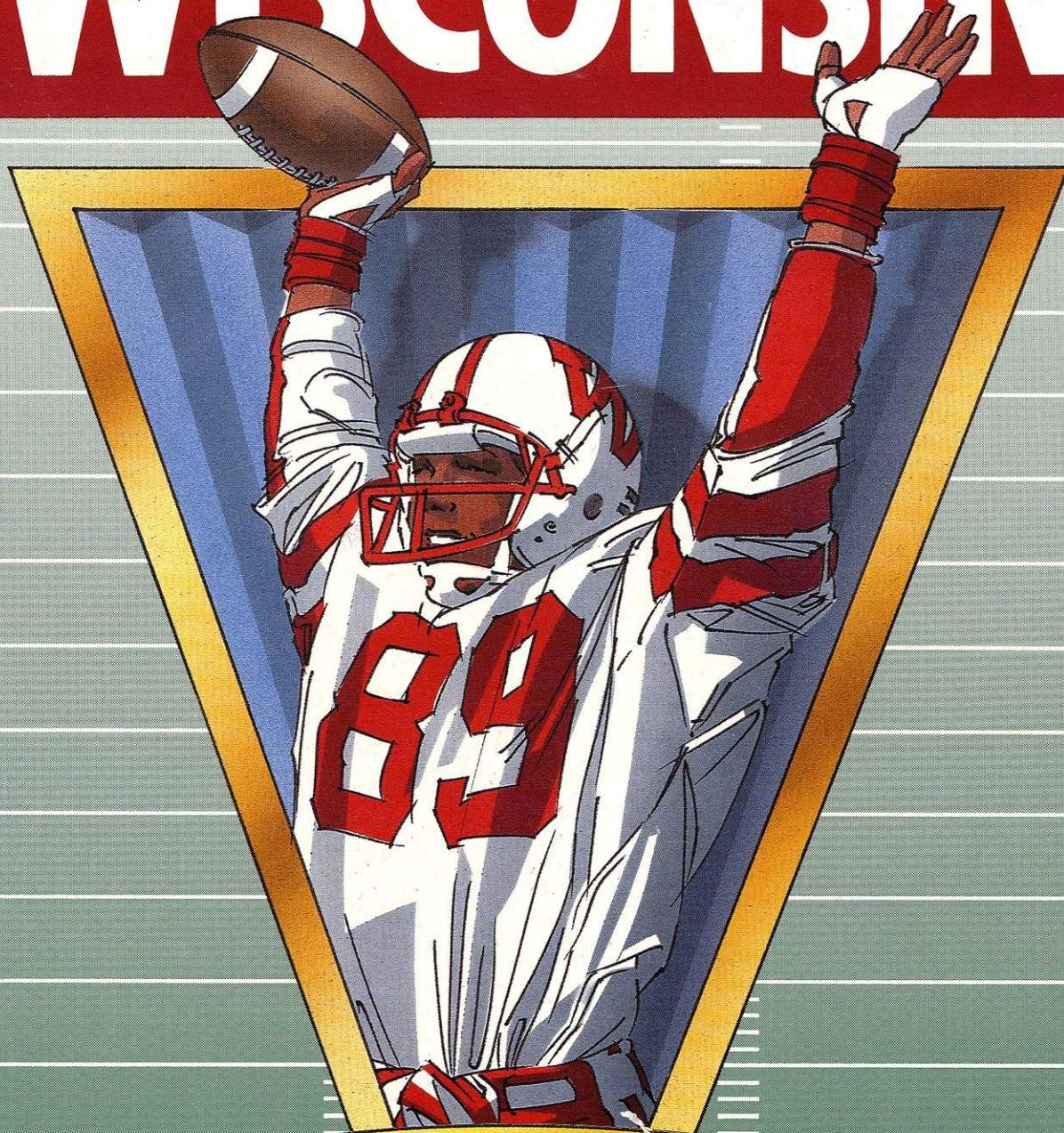

# THE UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN-MADISON

The University of Wisconsin-Madison, one of the world's leading institutions of higher education, is dedicated to the support of academic freedom.

Established in 1848, the first class of 17 students assembled February 5, 1849. Today, the UW-Madison includes 13 schools and colleges, 133 academic departments, more than 43,000 students and 14,000 employees, nearly 4,000,000 volumes in 22 libraries, a \$750,000,000 budget, and research and development expenditures totalling \$185,000,000 (third largest in the U.S.).

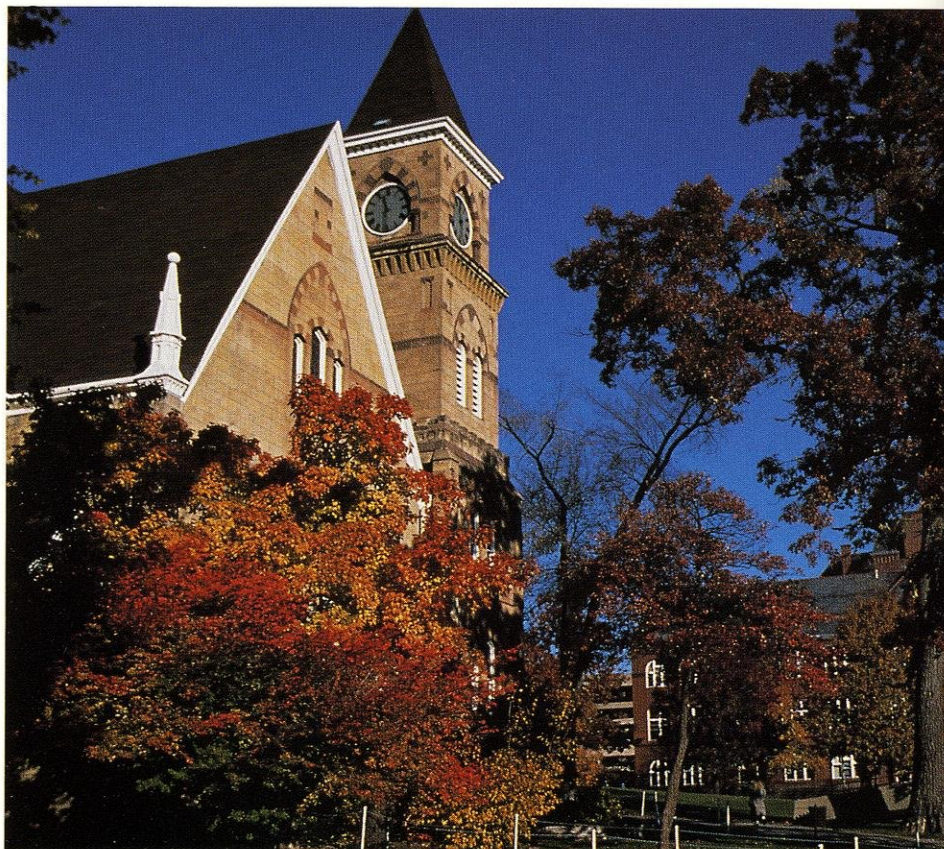
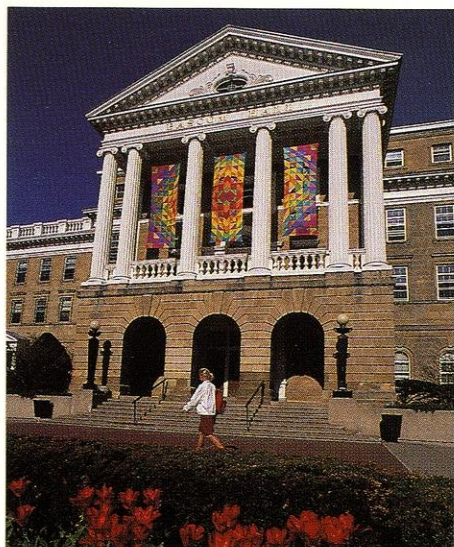
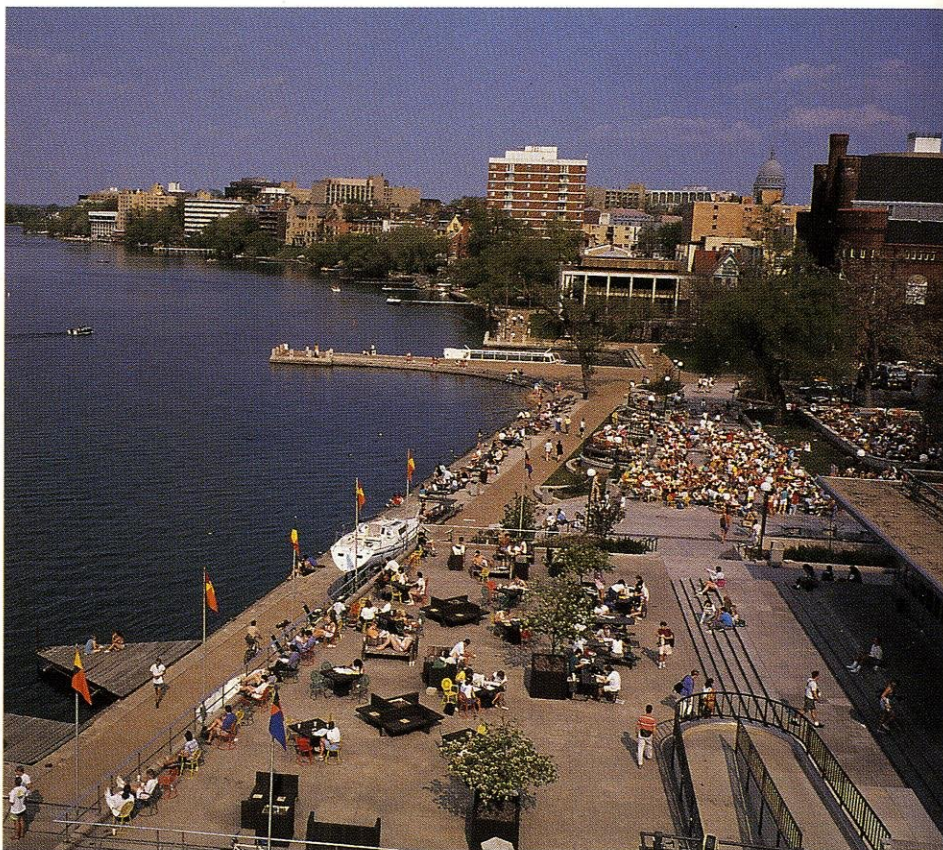
Wisconsin has ranked among the top ten universities in the United States in every scholarly reputational study since 1910. More than 4,100 courses and 12,600 sections are offered. Majors are available in 151 bachelor's, 191 master's, and 123 doctor's degree programs.

UW-Madison departments ranked among the top ten in the nation in the 1980s include Sociology (1st), German, Chemical Engineering and Geography (2nd), Statistics (4th), Plant Pathology, Molecular Biology and Biochemistry (5th), Spanish and Portuguese (6th), Zoology (7th), Political Science, Chemistry and Economics (8th), Mathematics (9th), and History (10th).

The UW's international activities extend the boundaries of the campus to all parts of the globe. The campus has about 3,600 foreign students from 125 countries, offers some 50 foreign languages for study, and has the largest overall number of international studies faculty and largest number of faculty of any university in East Asian, South and Southeast Asian, African and Latin American studies. Junior-year-abroad programs are offered for students going to Brazil, China, England, France, West Germany, Hungary, Israel, India, Italy, Spain, Sweden, Norway, Nepal, Thailand and Mexico and Quebec for summer study.

The UW's Center for Health Sciences is one of the Midwest's leading centers for patient care, education of physicians and other health professionals, research and public service. It includes the Medical,

**JIM MOTT** marks his 24th year as sports information director at the University of Wisconsin in 1989-90.

A Madison native, Jim was elected to the prestigious CoSIDA (College Sports Information Directors of America) Hall of Fame in 1979. He is also a past president of both CoSIDA and the Madison Pen and Mike Club.

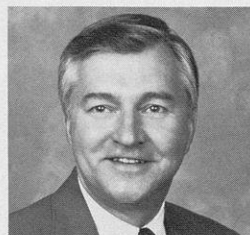

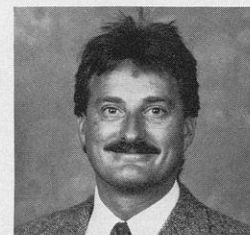
Dave, a 1988 graduate of UW School of Pharmacy, is a Waukesha, WI pharmacist. Eric is com-

# FOR MEDIA COVERING WISCONSIN FOOTBALL

## COMMUNICATIONS CENTER

The University of Wisconsin's working facilities for press, radio and television—the Communications Center—are located in the upper deck on the west side of Camp Randall Stadium and can be reached from Breese Terrace via the elevator at Gate 6. Radio and television broadcast booths are located on level three while print media should report to level four.

## MEDIA CREDENTIALS

All requests for Communications Center tickets must first be placed with the UW Sports News Service Office, at least one week in advance. Upon acceptance of applications, appropriate tickets are either mailed or held for pickup at the Press Will Call Window at the ground level entrance to the Stadium at Gate 6, Section E. Working press tickets contain assigned seat locations.

## PRESS BOX SERVICES

Game programs, two-deep flip cards, game-day notes and statistics are provided to members of the working press prior to kickoff. A buffet-style lunch is also served to attending media. Complete game statistics and play-by-play accounts will be furnished to each working location—or as requested.

## RADIO

Visiting radio stations wishing to broadcast from Camp Randall Stadium should contact the UW

Sports News Service at least one week prior to the game they wish to cover. Each radio station admitted to Camp Randall Stadium for broadcasting by signed contract will be issued five booth tickets. Booths are assigned and tickets are mailed upon receipt of necessary fees and a signed contract. If tickets are not mailed, they may be picked up in advance at the UW Sports News Service Office, or on game day at the Press Will Call Window.

## PHOTOGRAPHERS

Field photo passes are limited to daily newspaper, wire service, and television photographers who may work from assigned space in booths on the Radio-TV level, or from the east or west sidelines (except between the 30 yard lines) and beyond the end zone.

## PARKING AT THE STADIUM

A limited number of parking passes for Lots 18 and 19 (directly adjacent to Camp Randall Stadium) are available to working media only. They will be issued as requested and as available, on a first-come, first-served basis. Contact the Sports News Service for information.

## PLAYER INTERVIEWS

Wisconsin player interviews may be obtained following practice each weekday, Monday through Thursday—at approximately 6:00 pm. Out of town media should arrange interviews ahead of time through the

UW Sports News Service office, (608) 262-1811. On game days, media representatives will be able to interview Wisconsin players in the Badger locker-room following a short post-game meeting of the squad and coaches.

Post-game interviews of visiting coaches will be conducted near the opponents dressing room.

## INTERVIEWING THE HEAD COACH

Coach Don Morton will meet with media representatives following each game after a short post-game meeting with team and coaches. The post-game interview session with Coach Morton will be held in the McClain Athletic Facility Auditorium.

Coach Morton will conduct a press and telephone conference for local media each Monday at 12 noon central time during the season in the "W" Club Room in Camp Randall Stadium. A light lunch will be served.

On Tuesdays throughout the season, Coach Morton will take part in the Big Ten Telephone Conference. (Media wishing to take part in this teleconference should phone the Big Ten Service Bureau in Schaumburg, Illinois at 312-605-8933 to secure the appropriate phone number and further details.)

Morton will also usually be available each weekday immediately before and/or after practice. Practice will start daily at approximately 4:00 pm.

## RADIO COVERAGE OF UNIVERSITY OF WISCONSIN FOOTBALL

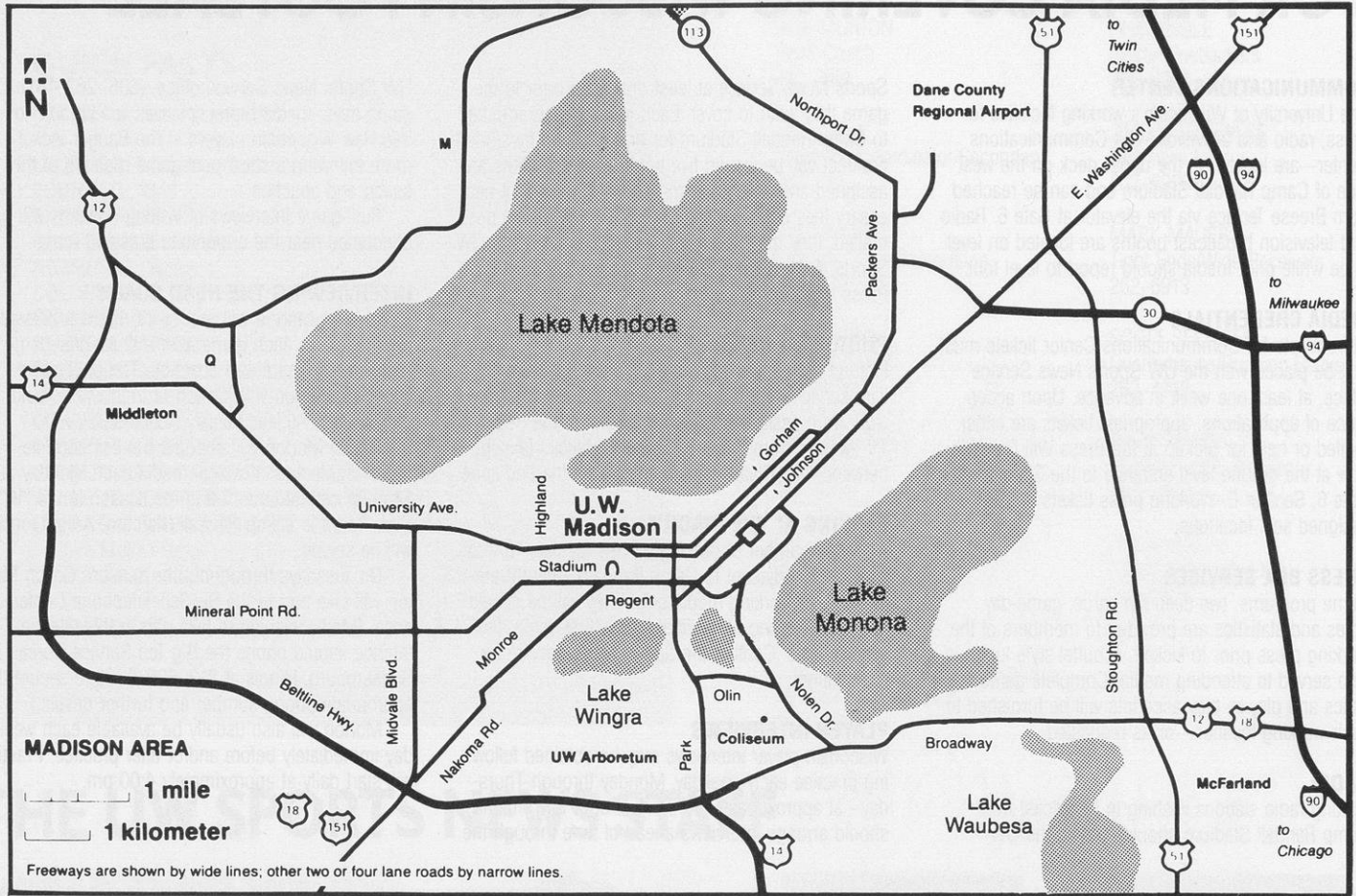

# 1989 WISCONSIN FOOTBALL OUTLOOK

The University of Wisconsin should have a much stronger defense and a more flexible offense in 1989 as the Badgers enter their third year under Coach Don Morton. The Badgers return eight defensive starters and four offensive regulars from a year ago. Morton will build around 36 letterwinners in all, 18 on defense, 15 on offense, and three specialists.

"In the future our coaching staff and players will look back at Spring Football 1989 as a very special spring," said Morton. "I think we saw a group of young people really come together as a football team. There was more contact, more intensity, more excitement and less injuries than in previous springs.

"We are especially pleased with the progress and depth being developed on defense. Two years ago the Badger defense had eight freshmen and sophomores starting. Well, those same people are now juniors and seniors with a tremendous amount of physical and mental maturity. There was great competition at most positions."

Tentative returning defensive starters are Dan Kissling at the SAM, or outside linebacker position, John Banaszak at noseguard, Don Davey at defensive end, Malvin Hunter at inside linebacker, Rafael Robinson at monster, LaMarr White and Eddie Fletcher, Jr at the cornerbacks, and Greg Thomas at safety.

Banaszak at noseguard and Davey at end give the prospects for the defensive line a positive note for 1989. Banaszak has 18 consecutive starts under his belt heading into the fall campaign, has played in all 22 games the past two years, and contributed 45 tackles in 1988. He earned himself All-Big Ten honorable mention honors last year and was the Badgers'

defensive player of the week vs Illinois. Davey, a two-time GTE First Team Academic All-American, has 20 consecutive starts heading into 1989 and has two years of eligibility left. He made 59 tackles last year and led the Badgers with eight tackles for loss (-34 yards). Also expected to make an impact on the defensive line in '89 are versatile two-year letterman Dan Batsch, who has 19 starts the past two years at outside linebacker/end, veteran Leon Johnson, who has 31 games under his belt, two-year letterman Bill Antonie, and up and coming new faces in Eric Benzschawel, Scott Boyke, Patrick Thompson and Pat McGettigan.

At inside linebacker positions, "Malvin Hunter and Brendan Lynch emerged as the top two at those positions this past spring," according to Morton, "but they are being pushed real hard by Aaron Norvell, Pete Underwood, Robert Newell and Gary Casper." Hunter, a two-year starter, has recorded 148 tackles in just 17 games as a Badger, and figures to be one of the linebackers to watch in the Big Ten this fall. "If the names Norvell and Underwood ring a bell you probably recall their fathers as members of Wisconsin's last championship team," added Morton.

"Our 1989 co-captains, seniors Dan Kissling and Tim Knoeck, lead a group of young outside linebackers," said Morton. Kissling, who had 21 starting assignments under his belt heading into his senior season, has 121 career tackles and should also be a strong contender for post-season honors. Knoeck, a true veteran, has played in 31 games as a Badger and his Big Ten experience should be a big bonus for the Cardinal and White. Others to watch for? "Duer Sharp saw extended action as a freshman in

1988 and Curt Maternowski has been a pleasant surprise," according to Morton.

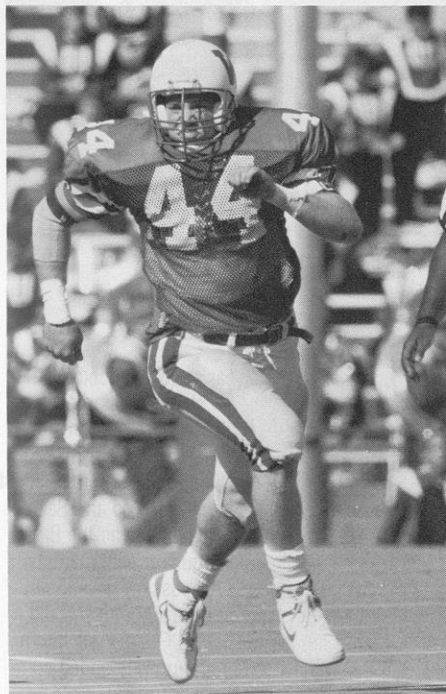
"The secondary," says Morton, "is an area where we have a tremendous amount of depth. As a sophomore in 1988, cornerback LaMarr White was voted our defensive player of the year and will be even better in 1989. Eddie Fletcher came out of spring ball in a real competitive battle with Troy Vincent. The lone senior in the defensive backfield is Brad Mayo who will be in the thick of things for playing time. Two-year starter Greg Thomas is being pushed by Tyrone Mahone at the free safety position while Rafael Robinson and Dennis Tillman give us excellent depth at strong safety."

LaMarr White, who has started 16 games, contributed 114 tackles, seven interceptions and has eight passes broken up the past two years, should be among the elite defensive backs in the conference. He ranked fifth (tie) in the Big Ten in interceptions in 1988, while Hunter, who is the top returning tackler for the UW this fall (he had 95 in 1988), was tied for 13th in tackles with 8.6 per game. Both Don Davey and Hunter were tied for eighth in the conference in tackles for loss (8), and Hunter and John Banaszak were tied for second with three opponent fumbles recovered.

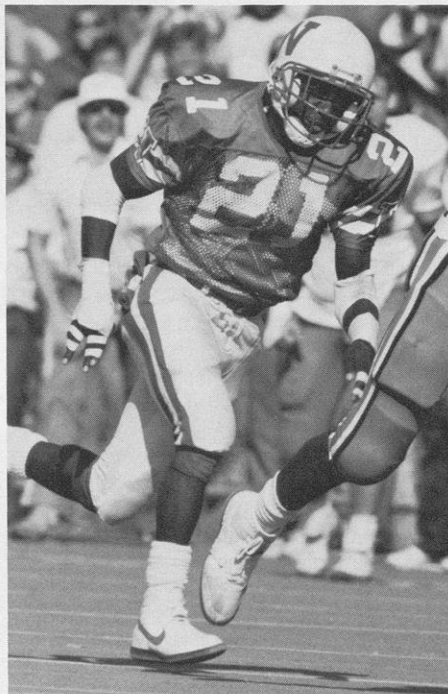
The Badgers ranked sixth against the run at 185.2 yards per game, but ranked tenth against the pass and ninth overall at 391.0 yards per game given up to 11 opponents. Obviously, the Badgers must improve those statistics to make a move up in the standings.

On the offensive side, the 1989 Wisconsin football team has promising potential, yet several ques-

tions still need to be answered. There is considerable talent, but there is also a measurable amount of inexperience.

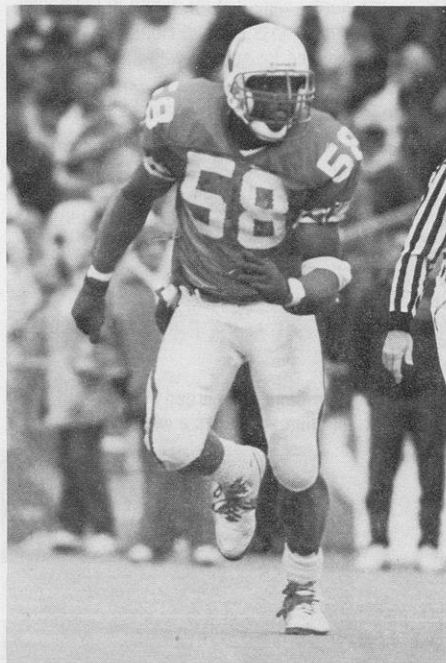
"We're going to diversify and not be as dependent on the option," said Morton when asked about his offensive plans for '89. "We feel we're going to be big and physical up front, and we have some tailback-type players. We feel we can explore some things out of the I-formation, diversify, and not be so dependent on the option."

"We are in the process of an offensive evolution that has caused a great deal of excitement with our players and staff. In an attempt to diversify and help the passing game, we are learning to operate out of a one-back set. There are aspects of the option game that we will keep and strive to develop an effective pass and run offense. There is nothing magical, it still comes down to people and execution." The Badgers averaged 149.6 yards per game on the ground last fall, and another 115.6 yards per game through the air. The total offense of 265.3 yards per game ranked ninth in the Big Ten.

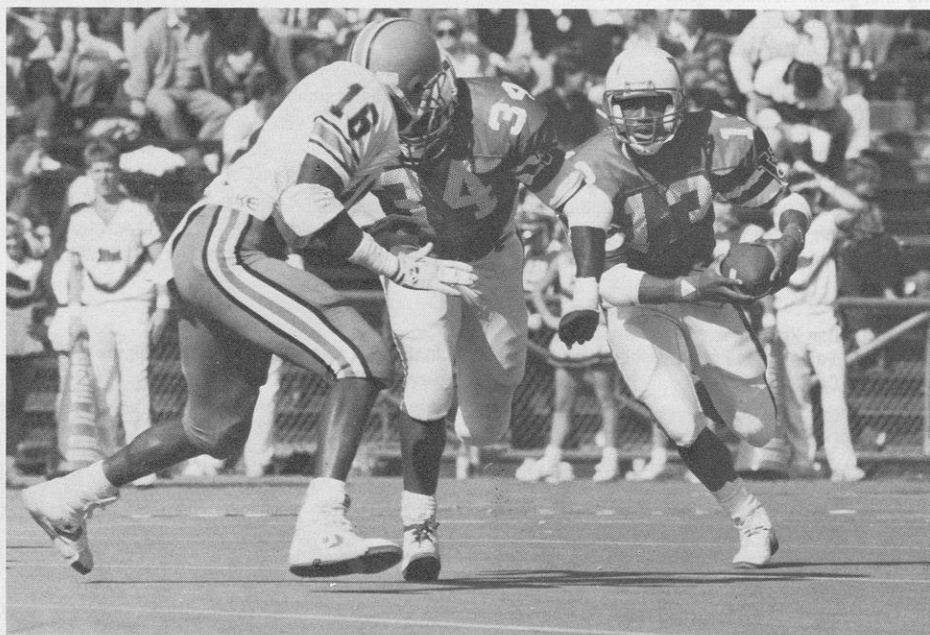
Offensively, tentative returning starters are Bill Williams at wide receiver, Brady Pierce at tackle, Joe Magazzeni at guard, and Lionell Crawford at quarter-

back. Williams, however, could be a question mark due to injury.

Pierce, a definite post-season honors candidate, started nine games in 1988 and has a 6-7, 290-pound frame. Also figured as anchors in the structuring of the offensive line are Magazzeni, who started every game as a junior and goes 6-7, 287, and junior Nick Polczinski, who shows great promise and figures to be one of the biggest players in the country at 6-5, 322.

"The most improvement this past spring was in the offensive line," Morton pointed out. "The Badgers will certainly be bigger and stronger. The starting

offensive line coming out of spring football averaged 286 pounds. Brady Pierce and Chuck Belin are developing into a good tackle-guard combination on the left side. The right side has Nick Polczinski and Joe Magazzeni competing at right guard. David Rapps has established himself at the right tackle position while Rick Godfrey is the number one center after an outstanding spring."

Williams is the top returning receiver after catching 13 passes for 170 yards a year ago. Crawford benefited from a great deal of playing experience as a freshman in 1988, after Tony Lowery was hurt in the Iowa game. He has the ability to be a top-notch

signal caller. In his first year of college football, the Badgers' #13 marked seven starting assignments, led the Badgers in total offense with 829 yards and scored three touchdowns.

"The quarterback position probably had the most intense competition as Lionell Crawford and Sean Wilson battled for the opportunity to lead the Badgers in 1989. Lionell appears quicker with maturity and is working to develop his passing skills. Sean completed 67% of his passes last spring and did a good job moving the team. Otis Flowers will return in 1989 from a knee injury and provide added com-



petition. Brad Brekke had a strong spring and is gaining confidence."

"Due to an excessive number of injuries to our wide receivers, we ended the spring with those positions unsettled. Tight end was a bright spot with the emergence of Kerry Miller and Craig Hudson.

"Our running backs bring a variety of skills and strengths to our team. As we diversify the offense we can utilize a back's strong area and stay away from a weakness, thus giving him a chance to excel. The two returning veterans are Leon Hunt and Fred Owens. Damone Freeman brings the most speed while Jimmy Henderson has power and above average speed. Tywin Claypool showed a great deal of improvement and will be a factor as well.

Statistically, the top returnee is Hunt, who averaged 4.2 yards per carry on 39 attempts in 1988. He has played in 34 consecutive Badger games the past three seasons. Freeman, who made his presence felt on the Big Ten track circuit this past spring, has sprinter speed and comes off a freshman season that saw him play in the last eight straight games in '88. Owens, another veteran with 27 UW games to his credit, was also the Badgers' top kick returner last year with 30 returns for 539 yards.

Wisconsin's kicking game should be strong this fall with talented Rich Thompson returning after going through surgery for an ulcer after the second game last year. Thompson recorded a 52-yard field goal prior to his injury. Also back is barefoot kicker Robb Mehring, who was strong in replacing Thompson. Junior college transfer and punter Mike Mullen, meanwhile, averaged 44 yards per punt last year and will battle with Brad Brekke for punting duties.

"The 1989 Badgers will play one of the more difficult Wisconsin schedules of this decade," said Morton. "We open with one of the top two or three

teams in Miami, play a tough California team in Berkeley, face Michigan and Iowa back to back, and have Big Ten road games at Illinois, Minnesota and Ohio State along with Big Ten home games with Indiana, Michigan State and Northwestern. It presents a large challenge and tremendous opportunity. We welcome the future."

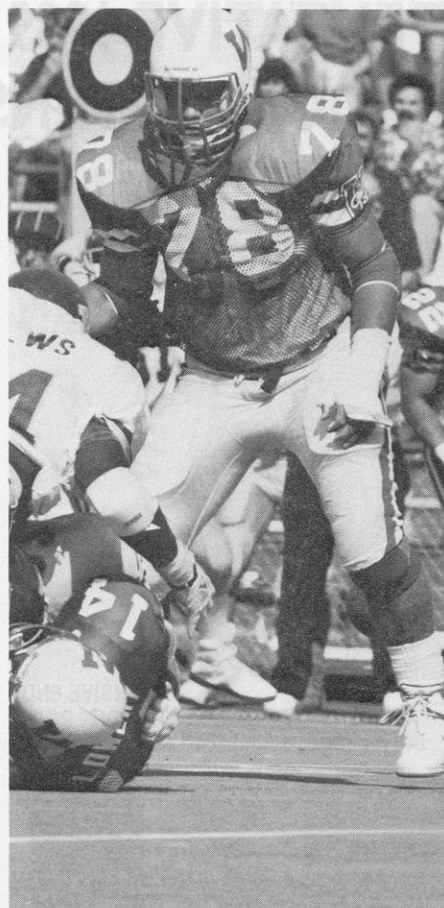

# PRE-SEASON INTERVIEW WITH COACH DON MORTON

**(Editor's Note: prior to publication, the UW Sports News Office conducted an in-depth interview with University of Wisconsin head football coach Don Morton as he prepares for his third season at the helm of the Badgers. We asked a variety of questions regarding the state of Badger Football, the prospects for the 1989 campaign, the Big Ten Conference, the future of college football, and so on. Following are his responses.)**

## **Please evaluate and give a general overview of your 1989 spring practice session.**

"I think in future years we will look back at the spring of '89 as a very critical spring. We had more contact than we've had in our previous years at Wisconsin. We had longer practices. We had more intensity, more enthusiasm. I think just a general, overall good spring.

"People were intent on getting better, people were intent on improving their individual skills, and we worked very hard at coming together as a football team. I think we made solid progress in every area."

## **What areas of the team made the most progress during the spring session?**

"The area where we are probably seeing the most improvement on our football team, generally, is on the defensive side of the ball and then specifically, this past spring, I think our secondary is probably making as fast of progress as any other group.

"We probably have as much experience back there as anyone else and we have a couple players that are really starting to come through. LaMarr White has been a two-year starter, had a great year in 1988, was our most valuable defensive player, and is doing everything to indicate that he can be one of the best cornerbacks in the Big Ten Conference in 1989. I think we have as much depth, in the secondary, as we ever had. Brad Mayo, who's a two-year starter, got beat out during the course of spring but he'll come back this fall battling for playing time. Eddie Fletcher and Troy Vincent are leaving spring football as co-starters at the one corner spot. That will make for an interesting battle. So we've got some depth at corner. . . . something every team needs.

"Our top returnee at free safety, Greg Thomas, another two-year starter, is in a heck of a battle with Tyrone Mahone. Tyrone started the spring a bit slowly; he had to miss some practices because of tests and his class schedule, but once he got in the groove he really put the pressure on. That's a healthy situation for both of them and also for us. Whenever you can have competition going at a particular position it's good for your football team and it's good for the people involved because it obviously helps your depth.

"At the strong safety position, Rafael Robinson comes out of spring football as number one. He has three years of eligibility left. Dennis Tillman, our top back-up, is another one of the young men that red-

shirted last year. . . . he has four years of eligibility remaining. They both have different strengths that they bring to the game, and I'm sure both will see a lot of action in 1989."

## **Which areas of the team concern you as you buckle down in preparations for the 1989 season?**

"As you look at our team in '88 and you look at our team in the spring of '89, the quarterback position is our big-play position. In the spring, Sean Wilson gave us big plays with the passing game; Lionell Crawford gives us big plays with his running ability. We'd like to take some of the pressure off the quarterback position. We need a receiver to emerge. It didn't happen in spring football. Injuries were certainly part of it, but we have to have some people emerge as big-play people. We can't afford to have every receiver be a possession-type receiver; we have to have somebody who can take a ten-yard play and turn it into a 40-yard play. We've got to have somebody who can turn a 15-yard play into a 60-yard play. We've just got to get some big plays out of the receiver position.

"And the same goes for the running back position. We've got to see somebody break tackles on a more consistent basis. We've got to see somebody make a defender miss them on a more consistent basis. You have to be realistic; it's not going to happen every time, but it has to happen a higher percentage of the time than what we've seen. I think Damone Freeman gave us a glimpse of some potential big plays a year ago. He has probably the most speed of anybody back there and we hope with maturity and experience that he can develop into a big-play type of person. But right now, offensively, our big plays come from the quarterback spot.

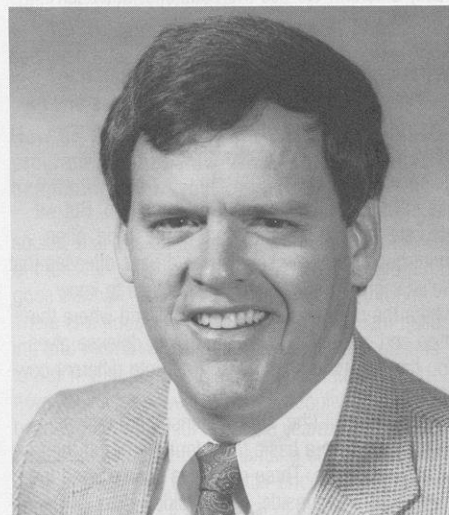
"I think Craig Hudson, in the spring, from his tight end position, showed the capability to be a big play person. We need someone like Craig to come through in 1989. Kerry Miller, at the other tight end position, also had an outstanding spring. Right now we've got to find a way to get both those people in the ball game because when you talk about our best players on offense, Kerry Miller and Craig Hudson are in that group."

## **What is the team's greatest strength heading into the new campaign?**

"Our greatest strength heading into the '89 season is on the defensive side. That is where we have the most experience. Two years ago, in our first year here, we played with five freshmen and three sophomores on defense. Well, those players are now juniors and seniors and it makes a heck of a difference. I think we have our better depth on defense. We have good athletic ability on defense and this certainly is going to be our strong suit heading into the season."

## **What offensive formation(s) will you use?**

"I really think that when you are at a university for your third year, getting ready for your third season, there is a natural evolution that you go through



with your offense and that is exactly what is happening at the University of Wisconsin.

"We have, for the last several years, been exploring several different ideas. You just don't all of a sudden plunge into drastic changes. Our first two years we felt we had to establish the basics of the option game. We thought, as we looked at our personnel, the option game gave us the best chance to move the football.

"The thing we want to explore now is not just an experiment, it is something we've made a commitment to. And that's the one-back offense. We want to be able to spread the defense out. We want to be able to spread our offense out. Whenever you can get four receivers on the line of scrimmage it definitely is a plus for your passing game. That's what the one-back system does. Instead of having three receivers on or near the line of scrimmage, you have four. You operate out of one back in the backfield. . . . we worked very hard last spring to develop an effective passing game as well as an effective running game out of the one-back formation. We feel pretty good about it. We feel that it will certainly complement the things we want to do offensively out of a two-back look. We want to have the ability to go back and forth between a one-back offense and a two-back offense.

"The thing we have probably learned is with the variety of formations that we have, it allows us to utilize the different skills that some of our people have. We have a number of running backs. . . . they all have a unique skill and they all have, maybe, a unique weakness. Hopefully we can give them a chance to feature their skills and stay away from a weak area. It means a lot of substitutions; it means we'll probably play with more people in 1989, but that can be something very positive."

## **Explain briefly about the 'R' back concept.**

"When you talk about our one-back offense, it's not an 'R' back offense. You've got to label people. For instance, the flanker is 'Z', the tight end is 'Y'. If



you've got two tight ends, the other one is 'U' and one is 'R'. We use 'R' because it is usually a running back coming out of the backfield that lines up on the line of scrimmage as a receiver. 'R' for running back, 'R' for receiver. It's not an 'R' back offense. I don't want people to think we're doing something really different. We use the traditional one-back offense."

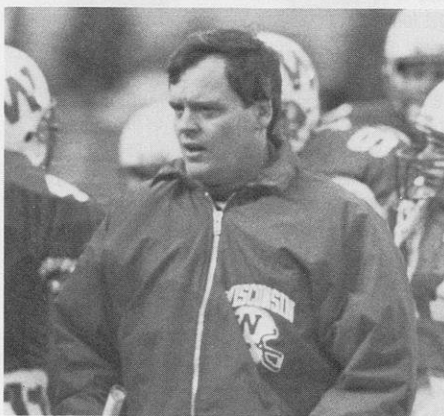
#### What defensive alignment(s) will you use?

"We're not making any drastic changes on defense. We will be very similar to what we have been in the past. We start with a basic 'Okie' defense, then we'd also like to reduce down; we'd like to bring the tackle down on the guard. But we also are using more and more of the 'Okie' alignment because of the sophisticated pass offenses that we've seen. We don't want the defense to know where the rush end is coming from and where the drop end is coming from. The 'Okie' defense gives you that ability to disguise and get into different coverages.

"Basically, it (the 'Okie' defense) is a college three-four. We're a basic three-four team and then we adjust from there. Three defensive linemen and four linebackers—two inside, two outside."

#### What players will you look to for leadership and big performances in 1989? Who will be your offensive leaders? Who will be your defensive leaders?

"The leadership for our '89 team has to start with the seniors. We have two excellent captains in Dan Kissling and Tim Knoeck. They have worked very hard. They have done everything we've asked them to do and they're very conscientious of the leadership role than they have to play this fall. . . . I think our entire senior class is. Leadership certainly starts with the seniors, but you've got to get leadership throughout your entire football program.



"Tim Knoeck's collegiate career probably hasn't been exactly like he'd hoped it would be. I think every young man has visions of being a starter, being a star player. Through some various coaching changes and different defensive schemes, Tim has played a variety of roles in our two years here. He has been a starter. He has been a backup. He has been a special teams player. But no matter what his role has been he's always been a Badger, he's always been a *team* player, and he's always been a leader. Some people can't accept that; some people have a

difficult time going from being a starter to being a backup player. But Tim is one of those unselfish people. If you ever talk about the "ultimate" team player, he just might be one of those type of people. Because of that, his teammates certainly respect him; you don't get elected captain unless your teammates have a tremendous amount of respect for you. That was a tremendous vote by the team to elect him to a captain's role. And now he comes off spring football as a probable starter.

"As far as the big performers in '89, people who have a chance to be impact-type players, Dan Kissling is in that position. He's playing the same position now for the second consecutive year. He's coming off a good spring. He's healthy and he's a person we look to to have a big year. Malvin Hunter, at one of the inside linebacker spots, is a solid two-year starter who is also capable of making the big plays.

"A very pleasant surprise for us is Brendan Lynch. Brendan had an awfully good spring. He, too, is at one of the very competitive inside linebacker positions. You've got to be able to get some big plays out of your inside linebackers. And I think in the secondary, LaMarr White is capable of having an outstanding year in 1989.

"Offensively, we think Brady Pierce is a potentially outstanding offensive lineman. He's going to stabilize the left side of the line. We've put a newcomer in alongside Brady, red-shirted freshman Chuck Belin who has four years of eligibility left. You don't usually find offensive linemen that young in a starting role at this level, but Chuck has a wealth of athletic ability, a wealth of talent, and he has the size you need. Playing next to Brady this fall is going to be a tremendous stabilizer for Chuck.

"At center, Rick Godfrey is our tentative starter. In our offense, the center has to play well. There is a lot of pressure on that position. That player has got to be able to block a noseguard one on one and he's got to be able to pass block one on one. We have to

get some stability there. What Rick Godfrey has is good quickness, athletic ability, and the ability to play with his pad level low. That's what you've got to have. As we look at our offense, other than the quarterback position, the center position is probably one of the most critical positions on our football team. For us to be effective, the center has to have a big year."

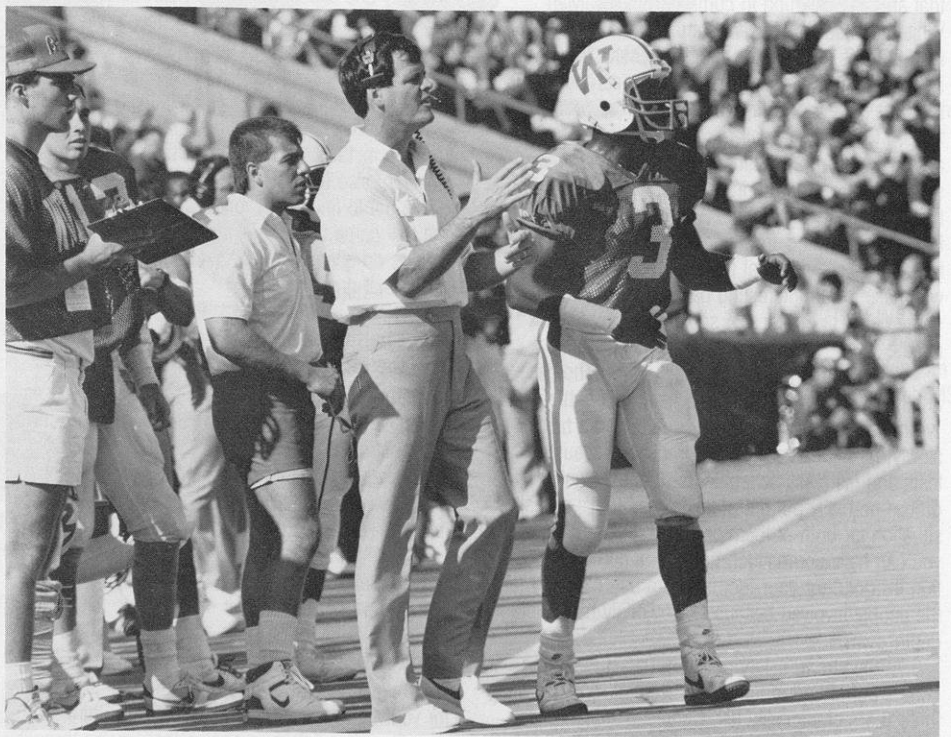
#### What about the quarterback situation? Do you have a definite number one heading into 1989?

"At the quarterback position, and I don't care what offense you run, you have to excel. And we've got some people there that can do that, starting with Lionell (Crawford) and Sean (Wilson).

"Sean certainly made a strong case for himself in spring football. The thing that he is able to do—he completed close to 67 percent of his passes in spring ball—is step into the huddle and get the team moving. The team will pick up first downs, they will get into scoring territory. He just has that ability to move a football team. He did it last fall, he did it this spring. His strong suit is throwing the football. He will be a much better passer than he is a runner, but he is elusive.

"Lionell has tremendous quickness. I think we saw a much quicker Lionell Crawford in spring football with a year of physical maturity behind him. The winter weight program has helped him and he is working very hard to develop into a good passer. He does have a strong arm, but Lionell's strong suit will be as a runner.

"Heading out of spring football they're really pretty even. I think Lionell has an edge because of the experience factor, yet we see them both being a major part of our offense in 1989. They both have some leadership skills that have got them to where they are today."





### Do you have specific goals for your offensive and defensive units this fall?

"Offensively, we have got to cut down on the turnovers. If we just cut down the turnovers we have a chance to win so many more games. We had 38 turnovers in '88; we just cannot be putting our defense in such bad field position.

"Offensively, we've got to win the field position battle and that means you don't have to score a touchdown every time, you don't have to kick a field goal everytime. You just have to get some first downs, allow your punter to make your opponent play a long field. The team that plays on a short field is more likely to win. You want your opponent to play on a long field. We've also got to pass the ball more effectively. We feel with a more effective passing game, with more emphasis on the passing game, it will open up the run. And you still have to be able to run the football.

"Defensively, I think we just want to continue where we have been. In '88, we defended the short passing game very well and we defended the long passing game very well. But we've got to do a better job in the intermediate zones. We had a lot of passes completed on us in those areas and we've got to improve there. We've got to continue to improve against the run. Our turnover ratio a year ago, or take aways from the defensive standpoint, were excellent. Our number of interceptions and our number of opponent fumble recoveries were excellent; we have to continue to maintain that high number of takeaways."

### How much of a factor can the emotional level be? Can an underdog utilize the emotional factor to overcome the odds?

"A lot of times, even if your mismatched, you can hold your own for the first half. Maybe you're very emotional, maybe the other team isn't quite as emotional. So even in a mismatch situation, you can hold your own for the first half. It's the second half, when you're mismatched, that the size, strength and speed of your opponent will start to show through as both teams get tired. If one team is able to put more athletic ability on the field, over the course of the game it starts to show up. That's one of the most difficult things for people to realize, that each team has 11 players on the field and there are a lot of different movements, motions and so on. In any one player, there may be a hundred little athletic things that are going on and gradually, through the course of the game, the team with the most athletic ability, the most strength, the most speed. . . . the scales are usually going to tip in their favor and they're just going to have more good things happen to them."

### What areas of the 1989 Wisconsin football team must come through for you to move up in the standings?

"For us to move up in the Big Ten standings, we've got to cut down the turnovers, improve our punting game, and improve our overall offensive stats. We've got to improve our scoring ability . . . to score more points."

### How do you perceive the Big Ten Conference race in 1989?

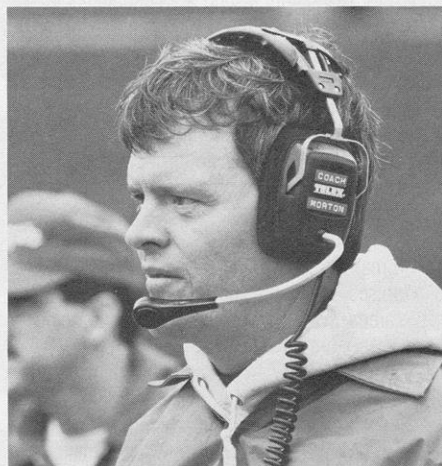
"There is no question that there is one team that is head and shoulders above the rest and that's

Michigan. Michigan had an outstanding football team in 1988 and they were basically a junior-dominated squad. I think the team that was the big surprise in '88, and that will continue to be impressive in '89, is Illinois. They had some young defensive players, particularly in the defensive line, come through for them last year. They also have one of the premier quarterbacks in the country and that's a good combination.

"Iowa and Michigan State will, of course, be tough. Indiana lost a lot of seniors but they've been recruiting very well. They've got some young players that have been given time to mature, they have had time to learn the system, and they've had time to gain confidence because they haven't been put in those pressure situations. Now it's their turn. And I don't think Indiana will drop off.

"I don't know if Ohio State had the talent a year ago that everyone assumed they had. Whenever you go through a coaching change there is going to be an adjustment period. Those players had to adjust to the new coaching staff, the new offensive style, the new defensive style. . . . that is what Ohio State is going through. But they'll be in the hunt for sure.

"There will probably also be a surprise team; there seems to be one every year. A team picked to be a lower division finisher that suddenly emerges. Last year, for instance, it was Illinois."



### With two full years behind you in the Big Ten now, how do you feel about the Conference as a whole?

"There is no doubt that this is on a par with any conference in the country. We have a competitive group of programs, great coaches and great student-athletes. It's certainly an honor to be a member of this league.

"When you talk about football philosophy, you're going to reflect, to a certain extent, your part of the country and the Big Ten is basically a midwest conference. It may tend to be a little bit conservative. If you look at the administration, I think the Big Ten tends to be reasonably conservative. I'm not saying that is good or bad. With the athletes we get, the conference tends to be a physical football league. We do have access to big people and consequently it does become a physical league. There are other leagues around the country that have access to more speed than we have, particularly if you look at the warm weather climates. We are a cold weather con-

ference and we reflect our particular region, yet I think last year the top teams in our conference represented the league very, very well. The only two losses that Michigan had, for one, were games that could have gone either way very easily. We were very well represented in the bowl games; Michigan did a super job in the Rose Bowl.

"Let's keep in mind, too, that the NCAA is not spending a lot of time on the Big Ten campuses and that has got to count for something."

### How do you feel about the Wisconsin football program at this point? What are the positive happenings from your perspective?

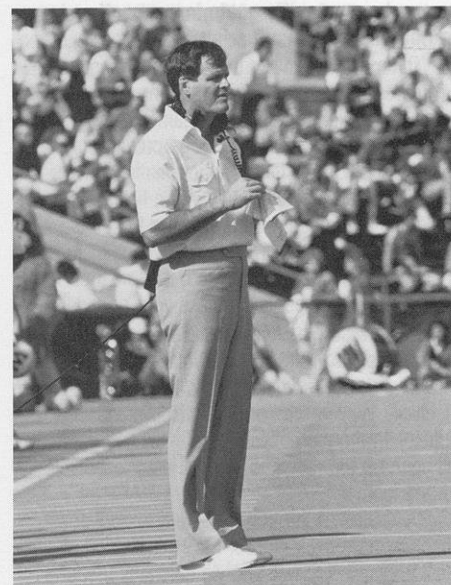
"We are similar to any other organization in our society that has gone through a tremendous amount of transition like the Wisconsin Football program has gone through. There is a process you go through. There is a price you pay for responsible team building and I think we paid that price. We will continue to pay that price. As you look at our football team now, I think we have a group of people that have been together now for a couple years. The coaches have a much better understanding of the players and the players have a much better understanding of the coaches. There is a great deal of respect, but that is something you have to build in together.

"As a program we have gone through some things together. You see, it's not all bad for an organization to go through difficult times. We've been through two difficult seasons together and we've learned a great deal. We've gradually improved the quality of the athletic ability to fit our particular system. Now in 1989 we have a chance to make some significant progress and make some significant steps. We are in a position to do that. We have as much depth, particularly on the defensive side, as we've ever had. Our quarterback position is beginning to stabilize and yet it is still a very young position when Sean Wilson has four years of eligibility left, Lionell Crawford has three years of eligibility left, Otis Flowers has three years of eligibility, and Brad Brekke has three years of eligibility left. That is just typical of our whole offense. It's a very young offense. You look at our starting offensive line. . . . Brady Pierce has two years of eligibility left, Chuck Belin has four, Rick Godfrey has three, Nick Polczynski has two, David Rapps has two. Joe Magazzini is the only senior there. We're a very young offensive football team and yet we have a chance to make some significant improvements."

### What about the new facilities? The Dave McClain Athletic Facility, for instance. How will they help you?

"This past recruiting year, the young men that are high school seniors right now and who will be freshmen in the fall, this is the first recruiting class that was able to visit University of Wisconsin and see an indoor facility. . . . see the best one in the country. Now that has been going on at other Big Ten schools since 1984. What people don't realize is that by 1985 Minnesota had an indoor facility, Iowa had an indoor facility, Illinois had an indoor facility, Michigan and Michigan State had indoor facilities. So since 1985, young people have been visiting those campuses and have been seeing a real commitment to facilities. Well, this past recruiting class was the first recruiting class that we could show the same thing to and that's very important. We are dealing





with impressionable, 18-year-old people who, obviously, we want academics to be important to them but *football* is important to them, too. They want to go to a school where there is a visual statement of a commitment. That's what facilities do for you. They make a visual statement to the direction that you want to take your football program.

"We saw the first real benefits of the McClain Facility this last recruiting year. And now we're seeing the benefits in the off-season as well. Now you can talk about the ultimate effect of the passing game because your quarterbacks and receivers are able to throw and catch all winter long. That makes a difference. Your skilled people can be in a facility and doing things they have to do like running and catching passes.

"And for our players own self-concept and self-esteem, to be in that facility makes them feel good about themselves. Any of us will do a better job if we feel good about ourselves. That facility is certainly a world-class facility. It's a facility that the University of Wisconsin athletes, the Wisconsin football players, really deserve."

**What are your thoughts about this year's schedule? You open up with a possible number one team, Miami, travel west to play an up and coming California team, have nearly a month between home games, play Michigan, Illinois and Ohio State on the road, and face four other Big Ten teams at home?**

"We have a very big challenge in 1989, but we also have some unique opportunities. This is, I believe, the toughest schedule Wisconsin has played in the decade. We open with probably the pre-season favorite to be the national champion, Miami, and then travel across the country to face an excellent California team—one that is making a strong comeback in the Pac 10. Every conference game is a tough game, and we have eight of them. And this year, we lose Purdue off the schedule and pick up Indiana.

"It's a great challenge and it's a unique opportunity. I think it's a challenge our players are looking forward to."

**What items most concern you about the state of college football in 1989?**

"Well, for one, before the decade ends, college football has to come to grips with the steroid problem. I'm for mandatory testing at the conference level. I would like to see the conference pick up the bill for steroid testing. Let's not just test the successful teams in the league, let's not just test the juniors and seniors, let's test those young players, too. It's the younger players that are trying to get big that face the temptation. Let's come to grips with the issue. That is something we can do as a conference, and we've got to continue to do it when we go through the recruiting process.

"We make promises and we've got to live up to our promises, in the academic arena as well as the athletic arena. We've got to make sure we're going to do what we are telling kids we're going to do. I think young people have got to be realistic when they come to college; we've got to make sure they are aware of the competition they are going to face in the classroom. We do an injustice when we paint too rosy of a picture and tell them how easy it's going to be. We spend a great deal of time getting them ready to be a college football player. . . . we've got to do the same thing to get them ready to be a college student.

"I think the NCAA is doing some real good things. They came out with a tremendous study about some of the problems division one football players and basketball face and about some of the problems black athletes face. I think these are the things that as college coaches and administrators, we've got to understand and we've got to participate in. We've got to use these studies and get the information these studies have to see what we can do to make the environment as good as possible for every student athlete.

"Most universities have a summer collegiate experience where those young people that haven't had the preparation in high school that they need, there is some type of summer collegiate experience that they can get involved in at their university. Right now, the NCAA makes it very difficult for schools to pay for the student-athlete to enter before the fall.

This is 1989, if there are changes that have to be made let's make them."

**Do you see any trends developing in the college game?**

"In 1988, division 1A football lost something like 900,000 fans. I think that is a definite trend, and there are a variety of reasons. The demographics are changing. We're becoming a more participatory society. People participate in activities. . . . they get involved in running, jogging, walking, and recreational sports and hobbies. We're not the spectator society we were ten years ago.

"What has hurt college football, we feel as coaches, is the T.V. There is so much college football on T.V. It's just too easy to sit at home and watch a game.

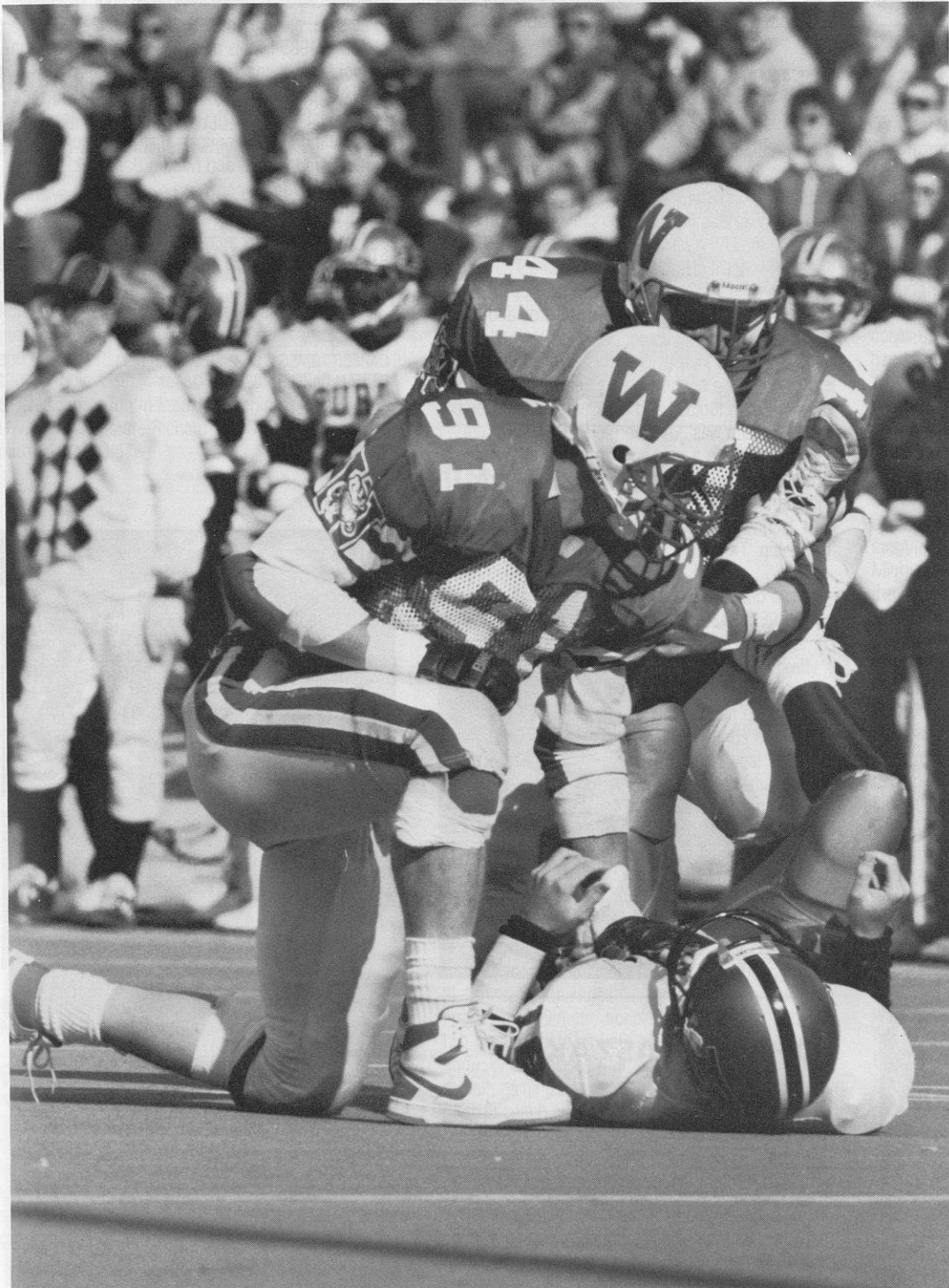
"As you look at the demographics and you look at our society changing, you see a whole new awareness when it comes to alcohol. I think a lot of schools went through a period where there was a certain atmosphere at the games and some of that revolved around alcohol. I think those days are gone. In the '70's, perhaps, win-loss records weren't as critical to attendance. But as you leave the '80's and enter the '90's, the win-loss record may be more critical. People want to be associated with a winner. And yet there is no reason you can't have good, wholesome fun at a football game. We've got a great show at Camp Randall. We've got one of the best bands in the country, we've got the pom-pom girls and cheerleaders, we've got student-athletes that are true student-athletes that will give a great effort. And we're going to be better. We've got to show people that we are doing the things we need to do to be a good Big Ten team, to be a championship Big Ten team."

## HEAD COACH

# DON MORTON

**D**on Morton marks his third season at the University of Wisconsin and tenth overall as a collegiate head coach in 1989, after being selected to guide the school's gridiron fortunes on November 28, 1986.

Initially awarded a five-year contract, Morton is the 26th head coach in the long and colorful 100-year history of Badger Football. After being at the helm during the school's 100th anniversary season in 1988, Morton has the distinction this fall of leading the Cardinal and White into their second century of collegiate football competition.

One of the primary concerns confronting Morton at the onset of his tenure at the UW in 1987 was installing a renewed sense of enthusiasm and eagerness throughout the program. Wisconsin, he knew, had won just eight of its previous 23 games in 1985 and 1986. He has made measurable strides in those areas, but he also knows there is more work to be done.

The 1989 season, the third installment of Coach Morton's five-year plan to get Badger Football back on track, will likely provide an even greater challenge. But Don Morton is a man who thrives on challenges;

in fact, he has made a career of turning such challenges into successes.

Yes, the '87 and '88 campaigns are now history. And though maybe the won-loss record wasn't what the coaching staff had hoped it would be, Morton and his spirited support group can now point with optimism to a coming season that promises a new degree of excitement and hopefully, some eagerly anticipated dividends.

Recognized as one of the top young head coaches in the college game today, Morton's overall philosophy of collegiate athletics includes a strong commitment to academics. At the time of his hiring, Morton said, "I am proud to be a part of a university that has a value system. One that says, 'Hey, this is what we believe in; this is what we stand for.' I think that's important in our society.

"I'm excited that here at the University of Wisconsin they are not going to corrupt the educational process. When we make a fraud of a student-athlete for the sake of winning, that is not winning at all. That has not happened here in the past, and it will not happen in the future.

"That so-called 'dumb-jock' is not born. He is systematically created when we let him go through a system unchallenged. As a coaching staff, we will continue that great tradition of challenging young people on a day-to-day basis—academically and football-wise.

"It's important for all of us to realize one thing. We are involved in a game. It is a game played by young people and not every play will be perfect, there will be mistakes made. We have to keep that in mind.

"I'm in the toy department at the University. There are a lot more important things going on across campus. This is fun, and we have to keep this game in perspective."

A 41-year-old native of Flint, Michigan, Morton was born on April 10, 1947 and attended and graduated from that city's Northern High School. Following





high school, he moved on to Augustana College in Rock Island, Illinois, playing center for the football team in the late 1960s and earning his Bachelor of Arts degree in Psychology in 1969.

His impressive academic background then culminated in a Master of Arts degree in Education and Administration from Western Illinois University in 1974.

Morton began his professional coaching career in 1969 as assistant football and assistant wrestling coach at Moline High School in Moline, Illinois, serving there through 1971.

His successes at Moline High School earned him his first collegiate position as offensive line coach at Augustana College of Sioux Falls, South Dakota from 1971-76.

Coach Morton then moved on to North Dakota State University as offensive backfield coach from 1977-79, and was subsequently named head coach at NDSU in 1979.

Morton's six-year head coaching record at North Dakota State was 57-15-0 (.792), with the school winning the North Central Conference title four straight years (1981-84) after placing second in both 1979 and 1980.

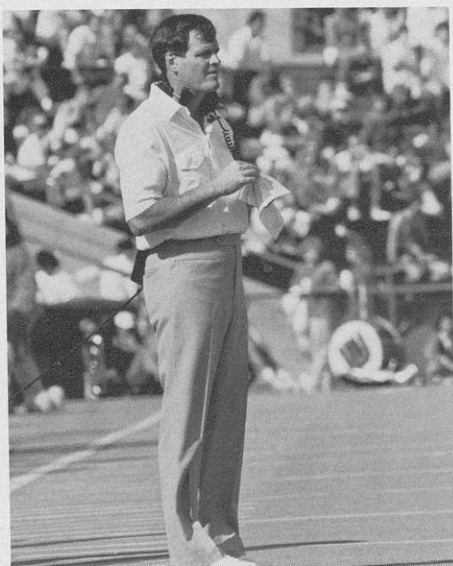
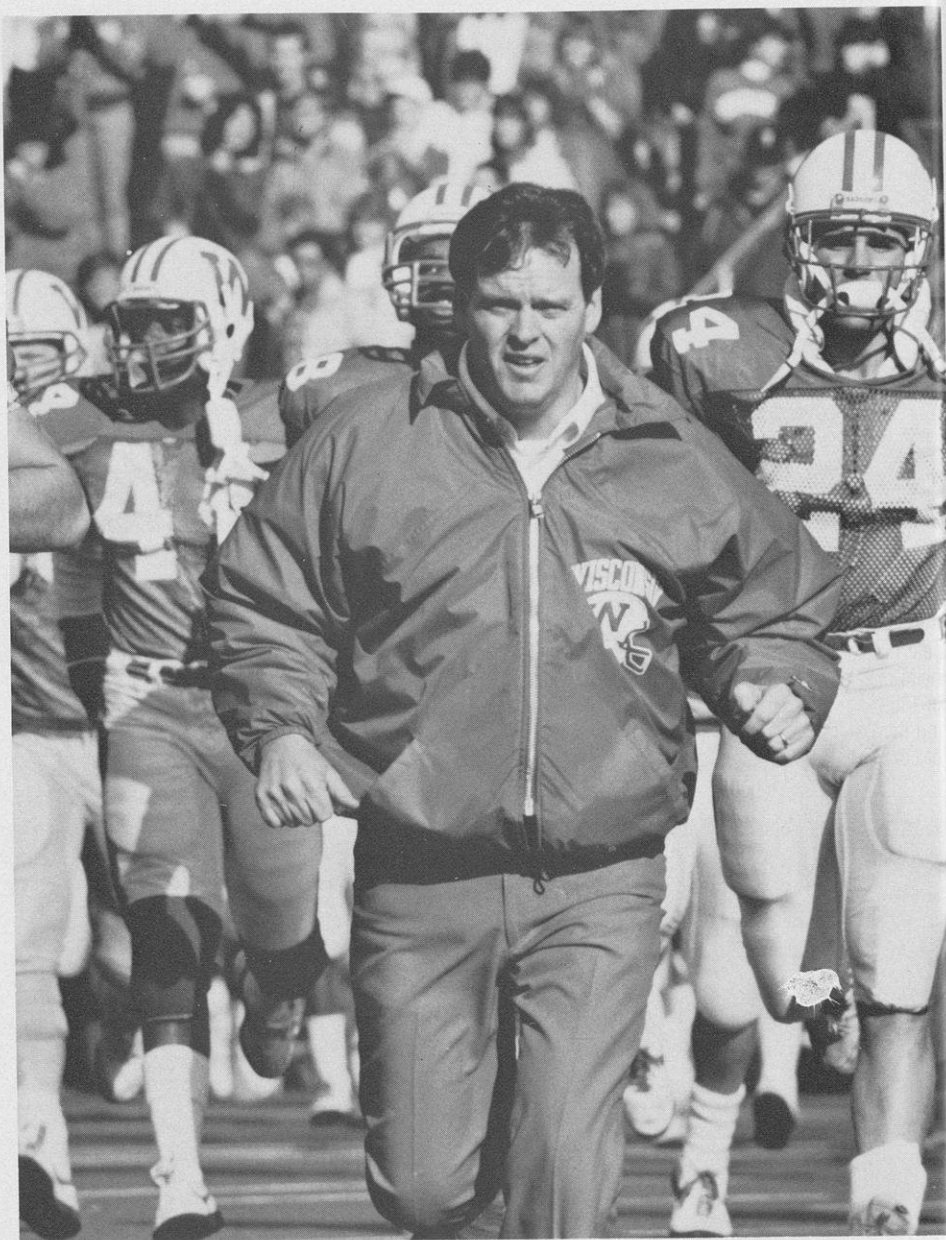
While at North Dakota State, his teams participated four times in NCAA Division II Championship playoffs, with the Bison winning the national title in 1983 and placing second in both 1981 and 1984.

Morton took the head coaching position at the University of Tulsa following the 1984 season and immediately guided the Hurricanes to the Missouri Valley Conference title with a perfect 5-0-0 record (6-5-0 overall) in his first campaign.

Tulsa dropped out of the Missouri Valley Conference following the 1985 season and in 1986 campaigned as an independent, posting a 7-4-0 record. The Hurricanes ranked third nationally that year in rushing offense at 289.0 yards per game, and 14th nationally in total offense at 414.0 yards per game.

Morton's ten-season record as a head coach is an impressive 74-42-0 (.638)—including marks of 57-15-0 at North Dakota State and 13-9-0 at the University of Tulsa. Morton-coached teams have won ten or more games four times.

Don and his wife, Susan, have two children: daughter Stephanie, age 18, and son Joshua, 15.

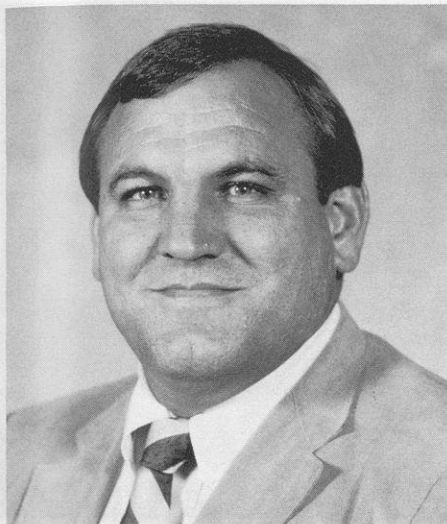

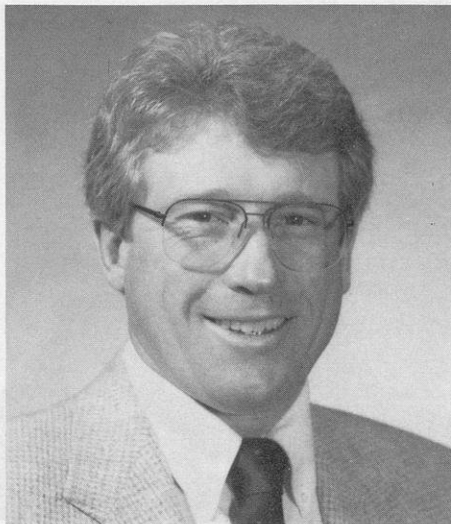
**OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR/

PAT SIMMERS enters his third season as an assistant coach with the University of Wisconsin football program in 1989. He serves as the Badgers' offensive coordinator and is an offensive line coach. He coached at the University of Tulsa under Don Morton for two seasons after joining the Tulsa staff in March of 1985 from North Dakota State.

**COACHING EXPERIENCE:** Simmers' coaching career began at Fond du Lac St. Mary's Springs High School, where he was an assistant football coach and the head wrestling coach from 1974-75. He moved to Devils Lake High School in North Dakota as the head football coach in 1975, compiling a three-year record of 13-10 (1975-77). In 1978, Simmers went to North Dakota State as a graduate assistant coach, and from 1979-85 served as offensive line coach. Under his guidance, NDSU ranked among the nation's top five in rushing offense in five of his last six years at the school.

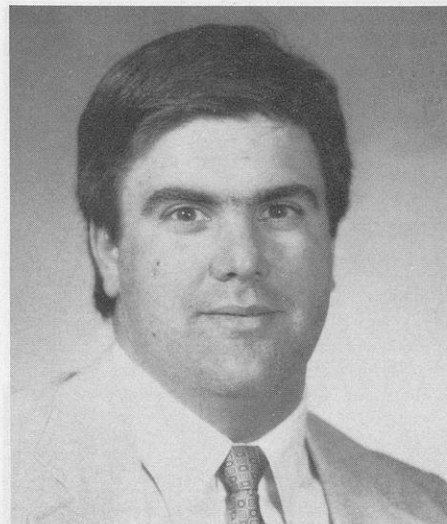

**OFFENSIVE LINE COACH**

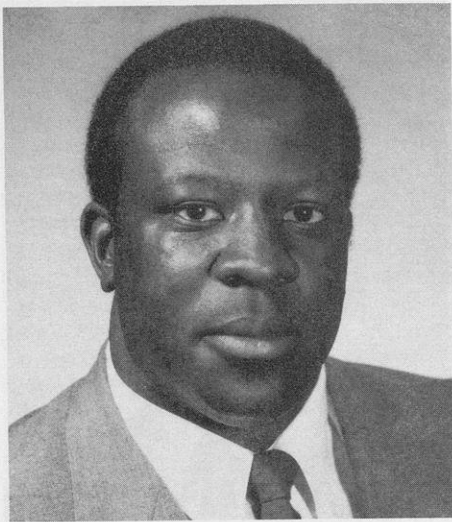

**DEFENSIVE LINE COACH**

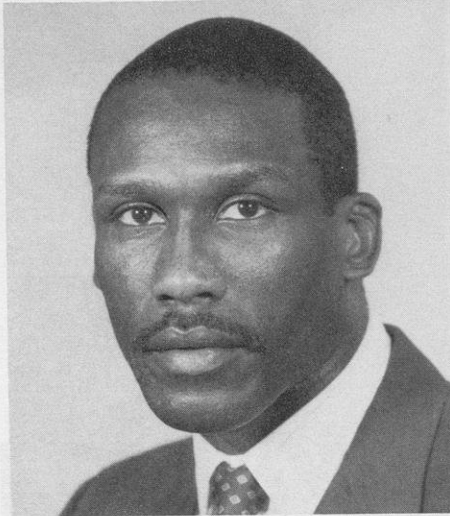

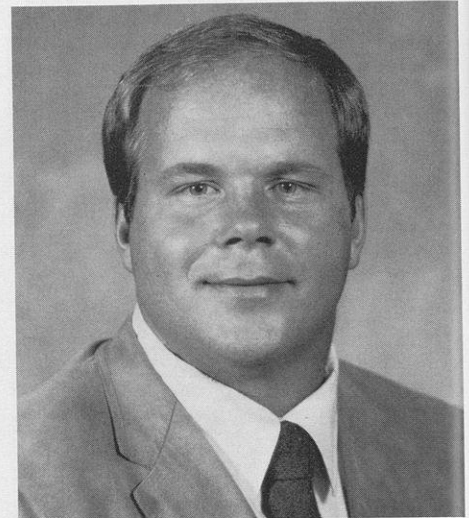
**LAWRENCE 'L. C.' COLE**

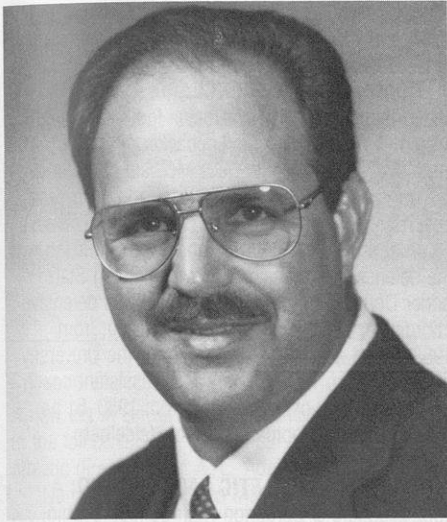

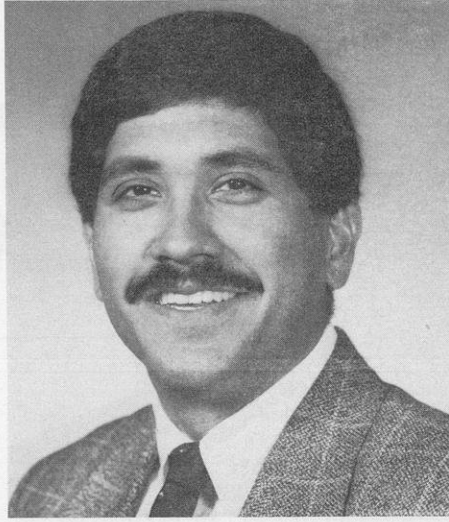
## PHIL ENGLE INSIDE LINEBACKERS COACH

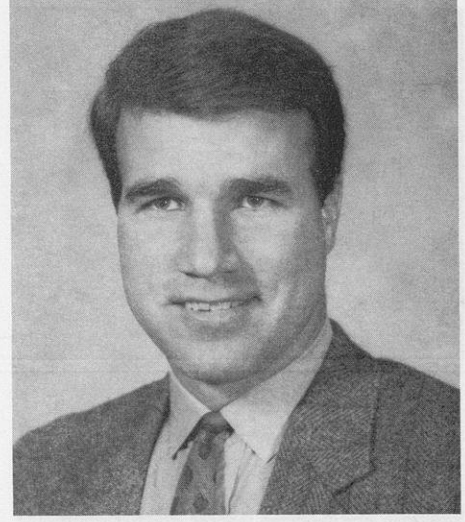
## JIMMY GONZALES DEFENSIVE LINE COACH

## MARK MAUER TIGHT ENDS/ WIDE RECEIVERS COACH

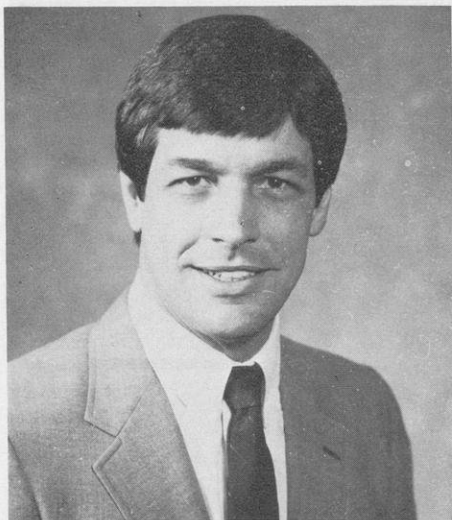

# DR. A.L. 'ADE' SPONBERG

A new era in University of Wisconsin athletics began in the fall of 1987, as the school welcomed a new athletic director in Dr. A. L. 'Ade' Sponberg.

Named to the post on May 15, 1987, Sponberg now marks his third year at the helm of the University of Wisconsin athletic program in 1989-90. He officially succeeded Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch, who served 18 years in that position, on July 1, 1987.

In just two short years, Sponberg has made a positive impact on the University of Wisconsin athletic scene. He has been instrumental in instituting a comprehensive marketing program for the athletic

department, has made the "business" side of the program a top priority, was a key figure in the addition of the Dave McClain Athletic Facility to the department's athletic facilities, and was a catalyst in securing the 1993 NCAA Ice Hockey Championships for the city of Milwaukee this past May.

Just 52 years of age, Sponberg already has 21 years of experience as a collegiate athletic director under his belt, including a tenure at North Dakota State University from 1973-87. In addition to his AD's position at NDSU, Sponberg also held the rank of professor and chaired the Division of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Athletics.

The athletic program at NDSU enjoyed a highly successful period under Sponberg's leadership. From 1982-85, North Dakota State was the all-sports champion of the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, the football team won NCAA Division II national championship in 1983, 1985 and 1986, and the men's and women's basketball teams as well as the women's volleyball team all reached NCAA Division II playoffs.

Among the football coaches Sponberg hired while athletic director at North Dakota State were Jim Wacker, now head coach at Texas Christian University, and current Wisconsin head coach Don Morton.

Prior to his period of service at NDSU, Ade was athletic director at Augustana College in Sioux Falls, South Dakota from 1968-73.

He has also been heavily involved in NCAA (National Collegiate Athletic Association) governance and policymaking throughout his distinguished career as an athletic administrator. At the time of his hiring at Wisconsin in the Spring of 1987, Ade was a member of the NCAA Council and was NCAA Division II vice-president. He also served as an NCAA Administrative Committee member from 1984-86. Since 1976, Sponberg has served on nine other NCAA committees, dealing with such issues as recruiting, legislation and interpretation, television and eligibility. Currently, he is an active member of committees involving the WCHA (Western Collegiate Hockey Association).

Ade's academic background is impressive as well. He earned a Ph.D. in Physical Education and Athletic Administration from the University of Michigan in 1968, received a master's degree in Physical Education from Mankato State University in 1963, and earned a bachelor's degree in Physical Education from Gustavus Adolphus College in 1958.

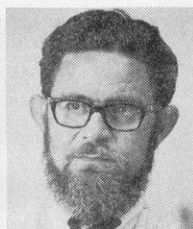

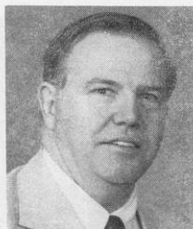

1989 marks his third year serving as a consultant to current UW athletic director A.L. 'Ade' Sponberg. Elroy is also working in the area of fund-raising for the new Dave McClain Athletic Facility.

Following World War II, Hirsch gained everlasting fame as the star flanker of the Los Angeles Rams of the National Football League.

A member of the NFL Hall of Fame, the National Football Hall of Fame, the all-time Ram and NFL All-Star teams, the Wisconsin Athletic Hall of Fame, the Michigan Hall of Honor, the Madison Sports Hall of Fame, and the National High School Hall of Fame, 'Legs' is a living legend in football circles around the country.

Elroy and his wife, Ruth, continue to make Madison their home.

## DIANE JOHNSON

### Assistant Athletic Director Student Personnel Services

## JOEL MATURI

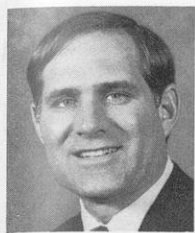
### Assistant Athletic Director Facilities and Events

He began his professional career at Madison's Edgewood High School in 1968 in the Social Studies Department. During his distinguished career there,

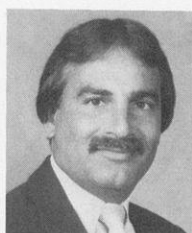

### DENNIS HELWIG

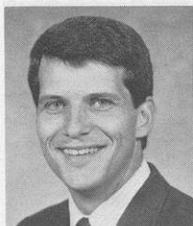
#### Training Staff Coordinator

In his 15th year with the University of Wisconsin in 1989-90 is Dennis Helwig, who serves as Training Staff Coordinator.

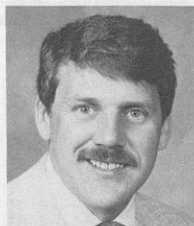
In addition to coordinating the day-to-day operation of the entire athletic training department, Helwig's major responsibility is with the Badger football team, where he serves as head trainer.

### BEN GRAF

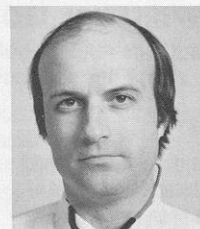
#### Team Physician

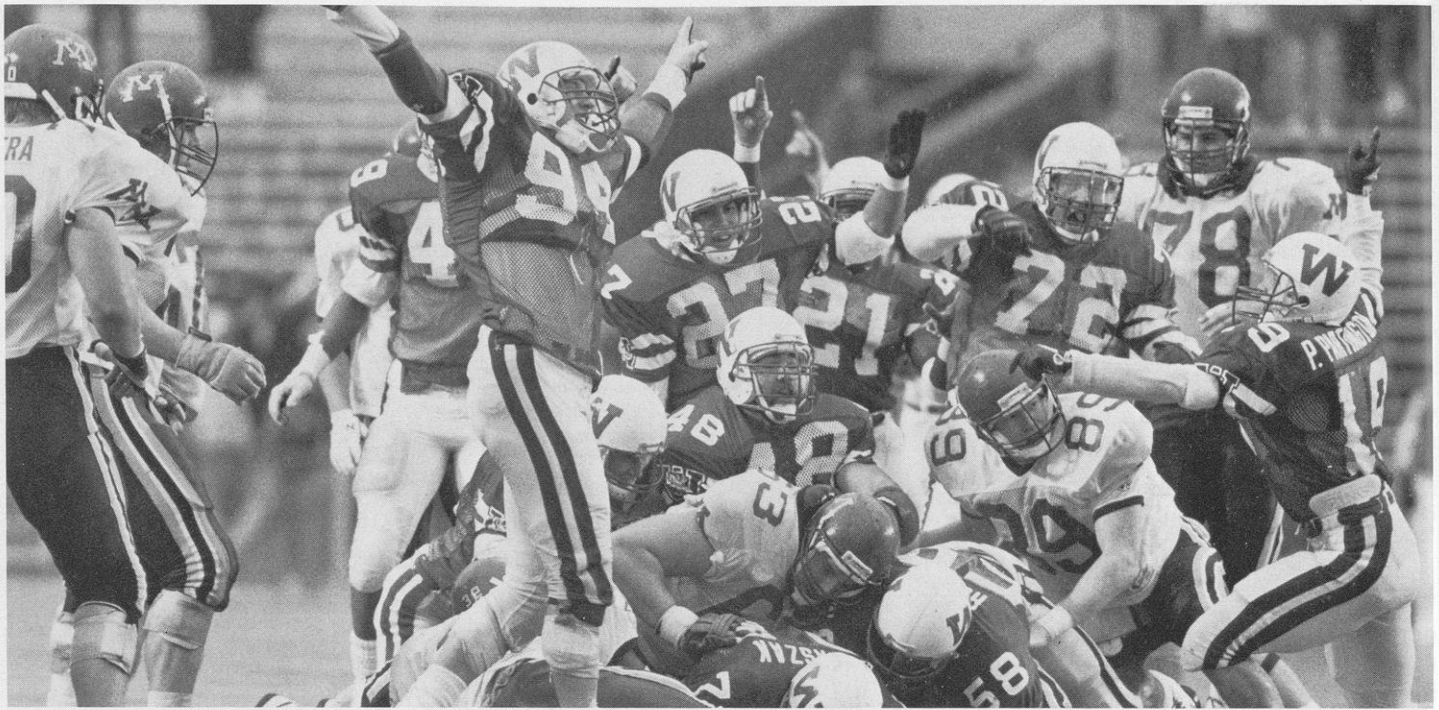

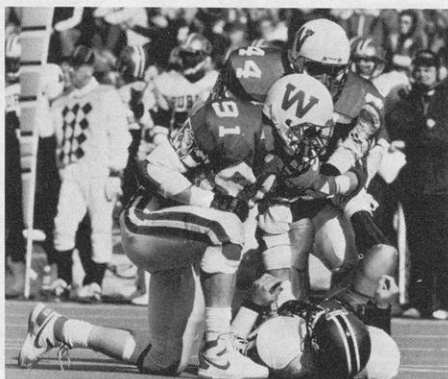

## FOUR BADGER NUMBERS RETIRED

Four football jersey numbers have been retired in Wisconsin's 100-year football history. They are No. 80, worn by All-American end Dave Schreiner in 1941 and 1942, No. 83, worn by quarterback Allan J. Shafer in 1944, No. 40, worn by standout Elroy "Crazylegs" Hirsch in 1942, and No. 35, worn by All-American fullback Alan "The Horse" Ameche.

Schreiner was killed in action with the U.S. Marine Corps during the battle of Okinawa in June

of 1945. Shaffer was fatally injured in the second half of the 1944 Wisconsin-Iowa football game and passed away shortly after the Badgers had defeated the Hawkeyes by a 26-7 count in Camp Randall Stadium on November 11, 1944.

Hirsch, who led the Badgers to a No. 3 national ranking and a 8-1-1 record in 1942, enjoyed a stellar career with the Los Angeles Rams in pro football, served as the UW's athletic director for 18 years, and

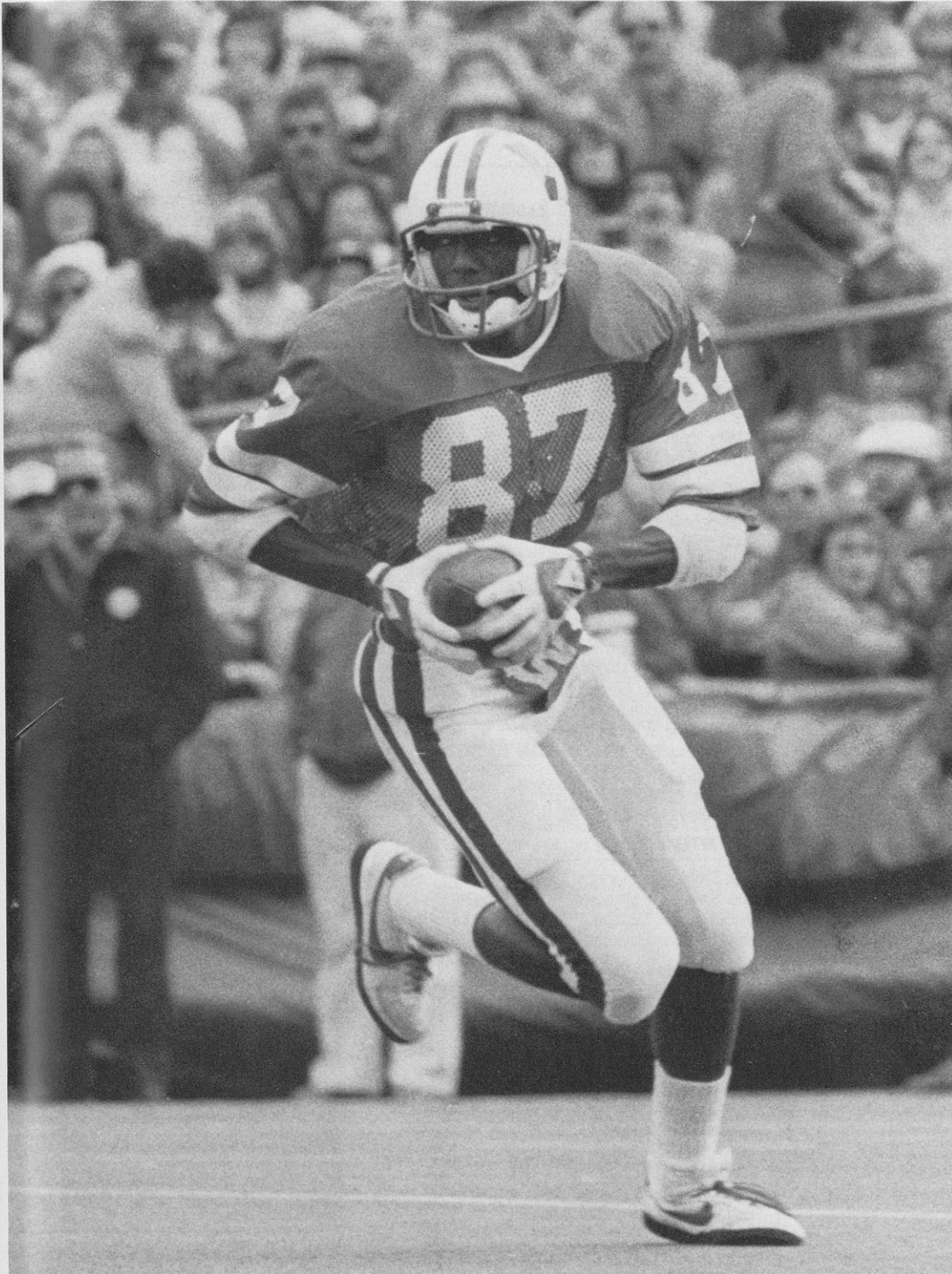
is a member of the NFL's Hall of Fame, the College Football Hall of Fame, and the National High School Hall of Fame.

Ameche, Wisconsin's only Heisman Trophy winner, wore No. 35 during the 1951-54 era, during which he established an NCAA record of 3,212 rushing yards for a career.

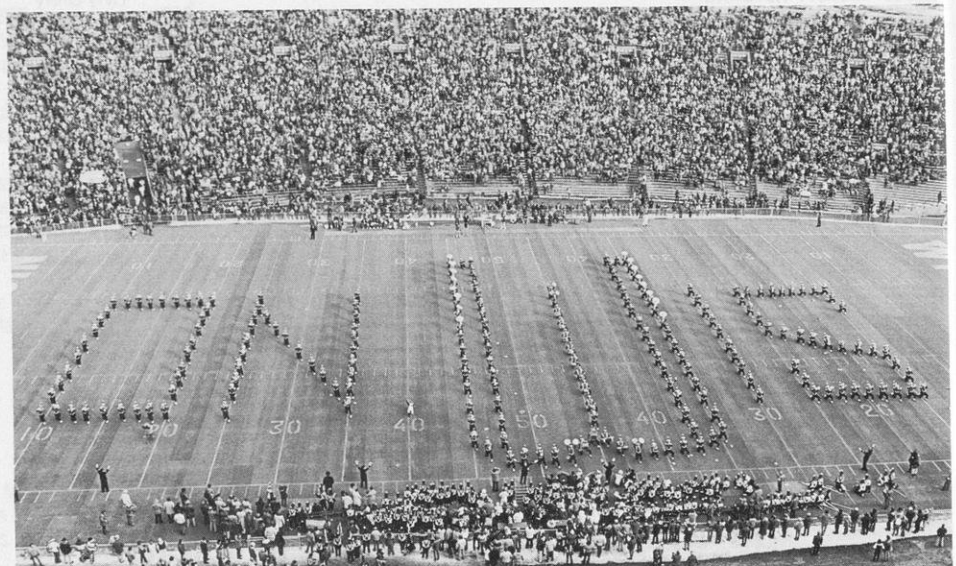

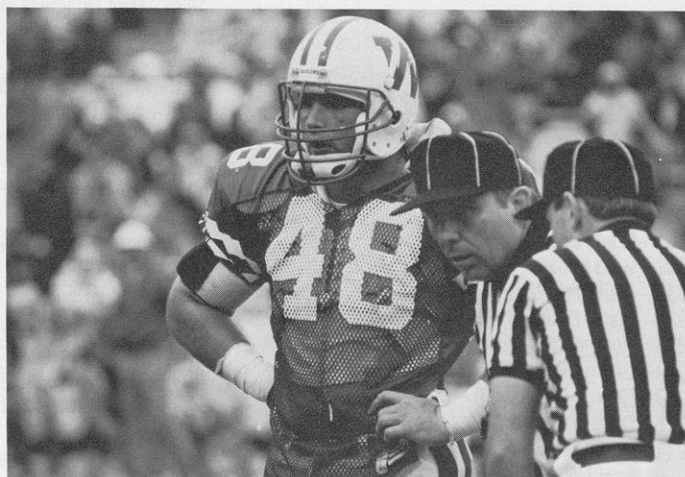

# THE WISCONSIN FOOTBALL COMPLEX

Tantamount to the success of any collegiate athletic program today are top-notch facilities. Here at the University of Wisconsin, the Badger football team is blessed with some of the nation's best.

The Wisconsin football team utilizes impressive 77,745-seat Camp Randall Stadium, the ninth largest college-owned football structure in the nation, for home games as well as outdoor practices and the beautiful new Dave McClain Athletic Facility for indoor practices, weight training, sports medicine, team meetings, film sessions and lockerroom facilities.

The mammoth double-deck, horseshoe-designed Camp Randall Stadium also houses the UW coaches' offices, lounge, conference and study areas for players and visitors, film rooms, and an extensive display of Badger Football memorabilia. From the impressive surroundings of the office of head coach Don Morton and a display area featuring three Rose Bowl games and Alan Ameche's original Heisman Trophy, to a photo display of former Badger stand-outs—including such NFL stars as Al Toon, Tim Krumrie, Mike Webster, Nate Odomes, Randy Wright, Rick Graf, Paul Gruber and Jeff Dellenbach—the Wisconsin football complex is truly complete.

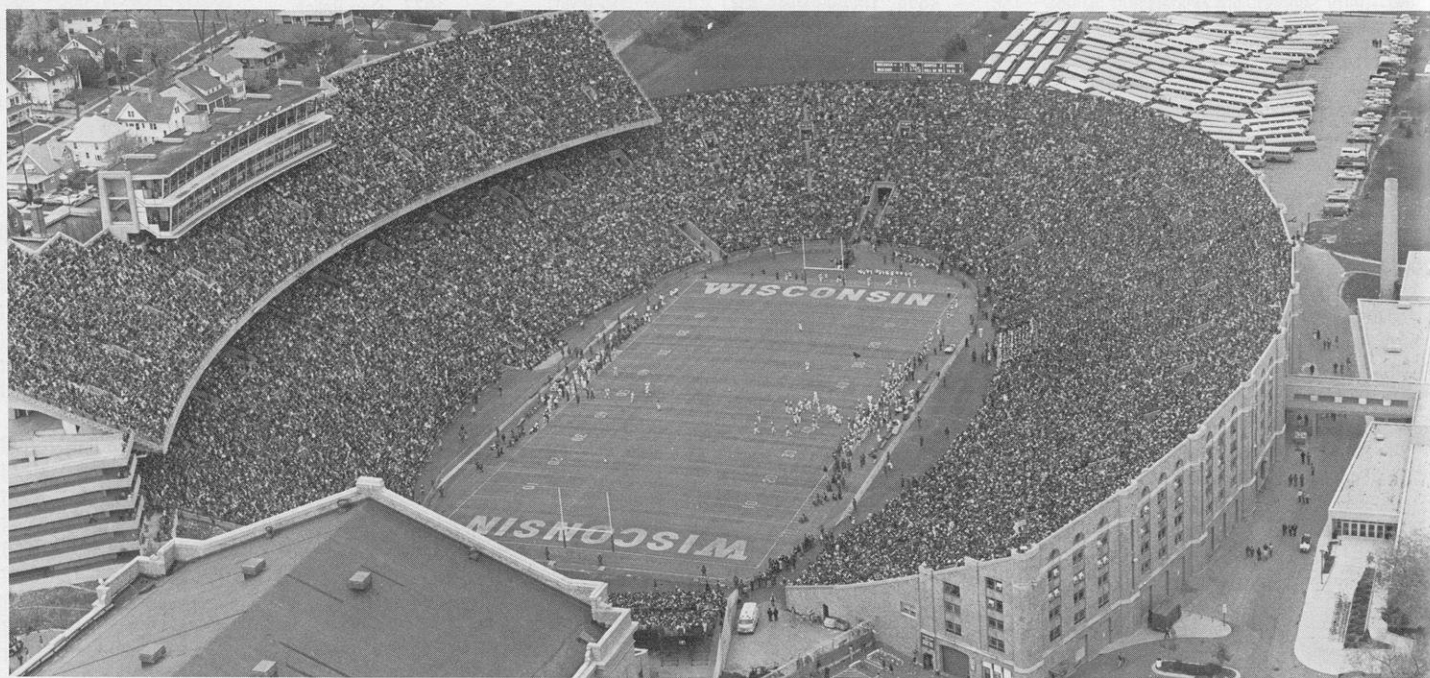
This fall, the University of Wisconsin Football program takes another giant step forward as the Badgers begin their first full season of residency in the Dave McClain indoor practice facility. A state-of-the-art building, the McClain Athletic Facility contains an artificial turf practice area (including enough clearance space for both kicking and punting), a comfortable, completely furnished lounge, spacious locker rooms, an impressive weight-training setup, an athletic training room, a lap pool for rehabilitation

of injuries, and various supply and storage areas. The McClain Athletic Facility connects directly to Camp Randall Stadium via an enclosed walkway for easy access from the football offices.

On game days, the Badger Football team dresses in the McClain Center, and then completes the walk onto the Camp Randall Stadium turf via a series of enclosed walkways.

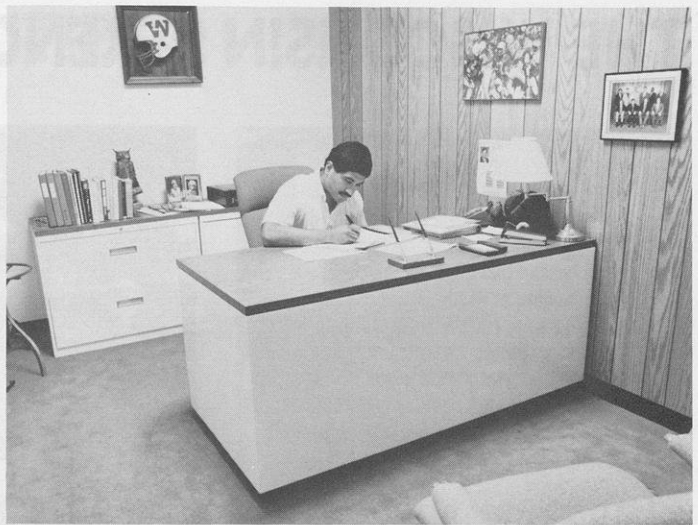

# THE WISCONSIN STRENGTH PROGRAM

At the University of Wisconsin, the "physical fitness" of student-athletes is of primary concern.

Under the guidance of Director of Football Operations Ken Ellett and strength assistant Jim Hyne, the school's strength program is recognized as one of the most successful and complete in the Big Ten.

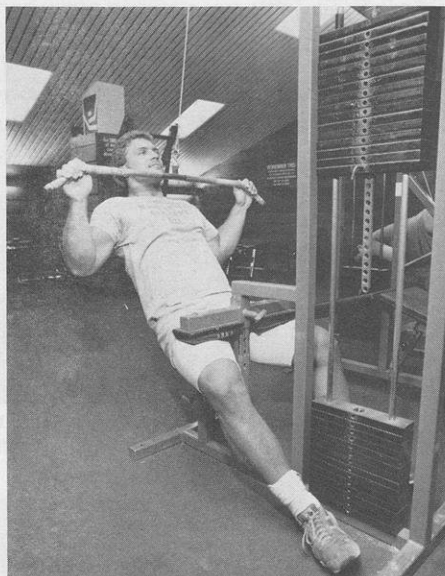
Strength training at Wisconsin consists of several year-round programs. For Badger football players, for instance, the strength program includes a pre-season training program, in-season and winter conditioning programs, and spring and summer programs as well. The football team ordinarily uses the strength training facility two hours per day, four days per week.

Each sport that utilizes the weight rooms is fully supervised by the UW strength staff. They will analyze and chart an individual athlete's week-by-week progress, as well as plan individual and team conditioning programs for the school's men's and women's sports. Strength training at the University of Wisconsin means more than just weight lifting. It also includes agility and flexibility development.

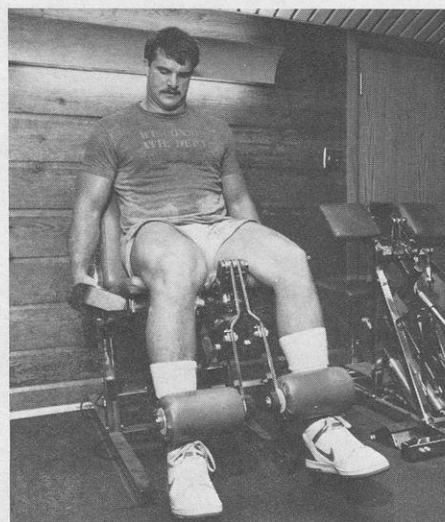
Open from 7:00 am to 8:00 pm six days per week, Camp Randall's 4,000 square foot Wisconsin weight room contains some of the finest training equipment on the market today. The football team makes use of some 38,000 pounds of free weight, 21 olympic bars, 21 free-weight stations, seven squat stations (of which four are electric squat racks), ten bench press stations, four wall-pully cable stations, five pieces of Keiser equipment (based on pneumatic pressure and used especially for high-speed training), and three full set dumbbells (5-100 pounds, in five-pound increments).

It's been a good setup, but the best is yet to come. With the Badger football team commemorating its first full year in the new Dave McClain Athletic Facility in 1989, comes a new, state-of-the-art computerized weight training room that consists of some 7,000 square feet of weight training areas.

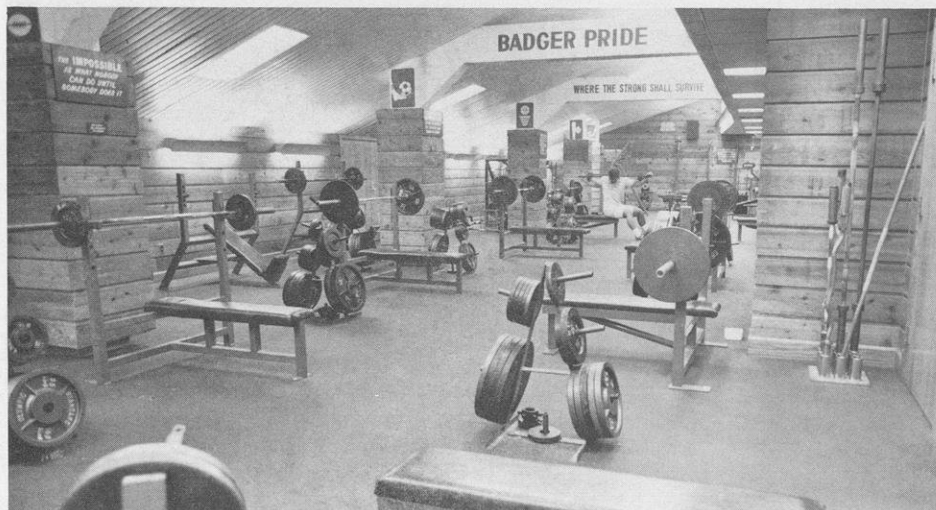
Along with all new weight training equipment, there is a separate computer room for evaluating athletes, a maintenance room, strength training offices, and a glass-enclosed conference area with seating for ten to 15 people.

# ATHLETIC TRAINING FACILITIES

The Wisconsin Athletic Training Department is also housed in both Camp Randall Stadium and the Dave McClain Athletic Facility.

Six full-time trainers, under the direction of staff coordinator Dennis Helwig, two graduate assistants, and some 20 student-trainers are on hand each day to assist the more than 900 University of Wisconsin student-athletes in their complex, personal needs.

In addition to the main training facilities in Camp Randall Stadium and the new Dave McClain Athletic Facility, the department also has five satellite facilities around the campus. There is one at the UW Fieldhouse, the Red Gym, the Natatorium, the Dane County Memorial Coliseum, and Nielsen Tennis Stadium.

Helwig and his staff put the main emphasis of their work on preventive programs. Their daily routines include coordinating the physiological testing of athletes, enlisting computer programs such as *Anjion* (dietary analysis) to provide nutritional information to athletes, utilizing Cybex strength-testing devices in the evaluation of strength weaknesses, working with attending physicians in rehabilitation of student-athletes, working to improve individual athletic performance, and outlining preventive stretching programs to aid in avoiding the recurrence of past injuries. The trainers also advise athletes as to what

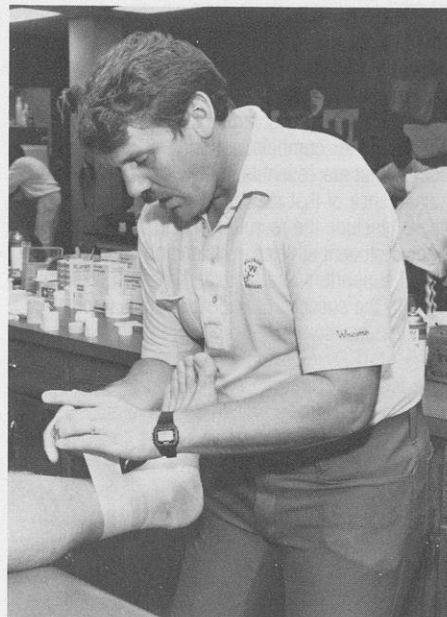
type of treatments they should do and refer them to appropriate physicians.

Thanks to the introduction of computers into the training department several years ago, the UW staff now has the capability of tracking sports injuries; in other words, diagnosing when and where these injuries most often occur. This information has proved extremely helpful to coaches in devising conditioning programs and practices for their teams.

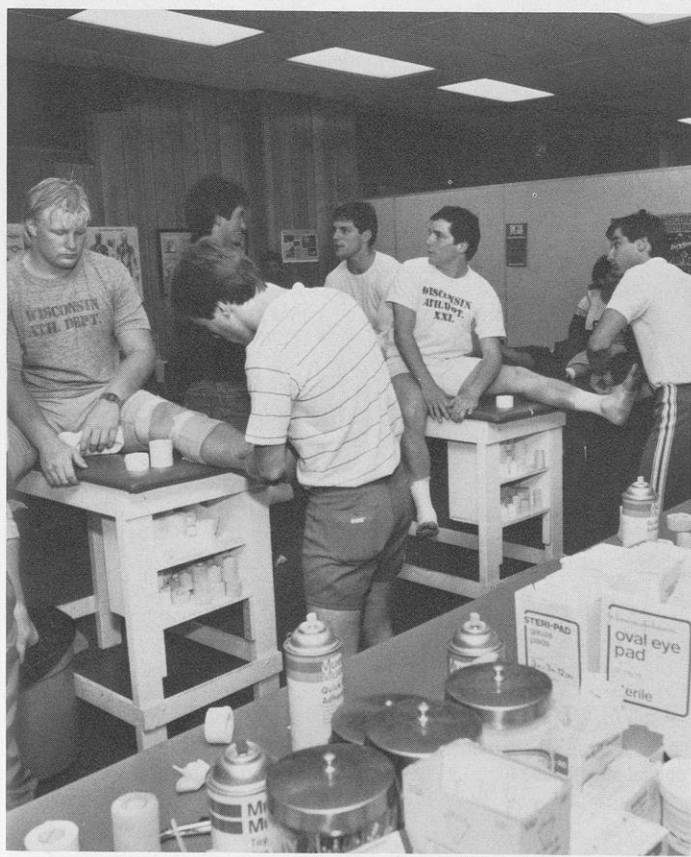
The UW training staff is also proud of their close working relationship with Madison-area physicians, some of whom regularly visit the campus to see injured athletes. Working directly with the Wisconsin football team are orthopedic surgeons Jim Keene and Ben Graf, and Dr. Greg Landry, who handles internal medical problems for UW athletics.

"The frequency of visits to the campus by our attending physicians," reports Helwig, "helps us with rehabilitation programs and shortens significantly the return to competition for our injured athletes. These individuals make a very large and very important contribution to the success of our athletic programs."

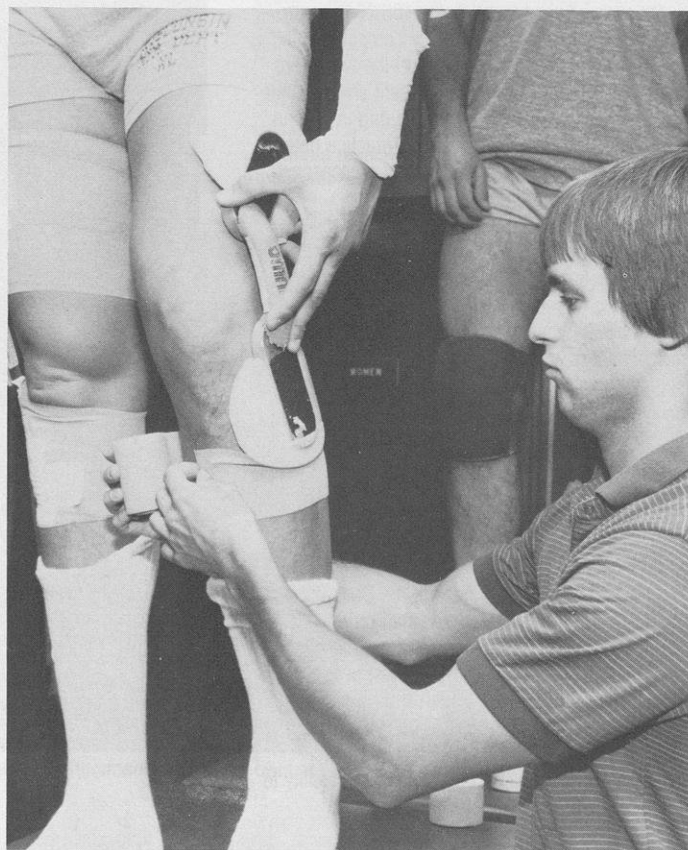

# THE DAVE McCLAIN ATHLETIC FACILITY

The University of Wisconsin is justly proud of its long and distinguished tradition of success in inter-collegiate athletics, one that includes 100 years of Badger gridiron history.

But within any winning athletic tradition, one will find a complex combination of ingredients; "building blocks" that are essential to the development and maintenance of that success. These "building blocks" include the recruitment and development of talented student-athletes, outstanding coaches, faithful supporters and fans, and modern facilities.

With the success of Badger Football (football revenues provide nearly 80 percent of the financial support for UW Athletics) impacting on the entire 25-sport men's and women's athletic program, the school has maintained a constant program of upgrading existing facilities as well as continued planning for future additions that should help ensure the continued good health of its athletic teams.

The monumental Dave McClain Athletic Facility, named in honor of the late Wisconsin football coach, is helping to usher in a new era in University of Wisconsin Athletics.

Head football coach Don Morton said the indoor facility is critical to the success of his football program. "The construction of the McClain facility is a statement of commitment that the university wants to compete at the highest echelon of Big Ten football," he said.

Officially opened in 1988, the 166,264-square foot Dave McClain Athletic Facility compares with the finest indoor training facilities in the world. For Badger Football, it provides a pleasant environment that improves practice conditions during in-season inclement weather and post-season practice periods, and it assists student-athletes in their off-season conditioning and skill development.

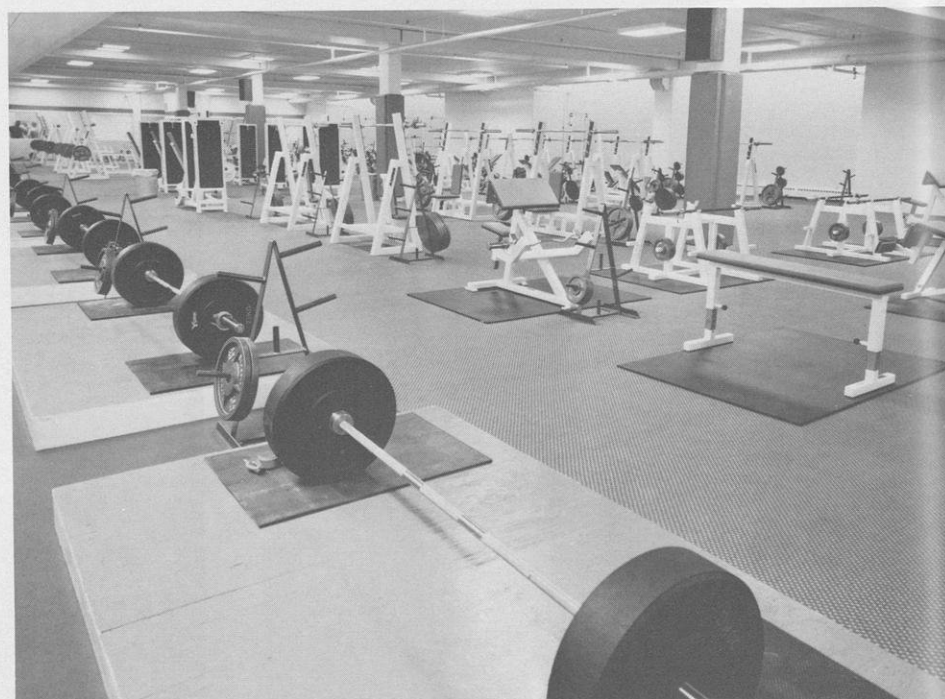
"This is a state-of-the-art facility," said facility architect Ronald Bowen. "We examined a number of other practice facilities, and this has to be considered among the elite indoor facilities in the nation."

The 76,380-square foot main floor of the new facility features an artificial turf practice area, with adequate space for all components of practice including height for kicking and punting. The building's 64,320-square foot lower level houses showers, lockerroom and dressing areas, a modern athletic training area - including hydrotherapy space, supply and storage areas, and a new, fully-equipped weight-training room. The upper level consists of 5,300 square feet of space.

At a total cost of \$9.5 million, the Dave McClain Athletic Facility has been constructed on an outdoor practice field immediately north of Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center. The domed structure is bordered on the north by the Engineering building, the east by Camp Randall Park, and on the west by parking lot #17 and Camp Randall Stadium. Direct access is provided via a corridor from the facility to the football offices in the stadium.



The focus of the McClain Facility is, of course, the 90-yard artificial turf practice field. The 76,380-square-foot main floor even has enough height for kicking and punting practice.

## McCLAIN FACILITY CONSTRUCTION FACTS

The Dave McClain Center was constructed in two phases. The main floor construction, referred to as "Phase I," was begun in July of 1987 and consisted of a 330-foot by 220-foot concrete floor supporting a 90-yard artificial turf practice field. In addition, a 2,700 square foot viewing and reception area is housed on the main level. The "Booster Room" will contain a memorial to Coach Dave McClain and other assorted Wisconsin football memorabilia.

The "Phase II" construction period, completed this past winter, included the full lower level beneath the main floor. This lower level houses team facilities that include lockerrooms, showers, a sauna and

steam room, a rehabilitation pool, a weight training facility, equipment storage area, athletic training and sports medicine facilities, offices and a media interview room.

The second floor area above the main floor entrance contains comfortable, attractive classrooms, a 150-person capacity auditorium and a direct access to Camp Randall Stadium. The McClain Center supports activities of both the stadium and the Camp Randall Memorial Sports Center.

To fully appreciate the scope of the Dave McClain Athletic facility, one need only examine just what went into the construction of the facility. To begin

with, there are 166,000 square feet in the facility. To make room for the building, some 70,000 cubic yards of earth had to be dug up and removed. Among the materials? Try 6,500 cubic yards of concrete, 75,000 concrete blocks, 1,550 gallons of paint, 4,300 square feet of carpeting, 2.5 miles of heating/cooling piping, 2.8 miles of plumbing piping, 101,000 square feet of stainless steel roof material, 35,000 pounds of ductwork, 27 miles of electrical wiring, 40,000 square feet of electrical conduit, and 43,000 square feet of roof fabric.

# CAMP RANDALL STADIUM

Camp Randall Stadium, the home of the University of Wisconsin Football Team, is recognized as one of the finest collegiate facilities in the nation.

From its impressive doubledeck, horseshoe design and 77,745-seat capacity, to its modern and spacious Communications Center, the UW is proud that its sports center is more than just an athletic field.

The ninth largest college-owned structure in the nation and third largest in the Big Ten, Camp Randall's official capacity of 77,745 is surpassed only by Michigan (101,701), Tennessee (91,249), Ohio State (85,290), Stanford (84,795), Penn State (83,770), Georgia (82,122), Texas (80,000) and Clemson (78,915).

Wisconsin football teams have played before season averages of more than 70,000 fans per game 12 times since 1972 and have ranked among the nation's top 15 in attendance several times. Since 1972, the Badgers have drawn a total of 1,172,194 fans, a per season average of 68,953 per game. Wisconsin teams have drawn crowds of more than 77,000 on 17 occasions since 1980, and on 30 occasions since 1975. The all-time single game attendance record at Camp Randall Stadium is 80,024, set against Michigan in 1978.

Located atop the west side of Camp Randall's double deck, the Communications Center ranks as one of the nation's finest facilities for press, radio and television. The Communications Center contains working areas for more than 300 athletic staff and media personnel throughout its three levels. The third level is composed of radio and television broadcast booths. The fourth level is reserved for the UW Sports News Service, print media, UW athletic staff, statistical crews, visiting dignitaries, and competing coaches. The fifth level, meanwhile, houses private corporation boxes, game film areas, and is also used for television broadcasts.

In addition to serving as the home of Wisconsin Football, Camp Randall Stadium also houses the UW Athletic Department and the office of the National "W" Club.

## THE NOTEWORTHY HISTORY OF CAMP RANDALL

Although the original structure was built in 1917, the history of the Camp Randall area itself dates back much further than the 70+ years of the stadium.

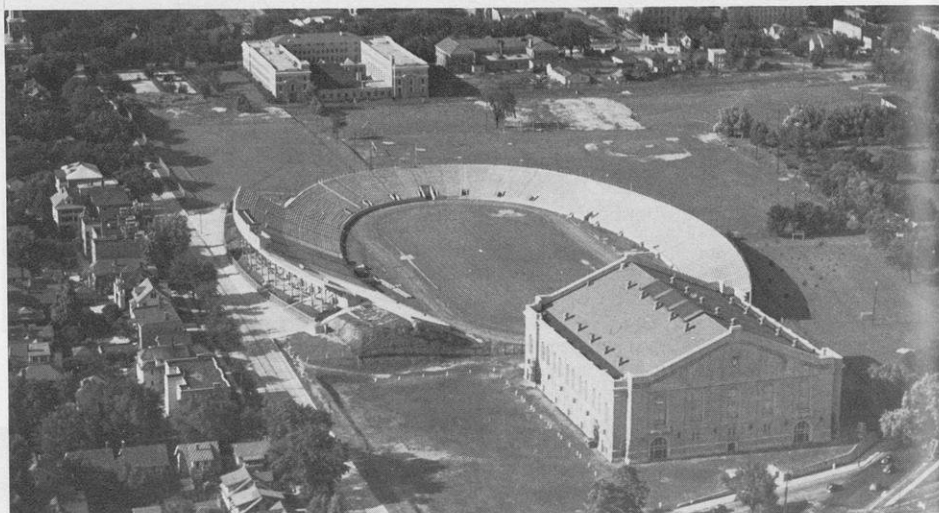
In the years prior to the Civil War, the original site was owned by the State Agricultural Society, whose yearly state fairs attracted holiday throngs there.

When the Civil War broke out in 1861, however, the society turned the land over to the government to become Wisconsin's major military training center. Named for a wartime governor, the site became known as "Camp Randall Military Training Center."

The land became the state fair grounds again when peace returned, and when General U.S. Grant visited it 15 years later, he hailed the transformation from a wartime military training center to the site of the annual state fair as "a symbol of beating the spears of war into the plowshares of peace." (Others who had visited the grounds included General Sherman, General Sheridan and President Hayes.)

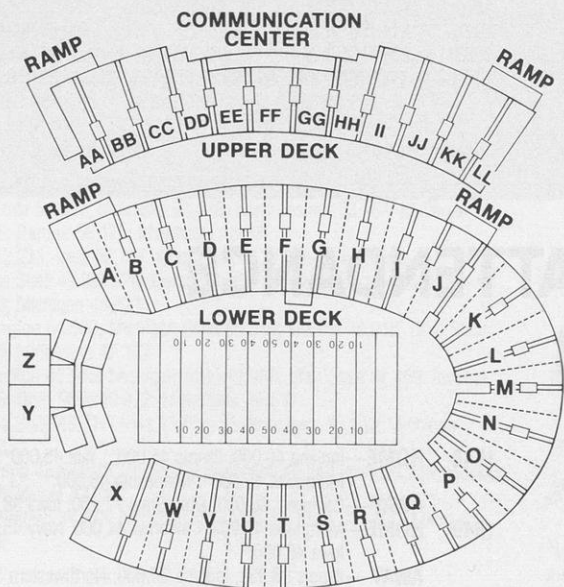

Following the eventual move of the Wisconsin State Fair to Milwaukee, it was decided that the land should be sold for building lots. This decision infuriated surviving Civil War veterans. Blasting this "sordid sacrilege," they promptly urged the legislature to purchase the land, and in 1893 the State of Wisconsin presented the site to the University as a memorial athletic field. And when the question of a name arose, the vets naturally carried the day for "camp" instead of "field."

Football became part of the University of Wisconsin athletic scene in 1889, but the first games were actually played on the lower part of the campus, with a part of the crowd regularly watching from fringed surreys. (Wisconsin won its first great victory at home in 1894, defeating Minnesota 6-0.)

The University had a "real" stadium by 1913, but the stands were still constructed of wood. The legislature had declined to pay the extra expense of concrete and consequently, a large section collapsed on Nov. 21, 1915, and injured 20 spectators. (Only the fact that the seats fell slowly prevented more casualties from among the 1,800 in the area.)

In 1917, a new 10,000-seat concrete structure was begun with a grant of \$15,000 from the state legislature. The rest of the money to finance the project was earned through University athletic events.

The first game to be played in the "new" Camp Randall Stadium in 1917 was the memorable Homecoming matchup with the Minnesota Golden Gophers—a game the Badgers won 10-7.

In 1921, capacity was increased to 29,783, then to 38,293 in 1926, and to 45,000 in 1940. The first of three enlargements following World War II took place in 1950-51 with completion of the horseshoe at the north end of the stadium, which increased capacity to 51,000.

In 1958 the running track was eliminated from Camp Randall, the playing field was lowered ten feet, and 12,000 more seats were added to give the facility a total of 63,435 seats. The addition of the second deck on the west side in 1966 created 13,000 more prime viewing seats, as well as construction of the modern Communications Center, and capacity rose to 77,745.

1984 saw the creation of 14 private boxes—each with seating for up to ten people—on the fifth level of the Communications Center, while a 1985 construction project on the third level of the Communications Center created ten new booths for radio broadcasts.

More than 400 campus organizations offer a wide variety of activities for Wisconsin students—including social, political, philosophic or religious, sports, honorary, ecological, philanthropic, drama and music groups, plus fraternities and sororities. Film societies show 400 titles a year, and the intramural recreation program services some 35,000 students and staff at five indoor recreational facilities every month.

The University's complete intercollegiate athletic program includes men's competition in football, basketball, ice hockey, track and field, soccer, swimming, tennis, rowing, wrestling, baseball, cross country, golf, gymnastics and fencing.

The Wisconsin Union has been providing a variety of services and an extensive program of social, cultural, and recreational events for students. Memorial Union, on the shores of Lake Mendota, is a cen-

ter of activity for some 18,000 people every day. Another 10,000 enter Union South, and more than 11,000 meals are served daily in the Wisconsin Union's 11 restaurants and delis.

The Elvehjem Museum of Art, the second largest art museum in the state, houses the University's collection of more than 10,000 paintings, prints, drawings, sculpture, and decorative arts dating from 2300 B.C. to the present, and maintains an active schedule of temporary exhibits.

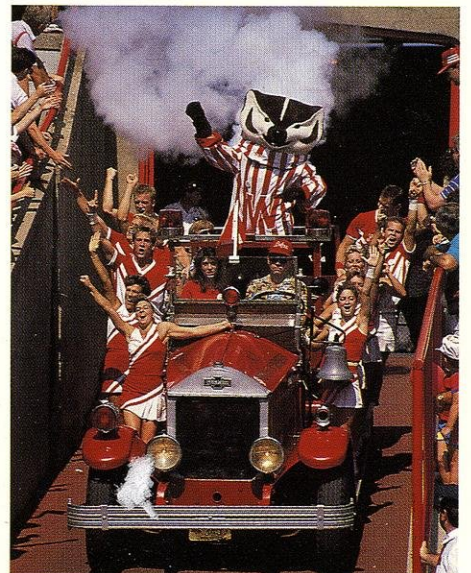
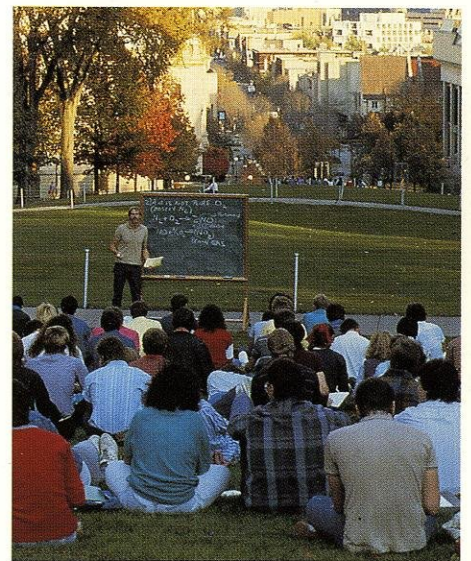
University Theatre, School of Music, and the Dance Division offer a wide range of performances throughout the year. Facilities include the Ronald E. Mitchell and Gilbert Hemsley Theaters in Vilas Communication Hall, Mills Concert Hall, Morphy Recital Hall, and the Eastman Organ Recital Hall. The Wisconsin Union Theater, with 1,300 seats, hosts visiting concert artists, orchestras, professional theater and dance companies, conferences, lectures and films.

Situated amidst five freshwater lakes and rolling hills, the University of Wisconsin-Madison is one of the most enchanting campuses in America. It sits on the south shore of Lake Mendota, encompassing
