## SPECIAL MEETING OF THE BOARD OF REGENTS

Madison, Wisconsin

Friday, June 3, 1938, 10 A.M.

# President Wilkie presiding

PRESENT: President Dykstra; Regents Backus, Baker, Brown, Callahan, Campbell, Christopherson, Combs, Gates, Glover, Mead, Miller, Wilkie.

ABSENT: Regents Hones, Kelly, Richards.

A telegram was received from Regent Kelly, regretting his inability to be present at the meeting.

President Wilkie stated that President Dykstra had raised the question as to whether it was necessary to make a reappointment of the President of the University for the ensuing year. President Wilkie explained that this was unnecessary and that the appointment would continue as provided in the budget from year to year unless some action was taken to the contrary and that the approval of the budget carries with it the approval of the appointment.

Regent Callahan brought up the matter of the continuation of Professor Page of the Law School under special contract. Upon motion of Regent Brown, seconded by Regent Gates, it was VOTED, That President Dykstra be requested to write Professor Page that the action taken by the Regents on January 18-19, 1938, remains in effect and that he is continued in the budget for 1938-39 pursuant to this resolution.

Mr. Ronald A. Dreschler of the Milwaukee City Attorney's office appeared before the Board to discuss the matter of the <u>Diller property</u> in Milwaukee. Upon motion of Regent Backus, seconded by Regent Brown, the following resolution was adopted:

WHEREAS, The Regents of the University of Wisconsin by its Secretary by letter dated May 14, 1938, requested of the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee that it adopt a resolution complying with the requirements of the State Emergency Board relative to the acquisition by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin of the following described real estate:

"All except the North  $7\frac{1}{2}$  feet of Lots 2 and 6; all of Lot 7; all except the East 30 feet of Lots 8 and 9; and the North 22 feet of Lot 10 in Block 166 of the Plat of the East 1/2 of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 29 (Township 7, Range 22 East in the City of Milwaukee)"

by warranty deed from the City of Milwaukee in exchange for a conveyance by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin of the following described real estate:

"The East 30 feet of Lot 1 and the North 7½ feet of the West 20 feet of Lot 1, Block 166 of the plat of the East 1/2 of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 29 (Township 7, Range 22 East, in the City of Milwaukee)"

by warranty deed to said city; and

WHEREAS, it was among other things provided in a resolution adopted on March 19, 1934, by the Common Council of said city, file No. 51591, as follows:

"That any plans for the building of additional structures on the premises now owned by the Extension Division and those to be deeded by the city be first submitted to the Board of Public Land Commissioners for its approval as to the proper setback restrictions from any streets on which said proposed additional structures may abut, the said plans to be approved by the Common Council before proceeding with the building.

"That said parcels of land conveyed by the city shall revert to the City of Milwaukee if not used by the state for university purposes."

now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin that it will accept a warranty deed from the City of Milwaukee conveying to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin the land above described, said deed containing, besides the usual provisions contained in warranty deeds, the terms and conditions above referred to.

FURTHER RESOLVED that The Regents of the University of

Wisconsin approve of the adoption by the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee of a resolution in form and substance as the form of resolution hereto attached and marked Exhibit "A".

## EXHIBIT "A"

RESOLUTION accepting offer of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin to convey certain property to the City of Milwaukee in exchange for conveyance by the City of certain property for the University of Wisconsin Extension Division.

WHEREAS, it was provided among other things by resolution file No. 51591 adopted by the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee on March 19, 1934, that the following described city-owned land, to wit:

"All except the North  $7\frac{1}{2}$  feet of Lots 2 and 6; all of Lot 7; all except the East 30 feet of Lots 8 and 9; and the North 22 feet of Lot 10 in Block 166 of the Plat of the East 1/2 of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 29, (Township 7, Range 22 East, in the City of Milwaukee)"

be dedicated to the State of Wisconsin for university purposes under certain terms and conditions, including among others that the State was to acquire on or before October 1, 1935, all of Lot 1 in said Block 166, of which said lot the East 30 feet was to be conveyed to the City on or before October 1, 1935, for the proposed widening of North Sixth Street, and the North  $7\frac{1}{2}$  feet of the West 20 feet of said lot was to be conveyed to the city on or before said date for the widening of West State Street, said resolution further providing that such dedication be subject to the following terms and conditions:

"That any plans for the building of additional structures on the premises now owned by the Extension Division and those to be deeded by the city be first submitted to the Board of Public Land Commissioners for its approval as to the proper setback restrictions from any streets on which said proposed additional structures may abut, and said plans to be approved by the Common Council before proceeding with the building.

"That said parcels of land conveyed by the city shall revert to the City of Milwaukee if not used by the state for university purposes."

and

WHEREAS, The Regents of the University of Wisconsin are

about to acquire title to said Lot 1 by purchase, it appearing that the State Emergency Board by resolution has allotted the amount required to purchase said lot from an appropriation made by statute for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1938, subject to the condition that the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee will, by resolution or ordinance lawfully adopted, agree to and transfer by warranty deed to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin with an abstract of title to be approved by the Attorney General the following described lots and parts of lots as follows: All except the North  $7\frac{1}{2}$  feet of Lots 2 and 6; all of Lot 7; all except the East 30 feet of Lots 8 and 9; and the North 22 feet of Lot 10 in Block 166 of the plat of the East 1/2 of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 29, when The Regents of the University of Wisconsin deed to the City of Milwaukee the East 30 feet of Lot 1 and the North  $7\frac{1}{2}$  feet of the West 20 feet of Lot 1, Block 166 of said plat for street widening purposes; and

WHEREAS, The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, by its secretary has requested in writing that a resolution be adopted by the Common Council in accordance with said resolution of the State Emergency Board; and

WHEREAS, the offer of The Regents of the University of Wisconsin has been approved by the Board of Public Land Commissioners; therefore, be it

RESOLVED by the Common Council of the City of Milwaukee that said property to be conveyed by the City to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin is not needed by the City, and said property to be conveyed to the City by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin is needed by the city for street widening, among other purposes; and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the proper city officers are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver, with abstracts of title extended to date, to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, a warranty deed free and clear of all liens and encumbrances, conveying to The Regents of the University of Wisconsin the real estate hereinafter described, said warranty deed to be prepared by the City Attorney and to be in form and substance as follows:

THIS INDENTURE, Made this \_\_\_\_\_ day of June, 1938, between the City of Milwaukee, a municipal corporation duly organized and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Wisconsin, located at Milwaukee, Wisconsin, party of the first part, and The Regents of the University of Wisconsin, a body corporate constituted and existing under and by virtue of the laws of the State of Wisconsin, party of the second part.

WITNESSETH, That the said party of the first part,

for and in consideration of the sum of One (\$1.00) Dollar and other valuable considerations, to it paid by the said party of the second part, the receipt whereof is hereby confessed and acknowledged, has given, granted, bargained, sold, remised, released, aliened, conveyed and confirmed, and by these presents does give, grant, bargain, sell, remise, release, alien, convey and confirm unto the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns forever, the following described real estate, situated in the City and County of Milwaukee and State of Wisconsin, towit:

"All except the N.  $7\frac{1}{8}$  feet of Lots 2 and 6; all of Lot 7; all except the East 30 feet of Lots 8 and 9; and the North 22 feet of Lot 10, in Block 166, of the Plat of the East one-half of the N.W. 1/4 of Section 29 (Township 7, Range 22 East in the City of Milwaukee)"

upon the following terms and conditions:

That any plans for the building of additional structures on the premises adjoining the aforedescribed land and now used by the University of Wisconsin Extension Division and on the aforedescribed real estate be first submitted to the Board of Public Land Commissioners of the City of Milwaukee, the party of the first part, for its approval as to the proper setback restrictions from any streets on which said proposed additional structures may abut, and that said plans shall be approved by the Common Council of the party of the first part before proceeding with the building;

That the aforedescribed land hereby conveyed by the party of the first part shall revert to the party of the first part if not used by The Regents of the University of Wisconsin for university purposes.

TOGETHER with all and singular the hereditaments and appurtenances thereunto belonging or in any wise appertaining; and all the estate, right, title, interest, claim or demand whatsoever, except those created by the terms and conditions aforesaid, of the said party of the first part, either in law or equity, either in possession or expectancy of, in and to the above bargained premises, and their hereditaments and appurtenances.

TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said premises as above described with the hereditaments and appurtenances, subject to said terms and conditions, unto the said party of the second part, and to its successors and assigns FOREVER.

AND THE SAID City of Milwaukee, party of the first

part, for itself and its successors, does covenant, grant, bargain and agree to and with the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, that at the time of the ensealing and delivery of these presents it is well seized of the premises above described, as of a good, sure, perfect, absolute and indefeasible estate of inheritance in the law, in fee simple, and that the same are free and clear from all incumbrances whatever, except the terms and conditions aforesaid, and that the above bargained premises in the quiet and peaceable possession of the said party of the second part, its successors and assigns, against all and every person or persons lawfully claiming the whole or any part thereof, subject to said terms and conditions aforesaid, it will forever WARRANT AND DEFEND.

FURTHER RESOLVED that such warranty deed be delivered by the City Attorney upon receipt from The Regents of the University of Wisconsin of a warranty deed with an abstract of title extended to date, both title and deed approved by the City Attorney, conveying to the City of Milwaukee free and clear of all liens and encumbrances the following described real estate:

"The East 30 feet of Lot 1 and the North  $7\frac{1}{2}$  feet of the West 20 feet of Lot 1, Block 166 of the Plat of the East 1/2 of the Northwest 1/4 of Section 29 (Township 7, Range 22 East in the City of Milwaukee)"

and, be it

FURTHER RESOLVED that the City Real Estate Agent be and he hereby is authorized and directed to cause the abstracts of title upon the property to be conveyed by the city extended to date and to deliver such abstracts to the Attorney General of the State of Wisconsin for approval of the title prior to the delivery of said deeds.

Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

Upon motion of Regent Backus, seconded by Regent Brown, it

VOTED, That when the resolution of the Milwaukee City Council has been passed and the deed prepared, the President and the Secretary of the Board of Regents be authorized to sign the deed and any other papers necessary to complete the transaction.

Reference was made to a communication sent out by Mayor Hoan of Milwaukee with reference to the price of the Diller property. It was explained by Mr. Dreschler that the Mayor approved of the purchase of the land at the stated price at the meeting of the Land Commission

of Milwaukee held on June 2, 1938. Regent Glover stated that he had had a communication from Mayor Hoan under date of May 12, 1938, withdrawing his objections.

Upon motion of Regent Brown, seconded by Regent Glover, it

VOTED, That President Dykstra be authorized to advise Mayor Hoan of this resolution and noting that any objections which Mayor Hoan had prior to this action had been withdrawn by him.

At 12:10 P.M. a recess was taken to 2 P.M.

was

At 2 P.M. the Regents reconvened.

The budget for 1938-39 was then taken up for consideration and a copy of the budget was placed before each Regent. President Dykstra presented an analysis of the budget, which had been thoroughly considered by the Business Committee at a meeting held on May 27, 1938. The President explained that the budget had been amended by the addition of several pages in which certain changes had been made, not affecting totals in any way.

Upon motion of Regent Brown, seconded by Regent Baker, it was VOTED, That upon recommendation of the Business Committee the budget presented by the President for the fiscal year July 1, 1938 to June 30, 1939, totaling \$9,126,079, be approved. Called vote was taken, all Regents present voting and voting "Aye".

President Dykstra referred to a letter from the operating engineers of the University dated May 16, 1938, regarding salaries. Upon motion of Regent Brown, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That the President be authorized to reply to this letter and report the action taken with regard to the budget.

President Dykstra reported to the Board that the Governor's

Advisory Committee has acted on the two radio stations which have been under the State Department of Markets and Agriculture. The radio stations will be turned over to the University on July 1, 1938, and it will thereafter be the responsibility of the Board of Regents to operate these stations.

Upon recommendation of the President and upon motion of Re-

gent Gates, seconded by Regent Callahan, it was VOTED, That provision be made for ten graduate scholarships of \$250 each, one for each of the nine State Teachers Colleges and one for Stout Institute, if the Committee on Research finds it feasible to do so.

President Dykstra presented the request of the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics for WPA projects totaling \$371,000, \$265,000 to be requested from WPA, \$106,000 to come from 20.41(5)C, with the understanding that the \$35,000 surplus for 1937-38 in 20.41(5)C would be used as a part of the \$106,000. This would involve a request to the Emergency Board for an appropriation of \$71,000 for the 1938-40 biennium. Upon motion of Regent Christopherson, seconded by Regent Callahan, the following recommendations of Director Stuhldreher were approved, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee as to details:

That the President and the Board of Regents approve the Camp Randall W.P.A. project totaling an expenditure of \$371,000, of which amount the W.P.A. authorities will contribute \$265,000, leaving \$106,000 for superintendents, supplies, and material, to be contributed by the Sponsor.

- That the Board of Regents authorize the expenditure of \$35,000 from the Surplus in the 1937-38 Athletic Council 5-C revolving Fund Budget as a part of the Sponsor's contribution totaling \$106,000. Adopted.
- That the Board of Regents request of the Emergency Fund Board an appropriation of \$71,000 as the balance of the Sponsor's contribution for the project. Adopted.
