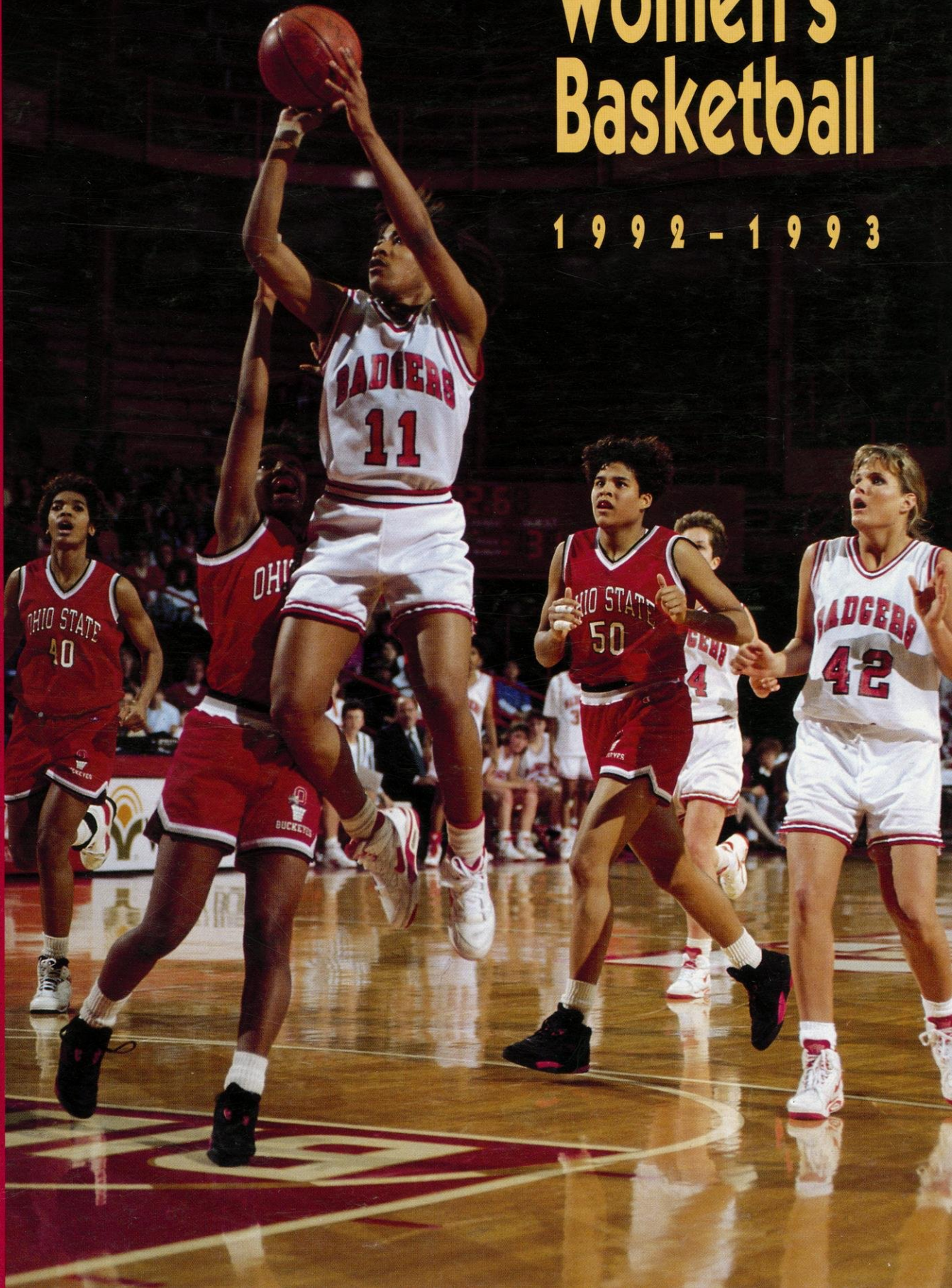

1992 Big Ten Coach of the Year

Mary Murphy begins her seventh season at Wisconsin.

A Chicago native, Mary Murphy was named the third head coach at Wisconsin on July 7, 1986. Since that time, she has revitalized the Wisconsin program bringing it into national prominence.

During the 1991-92 season, Wisconsin made the quantum leap with its first-ever national ranking. The Badgers were ranked as high as 22nd in the Associate Press poll during the season and ended the regular season in the 25th spot. That ranking and a 20-9 record, the second best in program history, gave Wisconsin its first-ever NCAA tournament bid.

The Badgers also finished third in the Big Ten Conference in 1992, the best conference finish since 1984, with a 13-5 record. For her team's achievements, Murphy was named the Big Ten Coach of the Year and also earned Converse Dis-



trict IV Coach of the Year honors.

Murphy's style of play is popular not only with her players but with the spectators setting attendance records in five of her six years. Wisconsin set cumulative and Big Ten school attendance records for the third straight year last season averaging more than 3,000 per Big Ten game and 2,759 for all games, over a 200 percent increase from the previous year. The Badgers also set a single game attendance record of 8,353 when Wisconsin played host to Montana in a first-round NCAA game.

Since taking over the program, nine individuals have received all-Big Ten honors by a vote of the conference coaches. In 1991-92, the Badgers landed three athletes on the honor team with Robin Threath earning first-team honors, Mynette Clark second-team laurels, and Michele Kozelka honorable mention honors, making her the first four-time honoree for the Badgers. In addition, Barb Franke was named the Big Ten Freshman of the Year, marking the second such honor under Murphy.

In the academic arena, Murphy has not neglected the responsibilities of her student-athletes. Wisconsin has made up



25% of the all-Big Ten basketball academic team members since 1989. The 1991-92 Badger team had four Academic All-Big Ten team members. In 1990-91, Wisconsin made up one-third of the Academic All-Big Ten team with seven Badgers among the 21 members. Four members of the 1989-90 team, and three members of the 1988-89 team earned Big Ten Academic Team honors, the first ever from the Badger program since the award was initiated in 1985-86. In the past four years, Wisconsin's 18 representatives on the academic teams has numbered more than any other Big Ten men's or women's basketball program.

In addition, Kay Fredrickson became Wisconsin's first women's basketball CoSIDA/GTE Academic All-America District team member. Murphy's emphasis



on the court and in the classroom is, "To be the best that you can be." The results of that philosophy are evident.

Murphy's reconstruction of the Badger program has included an infusion of youth, most of whom come from the State of Wisconsin. Her proven experience in recruiting has brought about the revitalization of the Badger program.

Murphy is a 1980 graduate of Northwestern University in public administration/public policy. She was a four-year starting guard for Northwestern and a co-captain her final two seasons. She guided the Wildcats to consecutive Big Ten and Midwest Association of Intercollegiate Athletics for Women Championships in 1979 and 1980. The Wildcats went to the quarterfinals of the 1980 AIAW National Basketball Tournament. She was also selected a Wade Trophy finalist in 1980, an annual award given to the nation's outstanding female college basketball player.

After completing her playing career, Murphy accepted a graduate assistant coaching position at Notre Dame. She earned a master's degree in business administration from Notre Dame in 1982. Murphy served as a head assistant and recruiting coordinator at Notre Dame for six years prior to being named to her first head coaching appointment at Wisconsin.

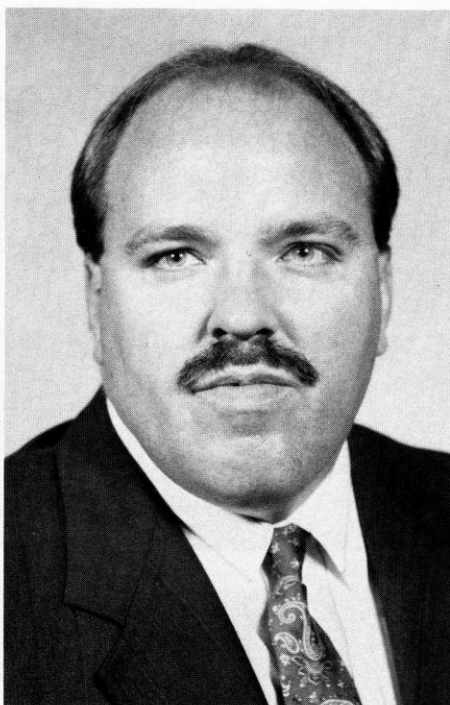


Donna Freitag

Donna Freitag begins her second season as the Badger's first assistant coach. The team's defensive coordinator, she is also in charge of coaching the post players. A native of Oregon, Wis., Donna returned to Wisconsin in 1986 as second assistant, and was named the first assistant in 1991.

Freitag earned most valuable player honors at the University of Wisconsin-Platteville for two years before transferring to the University of Iowa. At Iowa, she was named team MVP and captain during the 1982-83 season. Freitag also won the All-Around Athlete award in 1983 and was named to the all-tournament team at the Sun Dial Classic.

Freitag, a 1983 graduate of Iowa in physical education and health, has also worked at numerous basketball camps and has coached at the high school level. She played in Ireland with the women's semi-professional basketball league for two years prior to her appointment at Wisconsin.



Jon Cain

Jon Cain begins his second season with the Badger women's basketball program. The Badger's recruiting and scouting coordinator, Jon also assists with practice and on-court coaching.

A native of Wisconsin, Jon served as the only assistant women's basketball coach at Baylor University for two years prior to coming to Wisconsin. He assisted in all areas of coaching including recruiting and player evaluation, organizing practices, on-court coaching, scheduling, and monitoring the academic progress of the athletes.

Prior to his position at Baylor, Jon served as a coach and teacher at Concordia Lutheran High School in Tomball, Texas. He compiled a two-year record of 55-8 as girls basketball coach. Jon also served as the football coach and athletic director.

A native of Milwaukee, Jon graduated from Milwaukee Lutheran High School in 1980 where he lettered in football and wrestling. He received a bachelor's degree in education from Valparaiso University in 1984 and a master's degree in education from Baylor in 1989.



Anne Rzeszut

Anne Rzeszut (pronounced REZ it) begins her first season as the part-time assistant coach with the Wisconsin women's basketball program. She will assist with administrative and on-court coaching duties.

Prior to beginning her coaching career, Anne has worked as a project director and data processing specialist with the Wirthlin Group in McLean, Va. She also assisted the UW Athletic Department last season as a producer with the new computerized scoreboard.

A native of Severna Park, Md., Anne earned all-county honors in basketball. She was a member of the women's basketball team at the University of Alaska for two years before transferring to Virginia Tech. She earned her bachelor's degree in communication studies with a minor in Spanish from Virginia Tech in 1988.

Anne will be working towards her master's degree in public communication while at Wisconsin.

1992-93 Badger Women's Basketball Preview

Like a master painter, Badger Coach Mary Murphy began with a blank canvas and a vision six years ago and now is putting the final touches on her masterpiece.

Last season, her team displayed the artistry, color and depth of a true classic. From the team's first NCAA bid to the first Kodak all-America honorable mention player, Wisconsin's performance was no less than masterful.

"Our style of play won't change. We'll push the ball up the floor, toe the three-point line, have an aggressive, stifling defense, and baffle our opponents on how to stop our potent inside-outside game."

"It's sort of been my work of art," said Murphy of bringing her team from 4-24, when she took over the program in 1986, to 20-9 last season. "It's something I've put my heart and soul into. We have people that could have gone just about anywhere, but they decided to come here and make their own tradition."

The tradition Murphy started brought Wisconsin from last in the Big Ten Conference to a team in contention for the title last season. The Badgers hovered near first place before losing three of their last five games settling for third in the conference with a 13-5 record behind league champion Iowa and second-place Purdue. All three schools earned bids to the 48-team NCAA tournament.

It was Wisconsin's first invitation to the "big dance" and the Badgers tried to make the most of it. Despite drawing a school record 8,353 to the UW Field House for a first-round game, the Badgers stumbled at the start and couldn't make up the difference losing to a grizzly Montana team 85-74. The crowd was the most for any NCAA first-round game and brought Wisconsin's attendance average to 2,759 per game last season. The Badgers averaged over 3,000 for Big Ten games.

Wisconsin's success last season also included its first-ever national ranking, reaching a high of 22nd in the *Associated Press* poll and 21st in the *USA Today* poll. The Badgers 20-9 record was the second best in school history, just one win shy of the school record (21-13). The Badgers 13-5 Big Ten record tied the most conference wins in school history, and represented the highest league finish since 1984.

Post-season honors rolled in starting with Big Ten Coach of the Year and Converse District IV Coach of the Year honors for Murphy. Guard Robin Threatt earned first-team all-Big Ten honors and was second in the balloting for conference player of the year. She was one of five players to earn Kodak all-region honors and is Wisconsin's first all-American honorable mention player. Three other Badgers earned conference honors as Mynette Clark was named second-team all-Big Ten and Michele Kozelka was named honorable mention for the fourth consecutive year. Barb Franke earned Big Ten Freshman of the Year honors.

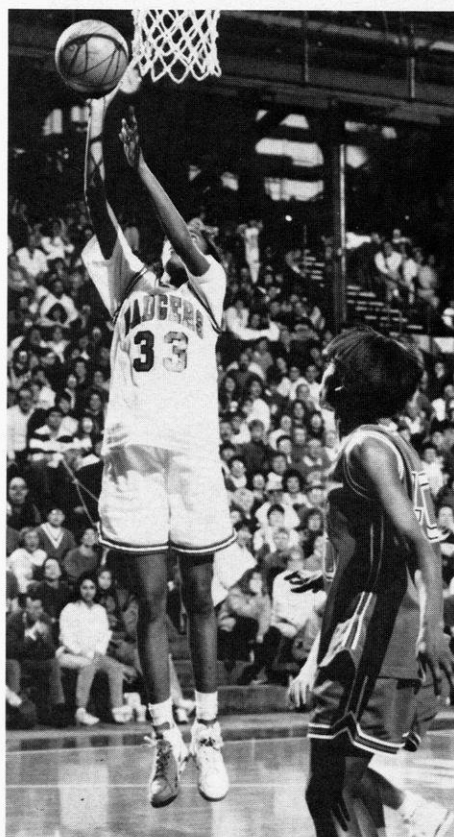
That was then This is now, and Murphy's masterpiece continues to evolve. Last year's quantum leap was accomplished with a meld of veterans and talented newcomers. Two starters graduated—Michele Kozelka (Prairie du Chien, WI) and Mynette Clark (Racine, WI). Kozelka was the team's leading rebounder the last four years and completed her career second in all-time rebounds with 916, and fourth in career scoring with 1,428 points. Clark was the team's second leading scorer last season with a 13.5 average and was the main three-point launcher averaging five attempts per game and hitting 130 of

393 in her career.

"We've got some gaps to fill when you look at losing Michele and Mynette, people who have statistically been career players in our program," Murphy said. "I think this will be a year where people are going to have opportunities to step up and see what they can do."

Those opportunities will be available to a corps of returning veterans starting with all-America candidate Threatt. A five-time state sprint champion with a 30-inch vertical leap from Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Threatt lends new meaning to the term "fast break."

"Robin Threatt is one of the best perimeter players in the country," according to Murphy. "She has it all. She can drive, she has hang time, she just glides in and floats back down. She plays defense, and scares the wits out of her opponent. She will shoot the three, and she'd shoot the four if they'd move the line further back."

The numbers say it all with Threatt's school record of 19.8 points per game and a .352 career three-point percentage (103-293). An all-around player, she also averaged three steals, 2.5 assists, and 4.6 rebounds per game last season. Threatt was one of 56 players invited to attend the U.S. Olympic basketball tryouts last summer, and later played with the Big Ten all-star team touring Australia and New Zealand last July.

Wisconsin's inside-outside game came together last season with the addition of sophomore Barb Franke (Cedar Falls, IA). The six-foot, two-inch forward showed her strength in the paint averaging 11.3 points and 6.9 rebounds while hitting just shy of a school record .542 percent of her shots (128-236). Franke made the U.S. Junior Select team which played five games in Canada last summer and was the leading scorer averaging 16 points per game.

"The main thing for Barb is we've got to keep her out of foul trouble," Murphy said. "She only took 236 shots last year. She could have easily doubled that, but we've got to get her the ball more and she needs to be on the floor more."

Returning at point guard are senior Peggy Shreve (Monroe, WI) and sophomore Sharon Johnson (Memphis, TN). The pair shared starting duties and each lends a different style to the Badger team.

"Peggy doesn't make mistakes with the ball and can hit the open jump shots," Murphy said. "Sharon can create havoc defensively with her quickness, and she's been working on her shot this summer."

Eyeing the remaining starting spots are senior Jen Waterman (Wisconsin Dells, WI), juniors Rebecca Leet (Oostburg, WI) and Dolly Rademaker (Thorp, WI), and sophomore Camille Williams (Waterloo, IA).

Waterman played in 24 games but averaged only nine minutes last season. Rademaker had a shooting slump after setting a three-point school record .405 (47-116) her freshman year. Leet began the year with a broken fibula and never caught up after the injury, while the sea-

son ended too quickly for Williams who came into her own in the NCAA game scoring 10 points on four of six shooting.

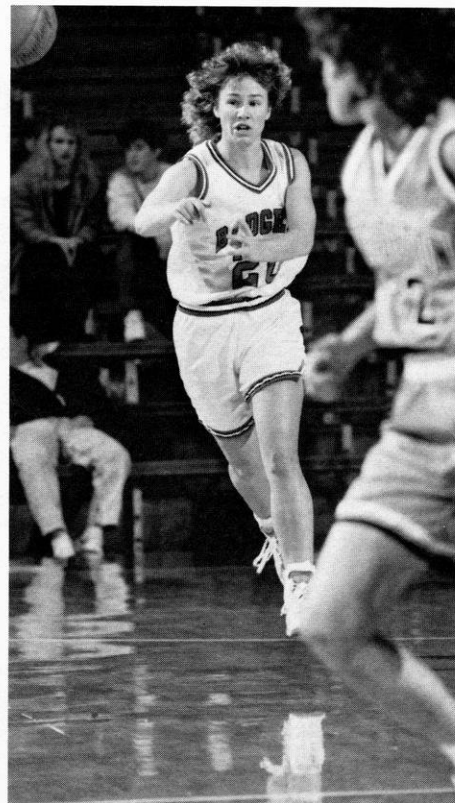
"Jen is shooting extremely well and her defense has improved," Murphy said of Waterman. "We need her rebounding, and we need her leadership on the court."

"Dolly is defensively one of our smartest players. She didn't have a great shooting year last season, but we have her two more years and I really expect great things."

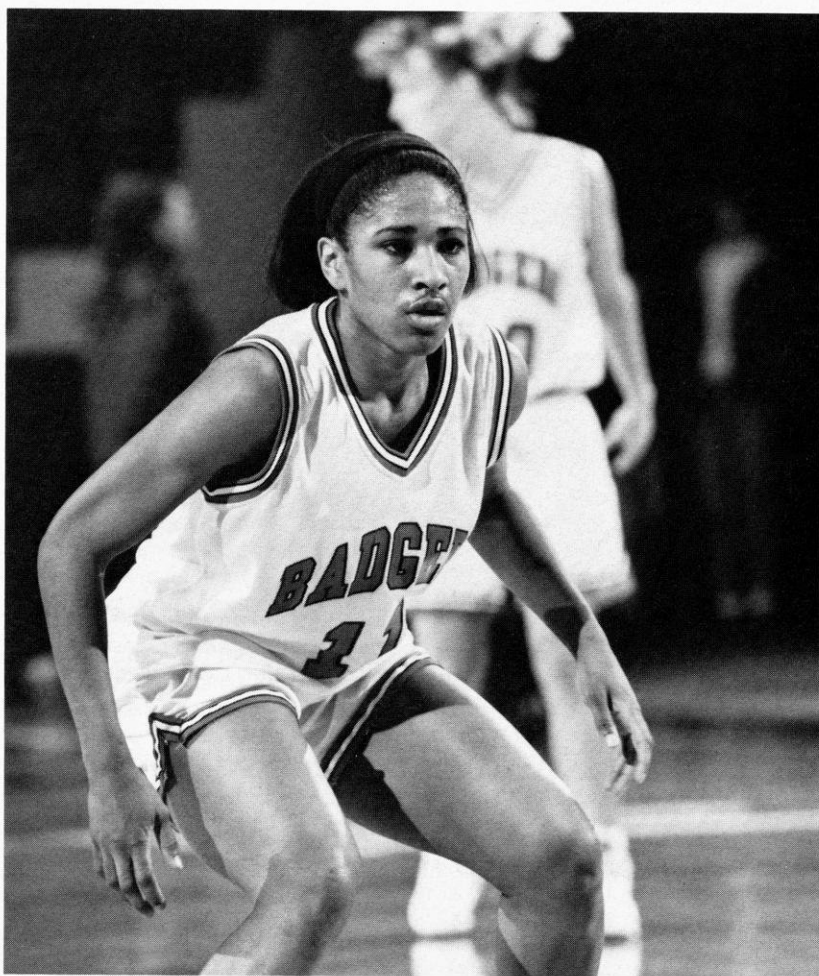
"Camille discovered how she fits in toward the end of the season. I think we saw a light dusting of what she can do. She has some awesome tools."

"Rebecca just needs to stay healthy for months rather than days. She can help us in rebounding and is not afraid to mix it up."

Injuries have affected two other returnees with Heather Bostrom (Rochester, MI) recovering from shoulder surgery and a hip injury, and six-foot, five-inch junior center Amber Landrigan

(Bridgeport, NE) coming off a redshirt year due to a stress fracture in her right tibia. Both will see limited action depending on their health.

Wisconsin's newcomers represent a whole new palette for the team. Redshirt freshmen Kesa Dillon (Oakland, CA) and Kim Martin (Demarest, NJ) are ready to lend their hues to the canvas. Freshmen Karie Cattanach (Markesan, WI) and Tracy Winkler (Chilton, WI) have great credentials from high school.

Cattanach, a five-foot, 10-inch swing player, averaged 22 points while Winkler, a six-foot, two-inch center, averaged 19 points and 11 rebounds. Both Martin and Cattanach are coming off reconstructive knee surgery.

"We're going to have contributions from a lot of people," Murphy said. "I'm looking for my experienced people to pick up where they left off, and for us to continue with what we need to improve. We need to be better rebounders, and I'd like to be a better free throw shooting team."

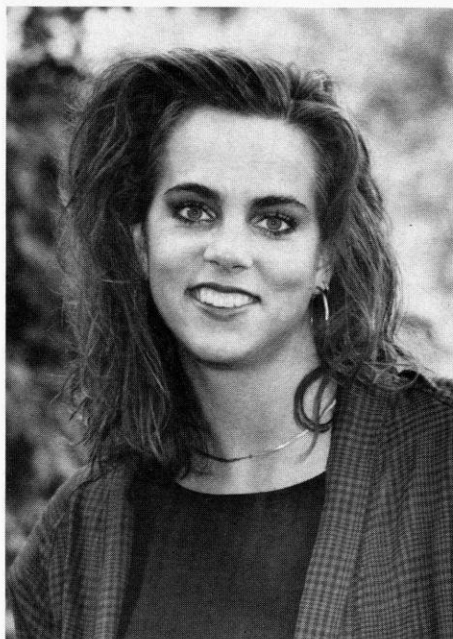
"I don't think we're starting with a blank canvas this year and trying to create something new. I think the painting is in progress, and we need to just get better at keeping the paint between the lines."

A World-Class University

The University of Wisconsin–Madison, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the UW–Madison ranks as the nation's fourth largest university with 43,695 students, 11 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, 14,000 employees, over 5 million volumes in 28 libraries, and a \$1 billion budget. The University's national ranking of fifth in research and development expenditures supports its reputation as a world-class research institution.

Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. In what may be the most extensive survey done on graduate level education—the five-volume *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States*—Wisconsin finished eighth in the nation, tied with Michigan and UCLA.

More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections are offered at UW–Madison. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's and pro-

fessional degree programs.

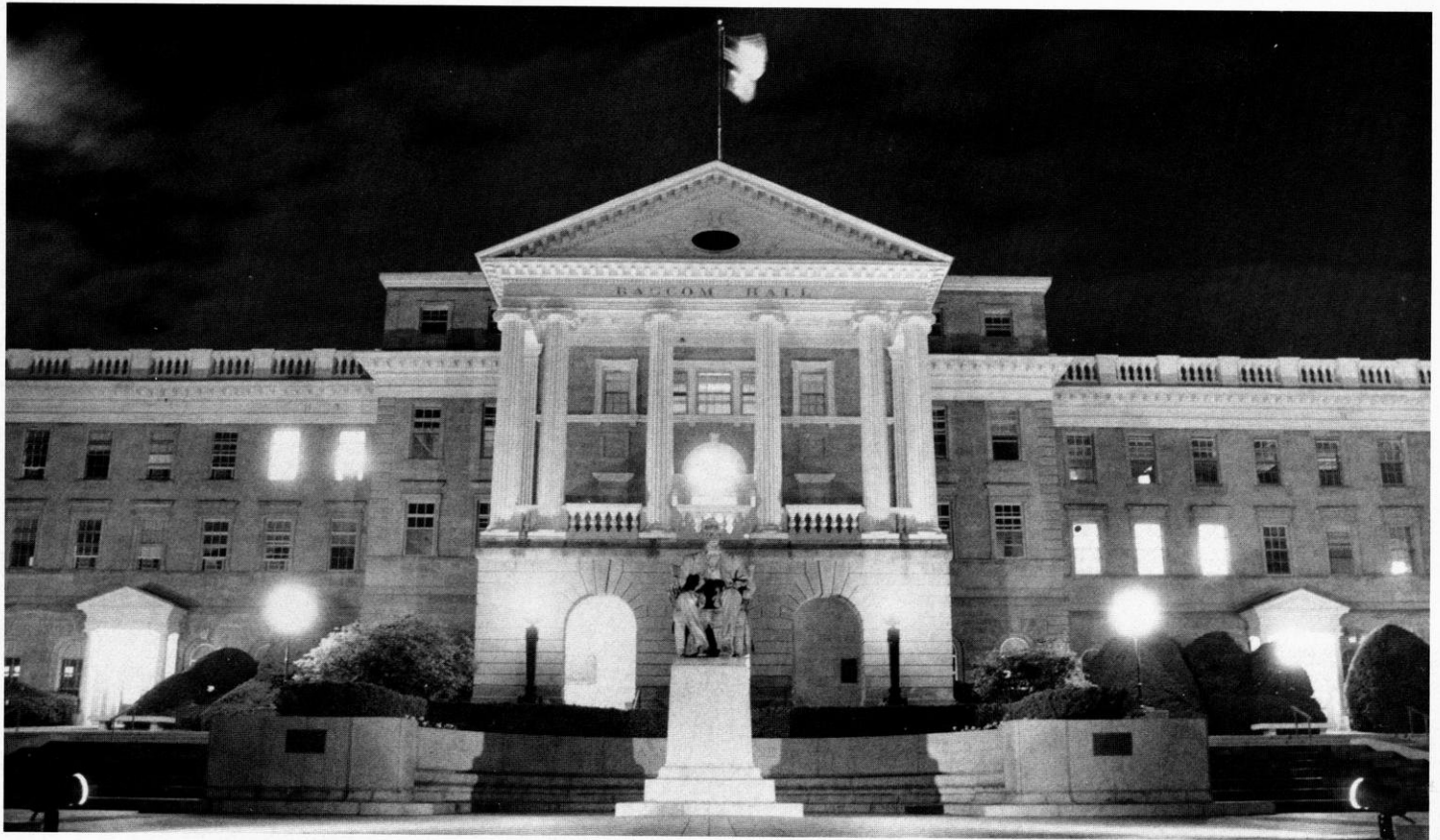
Some of the UW's departments ranked among the top ten nationally in recent years include sociology, mathematics, chemical engineering, economics, political science, zoology, geography, statistics, history, plant pathology, molecular biology, biochemistry, Spanish, and German.

Much of the University's international academic reputation stems from the quality of its faculty. UW–Madison faculty or alumni have been awarded 11 Nobel Prizes, with Professor Howard Temin receiving the most recent prize in 1975 for his study of retroviruses.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, research and public service, and education of physicians and other health professionals. It includes the professional schools of medicine, nursing, and pharmacy; UW Hospital and Clinics; the State Laboratory of Hygiene; UW Health Service; and the Wisconsin Clinical Cancer Center—one of 21 designated cancer centers in the country.

The Elvehjem Museum of Art, the second largest art museum in the state, houses the University's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C., and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.





A Scenic Campus

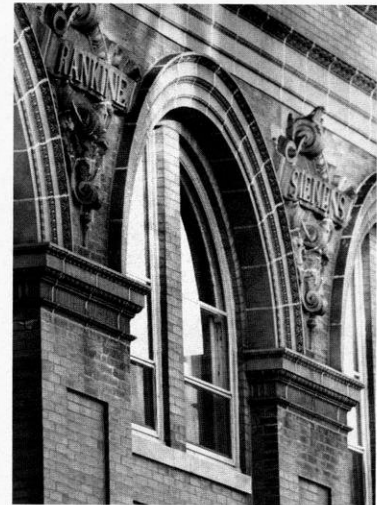
Located between Lakes Mendota and Monona, amid rolling hills and wooded areas, Madison is one of the nation's most beautiful campuses.

The city was designed so the University and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of the academic and political life of Wisconsin.

Two major films, including the 1986 summer hit *Back To School* starring Rodney Dangerfield, have been shot on the picturesque UW campus.

Tree-lined Bascom Hill, which features a bronze statue of Abraham Lincoln, is one of the University's most famous landmarks. Others include North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise (the UW's tallest building at 19 stories), Library Mall, with its clock tower and fountain, and Picnic Point, a 129-acre peninsula complete with hiking and biking trails—one of the most romantic spots on campus.

A favorite area for UW students to congregate is the Memorial Union and its lakeside terrace. Here students can study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, canoes, sailboards, kayaks and swimmers, while enjoying the sunshine and cool breezes from Lake Mendota.



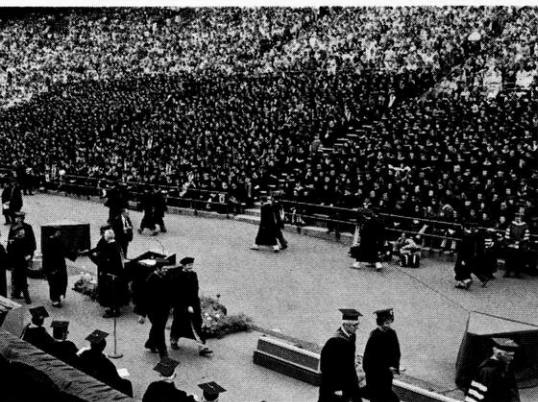
The Student Body

Over 43,000 students populate the 900-acre UW campus, including more than 9,500 graduate students in numerous fields.

Although a UW Board of Regents policy limits undergraduate enrollment from outside the state to 25 percent, the University still maintains one of the nation's most diverse student bodies.

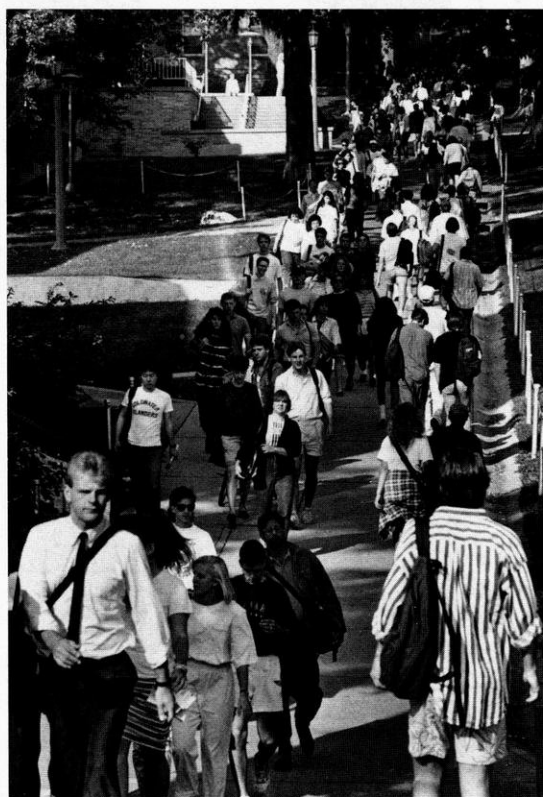
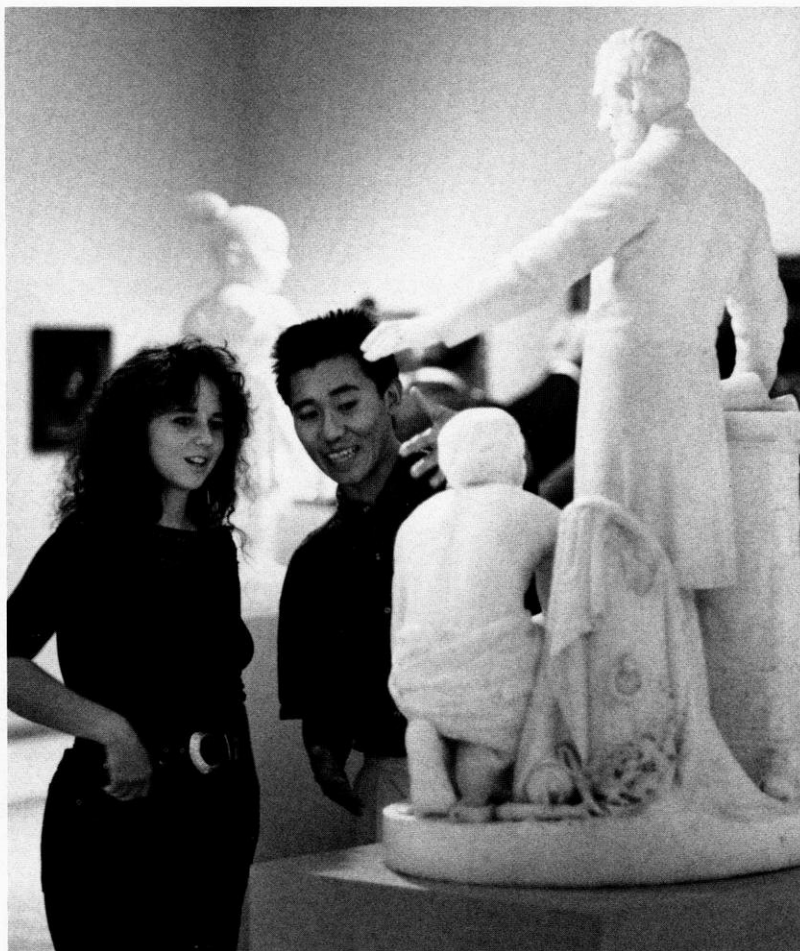
Students hail from every county in the state and every state in the nation, as well as from approximately 125 foreign countries. UW-Madison ranks fourth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment.

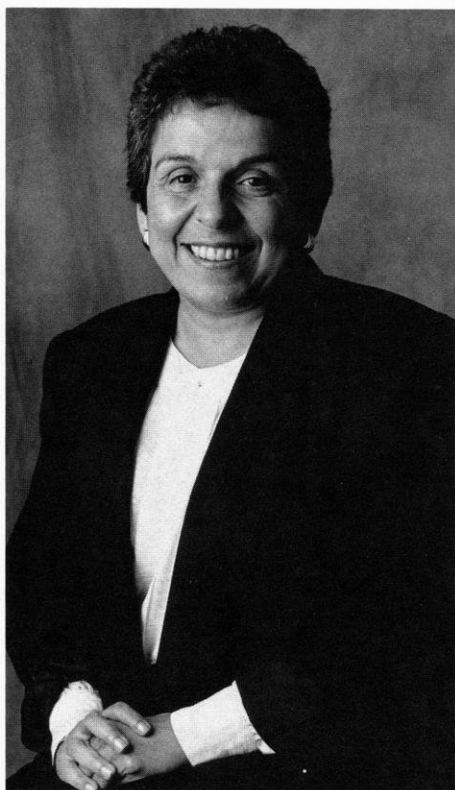
A greater effort is also being made to recruit and retain minority students. In 1990, African-Americans, Hispanics, Native Americans and other minority



groups accounted for 6.86 percent of the student body, an increase from 5 percent ten years ago.

The University's diversity is also evident in the more than 500 student groups. Organizations ranging from political action groups and student newspapers to recreational clubs, fraternities and sororities allow students to extend their collegiate life beyond the classroom. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.





The Chancellor

Dr. Donna E. Shalala is the first woman to ever lead the UW-Madison. She assumed her position as Chancellor and Professor of Political Science and Educational Policy Studies in January 1988.

One of Shalala's major goals has been rededicating the institution to the "Wisconsin Idea"—confirming a commitment to public service and social welfare, as well as an awareness that the borders of the University extend to the borders of the state and beyond.

Dedication to public service has been a trademark of Shalala's career. She spent two years in the Peace Corps, teaching English and working in community development. While a professor at Columbia University, Shalala served as a Director and Treasurer of the Municipal Assistance Corporation for the City of New York, the agency set up to help solve New York City's fiscal crisis.

Shalala earned her bachelor's degree from Western College for Women in Oxford, Ohio, in 1962, and her doctoral degree from Syracuse University in 1970. She has received 14 honorary degrees, and has been elected to the National Academy of Education and National Academy of Public Administration.

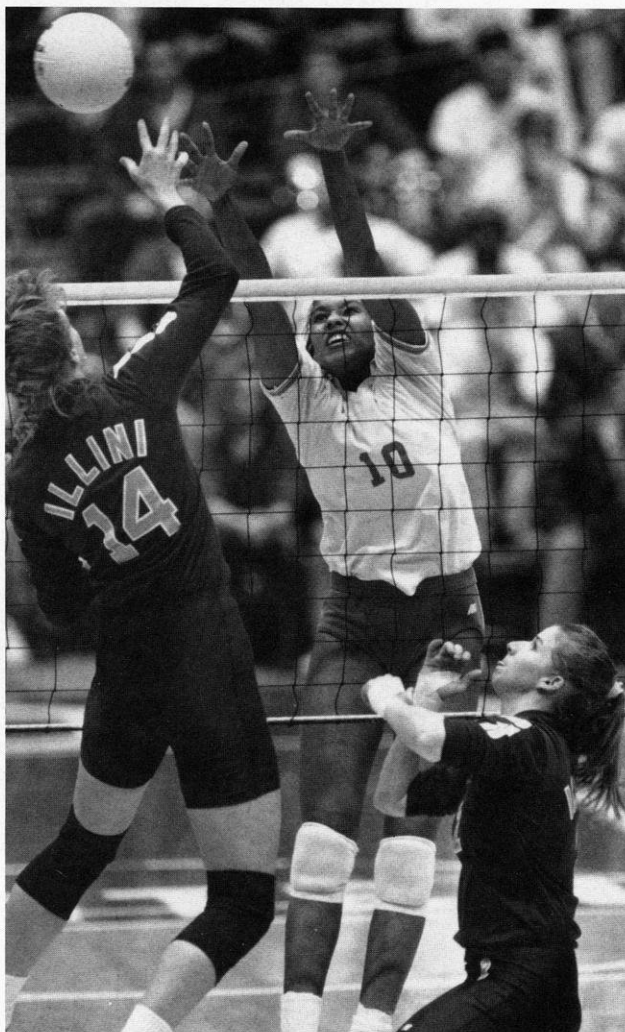
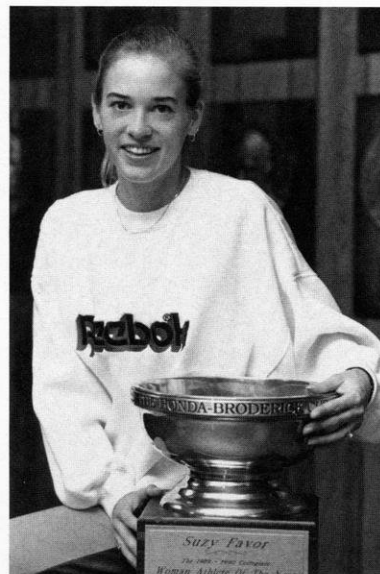
Athletics at the UW

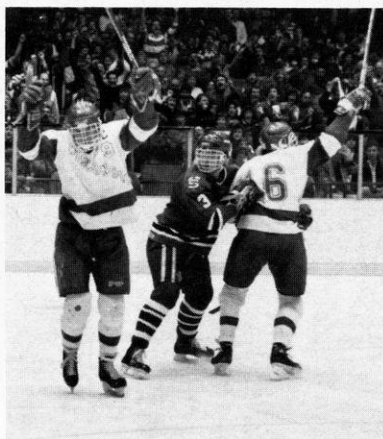
The University of Wisconsin-Madison offers its students one of the most diversified and complete intercollegiate athletic programs in the country.

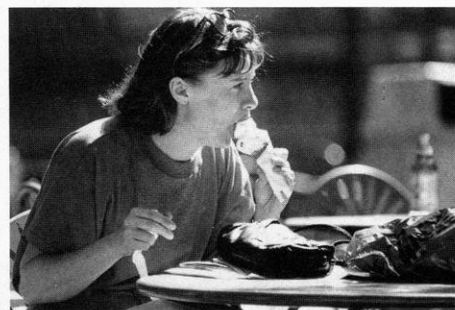
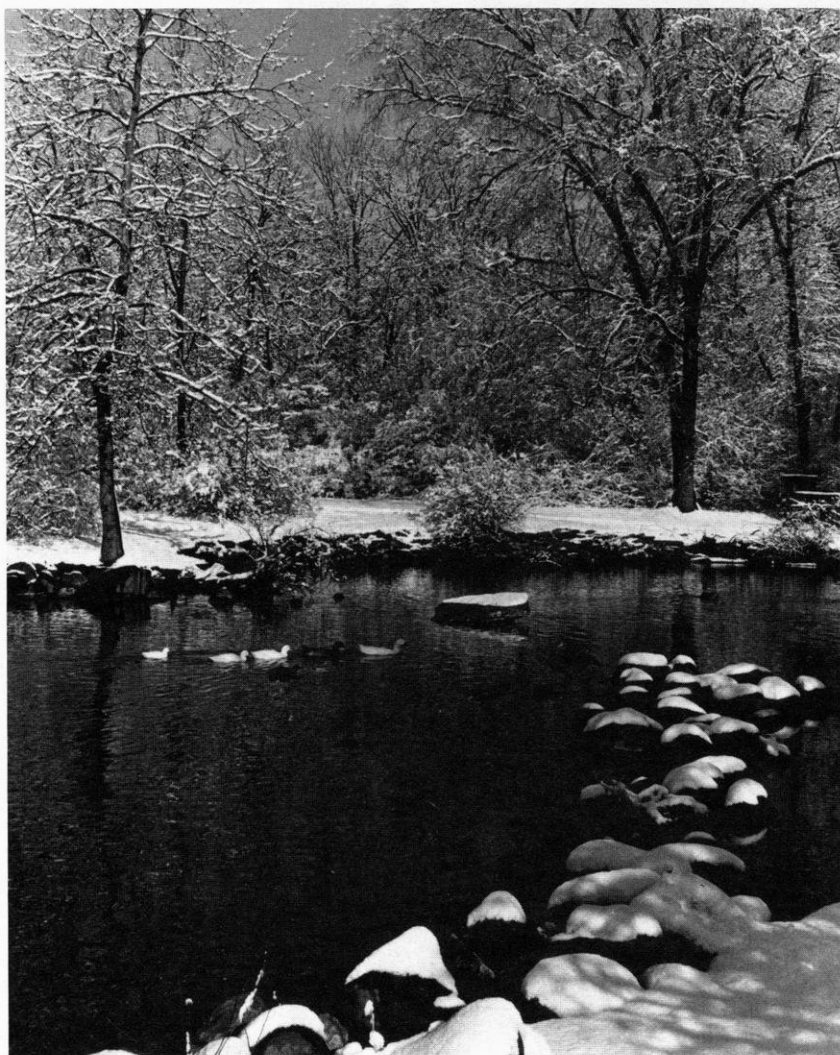

The Community

Madison is the home of the University of Wisconsin and the state capital, and is also considered one of the Midwest's most vibrant communities.

With a diverse population of 191,000, the Madison community offers an endearing quality of life for full-time residents and students. It offers the "big city" spheres of politics, arts and entertainment, as well as the attributes of a small town. It is a family-, action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, the arts, sports, and recreational activities.

The May 1989 issue of *Outside* magazine rated Madison as one of the top 15 "great sports towns" in the country, based on quantity and quality of outdoor activities, the surrounding environment, and the participation of its population in various sports and recreation.



Where Wisconsin Ranks

Since 1910, the University of Wisconsin has ranked on the top ten lists in every objective national faculty reputational survey. The quality of Wisconsin's undergraduate, graduate and research programs is recognized worldwide.

One recent survey rated 49 undergraduate programs at the UW-Madison among the top ten in the nation. The university has also ranked third for the last several years in research funding among the nation's universities.

In data taken from the 1983 *Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States*, Wisconsin tied for eighth in reputation for scholarly quality and second on the basis of faculty publications.

Academic, financial, and other rankings are summarized below to offer a flavor of the quality at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

Funding

■ **Federal Grants:** UW-Madison ranked 13th nationally in 1988, receiving 1.7% of the federal budget for university research.

■ **Research and Development Funds:** UW-Madison ranked fifth in the country for research and development expenditures in 1989, with almost \$286 million, according to the National Science Foundation.

■ **Tuition:** Over the last ten years, tuition for resident undergraduates at the UW-Madison has been consistently lower than the average for public Big Ten schools. The UW-Madison has the second-lowest resident undergraduate tuition, behind the University of Iowa, and the third-lowest nonresident undergraduate tuition of the public Big Ten institutions.

■ **Voluntary Support:** UW-Madison ranked eighth in the nation, and first among public institutions in 1988-89 by receiving \$102 million in private support.

■ **Wisconsin Money Appropriated for Higher Education:** Wisconsin ranked 21st in 1988-89 in the amount of state tax support appropriated for higher education per state resident.



Research and Programs

■ **Research Activity Index:** In 1986, the UW-Madison ranked second in a new multidimensional study that evaluated research activity at U.S. universities.

■ **Doctoral Degrees:** Between the school's founding and 1990, the University of Wisconsin-Madison awarded 27,584 Ph.D.s. Few institutions in the world can match this record.

Departmental Academic Rankings

■ **Business:** The School of Business ranks fifth in the nation in research productivity. The faculty's scholarly output ranks first among business schools at public institutions.

■ **Education:** The School of Education is the nation's best according to a survey by the University of Illinois released in 1990. The UW's educational administration and educational policy studies rank second.

■ **Forestry:** In 1986, the UW's forestry department was named top research department in the country by the USDA.

■ Journalism and Mass

Communication: The faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication was rated first in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by *Journalism Quarterly*.

■ **Plant Pathology:** In 1986, the UW's Plant Pathology department tied for a first place ranking with the University of California-Davis.

■ **Libraries:** The UW-Madison has the 13th largest university library system in the United States, with 5 million books in 28 locations across campus.

■ **Graduates:** According to a 1987 *Wall Street Journal* survey, UW-Madison produced the third highest percentage of CEOs at Fortune 500 industrial companies and at 350 Fortune 500 service companies.

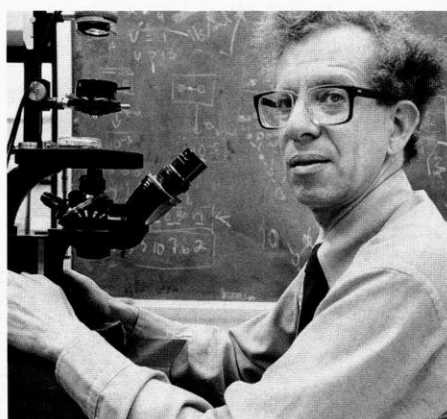

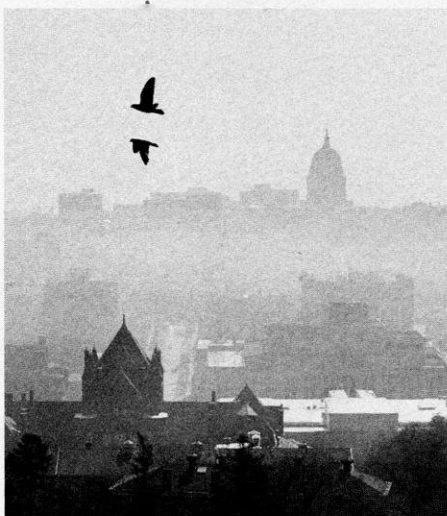

UW-Madison Sets the Pace

□ with the oldest Scandinavian studies (1875), psychology (1888), agricultural economics (1909) and genetics (1910) departments in the United States □ in discovering Vitamins A and B □ with the oldest radio station in the nation—WHA—which began broadcasting in 1917 □ by establishing the country's first graduate program in public utilities, within the School of Business (1929) □ with the development of Moh's Micrographic Surgery Technique, a process named for UW Medical School emeritus professor of surgery Dr. Frederick Mohs to remove external cancers, such as mouth, lip and skin cancer □ as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer in 1933 □ in finding in 1937 that niacin supplementation prevents pellagra, a deadly disease that killed 5,000 people a year □ with the nation's first department of wildlife management in 1939 □ in the synthesizing of genes. □ with the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space □ in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the age-old compound area during brain surgery on a human □ in developing tests for phenylketonuria (PKU), a congenital disease of children □ as UW-Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of a common cold virus □ in developing new techniques to measure bone tissue loss, known as osteoporosis □ with the Biotron, a research building that can control environmental conditions for experimental purposes □ with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. is done at UW Hospital. Today, more than 10,000 transplants are performed yearly, giving new hope to patients with leukemia and immune deficiency diseases □ in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharine and cyclamates □ in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously □ as UW Hospital and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories □ with the first and only medical physics department in the nation to exist within a

medical school □ with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university □ in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers.



UW Traditions

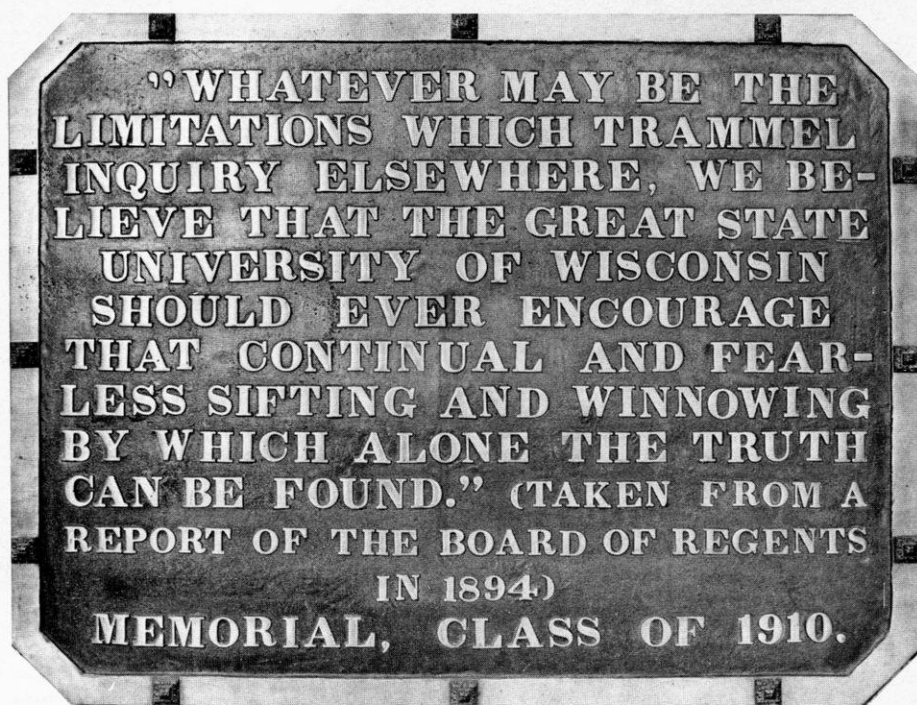


Bucky Badger

Although badgers in various forms had been the UW-Madison mascot for decades, the version that is currently known as "Bucky" was first drawn in 1940 by professional illustrator Art Evans. In 1949, a pep rally contest was held to determine the best name for Madison's mascot. The name Buckingham U. Badger arose at the drawing and credit was given to a randomly selected sorority. The name is said by some to have originated in a line from "On Wisconsin" that exhorts the UW football team to "buck right through that line."

Band Caps

When one of the Badger teams wins a game, the members of the band turn their hats around and wear them backwards. According to UW Band Director Michael Leckrone, the practice started in the 1920s to symbolize the band looking back at their victory in the days when they marched out with the departing crowd.



Graduating Law Students

At Homecoming, graduating law students march down the football field and throw their white canes over the crossbar of the goal post. If they catch the cane when it comes down on the other side, they are supposed to win their first case. If the cane is dropped, the case will be lost. The custom originated at Harvard and came to the UW-Madison in 1910.

Halloween

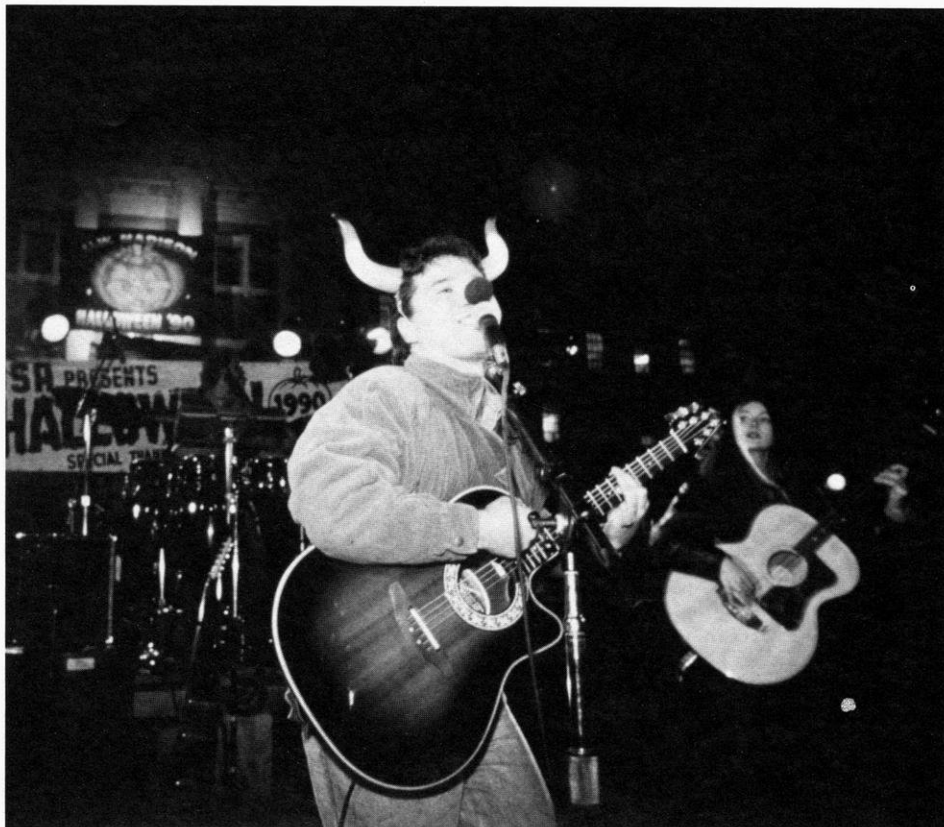
In 1979, the Wisconsin Student Association began sponsoring what for years had been a spontaneous event—the annual Halloween State Street costume party. The party grew in size and fame each year as costumed revelers filled the eight blocks between the Capitol and the Mall. In 1988, WSA sponsored its first non-alcoholic indoor party at the fieldhouse.



Abraham Lincoln Statue

Unveiled in 1909 as a gift of the sculptor Adolph Weinman, the statue is the only replica of one he had previously erected in Hodgenville, Kentucky—Lincoln's birthplace. However, the inscription attributes the gift to Madisonian Thomas Brittingham, who had paid for the casting of the statue and its pedestal.

Lincoln is considered a patron of the



university because he signed the Morrill Act in 1862 that provided federal aid to land-grant colleges such as UW-Madison. Tradition holds that Lincoln stands up when a virtuous coed passes by.

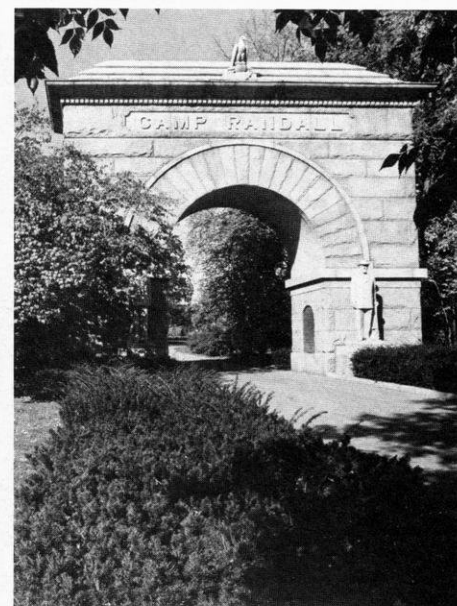
"On, Wisconsin"

The tune was composed in 1909 by William Purdy of Chicago, with words written by UW alumnus Carl Beck, who rewrote them in 1951. The song was an instant hit at the UW-Madison campus and soon spread throughout the world, being very popular with military bands. Some 2,500 schools and colleges have adopted the music and changed the words to suit their needs. The copyright to "On Wisconsin" is currently owned by Michael Jackson, who purchased the music a few years ago from former Beatle Paul McCartney.

"Varsity"

The traditional arm-waving at the end of the song "Varsity" was the 1934 brainchild of then-UW band leader Ray Dvorak. He came up with the idea after witnessing University of Pennsylvania students wave their caps after losing a game. Dvorak later instructed UW students to wave as a salute to UW President Glenn Frank.

Historic Buildings at the UW



Camp Randall

During the Civil War, Camp Randall was used as both a training ground, the state's largest Army staging point, and a

hospital and stockade for confederate prisoners. Today it is owned by the university and is the home of intercollegiate athletic and recreational facilities, a small park, and the Memorial Arch, completed in 1912.

Bascom Hall

Bascom Hall was constructed in stages to become the large building it is today. Bascom was originally called University Hall and later Main Hall. In 1920 it was renamed for John Bascom, president from 1874 to 1887. The architecture is of the classic Italian High Renaissance (Federal classic), Wren-modified. The building's original ornate dome was destroyed by fire in 1916. Bascom Hall houses the UW-Madison's main administrative offices including the Chancellor's office, Dean of Students office and Graduate School. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places as part of the Bascom Hill Historic District.



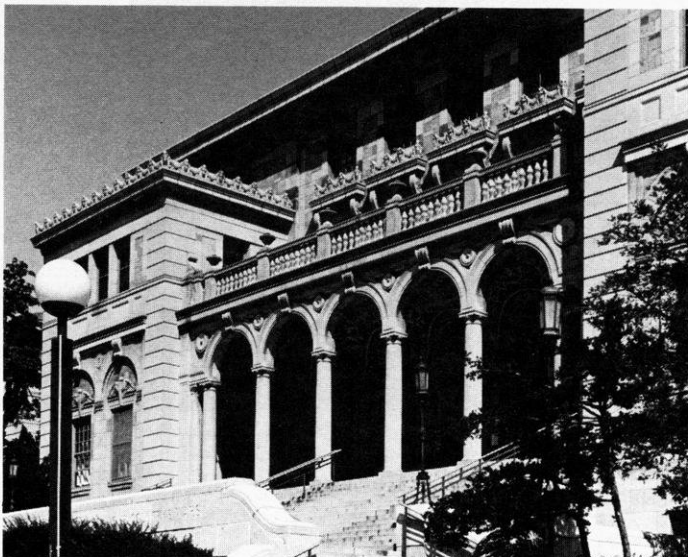
Memorial Library

Dedicated to those who died in our nation's wars, Memorial Library is the main research library. Along with the catalog for the holdings for campus libraries, Memorial houses the Mills Music Library, the official archives of the university, and an extensive rare books collection.



Memorial Union

Memorial Union has been called the "living room of the campus." With additions added steadily over the last half century, the Union now includes several dining rooms, theaters, study halls and game rooms, as well as the lakeside terrace. In 1933, Memorial Union became the first public university union in the country to sell beer.



North and South Halls

North Hall was the first building erected by the University (1851), serving as a dormitory for male students. Later it was converted into a classroom and office space. In 1966, North Hall became a National Historic Landmark. It now houses the political science department.

South Hall has had a wide variety of uses, including housing the old Department of Agriculture and the Hygienic Laboratory. Now it houses the dean and administrative staff of the College of Letters and Science.

Red Gym

Built in the Norman style in 1894, with Romanesque arches and heavy turrets, the Red Gym was originally intended as an armory and a gymnasium for men's physical education. A fire during the Vietnam protest era closed the gym for a few months in 1970. The building was included in the Bascom Hill Historic District in 1974. The report of a campus committee studying renovation in 1989 called the gym "a gateway building to the campus because of its central location and its historic architecture—a friendly and welcoming place for visitors, prospective students and their parents, and primarily undergraduates from all our academic schools and colleges."

Van Hise Hall

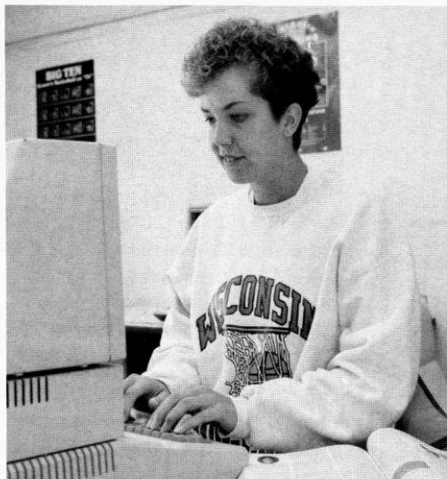
Built in 1967, at 19 stories, Van Hise is the tallest building on campus. The 17th floor houses the administration of the University of Wisconsin System. Van Hise Hall is to the UW System what Bascom Hall is to UW-Madison. Several foreign language departments make their homes here, and classrooms are located in the lower five floors.

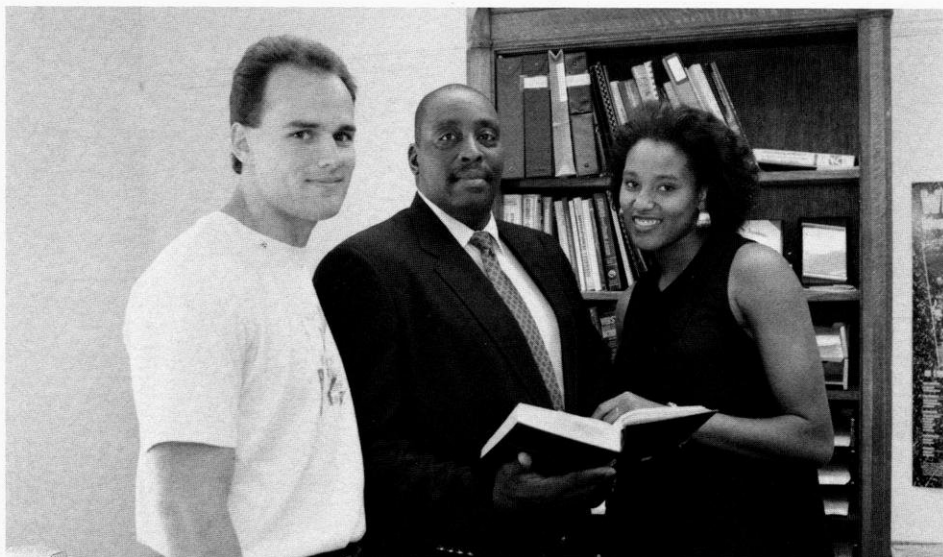

Scholarships

UW-Madison is proud to offer to its prospective student-athletes one of the most comprehensive athletic scholarship programs in the nation. As a Division I member of the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA), scholarships are awarded to athletes on a one-year basis, renewable yearly if scholastic and athletic commitment are maintained.

Full and partial scholarships are available in all varsity sports with the exception of rowing, which does not grant scholarships. 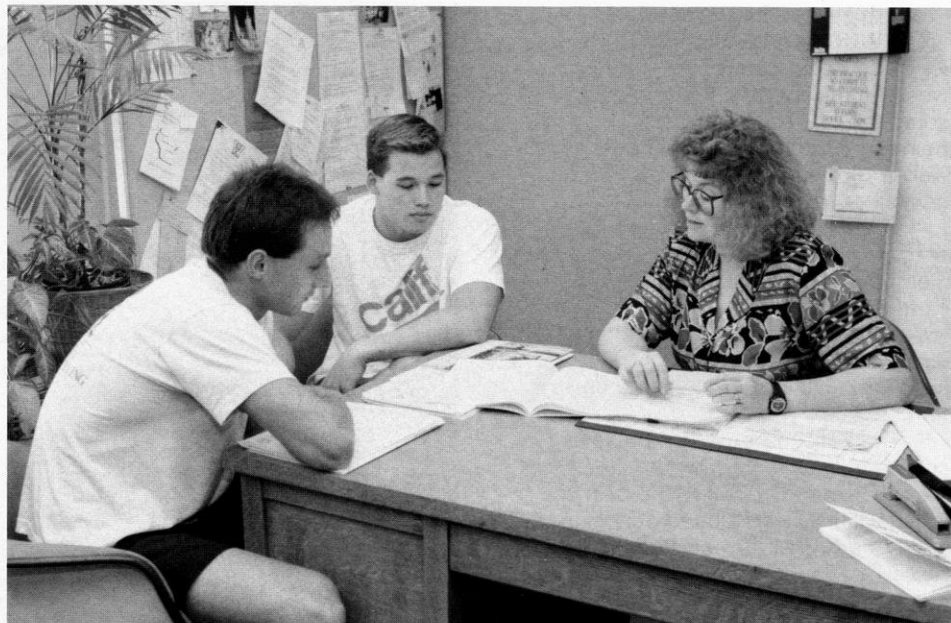

Student Affairs / Grant-In-Aid

Academic excellence is emphasized at Wisconsin. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the student-athletes.

Four full-time staff members, Associate Athletic Director Jan Wheaton and counselors Alan Zussman, Ed Pollard and Mary Weaver, conduct the Wisconsin Student Affairs program offered to the nearly 800 UW athletes. The advising staff has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments.

Wisconsin Sports Facilities

Athletes at the University of Wisconsin benefit from some of the finest sports facilities found anywhere in the country. From practice and competitive areas to athletic and weight training, Wisconsin offers modern and well-equipped facilities for its women athletes.

The basketball and volleyball teams practice and compete in the Wisconsin Fieldhouse, which seats 12,204. The Fieldhouse features four remodeled locker rooms and a modern athletic training area. Other recent additions include a new lighting system and new sound system.

The Wisconsin tennis teams have a competitive advantage in their ability to play year-round at one of the best college facilities in the United States. In 1984, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium was ranked by the USTA as the number one indoor tennis facility. It seats 1,500 spectators and is valued at over \$8 million. It features 18 tennis courts (12 indoor and six outdoor), five squash courts, and one squash doubles court. The stadium, located close to the lakeshore dormitories, is named for Arthur C. Nielsen, founder of the Nielsen television rating system. Nielsen captained the Wisconsin men's tennis team from 1916 to 1918 while a student in electrical engineering.

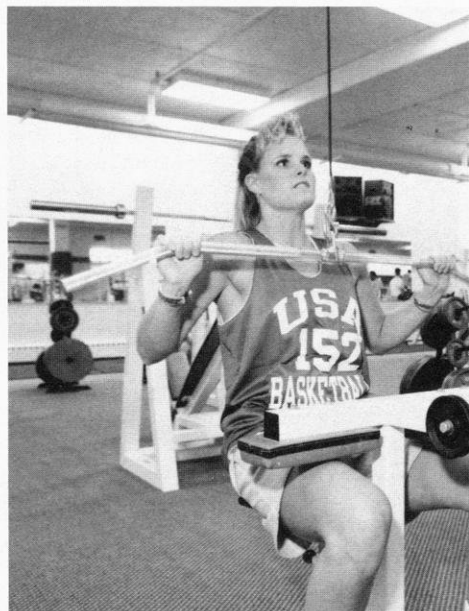
Wisconsin's track teams benefit from practicing and competing during the indoor season in the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. Located next to Camp Randall Football Stadium, the "Shell" contains a 220-yard Mondo rubber track, throwing and jumping areas in the infield, and a seating capacity of 2,500.

During the outdoor season, Wisconsin track and cross country athletes will be able to use the 400-meter, Mondo rubber outdoor track, located on the west side of campus, once construction is completed in 1993. The Dan McClimon Memorial Track, dedicated in honor of the former Wisconsin head men's track and cross country coach, was the site of the 1986 Men's and Women's Big Ten Outdoor Track Championships. Planning and fund-raising are underway for the next phase of construction: the addition of permanent spectator seating with press box and locker room facilities.

The swimming and diving teams have the luxury of two pools for practice and competition—the Natatorium adjacent to Unit II, and the new Unit III facility, or SERF. The "Nat" contains an eight-lane, 25-yard racing pool equipped with an automatic Colorado Timing System and digital readout score board. The 50' x 40' separate diving well is fitted with three one-meter and two three-meter

Dura (Maxi) Flex boards. The recently completed SERF facility features an indoor long course pool with movable bulkheads that more than double the program's training space.

Outdoor facilities at Wisconsin include soccer fields near the University Hospital. The crew boat house, situated on Lake Mendota, provides the Badger crews with a modern facility, including an indoor rowing tank for year-round practice. Construction was recently com-

pleted on an additional shell storage area, and other construction plans include a second indoor rowing tank and additional locker room space.

Our teams also have access to several other facilities on campus. The McClain Athletic Facility offers an indoor practice facility for football, soccer and track, as well as lockers for both the men's and women's track teams. The Natatorium and SERF feature numerous multipurpose gyms, weight rooms, run-

ning tracks, and other athletic facilities for practice and competition.

Other facilities that are an integral part of the athletic program are the co-educational weight training and sports medicine rooms in Camp Randall Stadium. The modern weight training area features Nautilus equipment, free weights, and stereo music in a spacious, carpeted room. Two full-time weight training instructors monitor and advise all Wisconsin student-athletes.

The care, prevention, and treatment of injuries to Wisconsin athletes is supervised by a six-person staff of N.A.T.A.-certified athletic trainers. They are supported by a staff of 25 student trainers and two certified graduate assistants as they care for the nearly 900 men and women athletes at Wisconsin.

The staff may use training rooms in the Stadium, Coliseum, Natatorium, and UW Fieldhouse. All training areas are equipped with the finest therapeutic modalities and rehabilitative apparatus. Other medical specialists assigned to intercollegiate athletics also assist in the diagnosis and treatment of the athletes.

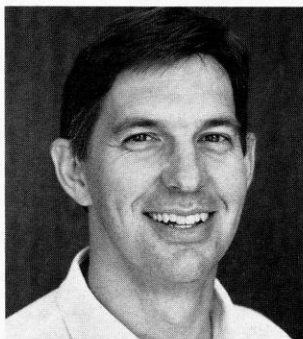

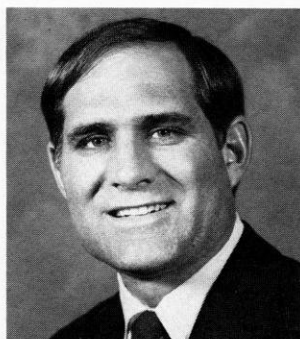

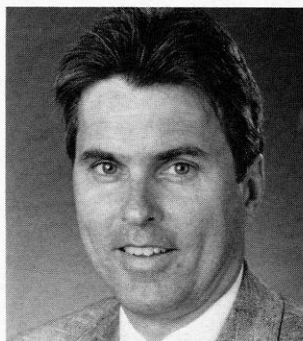
