RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE PRESIDENT

- Letters and Science -

l. That the resignation of Victor Vacquier, assistant in physics, be accepted; to take effect February 28, 1930. Adopted.

2. That Lester V. Whitney be appointed assistant in physics, beginning February 28, 1930; salary at the rate of \$800 per annum; in place of Victor Vacquier, resigned. Adopted.
