



The University of Wisconsin, founded in 1848, has been recognized as one of the nation's leading institutions of higher learning, with many departments ranked among the nation's top 10.

Nobel Prize-winning research, a liberal tradition of shared governance and a diverse student body have given UW-Madison a worldwide reputation. Wisconsin has ranked among the top universities in the United States in every scholarly pursuit since 1910.

Where else in the world can you find one of the finest textile collections in the country, a nuclear reactor, more than 40 libraries and 5.4 million books, a 500-bed hospital, and a 1,276-acre arboretum all on one campus?

POLITICAL ATMOSPHERE

Because of its roots in Wisconsin

legislation, UW-Madison has always maintained close links with the state. With the passage of a federal act in 1862, it became one of the nation's first land grant colleges, establishing a tradition of research in agriculture and the life sciences.

PHYSICAL SETTING

UW-Madison is considered one of the most beautiful college campuses in the country, lying along the shores of Lake Mendota. There are five lakes in the Madison area, two of which — Mendota and Monona — form an isthmus on which the State Capitol building sits.

STUDENT BODY

From an initial enrollment of 17 the student population has grown to more than 40,000, making it the fifth largest among public four-year institutions. Although almost 80

percent of the students come from Wisconsin, Madison's isthmus is truly an international community. Students come from more than 115 countries, and the UW ranks fifth in the nation for total foreign student enrollment (over 3,000).

FACULTY

The UW-Madison faculty routinely wins national citations for teaching excellence, research and service. Much of the university's international reputation comes from the quality of its faculty. In fact, UW faculty and alumni have accounted for 12 Nobel and 17 Pulitzer Prizes.

One of the nation's leading institutions for higher learning, the UW Madison includes 11 schools, 133 academic departments, 17,340 employees and a \$1.2 billion budget. Majors are offered in 156 bachelors, 184 master and 125 doctoral programs.

MADISON

Madison (population 196,053) is home to both the University of Wisconsin and the state capital. The city was designed so that the university and state would be linked, signifying the interrelated nature of academics and politics.

One of the Midwest's most vibrant communities, Madison offers an endearing quality of life to both its residents and students.

The centerpiece of the city is the State Capitol. The campus is west of the Capitol and offers easy access to shopping malls, restaurants for every taste and popular night spots.


With a diverse population of nearly 200,000, Madison offers the unique combination of big-city excitement and small-town charm. Madison is an action-oriented community that promotes participation in government, education, sports, arts and recreation.

Madison was listed as the second most livable city in the United States in a 1993 *Money Magazine* survey.

Besides the UW Athletic Department, the city offers a large quantity and high quality of sports activities. *Outside* magazine ranked Madison as one of the top 15 sports towns in the nation several years ago.

Madison is surprisingly cosmopolitan for a midwestern city and an educational capital for students from Wisconsin, every other state and over 125 countries.

The city boasts numerous ethnic restaurants among its many fine eateries. A diverse and thriving local arts community complements the cultural programs and opportunities offered by the University and the Wisconsin (student) Union.





UW-MADISON

SETTING THE PACE

- in discovering Vitamins A and B
- in finding in 1937 that niacin supplementation prevents pellagra, a deadly disease that killed 5,000 people a year
- in the synthesizing of genes. Biochemistry professor Har Gobind Khorana synthesized the first gene, for which he later received the Nobel Prize in 1968
- in finding which wavelength of ultraviolet light produces skin cancer
- in discovering the anti-cancer drug, fluorouracil
- as the Memorial Union became the first public university union to serve beer in 1933
- as Elizabeth and James Miller, UW Medical School professor of oncology and professor emeritus of oncology, were the first to identify characteristics among chemicals that cause cancer
- with the Orbiting Astronomical Observatory, the world's first true observatory in space
- in revolutionizing brain surgery, as Dr. Manucher Javid, UW Medical School professor of surgery, became the first neurosurgeon to use a solution from the age-old compound area during brain surgery on a human
- in developing tests for phenylketonuria (PKU), a congenital disease of children
- as UW-Madison researchers describe the atomic structure of the common cold virus
- in developing new techniques to measure bone tissue loss, known as osteoporosis





- with bone marrow transplants. Using techniques developed at UW-Madison, the first bone marrow transplant in the U.S. was done at UW Hospital. Today more than 10,000 transplants are performed yearly, giving new hope to patients with leukemia and immune deficiency diseases
- in finding evidence linking cancer in laboratory animals with saccharine and cyclamates
- in finding that the anti-estrogen drug tamoxifen can prevent breast cancer from recurring in certain women who have had cancer previously
- as UW Hospitals and Clinics develop the nation's first Mobile Critical Care Unit, which duplicates facilities of a hospital intensive care unit and laboratories
- with the first and only medical physics department in the nation to exist within a medical school
- with the establishment of the Center for Dairy Research, the nation's first such center to be established at a university
- in organ preservation breakthroughs. In 1987, Dr. Folkert Belzer used a cold storage preservation solution to preserve dog livers up to 36 hours and dog pancreases up to 72 hours. Clinical use of this new solution decreases the need for emergency transplantation, increases the number of livers and pancreases available to people who need transplants, and improves organ sharing among transplant centers
- with the late Dr. Howard M. Temin of McArdle Laboratory and his coworker discovering reverse transcriptase (Independently discovered by Dr. David Baltimore). This enzyme explains how retro-viruses cause cancer and AIDS. Temin's work in this field led to his selection as a co-recipient of the 1975 Nobel Prize in Medicine




Situated among gentle rolling hills and wooded areas between Lakes Mendota and Monona is the 900-acre University of Wisconsin campus. Located in the state's capital city, Madison, the UW campus is one of the nation's most picturesque.

Filmmakers have selected the campus as the location for films about college life; one was the 1986 summer hit *Back to School* with Rodney Dangerfield.

In the fall of 1993, MTV included UW-Madison as one of four campuses to feature during its "Guide to Higher Education" tour.

There are many famous landmarks on campus, including tree-lined Bascom Hill, North Hall (the first building on campus), Van Hise Hall (the tallest building on campus) and Picnic Point (a 129-acre peninsula used by joggers, walkers and bikers). One of the best loved and most visited areas of the campus is Memorial Union Terrace, where students sit and study or socialize against a backdrop of sailboats, sailboards and swimmers enjoying Lake Mendota.

Wisconsin students include some of the nation's foremost scholastic achievers. The diversification of the student body and the UW make a truly special educational experience.

CAMPUS LIFE



Any student can participate in sports and fitness programs through the Division of Recreational Sports. Five facilities plus 63 acres of playing fields are located right on campus. Intramural sports provide structured opportunities in team, dual, and individual sports. Club sports are also available for more intense participation including practice, coaching and competition.

With 27 clubs to choose from, Recreational Sports draws together almost a thousand athletes on campus.

Students interested in social, cultural and volunteer organizations can take great advantage of the Wisconsin Union, Memorial Union on Lake Mendota and Union South near the Engineering campus and Camp Randall provide activities and meeting rooms for students, faculty, staff and guests. Every student is automatically a member of the Wisconsin Union, which also provides restaurants, retail stores and other services.

The Union offers a wide array of activities including free films, lectures, art exhibits, theater and live music events, bowling, billiards, table tennis and video games, seven Hoofer outdoor recreation clubs and short non-credit minicourses.

Students interested in the arts can volunteer with the Wisconsin Union Directorate (WUD) the group of students who develop events at the Union. Students on the WUD Committees expand on their class room experience with hands on experience selecting and installing exhibitions as well as producing performance art, film and music events.



ACADEMICS

DEPARTMENT RANKINGS

- The School of Education is ranked No. 1 in the nation according to a study conducted at the University of Illinois in 1990. In departmental rankings, Wisconsin placed second in educational administration and policy studies.
- *U.S. News & World Report's* annual graduate school rankings, published in 1993, ranked UW-Madison in the top 12 of six science programs. The rankings were: computer science (tied for eighth), biology (tied for ninth), chemistry (10th), nursing (tied for 11th), health services administration (tied for 12th) and engineering (12th). Additionally, the magazine rated the UW's sociology department No. 1 in the nation.

- The School of Business' MBA program ranks in the top five percent among all schools in a 1993 *U.S. News & World Report* survey. The school's real estate program ranks third and the risk management program ranks fourth, the publication added.


- Scholarly output by the marketing faculty ranks first in the nation according to a 1988 study in *Review of Business and Economic Research*. Faculty at the School of Journalism and Mass Communication were ranked No. 1 in the nation in research productivity in 1988 by *Journalism Quarterly*.

- UW Hospitals and Clinics is among the leading transplant centers in the nation. In 1993, *U.S. News and World Report* ranked the hospital among the top three percent in the U.S.

- The plant pathology department tied for first with the University of Cal-Davis in a 1986 study by the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences.

- The forestry department was the top research department in the country in 1986, according to the *Department of Agriculture*.

In the most extensive study on graduate level education of its kind, the Assessment of Research-Doctorate Programs in the United States rated Wisconsin tied for eighth (with UCLA and Michigan) for its academic quality. The other schools in the Top 10 were Cal, Stanford, Harvard, Yale, M.I.T., Princeton and Chicago.



With its admittance to the Association of American Universities (AAU), the UW-Madison has been recognized for its solid reputation in the academic world. Indeed, only 56 schools nationally are in the AAU.

Balancing the academic requirements of an outstanding institution with the demands of collegiate athletic competition is difficult. However the University of Wisconsin has attacked the challenge and succeeded.

Inclusion in the Association of American Universities, a Rose Bowl championship in 1994 and seven consecutive appearances in the NCAA hockey tournament proves that academics and athletics do indeed mix at the UW-Madison.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT


The primary objective of the Department of Academic Affairs office is to ensure the academic success of all UW student-athletes. Much of the credit for the impressive academic record behind many Badger athletes is the counseling system available to the student-athletes. Counseling and advising services, plus a number of academic help programs, are offered to all student-athletes at the University.

Four full-time staff conduct the Wisconsin Student Affairs program offered to the nearly 800 UW student-athletes. The advising staff has a comprehensive understanding of academics at Wisconsin, and a permanent line of communication with all University departments. They are available to assist student-athletes in registration and course selection, monitor progress toward degrees, offer career guidance and serve as valuable resource people.

For those athletes who request assistance, counseling sessions are offered on a one-to-one basis at a time appropriate for the athlete. More than 100 tutors are available for student-athlete utilization.

In addition, the department arranges for exam proctoring, offers advice on resume preparation and coordinates the grant-in-aid program. Also, support groups are offered to students who become medically or academically ineligible for competition.

Wisconsin athletes are encouraged to be degree-oriented while allowing for the flexibility to explore different areas. The counseling staff takes a personal approach to each athlete in determining his or her individual needs, whether needs be personal or academic.





CONDITIONING

The Wisconsin strength and conditioning program is a sophisticated blend of science, technology and one-on-one attention to each athlete. Throughout the year, UW athletes spend more time working on strength and conditioning than any other aspect of their game.


During the off-season, athletes work on strength improvement, speed, power, agility and conditioning. The in-season program is devoted to continuation of strength gains and performance-related conditioning.

Each year when freshman players arrive, baseline measures of strength, speed, power, agility, flexibility and endurance are collected. Measures of body com-

position, weight and frame-size are also recorded. With this information, goals are set for development and maintenance. Individual computerized programs are established for each player by hockey strength and conditioning coach Stieg Theander.

The UW also offers a sports nutrition program. The program assists athletes in meeting their nutritional demands and body composition goals. A big part of the nutrition program is the UW's Sports Buffet program and the development.

Badger athletes also benefit from speed conditioning workouts designed by former track all-American Robert Hackett.



The Wisconsin Sports Medicine program features state-of-the-art facilities and the outstanding services of leading sports medicine and health care professionals.

Headquartered in the McClain Center, the department also maintains facilities at Camp Randall Stadium, the Nielsen Tennis Stadium and the Dane County Coliseum.


Combined, the athletic training staff brings over 50 years of experience in providing health care to intercollegiate athletes. Olympic Games, World Championships, Olympic Festivals and extensive foreign travel highlight the varied and unique backgrounds and experiences the staff brings to the University and its student-athletes.

The Sports Medicine program focuses on injury prevention. Staff members utilize Cybex strength-testing devices, provide dietary analyses, measure physiological capacity and outline programs to improve an athlete's flexibility.

The UW is one of a handful of schools with an on-site X-ray machine, enabling physicians to quickly and thoroughly evaluate injuries and prescribe treatment and rehabilitation.

Athletic trainers and physicians work together to design rehabilitation programs for injured athletes. A wide variety of facilities and equipment, including a rehabilitation swimming pool, Cybex equipment, the Impulse Inertial Exercise System, Stairmasters, and Fitron Bicycles, help athletes rehabilitate injuries and minimize the loss of general fitness during recuperative time.

Dennis Helwig, a 1974 UW graduate, coordinates the Sports Medicine Program. He is assisted by five athletic trainers, one physical therapist, three graduate assistant trainers and 30 student trainers. Team physician coverage is provided by Dr. Ben Graf and Dr. Greg Landry of the UW Hospitals and Clinics and Dr. John Orwin and Dr. Dave Bernhardt.




THE BOB JOHNSON HOCKEY FACILITY

Wisconsin hockey undergoes a pleasant change starting in the 1994-95 season. With the opening of the Bob Johnson Hockey Facility (named after the late Badger coach), Badger hockey will have one of the finest collegiate hockey facilities in the country.

Located on the south end of the Dane County Coliseum, the Bob Johnson Hockey Facility features a state-of-the-art locker room, which includes a players' lounge, weight room, training room, rehabilitation pool, whirlpool and sauna.

The spacious locker room is in itself 4500 sq. feet. It consists of 31 individual hockey lockers. The locker room also includes a 35" big screen TV. Adjacent to the locker room are the coaches offices and lockers, the pool room, the weight room and training room. All can be directly accessed from the locker room itself.

Home of the Badgers

The Dane County Coliseum is the site of the 1995 NCAA West Regionals. It is the first time the Coliseum has hosted a hockey tournament of this size. The East Regional will be contested at the Centrum in Worcester, Mass.

The 1995 Selection Day is Sunday, March 19, 1995. It is anticipated that the announcement of the 12-team field will be made at around 8:00 p.m. CT.

One of college hockey's finest facilities, the Dane County Coliseum, has been home ice for the Wisconsin hockey team for 27 years.

With theatre-style seating for 8,644, the Coliseum is the third largest collegiate ice facility in the nation behind Minnesota and Illinois-Chicago. The ice surface is an impressive 200' by 97', making for fast-paced, free-wheeling hockey.

Recognized as the home of the nation's best collegiate hockey fans, the Dane County Coliseum hosted the nation's largest crowds for 24 years straight from 1970-93.

Since 1969, the UW has drawn 4,496,892 fans for 532 home dates (not including exhibitions), an average of 8,453 per game! In addition, Wisconsin has averaged over 170,000 fans per year at the Dane County Coliseum (27 years).

Over the past 24 years, Wisconsin has averaged 98% capacity at the Dane County Coliseum. Since the 1987-88 season, Badger fans have filled the Coliseum to capacity on 81 occasions.

In 1981-82, the Badgers drew 240,095 fans for 28 home games to set the all-time NCAA season record. The 1978-79 average attendance of 8,654 set an NCAA and UW record.

Along with some of the country's best fans, the Badgers have one of the college game's best home ice records. UW hockey teams have a home record of 457-167-24 since 1963, a winning percentage of .724!





- With the expansion of the ice to 200' x 97', the new capacity of the Dane County Coliseum for hockey games will be 8,395.
 - 11 miles of steel tubing were laid down to adequately supply the ice with proper coolant.
 - Coliseum floor took 28 truckloads of concrete or 280 yards of concrete
 - The Arena also underwent a facelift. It will serve as another sheet of ice for UW practices and is identical to the sheet of ice in the Coliseum. It is also 200' x 97'.

THE BRADLEY CENTER

Site of the 1997 NCAA Championships — The 50th Anniversary

The Bradley Center, located on the corner of Fourth and State Streets in Milwaukee, covers more than a city block and is within walking distance of such luxury hotels as the Marc Plaza, the Wyndam and the Hyatt Regency, tournament head quarters for the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown.

With state-of-the-art engineering and technology, the Bradley Center features the integration of classic architectural elements. There are four dramatic entryways leading into the facility, one on each corner of the building. Each entryway is reached through a progression of visually exciting spaces: a tree-lined plaza, leading through an exterior portico into a 28-foot high, glass-enclosed vestibule, which opens onto a stunning 60-foot high, 17,500 square-foot lobby, also totally glass enclosed.

Inside each lobby, double rows of concrete columns with granite bases rise almost 70 feet to support a spectacular skylight system.

Two elevators, 16 escalators and various stairways take spectators to the seating area. Seating is comfortably arranged in an oblong octagon that provides spectators with an unrestricted view of the playing surface and the centrally located, four-sided video scoreboard.

The first level accommodates approximately 8,000 spectators. The second level features private suites that encircle the arena and provide seating for nine to 12 people per suite. The third level seats approximately 10,000 spectators in 21 rows of seats.



The Bradley Center has a total of 12 concession stands; eight of which sell traditional concession food and refreshments. The other four sell hamburgers, french fries, shakes, tacos, pizza pasta and other foods. Each stand is equipped with two to six closed circuit TV monitors.

The Bradley Center is the site of the nation's premier collegiate hockey holiday tournament in the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown. In the five year history of the tournament, over 170,000 fans have witnessed Badger hockey at the Bradley Center. Over 14 teams representing all four collegiate hockey conferences have taken part in the two-day event. Teams from Canada have also been part of the field.

In 1993 the Bradley Center was the site of the NCAA Ice Hockey Championships. It was the most successful Final Four in NCAA history, drawing nearly 53,000 fans (an NCAA record for three sessions). The crowd of 17,704 for the NCAA championship game, set an NCAA hockey single-session record. Because of the remarkable success in 1993, the Bradley Center was awarded the 1997 NCAA Championships, which marks the 50th anniversary of the ice hockey championships.

Accommodations for the disabled

The Bradley Center is an accessible facility with a variety of accommodations for patrons with limited mobility or special requirements. DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Pat Richter, the former Wisconsin all-America gridiron star and the last nine-time letterwinner in school history, continues to work his magic as Director of Athletics at his alma mater.

During a time of budget tightening, presidential reform and gender equity concerns, Richter has built one of the most respected intercollegiate athletic programs in the nation.

Entering his fifth season as Director of Athletics, Richter enjoyed a '93-94 campaign that included many accomplishments. A Rose Bowl victory over UCLA was the Badgers' first appearance in Pasadena since Richter's 1962 squad lost to No. 1 USC. Wisconsin was first nationally in college football attendance increase and finished fifth in the coaches' final poll.

The men's basketball team made its first appearance in the NCAA tournament in 47 years, won 18 games for only the fourth time in school history and advanced to the second round of the national tourney. The hockey team participated in its national championship for the seventh year in a row and 19 of the division's 20 sports have competed in NCAA post-season play during his tenure.

In 1994, Wisconsin finished among the national leaders for the prestigious Directors' Cup, presented by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) for all-around athletic success.

Perhaps most satisfying to Richter, however, was the department's elimination of what was a \$2.1 million deficit in 1990. The Badgers were a huge success at the gate last year by filling their venues for football, basketball and hockey to 98.3 percent of capacity. The entire basketball season was sold out on a season basis for the first time in Wisconsin history.

Named to his position in December of 1989, Richter is in charge of 20 sports, nearly 700 student-athletes,



more than 160 employees and a large physical plant.

AS AN ATHLETE

Richter's affiliation with Badger athletics started as an under-graduate, when he earned three letters in football, basketball and baseball.

Pat earned All-America (1961-62), academic all-America (1962) and all-Big Ten (1961-62) honors as a football end. He led Wisconsin to the 1963 Rose Bowl and set a game record with 11 receptions in one of the best Rose Bowls ever.

Richter led the Big Ten in receiving twice and is still the third-leading receiver in school history. As a senior, Richter won Wisconsin's 1963 Big Ten Medal of Honor (given for proficiency in scholarship and athletics).

Richter earned all-league honors in baseball and led UW in hits, homers and RBI three times. Pat earned his scholarship for basketball, where he played three years.

After earning his B.S. degree from the UW in landscape architecture in 1964, Pat was a first-round draft choice of the NFL's Washington Redskins. He played from 1963-71.

PROFESSIONAL LIFE

Upon retirement from the NFL, he returned to Wisconsin to earn his law degree (1971). After working at a Madison law firm, he worked his way up to Vice President of Personnel at the Oscar Mayer Corporation.

Richter was honored with an NCAA Silver Anniversary Award for post-college achievements in 1988. He is a member of the Wisconsin State Athletic and Madison Sports Halls of Fame, the NFL Player and Alumni Associations and the American Bar Association. Pat was included in the inaugural class of the Athletic Department Hall of Fame in 1991. Last spring, he was a finalist for induction into the CoSIDA Academic All-America Hall of Fame.






PERSONAL LIFE

OUTLOOK



The Badger coaching staff knew that the 1994-95 season would be somewhat of a rebuilding year with the departure of 10 seniors off last year's 26-15-1 squad. Including four of the team's top five scorers.

Those were all expected departures. What wasn't expected were the early departures of two key players and two of the top players in collegiate hockey entering the '94-95 season. Senior center Kelly Fairchild and Junior goaltender Jim Carey opted to give up their remaining eligibility to seek careers in the NHL. Carey signed with the Washington Capitals in September.

With the loss of 12 players from last year's squad, the incoming class is a large one. Seven newcomers, including two transfers, will try and fill the holes. Said Sauer, "I would look for all of our freshman to come in and be able to contribute. We recruited these freshman with the idea that they would be able to make contributions from the start."

Fourteen lettermen return from a squad which earned the school's

seventh consecutive bid to the NCAA tournament and finished third in the WCHA with a 19-12-1 mark.

Off the ice, Head Coach Jeff Sauer, in his 24th year of collegiate coaching, is 11 wins shy of becoming only the seventh coach in history to win 500 games at the college level.

After losing the likes of Blaine Moore (the team's top goal scorer and MVP), Andrew Shier (the top assist man) and Jason Zent (20-goal

scorer) at forward, the Badgers have a lot of point production to replace. Those three alone combined for 58-86-144 and 33% of goals scored in '93-94. When it is all said and done, 109 goals (63%), 196 assists (67%) and 305 points (66%) are gone from the 1994-95 team.

Kelly Fairchild, the team's top scorer last year, was a first-team all-WCHA selection in his junior year and would've been one of college hockey's premier players this season.

Obviously, the forward position will be young (just two seniors and five freshmen), but at the same time experienced with six veteran forwards returning.

"This year is not too different from other years when we have had large graduating classes," said Sauer. "The question always comes up, 'Who is going to fill the holes left from the departing players?'"

"But there always seems to be a player or couple of players who step forward. We definitely have some players who have that potential and ability this year."

OUTLOOK

The scoring pressure falls on the shoulders of veterans Jamie Spencer, Mike Strobel and Max Williams, the top three scoring forwards off the '93-94 team.

Spencer, a senior who was elected as an assistant captain, is a quiet leader for the Badgers and also one of the more underrated players in the WCHA. He scored a personal-best 15 goals last season, despite missing eight games with a foot injury.

Strobel is coming off his most productive season at the UW. He played in 41 games last season and has the ability to be an offensive leader.

Williams proved he had offensive punch last season contributing 13-12-25. The junior winger hasn't missed a game since his freshman season, enjoying a consecutive games played streak of 50 games.

Junior Scott Sanderson saw action in 15 games last year and is expected to see more playing time at center. Other returning letterwinners include juniors Shawn Carter and Troy Howard and sophomores Dan Tompkins and Darren Haley.

Rookies Joe Bianchi, E.J. Bradley, Brad Englehart and Rick Enrico will be expected to make the transition early to the college game. Their ability and ease of adjustment could be essential to a good start for the Badgers. Sophomore Erik Raygor brings one year of college hockey experience with him, transferring from Kent State University.

"I think one of the keys to this season will be not only how our freshman contribute, but how some of the players who have been waiting their turn develop and step up," said Sauer.

"How those players accept that opportunity, how they take charge of the situation and what they do to make sure they are successful will

"Our defensive game should be our strength this season. With the amount of experience and the veterans we have returning on the blueline, and with Kirk Daubenspeck in goal, we look to again be one of the better defensive teams in the league," said Sauer.

The Badgers return the strongest and deepest unit in the league. Five of the top six blueliners are back from the '93-94 team that allowed the fewest goals in the WCHA (103/3.22 avg.) and recorded an impressive 83.1% stoppage rate on the penalty-kill.

Leadership and a wealth of experience will be key as seniors Mark Strobel, Maco Balkovec, Brian Rafalski and Chris Tok have over 450 games of experience under their belts and missed just ten games between them last year.

Rafalski (6-17-23), and Strobel (7-12-19) are coming off their most offensively productive seasons at Wisconsin. Rafalski is the top-scoring returning defenseman and Strobel shared the team's top spot for most goals by a defenseman during 1993-94.

Junior Mickey Elick, the team's most improved player last year, has the longest consecutive games streak on the team at 72 games.

OUTLOOK

Elick scored 7-12-19 last season to share the lead among UW defensemen in goals scored (with Strobel).

Redshirt freshman Matt Peterson and junior Tim Krug add depth. Krug earned some experience last year, playing in five games.

Freshman Craig Anderson and sophomore transfer Steve Sabo round out the defensive group. Sabo comes to Wisconsin from Kent State University, a teammate of Raygor. Sabo is a brother of former Badger hockey player Scott Sabo (1980-84).

With the loss of Junior Jim Carey to the NHL, the Badgers' goal-tending hopes rest on the shoulders of sophomore Kirk Daubenspeck.

Daubenspeck was solid in his freshman campaign, recording a 4.07 goals-against average and an .880 save percentage in seven games.

"The games that Kirk played in last year, he was excellent. I would expect that type of performance to continue this season," said Sauer.

He recorded victories over WCHA rivals Northern Michigan (5-4) and Alaska Anchorage (4-3, ot). In addition, he saw action against Michigan Tech and St. Cloud State.

"The biggest question mark in goal is who will be Kirk's backup."

"Having just one proven goaltender is not an unusual situation for us to be in. We have been in the same position before with Jim Carey as a freshman, Curtis Joseph as a freshman, Mike Richter as a freshman and Dean Anderson as a freshman. I don't think it will be a factor."

The WCHA

The WCHA race should once again go down to the wire. Last season just six points separated the top five teams at the end of the regular season and this year should be no different.

Said Sauer, "I think the league is as balanced as it's been at any time. Minnesota looks like the favorite with the number of returnees and experience they have. But, Northern Michigan is going to be a very strong club with the seniors they have coming back and their depth. Colorado College, coming off the season they had in winning the MacNaughton Cup, should have some carryover effect and that should keep them going throughout the course of the year. The rest of the league is very even and it should be a real dogfight."

The Schedule

The Badgers entertain one of the toughest schedules in college

hockey this season. In addition to the always tough 34-game WCHA schedule, the UW has a very challenging non-conference slate.

CCHA rivals Michigan and Michigan State play the UW at the second annual College Hockey Showcase in St. Paul, Minn. Over Christmas, the sixth annual Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown features Northeastern, Bowling Green State and defending NCAA champion Lake Superior State.

On New Year's Eve at the Coliseum, the Badgers will face a touring Swedish team in an exhibition contest.

"I think the schedule for us is absolutely perfect. It's the type of schedule we need to learn about our team and see what we can do under pressure. Our goal has never been short-term. We always stress continued improvement throughout the season so that when we get to the play-offs, we're a team that is experienced and peaking at the right time."

"We look at our schedule this year as a challenge. We want this type of competition to prepare us for a good run at the end of the season."

Wisconsin's Jeff Sauer enters his 24th year of collegiate coaching in 1994-95, making him the "Dean" of coaches in the WCHA. One of the games most influential and respected men behind the bench begins his 13th season at the helm of the UW program.

He boasts an impressive list of accomplishments heading into the season. But 1994-95 could be yet another milestone season for Sauer. With a career coaching record of 489-400-34, he looks to become only the seventh coach in history to achieve the 500-win plateau. He would become the first UW coach to win 500 career contests in any sport.

His current win total ranks him seventh on the all-time victory list. He is one of only three active coaches to win that many games behind Ron Mason of Michigan State (698) and Bob Peters of Bemidji State (627).

AT WISCONSIN

In 12 seasons at Wisconsin, Sauer's teams have averaged 27 victories per year and posted 20 or more wins every season. Compiling an impressive 323-174-23 record (.644), his Badger teams have earned NCAA tournament bids the last seven years running while finishing third or higher in the WCHA standings all but one year (1984-85).

Last season was no different with the Badgers enjoying yet another 25-win season and earning a seventh straight bid to the NCAA tournament. With an overall record of 26-15-1, the Badgers achieved their 12th straight 20-win season and advanced to the NCAA tournament for the eighth time under Sauer. In the WCHA, Wisconsin finished third, just two points behind league champion Colorado College.

A look back at the Sauer Era at

Wisconsin shows nothing less than unparalleled success and tradition.

The 1992-93 team advanced to the NCAA tournament after a second-place finish in the WCHA. The Badgers came within seconds of advancing to their third Final Four appearance in four years but fell to Michigan 4-3 in overtime at Joe Louis Arena.

During 1991-92, Sauer's Badgers surprised the college hockey world, finishing as the NCAA runners-up. Receiving the sixth seed in the West, Wisconsin was an underdog to advance to the Final Four. The UW proceeded to upset the No. 3 seed New Hampshire (4-2) and No. 2 seed St. Lawrence (5-2) to qualify for the NCAA Championships.

In the NCAA semifinals, Wisconsin knocked off Michigan (3-2) before losing to Lake Superior State (5-3). It marked the second time in three years Wisconsin played for the NCAA title.

- Δ Has coached 12 individuals to all-America status and has had eight players selected to Olympic teams on 10 occasions.

In one of Wisconsin's finest seasons (1989-90), Sauer's team posted a 36-9-1 record, en route to capturing the school's fifth NCAA Championship and the second in his tenure. The Badgers won both the WCHA regular season and playoff championships. The WCHA regular-season title was only the second in UW history.

The Badgers' 36 victories in '89-90 marked the third time under Sauer that a Wisconsin team won 30 or more games. No other Wisconsin coach can boast of such a distinction.

In his first year at Wisconsin in '82-83, Sauer accomplished what no other first-year college hockey coach had ever done. His Badgers captured the 1983 NCAA Championship, earned the No. 1 ranking in the final poll, and posted one of the best marks in school history at 33-10-4.

Four members of that team—Pat Flatley, Chris Chelios, Bruce Driver and Marc Behrend—also played in the 1984 Winter Olympic Games in Sarajevo, Yugoslavia before moving on to careers in the NHL.

INTERNATIONAL EXPERIENCE

In addition to being one of college hockey's top coaches, Sauer has been one of its foremost ambassadors of the game. He is a regular consultant to USA Hockey.

In the spring of 1985, he served as an assistant coach to Dave Peterson for the USA Hockey Team that participated in the annual IIHF (International Ice Hockey Federation) World Championships in Prague, Czechoslovakia.

In 1987 he was one of four head coaches at the Olympic Festival. He has also served on the U.S. Olympic Hockey Committee (1984) and been a member of the Rules Committee.

Not only has Sauer been a noticeable presence off the ice, but he has

earned a wealth of international experience on the bench as well.

Consider that he was a finalist for both the 1992 and 1994 U. S. Olympic coaching jobs.

During April of 1992, Sauer was an assistant coach for the U.S. at the World Tournament in Prague.

He was head coach of Team USA in the 1990 Goodwill Games. Prior to the games, Team USA beat the Soviet Union's National Team in an exhibition contest at the Oakland Coliseum. It was the first time since 1980 that a U.S. squad had beaten a team from Russia.

Under Sauer's guidance, Team USA advanced to the gold medal game against the Soviet Union, but lost a 4-3 decision decided by a shootout at the end of sudden death.

Sauer also coached the USA Select Team (composed primarily of top collegiate players) at the 1989 Pravda Cup in Leningrad.

THE PLAYERS

Many of Sauer's players have moved on to prestigious careers in the NHL. The list includes Chris Chelios, Pat Flatley, Tony Granato, Curtis Joseph, Scott Mellanby, Paul Ranheim, Mike Richter, Gary Shuchuk and Gary Suter.

He has coached 12 all-Americans and eight Olympians. Those lists include:

This past summer the UW staff added a Wisconsin hockey school to the Indianapolis area.

AS AN ASSISTANT

Sauer began his coaching career as an assistant to the legendary Bob Johnson at Colorado College in '66. In addition to coaching hockey, he was an assistant baseball coach at CC.

In 1968, he became Johnson's first full-time assistant at the UW. He served in that capacity until 1971, when he accepted the head coaching

job at Colorado College.



Stieg was an honorable-mention all-American in wrestling at Ripon. The team captain placed at the 1985 NCAA Division III wrestling tournament.


In addition to hockey he directs all seasonal strength and conditioning programs for wrestling, men's and women's golf and assists with football.

He is single and lives in Madison.



At Wisconsin, Tim has been a graduate assistant coach with the football program and has assisted in the development of the video department.



Tim also played football for the 1985 NAIA Division II National Championship football team at UW-La Crosse.


He received his B.S. in physical education with a coaching emphasis at UW-La Crosse and his M.S. in educational administration from Madison.

BANK ONE BADGER SHOWDOWN



The University of Wisconsin, the Bradley Center and Banc One Wisconsin Corporation host the sixth annual Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown in 1994.

Touted as one of the best showcases of college hockey talent in the nation, the Showdown has become the most successful college hockey tournament in the country.

In its four previous years, nearly 170,000 fans have witnessed the December spectacle in Milwaukee.

During the Christmas holiday period each year, the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown is contested at the state-of-the-art, 18,000-seat Bradley Center sports facility. Considered by most to be the finest hockey arena in the United States, the Bradley Center is located in the heart of downtown Milwaukee.

Wisconsin claimed the Pettit Cup, given to the Showdown champion, in 1989, 1990, 1991 and 1993, beating hockey powers Boston College (1989), North Dakota (1990), Maine (1991) and Northern Michigan (1993). Boston University has been the only team to take the Cup from Wisconsin in 1992.

In addition to four-time Showdown champion Wisconsin, the '94 field includes defending NCAA champion Lake Superior State and Bowling Green

State, both from the CCHA. Northeastern joins the field from Hockey East. Lake Superior and Northeastern are making their first appearances in tournament. Bowling Green makes its second appearance (1990).

Participants in the Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown have come from every Division I conference and even from Canada. Hockey East has been represented by Boston College, Boston University, Maine and Providence. From the CCHA, Alaska-Fairbanks, Bowling Green State and Miami (Ohio) have participated. The ECAC has been represented by St. Lawrence. Then-independent Notre Dame was part of the tournament field in 1989. WCHA rivals Minnesota-Duluth, North Dakota and Northern Michigan have also taken part. The University of Toronto became the first Canadian team to participate in 1991.

The Showdown has set attendance records every year. In 1990, the championship game between Wisconsin and North Dakota drew 17,671 fans setting a record for a WCHA match-up.

Second-day attendance has sold-out the last four years.



THE SIXTIES

March, 1962

Athletic Director Ivan Williamson announces the return of hockey as an inter-collegiate sport after a 28-year absence.

December 6, 1963

A rebound goal by Chan Young gives Wisconsin its first modern collegiate victory, a 3-2 ot decision over Macalaster.

December 11, 1964

To upgrade the program, the Badgers schedule eight games against WCHA teams, but unfortunately lose all eight.

February 22, 1966

After 13 straight losses to WCHA teams, the Badgers post a 5-4 overtime victory over Minnesota. Jim Petruzzates scores on a break-away two minutes into overtime.

April 1, 1966

Following John Riley's retirement, Bob Johnson is named head coach.



March, 1968

Bert DeHate, a sophomore center, wins the national scoring title with 77 points (47 goals and 30 assists). DeHate has seven hat tricks.

March 30, 1969
The Badgers join the WCHA.

THE SEVENTIES

March, 1970

Wisconsin places fourth in the WCHA, eventually finishing third in the NCAA Championships. Defenseman John Jagger becomes the first Badger to earn all-America honors.



March, 1972

The Badgers make their second appearance at the NCAA Championships in three seasons.

March 16, 1973

Wisconsin stuns Cornell, 6-5 in overtime, to advance to the finals of the NCAA Championships. A goal with five seconds left in regulation by Dean Talafous ties the game. Talafous then tallies the winner with 33 seconds left in ot.

March 17, 1973

With a 4-2 victory over Denver, Wisconsin wins the NCAA Championship for the first time.

February 19, 1977

Wisconsin captures the MacNaughton Cup. With a

6-4 win over Minnesota-Duluth, the Badgers clinch their first WCHA regular-season championship.

March 25, 1977

The Badgers make it to the final four. Les Grauer scores the tying goal and Mike Eaves gets the game-winner over New Hampshire (4-3, ot) in the NCAA semi-finals.

March 26, 1977

Steve Alley culminates the Badgers' finest season with a goal 0:23 into overtime to give Wisconsin a 6-5 win over Michigan for the school's second NCAA Championship. Wisconsin becomes the first team to capture the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in one season. Bob Johnson is named national coach of the year, while his son Mark is named freshman of the year.



March 25, 1978

Wisconsin fans take Providence, R.I., by storm for the 1978 NCAA Championship, and are proclaimed the "World's Greatest Hockey Fans" by the city. Mike Eaves concludes his UW career as the school's all-time scoring leader.

March, 1979

The Badgers play before 21 sellout crowds. The average crowd of 8,654 at the Dane County Memorial Coliseum is eight short of a sellout. Mark Johnson closes out his Badger career as the top goal scorer (125) in UW history.

THE EIGHTIES

March 28, 1981

The Badgers win the NCAA crown for the third time with a 6-3 decision over Minnesota. The Badgers defeat the No. 1 teams in the ECAC (Clarkson), the CCHA (Northern Michigan) and the WCHA (Minnesota).

March 27, 1982

Wisconsin makes its seventh NCAA Championship appearance, finishing second to North Dakota.

June 1, 1982

Bob Johnson resigns after 15 years at Wisconsin. He guided the Badgers to three NCAA titles, seven NCAA tourney appearances and the best attendance of any program in the country.

July 8, 1982

Jeff Sauer is named the school's fourth coach.

December 28-29, 1989

Wisconsin hosts the inaugural Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown in Milwaukee. The Badgers defeat Notre Dame (9-3) and Boston College (6-5) to capture the Pettit Cup.




THE NINETIES

February 16, 1990

Wisconsin plays its 1,000th game, a 6-3 victory at Minnesota.

February 24, 1990

Wisconsin defeats North Dakota (5-4 in overtime) on Chris Tancill's goal to clinch the school's second MacNaughton Cup.



March 12, 1990

Wisconsin defeats Minnesota, 7-1, to claim the 1990 WCHA playoff championship. It is the UW's ninth WCHA playoff title and second in three years.

March 24, 1990

Wisconsin completes an NCAA quarterfinal sweep of Maine with a 4-3 overtime win. The win sends the Badgers to Detroit for the 1990 NCAA Championships.

March 30, 1990

The Badgers down Boston College (2-1) in an NCAA semi-final game in Detroit as Chris Tancill scores both goals. More than 8,000 Badger fans made the trip to Detroit.

April 1, 1990

Sauer's Badgers down Colgate (7-3) to claim the school's fifth NCAA hockey title before 15,034 fans at Joe Louis Arena. John Byce records a hat trick.



December 28, 1990

Sauer records his 400th career victory over St. Lawrence at the Showdown.

December 29, 1990

The Badgers claim their second Bank One Badger Hockey Showdown title,

defeating North Dakota (3-2) in the championship game. The contest drew 17,671 fans, setting a WCHA record for attendance.

December 28-29, 1991

Wisconsin wins its third straight Bank One Badger Showdown title. The Badgers defeat No. 1-ranked Maine (3-2) for the championship. The two-day tourney draws 34,578 fans.

April 2-4, 1992

Wisconsin defeats Michigan, 4-2, to move into the NCAA championship game against Lake Superior State. The Badgers lose the title contest, 5-3, but become the lowest seeded team to advance to the championship game. It is the UW's second Final Four appearance in three years.

March 26-27, 1993

Wisconsin receives its sixth straight NCAA bid and travels to Detroit for the NCAA West Regionals. The Badgers defeat Miami University (3-1) before dropping a 4-3 overtime decision to Michigan who advanced to the Final Four.

March 25-26, 1994

With their seventh consecutive bid to the NCAA tournament, Wisconsin traveled to Albany, New York for the NCAA East Regional. The Badgers handled Western Michigan 6-3, but lost to top-ranked Boston University, 4-1.

The Wisconsin Badgers are the National Champions of collegiate hockey. Wisconsin won the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) Championship last weekend by beating Cornell 6-5, in overtime and then disposing of Denver 4-2 in the title game. It was the first Wisconsin team to win an NCAA title since the Badger boxing team did in 1956.

The Badgers came within five seconds of never having a shot at the title at all. That's how much time was left on the Boston Garden clock when Wisconsin tied Cornell 5-5 to send the game into sudden-death overtime. Wisconsin, after making an incredible comeback, scored the game-winner with 33 seconds left in the overtime period. Dave Olmstead centered the puck to freshman Steve Alley. Alley's shot was blocked, but the rebound came to Dean Talafoos who scored the winner.

Wisconsin then moved into the championship game with Denver, who had ousted Boston College 10-4 in the tournament's first game on Thursday night. Wisconsin freshman Dave Pay opened the scoring in the first period but Denver tied it at 1-1. The Pioneers

took a 2-1 lead early in the second period but from that point on it was all Wisconsin. The Badgers showed no after-effects of the exhausting game against Cornell the night before, and completely outplayed Denver. The Pioneers were the Western Collegiate Hockey Association Champion and had been ranked the No. 1 team in the nation coming into the NCAA tourney.

Captain Tim Dool tied the game at 2-2 and then Talafoos put Wisconsin ahead 3-2. Senior Jim Johnston added an insurance goal in the third period and junior Jim Makey was superb in the nets kicking out 32 Denver shots. But somehow, even the national championship game paled in comparison with the Badger team heroics against Cornell.

No NCAA tournament team was named, but Talafoos was named Most Valuable Player. Wisconsin became the first team since 1965 to win both Friday and Saturday night games in the national tournament.

The Badgers finished the season with a school record for wins in a 29-9-2 season. Coach Bob Johnson finished his seventh year at Wisconsin with a record of 158-73-6.

"Badger Hockey Party Relocates in Detroit"

1977 NCAA Championships

March 26, 1977

(Editor's note: Parts of this game story were taken from the March 27, 1977 Wisconsin State Journal article written by Jay Poster)

Steve Alley slammed in a rebound off Tom Ulseth's shot 23 seconds into the overtime to give the weary Badgers a 6-5 victory over Michigan and the 1977 NCAA Hockey Championship.

If Wisconsin was off balance in Friday's overtime victory over New Hampshire, the Badgers came out clicking against the Wolverines. They passed crisply and confidently and played strong defense, with the forwards back checking consistently. Julian Baretta played confidently and positively in the net.

Alley scored on a power play 2:29 into the game when he fought off a man in the slot and deflected a Craig Norwich slapshot from the center blueline past goalie Rick Palmer. Dave Herbst scored on a breakout off a beautiful pass from Craig Norwich at 9:27. The two Badgers steamed down the slot, Norwich on the left side and Herbst

slightly ahead of him on the right. Norwich slid a pass through traffic to Herbst at the goal mouth and Herbst flicked the pass in.

Mark Johnson scored on a rebound off an Alley shot on a power play at 15:12. Norwich, at the blueline, passed to Eaves in the left circle and Eaves got it to Alley, who got off a shot in the slot. The rebound hopped out to Palmer's left and lay there until Johnson could roar in from the right circle to flip it over Palmer.

In the second period, Mike Meeker carried the puck down the right wing boards, stopped and deked around a defender at the top of the circle then skated a stride and floated a backhander which hit the bottom of Palmer's glove and skittered down into the net.

Baretta, a sophomore, was named the Most Valuable Player in the Tournament. Baretta, along with defensemen Norwich and John Taft were members of the all-tournament team. Wisconsin became the first team to win the Big Ten, WCHA and NCAA titles in the same season.

The Wisconsin hockey team took full advantage of its at-large berth and captured the NCAA title for the third time under Head Coach Bob Johnson.

The Badgers downed CCHA champion Northern Michigan in the semi-final game (5-1) and then took on the top-ranked team in the country and WCHA title winner Minnesota. Wisconsin beat Minnesota by a 6-3 count behind the steady goaltending of sophomore Marc Behrend and a total team effort that the Gophers could not match. Behrend, who was also in the nets against Northern Michigan, was selected tournament Most Valuable Player and along with freshman center John Newberry made the all-tournament team.

Behrend had 55 saves in the tournament, 25 against NMU and 30 against the Gophers. Newberry led the Badgers in scoring with two goals and four assists and tied Aaron Brotan of Minnesota for the scoring leadership in the Final Four.

Wisconsin playing on an emotional high, never let the Gophers get into their style of play and first period goals by senior Dan Gorowsky, Newberry and Lebler gave the Badgers confidence.

Wisconsin jumped out to a 4-0 lead midway through the second period on a goal by freshman Ted Pearson. Minnesota cut the advantage to 4-1, but Newberry gave the Badgers its four-goal lead back with a power-play goal at 16:09. Minnesota pulled its goaltender with 1:25 remaining in the game and Lebler hit the open net from just outside his own blueline to ice the victory.

On its way to the 1981 NCAA crown, Wisconsin defeated the conference champs of all three Division I leagues. In the NCAA quarterfinals, Wisconsin beat Clarkson 9-8, in a total goals series. Clarkson was the ECAC title holder. Northern Michigan had captured the CCHA title and Minnesota finished first in the WCHA.

The Badgers finished their season with an overall record of 27-14-1, second in the WCHA and winners of the 34th NCAA Championship.

In what was to be a transition year, first-year Coach Jeff Sauer guided the Badger hockey team to its fourth NCAA Championship, and second in the last three years. Sauer molded the squad slowly but suffered only one loss in the last 15 games. By downing the powers of the East, Wisconsin proved to the hockey world that without a doubt they were No. 1.

Wisconsin met Providence in the semi-finals of the NCAA meet, and with Marc Behrend in the nets, shut out the Friars 2-0.

There was no scoring in the opening period, but a carry over power-play helped Wisconsin get the winning goal 0:37 into the second period. Bruce Driver and John Johannson combined passes to set-up Paul Houck for his seventh power-play goal of the year and his 14th winning goal.

Behrend was tested only 17 times while recording his first shutout, and Wisconsin's second in NCAA tournament history. Jim Johannson tallied an open net goal with 0:47 remaining for the final tally.

Wisconsin faced Harvard in the

Championship game. The Badgers jumped out to a 3-0 lead with a goal in each of the first two periods and another goal early in the final stanza.

Pat Flatley, who along with Paul Houck were named to the all-tournament team, scored Wisconsin's first goal on a power play midway into the first period. Flatley picked up his second goal of the game late in the second period. Paul Houston made it 3-0 early in the third. Harvard then scored two goals with Driver getting one in between.

The Badgers pulled away late in the game with Houston scoring his second at the 18:39 mark and John Johannson tallying a short-handed, empty net goal at 19:21 to make it 6-2.

Behrend was honored as the tournament's Most Valuable Player. It was the second time he received the award having captured it in the 1981 tourney. Badger defenseman Chris Chelios was also named to the all-tournament team.

It was UW's fourth title in eight appearances in the Final Four and their third straight appearance in the championship game.

Colgate's game plan was wrecked in the first 3:23 by UW forward John Byce. His two early goals put the Red Raiders behind the eight ball, and left them in a precarious position, which they were not able to escape. The Badgers held off Colgate 7-3, and claimed the NCAA title.

Wisconsin capitalized on its first opportunity as Red Raider Steve Poapst was whistled for high sticking just 0:37 into the game. When Byce tipped in Sean Hill's blast from the left point, it put the Badgers ahead to stay. The telling play occurred less than two minutes later. With Colgate on the power play, Rob Mendel stole the puck and banked it off the boards and up to Byce who was breaking ahead of the pack. He deked Dave Gagnon and neatly deposited the puck through the netminder's pads.

Two goals by Byce and single tallies by tournament MVP Chris Tancill and Rob Andringa gave Wisconsin a 4-1 first-period lead. However, with 40 minutes to play there was still plenty of time for Colgate to put together a comeback. But Dennis Snedden took a pass from Brett Kurtz, skated around a Colgate defender and blasted the puck past netminder Gagnon, to make it 5-1.

Though Colgate pulled to within 6-3 midway through the third, Coach Jeff Sauer knew that victory was there. All facets of the game were clicking, as the Badgers scored on tip-ins, perfect passing, and booming slapshots while receiving Stanley Cup-style goaltending from Duane Derksen. The UW once again stood at the top of the college hockey world.

Along with MVP Tancill, center Byce, goaltender Derksen, and defensemen Mark Osiecki and Rob Andringa were selected to the all-tournament team.



The Fastest

Two Goals

The fastest two goals in UW history were scored :06 apart by Bob Suter and Rod Romanchuk vs Denver on Feb. 3, 1979. The feat was matched six years later by Tony Granato and Jim Johannson at Lowell on Oct. 27, 1985.

Two Goals by One Player

Steve Alley set the UW mark for quickest two goals by one player. On Jan. 29, 1977 vs Michigan State he scored goals :10 apart. Prior to Alley, Murray Heatley set the record with two goals in 12 seconds vs Minnesota on Feb. 6, 1970. Bob Lundeen matched it at Michigan State on Jan. 4, 1974.

Three Goals

Pat Flatley, Peter Johnson and Brian Mullen combined for the fastest three goals in Badger history scoring three goals in 31 seconds. They set the record at North Dakota on Mar. 13, 1982. MEDIA INFORMATION

Arriving at the Dane County Coliseum

The University of Wisconsin's working facilities for newspaper and radio are located in the upper level on the east side of the Coliseum. Media covering the Badgers should enter the Coliseum on the north side or where the opponent entrance is located.

Media Credentials

All requests for working media credentials for Wisconsin home games must be made in advance through the Sports Information Office, 1440 Monroe Street, Madison, WI 53711. PHONE: (608) 262-1811.

Requests should be made on your company's official letterhead at least one week in advance of the game(s) you wish to cover. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the north entrance to the Coliseum by the opponent lockerroom (the old Badger lockerroom).

Media Parking

There is no reserved parking for visiting media at the Dane County Coliseum. Visiting media should plan to arrive at the Coliseum at least one hour prior to game time to avoid parking problems.

Photographers

Photo passes are limited because of space restrictions at the Coliseum. Requests should be submitted on your company's letterhead to the UW Sports Information Office and will be granted on a priority first-come, first-served basis. Photographers are asked to consider the fans when shooting in the Coliseum.

Radio and Television

Visiting radio and television stations will be admitted for broadcast upon recommendation of the visiting school and its sports information director. Requests must be received at least one week prior to the game(s) you wish to broadcast. Broadcast locations are assigned by the UW Sports Information Department based on involvement with the co-op line arrangement. Tickets will be held at the UW Sports Information Office through noon on Friday and then will be placed at the north end of the Coliseum by the entrance to the Opponent lockerroom (the old Badger lockerroom).

Interviewing Coach Sauer

UW Head Coach Jeff Sauer will meet with the media following each game after a short post-game session with the team. The post-game interviews will be conducted in the players' lounge area of the Badger lockerroom. The best time to interview Sauer during the week is between 10:00 a.m. and noon at the UW Hockey Office or before (approx. 2:45-3:00) or after (6:00-6:30) practices.

Interviewing Wisconsin Players

During the week

Media wishing to interview specific players may want to call the Sports Information Office on their availability. Practices are generally held at the Coliseum from 3:00-6:00. Occasionally, practice will be at the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center (the Shell) on campus or at the Arena on the grounds of the Dane County Expo. Practice times at the Shell run from 3:00-6:00. 
