Bomber Plea on Air, Nets More Than \$100

Crew of Station at Manitowoc Gets Good Response

MANITOWOC, Feb. 25—(Special)—A 15 minute radio drive for Badger Bomber donations netted more than \$100 Monday night following President Roosevelt's address to the nation, it was announced today by WOMT, Manitowoc radio station.

The entire personnel of WOMT, owned by Francis M. Kadow, is helping to promote the Badger Bomber drive in Manitowoc county. Monday night all staff members sat by the station's many telephone outlets during a special 15 minute broadcast, receiving telephone pledges of Badger Bomber donations.

Maurice S. Dailey, the station's commercial manager, today announced the results of the novel campaign.

Under the leadership of William H. O'Donnell, Badger Bomber chairman, Manitowoc county stands sixth among all counties outside Milwaukee in total donations, while the city of Manitowoc leads all other state cities outside Milwaukee. Other Bomber events are planned for the near future to insure Manitowoc's continued leadership in the campaign.
