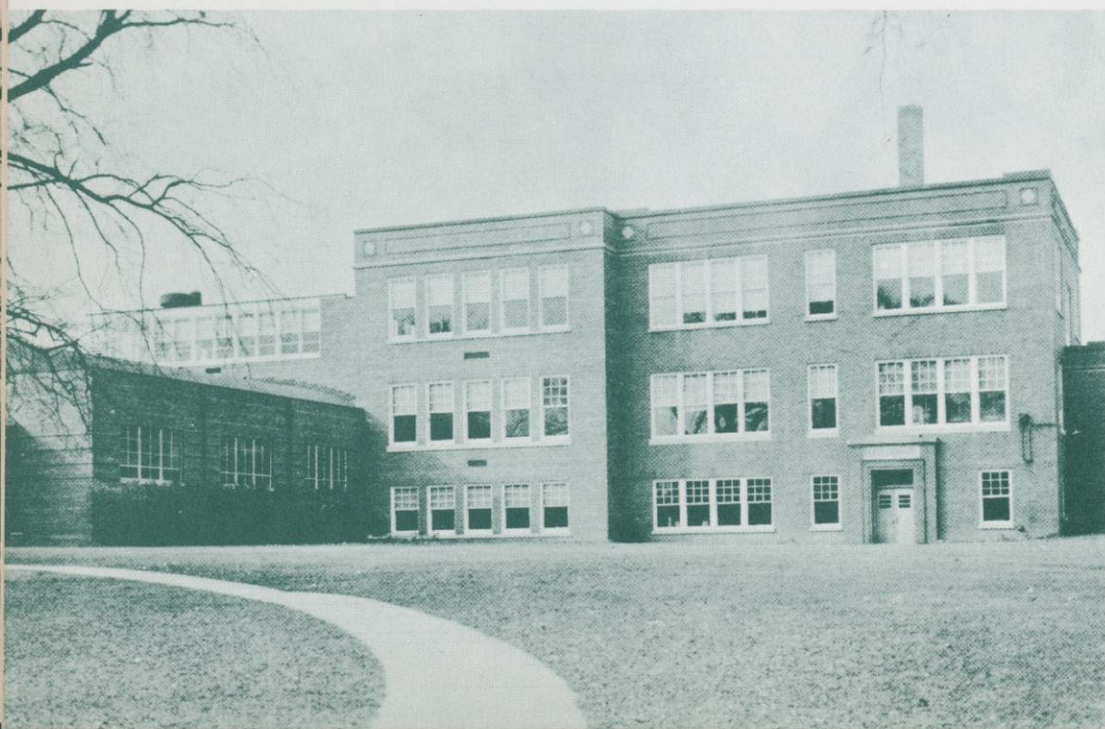

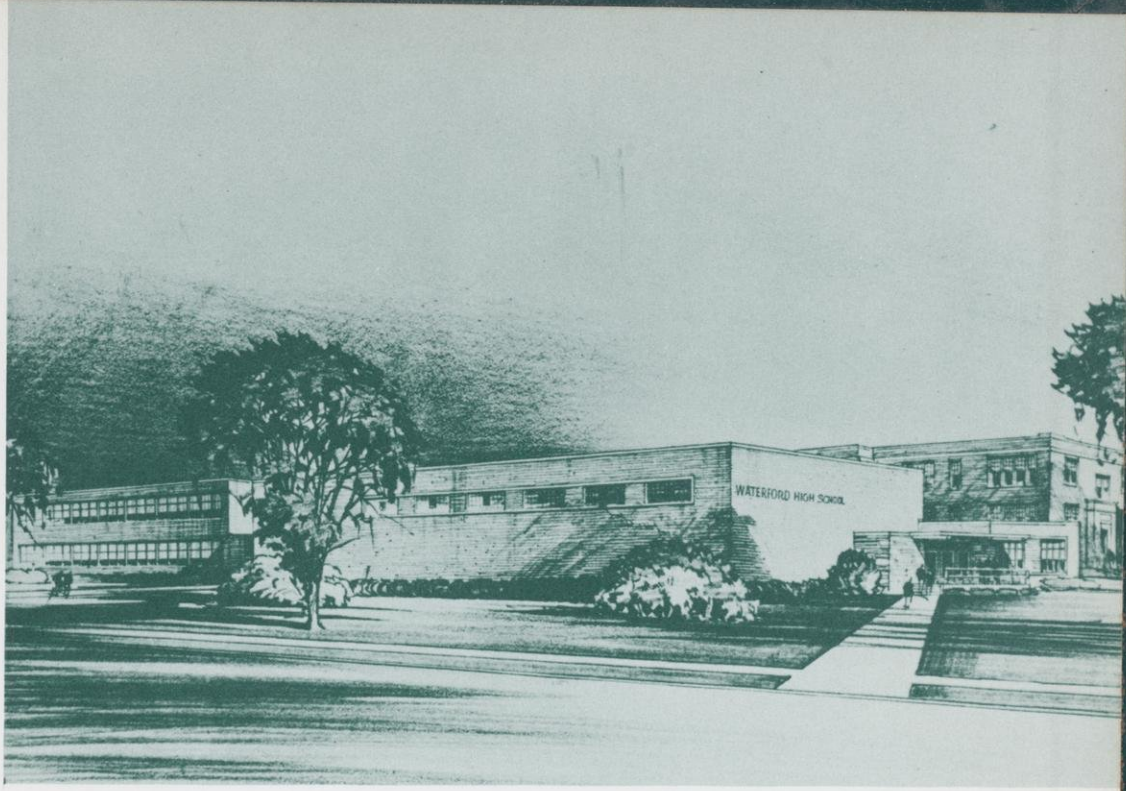
